A CONDENSED OUTLINE OF THE LIFE OF SAMUEL H. FROEHLICH

NEW BEGINNING

An invitation to Wilhelmsdorf in Wurttemberg (Germany) seemed a sign from heaven for Froehlich, and he preached there for a congregation that had separated from the state church. However, this church was not receptive to his doctrine, for it clung to infant baptism, and had left the state church only because of the liturgical baptismal formula.

In this new beginning, Froehlich served several families at various places as private tutor. In addition, he associated with the old Baptists (Mennonites) and preached in their circles (in 1831) and kept in contact with his former congregation at Leutwil.

CONTINENTAL SOCIETY IN LONDON

Through a preacher in Frankfort-on-Main, Froehlich learned to know the Continental Society of London which supported ministers and teachers. One of these, Pastor Bost, who had been expelled from the state church, was active in Geneva. Through his meditation, Froehlich offered himself in 1831 for a diaspora-preaching place in the Rhineland.

In February, 1832, Froelich was baptized at the hands of Bost in Geneva, and thereupon, at private meetings, proclaimed the true Gospel here and there. He pointed men to Christ for repentance, faith, and baptism according to the words of Christ as the first Christians had done.

On Jan. 9, 1836, Froehlich wrote: "It never entered my mind that I

should found a sect here on earth; rather, it was in my purpose to gather children to God. If I could not place my confidence in the Lord mv God. that He had called me to His Gospel, I would indeed repent for having begun something upon which the Lord could not place His blessing or with which He could not be pleased. However, I now place myself wholly into His hands that He might lead me according to His good pleasure."

EVANGELIZATION FIRST MISSIONARY JOURNEY IN AARGAU

Froehlich began his missionary work in Leutwil, his former congregation. Hardly had the news spread that he was there than from 200 to 300 persons gathered every evening that he might preach the Word of Christ to them. Some also came to spy on him; the majority, however, came from desire. Within a week, many hearers, whom he had instructed before and in whom God had prepared the way, requested baptism. Froehlich examined them carefully to be convinced of their faith and of their knowledge, and admonished them to count the cost of following Christ. Then he baptized them according to the instruction of the Lord; and on Palm Sunday he could, for the first time, celebrate the Lord's Supper with 38 members.

Meanwhile the foe was not idle. When many were gathered together, a gendarme appeared and ordered that all who had sheltered Froehlich must appear before the district magistrate. Froehlich did not allow himself to be intimidated

and continued to preach the good tidings. A summons followed and he was told to leave the village at once and to return to his native Brugg. In vain did he refer to the highest Aargau court. He traveled to Aargau to the magistrate and was dismissed with a warning.

Later on, a gendarme dragged Froehlich out of a meeting and brought him to the magistrate at Lenzburg. In answer to the question, "Who commanded you to preach?" his reply was calmly: "Christ." The angry official raised his hand to strike him, but withdrew it under a stream of profanity. Finally, he tore Froehlich's clothes and emtied his pockets in order to find his books; then he ordered the gendarme to put him in prison. When Froehlich appealed to the fact that the magistrate at Aargau had not arrested him, he was finally allowed to go free, and began his wearisome journey to Brugg.

SECOND MISSIONARY JOURNEY IN THE CANTON BERNE

Since it seemed impossible to be active further in Aargau, Froehlich once more turned to Pastor Bost at Geneva: "I have been declared scot-free. In Aargau I was arrested and banned. Where shall I go?" In the mission field he felt himself a beginner and a novice. He would like to go with Paul to learn of him "how with simplicity and schrewdness the Gospel might best be spread."

The new constitution had granted religious freedom and freedom of conscience. When Froehlich re-

ferred to it before the officials, he was told that he could believe what he chose, but that he could not con-

vev it to others.

In July 1832, Froehlich journeyed to Berne to meet with Bost. But Bost had departed because those who would prevent the interview had informed him that Froehlich was behind bars in Aargau. That the wearisome and costly journey might not have been undertaken in vain, Froehlich resolved to go to a missionary journey from Berne.

THIRD MISSIONARY JOURNEY IN EMMENTAL

On Aug. 11, 1832, Froehlich made contact by letter with Christian Gerber, Langnau in Emmental, elder of the Baptist church there, whom he had never seen, but of whom he had been told. Agreement of their views on baptism attracted him thither.

Ten days later he himself traveled to Langnau and visited Christian Gerber who then was nearly seventy years old. At a meeting of all the deacons, Froehlich laid before them, by way of introduction, a copy of the letter to the English Continental Society in which he, on Ma-14 of that year had answered six questions. The gathering seemed to agree with these explanations.

Froehlich held daily meetings in the area, and was generally accompanied by the elder of the church. The attendance grew larger and larger. On Sunday, Sept. 2, the number of hearers at Langnau was between four and five hundred. According to the custom of the time. he preached for three hours. The word was not without fruit, but the foe sensed the danger. On the following morning the state church pastor raised his voice in warning during a meeting of the citizens. Despite the fact that a deacon who was present defended the accused fearlessly, Froehlich was hailed before the magistrate, who decided after a brief hearing that Froehlich was to leave the territory within 24 hours.

Back at Brugg, Froehlich could not, in spite of the prohibition, keep from visiting the persecuted churches in Aargau. In Leutwil where there were 45 baptized souls. a penalty had been placed upon any who would permit meetings in their homes. "We have a great cloud of witnesses before us, who, for the sake of freedom in Christ, were ready to sacrifice goods and blood, whose imitators we should be in patience and faith," he wrote on Sept. 24, 1832.

FOURTH MISSIONARY JOURNEY TO ZURICH AND EAST SWITZERLAND

In October, 1832, Froehlich began his activity in Zurich, where two of his sisters lived. They were, as yet, undecided to go his way, but they were no longer offended by him. He found no hearing, however, among his former acquaintances.

Great was the joy of seeing one another again when he, in Canton Thurgau, visited the congregation Wagenhausen at Stein on the Rhein where he had served as vicar four years before. Although the teaching of the baptism of believers met with opposition, he parted from them in the good hope that they would finally find the

In St. Gall, also, he met with the opposition on the question while he found many receptive hearts in Herisau. On Nov. 21, 1832, he reached Wattwil, where a year before, a common laborer, Adolph, of Zurich, who was active in the Word of God, had worked after his expulsion by the authorities and had left many awakened ones behind. Here Froehlich remained several weeks, during which time he held meetings and strengthened the knowledge of the baptism of faith and deepened it. In Hauptwil (Thurgau), where he had never been, he learned to know the Brunschwiler family who sought the divine truth and were deeply touched by his word and teaching concerning the baptism of faith. A daughter of this family, Susette, he chose in 1836 as his life's partner.

LONDON

In Hauptwil, Froehlich received an invitation from the Continental Society of London for a visit of three months. First he concluded his visitations in the area and then returned to his home. At the end of January, 1833, Froehlich went to London where he stayed almost five months. The journey led him down the Rhine, over to Antwerp, via Paris. In the archives of the "Strict Baptist Church," which upheld the baptism of faith, there are records of his stay. Froehlich felt very lonely in London. He felt like Elias on Mt. Horeb, and wrote: "Behold. what doest thou here in England? I do not rightly know why I came here, and yet I was called hither, and by the will and guidance of the Lord. I have been zealous for the Lord, and I am here now, and wait as to what I am to do."

As much as Froehlich treasured it to have support (\$100.00 per year), he saw that it was bound up with difficulties. The Continental Society was now suffering from financial cares, so that it was not in a position to support him nor to pay Bost's salary in Geneva. On its advice, he returned to the continent to work "where the Gospel is not known or preached and where one may find tolerance and entry." The recommendation that the zealous missionary might work in Strasbourg (as only in France was the freedom of preaching the Gospel permitted) was not possible, likely for political reasons. Froehlich returned to Brugg.

RETURN

Boldly, Froehlich once more took up his work in his native city after his London visit, in midyear 1833. During his absence two brothers from Wurttemberg had directed the congregation in Aargau. One of these had been arrested at a meeting, the other, during a visitation of the sick, and were held for weeks in the Lenzburg prison. In September, 1833, both were brought to the border. Their personal property was sold at public auction to defray the costs.

A Berne brother was banned from the Canton Aargau and moved to Toggenburg, from where he sent an urgent call to Froehlich when several souls requested baptism. "Bitter experiences have taught me not to be too hasty in this matter," he wrote in his dairy in September, 1833 "for some whom we have baptized have apostatized when Satan began to rage. Everyone who permits himself to be baptized must be ready, not only to receive the blessings of the Cross of Christ, but also to take up the Cross of Christ."

STORMS

In the beginning of October, 1833, a message came from the English Continental Society stating that for lack of funds it had to be dissolved. Froehlich did not allow

himself to be discouraged for that reason. Bravely he started on a journey through Aargau to Suhr, Rupperswil, Hunzenschwil, Schafisheim, Aesch, and Teufental. He held meetings everywhere despite the persecutions that followed his very step. "As long as I kept silent I was left alone; as soon as I began to testify of Christ I was persecuted." For the first time three elders were ordained to serve the churches of Aargau.

In Hauptwil (Thurgau) also, where Froehlich continued the

work which had been begun, the Word found response. The meetings were attended by 200 persons, and by the beginning of the year 1834, the number of baptisms had risen to 60. This development was bound to bring the opponents to the fore. There were public warnings from the pulpits, also threats. The newspapers decried the enthusiasts and sectarians. Participants at the meetings were manhandled to the shedding of blood with stones and sticks. Twelve state church pastors demanded the removal of Froeh-

lich from Hauptwil. At the end of February, a mob of several hundred people destroyed a house, the occupants of which barely saved their lives.

Now the storm broke loose ubiquitously. All newspapers carried reports so that Froehlich became known and was reviled throughout Switzerland. He had to flee from Thurgau and on his passport it was noted that he had been expelled as a sectarian. The police watched him wherever he went.

HISTORY OF THE HARTZLER FAMILY By Ben Hartzler

There are a good many Hartzlers in the Rittman church, and they

all descended from my grandparents, Soloman and Martha 'Lanz' Hartzler. Jacob Hertzler, as it was then spelled, was born in 1703 in Switzerland. He came to America, and ,I was told, became the first Amish bishop in this country, He eventually settled in Pennsylvania.

About five generations later, Soloman was born. When he grew to manhood, he married Martha Lanz. It seems she had a brother living in Illinois in the Congerville area. She learned of the Apostolic Christian faith and church while visiting her brother, and not being satisfied with the faith or beliefs or practices of her husband's church, she embraced the faith she heard of in Illinois. Through correspondence with members and visits of ministers who visited them in Pennsylvania, she was finally baptized at her home by an elder and probably others with him of the Apostolic Christian Church.

All of their children became interested in their mother's faith, and as they grew to adulthe od sought opportunity to move West where they could go to church. Noah, the oldest went to Illinois and spent some time with the Ackermans at Morton, and went to German school probably at Congerville with Bro. Hohulin as the teacher. He seemed to appreciate very much the experience he had there, as he often spoke of that time. Later he came to the Rittman vicinity where brothers lived that visited them in Pennsylvania. Dan Steiner, who was the first minister at the Rittman church, had several daughters, and Noah married one of them. I am not sure where he was baptized, whether in Rittman or in Illinois, but he eventually became a minister, and, some years later, the first elder at the Rittman A. C. church. He died in 1947 from the effects of an automobile acci-

Joseph, the second son, came to Akron, Ohio, where he worked as a blacksmith and, for many years, as a carpenter. He married Elizabeth Brenner of Akron. They had two sons and three daughters. His wife died, and he was married again to Clara Bollinger of Girard, Ohio. They then had one son and one daughter, and during this time he became a minister at the Akron church until his health failed. He passed away the day after Bro. Noah died, and was buried the day

after Noah's funeral.

Amos, who was my father, came to the Rittman area about 1895 or 1896 and worked as a carpenter. In 1898 he was married to Sarah Horn, who was a granddaughter of Anna Steiner, the first member of the Rittman Apostolic Christian church. Anna Steiner was born in Alsace, France. Her father was a Mennonite bishop, and later Anna married John Steiner, who also became a Mennonite bishop. Amos, my father, also became a minister at the Rittman church, serving in that capacity until old age and health overtook him. He died at age 92.

Isaac and two sisters, Mary and Lydia, never married. They, with their parents, moved from Pennsylvania to the Rittman area in 1902 and lived there together. Grandmother died in 1912, and grandfather in 1921. He never left the Amish or Mennonite faith, and his funeral services were held in the Mennonite church where he attended. The ministers who had the services were from the Akron A.C. church, the Mennonite bishop sitting with them on the pulpit.

The Rittman church was earlier known as the Chippewa church, and later as the Wayne County church, and finally as the Rittman, Ohio, church.

Some of these things and dates are rather vague, but this seems to be as near as can be ascertained. One often wonders what the reasons were that my grandmother Hartzler and my great-grandmother Steiner were dissatisfied with their early church or faith, but we must believe it must have been the work and goodness of Almighty God. We pray that He will keep us in His grace and help us to grow in faith and in the things that are an honor to Him, which is our reasonable service.

True, we are instructed when we are baptized—and it is scriptural—that if we are concerned about others, we should go to them and tell them, but we are not to speak evil of them. Tonight we have the commandment straight and clear; "... speak evil of no man," Titus 3:2, of nobody, ever!

If we live according to this teaching, we will be happier throughout our lives on earth and throughout eternity. Why do I say "throughout eternity"? Because, when we make it safely through those gates into the next World, we will remember whether or not we went about in this present lifetime (be fore and after our conversion, especially after) speaking evil of others. And we will regret any evil speech.

Do you remember the parable in

which the Lord Jesus Christ spoke of Lazarus and the rich man? God said to the rich man through Abraham, "Son, remember . . . thou in thy lifetime . . . ?" This was a soul who was lost. We definitely know that someone who is lost can remember his failings. When I say, "we will remember our failings as believers," I am making an assumption—I am not positive. But it may well be because " . . . every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment." Matthew 12:36. In any case, it is very serious, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." 2 Corinthians 5:10. This was written to believers!

No, we don't repent, come into the fellowship, and then just relax completely and live carelessly. We are called into holiness and righteousness and unto a tremendous love for one another where we speak evil of no man. What a

blessed thought!

Well, what do we speak about then? It is so easy to talk about the failings of others—that they wore something odd, or that they drive such an automobile, and we don't understand why. This is such easy conversation. If we can't talk about this what can we talk about? Malachi gives the answer. He says: "They that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name." Malachi 3:16. The more we can think and speak of spiritual things the more we can ask one another about a Bible verse, the more we can speak one to another as Malachi says, how precious and blessed it IS!

Do you know that where the love flows, where the fellowship is united where there is no schism whatsoever, the Holy Spirit works so much better? Where we can just fold our arms around one another, where there's really love for each other, where we do not speak evil of each other, the Holy Spirit works manificently?

But where there is a division and where there is tension between brethren in the Lord, those outside of Christ can see it. It is not

good. Therefore, we should never speak evil of each other, in order to be a better testimony for the Lord. When we can just naturally embrace each other in the Lord, the Holy Spirit works marvelously. We're so happy we came to church; we're so happy to see a brother or sister; we're so happy we can identify with our own group of believers and can say, "I have brethren who care for me! I love them all! I really love them all!" If, throughout this great land of ours, all the brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ will follow this one commandment, "... speak evil of no man," Titus 3:2, there will be a greater out pouring of the Holy Spirit!

In my own experience in Japan, I remember all the adjustments that the people there had to make to me and to our church, and all the adjustments that I had to make to them, and the frustrations involved on both sides of the fence. When we could come to the place where we no longer spoke evil of each other, of each other's customs, of our country's history, of our country's condition, of our own nationality, and could simply love each other and greet each other with a holy kiss, the Holy Spirit blessed our services. We thank you for your prayers on our behalf.

Remember that the same Holy Spirit that works in our small congregation in Japan, works even more mightily here because of your numbers and your stability over many years. But it is very important that you "... speak evil of no man." Titus 3:2.

You should speak good things, encourage one another, help one another, visit the sick, and be a laborer in the vineyard, for we are all to be laborers in the vineyard of the Lord. No one here tonight, who is a brother or sister in our fellowship, should in any way feel that he is not a laborer in the Lord's vineyard. You should, by all means, in some way be a laborer.

If you could see the vineyards in Japan, you would know that the laborers work hard. We live right in the center of the grape growing area, the heart of Japan's grape vineyard. They have the vinyards up over the heads, and you walk in under them and look up. The workers have to take each bunch of grapes and handle it carefully as they dip it into some liquid so the seeds will not form so they can have seedless grapes. They clip off some of the grapes so the rest have plenty of room to grow large. The vines are pruned very severely, so severely you might think the vine would die, but it doesn't. It shoots forth new growth and goes on, just as we do.

The more we give up for the Lord Jesus Christ, the more fruit we can bear. True holiness comes only by suffering. God may allow you to suffer mournfully, but, through it all, always keep in mind that you are going to climb on top of it. Every experience of suffering, every experience of frustration, can be surmounted. It will raise you higher in the ladder of spiritual growth.

If you do not help in the vineyard, how is it that you want to partake of the grapes when it is harvest time? If you are a brother or a sister in our fellowship and you want to partake of the grapes of the fruit of the harvest, of the love, joy, peace and all the other good fruits, and want to see more souls come in, then encourage the brothers and sisters.

Don't be discouraged. Don't think that you have all the problems. The person beside you may have more. Do something. Offer yourself to the brethren who have responsibilities. Some are secretaries, some can type, some can help clean, some can do something else. Everybody in the vineyard is a willing worker. No one is lazy in the household of God.

To support the Brotherhood, to build up the faith, "... to speak evil of no man;" such love, such conduct, such faith will help us all the way through!

Hold yourself down. I have to, too-I have to so much. It is so easy to speak evil of others.

Also, don't complain. It is taught in the Scripture that we should not complain: "When the people complained, it displeased the Lord." Numbers 11:1. Don't complain. The world is tired of complaining. The world is sick of hearing evil about us. No! No! No! Don't do it. As a child of God, be joyful; be cheerful. Remember the Lord Jesus said, "In the world ye shall have tribulations: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." John 16:33. Be of good cheer!

Jesus loves you. We should love one another and " . . . speak evil

of no man," Titus 3:2.

SERMON BY BRO. WILLIS EHNLE

Text: Titus 3

"To speak evil of no man, to be no brawlers, but gentle, shewing all meekness unto all men." Titus 3:2

God tells us to speak evil of no man. The Apostle Paul was inspired by the Holy Spirit to write to Titus, among other things, "To speak evil of no man . . ." Titus 3:2. Have we failed in this regard today? This is a hard saying. As we read the Holy Scriptures together this evening and my eyes fell upon this phrase, "Speak evil of no man," I accepted it as a challenge. It is a guideline that I believe we would do well to take careful note of.

"Speak evil of no man." Titus 3:2. Let us say, first of all, that we would not speak evil of men in high places. We would not speak evil of those who have great responsibilities in the world. Why? Because it says here that we ourselves were at one time in the world; we ourselves were thrust about with sin; "we ourselves also were sometimes foolish, disobedient, deceived, serving diverse lusts and pleasures, living in malice and envy . . ." Titus 3:3. This hating, this biting, this criticizing drives you to the ground. It does no one any good at all. It is contrary to the Word of God. So, we are instructed first of all, as we read together tonight, "To speak evil of no man!" Titus 3:2.

Especially, we have no right whatsoever to speak evil of those who have not been converted, because they have not been converted. Thy are living for the devil in a greater or lesser degree. Some people are just floating along. You cannot tell that they are living for the devil, but they are. If they have not surrendered to the Lord Jesus Christ, they have no promise of being in the fold according to the Words of the Lord Jesus Christ when He said, "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." John 3:3.

"To speak evil of no man," Titus

3:2, then, is a tremendous challenge that is handed down to you and to me. It is not just given to us as something we should consider or ponder upon but that we should do. We should carry it out! Why? Because we ourselves are only saved by the grace of God. This is the same reason that we should be so loving and forgiving to everyone.

There was a certain person, I heard about, who sought the Lord, who sought His forgiveness. She wanted to repent; she wanted to live for the Lord; she wanted forgiveness: she wanted a clean heart: she wanted into the houshold of God. She wanted to know if she was ready to meet God if she should die suddenly in an automobile accident or in some great tragedy that should befall her unbeknown, be it sickness or accident. She wanted to know that she was ready to meet the living God. But she had a terrible time. She could never find peace or forgiveness and was troubled in her heart, on and on and on, until one day, someone said to her, "Have you forgiven everyone?" We know about making restitution. We know all about asking for forgiveness where we have done wrong. But this person forgot one thing-forgot to be forgiving. You know, the Lord says. "But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Matthew

Neither you nor I could ever find forgiveness, unless we were willing to forgive others. Why? For the same reason that we are not supposed to speak evil of others. Because, if God forgives us, the least we can do is forgive others. We must never be hesitant to forgive others. As individuals, we should gladly forgive them for anything—even if they want to kill us. Didn't the Lord say, "Father forgive them; for they know not what they do," Luke 23:34, when they nailed Him to the cross? And aren't we supposed to follow in His

footsteps?

This is no baby's play. We are supposed to be followers of Jesus Christ, not some vain philosophy that tunes in and tunes out according to the whims of the individual. Then we have two things straight tonight: one, we are NOT supposed to speak evil of anyone; and two, we ARE supposed to forgive them, willingly and gladly!

Without the forgiveness that we have received, we would be doomed to an eternity of suffering and outer darkness. How, then, can we possibly say we will not forgive? So we forgive—gladly! We forgive; but it doesn't mean that we condone, and, someday, if offenders go completely away from God, the church will have to judge. But no brother or sister, to my understanding, is ever asked to judge, by himself, any other brother or sister or wayfaring soul. The church may be called upon, a group of brethren may be called upon, but no individual is called upon to pass judgment on another or to be unforgiving! If you do have to make a judgment it is not because you are not forgiving. It is to keep order in the church and to keep the bride of Christ clean and pure.

So, as we run across the Scriptures tonight, "To speak evil of no man," Titus 3:2, we have it straight. We are not supposed to speak evil of others because they haven't been converted. We are talking about those outside of Christ now. But when we come to the household of faith, the precious brothers and sisters in Christ who gather here, who are in the faith, how could we dare speak evil of them to somebody else? If we are not allowed to speak evil of our president, unless it be with tears in our eyes, a prayer in our heart, and an attitude of concern rather than criticism, then how can we speak evil of our leaders and our brothers in the church? It should never be! It cannot be!
