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THE RESURRECTION AND "LIFE"

Mr. Ohara, an elementary school teacher who is one of my English students, told me recently that he was very tired, physically and spiritually. One of his neighbors, a young father of several children, had passed away suddenly due to a blood clot in the brain, so Mr. Ohara and all the other neighbors in that particular social unit called a "kumi" took off work for several days to help with the funeral. It was Mr. Ohara's job to help dig the grave. This is all right; I, too, have helped dig my Japanese neighbor's grave, but what made him so tired was the fact that the grave was to be dug where a relative had been buried 15 to 20 years previously. What remains there were of the body previously buried were gathered up and buried a little deeper, the ground leveled off smoothly, and the new wooden coffin set into the grave, fulfilling the Scripture. "... Dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return..." Genesis 3:19.

But why should this make Mr. Ohara so tired, spiritualy and physically? Because human beings love life, whether they are Buddhist, Moslems, Christians, or whatever, and he had been face to face with the mortality of the human body. The Apostle Paul speaks of the human body of a believer as follows, ". . It is sown in corruption, it is raised in incorruption." I Cor. 15: 42.

Men cling to life; the instinct for self-preservation is very strong, not only for human beings but for all creatures of the animal kingdom. What millionaire would not give at least half of his possessions for an extension of good health so he could enjoy his family and grandchildren a little longer. Recently when a high school student in America was asked why young people opposed our president's call for draft regis-

tration, his answer was simple, "We don't want to die."

When our Lord Jesus Christ was at the grave of Lazarus, He said to Martha, "...I am the Resurrection, and the Life: He that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die. Believest thou this?" John 11:26.

What's this about never dying? Sounds like the answer. Christ didn't explain futher, but he called Lazarus out of the grave, with his former physical body, to die again.

Sometime later it was Christ's turn to be in the grave. This time Mary stood nearby. Christ came forth from the grave, much like Lazarus did, but there was one big difference. His resurrected body was not physical but immortal, never to return to the dust of planet earth.

The conclusion of the whole matter is that death hath lost its sting. I Cor. 15:55: "O death, where is thy sting?..." The true child of God never really dies in the sense that death usually conveys. He only moves from "the earthly house of this tabernacle, his physical body. to a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." I Cor. 5:1 paraphrased. This indicates, among other things, that we will sooner or later, move into a new and resurrected body which is immortal and eternal. Such is the essence of the terminology "eternal life" made possible and confirmed by the resurrection of our Lord and Saviour. Jesus Christ.

I arrived at Tokyo July 6, 1977. Sis. Jane Weiss and I taught kindergarten together. The two years I spent in Japan passed quickly, and now I have precious memories from

my experience.

When I was first in Japan, I remember feeling the same love among our brethren there as we have in our precious fellowship in the States. The group having fellowship in Japan is small, but it is wonderful that there are brothers and sisters there. Our brethren showed me many kindnesses. I enjoyed visits in their homes. Sis. Jane and I traveled to Tokyo sometimes. It was a blessing to be with our brethren there. Bro. Willis Ehnle and Bro. Akito were ordained elders while I was in Japan. They uphold the doctrine and traditions of our precious faith. We had English services regularly in Shioda. A brother spoke, or we listened to a tape.

The kindergarten children became dear to me. They are similar to American children. They listened to and learned Biblical truths. I pray they will continue to have the opportunity of hearing the Truth and will someday turn to God in repentance. We had enjoyable experiences with the kindergarten children. The kindergarten childrn's parents were very kind to me, and I also enjoyed visits in their homes.

I had many interesting experiences during my stay in Japan. I learned about the people and their culture. I saw different parts of Japan and appreciated the opportunities I had to travel. I really enjoyed traveling by train.

During my stay in Japan, several improvements were made in our church and in the kindergarten. We started wearing long veils during worship services, and our beautiful, meaningful Zion's Harp hymns were translated into Japanese. Both are special to our precious faith. In the church/kindergarten at Shioda, changes were made to improve the physical stucture of the building and to make it more able to accomodate the growing number of kindergarten children. A new heating stove was installed to replace on old one, and the church kitchen was redecorated. There were also improvements made at our Tokyo church.

Jane and I moved from our small apartment to a new home. Our new home was definitely a big improvement which Jane and I really enjoyed. We also enjoyed having a

I think it is a good idea to have sisters stay in Japan for two years. Adjustments were necessary, and I had difficulty adjusting immediately. I enjoyed my second year in Japan more than the first. I was busy, time never dragged, and I didn't get homesick. There were times when I would have liked to have been with my loved ones at home, but I felt God wanted me in Japan. I was so lonesome for fellowship, sometimes, but I felt the prayers of loved ones from everywhere helped me. I think it is good to reinstate the rotation system among teachers. I think this is better for everyone concerned.

I returned to the States in July, 1979; Sis. Jane Weiss, Sis. Reiko Furuya, and I traveled together. We spent some time in Honolulu on our trip to the States. I appreciate the opportunities of vactioning in

Alaska and Hawaii enroute to and returning from Japan. Since my return home, I have been employed as a teacher's aide. I am thankful to God for His guildance and for providing for my every need throughout my life.

My experiences in Japan were interesting and worthwhile. I am thankful I had the opportunity to go to Japan. God willing, some day I would like to visit my brethren and friends in Japan again.

ILLINOIS **BLOOMINGTON - NORMAL** Dixie Knapp

Some of this month's headlines read: "Economy Out of Control," "High Interest Rates Start to Hit Home," "The Hard Facts about Balancing the Budget," "Skyrock-eting Energy Costs." Inflation—a topic that is on everyone's mindcould easily be a result of our spiritual problems. And it follows that if that's true, the weight of change rests upon the Christian.

How easy it is to identify with the feeling that your paycheck seems to disappear. It's as though your wallet had holes in it. Where does it seem to go? In Haggai the Lord said, "He that earneth wages earneth wages to put it into a bag with holes." (1:6) The book of Haggai has something to say to our country today.

The Lord was displeased with these Israelites. They had returned to the land of promise to rebuild the temple. The work was begun, but hostile neighbors tried to stop the construction and they succeeded. Fifty thousand Israelites' enthusiasm for the rebuilding was smothered by outward opposition and inward indifference.

For sixteen years the temple was in ruins. Then the Lord, through the prophet Haggai, spoke to the Israelites and challenged their excuse which was, "This isn't the time to build the temple." He questioned them, asking "Is it time for you, O ye, to dwell in your cieled houses, and this house (the temple) lie waste?" (1:4) He was pointing out that they had time for their homes and possessions and yet no time for the things of importance to God-in this case it was the reconstruction of the temple.

To make the contrast more obvious between the ornate homes of the returned exiles and the temple that lay desolate, it is important to understand what cieled means. Cieled houses were homes paneled extensively-very ornate for those times. Expensive timber was not common in Judah: therefore, its use was a mark of luxury. Wainscoating with cedar was to be found in the palaces of the kings. (Note that their sin was not in their possessions-Abraham had cattle on a thousand hills and the richest man whoever lived was Solomonbut in their priorities.)

Verse 12 shows the turning point of the leaders and people for they "obeyed the voice of the Lord their God." And the Lord said, "I am with you." (1:13) From my understanding, it was a little more than a month between the time that Haggai first expressed the Lord's dissatisfaction with the people and the time the people began to build.

This short book taught me a lot. The indifference in our country toward spiritual things and too much concern for temperal things seems too closely related to the sin of these people. What gives me so much hope is that after changing their attitudes, the Lord said, "I am with you." Our country can change, too.

Several years ago I met a lady, by chance, who with her husband had a very unusual kind of ministry. She was acquainted with the Jewish community and had been able to learn about the special feasts and observances, among them the Passover supper. They obtained items used in the Passover, learned the rituals involved, and by it taught the Gospel of Jesus Christ, noting the significance of the Passover because it so closely linked with the focal point of their faith—Christ's death on Calvary.

I have in my hand an article published in a Christian magazine in 1973, written by Daniel Goldberg who was reared in an orthodox Jewish home. It is entitled. "Passover-A Forecast of Calvary." The article agreed with what this lady told me. It brought a deeper appreciation of the greatness of God in that it reflected the wonderful plan of redemption as He was trying to reveal it to His people so many years ago. With the advent of Easter, it seems fitting to talk about the Jewish Passover to see if some value or interest can be garnered from it.

The Feast of the Passover is also known as the Feast of Unleavened Bread or Feast of Freedom. Technically, what the modern Jew celebrates is the Feast of Unleavened Bread. God allowed destruction of the temple, the only acceptable place where the lamb could be offered, because Christ, who was called the "lamb of God" (John 1:29) was to take the place of the Passover lamb.

The night before the Passover eve, the head of the Jewish household purged the house of all leaven, or yeast. The bread (matzot) made

without leaven during the Passover is symbolic not only of God's holiness and purity but also of the purity and holiness which he expects of His children. We all remember how the Israelites left Egypt at God's instructions in such a hurry that they did not have time to knead their bread, so they took it without leaven.

The Apostle Paul admonishes Christians in I Cor. 5:7, 8: "Purge out therefore the old leaven, that ye may be a new lump, as ye are unleavened. For even Christ, our Passover, is sacrificed for us; therefore let us keep the feast, not with old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness; bue with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth."

This provoked much thought as to what transpired in the Upper Room the night of the betrayal: how the Passover supper was served first before the washing of the feet, how Christ told His disciples that they were not all clean and how Satan, also being present, entered into Judas after Christ gave him the sop and Judas departed. (John 13). John seems to indicate it was here where Christ served the feast of communion with the drinking of wine and eating of bread which was actually the institution of the Lord's Sup-

It is interesting to note that unleavened bread is served at the heginning of the Passover. It is served on a Seder tray. which has three compartments. each containing mot zah, or a piece of unleavened bread. During the ritual, the father takes out the middle piece, breaks it in half and returns it to the compartment, wrapping the other half in a linen napkin which the mother takes to hide for the children who will later go to hunt for it. It is called the "bread of affliction," but after it is found it is called the "bread of hope." Every born-again Christian may relate to this. The three compartments, according to Christnan understanding of what God was trying to unfold, represents the triune nature of God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The housewife prepares and places on the table, before the head of the family, the ceremonial platter containing the six symbolic elements: (1) vegetable greens repre-

senting new life (2) a dish of salt, reminiscent of the Red Sea and the tears shed by their ancestors during their enslavement (3) bitter herbs to remind them of the bitterness and bondage endured in Egypt (4) the Charoset, a mixture of chopped apples, nuts, cinnamon, and a little wine, which reminds them of the clay used to make bricks for Pharoah (5) a roasted egg which brought remembrance that in Old Testament times salvation came by roasted or burnt animal sacrifices (6) a shank bone of a lamb as a reminder to them of the lamb God wanted them to kill.

The supper ends when the oldest son goes to the door to see if Elijah is coming as a messenger to announce their Messiah. When he does not see him coming he comes back very sad and delivers the message that maybe next year he will come. (See Malachi 4)

Now, can't we say that God is good because He has opened our eyes in the acceptable time so that we can see? Elijah will surely come before the great and dreadful day of the Lord, but we should be thankful that, for us, the Messiah has already come and will come again to take us unto Himself, that where He is, we may be also.

The wedding ceremony is still a solemn and special ceremony to Christians who love the Word of God and honor it. The simplicity of the ceremony, as we know it, gives the honor to God as instructions are given for living and establishing a home built upon the Word of God. The position of the husband in the household is very clear in God's Word, as is the responsibility of directing the family in its pattern of living through the Word. The love he is to have for his wife secures her position as his helpmeet and gains, for him, a place of respect with her. These were the words we heard at the wedding of Sis. Melinda Langhofer to Bro. Rocky Giltner as they exchanged their vows in the presence of many witnesses on Mar. 9. Bro. Samuel Anlniker, elder of our congregation, performed the wedding ceremony with support from the father of the bride.

It often has entered my mind that there are several rather quiet individuals who may sit toward the back of the church and not speak much, but whose prayer for our precious faith is perhaps so fervent and strong that it surely arises to God and merits His favor. So let no one ever believe that he has no talents to use. Then, if we take our talent and use it, it can be as a light set upon a hill.

There is no question that the time in which we are living is the most knowledgeable time there ever was upon the earth. I believe that along with knowledge Satan has found the most devices he has ever had at his disposal to bring us again into darkness. If this is true, this world is surely a dark, evil and sinful place.

The thought also comes to me from time to time that God looked down upon Sodom and Gomorrah and saw the gross sin that was taking place in those cities.

Our country is two hundred years old, roughly, as a nation. It is a country that was founded on the worship of God according to the dictates of men's conscience. However, this country has been so deluded and deceived by Satan that our society has become (over all, that is) so sinful that I wonder whether God sees it as much better than Sodom and Gomorrah.

After the angels left Abraham, the Lord told him that He was going to destroy the cities. Abraham pleaded, asking that if there would be a certain number of righteous, with the number finally reduced to ten, whether He would spare the cities for their sakes. There were not even ten.

No, dear ones, I do not intend to prophecy; but will the time come again when God will be unable to find ten souls worthy of being His children? That is why we should use every talent that God has given us. That is why we should let our candle shine so brightly today amongst our brethren, amongst our friends, amongst our neighbors, and amongst all those with whom we come in contact.

I know that you have met from time to time those who had no

knowledge of our precious faith, but who walked in the fear of God. Then there are those who have become acquainted with it and have found the Rock of Salvation in our faith which answered their needs.

We are not here to boast this morning. We have nothing to boast about. Man is fallible. Man is prone to make mistakes and that is why we should assemble every Sabbath Dav and at every opportunity that we have.

The physical man needs food and drink to be sustained, and I think that the spiritual man is similar. Even though we confess the Lord Jesus Christ and believe upon Him with all our hearts and minds and souls, if we go our own way and do not have the benefits of assembling in the house of worship under the sound of His Word, I am rather sure that the evil and crafty foe (Satan) will find many, many ways to come into our paths.

We can read that an evil spirit went out of a man, but returned and found his former "house" clean and went in again with seven more devils. I am very fearful, dear ones, of that happening to those who neglect the assembling of themselves in the house of worship. Before we neglect this assembly, we should most prayerfully seek God's help, favor, and guidance. It is most serious, dear ones, and as in all problems there is only one solution: that is falling upon our knees before our God in prayer, seeking His guidance and direction.

I would like to share with you a thought that we heard this week from Bro. Akito. A comment that he made to us on Friday afternoon concerned entering the straight gate and the narrow way. He gave us (and I hope that you will all hear it on a tape in the future) a most wonderful exhortation.

If we are going to walk the narrow and straight way that leads to life eternal, we surely cannot take with us all the material and passing things which this life offers and our physical selves desire. We must set such things aside; we have to leave them; we have to forsake them. As we walk this narrow way, we cannot enjoy the pleasures of life that God has no

pleasure in. That is the broad way and, as Bro. Akito said, the "crooked" way that leads to destruction.

This very valuable teaching concludes with, "...and few there be that find it." Matt. 7:14. Is it not sad, dear ones, that in this land where knowledge is so great, few will find the way?

Yet, we are so thankful that we are permitted to go to and fro and to worship. I think about and pray many times for those in other lands who cannot gather freely to worship God. Have you ever thought about what you would do if you were denied that privilege? How would you act? We should thank and praise God this morning for the opportunity to gather here together.

Returning again to the fact that only a few, according to the Word, will find salvation, it is mentioned many times in the Old Testament that there were remnants who were true to God and to their calling. Are we a remnant today? Is our faith built upon the Solid Rock which will stand? Is it strong enough to hold when the wind blows and floods come and the waters rise?

Dear ones, I don't have to tell you that Satan brings trials into our lives. Regardless of the things that may test our faith, when we are built upon the Solid Rock, we shall stand. That is what the Word tells us. The Word is true and all will be completed according to the Word.

Many people today are endeavoring by the ability of man to build a doctrine of faith, a way of life, on other than the Solid Rock. It has to be, then, on the sinking sand. The Scripture tells us that there are only two ways. "Two ways, O man, are there for thee." There are only two destinations. Rgardless of what man tells you, there is no other way or destination. Our faith is built either upon the Solid Rock which will stand, or it is built upon sinking sand.

May God grant each and every one of us, brothers and sisters, that our faith be built upon the Solid Rock and that we hold fast all the days of our lives.

For our dear and precious friends who are with us this morning, may the exhortations be your invitation to build your faith upon the same Solid Rock and also gain the hope of eternal life.

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. ROBERT G. BEYER OF NAUMBURG, NY

Text: Genesis 28 and Matthew 7

Let us begin this morning with a sincere, upright, and honest prayer, thanking God that our precious faith is built upon the Solid Rock which is Jesus Christ and Him crucified

Paul teaches us that "If any man preach any other gospel unto you ... (but Jesus Christ and Him crucified) . .let him be accursed." Galatians 1:9.

God's promises are sure. They are

true. They are kept!

We read together of things which transpired many, many years ago. I trust that we all know, more or less, how God called to Himself a chosen people. He found an individual, Abraham, who had sufficient faith to believe that there was a great and mighty God in heaven who would provide all things according to His promise and to His word. God called Abraham and told him to go to another country; this man left his home, his family and his friends.

We read this morning of the renewing of the promise to Jacob that God had made to Abraham: "the land whereon thou liest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed." Gen. 28, 13. As we read through the Old Testament, we see how the people returned to this land. They were taken away and again returned.

When our Lord and Saviour was on earth, His people bitterly rejected Him, denied Him, and forsook Him. Within thirty or forty years they were again dispersed to the four corners of the world. The prophecy was fulfilled which He shared with His disciples during the last week of His life, that the city and temple in which the people took such great pride would "not be left one stone upon another.' Mark 13:2.

Sometimes it is hard for us to believe that such things can happen, but they do when it is prophecied in God's Word. There were totally, I believe, millions who did not flee to the hills when they had the

warning. They looked back, perhaps hoping for another opportunity, as did Lot's wife; their hearts, souls and minds (and evidently their trust) were in this world and they lost their lives.

Would we be willing to lose our lives this day for the sake of life eternal? Or would we want to save them, as they were trying to do, and then lose them for all eternity? We have this choice today. God did not compel us to come here this morning. You do not have to listen to the Word. You do not have to repent. You do not have to confess your sins. You do not have to find peace with God. You do not have to be baptized. You do not have to receive the Holy Ghost. You do not have to walk in His ways. No. He gives you the choice.

But He gives you the opportunity from the Word to follow the plan of salvation. Then you must do as we have read here. You have to seek. You have to knock. You have to look. But the comforting thing is that when you seek, or when you knock, or when you look, you can find. He will answer. He will provide. Is that not a tremendous promise, dear friends of the truth?

Those of us who have acquired this precious faith have found it to be that way. We came to the point in life where we had no hope; we knew that we were lost and realized that we were sinners in God's sight. We had the knowledge from the Word that we had no hope of eternal life. If we had departed from this life at that time, where would we have gone? Knowing these things and knowing the Word, when the still, small voice of conscience comes to us, perhaps in the assembly, in the stillness of the night, or in the fields, God is call-

We do not have to go to Jerusalem to the temple to worship. The woman at the well questioned our Lord and Saviour. She said "ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place . . . to worship." And the Samaritan's worship "in this mountain." The

Saviour told her that the time will come "when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father . . But . . .true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth." John 4:20, 21, 23.

I think, dear ones, that that is the way we are worshipping God -in truth and in Spirit. And the promises to Jacob about which we read this morning are given to us also. Oh, we have so much more to thank God for than Jacob had. He had only a glimpse of the promise of salvation that was to come to his children, his grandchildren, and "all the families of the earth." Gen.

We have lived on this side of calvary. We have lived since our Lord and Saviour fulfilled God's promise which was already made in the Garden of Eden. That is why we should be a most thankful people this morning. That is why we should be a most concerned people, not casually coming into our precious faith.

We have read here: "Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them." Matthew 7:20. This refers to the time after we have been called into God's service, after we have become His children. It is a time for us to grow, a time for us to bring forth fruits to be judged by.

We are also told here: "Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils. . ?" and we have done this and done that? Matthew 7:22. The next verse says, ". . . I never knew you: depart from me, ve that work iniquity."

We have a district obligation, dear brothers and sisters in faith. We have work to do here upon this earth. Some may be given only one talent; some, two; some five or more. But I can assure you, dear ones, from my knowledge and interpretation of the Scriptures, that there is not one individual who has not been given work to do.

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
