

children are in . . . happy in ceaseless view, where God's forever has put all margins forever away.



Early Memories

Our retired elder, Bro. George Yergler tells of the years he was in charge of the Chicago congregation: In the early 1920's there were several families, friends, and several young members employed in the Chicago area. They gathered for services at the home of Bro. Sam and Sis. Mary Clauss. Services

were held one Sunday evening a month. Bro. George would catch a train late Sunday afternoon to 90 to Chicago, and was able to catch another train at 10 p.m. to bring him back home. Later on they had services twice monthly, then rented a hall on 5th and Francisco Avenue. Next they moved to a former church building at 735 Sacramento. In 1937, the building at 2120 W. Sunnyside was purchased and used until 1972, when a new church was built at Hillside. Ill., on Wolfe Road. Bro. Robert Haas and Bro. Eli Winzeler were the first ministers in the Chicago church. Bro. George Yergler was ordained elder at La-Crosse in 1936, and served the Chicago church until the late Bro. Al Fisher was ordained, in 1970.

Bro. George also told of the first elders who came to LaCrosse. Elder Bro. Godfrey Rauch from Bluffton was our first elder. Bro. Henry Souder (Leo) came along occasionally to assist Bro. Rauch, as Bro. Souder spoke English and Bro. Rauch did not. Bro. Souder passed away in 1924. Bro. Rauch served our congregation until his death in 1935. After that, Bro. Eli Dotterer (Junction) had the oversight of LaCrosse until Bro. George Yergler was ordained in 1936. In 1971, Bro. Ed Frank was ordained, and served along with Bro. George until the latter's retirement in 1974.

John writes in his cheering epistles, he has no greater joy than to hear that his children walk in the truth. Have you ever thought what a beautiful love this reveals? More, have you felt some and want more deeper? This joy soars into realms unheard of human time zones. A grouchy feeling can easily slip in to rob us of the soul of what does the most good. Looking for, enjoying the happiness of another.

There are certain things the Lord cannot allow in the church. There are ways that do not bring Him pleasure... But for the willing and obedient, His mercies are tender, His compassion wonderful. Read that perfect prayer, the one He

taught, again. Look at How it reveals His deep, rich personality; he teaches our forgiveness must be accompanied with the forgiving of others.
