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A DREAM

I had a dream in which everyone was called upon to believe in the world. The three cardinal facets of this faith were worldly possessions, carnal enterainment, and self. Since faith without works is dead (that is, if your faith is genuine it will be evident by the way you live) everyone was supposed to go "all out" to emphasize the three cardinal facets.

It really doesn't take much effort to emphasize worldly possessions. Basic drives cause you to seek food and water when your stomach is empty and your throat is dry. When such basic needs are met through hard work, it's only a short step to laying up extra for security in order not to be dependent upon others in your old age. How much you need for your old age, or how old

is old, has never been decided, so you can go on indefinitely seeking more and more. These are the kinds of works needed to show real faith in the world. A heart set on worldly possessions, or an above average standard of living, is one of the three facets needed to back up this faith.

Carnal entertainment is the second facet of this faith. There are so many entertaining things to do these days. To try all these is part of the works needed to show faith in the world. To deny ourselves such things might even give the impression of faith in Jesus Christ which is untenable from the standpoint of faith in the world.

Self is the third facet of faith in the world. The person is always to put himself first, to seek what is to his own advantage at the expense of others. To critize and despise others, insinuating that you yourself are far superior to them, is the mark of someone who has true faith in the world. It would be impermissible to be compassionate and self-sacrificing, out of love for others. Such conduct is incompatible with faith in the world.

There is, of course, another faith, faith in the risen Son of the living God, the Lord Jesus Christ. I pray that I will never be quilty of saying I believe on Christ while living as though I believe in this world. "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Matthew 6:21. "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him." I John 2:4.

FAMILY WORSHIP TIME

In this age of rapid change and increasing exposure to the subtle but persistent influences of society, we must try to identify threatened features of our Christ-centered lives which may be lost unless a concerted effort is made to preserve them. One of these underpinnings which merits serious consideration is the maintenance of family worship time in our homes.

In Bible times and for many centuries thereafter, the growing and preparation of food required much of the time and energy of the entire family. Eating together was an inevitable culmination of this effort. How greatly this has changed for most of the people in our society today. For many, there are few incentives to eat together as a family and many factors which discourage it.

Let us reflect upon the spiritual

benefits of preserving in our Godly homes the sharing of at least the major meal of the day together as a family. In most cases, it is the evening meal that best lends itself to this. The call goes out that the meal is ready, and each family member leaves his work or play and assembles around the table to give thanks to God for all good gifts. Following is a time when children should be seen and heard. Each must be given opportunity to pour out the varied experiences of the day to that little group of people who should be his most understanding and supportive fellow human beings. This should be a relaxed, unhurried hour spent together around the table. Before adjourning to the various individual pursuits, the family is once again bound together in a few precious moments of worship and prayer.

If we do not make the positive effort of setting aside such times in our fleeting lives with consistent determination, how often will such family communion occur on a spontaneous basis?

There will always be justifiable exceptions which deter us temporarily from our family worship time. Unfortunately, if we are not on guard, exceptions become the rule. Innumerable after-school activities. the lure of television and other entertainments, multiple jobs, fast food outlets, and a host of other factors have made a quiet evening meal at home with the entire family virtually unknown to many households in America. This is but one small example of the success which the unrelenting enemy of our souls has had in seeking to destroy the Christian home. Like termites chewing away unnoticed, he

may have already gained some

ground in our own homes.

Although few of us as children could appreciate the significance at the time, it seems that with the rare exception, no matter how far one strays, the memory of Father praying aloud at the table remains as a spiritually tender spot in the hardest of hearts. Our prayer for all is that the tender spot may be touched someday by God's finger of love as He gently calls to sinsick souls. During that same hour of supping together as a family, we heard Dad read from the Holy Scriptures and sometimes from a Bible Story book. The specific words have long since faded from the memory, but the picture is as vivid as today.

Are we doing our best to preserve these sacred experiences for our childrn? Are we relenting to the peer pressure of neighboring children who grab a bite individually and in ten minutes are back at the door to play again? Or have we established a consistent pattern which is planned around ourselves and others about us because it is understood that this is an hour which we esteem as essential to the

God-fearing family? Joshua said, "Choose you this day whom ye will serve. . . but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

(Josh. 24:15) One of the fruits of the Holy Spirit is temperance which is defined as habitual self-control or self-discipline. We can pray spontaneously at any time without depending upon a structured schedule. However, if we acknowledge our human fraility, we will agree that much grace is needed to help us lead balanced or temperate lives which include adequate time for worship on a regular basis. The Psalmist wrote, "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto thy name, O most High: To show forth thy loving kindness in the morning, and thy faithfulness every night." (Ps. 92:1.2) Numerous Scriptual teachings refer to daily communication with God and regular meditation upon His Word. Parents are instucted to teach their children the ways of the Lord, continuously. Abraham was commended by God, Gen. 18:19, "For I know him that he will command his children and his

keep the ways of the Lord."

Family worship should include, in addition to faithful attendance at the assembly, sharing of that special meal-time together, review of the subjects of the Sunday School lessons and sermons heard on the Lord's Day, memorization of Scripture verses, and reading of the Word and prayer—all on a regular basis.

How can we find the time? More significantly, how can we dare to do otherwise? We need to put forth the time, energy, dedication, selfdenial, and whatever is needed to meet our family responsiblities. By faithful obedience to the prompting of the Holy Spirit, there will be generated in our own minds deep personal convictions based upon the Word of God regarding these responsibilities as Christian parents. As this occurs, the reallocation of our time becomes of itself a simple act. The resultant blessings will rest with our children and our children's children-should the Lord tarry.

SPEAKING WITH TONGUES

In Ephesus, the Disciples of John the Baptist believed the further revelation of God in Christ. as explained by Paul. After they were baptized in water and had hands layed on them, they received the Holy Spirit and spoke in tongues. These accounts serve to introduce the Holy Spirit to different classes of people. The first introduction was to the Jews at Jerusalem and was evidence that the Holy Spirit had indeed come in fulfillment of Christ's promise and was truly a sign unto them. The second introduction was a sign to the Jewish Christians that Gentiles could be saved and that they were equal to the Jew before God. The third account involved the Disciples of John the Baptist who can be regarded as Old Testament Saints and who received the gift as evidence that Paul's message was truly from God. These accounts were unique and separate in themselves. They were never intended to become a permanent pattern for an (Charismatic Movement)

experience to be sought by Christians.

The Apostle Paul learned there were many things that worked to hinder the power and the progress of the Gospel in Corinth. He came to Corinth from Athens and remained there 18 months. He began his labors by preaching in the synagogue but was driven out of it, and was compelled to give instructions in the home of Justus. During this stay, he founded the Church at Corinth. It was later while he was in Ephesus that he received news of a distressing nature to the state of things in this church. It was divided by the party spirit, one faction adhering to Paul, another to Apollos, another to Cephas, and another party that gave itself the name of Christ. Immoralities of various kinds prevailed in the church. There were those who would partake of the Lord's Supper and then eat meat offered to idols. There were irregularities in public worship and mistaken views of the

resurrection. These were some of the things this Epistle to the Corinthians were designed to correct. In Chapter 12 of I Corinthians, Paul dealt with the general nature of spiritual gifts. Although spiritual gifts are discussed elsewhere, I Corinthians is the only Epistle that mentions the gift of tongues by name. These gifts are enumerated in I Corinthians 12:8 through 10, and 28 through 30. In both of these lists, tongues and the interpretation of tongues are designated last. This may reveal the fact that they were regarded by Paul as the least of the gifts, but nevertheless they were still gifts and a function of the believers of that day. These gifts that are mentioned in I Corinthians are gifts that are imparted by God, for we can read where it says, "For to one is given by the Spirit the word of wisdom, to an-other the word of knowledge by the same Spirit, to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit." These gifts cannot be gained through human initiative, and they are not dependent upon human prayer or faithfulness. They are given as God wills to give, not as man wills to receive. In regard to the phenomenon of speaking in tongues, to say that God must do today what He did yesterday, or in the apostolic era, is to put a limitation upon God. This is contrary to the character of God and the events of the Bible. Although God does not change in His person or nature, His dealings with men do change. His witness to the world changed from being centered in Israel to that in the church. He will deal with sin in the future as He never has done in the past. God is immutable, but He is not immobile. It is not the question as to whether God can give the gift of tongues today; He still has that power. The question is whether it is God's purpose to continue the same phenomena that the Apostolic Church experienced. The claim that God must do today what He did then is actually putting oneself into the position of telling God what He ought to do. After enumerating the spiritual gifts in Chapter 12, the Apostle Paul states, "And yet show I unto you a more excellent way." He follows this with Chapter 13, or the Chapter of Love. In this chapter, he specifically states that whether there be prophesies, they shall fail, whether ther be tongues, they shall cease, whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away. It seems rather strange that today so much emphasis is placed upon the speaking with tongues by some and so little importance upon the gift of prophecy. Insomuch as no mention is made of the gift of tongues after the I Corinthians, it seems rather apparent that these gifts ceased at that time. It is very possible that the gift of tongues was necessary to the infancy of the church. Paul saw little value in the gift of tongues if there was no interpretation. In fact, if there was no interpreter present, then the person who had the gift of tongues was to remain silent.

I think it can be concluded that throughout the history of the church, no spiritual gift has occasioned so much continual controversy as the gift of tongues. It is a known fact that the speaking in tongues to a large degree is today accomplished in unknown sounds. It seems as though there is conclusive evidence in the Bible that

speaking in unknown sounds is actually unscriptual, and, accordingly, the present day movement of speaking in tongues has not recovered the Biblical phenomenon of the early church. I don't believe these occurances were ever intended to become a pattern for the reception of the Spirit into the lives of believers in our church today. It is clearly stated that the gift of tongues would cease, and church history has revealed that this has actually happened in the first century.

There are some who testify that they believe this is truly the work of the Spirit. In every believer's life, there should always be two witnesses—the Holy Spirit and the Word. This is why it is important that we search the Word to discern the Spirit. In the Bible, speaking with tongues was always for a reason. In addition, it was for a specific time and was always spoken so that others could understand. It was never a demonstration to test the Spirit. Inasmuch as the New Testament was written in the Greek language, translating from the original Greek, the word signifies a foreign language, not an unknown language that cannot be understood. God is not the author of confusion which this doctrine of speaking with tongues has caused in many churches. Our lives as Christians should be a life of faith. The Holy Spirit is received by faith and not by an outward manifestation. If we receive the Spirit in Faith, we walk by faith. If we need an outward manifestation, we walk by sight.

Our aim in researching this doctrine of speaking with tongues is not to discredit the doctrine, but rather to prove it according to God's Word. Further, it is not our desire to suppress anything that is good, but rather to avoid confusion, and to seek for the unity and harmony that should exist in God's Church and among His people.

The Apostle Paul made specific mention of this in his first epistle to Timothy 4:1, "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils."

Peter also in 2 Peter, Chapter 2 stated: "But there were false prophets also among the people, even as there shall be false teachers among you, who privily shall bring in damnable heresies, even deny-

ing the Lord that brought them, and bring upon themselves swift destruction. And many shall follow their pernicious ways; by reason of whom the way of truth shall be evil spoken of:"

It is particularly disturbing to realize that none of us are immune to the tactics of the evil one, for Paul further exhorted in 2 Corinthians 11:2, "For I am jealous over you with Godly jealousy; for I have espoused you to one husband, that I may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ. But I fear, thus by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtility, so your mind should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ. For if he that cometh preacheth another Jesus, whom we have not preached. or if ye receive another spirit, which you have not received, or another gospel, which ye have not accepted, ye might well bear with And in verse 13:"For such him.' are false apostles, deceitful workers, transforming themselves into the apostles of Christ. And no marvel; for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light. Therefore, it is no great thing if his ministers also be transformed as the ministers of righteousness; whose end shall be according to their works:"

There are those who are troubled and confused in heart, feeling that to attain spiritual maturity or as some teach, the second manifestation of grace, it is essential to speak with tongues, failing to recognize a number of very serious factors.

The gift of speaking in tongues and the gift of healing were given directly to the apostles and disci-

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ples in the time of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, as a sign to reveal the power of God. It is concluded in Mark 16:20, "And they went forth, and preached every where, the Lord working with them, confirming the word with signs · following:"

It is clearly evident in Acts 2, "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come. . . and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance,' this was not to cause confusion, but rather to fulfill the prophecy of Joel 2:28-29 and the directive of

Christ in Acts 1:8.

The Galileans that were assembled at Jereusalem along with the Cretes and Arabians were from at least seventeen different nations, and as we definitely read in Acts 2:6, "...they were confounded, because that every man heard them speak in his own language. And they were all amazed and marvelled, saying one to another,. . and how hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born?" Further, verse 11, ". . . we do hear them speak in our tongues the wonderful works of God." The purpose being that each clearly understood what was said and taught.

This parallels Paul's writing in I Corinthians 14:33: "For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all the churches of the saints." Chapter 14 in I Corinthians should not be studied without reading the preceding chapters 12 and 13. The Apostle definitely mentions in 13:8, "Charity never faileth; but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; . . ." Obviously, he concludes that there would be a time when this scripture was fulfilled, that tongues would cease.

Does he not further exhort in Chapter 12:31, "But covet earnestly the best gifts; and yet I shew unto you a more excellent way." The Lord Jesus said the greatest gift of all was the gift of love. The Apostle Paul verifies this: "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity."

We have no commandments of the Lord Jesus that one should speak with tongues; and we have no indication in His ministry that the Lord ever resorted to sr in an unknown language.

Let us closely examine I Corin-

thians 14 for some definite guidelines. Apparently some do not fully understand that the apostle is not commending speaking in tongues, but rather quite clearly stating that next to love, the gift of prophecy was to be stressed and states: "for greater is he that prophesieth than he that speaketh with tongues, except he interpret, that the church may receive edifying."

We are directed also (verse 9), "So likewise ye, except ye utter by the tongue words easy to be understood, how shall it be known what is spoken? for ye shall speak into

the air."

Nowhere does he encourage them to speak in tongues. Further, he distinguishes between speaking to brethren and speaking to the heathen. Ephesians 3, "For this cause, I Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ for you Gentiles, ... which in other ages was not known unto the sons of men as it is now revealed unto his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit; that the Gentiles should be fellow-heirs, and of the same body, and partakers of his promise in Christ by the gospel; whereof I was made a minister, according to the gift of the grace of God given unto me by the effectual working of his power. . .that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ:"

One could conclude, by studying the apostle's life, that by birth and education, he could speak Hebrew. Perhaps because of the Roman influence that prevailed in Jerusalem at the time of the apostle's earthly pilgrimage, he could have spoken Italian or Latin. Did he not clearly state, "I thank my God I speak with tongues more than ye all"? Emphasizing again, "Yet in the church I had rather speak five words with my understanding, that by my voice I might teach others also, than ten thousand words in

an unknown tongue."

Scripture definitely informs us (Romans 10:18) that the word of God was preached throughout the entire world. "But I say, have they not heard? yes verily, their sound went into all the earth, and their words unto the ends of the world." Colossians 1:5-6, "For the hope which is laid up for you in heaven, whereof ye heard before in the word of the truth of the gospel; which is come unto you, as it is in all the world; and bringeth forth fruit, as it doth also in you, since the day ye heard of it, and knew

of it, and knew the grace of God in truth." In verse 23, "If ye continue in the faith grounded and settled, and not moved away from the hope of the gospel, which ye have heard, and which was preached to every creature which is under heaven; whereof I Paul am made a minister;"

In Galatians 1, the apostle mentions how this was fulfilled. Verse 11: "But I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of me is not after men. For I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ." Further, verse 16, "To reveal his Sen in me, that I might preach him among the heathen; immediately I conferred not with flesh and blood; neither went I up to Jereusalem to them which were apostles before me; but I went

into Arabia and returned again unto Damascus."

In 2 Corinthians 12, it reminds us, "truly the signs of an apostle were wrought among you in all patience, in signs, and wonders, and mighty deeds." In verse 2, "I knew a man in Christ about fourteen years ago, (whether in the body, I cannot tell; or whether out of the body, I cannot tell: God knoweth;) such an one caught up to the third heaven: ... how that he was caught up into paradise, and heard unspeakable words, which it is not unlawful for a man to utter."

However, to keep him humble and to reveal the limits of the power of man, in spite of his deliverance and his ministry to the heathen, we find in verse 7, "And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure. For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me." The answer was: "My grace is sufficient of thee; for my strength is made perfect in weakness." "Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.'

It is evident the speaking with tongues is a sign for the unbeliever. So when it is exercised among socalled brethren, they are going contrary to the explicit instructions of St. Paul. He portrays a beautiful parallel (I Corintians 14:7): "And even things without life giving sound, whether pipe or harp, except they give a distinction in the sounds, how shall it be known what is piped or harped? . . . So likewise ye, except ye utter by the tongue words easy to be understood, how shall it be known what is spoken? for ye shall speak into the air." He concludes, "Therefore if I know not the meaning of the voice, I shall be unto him that speaketh a barbarian, and he that speaketh shall be a barbarian unto me."

They were never to speak in an unknown tongue unless there was an interpreter. This makes a great deal of sense for how else can there be understanding and how can we say "amen" unless we understand what is said?

We are cautioned not to be children in understanding, and he shamed them that, apparently in their confusion there were even those who were unlearnd and believed they were mad. "But if all prophesy, and there come in one that believeth not, or one unlearned, he is convinced of all, he is judged of all: And thus are the secrets of his heart made manifest; and so falling down on his face he will worship God, and report that God is in you of a truth... Let all things be done unto edifying."

If there is no interpreter, they are to keep silent. We still follow the order of, "Let the prophets speak two or three, and let the other judge," or discern.

Perhaps the greatest folly or error of those who get carried away with the doctrine of speaking with tongues is the fact that they have never been known to speak in a language that is understood, even in a known language of any nation. Actually, it is "gibberish" that Webster defines as: "rampant or untelligible talk or gabble." This had its beginning in witchcraft which the Prophet Isaiah (8:19) cautioned long before Christ. "And when they shall say unto you, Seek unto them that have familiar spirits, and unto wizards that peep, and that mutter: should not a people seek unto their God? for the living to the dead? To the law and to the testimony: if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them."

The so-called movement of speaking with tongues seems to find special favor among the women—which is again contrary to the Word, where the apostle had admonished the women to be silent in the church for it is not permitted

to them to speak—and also among the highly emotional. Even today, it can be associated with voodooism in many parts of the uncivilized world. These people are highly superstitious and easily overtaken in somewhat of an emotional stupor.

Those who get carried away with this gibberish fall into a type of hypnotic trance. It is an exotic form of ecsasy and conforms somewhat to the intoxication brought about by drugs or alcohol. Even people who have not been fully converted, according to the Word of God, seem to be able to speak in this gibberish. It would seem apparent this spirit would not be of God, but would have another source.

There is no question one can become so involved and emotional, that a form of hypnosis comes over them; and certainly the spirit of peace, contentment, sobriety, gentleness and meekness, which are the fruits of the spirit, would de-

part.

An obvious question could be raised: If speaking with tongues were necessary and essential to salvation, and also obtainable, why have not those souls who brought forth the fruits of repentence; unburdened their hearts of their sinful lives; confessed their peace with their God, Saviour, fellowman and selves; erected a covenent with their Lord in the waters of baptism and received the sealing of the Holy Spirit, (to my knowledge and our precious faith) ever once experienced so-called speaking with tongues? It comforts us to know we have made personal experience, in observing many of our forefathers fighting a good fight of faith and going to meet their Creator, and are confident that thru the tender mercies of God they had fought a good fight of faith.

The Pentecostal movement is relatively new, dating back approximately 100 years. When our forefathers were enlightened, they rejoiced in being reconciled to their Lord thru the simple faith that we now believe and teach. Many are the exhortations that parallel the Apostle Paul's: "If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed."

Titus 3 cautions us, "But avoid foolish questions, and genealogies, and contentions, and strivings about the law; for they are unprofitable and vain." And concludes that: "A man that is an heretic after the first and second admonition reject; knowing that he is such is subverted, and sinneth, being condemned of himself." Webster defines the heretic as one who holds beliefs or opinions contrary to the established doctrines of his religion. Spiritual adultery or fornication is a very serious offense. We see the conclusion of such in the life of King Saul of old, who, although he repented, perished by his own hand.

Let us all labor together in the blessed heritage that God has so graciously bestowed upon us. As the apostle spoke to his beloved son in the faith (I Timothy 4:16), "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself and them that hear thee." "But godliness with contentments is great gain."

Let us endeavor to "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. . . Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the fulness of Christ: That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; but speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ:" (Ephesians 4:3, 13-15) (This is the conclusion of "A Timely Warning.")

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

James Cowan, who once penned these words, must have had the wisdom to realize that work, motivated by empathy with another's need and by love for our Saviour, becomes not only a joy but a product of gratitude for our blessings.

don't realize it so fully. For in the vitality of youth, we do not think so often of our dying day and of the day of the Lord, the day of judgement. But, as the time comes when we see ourselves "going down hill" with our bodies becoming more frail, we note that those whom we had regarded as pillars in the church are no more with us; they have gone to their rest.

We see changes all around us; the inevitable evolution of things is taking place right before our eyes. Then a still small voice tells us that some day it will come to us, and we begin to think seriously about how much depends upon our living and how we have served our God. Have we been faithful in our calling? While we are absent from our Lord, may we also look forward to being present some day with Him.

In the eleventh verse Paul mentions "the terror of the Lord." Let no one misunderstand God is love and His Son was sent as the perfect example of God's love for man. He was the offering brought, but God is not to be mocked. "For we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." II Cor. 5:10.

This terror of the Lord only reminds us that He stands firmly according to His Word. Today He is merciful; today He offers salvation to every one who will come to Him. But, He has said that when we have finished our lives, there will be no more opportunity to find salvation. God made a plan and offers it to man, but on judgement day, the Lord will be a terror in the hearts of those who do not believe.

The love of Jesus Christ constrains us who are ministers of the Gospel to speak the truth concerning the Word. The Apostle Paul said, "For the love of Christ constraineth us; because we thus judge that if one died for all, then were all dead: And that He died for all that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto Him which died for them, and rose again." II Cor. 5:14,15.

We must preach that today. There was One who loved man; there was One who loved such unworthy ones as I so much that He gave His own life for our salvation. The price was His own precious blood. Now we need not be lost eternally. He died for our sins, and today that is still the only hope of repentant souls. It is not possible that I may repent for my son or my daughter. It was not possible that my parents could repent for me. Each one must come to the Saviour individually. Each one must make that experience with Him. It cost so much to save our souls that we must come humbly, kneeling at His feet and bringing Him our hearts. He will accept and receive us.

We have read together here, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature." II Cor. 5:17. We cannot be the same anymore. If we poor sinners kneel and pray at Jesus feet, beg Him for mercy, and then receive His gifts, we should no longer live for ourselves. We have now pledged ourselvs to our Lord and Saviour. It is wonderful that God is willing to help poor sinners, to lift them up and make them children of His (saints).

Dear ones, it is a blessed condition to be "new." The old has passed away, as we have read, and all things have become new. We would not want to live that old life again. After knowing the Lord, loving and serving Him, who wants to go back again to sin? No one who stands in the light of His Word! We remember our calling, remember what it cost the Lord. SERMON BY BRO. RUDOLPH GRAF OF AKRON, OH

Text: II Corintians, Chapter 5

Dear ones, the hearts and souls of men seek comfort and solace in the word of God. After we have matured, we should have learned that true comfort and values for the souls of men are only to be found in God.

While we are children, we are innocent; but as we mature, our conscience, our inner man, our soul speaks to us. God breathed into the nostrils of the first man, making mankind different from the dumb animals which He created. He made them living, breathing souls. All those born to the human family since that time have had that spirit of God. He has set us over His creation, to His name's honor, praise, and glory.

Man, with the gift especially given from God to be able to weigh and consider things, finds that within us is the inclination to sin and to transgress. The Apostle Paul said that there was no transgression without the law. Also, when it was said to him, "thou shalt" or "thou shalt not," there was then

temptation to transgress.

Sometimes we don't fully perceive this, but upon reflection and with understanding from the Lord, which is given if we are humble and ask for it, it is evident that this is true. Allthough we want to honor God, within this flesh lies that inherent desire to sin, and we transgress many times without thinking. Many who bring us the burden of their hearts say that they had not wished to be vile in the sight of God; but, in the weakness of the flesh, the spirit of the evil one had come upon them and and they had sinned and were separated from God. If this had continued from past generations through our present time, if we all had been troubled with this and there would be no help-how sad it would be. But God in His great love beheld the need and prepared a way for man to be reconciled with Him.

As we read, the Prophet Isaiah saw that man would come again to Mount Zion and be cleansed. Those who would serve God and those who would be interested in hearing and receiving the Word of Truth would all know Him and come to

the holy hill.

Where is the holy hill of God? God lives omnipotent in the heavens, and, when we look up to Him, we lift our hearts and fold our hands in prayer. Within our hearts we know where He is, or where He may be found, and that He will hear our prayers. That gift is given to us for one purpose, to cause us to stop, consider, and give our hearts to the Lord Those who have come to this "holy hill" have found that God has prepared a way of salvation through His only begotten Son, a way for the sins of man to be washed away. It was accomplished at Calvary, and the way is still effective today for everyone who believes, and stays true in service to God.

Man cannot understand how God begins this, but we know that it is as Jesus said. The husbandman sows seed in the ground. He labors, and, while he is sleeping, there is action; there is growth and finally a plant comes forth, at first only

evident in a blade as grass.

We who toil in the field and sow the seed into the ground go out almost every morning to see whether the sowing has come forth. At this time of year we see farmers looking for the first evidence of life from seed that was sown. It is not known to us how this comes about. It's somewhat of a secret, and yet it isn't a secret. It lies within the hand of God to cause good seed to sprout and grow. Thinking about the things of the field helps us to understand the working of God's planting in the heart of man. The Lord reserves that for Himself. He knows when souls are humble, willing, and obedient, and He makes the seed grow.

The spirit which God breathed into man in the beginning, and

which is in every person born thereafter, finally returns to God for judgement and the body to the dust from whence it came. Then the question is: Where will I spend eternity? What will become of me in that day? Let us think, Let us stop and consider. Paul, and perhaps many of his brethren, had wondered about such things. For in that day people didn't have the writings and teachings that we have; they scarcely had copies and samples of the gospels. The inspiration of the Spirit moved men to preach the Gospel of salvation.

The men who went out in the name of the Saviour, the Son of God, did not have Bibles as we do, but talked about spiritual things. "They that loved the Lord sat together," said the Prophet, and the Lord visited them and gave them ful understanding. Those who are faithful in the ways of the Lord will be remembered. "And they shall be mine, saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels . . . " Mal. 3:17

The Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." II Cor. 5:1. This chapter is read often, especially when we lay our beloved ones to rest. It is evidence that when those who die in the Lord are taken from us, they have gone to a better home and place.

The Apostle Paul was confident that while "we are at home in the body, we are absent from the Lord." I believe that every one of its ought to feel that way. We are here today, enjoying good fellowship, the privileges, and the blessings that the children of God and those who love the word of God may enjoy; but we feel that we are absent from the Lord.

Not one of us has realized his full redemption. We look forward to it. We think about it. As we said before, when we are young, we

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
