It pleases me to write and send this with my son, who is coming and wish he could stay with you. It would be our wish that he could find salvation for his soul and escape the future wrath . . ."

How about letters for enriching the bonds? Gathering love for always?

"Aug. 9-'73 . . . Dear Bro. in Christ . . . I'm past 80 years and

don't see very well any more. Also, I don't know too many people of whom there are articles . . . But some day we'll all know each other. Until then—May God bless you all . . . Lena Klaus Reiman, Peoria.

Have you thought of a letter to help someone? . . . Perhaps someone who is in danger or wandering . . . It's gentle love to remind of the duties of our high calling, to call out of the danger of the chasm crevicing the dark.

Here in Detroit . . . we have found it to work for good order, . . . we have definitely tried to hold a line . . . At my proving years ago, the attendance of other churches was made quite an issue. Old Bro. Graf, who had come out . . and who if I am not mistaken was the only one of his family to come into our brotherhood, had made great experience . . . had suffered great heartache, and knew firsthand the value of order, and also what it was to be careful in this particular question . . . He gave me good advice that before I would undertake liberties to assemble elsewhere, even in the event of a funeral, it would be good to share this with my brethren. Know Each Other Better

Bro. Henry Manz was born in Archbold, Ohio (Fulton Co.) in 1893. When he was 7 years old, his parents moved, with their seven children, to Paulding County. In 1908 and 1909, the family was affected by typhoid fever. Within five months four of the children had died, one little girl dying on

her 9th birthday. All but the mother became sick with typhoid. At one time, Henry's father was so sick that one of the children died a week before he was aware of it. After the fourth child had died, a new baby was born to the family within the week.

In 1914, Henry found the grace to repent. Henry thought that when he gave his testimony before the church, he would have to make a confession of his sins to the church. Finally, he told his mother he felt he was ready to do this, at which time she said this wasn't required of him. It is the willingness that is important for our salvation. He went to Mansfield to work for his Uncle Ben Dotterer for awhile, and in 1918 he went to

the Army.

When Bro. Henry felt the need for a helpmate, he prayed for guidance, which was answered with a vision. He saw a face but didn't recognize it, and a voice told him that this was the person for him, but it wasn't the right time yet. Several months later the identity of the person was revealed to him, and in 1923 he married Lena Suttor from Latty. The lad took several photographs of the flying object as it flew off into the sky; I saw one of those photos and testify that it certainly appeared to be a very real aircraft. This incident took place one afternoon this February, about a 30-minute drive from our home. It certainly stimulates one's thinking. Just what is taking place? It isn't likely to be imaginary when the camera shows it so plainly. In Luke 21 we read . . . There is joy if we write more of the living word in our life. Self things make miserable: self-pity, selfish, self-willed, self-envying ... and a whole grab bag of bad tastes. Look at the apostle, John: "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in the truth." His joy showed on his face! Paul knew the true thrills. His people, the way they responded, brought a sweet countenance. Bounding joy came when he heard good news from Corinth! "... I am filled with comfort, I am exceeding joyful in all our tribulation."

God "is able . . . to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy"... What a life! What a holiday, a homecoming, His haven of perfect

satisfaction.

We'll meet in the clouds, such a moment of tenderness. The Lord tarries in that sweet meeting, before setting His feet on Olivet. Arms will go round, dear ones embrace, victory will shine . . . Triumph will be forever and ever.

Patterned in the Plan of God will bring exulting joy in perfect fullness . . . never to get less, for always and always. Think of it!
