the end of the journey where there is opportunity. It behooves us to pick up the precious opportunity of doing good unto all men. Better than a \$100 bill — much, much more!)

... disaster caused by hurricane Fifi . . . 200,000 surviors are homeless—camped under plastic or palm branch shelters, crowded into schools, huddled together in empty box cars which used to carry bananas. Our hearts ache as we see hungry families who have lost their homes and their corn crops, almost ready to harvest. Many have fevers. malaria, diarrhea, pneumonia. Others have infected wounds from cuts by barb wire and twisted tin roofing, which they received while fighting their way through the swirling water and debris.

The tragedy in the town of Choloma, 10 miles north of San Pedro

(Editor's note: We hear from Soula, came at 1:00 a.m. ... most of the people were sleeping. Twenty inches of rain fell in 40 hours. Landslides in the mountains above caused temporary dams on the river . . . without warning, these broke, carrying everything before them, trees, rocks, houses and people. Some houses remained, but filled up with 3 to 5 feet of mud, buried people right in their beds. So far 1680 have been dug out. The death toll in Choloma alone is estimated to be nearly 4,000, and there are probably another 6,000 in the rest of Honduras.

> A large area below Choloma looks like a vast lake. This is the rich farm delta, where a major part of the food for Honduras is produced . . . the majority escaped with only the clothes on their backs. The refugee camps are dry, but difficult to reach, with big lakes of water on all sides of them - and mosqui-

tos! Rains continue three weeks after the hurricane, which makes a discouraging picture for the farmer trying to raise a little corn and beans for his family. How is he going to live these next 5 months, until the next crop? And where is he going to get the seed for planting?

A haunting memory was a sad father, walking the railroad track, back to his hungry family with an empty sack. He couldn't even find corn to buy for their tortillas! The fields below Choloma are still flooded . . . possibly half of the country's food supply has been destroyed by this disaster. A "veloria" (wake) was being held for 3 children who had died that day of diarrhea. One little mother, in rags, held her sick baby in her arms, as she told us the flood took away her house. Her husband died 5 months ago, and she had 3 other children with no food. Stories can be multiplied by the thousands.

Many of your letters have asked. "What can we do to help?" This was the question asked by Contractor Ed Haas, of world relief of the Apostolic Christian Church . . . Ed flew soybeans, rice and flour from Mexico. It is difficult to put on paper the emotion that surged through our hearts, when Ed ar-rived with this food from Mexico.

Shipments of grain, food, clothing, medicine, may be sent by boat: (Shipments coming by boat are entered duty-free with the PAHS special permit. Please do not mail packages to Box 191, SPS, as duty is high; however, small flat objects, as garden seed, can be mailed in manila envelopes with metal clasps.)

Small packages sent before Christmas may reach the convoy waiting in Texas: . . . Needed at orphanage are children's clothes. especially boy's shirts . . . hospital needs diapers, shirts, pants and dresses for children.)

Family Bundles For Refugees: (wrapped in a plastic covering inside a flour sack.) For a man of 140 pounds, shirt, pants, shorts and sweater; for a woman of 120 pounds, knee-length dress, underward and sweater; for a baby, diapers, shirts, gown and blanket; for two girls, large and small, dresses, panties, and sweaters; for two boys, large and small, bluejeans, shirts. sweaters; and a washable blanket, towel, comb, toothbrush, dish, spoon, pan and possibly shoes.

The mayor of San Pedro Sula reminded us after the hurricane, "Man shall not live by bread alone". These people are wounded in spirit, and thousands of Bibles are needed for the healing of the soul.

When Paul wrote advising Timothy to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed ... he also laid the same responsibility upon us. Those of us who through faith find ourselves shouldering our share of the responsibility at the Home, be it in a key position or a lesser one, still feel our first allegiance is to be a "workman" for our Heavenly Father. Secondly, our wish is to be diligent in whatever is our assignment with the residents. We pray for wisdom that our attitude may always be found to be that we labor "heartily, as to the Lord", a formula which is reliable.

During moments of quiet meditation when we realize the wisdom of God's direction, we marvel. Even nature confirms our amazement. No two leaves, snowflakes - and yes - no two people are exactly alike. Each one of us is created just as we are for a purpose, and if that purpose is to fulfill a responsibility here, then we pray for divine wisdom to be "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed". To this end we need your prayers.

Still wanting to learn to "know each other better," we shall visit the Activity Department of the Home. Webster defines activity as an educational procedure designed to stimulate learning through firsthand experience. It is this type of activity which takes place under the supervision of the staff of this department. Imagine, if you can, what takes place in the course of a day's time, when the therapy of music, physical exercise, crafts of various kinds, embroidery classes, Bible study, nature study and others is applied to all or some of the

residents. Some phases of activity are required of all who are able; others are for those who show ability and inclination.

Interesting observation we have had time to make is that most respond positively to good quality, soothing music; another is the joy of accomplishment. Sometimes after long and patient effort, a resident is able to learn a skill which gives him a feeling of worth, which in turn helps to minimize the everpresent handicap. Much could be said about the many activities and their value to the residents. Anyone who wishes to enroll in the school of observation need offer only eyes, ears, and heart as tuition. It is noteworthy that here, too, many hours of volunteer help enhance the worth of the program.

It is a real privilege to be able to go to school in Ethiopia, and the 7th and 8th grade boys he teaches must periodically pass the national exams in order to stay in school. Failure to pass the tests almost always puts an end to their education. Some boys whose parents cannot buy the needed equipment never get to attend school.

In some aspects, Ethiopia is still

back in the Biblical times, complete with camel caravans, the proverbial women at the well, walled cities and courtyards, turbaned and bearded men and heavily veiled women. Donkeys, sheep, goats and cattle freely roam through the rutted, mud town streets. There are huge open air markets where anything can be bought, such as sandals, kitchen utensils, clothes, chickens, jewelry, grains and vegetables, furniture and the like.

Ethiopian society is very structural, and formalized by rank, age and sex—women are considered as

almost nothing.

Before the fall term began, it was necessary to repair the class-room desks. Working with the hands is looked down upon by Ethiopians and especially teachers, but soon the boys became interested and were eager to help. Phil writes that it took much patience in teaching them to hammer nails and saw wood, as they had never seen this done before.

Phil's own home is constructed of stick, stone and mud walls, which are then whitewashed. It has a tin roof and red mud floors, spread on much like cement, but after a hard rain it sometimes needs to be resurfaced. In order to hasten the preparation of his meals, he purchased a gas stove to cook on, rather than use charcoal or wood as the villagers do. The people were unconvinced of its worth, especially when after 8 months, the fuel ran out.

Since Phil's the only white "ferenzi" or foreigner in the village, it has taken some time for the people to stop staring at him. Now "Mr. Phleep," as he is called, is warmly accepted and feels very much part of his community. He will complete his 25-month tour

in July 1975.



The construction of the utility building has been started, with the frame and roof up, volunteers from Remington directing the constructive efforts.

Committee members were assigned to check state requirements for carpeting, appliances, kitchen utensils, drapery and furniture, and provide information of the equipment for those who wish to contribute these items, to furnish the first two homes.

At 3:00 Sunday afternoon, Groundbreaking services were held at the site, with visitors from many congregations and the Leo community in attendance. Elder Bro. Wendell Gudeman gave the groundbreaking message, with a call to lift up a home for the children,

with the love and strength from our Heavenly Father guiding our every effort. Many from the committee and from those attending participated in breaking ground. Elder Bro. Loren Stoller of the Latty congregation led in the closing prayer.

By the President of the
United States of America
(Thanksgiving, 1864)

. . . Now, therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, do hereby appoint and set apart the last Thursday in November next as a day which I desire to be observed by all my fellow citizens wherever they may then be, as a day of thanksgiving and prayer to Almighty God, the beneficent Creator and Ruler of the universe, and I do further recommend to my fellow citizens aforesaid, that on that occasion they do reverently humble themselves in the dust, and from thence offer up penitent and fervent prayers and supplications to the Great Disposer of events for a return of the inestimable blessings of peace, union, and harmony throughout the land which it has pleased Him to assign as a dwellingplace for ourselves and our posterity throughout all generations. . .

Abraham Lincoln
