WHAT IS COVETOUSNESS?

(Are we guilty of this dreadful sin?)

In I Cor. 6, we find covetousness listed along with fornication, adultery, and drunkeness, with only a comma between. Men who are guilty of these practices shall not inherit the kingdom of God. In Col. 3:5, we read that covetousness is idolatry, and in I John 5:21, that children of God should keep themselves from idols.

The dictionary defines covetousness as an unrestained desire for something that another person has. In the seven woes of the 5th chapter of Isaiah, verse 8, we read, "Woe unto them that join house to house, that lay field to field, until there be no place that they may be placed alone in the midst of the earth." The Scripture warns against emulations in Gal. 5:20. Webster defines emulations as the desire to equal or surpass, or rivalry. "Let us not be desirous of vain glory, provoking one another, envying one another." (Gal. 5:26) "The love of money is the root of all evil, which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith and pierced themselves through with many sorrows." (I Tim. 6:10)

In the "Sermon on the Mount," Matt. 6:24, Jesus said, "Ye cannot serve God and mammon." Mammon is defined as riches regarded as an object of worship and the greedy pursuit thereof. In Philippins 4:5, we read, "Let your moderation be known unto all men." The dictionary lists moderation as the avoidance of extremes; not being excessive. As a believer in Christ who wishes to have a part in the first resurrection and who expects to leave this earth, perhaps without a moment's notice, should our life-style be one of os-

tentatious display? "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him." (I John 2:15) The rich young ruler who came to Jesus asking what he could do to inherit eternal life went away sorrowful. Though he was of sterling character, he had a covetous heart, and the Scripture does not relate that he ever "sold out," distributed to the poor, and followed Jesus.

The antonym for covetousness is generosity. In Ezek. 16:49, we read the pridefullness of bread. and abundance of idleness (leisure time) was the beginning of the downfall of the proud city of Sodom; and the prophet also said that Sodom did not strengthen the hand of the poor and needy. In I Tim. 6:17, we are charged that if God blesses the labors of our hands, and if our herds and flocks are multiplied, and if our silver and gold is multiplied (Deut. 8: 13), we are not to be highminded nor trust in these riches. They are temporary at best (Ps. 62:10). We ARE to trust in the living God for it is He that giveth man the power to get wealth (Deut. 8:18,19). We ARE to do good and distribute and share with the needy. Psalm 41 lists certain promises to those who remember the poor.

In tithing and charitable giving, we find the only true tax shelter for the believer (we can deduct up to 50% of our income). In I Tim. 6:19, Paul says we will be laying up in store for ourselves a good foundation against the time to come, and will lay hold on eternal life. And finally, Jesus Himself tells us in the "Sermon on the Mount," "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal; but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.' (Matt. 6:19-21).

If we are truly interested in treasures in heaven, it will not concern us who has the finest car, the largest tractor, the biggest farm, or the most opulent home. We will hardly notice because we will be about our Father's busi-

THE SEPARATOR

Some of our brethren from Oregon own a piece of property on the coast which they have named "The Restless Surf." The property includes a three-story house. Emphasis is placed on the giant cedar trees in the area, the ceaseless pounding of the waves against the nearby coast, and the whales which spout offshore, all wonderful things of God's creation for us to enjoy. However, I was intrigued by an old cream separator which stands in the corner of one room of the house. It is clearly marked, DeLaval No. 15. It has a rather large handle on which is written "48 revolutions per minute."

My mind went back many years. As a small boy I stretched myself tall to turn the handle of a similar separator to its apex, or highest position, and then on around to separate the cream from the skim milk on my parents' dairy farm in Illinois. My dad had poured the whole milk into a large bowl at the top of the separator; the cream came out one spout while the skim milk came out another. We sold the cream but in those days, for some strange reason, we fed the skim milk to our pigs instead of saving it for human consumption.

"And before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats." Matt. 25:32. Christ speaks of separating the sheep from the goats. The sheep hear the words, ". . . inherit the kingdom," while the goats hear the words, "... Depart... into everlasting fire." That separation is final, and for the goats it is an eternal tragedy. It isn't necessary.

In Matt. 24:40, we read, "Then shall two be in the field: the one shall be taken, and the other left." This is an explanation of what will happen at the coming of the Son of man, the Lord Jesus Christ. If both of the people in the field were ready to meet the Lord, there would be no separation. They would both be taken to be forever with the Lord.

If you ever have the opportunity to visit "The Restless Surf," please take note of the DeLaval separator, and may it remind you of the great Separator, the Lord Jesus Christ. He calls us now to serve Him together that we might be spared that final separation with all its heart-rending, eternal consequences. He wants us to be cream, not skim milk; sheep, not goats; to be taken, not left. That's why He died for us.

"Woe unto thee, Chorazin! woe unto thee, Bethsaida! for if the mighty works which were done in you, had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes" (Mt. 11:21). Many times I have

read this verse and impatiently questioned why Jesus didn't go to Tyre and Sidon instead of going to Chorazin and Bethsaida. If Tyre and Sidon would have repented had Jesus performed His mighty works in those cities, why wasn't Jesus there to meet their needs? I have finally received an answer to my questioning.

The answer comes through understanding Jesus' mission here on the earth. God's sovereign purpose was for Christ to be sent first to the house of Israel: "But he answered and said, 'I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel'" (Mt. 15:24).

Jesus instructed His twelve disciples with the same goal: "These twelve Jesus sent forth, and commanded them, saying, 'Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not: But go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel'" (Mt. 10:5,6).

Tyre and Sidon, prominent Phoenician cities, were located on the coast of the Mediterranean. At the time of Christ their inhabitants were mostly of Greek origin. Chorazin and Bethsaida were two cities very close to the larger city of Capernaum. Capernaum was the home of Jesus and it was of the house of Israel. Therefore it was God's sovereign purpose for Jesus to reach the people of Chorazin and Bethsaida. The people of Tyre and Sidon were not of Israel.

Now, even though Jesus was to reach the lost sheep of Israel, any individual could have the opportunity to receive salvation through Him. As John 1:11,12 records: "He came unto his own, and his own received him not. But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name."

This is exemplified through the woman of Canaan who asked a miracle of Jesus while He was on the coasts of Tyre and Sidon. The woman seemed to understand that His mission was to Israel. She said, "The dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table" (Mt. 15:27) as she pleaded with Him to heal her daughter. Jesus replied, "O woman, great is thy faith," and her daughter was healed.

Converting such cities as Tyre

and Sidon became the purpose of the New Testament church. When Christ's holy mission was accomplished, Jesus assembled with His apostles. He instructed them that the message of the Messianic kingdom of heaven, to which the house of Israel was originally heir, was to be taught "both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and to the uttermost part of the earth" (Acts 1:8). From the 4th of July to Dec. 31, he and 100 other brothers and sisters were baptized in a trough in the churchyard with water pumped from the well beside the church. There were testimonies and baptisms every weekend (and sometimes during the week) during that six month period.

Bro. John's father came to this country at the age of 17 (around 1876). At that time, brothers were coming to the U.S. to avoid the required combat military service in the old country. He came from the Alsace Lorraine area, a French territory, which had only recently been taken over by the Germans. Bro. John remembers his father telling him how during the takeover, he went to school one day and had a French teacher. The next day he walked into the school house and found that he had a German teacher.

Bro. John was born in 1889 to Bro. Michael and Sis. Lydia (Hartman) Mangold. He had three brothers, Joe, Ezra, and David. Bro. John remembers most of his single years at home, helping on the farm. After the traditionally late dinner hour, he remembered gathering with the family to read Scriptures. They all took turns reading, and usually it was in German. German was taught in the school as well as in church.

In 1914. Bro. John married Sis. Anna Schumacher. They had two children, Kathyrn (Hodel) and Curtis. Three other children died in infancy. Curtis was killed in a construction accident in Arizona in 1959. Family life, he recalled, was centered more around the home in those days. He thought that it was because of the time it took to travel anywhere. He remembers some good times on the old country roads in his Model T. He smiled as he remembered out loud how he used to get stuck with it in knee-deep mud on some

of the old back roads.

Bro. John was in charge of the Brotherhood Aid of the church for about 40 years. This involved storm, fire and flood coverage. He recalled a visit to Oakville, IA, to check flood damage caused by the Mississippi River. The water was so high that he stood on the levy and saw a house in a lake of water with a horse on the porch.

His wife passed away in May, 1976. He remained in his home and cared for the house and garden. He drove his car until he moved to the Roanoke Apostolic Home in July, 1979. John's favorite pleasures and blessings of life were derived from visiting folks, traveling and farming. He's not able to do these things anymore. When we asked him if he ever wishes he were back on the farm, he replied, "No. no. there's a time for everything."

TEACH TENDER AND YOUNG (Reprinted from the March, 1964, issue) Elder Bro. William Stettner Elgin, Illinois

I Jn. 3:1: "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God: Therefore, the world knoweth us not, because it knew him not.'

I Jn. 3:8: "He that committeth sin is of the devil: for the devil sinneth from the beginning. For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil.'

I Jn. 3:9:"Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin, because he is born of God."

... he cannot sin" means he will not sin because that would be an evil deed in the sight of God. The seed which was planted in him has taught him to stay away from sin. We have examples in the Old and New Testaments of those whom sinful people tried to force to commit sin.

Let us refer to Joseph who in his early years was brought into Egypt and served in the house of

Potiphar.

Joseph was a goodly person. And it came to pass that his master's wife cast her eyes upon him, and tried to lead him into sin. But he refused, and said, "How can I do such a great wickedness and sin against God? No, that would be a great sin: I cannot do that.'

Here, we can see that the good seed which was planted into his young and tender heart from his God-fearing father was still with him, even though he was far away from his home and father's house. So, the real meaning of "cannot sin" means will not sin.

Now, we have another striking, good example from Daniel. Dan. 6:4: "Then the presidents and princes sought to find occasion against Daniel concerning the kingdom; but they could find none occasion or fault; forasmuch as he was faithful in all, neither was there any error or fault in him."

Then those wicked men said, we shall find occasion against Daniel, except it be concerning the law

of his God. We know the story, how these wicked men went to King Darius and trapped him, by subtlety, to sign a oyal decree which stated that wh soever "shall ask a petition of and God or man within thirty days, save of thee, O king, shall be cast into the den of lions . . . "

So the king signed the decree, not totally knowing what he was doing. "Now when Daniel knew that the writing was signed, he went into his house; and his wndows being open in his chamber toward Jerusalem, he kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks before his God, as he did aforetime." Dan. 6:10.

Here again, we can see that the good seed which was planted in him in his early youth remained in him, and he could say, "No, I cannot stop praying to my God. No, I can't stop praying to my God. I will not stop praying to my God"

Again, we hav another wonderful example from three young men, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who were taken from the land of Judah and brought in to the great wicked city of Babylon where the king and the people lived in terrible sins and worshipped idols.

"Nebuchadnezzar the king made an image of gold, whose height was threescore cubits, and the breadth thereof six cubits: he set it up in the plain of Dura, in the province of Babylon." Dan. 3:1.

He commanded all the people. when they heard the sound of music, to fall down and worship this great image, and whoever would not worship the image would in the same hour be cast into the midst of the burning, fiery furnace.

Now, these three young men, who also were brought up and taught in their early youth to fear God and worship Him alone and no false god, retained the seed which was planted into their young hearts. They said that they could not worship the idol, would not commit such a sin against their God. "If it be so, our God whom we we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace, and . . . out of thine hand . . . But if not, be it known unto thee, O king, that we will not serve thy gods, nor worship the golden image . . . Dan. 3:17, 18.

So, it's well if all parents teach

their children to fear and love God while their hearts are tender and young. When children grow up, for a time we may not see the good fruits which we wish to see. Often the good seed takes new root, comes to life again, and becomes fruitful.

May God bless all the good seed which is sown in the homes and in Sunday School, in the hearts of our children. May they give the increase to their salvation, and may it all be to the glory of God.

same "metal" as He, the same Spirit of God which we received at the time of our conversion, will be drawn by Jesus from the confusions, turmoils, and troubles of this life as a magnet would draw the steel pieces from the chaff, hay, or straw.

The questions then arise, "Are we living in communion with our Saviour, our God, from day to day? Have we retained a cleansed conscience with the assurance of sins forgiven since the day that we sought Him?" We may ask ourselves the questions, "Has my love grown or has it decreased? Do I love the brethren as much as I used to, or do I love them more?"

David said in the nineteenth Psalm, "Who can understand his errors? Cleanse thou me from secret faults." And the apostle Paul said, "Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith." II Cor. 13:5. We do that individually, dear ones. We are not told to examine one another but to examine ourselves. But how blessed is the day of grace that allows us, if we have failed in any way, to apply our hearts more earnestly. For, "Can we our imperfections see without a humble sigh; should we neglect God's precious word and lightly pass it by."

Who among us can boast that he has achieved or attained all that he wishes to attain? How precious is each new allotted day of grace to yet do something for His name's sake. Not that you or I would want only to heap up good works in great abundance, for we cannot be saved by good works, dear ones. But the Scripture says that we are saved unto good works. After we have found this saving grace, have been accepted by Jesus, and have felt His pardoning grace, then indeed we are saved unto good works. However, we should not remember every deed that we do, but rather forget them and leave them in God's hands; then He may put some reward on it if it is His will.

Some time ago, I read an article that greatly impressed me. It was just a dream that a man had, but it taught an obvious lesson. In the dream, a man thought that if he would do many good works it would be just like constructing a ladder to heaven. Each good deed that he

would do would place one new rung upon the ladder, or on some days several good deeds would build two or three new rungs. Finally, after years of good works, the ladder reached to the floor of heaven. As he approached, expecting to enter, a voice said, "Unless you enter in at the straight gate you are as a thief or a robber." He said to himself, "Well, I haven't entered in at the straight gate." At that, the ladder crashed back to earth because he had remembered his works, but he had not learned to know Him whom you and I have learned to know. Knowing the Lord is eternal life.

Dear ones, there may be some among us who would say, "If I live a good life and do many good deeds, my chances of being saved ought to be pretty good." But that is a great fallacy. God sent forth a wonderful Offering from the heavenly realm to this world. Unless we know and love Him (the Offering), we cannot be saved, for Christ Jesus is the gate.

Good works are commendable (they will keep you out of the clutches of the law), but good works cannot save you, dear ones. When we ourselves thought over our good works at the time of our conversion and also thought over our evil works, the evil greatly overbalanced the good and we were moved to fail at the feet of Jesus. We have read beautiful words about Him today and confess our need to pray the simple prayer of the pentitent publican, "God be merciful to me a sinner." Luke 18:13. The prayer was not long or high sounding, but when it was offered in sincerity, the ears of God were attentive. Today God's ears are still open to the prayers of the righteous and He looks upon those who pray to Him; but His face is against those who do

Jesus told His disciples many things when they were together, and we read today, "these things have I told you, that when the time shall come, ye may remember that I told you of them. And these things I said not unto you at the beginning, because I was with you. But now I go my way to him that sent me; and none of you asketh me, Wither goest thou?" John 16: 4, 5. Jesus in more than one instance said that some things which

He had taught His disciples were not clear at that time, but would be remembered and understood later.

This happened concerning His death. He had told the disciples plainly that He must go to Jerusalem and that He would become the Great Passover. This was hard for them to believe and grasp, but after it came to pass they remembered His words.

Other things will come to pass and we or those to come will know that the Lord's words have been fulfilled. We can read in another chapter of something which is more timely today than ever. Jesus said, "Then shall two be in the field; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Two women shall be grinding at the mill; the one shall be taken, and the other left." Mt. 24:40, 41. Where shall they be taken? According to our weak understanding (I believe most of our brethren will agree), that will be the harvest time of the saints, and the unbelieving will be left behind. Then they will remember that Jeus said that some would be taken and others left. The awful reality of this will dawn upon the world on the morn after the first resurrection. That will be the saddest day of all the ages when loved ones are taken and others are left behind. We must search our own hearts. Will we be taken, or will we be left?

What a wonderful opportunity it is as we gather in the house of God to be reminded of our faults and shortcomings. Then our hearts may be so softened through prayer, singing, and the meditation that if we have erred or grieved someone, the Spirit might move us to bring forth the necessary reconciling measure. We read that God has given us the ministry of reconciliation. That means a great deal. I wonder if we always apply it. He has told and even commanded that we should be reconciled with each other whether the dispute is between husband and wife, children and parents, or even friends and neighbors. It might even be that we have grieved a nighbor who is not of our particular faith. Should we let that go unchanged or say, "Why does it make any difference? He isn't of our faith, so I can do as I wish or think." Not so! He might be the

very one whom you might win to the faith by your willingness to make reconciliation. There are many obligations facing you and me, dear ones.

Are we to pray only for ourselves? No, that would be selfish. We sing in a song that not only for ourselves we are pleading, but for many others, beginning with our unconverted children. The thought frightens us that unconverted children might be left behind and our grandchildren with them. Sometimes we hear brethren say, "Well, the times indeed are evil, but that doesn't concern me: I feel secure and safe." I can't feel that way, brethren. Think of the many loved ones in the family circle. Yes, we have the assurance that we belong to the Lord and that He is ours, but how can we make such a light statement when it involves so many loved ones who are not saved?

If there ever was a time when this country should fall upon its knees, it is now, dear ones, because of the impending threat that this nation could become engulfed in the most dreadful of all wars. We should not say carelessly that we are not afraid. I am afraid because of the many dear ones who may suffer under such a conflict and in the aftermath of war. In Korea there were 200,000 war orphans, children who wandered hither and thither. Records state that many saved their lives through the cold winter by lying down and cuddling up to a cow or horse, drawing heat from the animals' bodies for survival. Can you imagine your dear grandchildren going through anything like that? It would make our hearts bleed, wouldn't it? Most fathers' and mothers' hearts are touched when children suffer, and so we should all be concerned, dear ones, prayerfully concerned.

Christains in this country, especially, ought to pray on bended knees that God would postpone or change the enemy's intentions (if we dare to call them enemies, for we are to pray also for our enemies). Then there might be an extension of the day of grace so that you and I can become more fully prepared. We want to look upon Jesus at His coming with joy and confidence and be numbered with those dear ones worthy to be saved.

SERMON BY BRO. HENRY BEER OF MILFORD, IN

As we approached the assembly, dear ones, the thought came to me that although the weather without is very unpleasant, we can find warmth and comfort when we gather in the house of prayer, and worship with those whom we know and love. We forget about the outside weather, do we not, when we enjoy the fellowship of those who are His children. With such we wish to spend the ages of eternity, looking together to Him who is the Author and the Finisher of our salvation.

Wonderful promises are found in this one Book of all books. How much is contained between the covers! It contains the mind and the will, the thought and the plan of God for the universe. In it we can find comfort as it directs us to its central figure. Many books have a central figure, or hero, but in this Book we have Jesus Christ, the Son of God. He came forth from the "Ivory Palaces" twenty centuries ago to save those who followed Him, and to give the opportunity of salvation to those who had died in the preceeding centuries.

How gracious, how wonderful, how merciful is such a Saviour who remembers the dead as well as the living. For we read that after His death on Calvary's cross, though His body lay in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathaea, His Spirit "descended first into the lower parts of the earth" (Eph. 4:9) where He carried the message of salvation. How wonderful it must have been when He brought the message for which kings and prophets had sighed.

Nearly twenty centuries have elapsed, dear ones, in which countless millions of people have been born and have died. Alas, we fear that many of them have not learned to know Him who first loved them. But we believe that in each generation there have been those who have loved the Lord Jesus so that some fruit and some grain has been brought forth.

Whenever grain has grown into a fruitful harvest, the next thought is to gather it in. Do we not, brethren, feel that we are approaching that great harvest time when Jesus will come "in the clouds with great power and glory?" Mk. 13:26. We also read that "the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air." I Thes. 4:16, 17. That will be a momentous moment and it seems (do vou feel thus?) that that is the next thing on God's calendar.

Important days are often written in red letters on the calendar, and we fix our eyes on this or that date as a coming event. Though e do not know the day nor the hour of our Lord's return, let us not be deceived and think that we can just go on thoughtlessly living for ourselves and accumulating possessions. Jesus also said, "Ye hypocrites, ye can discern the face of the sky; but can ye not discern the signs of the times?" Are we not aware that we are approaching eventful times? We are conscious of this because the powers of the earth are pitted against each other, "Nation against nation, and kingdom against kingdom."

We know that nations have often been pitted against each other in dreadful warfare which has engulfed millions in death. The aftermath of such conflicts has caused old and young to suffer, leaving countless thousands of orphaned children.

On the other hand, we might interpret "kingdoms" as conflicting principles of government. Much of the world today is behind the "iron curtain" where the reading of God's Word is greatly suppressed. It has come to us from reliable sources, brethren, that no Sunday school or Bible instruction is given or permitted to be given to children under the age of eighteen. They say that if they can teach the chil-

dren through age eighteen, their formative years, then the young people will always follow their teachings, that evil system which is God-defying Communism. The Communist leaders contend that they can drive out Christian religion from the roots, just as you would injure the root system of a tree. They believe that Christianity would actually wither. It is something to think about.

This all works into the plan of the coming antichrist. For we read, "that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first . . II Thes. 2:3. The Lord will not come until there is a great falling away, and since half of the world is already denying the existence of God and permission to preach the Word is forbidden, we may well sit up and think. Not only individuals are falling away, having a form of righteousness but denying the power of the saving grace of Jesus, but whole nations are forbidden to worship as we are doing this evening. The trend is a great falling away, nation wide.

I often think, dear ones, of one of our precious hymns which says, "Jesus as a magnet raises our faint spirit to the sky." We all know what a magnet is, do we not? It is metal which has a strong attraction or pull in it. The author used that comparison and it is a beautiful thought. If you or I were to scatter ashes, wood shavings, straw, or hay upon a table and mix in with it certain kinds of metals including steel, and would then run a magnet over it, the magnet would pull out only those things which were of like substance, would it not? The hay, straw, and the false metallic substances would remain there, although they might look very much like a real piece of steel; only that which has the same composition as the magnet would be drawn out.

This will happen when Jesus comes. Only those who have the (Continued on page 26)
