Who art thou that judgest another man's servant? To his own master he standeth or falleth. Yea, he shall be holden up: for God is able to make him stand.



A Work of Faith, a Labor of Love

In the March issue of The Silver Lining, Bro. Jack Krantz gave a summary of steps taken to establish the Apostolic Christian Children's Home and the various work accomplished to date. May I try to bring you up to date on how we have handled our meetings, prayerfully asking God's blessings and with your prayerful support. These have been some of our guidelines used and under which, we believe, God has been able to guide and bless our thinking.

No meetings have been held by the committee approved by the elder brothers, without an elder or more in attendance for counseling. . . All regular meetings are open, at which time final action is taken, and members and friends

who have an interest in this work are encouraged to attend. . . All parties attending, at an allotted time, are given the opportunity to express their thoughts for our consideration. Minutes are kept of each meeting, and copies are sent to all directors, incorporating members and the four counseling elders appointed by the elder body. Elder Bro. David Bertsch will send a summary to all of the elder body on a regular basis. . . The directors each have a vote, and five or more of the nine directors shall constitute a quorum and can act on any matter discussed at the board meetings. . . All meetings must have official notification, as provided by the Articles of Incorporation, bylaws, and/or advance action taken by the directors in accordance with the statutorial regulations. . . Meetings have been held at different churches, to give the broadest exposure and knowledge of what we are doing to the greatest number of members and friends. . . Complete financial information is kept by our treasurer, and a report will be made in the Silver Lining during the next few months, along with other vital and interesting information.

We will try to do our best to keep you informed. If questions arise, please write Bros. Jack Krantz or William Klopfenstein, requesting information, and we will do our best to answer. We ask your continued prayers and guidance that God's will may be done.

Applications for the Children's Home Administrator now being accepted

Through our Lord's guidance we seek to help the children in need of loving care. An outline of the qualifications for Administrator are listed:

Must be a brother sound in faith, upholding church order and doctrine, married to a sister of like standing. . . Must have the support of his home church and Elder. . Demonstrate administrative ability and understand fiscal policies... Be able to command respect of children as well as adults. . . Desirable age between 25 and 55 years; consideration will be given to all applicants. . . Must be able to meet requirements of governing authorities. . . A resume is required to be sent with your request for an interview.

The brother and sister interested can send their resume of experience to Apostolic Christian Children's Home, Box 8, Leo, IN 46765. The replies should be forwarded prior to July 1, as interviews will begin about this time. We will try to arrange interviews promptly, at mutual convenience. Time is of great importance, and your applications should be submitted promptly.

The title is Greek, in English letters. In Philippians it is translated moderation. "Let your moderation be known unto all men." It is marked off by, to—the. The moderation.

It is a very important attribute of a sweet personality. In II Corinthians 10, in a different form of grammar, it is translated gentleness. "Now I Paul myself beseech you by the meekness and gentleness of Christ..."

What is God pointing out, not for our listening pleasure only, but to model our lives like Jesus? He gives us words that are 100% accurate. They ask the highest model, the best goal, pure perfection. Jesus and Paul always spoke the full counsel of God. They wanted it in action in the hearers, and they showed a sweet compassion with others.

Paul said: "I... beseech..."
Notice the tone. It is reasonabless.
Not being overly demanding.
Those under our influence, not using rigour. See what is in the prayer our Lord gave: Forgive us, as

we forgive. It is beautifully shown in the longings of the Master's heart. His people are not to be like the servant who demanded the last ounce, the small debt. The feet washing so dramatically and truly shows what we are to do. Those little shortcomings of another, those need cleansing, those that are in our daily walk.

Another place it is used, in slightly different form, is I Peter. It is to be shown in employer-employee relationship. "Servants, be subject to your masters with all fear; not only to the good and gentle, but also to the froward." It is not hard to picture a boss with this sweet gentleness, moderation, and one who is hard and stern.

We are not moderate when we down-speak, talk about a brother or sister in an unloving way. Nor when we become overseers in things that belong to that person and God. We can interfere, get in the way of God. Grace needs room and liberty to work marvellous things beyond human ability. "We then that are strong ought to bear

the infirmities of the weak. . ." How do we bear them? In prayer, participating in the gentle washing, forbearance of the Master.

This in no way halts the good to be done, the response to one in time of danger or loss. All scripture is God-breathed and is profitable. We are kind, and moving in best interest to the offender and all, when the old leaven is purged. In another problem, who would not ask that the splints be applied that the limb would heal? The real admonitions and urgings, the sweet talk, brothers and sisters give. They are to be music to the sweetness of a Christian's life.

Yet we would have this beautiful gentleness. It chimes with charity. "And above all things have fervent charity among yourselves: for charity shall cover a multitude of sins." This is so sweet, seeing the pure mantle of charity cast about our Christian brother and sister. This is the divine nature of eternal life, and now.
