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REGARDING THE RESURRECTION

Regarding the resurrection from the dead, we read in the Holy Scriptures, in John 11: 25-26, that Christ said to the sister of the dead Lazarus, "I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live . . . He continued, ". . . . whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." After these words were spoken by our Lord, He proceeded to prove them by resurrecting his friend Lazarus from the dead after corruption had set in; for as Martha had told the Lord, her brother had already been dead four days. This act of resurrection proved to all the almighty power of the Son of God.

Men of God believed in the resurrection of the dead many centuries before Christ came to earth. We read in Job 14:14: "If a man die, shall he live again? All the days of my appointed time will I wait, till my change come." Job also said, after he had gone through

fiery trials, "... I know that my redeemer liveth... And though after the skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God." Job. 19: 25-26.

To Daniel, the faithful prophet of the Lord, it was revealed that (and we read it in the book of Daniel, chap. 12, verse 2), "...many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt." In the 13th verse of the same chapter, Daniel heard the comforting words, "But go thou thy way till the end be; for thou shalt rest, and stand in thy lot at the end of the days."

Let us carefully consider the words of our Saviour in John 5:28-29: "Marvel not at this: for thehour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation."

It seems that if we believe that the Holy Bible is the inspired Word of God, we should also believe that we should live as we are taught in the Word: make preparation for the hereafter while there is opportunity, for as surely as night follows day, judgment follows death. Then all of us shall hear what our lot will be in all eternity. If we have spent our time in the service of our God, we can rest assured we shall hear "Go ye into life eternal." If we have served the prince of this world, we can likewise be assured we shall hear, "Go ye into eternal punishment.'

Dear reader, very soon even nature will reveal to us the mighty power of our God. We will behold grass, trees, and flowers come to life. Their drab colors will be replaced by the glorious hues which a wonderful Creator created. This demonstates the mighty resurrecting power of our God, for at His appointed time all nature will put forth new life.

RESURRECTION

According to Scripture, the resurrection is the chief method by which God will harvest or garner the precious souls of believers into His realm.

The first resurrection, as in a harvest, is made up of the choicest fruit, of which Christ was the most elegant; those who gave their lives for Him are also of the select. I Thessalonians 4, verse 16: "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in

Christ shall rise first . . ." This completes the first resurrection.

The general resurrection, which no man will escape unless he has been worthy to have part in the first, will follow the thousand year reign of Christ, just prior to the great white throne judgment. Revelation 20:11-15.

The resurrection of Christ was foretold in Psalm 16:10: "For thou wilt not leave my soul in hell; neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption." Also, it was told by Himself, announced by an-

gels, declared by Peter, and preached by Paul.

The resurrection gives us hope, as recorded in I Peter 1:3. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according to his abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead . . ."

Also, "But if the Spirit of him that raised Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you." Rom. 8:11

The world cannot understand

this, but the true believer can derive such peace of heart and mind by believing in the resurrection of

our Lord and Saviour, that it can mean the difference between victory and defeat.

Are you willing to go with Him to Calvary's hill where He died and shed His precious blood as a ransom for all those who acknowledge that they are sinners? You must humbly beg for grace to be able to go through true repentance, with a purging of worldly things and a cleansing of the heart by the shed blood of Christ. Then, by a confession of your faith in this crucified Christ, you can experience spiritual resurrection with great joy and the hope of eternal life.

WRESTLING WITH GOD (cont.)

It is while the fruits of repentance are being developed and ripened that this struggle must go on. The length and fierceness of the struggle does not depend nearly so much upon the degree of our sinfulness, (for the sacrifice of Jesus Christ upon the cross is sufficient to atone for all sins, though they be as scarlet) as upon the stubbornness of our will and the tenacity with which we cling to our old life.

Repentance, then, is not merely remorse for past wrongdoing but a struggle within ourselves, a stuggle in which our will plays an important, but not the decisive, part. Our own will unsupported could never overcome the evil in our nature, not only for lack of strength, but because it, itself, is not perfectly pure.

As the struggle goes on, the soul becomes more conscious of its need,

of its complete dependence upon the grace of God, in short, of its lost condition without Christ. It wrestles with God, pleading to be forgiven, pleading for strength and victory, pleading for peace, and vowing over and over to God, to obey and serve Him unto death if He will only help and receive us.

The soul becomes more and more ready and willing to yield itself to Christ and to believe and accept God's way of salvation; to believe in Jesus Christ as the Son of God and to believe in His atonement for sin through His death upon the cross and in the shedding of His blood, as a blameless, perfect Lamb of God, for the atonement and the forgiveness of the sins of all men who believe and accept His salvation.

APOLOGIES

When a repentant person becomes convicted in his conscience, of wrong doing against another person it is essential to confess and apologize and where possible make restitution to that person. Sometimes this is not so easy because it involves personal pride. In such cases it is all the more necessary and wholesome that it be done. Not only is it very helpful and healing to the confessor but it gives the very best kind of testimony to the

wronged person of the change which the Grace of God is accomplishing in the repenting person. There have been cases where a person to whom the apology is made by a repenting person was so struck and impressed by the humble and penitent attitude of the confessor that it caused that person also to turn to repentance and thereby became the direct means of saving a soul.

But there are sins which are against God and His law only and involve no other person. In fact, all

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sins are primarily against God and only secondarily against our fellow men. The truly repentant person will feel the need of confessing these also. While such confessions are usually made to elders and ministers of the church, that is not absolutely essential. Such confession can be made to any mature believing person in Christ toward whom the confessor has a feeling of confidence that he or she will understand and sympathize and will know how to counsel the confessor. and will keep such confession confidential. Of course, such a confession is always to be made in sincerity and uprightness.

That confession of sins is an essential fruit of true repentance is evident in many places of the Scriptures. Even of John the Baptist it is written, the people "were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins." (Mt. 3:6) When the gospel of Jesus Christ was brought to the Ephesians and accepted by them we also find that confession was the fruit of repentance. We read: "And many that believed came and confessed, and shewed their deeds." (Acts 19:18)

When unrepentant people came to John the Baptist for baptism, he refused them with these cutting words: "O generation of vipers, who hath warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bring forth fruits meet for repentance." (Mt. 3:7-8) Undoubtedly an essential part of the fruit consistent with repentance which John missed in these insincere candidates for baptism was a readiness and willingness to confess their sins as the others had done, to whom John's baptism was administered.

That confession is an essential part of the cleansing of the heart, not only in the original cleansing during repentance, but also through unwatchfulness commit sin, is shown by the following Scripture texts: "Confess your faults one to another and pray one for another that ye may be healed." (James 5:16) "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I Jn. 1:19)

ACCEPTED BY THE SAVIOUR

But the climax comes, not when we accept Him, but when He accepts us. When He sees the fruit of repentance ripened, the heart purified, the will subdued into obedience to Him, then he changes our hope and belief that He can and will forgive our sins and accept us, into a conviction, into an assurance that He has accepted and forgiven us. Thus the struggle ends. Peace and joy fill the heart. An all-consuming love fills and overwhelms the soul. This love knows no bounds. It embraces all men—friend and foe—and burns with a desire to tell all men of the life-giving, soul-saving, healing, and liberating power of God in Jesus Christ.

That soul is converted!

BAPTISM

The man of sin has perished in the heart, has been nailed to the cross with Christ; "old things are passed away; behold all things are become new!" (II Cor. 5-17)

The man of sin, the Adam nature, being now slain, crucified with Christ, that soul may now be baptised into the death of Jesus Christ and arise with him to "walk in newness of life." (Rom. 6:4)

Thus baptism is not the means of obtaining forgiveness of sins, but is the ensealing of an established fact, of a conversion that has gone before. By immersion into water, the burial of the Adam nature is symbolized; by arising out of the water the resurrection to a new life of godliness and holiness is symbolized. The bath in water symbolizes the cleansing of the heart, which cleansing, however, is not done with water, but by the atonement in the blood of Christ.

THE HOLY SPIRIT

Now, the heart, being cleansed, is prepared to receive the Holy Ghost as a permanent tenant. He shall be, and is needed as a comforter, as a guide through life, to guide us into all truth. (Jn. 16:13) Jesus said, "He shall teach you all things and bring all things to your remembrance whatsoever I have said unto you." (Jn.14:26)

The annointing of the Holy Ghost is an essential part, without which no converted soul is fully furnished and equipped for the journey and battle of life. A solemn rite is ordained in the Word of God which when accepted in obedience and faith, and after proper preparation, becomes the means by which this precious gift is received, namely by the laying on of hands, with prayer, after immersion.

The writer of the Epistle to the Hebrews includes this rite, along with repentance and baptism as among the principles of the doctrine of Christ when he says, "Therefore leaving the principles of the doctrine of Christ, let us go unto perfection; not laying again the foundation of repentance from dead works, of faith toward God, of the doctrine of baptisms and of laying on of hands, and of resurrection of the dead and of eternal judgement." (Heb. 6:1, 2)

Also we find that the Apostles Peter and John when they went to Samaria had received the Word of God through the preaching of Philip, practiced the laying on of hands for the giving of the Holy Ghost upon those who believed and were baptized. We read: "Then laid they their hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost." (Acts 8:17)

While this rite is ignored or neglected by most denominations of nominal Christianity, it is well established in the Holy Scripture and should be gladly embraced by all true believers who desire to accept the whole counsel of God.

WHAT A BLESSING

What a wonderful experience, to be lead out of darkness into light! To be lead by God's goodness into repentance; in repentance to be lead to faith in the Son of God; by Him to be freed from the power of sin: by Him to be washed and cleansed of our sins that are past, to receive forgiveness of sins and peace with God; to be clothed with the white garment of justification through Jesus Christ; to receive baptism in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; by the laying on of hands to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit; to have the love of God richly poured out into our hearts!

WHAT A RESPONSIBILITY

What an experience! What a blessing! Also what a responsibility!

Henceforth we are no more our own, but are betrothed as the bride of the Lamb, to Jesus Christ the Lamb of God, the heavenly Bridegroom.

Henceforth we may no more live unto ourselves but unto Him who lived and died for us.

Blessed are we if we continue in this faith and in the love all our days, being faithful unto death, bearing fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5: 22), serving God and our fellow men in love, keeping the commandments of Christ, growing rich in good works, done in the Lord. "For so an entrance shall be ministered unto you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." (II Pet. 1:11)

But woe unto us, if, after being saved, and having vowed to serve God and to keep the Commandments of Christ, we fail to do so; if we content ourselves, merely because we no longer live in sin, and neglect to labor in Christ's vineyard and harvest field; if after having said, "I go, sir," when the Lord called us to labor for Him, we neglect to go and neglect to labor.

Woe unto us and double death, if after we have been "once enlightened, and have tasted of the heavenly gift, and were made partakers of the Holy Spirit and have tasted the good word of God, and the powers of the world to come, if we shall again fall away, and crucify the Son of God afresh and put Him to an open shame." (Heb. 6:4, 5) There is no second regeneration for such. "But beloved, we are persauded better things of you, and things that accompany salvation, though we thus speak." (Heb. 6:9)

Satan has great power; the Antichrist will use great signs and lying wonders. The apostle revealed that when he wrote this letter.

We believe, beloved ones, that Satan is working harder now than when the apostle wrote to the Thessalonians. It gives us even more reason to fully prepare our hearts to keep them clean and pure; we should have nothing in our hearts that would condemn us. We want to stand firmly upon the foundation which we had when we became followers of our Lord. It is so necessary to be firmly grounded and founded upon the solid rock. Then, when the storms of life come over us, we have something to hold fast to; and we can stand amid the trials and temptations of life which still come over

God's children today.
Paul also said, "But we are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, brethren beloved of the Lord, because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth." II Thess. 2:13. He was thankful that God had chosen these followers of

the Lord.

Beloved ones, we have reason to thank God today for those who turn to the Lord in spirit and truth. Working out their souls' salvation in truth and sincerity is of great importance. If we would consider our salvation lightly, not complying with the Word of God, we would be found wanting. Possibly we would have a hope that we could live by, but not a hope to die by.

That has often been expressed by converts, dear ones. They felt that they could live successfully; but when they considered dying, they had no hope within their hearts. What we should seek while

Where would we stand then, if we were still serving the enemy of our soul? If our hearts were not cleansed and purified? Would we be standing before Him in peace? That is what is important. We want to stand before Him with peaceful hearts.

"Whereunto he called you by our gospel, to the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, brethren, stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word, or our epistles." II Thess. 2:14, 15. Paul told the Thessalonians not to waver from what they had been taught, and to hold fast until the coming of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus.

It is important for you and me, beloved ones, not to drift away from the Word of God, seeking a hope and promise in any other way.

I often think of the hymn that we sing together which says, "Tho baptized, yet our hope is vain, if we his Word don't heed." Baptism alone does not save the soul. The Word teaches us that it is necessary to become converted and newborn. In baptism the old sinful life is buried in Christ's death, and we arise and come forth in newness of life. That is the teaching that we have in the Word, beloved ones, the way that does save the soul if we then live faithfully until the end of our days. Unless we follow those teachings, we cannot find a living hope that we can have eternal life.

We would fear standing before the just and righteous One if we felt within our hearts that we had not complied with the Word. How freely the Word of God is given to us! We all have Bibles in our homes and can read the Word over and over again; if we do not read it, it is our own fault. When we stand before our Lord and Saviour, if we have to say that we have neglected to read the Word, have neglected to go to church, and have

neglected to comply with the teachings which we received from His Word, there will be no help for us.

How will it be on that Great day? The Lord says in His Word that out of a thousand questions we will not be able to answer one, if we have neglected this important work. Dear ones, would it not be far better to give heed to the Word today while we hear it spoken to us? It is offered free of charge, without price. It is not only for the rich nor is it only for the poor; it is for everyone who becomes willing to submit to the ways of the Lord.

I often think of the example of the poor man and the rich man. Both died; poor Lazarus was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom; the rich man went to hell where he lifted up his eyes, being in torment, and pleaded, saying, "Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame." Luke 16:24.

What was the answer, dear ones? There was no relief given. It was too late. When the rich man thought of his five brothers who were still on this side of the grave, he pleaded with Abraham to send one from the dead to preach to them so that they would not come to the place of torment. Not even that much was granted him. Abraham said, "They have Moses and the prophets; If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded though one rose from the dead." Luke 16:29, 31.

So, we can see what it will mean for those who neglect this important work until it is too late. It would be regretted forever and ever. Abraham told the rich man, "Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented." Luke 16:25.

That is the great difference, beloved ones. Those who are submissive and humble themselves before the Lord will be comforted on that great day. Those who neglect their salvation will suffer without end. There is no end to eternity; it is time without end. We will be in one place or the other, so today let us choose to come to the Saviour. Let us not harden our hearts.

SERMON BY BRO. NOAH BAUMAN OF RITTMAN, OH

Text: II Thess. 2

When we turn to the pages of God's living Word, is it not true that we always find many instructions given to us? Those who lived many years ago felt a duty to instruct future generations in the ways of our Lord.

Our Lord and Saviour Himself gave us many teachings and instructions concerning how we might be fitted and prepared to inherit our eternal resting place. When the Lord Jesus left this earthly life, He instructed that others should continue the work; that they should point out the necessity of following His teachings. There were those who carried on this duty, and were deeply concerned that the followers of the Lord might not come short of their eternal inheritance.

The Apostle Paul was truly diligent in this work even though he walked in the ways of this world and committed great sin before his conversion. He thought that he was pleasing God (according to the old law) when he persecuted the church of Christ. However, when it pleased God to call Paul to go forth and proclaim His Word, he

willingly obeyed.

Paul wrote many letters of instruction to the various churches. In today's reading, Paul wrote to the Thessalonians out of concern for them. "Now we beseech you, brethren, by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by our gathering together unto him, That ye be not soon shaken in mind, or be troubled, neither by spirit, nor by word, nor by letter as from us, as that the day of Christ is at hand." II Thess. 2:1, 2. Paul warned them, beloved ones, so that they would not be misled, and it is also a warning for us today.

God gives each one of us a free and open way to become a child of His. When we become a child of God, dear ones, we have duties to carry out. The Word teaches us that we should not be shaken in our mind or be troubled. Truly, we have an enemy of our soul who seeks to misdirect the very elect of God. It is for that reason, dear ones, that we must often be reminded of our high and heavenly calling. We should seek to be obedient to that calling.

If we become children of God and then do not walk in His ways, will it profit us anything? Not according to His Word. The teaching in the Word is that if we become children of God and remain true and faithful to the teachings which are outlined for us, then we can expect to inherit that eternal resting place. Otherwise, beloved ones, if we become disobedient to the Word, our promise is cut off unless we repent for our sin. Therefore, we must be careful how we live so that we retain our hope and promise of salvation.

Don't we all have a desire to inherit a heavenly home? Who would not wish to? We see plainly and clearly through the Word that there are two ways we can walk. We are either upon the broad way that leads to doom and destruction, or we are on the way that leads to life eternal. There is no middle way, beloved ones. We are either on

one path or on the other.

It is very important to be on the narrow path. If we become negligent in our duties, careless and unwilling to submit to the teachings in the Word, we have no promise. How sad it would be if we came to the end of our journey and found nothing prepared for us. That would be a condition we could scarcely imagine!

Today we have the privilege and opportunity to gather together unhindered and unmolested by the outside world, even protected by our government. We can come here in quietness and we can hear the Word of God; we find therein how we can gain an eternal resting

place.

The apostle warned the Thessalonians to "Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day

shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition; Who opposes and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped; so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, showing himself that he is God." II Thess. 2:3, 4.

At that time already, dear ones, there were many who sought to deceive mankind and show other ways in which man could become saved. But, beloved ones, there is only one way that man can be saved. The Saviour Himself said that anyone who enters the door of the sheepfold in any way except through Him is a thief and a robber; and we know that no thief or robber will have any part in heaven (unless he fully repents in this life). We must go through that one Door if we want to become a child of God. We must go through the straight gate and enter the narrow way.

Paul says further, "And now ye know what withholdeth that he might be revealed in his time. For the mystery of iniquity doth already work: only he who now letteth will let, until he be taken out of the way." II Thess. 2:6, 7.

Paul continues, "... then shall that Wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming:" (verse eight). The apostle said that the Lord will consume the Antichrist with the Spirit of His mouth and destroy him with the brightness of His coming. Those who do not love the Lord will also be destroyed. That is the word of God, beloved ones, and we cannot change the Word.

It is so plain and so clear that those who love and follow the teachings of the Lord are those who will inherit eternal life, and those who neglect this important duty will be forever cast out.

Paul says, in verse nine, "Even him, whose coming is after the (Continued on page 27)
