

A request came to the elder brethren for help to the Romanian churches. It has been decided to hold a special collection for the restoration and reopening of the churches in Romania for the brethren of the Apostolic Christian faith (also known as Nazarenes, Evangelical Baptists. Weider Daufer.)

The Romanian government has softened their stand against freedom of worship, and presented the church members the opportunity to reopen the churches, providing they raise \$100,000 outside of Romania. The Apostolic Christian Nazarene Church and the Apostolic Christian Church will seek to raise this. Our church group has been asked to raise \$50,000 plus in the next three weeks.

The World Relief Committee has made a concentrated effort to assist financially; now an opportun-ity has opened to serve in reopen-

ing their precious places of worship. Your prayerful support of this opportunity to serve our fellow-believers will be greatly appreciated by your elder brethren, missionary and world relief committees. CHILDREN'S HOME

On Aug. 22, a report was made to the elder brothers on the progress in the organizational work required before starting construction at Leo. Jack Krantz, president of the group, reported:

A layout plan was submitted to the Indiana State Welfare Department for preliminary approval and their review. Welfare Director Cardwell met with the children's home committee and our attorney, Mr. Bohning, and discussed various phases of the home. This was

of considerable assistance on the next steps to be taken.

IRS numbers, meaning IRS approval, has been received. Anyone wishing to make contributions to the Apostolic Christian Children's Home, Inc. may do so with the complete knowledge that it is an approved charity organization, and gift deductions will be allowed.

We expect the finalized engineering report on the sanitary

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waste treatment at the next meeting. Permission has been granted to enter Grabill Sanitary Plant... the cost quite high ... investigating possibility of purchasing and installing mechanical system to take care of sanitary needs of the children's home and adjoining neighbors at reduced initial cost and reduced maintenance cost. Anyone desiring to give financial aid towards this project will be appreciated.

We prayerfully are awaiting results of the letter that was or is to be read at all churches, for applicants for an administrator of the home. We will start to review applicants about Oct. 15.

Layout and a ¹/₄-inch-scale model of the home was shown at the Bluffton Fellowship Hall and Bluffton church narthex. It was seen with many interested parties. The model is at Leo. Any church group desiring it for a few weeks may have it by contacting any member of the Children's Home Committee.

We hope to have all of this preliminary work done, including approval of working drawings and the state requirements so actual work can begin within 60 to 90 days. We ask your prayers that this work will continue to have the Lord's blessings and that His will may be done.

SHIODA JAPAN Willis R. Ehnle

I was asked by telephone to visit the home of a friend, who sometimes in the past comes to church. The lady had been hearing strange noises in the house at about 1:00 at night, and she feared spirits of the dead, or evil spirits, were causing a turmoil in her house.

When I visited, a home I had visited fairly frequently, I was told that the family which had owned the land on which the house stood were of the Samurai or soldier class in old Japan, probably during the Tokugawa Period which lasted for about 300 years up to 1867, when the Meiji Period began, at which time Japan accepted contact with Western countries. The Samurai class were the governing class and reportedly took the lives of farmers or merchants at will, for no reason at all except to try out the swords that swung from their sides as they rode about on horses. This murdering which had been done at will so many years ago was thought to be at the heart of the problem.

I agreed that I would pray in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, in whose name there is such great power, that any spirits causing distuurbance in that house should be driven out so that the occupants could rest, but I agreed only on certain conditions. The conditions were there be no idolatry involved, no praying to other gods, but only to the true and living God. This brought complications. The lady of the house told me she had visited the high priest of a Buddhist temple in Tokyo, paid him some money, and that he was offering daily prayers to the Buddhist god, Hotoke Sama. She assured me she was going to see him again and would tell him from now on she would pray only to the almighty God.

It turned out differently. The Buddhist priest evidently didn't like the idea. The report I have been given is that this lady now has a Buddhist "Butsudan" or altar set up in the home where she prays and offers incense in an effort to rid the home. In the Old Testament, Moses, quoting God, thunders forth, "Thou shalt have no other gods before me", and the New Testament confirms this. Let's make certain we have no other gods in our lives, be it wealth, honor, or self-righteousness.

Unlike people of Western civilization, where traditionally the emphasis has been on a God and man relationship, the people of Asia grow up with the emphasis on a man-to-man relationship, with religion as one means of "improving" that man-to-man relationship. I do not believe this is limited to Japan, but that it includes India and other countries. When a person is truly converted this is one of the things that is expected to be buried with Christ in baptism.

The emphasis on man-to-man relationship as mentioned above, so long as there are no stringent or continuing requirements, enables the rank and file of Asians to be like Apostolic Christians when they are with or confronted by Apostolic Christians. When they get back to the Buddhist priest they may then be Buddhist, hoping to receive benefits from both directions.

WICHITA KS Glennis Allenbach

The dictionary gives as one of its meanings of fellowship — a group of people with the same interests; certainly we are that! In our newsletter this month it was suggested our project could be a "know each other better" feature. I felt this was a great idea in working toward a closer Christian fellowship, that in turn draws us closer to our Saviour.

It was suggested that a member could give some early remembrance, plus some personal insight into their life. Bro. George Lambert was suggested and was very cooperative.

A note accompanying his story included, — "I went from a feeling within as it is just me," . . .also, "These are the things that come to me, and could say are outstanding events in my life."

Bro. George Lambert was born

at 5519 S. Adams St., Bartinsille, Ill. just out of Peoria, on Feb. 9, 1906, the son of Bro. and Sis. Alfred and Bertha Lambert. His father for a time worked for the Keystone Wire and Fence Co. there.

His early life was spent in the Burlington Okla. community, where he attended the Apostolic Christian Church with the rest of his family. During his first 8 years he had moved to Portland, Oregon; Linwood, Michigan. Finally the family settled permanently in Wichita, when he was eight years old.

He recalls some interesting events, some common to many perhaps who might have lived in that era some 65 years ago. As was very common in this new land, which was called THE CHERO-KEE STRIP and was opened for settlement Sept. 16, 1893, the day to day needs were very meager for many years, but somehow his mother always seemed to find enough to eat and clothing to wear. He recalls that his parents were both very devout to their Heavenly calling, and were very strict, demanding discipline which is so lacking today. His father prayed and read at every meal, often explaining its meaning, which even now Bro. George recalls some of these explanations.

His father and brothers, with himself set on the front bench of the church on the north side of the pulpit, where the congregation could all see them, his father's ever watchful eyes on them to be sure there was no talking, sleeping or foolishness going on. . . The trial of sitting still with 100 and better temperature, with stiff starched shirts and the hot, steaming celluloid collar without a tie... The only thing he could think of was when he would climb on the Studebaker wagon pulled by two horses, start for home. What a relief to remove that steaming collar. as soon as possible.

At age 12 he helped operate the first wheat combine that came into Alfalfa county Okla. for his uncle, who lived across the road from the church. Following a binder and shocking wheat was not easy for a boy of 12. He fondly tells how wonderful it was to lift a jug of water that had burlap around it, kept wet. Since the humidity was low, this kept the water cold, and it tasted so good and was so refreshing.

He recalls a Bro. Bill Anliker that lived along the Saltfork River, south of the church a number of miles, and it was common to go out into the melon patch and pick watermelons weighing 100 pounds and more. This was quite a moment when they would see who could pick the largest melon.

The family would often go to Harper, Kansas to church when the first cars were available. The roads were something else. It was common to get into downpours of rain, making the roads muddy and almost impossible to travel on.

On Sept. 5, 1924 he began working for the Bell Telephone Company here in Wichita, and worked for 43 years, retiring Sept.5, 1967.

Bro. George married Sis. Elsie Beer, daughter of Bro. Frank of Milford, Sept. 19, 1937. They have two children, Earlene of Park Forest, Ill. and Dr. Donald of Parkville, Mo., a suburb of North Kansas City, Mo. They also have six grandchildren.

He likes to talk about the most important happening in his life, and that is his conversion, following in the steps of his father, who passed away in June of 1924. Since there was no church in Wichita until 1938, the members and friends would gather in homes, mostly at Bro. and Sis. John Schrocks, because they could not get out as easily as the others. This particular Sunday evening, Bro. Alfred (his father) was reading to everyone there (and this is the first time the three Lambert brothers were at these meetings), and his text was Matthew 24:1 to 15. When he reached the 15th verse and said DANIEL he suddenly faltered, and began falling from his chair. We brothers caught him and gently laid him on a bed, and he soon went to sleep. We feel that it was only by God's love that we brothers were present that night. It was then that our dear Lord enered into our hearts, and we began repenting. Just a kind word to all friends that might read this account. Please don't wait as I did. I have shed many tears and endured many regrets that I didn't repent BEFORE he had to leave to awaken me. O, how much I needed him after that. Please let them enjoy

it with you at least for a season."

Bro. George would like to add this, when they gave their testimony in the little country church at Burlington, "Elder Bro. Kurz at the consent of the church brought all three of us brothers in at once for our testimony".

His only regret is that he did not attend the meetings before his father passed away, as he now realizes that it would have brought so much joy to him if he had. He is now looking forward to that great reunion in heaven, after the trials of this life are over.

I would like to add something about Bro. George. I've known him a long time, and as I often associate people I know and love with a verse, saying or song, I associate Bro. George with the old gospel hymn which says it all— "I Love To Tell The Story". This is truly Bro. George's theme song.
