APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

On Oct. 1, 1980, it will be nine years since the Home for the Handicapped began its operation. Any success can be credited to our Heavenly Father's blessings, carried out through the hands and hearts of many.

In retrospect, many events and thoughts come to mind. Uppermost is all the physical and financial help which we have received from many who stood by us during these intervening years. Prayerfully, we reiterate with the Psalmist. "Do good, O Lord, unto those that be good. . ." (Psalm 125:4) There is no way we can express our gratitude properly, but intercessory prayer gives a sense of peace because we can rely upon our Heavenly Father to measure the gratefulness in our hearts and convey through His Spirit the riches of blessings. We beseech your continued support.

How wonderful is the privilege of prayer! The Lord's prayer, Christ's example, indicates a changed method of prayer from the time of the Mosaic law. At

that time there was no social worship in the Jewish temple. The priest went alone into the holy place, while the people stood outside. But in the Christian church. the worship of God is for all the people; and in private prayer, the word "OUR" suggests that our prayer is not acceptable if we come in a selfish spirit. By the grace of God, through faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ, we can address God as "FATHER." No longer is the temple priest needed as an intercessor on this earth. Jesus nows fills that position as the perfect intercessor. "WHICH ART IN HEAVEN. ..." In thought, our desires and affections leave this earth and ascend fervently to the heavens. "HALLOWED BE THY NAME..." With our spirits closely aligned with that of our Heavenly Father's, we are to treat the name of a holy God with a holy love and reverence. "THY KING-DOM COME. . ." This is a petition that God's reign of righteousness, peace and joy may be set up in our hearts now and that One Day it may be extended to the world beyond. "THY WILL BE DONE IN EARTH AS IT IS IN HEAV-EN" shows to us that God's laws have been devised to bring about the highest, ultimate good of all His creatures; and that in proportion as we obey this will is our true welfare promoted. When our will and the Father's are absolutely one, we shall know that all things work together for our good. "GIVE US THIS DAY OUR DAI-LY BREAD. . ." If we hallow God's name, submit to his reign and seek to do His will, then we can with confidence ask Him for the blessings which our natural life requires for its support and welfare. God gives us that for which we ourselves have to toil; not arbitrarily, but by wise and beneficent law; not all at once, but day by day. "FORGIVE US OUR DEBTS. AS WE FORGIVE OUR DEBTORS. . ." If we forgive others slowly, grudgingly, coldly, so shall we be treated. "AND LEAD US NOT INTO TEMPTATION. . . " It is by temptation that we are tried and educated; yet we are justified in praying to our Father not to lead us into temptation so long as we leave to His loving will the means by which our faith is to be strengthened and our spiritual life purifed and ennobled. We are not

to go willingly into temptation. Knowing God's power, we ask him to "DELIVER US FROM EVIL." That is in temptation, relying upon His promise that He will not suffer us to be tried above what we are able, but with every temptation will provide a way of escape. The doxology, "FOR THINE IS THE KINGDOM AND THE POW-ER AND THE GLORY, FOR-EVER" is an appropriate ending of the Lord's Prayer, giving us good grounds of encouragement to pray and at the same time ascribing all the praise to God. It is for His glory that all worship is carried on; therefore He will hear our prayers and will do for us exceedingly abundantly above all that we can ask or think.

me, a nobody, a lost sinner, just a little speck, a little nothing. But God loved me!

God cares for each person. We are all lost sinners without Jesus. I used to think, "Well, I don't believe I could really live a Christian life. I don't believe I could do all the things that Christians are supposed to do, and I certainly don't want to be a hypocrite." The world is filled with hypocrites today, with people who pretend. If anybody here today is a hypocrite, the Word says: "Woe unto you." Matthew 23: 13, 14, 15.

If you are a backbiter or if your life is filled with envy, hate, malice or any of the many things that ought not to be there, it's time for you to spend some hours in prayer. Confless your faults and make right that which is wrong. Don't wait until you stand before the Lord. It's going to be too late then.

When I repented, it was hard for me to stop some of the things that were wrong. But, by the grace of God, I was able to stop some of it. It's a continuing process as we go through life fighting the devil. He comes at us in so many ways. He usually attacks us in what would be considered our weaknesses.

Each of us has a weakness, haven't we? You know what yours is and I know what mine is. We know what sins we are most vulnerable to. But remember this: "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." I Corinthians 10:13.

Lots of you today are young Christians. It thrills my heart to see teenagers turning to the Lord. I was not a teenager; I was in my twenties. I know that you go through some troublesome times but the Lord always blesses you, doesn't He? He always lifts you up and the knowledge that you lack today will come with age, with experience, and with examples that are set before you by older sisters and brothers.

As we grow older, we must face our responsibilities to set these examples. We must make sure that we are on the Solid Rock, and not on sand. It is very important to have a good foundation. Without a good foundation the building does fall, doesn't it?

There is nothing greater in all the world, than the love of God. There is nothing more precious than the love of God. That love is the bond of all perfection.

People are trying to be happy today in many klifferent ways. That's what we all want, don't we? We long to be happy. Why is it then, that hospitals are filled with people who have nervous breakdowns? Why do so many people take sedatives of one kind or another? Why? The reasons vary and there are many, but usually it is because of failure to put trust and faith in God.

Recently, a lady who works where I do came to me and asked my opinion about a particular doctor in Athens, Dr. Penington is his name. I'm sure he'd be glad for me to mention his name this morning. She said that when she went to him, he checked her and

then laid his instruments down and said. "How do you stand with the Lord? Are you a Christian?" This was a shock to her. She couldn't believe that the doctor would ask her that.

It is a rather long story, but to make it short, she wanted to know what I thought about a doctor's giving advise on spiritual matters. He told her that what she needed more than anything else was to get her life straightened out spiritually. He had apparently found this out during their conversation.

Within the next few days, I was in the hospital and met Dr. Penington in the hall. I stopped him and thanked him for taking the time to talk to this person. In the next half hour or so, I got to know him pretty well because he told me how he treats his patients. He says that the biggest thing wrong with people today, in addition to actual body ailments, is simply their nerves and tension. He said that people must learn to release the tension that builds up. The nervous system, he says, must be relaxed. I am inclined to agree with him.

We don't spend enough time in prayer. We don't pray enough. We don't try hard enough to get closer to God. We come to church on Sunday and perhaps you come on Wednesday night. I hope you do . . . I encourage you to . . . I challenge you to take time on Wednesday night to come to church.

Read your Bibles. The Word says that we ought to study. Study the Word. Listen to the Word as it is preached. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

2 Timothy 2:15.

If somebody asks you, "What do I need to do to become a Christian?" what do you answer? What do you reply? Sometimes it is very hard to know what to say, but God expects us to let our lights shine. He expects us to "do unto others as we would have others do unto us." That is often referred to as "The Golden Rule." "As ye would that men should do to you. do ye also to them likewise." Luke 6:31.

Many people helped and encouraged me in so many ways to become a Christian. We, as God's people, should encourage others.

There is probably somebody here in this building, this hour, who would not go to heaven if he should die.

Sometimes we hesitate to talk about death. But death is real, isn't it? It's something that is coming to each one of us. We ought to welcome it with open arms because it is a blessing to leave this sinful world and go to be with the Lord, is it not? We should rejoice, really! Of course it leaves an empty place in our midst when a loved one is gone. But it is such a joy to go to be with the Lord!"

So, I ask you this morning to give yourself a challenge by simply asking yourself the most important question you'll ever think about: "If I died today, where would I spend eternity?" What does the blood of Jesus Christ mean to you? Do you ever take the time when you pray, to envision the Son of God, the Lord Jesus Christ, hanging on Calvary's cross and shedding His precious blood as He gave His life for you? And for me! And for every person in the entire world!

One night many years ago I woke from a dream in kind of a cold sweat. I had been dreaming about the Lord when He was in the Garden of Gethsemane. We had been reading and studying about how He prayed and His sweat became drops of blood. (Luke 22:44). What anguish He must have gone through! He didn't want to die; we can believe that. He prayed three times for the cup of death to be removed from Him, but He added, "nevertheless not my will but thine, be done." Luke 22:42. "Not My own will, but Your will," He prayed to God.

Many times we are indifferent and selfish. Many times we express our feelings, saying what we like and what we don't like. What we ought to do is live with the attitude: "Lord, here I am. Take me, use me and do with me whatever You choose. Take me, Lord, mold me and make me. Help me to be whatever You want me

Indifference and pride can be the downfall of man. Pride should be very limited in all of our lives. The disciples once asked Jesus: "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" Matt. 18:1. His

reply was that whoever was hum-

ble would be the greatest.

Why do you think God wants each of us to be a servant? When we are all servants, we are all equal, aren't we? That's what we are. We are all servants of God and we are all equal. God cares just as much for the white person as He does for the black, and vice versa. He cares just as much for the rich as He does for the poor, and vice versa. We read this very simple message in the first few verses of this chapter.

How simple the plan of salvation is! Why do people make it so complicated when it is so simple? The love of God. Is there anything in the world more simple than love? Love is a universal language. There are many places I have never been or may never go, but I am confident that wherever I might be in this world, I would understand the language of love.

Many of us have animals. Maybe you've got a little dog. Did you ever watch how that little dog wags its tail? That little dog can't speak to you, but if that little tail is wagging, that little dog is saying, "I love you." Kind of foolish?

Well, maybe. But it is real.

Did you ever look into the eyes of a baby? A little innocent baby those pretty eyes. They look at you and they stare straight at you; their eyes don't water, they don't blink, and they don't get nervous. Lots of people can't look you straight in the eye. They have to look away or their eyes will water or they will blink. Why is that? Because there has been some measure of sin in all of our lives. But there is no sin in the life of that little baby. To look into the eyes of an innocent baby is a wonderful thing. The word says that we all must become humble, as a little child, if we are to inherit the kingdom of God.

"Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful." Luke 6:36. Love your enemies. Do Good. Do unto others as you would have others do unto you.

May God bless the Word that we have read together this morning. This was quite a lengthy reading and I encourage you to read it again. Study it. Go over it. Search out the deep meaning which is here that we've certainly not touched upon this morning. May the Lord bless you.

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. LAVOYD MOORE OF ATHENS, AL

Reading: Luke 6:20-49

This chapter in St. Luke's gospel is long, but it is filled with many teachings that are precious, teachings which are easy to understand but so simple that perhaps we fail to grasp them.

We are instructed to examine our own lives and to judge ourselves. Perhaps one of the hardest things to do is simply to be honest with ourselves, to look into the

"mirror" and face reality.

Too many people in the world today rush around so fast that they forget how to be happy. I appreciated last night, so very much, being with a number of you, and sharing the joy and fellowship which we had together. I wish each person here could have been with us last night. There is nothing more precious than fellowship. As we wait for our Lord to come back, we need each other; we need the strength and the help of our brothers and sisters in faith. It's awfully easy to be neglectful.

I recently read an article in a Detroit newspaper about an elderly man who fell. (Maybe some of you read this). The man fell, apparently hitting his head, and was hurt badly. He lay there for about fifteen minutes or so, and people walked around him. Some actually stepped over him, but nobody stopped to help. No one wanted to get involved. Finally, a person did stop and in the next several minutes an ambulance was called; but the man died before he arrived at

the hospital.

Can we imagine people actually stepping over an injured person lying on a sidewalk? Stepping around a person who is hurt? Because they don't want to get involved? We think that's terrible, and it is.

But, perhaps we do things that are even worse. We step around and over somebody who is dying spiritually. The world is filled with people who are dying spiritually.

Do we ignore those people? Are

we afraid to get involved with those people? Are we? Do we let our love-light shine? How bright is the beam that is being radiated from you and me? How far out does it reach? What do people see when they look at us? When they hear us? What kind of testimony do we give in our daily lives? What kind of words do we speak? What attitude do we express?

The Word says: "Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you... pray for them which disspitefully use you." Luke 6:27, 28. This is not easy. It's not easy because we are weak. "The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." Matt. 26:41.

It's been about twenty years in fact it was in 1960-when I first met an individual who was a member of the Apostolic Christian Church. Prior to that, I knew nothing of our faith. As I think back, I ask myself today, "What was it?" What was it that made me interested? How did it come to be that I am a member of this church today? It's really very simple. Somebody cared. Somebody let his lovelight shine. Somebody did more than just speak a few words. It's one thing to speak words; it's another thing to live accordingly. The Word says: "To him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin." James 4:17.

One of my favorite verses tells us: "Happy is he that condemneth not himself in that thing which he alloweth." Romans 14:22.

Let me ask you some questions this morning. Is there anything in your life which you are allowing that you don't feel good about? Is it wrong? Is it sinful? Do you ever find yourself saying words that are harsh? Do you every say something and then, almost immediately, realize that it was wrong and wish you had not said it? If you experience that feeling, perhaps it is good. But if you speak words that are harsh, if you speak words that are wrong, and you feel no

guilt or sorrow, then what is wrong? In the life of God's people, there cannot be sinful attitudes.

I cannot fully put into words the feeling, the joy and the happiness, of becoming a Christian. As we worship God this morning, I know that many of you are much older than I am, and you could tell me more about living for the Lord than I have ever experienced. But, perhaps there is someone here who would have to admit that he is not ready to meet the Lord.

People talk about the end of the world. People talk about the end of life. From the time we are born, as each day goes by, we are all slowly dying, aren't we? We are all getting closer to the time when

we will meet the Lord.

Frequently I pray that the Lord will come back soon. Oftentimes it is hard to wait when the stresses of life and the troubles of the world are pressed upon us. Then, just when we think we can't bear any more, the Lord takes over. It's a comfort to know and to believe without doubt that God will not put upon any of us a greater burden than we can withstand.

Before I became a Christian, as I said, I knew nothing of our faith. I knew nothing of many things that I am aware of today. Nevertheless, I became a Christian. How did it happen? It happened by faith. It happened because of love, the love of God as He reached down and touched me. He touched my heart and He made me realize what sin really was.

Until you realize what sin is, you won't be a Christian. Until you experience the guidance and direction of the Holy Spirit, you're not a Christian. The Spirit of God bears witness with your spirit when you become a child of God.

There are many things in my life for which I am thankful. Right on top of the list is the love of God. I am thankful that God loved
