Submitted by Bro. Charles Mogler of West Bend: On March 9, Bro. Gene Bruellman and I left for Guatemala, praying for the Lord's protection for our journey. In Guatemala City, we met Rick and Delmi Clark, friends from Bluffton. From there we went as a group, and their knowledge of the Spanish language was a valuable aid.

Guatemala is a beautiful country. It is basically mountains, with some valleys. The people are mostly farmers who work their land by hand. They own small patches of 20 acres or less on the mountainsides, from which they make their living. They are basically a friendly, thrifty and hardworking people.

The original earthquake registered 7.5, which is quite strong. The country was not completely affected, but 93 different towns and villages were almost completely leveled, with lesser but significant damage in other areas. The adobe (sun-dried mud brick) houses, which most of the people lived in, were in total ruins where the quake shook the hardest. This type of housing offers almost no protection from earthquakes. Something had to give, so the walls cracked and crumbled and the tile roofs came tumbling down. The quake happened at 3 a.m., so most of the population were in their houses. The falling roofs and crumbling walls accounted for a very large portion of the death loss. Many who were not killed were badly injured, and many others were in shock.

After the earthquake, the Guatemalans are beginning a remarkable recovery, even though many are left without homes and families. The people salvaged what they could, to construct makeshift homes out of plastic, tin and wood scraps. Many will live in these until the rubble can be cleared and a new house constructed. It will be some time before these people can again

lead a normal life.

Soon after the earthquake, the President of Guatemala made a statement to the effect that he didn't want this tragedy to be "another Nicaragua". When the aid for Nicaragua came in after their earthquake, much graft and mishandling of funds and material occured. Little of the aid intended for the people reached them. The President of Guatemala declared a National Emergency Committee to be formed. Any organization who wanted to help had to be a member of this committee. By working together, the actions for relief could be coordinated and controlled, so the help could reach those who really need it.

The earthquake was a terrible tragedy, but the Guatemalans are picking up the broken pieces and starting over. The lives and hopes of these people are being renewed by the generous aid of others.

I don't mind helping my neighbors work to make an asphalt road, but I was at a loss as to what was coming next. It was past 5:30 p.m., and we had finished our day's work. Instead of everyone going home, others of our community who hadn't even helped with the work of digging out rocks and dirt to make a place for concrete forms were arriving. We gathered around an improvised table which held a lunch, the usual thing for midmorning and mid-afternoon, but unusual for this time of day. One of the men from our kumi or group of 11 houses, began to speak.

"Thank you all for coming to help us build a new road, although you have so very much work of your own to do. Now we would like to sprinkle salt on the work we have been doing." With that several of the men took handfuls of salt from a dish and threw it into the ditch, which had been dug for concrete forms. Then everyone around me put their hands together and bowed low in prayer, several times, toward the ditch where the salt had been thrown. I stood straight and tall, not wishing to be a part of idolatry.

Later upon inquiring. I was told that this ceremony is to seek help from the gods of the road, that the road-building can be blessed and that there will be no injury to anyone on the road. It is usually emphasized, that "no one believes in these gods", but not to perform this ceremony would leave them with a very uneasy feeling of something missing, a superstition that some accident might happen. Evidently, salt is thought of as a purifier. It is interesting to note that the Lord Jesus Christ thought of salt representing . . . influence when He said, "Ye are the salt of the earth: But if the salt have lost his savour, wherewith shall it be salted?"

Bro. Art and Sis. Ruth Gramm are in Japan, visiting their daughter, Sis. Sally, so they attended our fellowship meeting on March 19 and 20. 
