When I was asked to write for the Silver Lining, only one thing came to my mind. It is the harvest season in the grain fields; the Lord gathers in His harvest, too. May all of us be included in His harvest! The following is written in memory of our son who was "harvested"

at an early age.

Twenty years ago on Aug. 8, 1958, God blessed our union of hearts with our first born, a son, Adair Lynn. We did not fully realize the greatness of this miracle and blessing from God, because we were not yet Christians. However. remembering the faith of our parents and the example that they set, the first place we took Adair was to church.

He quickly grew and developed into a young boy. We enjoyed his first words and steps in life. Soon the time came to start Sunday School and to learn about Jesus and the gift of eternal life. Then came school. He learned of the things that are necessary in this life to help him grow into manhood and

take his place in society.

Our family grew and so did the children. We felt the need of bringing our children up in a Christian home. By the grace of God, we turned to the Lord in repentance. We realized that it was His love that sought us. It was a totally new life when the Lord entered into our hearts and gave us the peace that passeth all understanding. We then saw the miracle of life in ourselves and in our children. It is beautiful. God created man in His own image and breathes life into each living soul. It became very apparent to us that we should walk the Christian way of life and set a good example for our children.

I didn't know much about Jesus. but I was able to find absolute peace and hope of eternal life. I had the privilege of teaching Sunday School, with Adair in my class. I taught the children that Jesus loves them. Adair loved the song, "Jesus Loves Me."

Adair had a love for farming, but he believed that the opportunities were limited where we lived (central Illinois). After much prayer, my wife, our children, and myself decided to move to the Taylor. MO, area. Deuteronomy 11:11-14

was revealed to us.

A year after we moved, Adair graduated from high school, and we started our life-long dream of farming together. It was a privilege to see Adair grow from a child, to a teen-ager, to a grown man. Yes, there were trials, but we learned, together, of love and patience. As he matured, we saw him grow to manhood. He was willing to help when need. He was kind to others and obedient to us, his parents.

On Aug. 1, we spent the day together. We looked forward to harvesting the crops together. As Adair left that evening, we told him, "Goodbye." We had no idea that tomorrow was his day of har-

Adair was a part-time construc-tion worker. They were building a river bridge. He fell from it and sustained severe head injuries. He was taken to the Columbia Medical Center. I took the Bible and knelt beside Adair's bed. I prayed to God that when I opened the Bible that He would show me a sign of my son's spiritual condition. I had to know this to continue life. The Bible opened to St. John 4:47-53.

We were given no hope for life for our son, but my wife and I believed that since God was able to save us in our sinful condition and was able to create the heavens and the earth, it would be a small matter to save our son. With that in mind, we asked that the life-support machine be removed from our Adair. We felt that if God wanted him to live, he would; if not, in the life to come.

Adair died on Aug. 8, 1978, his twentieth birthday.

Our hopes, our plans, our dreams of being together on earth were shattered. My wife and I learned that our plans are not always God's plans. We must accept His plans as they are fulfilled in our lives each day. We believe that what God does is well done, and that He does only what is good for His children. We can't understand now, but sometime, in that better land, we will understand.

As we now often go to Adair's grave, we think of his life as the setting of the sun. After the sun sets, its glow can be seen long afterward. It is this glow that we now see of our beloved son. Yes, we miss him on Sundays. He always sat on the back bench. Just a few months ago I looked at Adair and thought that, if something happened to me, he would be well able to take my responsibilities in life. I felt that the Lord would want

As we kissed Adair farewell, only God knew how much we loved him.

But how thankful we are for the twenty years when we were able to enjoy him and rear him from a child to a man.

A TREASURE OF PRAISE THE HISTORY OF THE ZION'S HARP HYMNAL

The Zion's Harp hymnal has cut through a wide swath of time. While it's true that distribution of the official, bound copies of the book we now recognize commenced only in the middle of the 19th cen-. tury in Europe, fragments of the hymnal's contents, both the hymns and the musical composition, date as far back as the 15th century before the inception of the Protestant

Reformation, which began in 1517.

The Zion's Harp, as known today, was first printed during the vears 1853-54 on the request of Bro. S. H. Froehlich in Switzerland. Up until this time, various booklets and compilations of hymns had been used in one form or another in the meetings of the Evangelical Baptists.

To obtain a more general understanding of the actual beginning of this beloved and cherished hymnal, one must go back to the early stages of the 19th century.

On November 11, 1764, a little baby girl was born in the Russian town of Riga. This Latvian city today has a population of over 600,000. The girl's name was Juliane von Kruedener. She was the daughter of Herman von Vietinghoff, a Russian imperial privy councilor, a man of rationalistic views and a leading freemason, and of his wife, Anna Ulrica, a strict Lutheran.

After a fashionable education she married at age 17 to Baron von Kruedener on September 23, 1782. He was then the first Russian minister at the court of Courland. The marriage proved to be an unhappy one, since the husband was conscientious and retiring, while the wife was restless, flirtatious, and given to frequenting the cosmopolitan fashion centers of the world.

Her husband died on June 14, 1802. Meanwhile, the Baronness took to the task of writing a novel. It took her two years to complete. It was published in 1804, and was highly regarded. This tended to confirm that she was a very capable individual, well-educated, and talented in the art of communication. Her personality, too, was such that people easily attracted to her.

She lived a free lifestyle and eventually found herself far from God. During a sojourn in Riga in the summer of 1804, Juliana experienced conversion, an occurance which nothing in her past life seemed to make probable. Her exher life profound. In language we perience was deep, the change in can readily understand, she experienced a "true repentance"

Yet, from this time forth, a seemingly unwholesome, nervous "religosity" came to be the dominant element in her character, and through its extravagance, reflected a cloudy mysticism like that of the Chiliasts of Baden, Alsace, and

Wuerttemberg with whom she cultivated relations of intimacy.

An interesting footnote to the history of Baroness Juliane von Kruedener is that she attempted to convert the czar of Russia. In 1815 she was granted an audience with Czar Alexander which lasted for three hours at Heilbronn. So captivating was this woman that he became a constant "guest" at her Bible classes in Heidelberg and Paris. Before long, however, Alexander turned away from his new friend whose persisting associations with unsalutory elements rendered him distrustful.

Her repentance, having occurred at the outset of the 19th century came about at a time in which theological change and maneuvering still lingered in Europe. It was a time when the Reformed churches were continuing to be threatened by "pietistic" and "anabaptist" groups, who were opposed to a dead orthodoxy. Essentially, the authority and influence of the Protestant State Churches were on the wane—they had been since the early 17th century.

Replacing them, to a degree, was the further development of the "free church", which among other things challenged the concept of the union of church and state. The free church also encouraged the doctrines of sanctity, repentance, adult baptism, coming out from the world and living a life of holiness, and a literal interpretation of the

In any event, Frau Kruedener's conversion and subsequent experiences were such that she felt the need to be an active worker in the Lord's vineyard. As a matter of fact, she became an "evangelist" at least according to her view of what she felt an evangelist was.

Obviously, in 19th century Europe the fact of a woman evangelist carried with it quite a social stigma. Indeed today, and justifiably so, the notion of a woman minister carries with it the same stigma. Even so, Frau Kruedener was actively engaged in the work of an "evangelist", social stigma notwithstanding. In this realm, she faced twofold opposition because of her actions. First, she conducted religious meetings outside the legally sanctioned Reformed Church. Secondly, she presented herself as a woman minister. Both were an anathema at that time. In spite of this she had many devout followers, not only among the peasantry, but in the intellectual community as well. One influential supporter was Friedrich Lachenal, Professor of Logic and Metaphysics at the University of Basel.

Frau Kruedener traveled extensively throughout Switzerland conducting Bible study sessions and worship meetings. She personally financed many projects to aid this work. One such project was the collection and printing of hymns to be used in her church and Bible meetings.

Why was it necessary to collect new hymns? First, in the context of religion in those days, the relationship between the established and legally sanctioned state Protestant churches and those outside this church (i.e. the "free churches") was a partisan and combative one in the most literal sense. In most cases, organized opposition and blatant disobedience to the will of the state church was often met with force and persecution, and if not, at least harassment was prevalent. This situation was nothing new in Europe, for a similar dispute arose three hundred years earlier between Ulrich Zwingli, an avowed Protestant and a leader of the original Protestant Reformation (but a firm supporter of the statechurch concept) and Conrad Grebel, a noted leader of the often ill-fated Anabaptist move-

Several public debates took place between these men who held to differing religious views. In fact, these differing views still lingered centuries later in the time of Frau Kruedener, and in large part still exist today.

Thus, in this context of strife and conflict, the use of a hymnal of the established state church outside one of their official services was prohibited. As a result, it became necessary for those holding their own "independent" religious meetings to print hymnals to be used in these meetings, which in essence were considered outside the official sanction of the state church and consequently illegal. Frau Kruedener saw this need, and along with her followers, acted accordingly. So, with the recognition of a need for hymns, the gathering of special hymns which eventually found their way into the Zion's Harp began. By 1817, the great need for songs to be used in "outside" religious meetings led Frau Kruedener to publish a small hymnal. It was small indeed and could hardly be considered a hymnal according to today's standards. Three songs were chosen at the outset. They were printed on two sheets and 500 copies of this "hymnal" were made. This effort was financed by Frau Kruedener and the collection bore no title. Working with her on this initial project was Johann Jacob Vetter (1789-1871).

From this first effort, Vetter later compiled some hymns into a publication entitled Begginger Buchlein. It was named for the Swiss village of Begginger. The exact publishing date is not known.

In time, a hymnal called the Christliche Harmonika was completed by Johann Vetter. This was an extended version of the Begginger Buchlein and the first to contain melodies. It is assumed that Vetter wrote some of the songs included in this publication. The exact publication is not known, but records indicate that by 1828, D. F. Spitteler printed the 5th edition.

The 5th edition of the Harmonika (1828) was published together with a group of hymns collected and admired by S. H. Froehlich. Further, by this time, Froehlich made another collection of hymns that he later published along with those already bound with the Harmonika. This volume bore no title. According to the late author Herman Ruegger, it was simply called a collection of "hymns for meetings of believers." This volume was printed in four editions between 1828 and 1853 by Karl Weuterich-Guardard in Zurich, Switzerland.

During 1852-53, a new version of this hymnal was printed and named Neue Zionsharfe. It was printed separately from the Harmonika, but 182 hymns of the latter were included. G. M. Mangold, a member of Froehlich's Evangelical Baptist Church, had been commissioned to compile this edition of the hymnal. Sources indicate that Froehlich himself gavethe commission.

Uncertainty exists as to who G. M. Mangold really is. This man authored more hymn texts for the Zion's Harp than any other man. Yet, no definitive proof can be registered if this man is George Michael Mangold, or G. Martin Mangold. However, most people think it is the former.

Since 1854, several editions of

the **Zion's Harp** have been published, both in Europe and the United States.

In the decade of the 1920's, the Zion's Harp was translated from the German to the English language. This was somewhat controversial at that time because a large share of the membership were either from Europe or had close ties to that continent. Nonetheless, the monumental task of translation took place.

Bro. Henry Beer, an Apostolic Christian minister from Milford, Indiana played an instrumental role in this effort. As a young boy in faith in 1921, he thought it would be beneficial to translate these songs into English. After translating a few songs on his own, he sought and received encourage ment from some of the older brethren to continue on. Bro. Ernest Graf, Sr., of Akron, Ohio especially encouraged translation into English according to Bro. Beer.

Among the first hymns that Bro. Beer translated were No. 47, "Strive Aright," No. 164, "The Image of Christ," and No. 89, "The Seven Words of Jesus On The Cross."

On completing the translation of these hymns, Bro. Beer officially sought and received the sanction of the church leadership to translate the remaining hymns into English. Several other brothers were assigned to help with this herculean task. They included Bro. Ernest Graf, Sr., Akron, Ohio; Bro. Edward Grimm, Elgin, Iowa; Bro. Amos Hartzler, Rittman, Ohio; Bro. Noah Hartzler, Rittman, Ohio; Bro. William Stettner, El-

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gin, Illinois; Bro. Jake Stettner, Elgin, Illinois.

This was a large task and took considerable time. Each brother was given approximately 50 songs to work on. The two Stettners worked as a team. The Zion's Harp was thus published in the English language in 1924.

In 1958, the **Zion's Harp** was revised to include music with every text, thus eliminating leafing back and forth between the text and the music.

In order to set in motion a plan to revise the Zion's Harp Hymnal, a somewhat lengthy and deliberative process took place. In the late forties and early fifties there existed feeling among certain brethren that a revision was needed to improve the hymnal, and make it more practical.

By 1954, Bro. Raymond Gerber, a song leader of the Bluffton, Indiana congregation, and others, favored the idea of placing music to each song, thus making it easier for the song leaders to lead the congregation. This idea was representative of many brethren across the churches.

As a first move, Bro. Gerber posed the suggestion to Elder Bro. Sam Aeschliman of Bluffton who immediately concurred. His favorable response gave much courage to those brethren concerned with the need for a revision, and ultimately provided the momentum to initiate the project.

Bro. Gerber then discussed the proposed project with his close associate, Bro. John Baumgartner, also a song leader in the large Bluffton congregation. On the basis of their visits, and their discussions with other brethren, they decided it might be well to call a meeting of song leaders from various congregations for the purpose of discussing the need and plausibility of a revision. Invited along with many song leaders was ministering Bro. Henry Beer of Milford, Indiana. Al though the latter was a minister, it was felt he was well qualified in the field of music. Also, his enthusiasm and poetic credentials would be helpful.

Word was thus sent to many song leaders to attend a conclave in Cissna Park, Illinois on September 10, 1954. They were advised to bring their ministers or any other brethren they wished. Cissna Park was chosen because of its central

location. Approximately 110 brethren attended the meeting.

A presentation was made regarding a proposed hymnal revision. This was followed by a lengthy discussion. About 99% of those in attendance favored a revision. This left only the question as to "how to proceed." Bro. Sam Wieland of Bay City, Michigan made a motion that Bro. John Baumgartner, Elias Souder, Eli Gerber, and Raymond Gerber transmit the concensus of the meeting to the elders. The motion was seconded by Bro. Henry Rapp of Morton, Illinois. The motion carried.

The proposal for a major revision of the Zion's Harp was presented to the Elder Body at the Annual Conference in October, 1954 at Elgin, Illinois. At this meeting, the elders requested that a more indepth proposal be submitted at the following year's conference.

At the 1955 Annual Conference, it was advised that further work and review was needed, and that consideration of proposed changes would be deferred to a future date.

The revision committee met with the Elder Body at the 1956 Annual Conference in Morton, Illinois. Subsequently, the matter of a revision was permitted to be brought before the plenary session of the conference. On hearing the basic concepts of a revision, the general conference favored improvements in the hymnal.

A committee of elders was appointed to oversee the developments of a revision: Elder Bros. Philip Beyer of Croghan, New York, William Stetner of Elgin, Illinois, and Rudolph Graf, Jr. of Akron, Ohio. Elder Bros. Sam Aeschliman of Bluffton and Theo Beer of Milford, Indiana also served in an advisory capacity.

A church-wide referendum was

A church-wide referendum was held and the brotherhood voted in favor of the revision.

Serving on the Song Book Committee (or revision committee) were Bros. Raymond Gerber, Eli Gerber, and John Baumgartner, Bluffton, Fred Gutwein, Francesville, Henry Beer, Milford, Eli Souder, Leo, IN, and Jesse Gerber, Latty, OH. With the exception of Bro. Beer, who was a minister, all were song leaders in their local congre-

The task of supplying melodies for all the hymn texts was long and arduous. These brethren applied themselves with diligence and often

gations.

toiled at night, many times burning the "midnight oil." Prior to publication, the revision committee met with the aforementioned elders regarding the approval or disapproval of each song. In 1958, editions of the revised hymnal were distributed to the churches.

By 1976, several new faces appeared on the Song Book Committee. Bro. Daryl Stoller, Latty, Ohio; Bro. Henry Souder, Leo; and Bro. Jay Kipfer, Bluffton, Indiana replaced Bros. Jesse Gerber, Eli Souder, and John Baumgartner, all of whom had passed on to their reward.

This committee continues to meet several times each year—usually in Ft. Wayne, Indiana—to discuss matters relevant to the Zion's Harp.

The Silver Lining (Volume 9, No. 1) described the 1958 revised hymnal, "The new book will have a melody with every song, and every song will be on a single opening to eliminate leafing over. The first three or four stanzas will be placed in the staff. There will be some 50 new melodies.

"The book will be $5\frac{1}{2}$ by $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches in size with rounded corners, covered with black sturdite, printed on 40 pound paper. The price will be \$1.75 for white edge, and \$2.20 for gold edge."

The printing of the new hymnal was done by the Berne Witness Company of Berne, Indiana. Since 1958, one revision has taken

place.

Their problem stems from a reason far deeper than what shows in the misbehavior. After we finished talking about her problem, the girl said, "I feel a good tingling inside me. I know we're not alone in this room. It feels like someone is

covering me." Our Father and Jesus are wonderful and caring persons!

Our oldest girl is doing very well in school. She is president of her junior achievement group, is involved in the school yearbook, and is doing very well emotionally and scholastically. She has expressed a desire to go to college.

The most prevalent reason for the misbehavior of today's child-ren is the lack of discipline and security from their parents. One of our children related that her friend in school has everything he wants from his parents, but is still not happy. When people talk about his parents, this friend just pretends not to hear, because he doesn't have anything to say about them. They are never around to give him the security of their care. Children want the security of knowing that they will be disciplined for wrong and also the security of knowing that they will always be loved. When we fail to give them this discipline and security, we foster, in them, a terrible fear and anxiety. One of the children told me she appreciated being disciplined because it shows that we care. She also said she needs our love. Our little Rachael also said, "Mommy, please don't leave me."

Our dear God shows the true Fatherly example to His children. He gives us the promise that He will never leave us, but that we must walk in His ways and believe in Him for our strength and salvation. He lets us know that it's His good pleasure to give us the kingdom, and that He will do everything to get us there, if we let Him. He is always present in time of need. At the same time, he chastises and disciplines when we sin and err. but he does it to help us and says He will forgive if we humble ourselves and admit our wrong and turn from it.

We thank everyone who has let the Lord work in their lives and pray for and support us. We thank all visitors for coming to see us. We are still in need of an administrator and feel that the Lord will provide. Please pray for us . . . and all mankind.

Have you ever wondered why the Jews have such a hatred for Christ, when in the beginning they were allowed to actually behold Him here on earth? It has been a mystery to me that the Jews find it so difficult to believe that Christ is the promised Messiah. Just recently I read a book with the answer to why the Jews have been deceived in this matter. I would like to share what I read.

Judith came from a devout Jewish family. Her grandfather was one of the Jewish Rabbis. The Rabbis are "Watchmen" to the Jews, as we think of our elders as being "Watchmen" to us as Christians. The Rabbis counsel together and search the Old Testament diligently to help the Jews live a life more

pleasing to God. One day Judith asked her grandfather, "Who is Jesus? What kind of a man was he? Where and what has happened to him?" The misled ("wise"?) Rabbi's answer was this: "The glorious hope of all the true sons of Israel has lived and still lives in our hearts that, someday, Jehovah God will send His annointed one, the true Messiah, to free us from all our oppressors and will reign together with His people over the whole earth. At one time, a Jew, the son of a poor carpenter of Nazareth, came and claimed to be the Messiah whom God sent. His name was Jesus. (At this point, most of the Jews make the mistake of rejecting Christ as the true Messian.) Some of the Jews were deceived and honored him as the Son of God. His followers waited day after day for him to proclaim Himself as King over all Israel. But our 'wise' men of our time, back then, saw through His teachings and His influence over the people. ((Christ, in our Holy Bible refers to these "wise" men in this manner in Matt. 23:27: "Woe unto you, scribes and pharisees, hypocrites! for ye make clean the outside of the cup and of the platter, but within they are full of extortion and excess.") They counseled together and decided to put an end to Him before He was allowed to gather large numbers and destroy our gorgeous temple and the city of Jerusalem. Fearing that the 'impostor's' masses of people might rise against them, the Council sought to arrest this Jesus at night. Jesus did not seem to be afraid, though; he counted, evidently ,on the support and protection of his followers. (Remember how He told his disciples that they would desert Him?) One of his disciples who was discontented with his leader betrayed him and led the officers to Jesus' secret place in the Garden of Gethsemane. His followers fled and hid themselves. A fatal mistake was made after His death on the cross. The Council allowed his disciples to take his body from the cross and bury it in a tomb in his garden. One night the disciples succeeded in frightening our guards so badly that they were paralyzed with fear. (How devil-inspired can humans get?) When they came to, they found the corpse gone. Nobody knows to this day what hap-

pened to it. (I do-do you?) His followers spread the news that He had risen from the dead and that they had even seen Him ascending into heaven as the Son of God. Of course, this is just clever deceit, and no one of the wise and circumspect today have believed it. (This is blaspheme unto death.) There is a book today that His followers claim contains His teachings. Those who read it call themselves Christians, but how can they be followers of a true Messiah when they fight and hate so-especially those of the European countries? (How cleverly this deceit traps many. Were Hitler and Stalin Christians just because they weren't Jews?) There have been times when they have killed Jews by the thousands in Russia. All this was done by followers of this Jesus, the Christians, the Gentiles." (Prov. 6:16-19 tells us that there are seven things that the Lord hates and are an abomination to Him. Two of these are a lying tongue and a false witness that speaketh lies. Could a lie be greater than this?)

The Holy Spirit clearly shows us how sincerely wrong the Jews are in their perverted reasoning, but all of this helps me to understand why it is so difficult for the Jews to develop repentent hearts and believe that they destroyed the Son of God, the True Promised Messiah who had already been sent to Israel. The Sermon... (Cont. from pg. 28) if you love Me, you will love them and treasure them; you will keep them in your heart, and not forget them when you go to your work, or in whatever you do."

You're interested in your work, naturally; but whenever there is a question of morals, go back to the Bible, and live by that Word. Don't deviate from it to try to justify the flesh or to make more progress with your material things, but keep the commandments of the Lord first and foremost in your life. Jesus said that whoever does that really loves Him.

Dear brothers, sisters, and friends, you have the commandments of the Lord in this Book. John wrote: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." Jn. 1:1

Probably each one of you has the

Word of God in your bedroom. Here Philip says, "Show us the Father." We read in the Scriptures that this is the Father. This Word is God, right here before us. Have you friends ever thought of that? You don't have to wonder where God is. He is right here and in your homes, because this is the mind of God. This Bible is God's thought. It is His convictions.

The church is not a democracy; guided by the Word, it is a theocracy. The Bible is God's theory. It is God's will. It doesn't change and we can't change it, even if we wanted to which God forbid that any of us would desire.

There is no other way to live in harmony with our fellow men and with our souls than to be in compliance with the Word.

What a miserable thing it is to try to live for ourselves. No man, as was mentioned last night, really walks alone. Let's face it. Let's be really honest. Nobody really walks alone. If anyone did, there would be such misery in his life that we can hadly comprehend it. As God's children, we live for one another and for the Lord. We live with concern for one another. If we don't have that concern, we do not love God.

Jesus commanded that we love one another; that is how we prove that we love God. If we say that we love God and can't get along with our brother or our neighbor down the street, we are only kidding ourselves, Jesus said.

We are not really loving God when we can't get along with our fellow men. This does not mean that we don't have our little different thinking. But when we do not see eye to eye and differ to the point that we feel animosity and hatred, have varience in our lives, and are not at peace with each other, we are only kidding ourselves if we say, "I'm a child of God." Because, we are not.

Jesus said, "He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me." Jn. 14:21.

What is the result of that, brethren? Here again, I am referring to this one verse and I'll probably just stay with it: "... he it is that loveth me: and he that loveth me shall be loved of my Father ..." Jn. 14:21. There is the reaction of God: "He that loveth me shall be loved of my Father." Tremendous!

What more do we want? We might speak of many desires in this life, but we really and truly, want to have the Father's guidance and have His watchful eye over us. We want to believe that God is observing us and is satisfied with us. We really want to.

Finally, if we want to "go a little way down the road," we want to believe that we will be accepted of the Father. Well, we won't be accepted unless God loves us. It isn't that God doesn't love us in our unconverted state, but we want Him to love us as his children and as heirs to His Kingdom!

We want to have the relationship and the feeling that when we die and are gone from this earth, He will take us to be with Him. The Scripture is full of that promise to the believer when he dies. That is a wonderful thing. Still, let's not kid ourselves, because, if God isn't satisfied with us, He won't have His arms wrapped around us when we die. Maybe that sounds hard, but that's the way it is. We can't expect to be embraced by the Father when this life is over, unless we embrace Him-unless we are one of His and we are in close relationship with Him.

If we love Him, if we keep His commandments and keep them close to our hearts, we will be loving the Father. And he who loves the Father, will be loved by the Father.

We look at our lives and we say, "Lord, how could we ever . . . how could we ever be appreciated by the heart of God?" Because we see our lives, each one of us would have to say, "How could God ever really care for me, for my life, my life style, the things that I do? How could He ever really love me?"

Well, we are not going to earn our way to heaven's door. None of us is going to have anything that he can say merits his entrance into heaven. No one can say, "I've earned my way there." We can go to heaven because of the infinite love of God!

Now, we're coming back to it. We will be loved of the Father, if we love Him. (Keep the commandments.) "And I will love Him..."

Jn. 14:21. Jesus, the Son of God who came as a babe in Bethlehem's manger, said, "And I will love him." One song writer wrote:

When Jesus, the Saviour, was here upon earth,

He walked 'mongst the children of men.

When He took the little children,
As lambs to His fold,

Oh! I'd like to have been with Him then!

In our minds we would like to see Jesus. Jesus said, "... I will love him, and will manifest myself to him." Jn. 14:21. This same Jesus will embrace us.

Now we're through with that verse, but isn't that all encompassing, brethren? It's tremendous; the magnitude of it goes beyond us! I close with that thought.

God help us, brethren, not to sit complacently year by year, month by month, week by week, day by day, hour by hour, moment by moment and just take this whole thing for granted, wasting our time. We quoted the Psalmist in our prayer, II I'm not mistaken, and I appreciate it so much because I need it. I guess it's seit-discipline every time we read.

"So teach us (Lord) to number our days . . ." Psa. 90:12. Make a mark by them or, as we mentioned in our prayer, drive a stake each day; not a physical stake as a surveyor uses, tar from that, but a spiritual stake. "This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it." Psa. 118:24

Taking every day, making the most of it, sounds easy. I sound as though I have learned how to do this. Brethren, I haven't learned any more than you have. And, dear friend, I haven't learned any more than you have. But we're talking to ourselves this morning.

God help us to discipline our lives so that we will use them to the honor and the glory of God because that is what we want to see. Some day we want to see the honor and glory of God; but that blessing will only be given to those who love His Name and who serve Him, to those who tremble at His Word. It will be given to those who take it so seriously that when they open the Bible and it says to do this and that, they say, "That will I do, because God said to do it." When the Bible says to not do something, they will say, "I will not do it, because the Bible says not to do it."

It takes discipline. God will help

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. ALFRED BAHLER OF WOLCOTT, IN

Text: Psalm 103 and John 14:6-21 There is a lot to think about in these words. We cannot comprehend the depth of the last verse: "He that hath my commandments . . . " Jn. 14:21. Who among us here today doesn't have the commandments of the Lord?

Ask yourself that question. Because, finally, it becomes a person-

al thing with each of us.

We love the church; it's a united body. We come from different home backgrounds and have different family heritages and lineages, but we come together and we are bound together in the Spirit of the Lord.

Brethren, who among us can say that he doesn't have the commandments of the Lord? I want you to be honest. Jesus said, "I am . . . the truth." Jn. 14:6. Jesus wants us to think truthfully and honestly .He is the three: the Way, the Truth and the Life. That is a very, very commonly quoted phrase: "I am the way, the truth, and the life."

Jesus wants us to be truthful. But Jesus said, "He that hath my commandments . . ." Jn. 14:21. We all have them. We all should know what God wants of us. I find, in visiting with people, that we don't understand. It amazes me a little bit, but I guess we forget. We forget and also we don't always see everything clearly.

We can learn a lot from each other. As we talk with some of our dear friends, we sometimes find that they do not know what to do or how to begin to serve the Lord-how to start the

walk of faith.

Basically, beloved, we know that God wants us to be obedient to Him and He wants us to walk in conformity with His Word, which, I guess, is one and the same. But as we sit here this morning, we have to say to ourselves, honestly. "I know the commandments of the Lord. I know what God wants me to do."

The verse goes a step further and says, "... and keepeth them." Jn. 14:21. It refers to those who hold them dear to their hearts, who treasure them. I thought or this, beloved brethren, as we read: "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." Jn. 14:6. He then began to clarify His relationship with the Father. He said, "If ye had known me, ye should have known my Father also; and from henceforth ye know him, and have seen him." Jn. 14:7.

But Philip, in his lack of faith and his lack of being able to grasp it all, said, "Lord, shew us the Father." Jn. 14:8. (Each one of us is a Philip in this respect.) Jesus had been with Philip a long time and He had told him of His relationship with His Father in heav-

Think how Jesus must have felt. It is a little as though one of us had told his child over and over. "Look; you're my son and I love you. I really want to do everything for you." Then the child would walk up and say, "Dad, prove to me that you care for me." After we had talked to him for fifteen or twenty years, he would come and say, "Dad, prove to me that you really love me."

After we had bent over backward and tried to do a lot for our children, tried to make them feel at home and let them know that there is nothing that we wouldn't do for them, how would we feel if our children would say, "Dad, prove it"? We might turn to our wives (husbands and wives, you know what I mean) and say, "We have failed somewhere. Somehow. they haven't gotten the message."

That's how Jesus must have felt when Philip asked Him to show them the Father so that they might believe, understand completely, and have no doubt in

their minds anymore.

Jesus said something like this: "Philip, have I been with you this long, all this period of time, and yet thou believest not and hast to ask me, 'Show me the Father?' Philip, is that really how you feel? Do you have such a lack of understanding that you have to ask

me that? Do you have to ask and to demand that you see the Father? Philip, something is the matter." In essence, this is what he is saying. I am adding a little bit to

nelp us understand it.

Brethren, that's almost how I feel our friends must be. Again, I don't want you to go away from the morning's services (hope you stay with us all day) feeling that "He really put me down," because I don't mean to do that. I am trying to jar your thoughts; trying to get you to stop and think.

What's the matter? Do we have to demand some miracle? The coming of Jesus, which we talk about especially at this time of the year, is miracle enough, the miracle of the birth of Jesus and the coming of the promised Messiah. That is enough to dispel any doubts from

our minds.

But it is not that way. Maybe I don't look at it right, but when the Sunday school children present their program to you, the church, probably one of them will open to St. Luke's gospel and read the second chapter which tells of the birth of Jesus. We'll be sitting here and might think, "So many, many times I've heard of Jesus' birth," and kind of say to our-selves, "Well, I just hope they don't read the whole chapter.' That's a little bit the way we are. We don't appreciate fully the miracle of all this.

Is it just me or are we talking on the same wave length? I think we are. This is just the way we are. I've gotten away from the Scripture here, but, brethren, I'm trying to get us to stop and think; and I'm talking to myself. We sit and it gets monotonous to us and we just take it in stride. But we dare not do this.

When Jesus was here upon earth, He said, "He that hath my commandments, and keepeth them. he it is that loveth me." Jn. 14:21. That's the way to prove that you love Him. Jesus said, though not exactly in these words, "When you have access to My commandments.

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
