

JESUS AND HIS CIRCLE OF LOVE

In infancy He startled a king; in childhood He puzzled doctors; in manhood He ruled the course of nature, walked upon the billows,

and hushed the sea.

He healed the multitudes without medicine and made no charge for His service. He never wrote a book. Yet all the libraries of the country could not hold the books that have been written about Him. He never wrote a song, and yet He has furnished the theme for more songs than all the songwriters combined.

He never marshaled an army, drafted a soldier, nor fired a gun. Yet no leader ever had more volunteers who have, under His orders, brought more rebels to stack arms and surrender without a shot. He never practiced psychiatry. Yet He has healed more broken hearts than all the doctors.

The names of the past proud statesmen of Greece and Rome have come and gone. Scientists, philosophers, and theologians have come and gone, but the name of this Man abounds more and more. He lives. Herod could not destroy Him. The grave could not hold Him.

He stands upon the highest pinnacle of heavenly glory, proclaimed of God, acknowledged by angels, adored by saints. The living Christ, our Lord and Saviour.

One man found 208 names assigned to Jesus in the Bible! Included were Son of the Highest, Immanuel, the Word, the Lamb of God, the Messiah, and the King of Israel. Truly, God has highly exalted Jesus and "given him a name which is above every name"... The many-sided character of our Lord demanded that He be endowed with literally hundreds of different titles.

The Holy Spirit refers to Jesus Christ as the Second Man, the Last Adam, the Son of God, the Son of

Man, the Only Begotten of the Father, the Firstborn from the Dead, the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords, the Captain of our Salvation, the Head of the Church, the Messiah of Israel, the King of the Jews. His name is called Wonderful, Counsellor, The Mighty God, The everlasting Father, and The Prince of Peace. The Holy Spirit refers to Christ as the Lamb of God and the Lion of the tribe of Judah. The field of engineering is utilized to call Christ the Chief Cornerstone, the Rock of Ages, Head of the Corner, and the Foundation Stone. He is the Sun of Righteousness and the Bright and Morning Star. He is called the Prophet, Priest, and King, the Angel of the Lord, the Bread of Life, the Door, the Water of Life, the Word of God, the Good, Great, and Chief Shepherd. Where shall we stop? He is the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End. Yea, He is the Altogether Lovely One.

Each name in the Bible has a certain meaning peculiar to itself, Mrs. Lydia Baxter told her friends. They were visiting in the living room of NYC home one afternoon in 1870 . . . The name Jacob was descriptive of the character of Jacob, because the name itself actually means Supplanter: ... The name Isaac means laughter, for when Abraham and Sara learned that at their advanced ages they were to become parents, they laughed . . . Samuel means Asked of God, since his mother Hannah asked God for a son, promising to dedicate the lad to God's service, if He would answer her prayer. Hannah means grace, Sarah means princess, Naomi means pleasantness.

Mrs. Baxter, despite her radiant personality and cheerful disposition, had long been an invalid, and periodically was confined to her bed for days. Those who came within the influence of her lovely Christian spirit marveled at the way she bore her pain, endured her physical agony, and refused to let it crush her. They came to visit her constantly, not so much to give encouragement and comfort as to receive from her some added bouyancy.

Lydia, one of her most intimate friends used to confess, we are not here to cheer you up. You don't need cheering up, but we do. And we are here so you, the sick one, can give us a little of your zest, and so some of your wonderful faith can rub off on the rest of us . . .

How do you do it? others would ask, as they marvelled at the way she triumphed over pain and confinement.

I have some very special armor, she would reply... You see, I have the name of Jesus, and I use that name as my special protection. When I feel badly, and wonder if I will ever enjoy a good night's sleep again, I take the name of Jesus and ask Him to give me the soothing balm of His presence, and I soon drop off to sleep. The name Jesus means Saviour.

Her life gave evidence to the reality of her faith. Soon her friends were searching the Scriptures, to find out more about the

Lydia had been born in Petersburg, New York, Sept. 2, 1809 . . . Following marriage, she and her husband moved to New York City. where they were to make their home until her death, June 22, 1874. Her study of the Bible enabled her to understand the significance of the name of Jesus and appreciate its meaning and power in a wonderful way.

The name of Jesus represents the personality and character of Jesus in all His mighty power, she stated. When Jesus stated that where two or three are gathered in my name, He meant that they were assembled together in His Spirit for the purpose of glorifying Him and expanding His work in the world. When the people shouted on Palm Sunday, when He made His triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, they meant that Jesus came as the Lord, for the name represented the character of the Lord. Christians were those who believed on His name, which was the same thing as saying believed on Him . . . John wrote his gospel so many might have life in His name, which meant that they might have life in Him. God's name was to be holy and hallowed, as God himself was holy and hallowed. When we call on the name of the Lord, we call on the Lord himself, and when we are baptized in his name, we are baptized into him and the fellowship

The Valley and the Prayer (The editor has supplied the title to a printed letter, received by my mother and I. The author is Bro. Henry Beer of Milford. See how valuable time is, and how good to use the opportunity to prayer.)

I have so many reasons to thank the Lord for His many blessings bestowed upon me for the 73 years of my being upon earth. I have been blest with good health, and was never sick more than a day or two at a time, and have never been confined to a hospital, although to the best of my ability and as time permitted, I often visited sick and suffering brethren and friends who were confined to hospital care.

However, late in November of '73. I became ill and could not retain food in my stomach. During December, I lost much weight and I was facing a formidable problem. I had always abhorred the idea of surgery, and to a great extent followed health rules and was able to resume my work and family obligations without pain or distress, for which I was daily thankful.

However, not improving in my condition, I was encouraged by members of my family and by brethren in the church to go to the Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minnesota. After committing it to the Lord in prayer, the mountain of fear concerning surgery seemed to vanish as if cast into the sea. I praise the Lord for removing my doubts and fears, as a wise man will change his own convictions when reason would call for it. My wife and I decided to go to Mayo's on Jan. 7.

During the tests and observations at the Clinic, which is truly very scientific and exacting, they discovered that I had gastric ulcers in my stomach, the reason for my inability to eat and retain food. This type of ulcer cannot be effectively treated by medication, but on the other hand requires surgery. To this I became reconciled, and surgery was arranged for the

17th of January. Dr. Bearhs (pronounced the same as my name) was to perform the surgery. He is a famous surgeon and is flown to other parts of the world to operate on notables and dignitaries. Naturally I did not belong in that class, but I had requested his ser-

Now the main point of this writing is concerning the valley of the shadow of death experience. Many of us live quiet sheltered lives, enjoying the green pastures and the quiet and still waters of an uninterrupted Christian life. True. many of us sometimes because of our own failings and lack of understanding feel the winds and storms of life blow over us for our correction and humbling. all permitted by our loving Lord. So many go through a lifetime and never enter into the valley spoken of by the sweet Psalmist.

After the surgery is when I entered into the dark vallev-darkness back of me. high insurmountable walls at either side, and it seemed there was a soft yellow glimmering light far beyond me in this dark valley. My prayers to the Lord were broken and interrunted hv pain, and it is then I recalled that our elder brother and ministers, Sunday School teachers and so many of our dear brethren in our church and in other congregations assured me of their prayers. and it is in this manner that Paul's teaching to the Romans. Chapter 12. found meaning: Continuing instant in prayer, which was so needed to carry me through the three davs following this painful sur-

A heartfelt feeling of humility underlines my account of my experiences, and I do not wish to convev that other brethren have not experienced the same as I or even a greater witness of the love and gracious care of our blessed Lord.

So I have re-evaluated the prayers of the saints, and esteem each praver that the strongest and weakest pray to be of value in the sight of our Heavenly Father and to help carry us through the trials and troubles of this earthly life.

Gives exercise to faith and love. Brings every blessing from above.

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME PROJECT REPORT

In 1969 upon completion of the new building for the Dessie Scott Children's Home in Kentucky, many brothers felt that because of the great need for child care facilities. it would be well if our church checked into this need further. After receiving clearance from the elder body, many investigations were made by an exploratory committee and reports were made at each conference as the years went by. Last August at the Morton conference, permission was given to go ahead.

Two sites were offered at no charge for the use of the Children's Home, Francesville and Leo. After tours and meetings with public officials from both communities, a period of two weeks was allowed for the committee brothers to pray that the Lord would direct them in making a site selection. At Remington, on the 30th of November. a meeting was held and the vote was taken. Eighteen votes were cast and one counselling elder, who sunnorts the project, declined to vote. which resulted in a tie vote of nine to nine. After prayer two ballots were placed in the Bible. A brother drew Leo as the site. We believe the Lord's will was done. While either site was acceptable by all,

the Lord did the selecting.

The corporation papers have been received, and the attorney is now working on paners to clear the Home with the Internal Revenue department as a tax exempt notfor-profit corporation. Regoning of the land, making of a topographical map, sewage disposal, water, master layout, building plans, qualifications for the administrator and house parents, financial matters and many other items are on the minds of your committee members as time rushes on. Very shortly the call will go out, and hopefully we will be able to select the administrator. We solicit your prayers and support, as this brother and sister will be important to the conduct of the Children's Home.
