Mass Christendom of our time the Apostle Paul calls a great house . . . These are not only ves-sels of gold and silver, but also of wood and earth . . . some to hon-our, and some to dishonour. "If a our, and some to distribute the man . . . purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel to honour . . . and meet for the master's use . . . We are taught that there is no compromise between Christ and Belial-believer and infidel. Therefore God says, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing . . ." God's call to those in Babylon in Revelation is, "Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and receive not of her plagues. My wish, we could help more sincere people, to point them to the flock and where the Lord feedeth them and maketh to rest at noon. and also their lambs could feed beside the shepherds tents.

As Abraham was called out of Ur, so the church is also called out, to separate from the social life which belongs to the world. It was told Abraham, "Get thee out . . . from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee:" . . . God is a jealous God, and wants His church to himself, with no outward influence or compromise. In choosing his priests, he commanded Moses to sanctify unto me Aaron

(which means to separate unto me Aaron). God wants His church to be separated from the world unto himself.

The Apostle Paul stressed at length the office and function of the high priest... thus this rock, Jesus Christ as High Priest, interceding for all those that speak to him in fervent prayer. He as the cleft high rock will impart to them living water, without stoning or striking with the rod.

Moses, the law giver, could only lead them as far as the River Jordan. From then on, they needed a different leader, Joshua, which by name is also called Jesus, originally the same name. In crossing the river, it took faith as the priests carrying the ark, when they dipped their feet into the water the water parted before. Our inheritance now is the kingdom of heaven, not by observation, but within us. The carnal warfare must take on the spiritual.

For the Israelites to obtain their inheritance through warfare, which was won and given, the ground which their feet have trod was their inheritance. We, through repentance, by the captain of our salvation, Jesus, can overcome and win the victory and obtain the inheritance which once belonged to the Canaanites or the old life.

The theory once saved always saved . . . some religious people

claim if you are a child of God, you remain a child, but the Canaanites can again become victorious and occupy our heart. Then we have lost our inheritance and the land or heart that we have once won in Christ, thus losing our inheritance.

Then we are worse off than if we had never been an heir. We also find when the children cried unto the Lord, God sent them a deliverer . . . It is a great loss to lose our heavenly inheritance. As the children of Israel gained their land through conquest, being victorious by driving out the Canannites, they overlooked a few of the weaker ones, as they thought they were harmless. They became thorns in their sides.

In Joseph, we find a type of Christ. First, he was rejected and sold by his brethren, was elected to keep people alive by the natural food, as Christ makes and keeps alive by spiritual food, His word. He took a Gentile bride, as Christ is. He will make himself known to his brethren at his coming. Christ on the way to Emmaus opened the scriptures, pointing out to them Christ, through Moses, the Prophets. As God had covered up minerals & oil in the earth, so also was this dispension of grace covered up, and uncovered or revealed to Paul, because God's thoughts from Adam, his plan, was a bride for his Son, which is the church.

FROM A PERSONAL LETTER

from Bro. Ben Maibach, date May 19, 1967

The Apostle Paul writes that God is not the author of confusion, but rather of order as in all the churches. We read consistently throughout the Old Testament that God impressed the children of Israel not to mingle with others than their own fellowship, and stressed that if they ventured out, that their daughters would marry the young men and the young men the daughters of those whom they came in contact with . . . They were reminded ever to be a separated people and to stand alone.

My personal convictions are . . . that there are may conscientious and sincere people in the world and there are more, sad to say, even according to the words of Jesus, who are on the broad path that leads to destruction. Did not Christ Himself say that narrow is the path and straight is the gate that leadeth into heaven, and few there be that go thereon; but wide is the path and broad is the gate that leadeth to destruction and many there be that are traveling there.

I feel that just as it is wrong to judge on an individual basis those whose doctrine we do not fully understand and to condemn them because of ignorance, consequently it is just as wrong to bless those whose doctrine we do not fully understand.

"That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us: and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ.

And these things write we unto you, that your joy may be full.

This then is the message which we have heard of him, and declare unto you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all."

The invitation of John to "fellowship with us" refers to the Christian church, that is the body of Christ, whose Head is in heaven, at the right hand of the Father, whither He has ascended. It is a fellowship of the Spirit and the saints (not of the flesh). However it is one body, and one Spirit in the entire body, and one hope for all the members.
