In the conclusion, as in the beginning, Jesus testifies that He is the originator of the revelation, in order that we believe and deal with it with all reverence.

He calls Himself the Root and the Offspring of David (the God-Man), and the bright Morning Star. As the morning star is the harbinger of day, rising before the sun, so was also Christ in His first appearance the announcer of a new day, which will dawn with His second appearance in glory. As Morning Star, by His Holy Spirit He rises in the hearts of the believers, so that they may have a certain testimony from Him for the future glory; the anchor of their hope would enter into the inner part of the curtain.

As the tabernacle had two sections, divided by two curtains and separated, the first curtain to the Holy Place for the priests, and the other for the All-Holiest or Holy of Holies, for the high priest, so also has the glory of Jesus Christ two revelations, in the spirit and in the future resurrection of the body.

What will happen if a great, world church is formed?

They say that, with such unity and greatness, they will be able to make themselves heard throughout the world, and thereby be a great power for good to all mankind. We can expect that the will of this world church will not only be suggested, but enforced. Great churches in the past forced even kings to their knees.

Liberty will be threatened the moment a great monopoly is organized. This mammoth church may begin to throw its weight around, and thousands, yes millions, may suffer as a result.

The mind and heart of unconverted man is centered in himself. His supreme desire is to satisfy his personal appetites. He is completely separated from God. His thoughts and ambitions are earthly—not godly.

Christ's prayer for the eleven, and indeed for all who follow, is oneness of heart with God, the Father, and Christ, that their very lives would prove that Christ lived within them.

"Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word;

"That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." Jn. 17: 20, 21.

The burden of His prayer is for the salvation of those who believe on Him, that they might be with Him forever. God does not depend upon the strength of numbers to accomplish His purposes!

The world is impressed when it sees a person who is genuinely sold out to God, and is truly in oneness with Him. The world seems to sense and know God loves that person.

A tragic mistake is that this great prayer has been misinterpreted by the great majority. The wheels of movement are turning ever faster. The world church is approaching culmination f a ster than we ever thought possible. Already the Roman church is preparing herself to be more acceptable, so that this can come about.

Warning! Danger Ahead!

This great world church will dictate in every sphere. The antichrist will arrive and declare that he is God.

Your children brought up in such a church will soon be going right along with the rest. Your influence on others is vital. In speaking of a great church in Revelation, the message says, "Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins ,and that ye receive not of her plagues."

Now is the time to come out of all lukewarm and a postate churches. It's much later than you may think. Come out now, while you can still bring your children and others with you.

"Take my yoke upon you and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls.

A father of one of the children in the first grade of our school had leukemia. I would often visit with them as they picked up their daughter, Christy, in the afternoon when school was out. This week we read his obituary in the paper and called Mrs. Livingston to offer our sympathy and see what we could do to help. She simply said, "I have something wonderful to tell you," and she related the following:

upon themselves pride. Then, we see our accomplishments and begin to think how much we have done. But, beloved ones, if we are really wise, if we really want to have Godly wisdom, we need to search the Scriptures, word for word, and v i s u a l i z e God as He is, holy, righteous, and true. He calls to you and to me to be like Him.

Beloved, God gives this ability to anyone and everyone who is humble of heart. He does not do as the natural man would. People expected Him to come as a king, and they would have flocked around Him. They thought it would be a great worldly event. It was not so. It is the same, dear friends, with the saving of your souls. Don't expect big and marvelous things. God will not do that. He's not going to do that. When the Lord was on earth, the people became impatient and asked for a sign so that they could believe. Friends, I know that there are many of you who think you ought to have a sign, that some big event

or something special should happen before you can repent, so that you will know that God is calling you, that this is the way of the truth. This is not going to happen. Don't expect it to. The Lord comes in a still small voice. in an unexpected way. He is calling and beckoning to you. I know He comes at night when you go to bed; or when there are quiet hours; or when you are working in the house, dusting or doing the dishes; or at other times during the day. And you stop, and think and wonder about these things. Beloved ones, the Lord is just as close to vou as He can be! In those earlier days the Lord was in their very midst and people didn't recognize Him. They didn't want to. They expected something magnificent, not a small quiet birth like His was. What did the Lord say? "Ye shall seek me and ye shall not find me." Those words were very sharp. He said to them that they would seek Him and not find Him. He said that because they would not accept Him when he presented Himself to them. They wouldn't accept Him when He came as a lowly One from Galilee, born in a manger. He was not born in a king's house, so they just couldn't accept it. Could it be possible that a prophet came out of Galilee?

Now, beloved, there is a meaning in this for us. We must be humble. I believe that the reason most people cannot accept the Lord Jesus and His saving power is because they cannot get down on their knees and humble themselves, and recognize that the Lord Jesus is able to take away our sins. It is because the Lord Jesus has preached righteousness and conversion.

I invite you to read the sixth chapter of Isaiah. Read what that prophet wrote. He wrote of the coming of the Lord Jesus when he said, "Make their ears heavy and shut their eyes." There was a reason for this, beloved, and it is because they rejected the Lord Himself.

As we read in Luke 24, two of the disciples, unable to grasp the meaning of the crucifixion and burial, were pondering these things as they walked to Emmaus. They were filled with sadness. They believed that Jesus was the prophet whom God had promised would come. But they did not understand why God had allowed Him to be slain, and all their hopes were dashed to pieces. Then the Lord came and joined Himself to them and walked with them. He asked them what they were talking about, and why they were so sad. And they said, "Art thou only a stranger in Jerusalem and hast not known the things that are come to pass . . .?" (Verse 18) It was the Lord they were talking to. He was victorious over the grave; He had risen out of it. He was there and they didn't recognize him. They were telling Him their troubles when He full well knew them.

It is the same today—it is no different! The Lord knows our troubles; why, He knows them better than we do. He knows the answer to our problems, if we have problems, whatever they are. He just wants us to recognize them ourselves. We need to become acquainted with ourselves and admit that we need the Lord to help us in our troubles. So, the Lord is right here, and all we need to do is get down on our knees and pray to Him, "Lord, you know what is in my heart. You know that I wish to put away all evil." If there is anyone who has a heavy burden, the Lord knows it. Pour it out.

The Lord said to repent. The Lord said to confess our faults one to the other, so that we may be healed. The Lord said many things that people, in their pride, don't want to accept. They don't want to recognize that the Lord said these things. But this is the way to salvation. He stood for these things, and as we read in the Old Testament scripture, "This is the way, walk ye in it." Isaiah 30:21. That is why people who are not willing to accept the Lord are those to whom he said, "Ye shall seek me and shall not find me." Those are the ones in this world today who are in trouble and in torment. They go through their life in trouble, and they never find the Lord. They never get any relief. Day in and day out they go through life heavy of heart because they are guilty of sin. They know that they are not worthy of this great righteous God. They know that something needs to be done. They know that they are proud; too proud to bend the knee; too proud to confess the sin.

The Lord is always here. He is

just as near as He can be. When we go home, the Lord will be there. If we really want to see the Lord, He will be there. He does not deny Himself to any who would really love Him and wish to find salvation for their souls, relief for their souls. Beloved, there is not one who cannot find Him, for He said, "Seek and ye shall find." Luke 11:9 Those are positive words, very positive. "Seek and ye shall find." But we must seek. It isn't going to just come and fall into our laps. The Lord is not going to allow some great thing to happen. And would you want it that way? Would you want to be in a car accident for example, with your father or mother or husband or wife killed, or maybe be half dead before you repent? Would you want it that way? I ask you? Or would we rather accept the Lord for what He is. He is that humble Man who came from Galilee. Let us all admit that none of us is good, not one. One called to the Lord, "Good Master," but the Lord wouldn't admit or accept that. He said, " . . . none is good, save one, that is God." Luke 18:18, 19. If the Lord can say that, it really ought to bring tears to the eyes of all of us. Who, then, are we? What do we have to brag about? What have we to be proud of? If we would confess our faults one to another, we would have to hang our heads in shame, saying that I have done this, or I have done that, for which I am very ashamed.

Only this week, we were talking together and saying how we can go out into the world and sin, and the Lord will forgive. He has opened the way so that we can repent; true. The Lord has said that He will come into our hearts and we can be forgiven; true. But, beloved ones, the sins that we have committed we cannot undo. They are done. That is why we must say that there is not one of us who is not guilty; the Lord had to die on the cross for every one of us.

I know that there are a lot of people on this earth whom we classify as good people. They have not gone out into the world and gotten into some great sin. We know that there are some among us who came to the Lord in their youth with weeping and tears, repenting. And they were not guilty of some great evil such as stealing, lying, lasciviousness, or whatever you want to say. Yet, they came with

tears of sorrow. Why is that? It is because they recognized that their hearts were perverse against the Lord. The apostle Paul, himself, thought he was doing so much good for the Lord. But the Lord struck him down, and He said, "It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." Acts 9:5. This can apply to anyone who can classify himself as a pretty good person, but who still has a perverse nature and will argue with mom or dad; who has the nature of Adam, and not the goodness of the Lord. So beloved ones, there is no one who is not guilty of the nature of Adam. We need to recognize that lowly Jesus of Galilee.

This is what was the matter in the chapter which we read today. Some believed and accepted; others didn't. It is still the same. Beloved, the Man from Galilee invites you to be like Him. That is all there is to it. He says to follow Him. "I am the door," and "He that entereth not by the door . . . , but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber." John 10:1,7. If anyone thinks in his heart that he's going to get to heaven any other way, he is wrong. When that day comes, God the Father will ask where you come from and where your wedding garment is. And you will stand there speechless. We must be clothed with the righteousness of our Lord and Saviour. We must have the nature of humility and obedience, subject to the Father.

The Lord did not preach His own Word. He said clearly and plainly that He had not preached anything He had learned of men. He had not preached anything of Himself. "My doctrine is not mine, but his that sent me." John 7:16.

It is still the same today. If we wish to enter into the sheepfold, we must go through the door, and that door is the Lord Jesus. Narrow is the Way and few there be that find it. THE SILVER LINING

SERMON SPOKEN BY BRO. LEROY HUBER OF EUREKA, ILLINOIS

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We give thanks to God that we have learned to know the Lord from our youth, and that this gospel is not a new gospel, but an old one which we recognize as the true gospel of God. It will save our souls and deliver us from eternal Hell and torment, yielding and giving eternal life.

As we read these verses, we perceived the unbelief of some of the people, but some recognized Him and said, "This is the Christ." The officers themselves, whom the rulers had expected to take Him captive, did not dare lay hands on Him. They said, "Never man spake like this man." (Verse 46) They stood in fear of Him and did not touch Him, and let Him go free because His time was not yet fulfilled. There were more things that He needed to teach the disciples, so that they could be fortified in the days to come.

From this chapter, we discern that the Pharisees, the Scribes, the learned people were not expecting God to send the deliverer in the way He did, because it says, "And the Jews marvelled, saying, How knoweth this man letters, having never learned?" (Verse 15) It shows, dear ones, that they went to school to learn the old law. We read in the Bible that Gamaliel was one of the most respected among those who taught the law. They put emphasis upon learning the old law and they thought that surely God would send a deliverer who had been taught in the traditional way. They did not understand that even though they knew the law, they fell short of it and transgressed the law. We're not keepers of that law. We also are guilty of trying to kill Him, and without a cause.

When we analyze it, Christ was there, suddenly, as was prophesied by the Spirit of God many years before; He was in their midst and they didn't know it or recognize Him. They disputed with

each other about Him. Some thought that surely this had to be the Christ and recognized Him. Others were stubborn and blinded by their own thoughts, and couldn't accept Him. And they were even guilty of transgressing the law; Jesus told them that they had transgressed the law. Those who were supposed to teach others, knowing the law so well, would be expected to recognize Him when He came. But, beloved ones, even though they knew the law well, they did not understand what they were teaching, or they would have believed and would have recognized the Saviour as God sent Him.

When the Lord Jesus spoke, it was as the officer said, "Never man spake like this man." Beloved, the first Sermon on the Mount was the first message that Jesus spoke. We also say that never had anyone spoken like this before. "Judge not that ye be not judged." Mt. 7,1 Many, many teachings are in that sermon, which the Lord spoke with authority.

The officers said, "Never man spake like this man." He had the authority from God Himself to speak righteousness. Was it right that these people were trying to kill Him? It was not, as was even pointed out here by one of them. Nicodemus asked if it were right by the law to kill a man unless he had first been judged, so that the accused would have a chance to speak. They were at fault in that point.

Also, they were at fault because they despised Him. Twice during the past week I read in the scriptures in two different places that if you despise your neighbor, you sin. These Pharisees despised the Lord Jesus. Why? What had He done to them? Nothing. They had no reason to kill Him. He hadn't hurt them, or taken anything away from them, or mistreated them. He merely spoke the gospel truth

to them. Repent for your sins and be converted is what He preached. He was in the temple teaching the people to repent and be converted.

Beloved, it aroused envy in the so-called teachers of that day that this "unlearned" person was getting so much attention. The people were flocking to Him because the Lord was preaching the love of God, not an eye for an eye, or a tooth for a tooth. He was preaching forgiveness of sin. He said that if your brother sins against you, you should forgive him not seven times, but "seventy times seven." He was preaching a different gospel, the Gospel of God Himself. The Lord was telling how God deals with you and me. Beloved brothers, sisters, and friends, don't we all have to admit that this is the way God deals with us?

If we try to justify ourselves, as the Pharisees did, we will say that we have done this good thing or that good thing, or that we have not done this evil or that evil. This is not the proper way for us to analyse ourselves. Because God is holy, righteous, pure, and true, we should humble ourselves. Rather than bragging or thinking that we know so much. we should smite ourselves upon the breast and say, "God be merciful to me." To this day, even though we have repented, God gives us His spirit, and will forgive seven times seventy. If God would give us our due reward, we would not be called a Child of God. Not one of us. This is because we have been born with a perverse spirit; one that is always antagonistic, one that is always. according to the Word, striving against good. That's what it amounts to. We have been born into this world with the nature of Adam. It is a nature to sin. God has placed in us a living soul, and has given us freedom; and because He has done this, we begin to take (continued on page 26)

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
