What you are about to read is a letter that was sent to all Apostolic Christian churches and has been read to their congregations. The "Boat People" are Cambodian, Laotion, and Vietnamese refugees. Dear Brethren:

Christian greetings in the name of Christ Jesus.

At the last World Relief Committee meeting, it was decided to hold a special collection on behalf of the "Boat People." Quite a few inquiries have been directed to us requesting information as to whether the Apostolic Christian Church is doing anything about the refugee situation.

The World Relief Committee has sent more than \$22,000 through Care, Mennonite Central Committee, and Map International for relief aid and medical supplies during November and December of 1979. These organizations have personnel in the immediate areas.

Many contributions have been specifically designated for this purpose, and additional disbursements will be made as funds are available.

All churches are invited to participate on a voluntary basis. May God richly bless all who avail themselves of this opportunity to help the less fortunate. Contributions should be given to your church treasurer or sent to Vernon Leman, 606 Crestwood, Eureka, IL 61530.

YE MUST BE BORN AGAIN

EXPERIENCE

Not only is the confession of sins as an essential part of the Cleansing of the heart in repentance thoroughly established in the doctrines of the Holy Scriptures, but the experience of those in our days who have attained regeneration through repentance and faith confirms the absolute need of confession as a means of unburdening the heart and of obtaining the strength to resist and throw off the power of sin.

To the soul in repentance who is not yet ready and willing to make confession of its sins we can only say: "The fruits of repentance are yet incomplete. Press forward until you have grace to pour out all filth (be it much or little) of the old life." It is no disgrace for a repentant person to confess sins, but an honor. It marks definitely the end of the old life of uncleanness and the beginning of the new life in Christ in righteousness and purity.

However, the doctrine of confession as herein expounded must not be confused with the Roman Catholic Confessional, where the believer, supposedly standing in grace, is permitted to come from time to time to confess his sinfulness to a priest who is supposed to have authority to forgive the sins of those who accept the penance he prescribes, which often consists at least in part of the payment of money, ostensibly at least, for a good cause.

Nowhere in the Scripture do we find a commandment to confess sins to a priest or any officer of the church but the Scripture says, "Confess your faults one to anoth-

er." (Js. 5:16) For all true believers, united in the Church which is the body of Christ, are a part of the "royal priesthood" (I Pet. 2:9) and they being in union and communion with Christ can intercede for each other with Christ and with the Father.

WRESTLING WITH GOD

In this state of repentance the soul must wrestle with God and Christ in prayer as did Jacob who wrestled with an angel of God all through the night, seeking a blessing. The angel said to him, let me go, for the day breaketh. Jacob replied, "I will not let thee go, except thou bless me." Jacob prevailed and received a blessing and a new name; "Thy name shall be called no more Jacob, but Israel, for as a prince hast thou wrestled. (Gen. 32:26-28) So may the repenting soul say to the Lord, "I will not give up. Thou hast promised to help me and forgive me. I hold Thee to Thy promise."

It is not hardness nor unwillingness to forgive sins that causes God to allow the soul thus to suffer and struggle in the slough of despond. This experience is necessary to bring about certain changes in the heart. Willfulness and stubbornness must give place to obedience to Christ; pride and arrogance must be displaced by humility and meekness, and doubt and unbelief must yield to faith. The will and determination to serve God only must become overwhelming. Those in repentance, who ask God's forgiveness, must learn to forgive, where others have offended against them.

The love of things sinful must be changed into a loathing of them and the power of sin over us must be broken. The love of vain things must perish out of the heart. These are fundamental changes which are the real essence of conversion—of being born again.

Superficial evangelists often speak lightly of "accepting Christ as our Saviour." That of course is necessary. But our marriage to Christ the heavenly Bridegroom, like all marriages, must be a mutual affair. It is not only a question of whether we accept Him, but much more of whether He accepts us. He will accept us, He is bound by His Word and His promises to accept us and His love prompts Him to accept us when we meet His conditions and come with the true fruits of repentance asking to be forgiven by Him and to be accepted of Him.

During our mild winter, the cartoon I've seen the most variations on has an individual surrounded by snow thowers, blowers, shovels, scoops-in the rain. At our house, we have a snow fence (that remained under the snow all last year). But I started thinking of snow as the sheep's clothing of the wolf. Snow covers up daintily, prettily when it comes down. The snow often looks enchanting, breathtaking, and quite enticing. Often, it covers ugly reality; sometimes it masks slippery and dangerous areas. And it either melts elusively or turns muddy, slushy, and quite grim. When we "allow" the snow to pile up, removing it takes a great deal of energy. Often human energy is not enough. The weight of the snow has been known to cave in the roofs of houses. from the Word. Our lives are separated from God's Word and God's ways. As the world goes on and on, we get caught up and our mind is d i stracted from God's Word. Perhaps, even as we walk through the church door today, what God has spoken to us will not go with us. We see that Satan is working overtime. We see that God's mill grinds slowly; but it grinds surely.

We read in the Scripture that He is going to shake not only the earth but also heaven one more time. Those things which are grounded and founded upon the solid Rock, are going to stand. I believe that we are going through that shaking right now. God has allowed Satan much power to shake our faith. Only those things which are grounded upon God's Word will stand.

Paul told the Corinthians in today's reading, "I determined this with myself, that I will not come again to you in heaviness." 2 Cor. 2:1. No doubt there were many times when Paul was burdened. When we see the havoc that Satan raises and what he accomplishes in the hearts of men, it weighs heavily on us.

Let us stop and think, on the other hand, of the blessings of God and of the promises given in His Word. "Heaven and earth shall pass away: but my words shall not pass away." Luke 21:33.

If our faith is based upon this Word and this Word alone, will it really matter if this earth passes away? Will it really matter if the Lord comes today? Would it matter to you? If our faith and our life is based upon His Word, it shouldn't matter. It shouldn't really make any difference.

This is the privilege that God gives us today, the opportunity to come under the judgment of His Word, a merciful judgment. We are taught in the Word: "Judge not and ye shall not be judged." Luke 6:37. So let us examine ourselves in the light of God's Word, according to its promises, commandments, and precepts. If the Lord should come today, would it matter to you? Or to me?

We know that there are those close to us who have not come through the Door into the "ark." We are taught that in heaven there will be no sorrow and no pain. The former things will all be forgotten. So the sorrows which we have, even the heaviness that the Apostle Paul experienced, is only for this life. When the time comes that, by the grace of God, we enter into those realms above and into the blessings of heaven, I don't believe that we will know if anyone is missing, even from our own families.

As God's Word goes forth, we have His promises. We can read in the Word that Mary chose the better part. Martha was busy caring for the things that were material, but "Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her." Luke 10:42.

Today, the door of grace is open. Today, the plan of salvation is still in effect and grace is still sufficient. God is offering us an opportunity to seek the better part that will not be taken from us.

When we "lay away" a loved one whom we have known for some time, we see that death is final. There is no going back and changing or altering anything. The Bible says, "... where the tree falleth, there it shall be." Eccl. 11:3. It is a very sobering thought.

I think that anyone who has lost a loved one is impressed with the finality. We cannot speak to the loved one again. How many times we have wanted to sit down and visit one more time, but we can't! Death is final. God tells us this day after day.

This happens every day, but when it hits close to our hearts, it makes a deep impression and makes us realize what God's Word is all about. It is telling mankind that we are not going to live here forever; that we cannot put our trust in ourselves or in the material things of life, but that we must place ourselves in the hands of our Lord. This is what the Word tells us.

Paul said, "For out of much af-

fliction and anguish of heart I wrote unto you with many tears; not that ye should be grieved, but that ye might know the love which I have more abundantly unto you." 2 Cor. 2:4. Paul experienced many trials of his faith; he was stoned, beaten, and left for dead. He had to have a deep love for spiritual things and not too much care for his own life.

Paul also had a deep love and concern for his brethren, even as we should today. When we see the evil that is in the world, we worry about one another. The Apostle Paul wrote, "I wrote unto you with many tears . . . " 2 Cor. 2:4.

We are reminded that walking this path with the Lord is not all sunshine We wouldn't lead anyone to believe that it is. But, if we are being led by God's Spirit, we have faith that those things that come are in God's plan. The problems, trials, and heartaches are made bearable by His grace and by His strength.

Not one of us is ever going to be exempt from life's decisions and problems. We are all going to have to face them. But I find, and I think the brethren would agree, that we can do it with the help of the Lord. We can simply place our lives in His hands and say, "Not my will, but Thine be done." Luke 22:42. Those problems that seem to be mountainous are brought down.

Isaiah wrote of this. He said, "Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low; and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain." Isaiah 40:4.

God's ways are so high. To think that He would care! Consider that God has created all things beginning with the heavens and the earth. To think then, that God would care that we wouldn't have to walk this road alone. We face a God who is filled with compassion and love, and still many try to walk alone without His hand to direct them.

"But if any have caused grief, he hath not grieved me, but in part: that I may not overcharge you all. Sufficient to such a man is this punishment, which was inflicted of many. So that contrariwise ye ought rather to forgive him, and comfort him, lest perhaps such a one should be swallowed up with overmuch sorrow." 2 Cor. 2:5, 6, 7. We see throughout the Scriptures that there were problems.

The Apostle Paul was a man of staunch faith. I think of brethren who are pillars in the faith. But no matter how strong our faith may be, there are times when we become somewhat tossed around and troubled. That's when true faith shows in an individual.

We can go along pretty smoothly as long as things fall into place. But the real trials of our faith come when things don't go just the way we think they should. Then we need to believe that if God leads and directs us, all will be well and true blessings will follow. The patriarchs of old, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, David, Noah, the Apostles Paul and Peter had their trials too.

Life isn't different today from what it was then. Think of the Lord. Think of what He bore and how He endured all the trials that you and I experience. He endured in faith, believing that God would help Him. We should be so thankful that God is seated in the heavens and that the Lord is interceding for us. Many of us are seated here this morning with peace in our hearts, knowing that our Redeemer lives and that someday we will live with Him. Do you have that comfort and that assurance? Do you know that God is still bringing peace to the hearts of men?

This doesn't seem compatable does it, with what we see in the world? But it shows us the wisdom and the understanding of God. We would not want to live burdened down without His hand to help us, to lead us and to guide us.

The other night we visited a friend whose son was in deep trouble. She made the comment that she believes that if he hadn't made an attempt to repent, that he would have taken his life. We can see that God is an understanding God, and a God of love.

We underestimate, I believe, brethren and friends, the power that Satan has over the hearts of people. We underestimate what Satan can do with individuals and how he can turn them inside out.

Yet, consider the miracle that God can work, turning them right side out and back on the path that they were set on when they were first born. We have to remember that we were born in an innocent state.

But, there comes a time when we are not so innocent anymore, and we come under the influence of Satan. We come under his power and his might. Then we are no match for Satan. We are no match for the things that he can place in our hearts.

Only with God's grace and help can we overcome Satan's power. David experienced this; the Apostle Paul experienced this; and many brethren down through the ages of time have experienced the love and the mercy and the compassion of God.

"For to this end also did I write, that I might know the proof of you, whether ye be obedient in all things . . . " 2 Cor. 2:9. The Apostle Paul was concerned for the church at Corinth, the believers, because he realized the power that Satan has. After the Lord has converted us and brought us through the door of grace into the "ark" of safety, the hands of Satan are not bound. We are not insulated from the temptations and the trials of life. Paul knew this, and he wanted to know whether the Corinthians were obedient in all things.

The time is going to come, and we know that it's not too far off, when the Lord will return and rapture the church, the believers who have repented, been converted, been born again, and lived faithfully for the Lord. When He comes to rapture that church, we wonder if He will recognize us, you and me.

We know that the world has undesirable ways about it, certain looks and certain thoughts from which the Bible tells us to separate ourselves. The Word tells us pretty clearly what God expects. So we wonder if the Lord will recognize you and me. We have the opportunity today to make sure that He does.

We know that the Lord looks into our hearts, and He knows what is there. He knows the condition of our hearts. But the Word tells us that if the cup is clean on the inside, it will be clean on the outside. Often, what is in the heart can be seen on the outside, so that is important, too. When the Lord comes again, He will recognize as His own, as His bride, those who have turned their backs upon the world and become His followers, in His likeness. This is what God requires and expects.

"Now thanks be unto God, which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of his knowledge by us in every place." 2 Cor. 2:14.

God does make us triumph in His ways and it reflects back to teachings throughout the Scripture. One passage, for example, says that if we love God, we will love the brethren. We tie the whole Scripture together, not taking a piece here and a piece there but considering God's whole plan, a wonderful way for mankind to redeem his soul.

We should stand before God so that we would not have to be ashamed if the Lord returned today. We don't have to be as those who will run and hide themselves and cry for the rocks and hills to cover them. Only if we haven't taken advantage of God's grace (of the plan presented in this Word), only if we are as foolish as those who idly watched Noah build the ark, will we have to fear His return.

There is something in our day which illustrates how we take things for granted and lose interest in them. I am thinking of the space program. When the first man rode in a rocket, think of how much interest that drew. How we thought about it and talked about it for days afterward! Today we might not even know or think about it at all. Maybe we'd glance at it in the paper. When something is no longer new, it doesn't draw our attenteion.

I think this is what Satan is counting on. The plan of salvation has been in effect ever since the Lord died upon the cross and arose out of the grave. It is not something new or different; but it is something of which we are going to have to sit up and take notice. We will have to "triumph in Christ" to put Satan away from us.

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We must get things in the right perspective and in the right order. We must put our priorities in order. We must get down on our knees and plead that the door of grace will stay open so that many may still be able to go through that door in safety. SERMON BY BRO. DUANE KILGUS OF FAIRBURY, IL

Readings: Psalm 138 and 2 Cor. 2

The Apostle Paul, who wrote to the Corinthian church to encourage the brethren, had faith and confidence in the blood of Christ and in the power of God (just as you and I have); but we know that he experienced many trials and problems, many sorrows and difficulties. We find throughout the Scripture, throughout the lives of the apostles and the men of faith, that faith was based upon God's Word and upon His promises, as it should still be today. Our faith should not waver with the problems of life.

Regardless of the power that Satan has from the deception that is in the world or from sorrow or trials that come to us, we have faith and confidence in the Word. We know that through the Word we can be fed, nourished, edified in the Spirit, and set upon the right path.

The apostles walked the path of faith, and we know that when they laid down their armor, when they finished their battle, there was victory. God promised it to them, and His promise is the same today. His arm has not been shortened.

The Word is a mystery. But, as we look into it with the eyes of faith, believing that God was, is, and always shall be, we know that God is observing us. He sees not only our physical selves, but he observes the contents of our hearts. When we gather around the Word, we must consider what is in our hearts. As you look at me and as I look at you, we cannot see each others thoughts, but, if we could, would we be ashamed?

We should take this into consideration, realizing that God knows all things, including the contents of our hearts, He knows our intentions. Considering that He is the One to whom we will have to give account, it is important that we consider God's Word carefully and prayerfully. God has given us another day of grace, another opportunity. He ordained that we would be exposed to His Word. Some of us were exposed to it as little children; some were exposed to it later in life. But, having confidence that God sees us and uses us as creations of His, as those to whom He has given souls, we have faith that He gives us the opportunity to work out our salvation.

Perhaps, when those who have no faith in the Word hear about salvation, they consider it foolish. But we consider it with an eye of faith, with the faith that the Apostle Paul had, the faith that David had, the faith that Noah had. The Word says that all things have continued the same since the time of our Fathers, and are the same today. People still lose interest in God's Word.

There is probably nothing in the Scriptures that paralells the plan of salvation any more closely than the account of Noah's building the ark. Through faith in God, Noah built the ark. No doubt (keep in mind that the Scriptures speak of one hundred and twenty years) progress was very slow. I imagine that, as he started to build it, it caught the eye of people who passed by. They were interested, concerned; and when they saw Noah building it, they probably looked and wondered.

But, as time wears on, it seems that interest wanes. Think of it. More than a lifetime by today's standards, one hundred and twenty years passed as the ark was being built. People probably paid less and less attention. The ark was there and they knew it; and it wasn't of interest. Perhaps they stood back and laughed and made fun; but it didn't draw their attention as it did in the beginning.

I think it is the same with the plan of salvation. It seems that we sometimes become hardened to it because we hear it every Sunday. The invitation is sent out, the Word is still here, and time goes on.

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As Noah was building the ark, time went on. It was a monument and could be seen for miles around, no doubt, but it didn't hold the interest any more because it wasn't new. It wasn't something different.

The time came when Noah and his family went into the ark and the door was shut; perhaps even then, the people didn't really pay much attention. If I am not mistaken, seven days passed before it started to rain, and we have to keep in mind that it had never rained before. The ark did not hold people's interest because it had been there so long. So it is today, I believe, with God's Word and with the love and the patience that He has with mankind. It's been there as long as we can remember and is still with us. So, to some perhaps, it doesn't hold the interest any more.

God's Word is still here. The invitation is still sent out. We still have that opportunity. The door hasn't been shut, as it was on the ark.

Think of it! When the door was shut on the ark, and God shut it, that was it! Then, perhaps, the people started to look at the ark, especially when it began to rain. Then they saw that they had made a mistake. The ark had stood there for one hundred and twenty years, and they were accustomed to it; nevertheless, it was still there. The plan of salvation is still here. The door has not been shut. Again God will shut it; not man.

We still have opportunity today. As the Apostle Paul told the people how the Lord lived and walked, he proclaimed the Word and established the church. When the new dispensation of grace was started, man had opportunity, right from the beginning, to come into that "ark" for safety.

This is what salvation is all about. But, as we look around, many things in our lives are so different (Continued On Page 26)
