Bro. Jesse Beer was born and raised on a farm his father cleared in Mifflin township, Richland County, Ohio. He is the grandson of Bro. Fredrick Lantz, who was the founder and first residing minister in Mansfield.

The Lord has been very good to Bro. Jesse, who at the age of 93 is still teaching in our public school system, and as far as can be determined is the oldest active teacher in the United States, as it was stated in the National Retired Teachers Association bulletin of March 1974.

He received a Bachelor of Science degree at Ohio Northern University in 1908. Because of some fuss over high school credits, he received a second Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Chicago in 1912, instead of a master's degree. He later earned his master's degree at Western Reserve University and has enough credits for a Ph. D.

Jesse started teaching at the tender age of 18. His first assignment was in a two-room school in East Mansfield back in 1900. He taught at Cleveland Central for 10 years and was principal at Mansfield Senior High School from 1928 to 1941. He was in charge of the Guidance and Special Testing Program and resigned in 1948, but is still called to do substitute teaching.

Jesse credits his wonderful Christian parents, John J. and Mary Beer, for his first contact with the Lord. They taught him that "gossip and violence should be totally eliminated through the use of

kindness and reason".

When Bro. Jesse went to college, he soon began to question, "Why some of these people teach me the opposite to what I learned to love?" The more he compared the philosophy of such educators with that of the Bible, the surer he became that such viewpoint, especially in science, was not right.

He remembers once having an encounter with a professor, and he wishes now he would have the courage of Daniel, or other God-fearing men of the Bible, who would rather of suffered than give up God's teaching. Through all this, God

was working in his heart. He would always revert back to the good Christian teachings he had been taught. This particular teacher glorified violence, war he looked upon as "nature's method to get rid of the riffraff and permit the fittest to survive." It was impossible not to compare this with what he had been taught as a personal responsibility annd the clear statement of the Bible. "He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the LORD require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to wark humbly with thy God" ... Bro. Jesse's favorite song in the Zion's Harp is No. 37, Love.

At the age of 70, Jesse was drawn even closer to the Lord, and through humbleness and repentance could find his greatest joy, when he enrolled in the highest school, where the Lord is the teacher. He found what his godly parents had taught—LOVE, FEACE

and JOY!

He advises the young people today to "stand for what they have been taught by their godly parents, not to be persuaded by the philosophies of some so-caned educators and stylists of today, and don't be arraid to apply all these gems in your contacts with your associates and walk numbly with your God".

Jacob forded the St. Joe at Hamilton, now Leo. The two oxen pulled his covered wagon. He arrived at what would be home for this earthly pilgrimage.

His boys were Joseph Sr., John, Eli and Jacob. One of his girls had married Henry Dotterer Sr. in Ohio-another had married a Zetner-while still another was Kathy Rauhaus, wife of the good homeopathic doctor.

That beautiful rounded ridge across and west a little from where our church now stands, there the log cabin was built. The land sloped away to the winding St. Joe. There would be lamplight at night. A pair of wooden shoes provided a sturdy covering for getting around the land.

Hospitality was good in those early days . . . if Jacob didn't have enough places, straw would be put down. Guests were taken care of welcomingly.

Bro. Geistlich, on his journey in 1866 referred to Jacob or one of them.: "... Tuesday, Aug. 16... Bro. Conrad & myself drove to Ft. Wayne" . . . on Friday Aug. 17, it doesn't say where he stayed but ... "At Leo . . . The past night I slept very good. I had a good bed by the dear brethren. This is a good place to live. The hospitality of these brethren reminded me of Abraham, how he said to Sarah, to go and make ready three measures of fine

meal, knead and bake, and dress a tender calf . . . I really had blessed hours with the brethren here."

Mother Elizabeth would be busy with the preparing of food and other duties for the family. Her godly walk and example had a beautitul influence. After she passed on, her son John continued in his worldly way. Out in the field, he heard his mother call his name "John" three times. Then he sought the Lord in repentance and found.

Sometimes God's will is done through trying circumstances. Then His name is glorified through godly patience, take-it-on-thecheek living. Up the Maysville Road (now Grabill Rd.) east, then north, then east a little more was the Rauhaus residence in the country. There would be the row of pear trees. Milk cans would fill out part

of the picturesque place.

Suddenly it happened. Three men in masks, and six bullets spiked their mark in the good doctor, Bro. Rauhaus. They fled. At John's, they heard them go by. A voice told His child, Bro. Rauhaus, he would not die from this . . . and he didn't. He carried the bullets to his grave. His son, Bro. Otto lives at the Sabetha Rest Home. One Sunday in recent years, his hymnbook was open to "Our Pilgrim Way". His heart, with treasures above, continues in the good way.

On the west side or porch of that comely brick house of John's was the spirea . . . Here or near a sister found golden opportunity. Grandson Albert was a lost sheep. Grandpa John had passed on before. Now grandma lay inside, with silent lips. What are you going to do if you are laying there like your grandma? Are you ready to meet your God? It hit him just right.

It was the real thing. At Anna Whitaker's Candy Store, Summit and Jackson, Toledo it was noticed. The man working with him hadn't heard him swear all morning. Now Bro. Al Frautschi continues on the pleasant way that ends in glorious sunset.

Anna Whitaker had a dream. She saw Al's 20-year-old sister in white. Lydia Souder saw a faded flower in a bouquet. Unexpected, young Marjorie Frautschi, a saint and a sister, died on her 20th birthday. To pray about our dreams and ask God's will be done is the right thing to do.

Young Ed Frautschi bought a New Testament with Psalms-good reading on a commuter train in the Chicago area. Now he and his family live in Agoura, California (Los Angeles area). They still love this Good Book.

Opportunities . . . some would heed, some maybe not. A man came to John. He said he knew something awful. John said, Why don't you tell it . . . but he didn't. Once a member, he had left, and became mentally deranged. A mother would hide the child or children in the pantry when he came. What kind of dark secret haunted him? Life is so very important.

Joe and Leah Conrad celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary last December . . . Her days ebbed out . . . He was wheeled to the bedside. He kissed her. "Goodbye, mother; I'll meet you in heaven."

Life has a way of closing. Passing moments are only visible a little, but so much good and kindness there is to do, in what we call the commonplace. So many a poor soul needs that kind touch, that smile.

Give while you can. In beautiful poetry in German, Jacob Conrad seems to remind how to pray and ask for grace and blessings . . . He ends by asking that the Lord might finally take his soul to Him.

Do we grasp that the inevitable hour must close . . . The passing must be past? How well to have riches then, from what is not commonplace, but glorious chancel.
