

A LIGHT FOR BELIEVERS

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SERMON BY BRO. ED ALT

Spoken on July 2 at the funeral of the seven members of the Glenn Egolf and Aaron Bauer families who were killed in San Diego, California, on June 28, 1978. The obituaries were published in the September Silver Lining.

Beloved congregation: Have you given thought to how we would feel if we did not have this Book to reach for? When we came in, you sang the beautiful hymn, "Does Jesus Care?" I hope that this family can look back and remember the multitude that is here. There is your answer. Not only there, but in the comfort that you have in your hearts.

When this disaster came upon us. we were overwhelmed. I said to Bro. Aaron, "What would we dare to consider as a thought or a theme," and, beloved, there is one word which is of special importance to a believer. I think you all know what I am thinking of, and that is love. Can it be possible that even this act could have its roots in love? A few weeks ago this family, as a family went on a vacation trip. I know that they looked forward to it for a long time. They spoke of it, and that in itself was rooted in love. I believe that it was Glenn's intention to take his children and grandchildren, one family at a time, in the motor home, and vacation together.

You and I know that many prayers went into their departure, requests that the Lord would be with them and around them. Maybe, in our finite minds, we say, "Well, then, what happened?" What happened is that this is the culmination of God's wonderful plan for His children—and every one of those precious souls was a child of His. Would you, or I, or they have believed it, if we had been told that this lovely trip's destination would be heaven? That trip is what we all are preparing ourselves for here on earth, but it came much sooner than expected for Aaron, Carol, Glenn, Mary, and those precious children. They are not suffering, beloved; it is you and I who grieve and suffer. The victory is theirs, but we are here and we need comfort. I know no source other than this living Word.

Let us turn to Paul's first letter to the Corinthian church in chapter 13. We know it as the "love chapter." We are going to begin reading at the fourth verse because so much of this is known to us by heart. Here, Paul expresses the feelings of our minds. Beloved. I believe that each one of the adults who lie here before us would have been able to say, on his departure or at any time during the trip, the same thing which Paul said, "I believe that I have the mind of Christ." And the mind of Christ thinks like this, "Charity suffereth long, and is kind." When we speak of charity, or love, we are speaking of the love of God that is in the hearts of His children, and is then passed on to others.

"Charity envieth not . . ." and while we read this, beloved family and congregation, think of your loved ones, our loved ones, and consider whether this doesn't fit them perfectly. "Charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth, not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; Rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth. in the truth; Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Charity never faileth: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it

shall vanish away." Isn't that the truth?

We read these words often. We read them at funerals. We read them at weddings, hoping to incorporate the love of God into the union. But, beloved, we often fail to realize that these things come to pass, do we not? This has come to pass: "whether there be prophecies (preachings or teachings), they shall fail." That is true. As the tree falls, so shall it lie; as these precious souls have taught their children and grandchildren, so shall that teaching stay. Their tongues are still and their lips are silent, but the Scripture says that Abel, although he is gone, still speaks to us very vividly, plainly, loudly.

You'll never forget these adults; you will never forget these precious children. They'll be gone from us, and to a degree the blow will be softened somewhat—I say somewhat, never totally. But what they believed in, what they stood for, and what they advocated, you will never forget. That is why Paul wrote, "whether there be tongues, they shall cease," and they have; and "whether there be knowledge (the joy of wisdom put into practical use), it shall vanish away." He says "For we know in part and we prophecy (preach, teach, exhort, or admonish) in part."

The next verse shows us where the living and the dead must part, beloved. "But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away," and this is what has happened to these loved ones. You and I are still here in this vale of tears. As Bro. Ezra said, we must watch and wait, and we must pick up the torch and go on from here, advancing what these precious souls stood for and (Continued on page 25)

Don't try to produce Christ in yourself. Give Him your whole self (Romans 12:1; Mark 12:30) and let Him flow through your branches to produce fruit.

believed in. How thankful we are that it is not a vain philosophy, but that it is the living Word of Christ, beloved members of His Body.

In the twelfth verse Paul wrote, "For now we," and that is we who are here, "see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face." Beloved, when those who live for the Lord pass away, they know their destiny. We are gathered here this afternoon to remind ourselves of the destiny that each of us is going to face and to prepare ourselves, so that we may one day, as the Bible says, stand before God as sons or daughters, blameless.

Paul said, "now I know in part; but then I shall know even as I am known." If these precious souls are like myself, they often wondered. in spite of their faith. We trust that it was an abiding, staunch faith. They probably often wondered (and don't you wonder?) as we sing in the beautiful hymn, "How shall it be when we at last returning . . .?" Now, dear family, these people know how it really is. Isn't that something to think of, and to cling to? This is what we need.

Then Paul concluded by saying, "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." As you go through your lives, think about that, and ponder these thoughts. Does this describe this family? I believe it does. And "the greatest of these is love." God is speakin? here to believing souls. The greatest gift that He can give to men is the life of God shining forth through redeemed hearts which pass that love on to their fellowmen.

(We are going to bow our heads and fold our hands in praver, and we will ask you to remain seated for the prayer.)

Dear Heavenly Father. we thank Thee for the beauty of this quiet sanctuary in this lovely Sunday

afternoon hour. We came together. brethren, neighbors, acquaintances, and dear friends, to bid farewell to these whom we loved so dearly. How we thank Thee that by the gift of Thy Holy Son, Jesus, who died on our behalf on Calvary's Cross, we may address Thee not only as a righteous God, but as, Abba, Father. We thank Thee, Father, that, although we were not born into Thy family, through the reading and hearing of the Word, we, and these loved ones. could come under conviction. repent, be converted, be baptised into Thy death, and arise to a new life in Christ-totally sanctified to walk in Thy grace here on earth. We thank Thee for having prepared such a wonderful way of salvation, which defies our feeble description.

We do rejoice in the way, and our prayer this afternoon is that every heart that is wounded will be healed. We realize, Father, that in the case of the immediate children of Glenn and Mary and their loved ones, and of the family of Aaron and Margueritte and their surviving children, this healing will be partial at best. We realize that it will be slow, but Thy holy love can be poured in like a balm, as the healing balm of Gilead. We heard in prayer that even this tragedy can work for the good of those of us who love Thee, Lord, and who are called according to Thy purpose. We confess, dear Father, that this purpose looks different to us from what we would have expected, but we want to be wise unto Salvation and not question Thee. Again, we thank Thee from the depth of our feeble hearts, Heavenly Father, for giving us Jesus. May we look beyond the empty cross to the risen Christ. Who sits at Thy right hand and makes intercession for "whosoever will."

We realize that there may be some among us who are not acquainted with Thy wavs. and who are not acquainted with Thy Holy Word, and with Thy blan for the lives of men; we ask Thee to help each one according to his need. Let us be used here in life as servants of Thine, willing to labor in Thy vineyard so that when we answer the call. even as these precious souls did, that we will be ready as we feel that they were We thank Thee again, dear Lord, for Thy loving, kind, tender presence in the family of everyone here who is touched by this tragedy. As a congregation, as a brotherhood, we, too, are rent but not asunder. We know that we will heal, but we ask Thee to be patient with us as we wait upon Thee. Bless us with Thy precious and Holy nearness in the living Word is our prayer in Jesus name. Amen.

This afternoon, we are going to read some words from the Scriptures that are, I'm sure, we'l known to you, but they never become "common-place." The shepherd's psalm: If you remember, this psalm was written from the sheep's viewpoint. I was told, recently, by one in the medical profession that certain parts of us are very much like those of sheep. I am thankful, beloved, to know that, because sheep are known to be gentle and docile animals. The Psalmist used the illustration of a sheep of his pasture speaking of his shepherd.

When we read this, if we dare put one word before the reading of "The Lord is My Shepherd," let's just insert the word "because"—because the Lord is my Shepherd. Maybe it will give each of us more insight into how the child of God rejoices in His salvation, and has no fear of death because death is not an eternal separation from God. For believers, it is a transition from the state that you and I are in this afternoon, into the presence of God.

David, who had many experiences like ours, wrote, (because) "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; Thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil: my cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.'

Isn't it true. beloved, that we read these words often, but somehow their reality escapes us? We could find ourselves, as this dear

family found themselves, in the presence of God within a matter of moments. It was far from their minds that day. A dinner was planned for them, and they did not arrive; but notice that we read here, "Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies." They don't need mortal food any longer such as you and I depend upon to sustain us. They didn't realize that at the very time when the table was set in their friend's home, the Lord was setting the table for them in eternity.

We have a lovely hymn which goes something like this; "Live thou as thou wilt wish to have lived." That isn't exactly as it is worded but that is what it means. We don't know when our days on earth will be ended, do we? We have no idea, and how thankful we are that God keeps this wonderful secret to Himself.

A dear sister explained to us the other night, and I draw comfort from Margueritte's words, that God had this departure for Aaron planned even before he was delivered. When he was born, I was in Europe, but I recall that we started Sunday School together in 1957, about the time when he was in the seventh grade. It was an unusual class, and we enjoyed it very much. A brother warned me that it wouldn't always be that way, but this happened to be a class of intelligent boys and girls who were interested and very attentive. I think that we might say that it continued all through this young man's life, can we not? But, in spite of this interest which Aaron and Carol had, and in spite of the heart full of love that Glenn and Mary had for you, their children, and for their neighbors and friends, there was something lacking that each one of them recognized; and this is what we rejoice in this afternoon, dear family. They recognized that life without Christ was not life; it was not even existence. Everything else was as ashes, and they believed the Word of God that Jesus Himself spoke to Nicodemus at night, "You must be born again." You must repent, and you must recog nize that you are separated from God unless He is in your heart and you have turned your life over to Him as total Lord and Saviour, Prophet, Priest, and King.

If these loved ones had not done that, they would have been eternally separated from Him after the accident in San Diego County. This, beloved, would have broken our hearts almost beyond repair, but being very wise unto salvation and not foolish unto condemnation, they followed the teaching of the Scripture and went through blessed and pure cleansing of heart, soul, and mind. They were not refurbished, but new persons in Christ Jesus.

One precious young soul who finds it very difficult to part with one of this family has said to us. "If I could see him again, just once," and don't we all say that; if we could just one more time hold them in our arms or hold their hand. We recall what David of old said, that he couldn't bring back his son who had passed away, but he could prepare himself to go where he went. The servants were afraid to tell the king, because of what might happen in his wrath. that his son who was ill had passed away; but. beloved, David at that time had the mind of God, and he annointed himself and washed. shaved, dressed and sat down to meat. Then he made this wise statement, "Can I bring him back again? I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me." II Sam. 12:23. This is what we are speaking of in this afternoon hour. Beloved congregation, if there is one of you here under the sound of our voice who is not positive of your standing before the living God, realize that He can become the Lord of your life.

Nicodemus, a member of the council and wise in the ways of the world, was brilliant enough to recognize that there was something seriously lacking in his life and he came to the Lord at night. When the Lord speaks to your heart, don't let the cares of this world cause you to turn and walk away, dismayed, as some did. Jesus grieved, too. He told the rich young man to divest himself of what he had. I don't believe that He meant only financially, because finances can be used in the work of the Lord, but we should empty ourselves before God and let the Lord take us into His workshop. This is what happened to this dear young couple in Denver. and this is what happened to Glenn and Mary here in our assembly, beloved. The Lord took them into His workshop, and then what you saw, knew, met and greeted was the result of His work. These dear souls are the handiwork of God.

I believe that I knew each of them well enough to know that if we could ask them what we should speak of this afternoon, they would say the same thing. Speak of the things that pertain to loveliness, beauty, and holiness. Think of the things that will lift us up so that we may see beyond the present. The child of God, beloved, is not permitted after his arising from the waters of baptism to be taken immediately into the presence of God. That would be pleasurable for us as we would never be more ready than we are at that moment. but He wants us to stay here as a witness for Him, and to endure whatever He might lay upon us.

I can almost hear a conversation. Our Father in Heaven said, 'Aaron, it is time to come home." There would not be any argument. "I'm ready; the only thing, would you let me bring Carol and the children along?" What nobler thoughts could you have, beloved, than that? It's a grief and tragedy for every one of us, isn't it? But, it could be worse, couldn't it? We have no one maimed, halt, or blind as a result of this accident. We have no orphans left here who are juveniles. We all grieve, but, Dawn, you are the one who will really suffer, and you, also, Russell. The Lord will sustain you according to your every need. Keep your trust and your hope in the Rock that is higher than you.

The rest of you have your helpmates. We adjure you before the living God to put your trust and keep your trust in the One Who redeemed the souls of these precious ones whom you loved so much.

When Joseph and Mary asked Jesus if He didn't know that He was causing them anxiety when He was missing, He said, 'Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" I think that Mary realized a little bit better than Joseph who Jesus really was, but this virtuous man also recognized that he was rearing in his home the Son of God

Who but a shepherd would make preparation for his sheep to lie down by the still waters? Sheep can't wade out into turbulence to drink. Beloved, they are afraid; they have every right to be. And so it says, "he leadeth me beside the still waters." The calm waters. This is what is going to sustain this family. This is what is going to sustain you and me, beloved brethren. In the days and hours to come the Lord will continue to lead us beside the still waters. Read His Word and meditate upon it day and night.

'He restoreth my soul." It must be that once in awhile our soul needs refurbishing, doesn't it? Perhaps, because we are flesh and blood, we sometimes need to be brought up short, admonished, and chastened; but, oh, how much we need to be buoyed up and encouraged again anew. "He restoreth my soul."

"He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake." Here again, I think we should pause a moment, as we so often do on this Word, because there might be some among us who feel that righteousness is a standing we can never attain; but, beloved, it is a right standing with God in obedience to His living Word. That is what the shepherd's sheep is talking about here, not Glenn's and Aaron's righteousness, but the righteousness of Christ.

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me." The shepherd always carried two implements with him, the rod to ward off the enemy of the flock, and the shepherd's crook to reach out and draw an erring one back into the fold. This does indeed lift us up, does it not? You know that all sunshine, dear congregation, creates a barren desert; and I think that Mary, Carol, Aaron, and Glenn would tell us that it was the storm, and the wind, and rain, spiritually, that matured them into what it took to meet what happened last week in California. Think that over. It is true, isn't it? All sunshine makes nothing but a barren desert, and, likewise, all rain would create an Amazon rain forest. So, we need everything to mature us into, as the Old Testament speaks of it, a ripe summer fruit.

I must tell you that I didn't think that this fruit was ripe. Somehow, we just can't think of these precious souls as having been ready to depart this life, but this is the difference between our finite minds and the mind of Christ, is it not? Being the sheep of His pasture, we are going to wait upon Him. We sing, sometimes, in a lovely hymn, "Some day we'll understand;" and we might think, "Well, maybe there are things here that I didn't think I could understand, but I can if I think deeply." But I believe this defies human understanding. However, the children of God will be willing to wait; and, finally, before the judgment seat of Christ and in the presence of God, we will ask why this, what you and I term an accident, happened last week so far from home.

David writes "Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over." I read recently that sheep are bothered tremendously by flies and insects. In the very best seasons of the year, the grazing seasons, a wise shepherd takes each sheep and rubs a solution upon its head and nostrils to ward off the flies and the insects that would cause discomfort, infection, and maybe even death. This reminds us of ourselves and of the Christ whom we follow gladly, joyfully. Think of the words, dear family, which Peter wrote in 1 Pet. 2:25, looking to Jesus who went to the cross joyfully despite the shame of it; Jesus, "the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls." "Thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.'

If we could recall any one of these adults this afternoon, I wonder if they would say to us, "No, I really wish it would not have happened: I really wasn't quite ready and I would rather have waited.' The question was asked of this servant recently, "Would you really like to pass away?" Our natural response is, "No, I would really rather stay." We feel that we still might have some work with our young children. It is human instinct, is it not? But, beloved, the fact remains that this is God's will. and Jesus Himself taught His disciples "Thine and not my will be done." If we had asked any one of these souls, they would probably have said, "If this is God's will, we are more than glad to comply.'

Then, finally, David writes, "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life." This is speaking of those who have given their all into the hands of Christ that their destiny might be guided by Him. Then, after death, beloved, comes the act of God which has happened to this CHARLES WALDER EAST LYNN ILL 60932

family; we shall "dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

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I would like to read with you, if you will, a few verses from the Scripture which come to my mind. This is a family that had almost an unusual love, one for another. Many times when we gathered for some reason, if they were a little late, they would say, "We had something with the family first." I don't need to remind you that this is what put the family together in the motor coach. It was love, a desire to be together; to spend days and evenings together eating, drinking, traveling, sight-seeing, visiting and enjoying fellowship.

The family is the first structure, and the way the family is structured is going to determine how the nation goes, beloved. Listen to what wise David had to say concerning a family: "Blessed is everyone that feareth the Lord; that walketh in His ways." The fear of the Lord is in a Godly reverential trust in obedience to His Word. Again, I ask those of you who knew these four adults, don't you feel that they would say, "It is our wish and desire that somehow this might emanate from us." "Blessed is everyone that feareth the Lord; that walketh in His ways. For thou shalt eat the labor of thine hands: happy shalt thou be, and it shall be well with thee." Psa. 128:1,2. I don't believe that these people were interested in wealth as you and I think of dollars and cents, beloved. It wasn't important. Their happiness was first of all in the Lord and then in being together. We wish that this might be spread out among mankind. This is charity.

David continued, "Thy wife shall be a fruitful vine by the sides of thine house: thy children like olive plants round about thy table. Behold, that thus shall the man be blessed that feareth the Lord. The Lord shall bless thee out of Zion: and thou shalt see the good of Jerusalem all the days of thy life. Yea, thou shalt see thy children's children, and peace upon Israel." I think that the joy of Aaron's and Carol's home was these precious little childrenit couldn't be otherwise, beloved. We read in the Scripture that they are as arrows in a man's quiver. Then the Psalmist goes on to say, "Blessed is the man whose quiver is full of such arrows." Children are what turn a house into a home.

We would like to read a few more verses from the Scripture for the benefit of all of us. I do not wish to weary you, beloved, but we do not wish to transmit to anyone that all of us are automatically saved because God is love, which He is. I tried to speak plainly when I said that we must repent and we must be born again. "Two ways, O man, are there for thee; There are two destinations." Zion's Harp, No. 106.

In the Old Testament, in the book of Daniel, we read, in the 12th chapter, words that sober us. For Daniel was moved to write, "And many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awaken, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt." So we see that this is the time for preparation. He writes further, "And they that be wise (we are speaking of the wise toward God who cast their lot with the Creator of heaven and earth through His divine Son, our blessed Lord, and in that shed blood wherein is salvation) shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever."

If we could ask this afternoon, "Aaron and Glen, what do you hope will be the result of this tragedy which shocked not only our congregation and community, but the nation?" I think they would tell us, "We hope that souls will become (as we read here) wise unto salvation, and repent, become converted, die to sin, be baptized into the death of Christ, and arise as new persons in Christ Jesus, living a sanctified life that in every breath and every thought does one thing, which is to glorify the risen Christ."

One of the members of the family asked me, "Do you have on your pulpit an effigy of the empty cross?" And I said, "Yes, we do," and you see it right here in front of me. This is important, beloved, because our God lives. The Lord of heaven and earth didn't allow man to take His life, but as it says, gave His life-"gave up the ghost." Jesus had absolute control at that time, but He realized (this is what made it joyful) that he needed to give His life so that you might have yours, and so that Mary and Glenn, and Aaron and Carol might have theirs. It isn't only a doctrine to "die by," dear congregation, it is also a doctrine to "live by." Don't think of the fleeting moments which you and I term as fun; they pass away and are gone. But think of the joy that emanates from the personality of one who has given his life to Christ.

Maybe you are thinking, "Why don't you speak of the little people and of Ryan?" It is because, beloved, before God they are innocent. They needed no repentance; they needed no conversion. Had they reached the age of accountability, it would be a different story, but, in their innocence, God accepts them exactly as they are. As He put them here, so they return to Him.

Now. I would like to read with you one last thing for the comfort of this family. When we leave this assembly room, we are going to have thoughts. We're going to concentrate on something, and this is what we would like to have you think of. In the fourth chapter of Phillipians, speaking to the converted (but if we are not converted, beloved friends, we can become so in Christ Jesus who Himself said, "Whosoever will may come"), Paul says, "Finally bretheren, whatsoever thing are true, whatsoever things are honest. whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these thngs.'

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
