The history of Christ's birth is not new to most of us. We have been taught about it from childhood up... But isn't it refreshing to read it over and over again?

How wonderful it is to read the prophecies in the Old Testament. În Îsaiah 9:6,7 we read, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this.'

Thus did the prophet foretell the coming of the Saviour to the world. He used these good titles. "Prince of Peace," which He is, and has become by being our Saviour, giving us peace after a true repentance. People often don't understand why we don't have peace here on earth. We have peace now in our hearts, if we have repented, but peace in the world will not be until He, Himself, comes here to reign in the mellenium.

In John 1:10,11 He tells us, "He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not.

He came unto his own, and his own received him not." All this is already true.

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given . . ." We cannot switch this around and say, unto us a child is given, unto us a son is born. Here we are told of the virgin birth of the Prince of Peace.

In the Gospel of John we are told, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."

"The same was in the beginning with God"... "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us..."

We don't fully understand this, but it is a marvelous way in which God became incarnate. God became flesh in the form of the baby, Christ. He was born of the seed of the woman, entirely free from the man. This was prophesied in Isaiah 7, verse 14. "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Immanuel means God with us.

We must continually warn against the new revised version of the Bible, which was sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches, who try to change the great truths —including the virgin birth, which they deny. In this new version, they have in Isaiah 7, verse 14, a young woman shall conceive a son. This is a fearful change, from virgin to young woman. A young woman would be no sign. Multitudes of young women have conceived, but never before did a virgin conceive. Only this way could God become man. The Saviour was born of a virgin. That is how He could be perfect (sinless). He had no human father: Joseph knew not Mary until she had brought forth her first son. Matthew 1:25

The prophecy of Isaiah 7, verse 14 is restated in Matthew 1:20 "... Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is con-

ceived in her is of the Holy Ghost." It is proof that Mary was then a virgin, for she had known no man. He had no sin; He went to the cross for us, and took upon Him all our sins.

No wonder Christmas night was a "Holy Night." That night our Saviour was born. Thus was fulfilled the promise to Eve that her seed (CHRIST) would bruise the serpent's head. It is true that the important time of Christ's life was His crucifixion, but He had to be born into this world . . So let us rejoice in this Christmas season, because our Saviour was born. What a great gift God gave to us, in His only Son. If we now believe and repent and our sins are washed away, we have eternal life. Oh HO-LY NIGHT WHEN CHRIST WAS BORN. There were some humble people, like the shepherds who re-ceived Him. Strangers, wise men, from the East came; they were led by a star to Jesus. When they found Jesus, they worshipped Him and gave Him three kinds of gifts, gold, frankincense, and myrrh. All these gifts had prophetic meanings. Gold prophecies of kingship, and predicted that Christ would become a King. He will be a king in the millenium when He will be King over all the world. Incense is what the High Priest offered. This gift of frankincense predicted that Christ would be a High Priest. Now He is at God's right hand, making intercessions for us. Myrrh was a material used to embalm the dead. Christ's death was predicted, and came to pass almost 2000 years ago. The prediction of the gift of gold is left to be fulfilled.

May this be a very Blessed CHRISTMAS.

HERITAGE OF AMERICAN YOUTH

We are the heirs apparent of all that has been accomplished, all that man has done to improve his lot, and the world in which he lives. But our inheritance is not wholly golden. Today we face the greatest challenge history has known. Great political philosophers are in head on collision; a mad race is on for supremacy of munitions and instruments of destruction; fear grips every heart; and the marketplace bids for the minds and souls of men.

When Jesus came to bring a new philosophy of life, by which people might live better and happier lives, they reviled Him, spat upon Him, criticized Him, found fault with Him, and when they could not put an end to His teachings, they put Him to death.

When our Founding Fathers adopted the Constitution of the United States of America, here was a group of 13 underpopulated, undernourished, backward colonies attempting to unite into an harmonious and prosperous nation. Again people found fault and were ready to predict that this new republic could never make the grade.

Today we stand at a crossroad in the history of our great nation. The time has come when we must act, not defer; when we must lead, not follow; when we must speak, not listen; when we must unite, not divide. In this crisis, we have at our command the strength, the courage, and the inspiration which lay in the faith of our founding fathers. Men who signed the constitution, men and women who braved the prairie and the mountain to pioneer our land, lived and died by faith in God.

What about our faith? Let us remember that, down through the ages, faith in God has been an all powerful force in the lives of men. It has been a never failing source of strength in time of trouble.

Let us remember too, that all of the great and lasting monuments of civilization have been dedicated to, and founded upon, faith in a supreme power.

When our Pilgrim fathers waded onto the shores of New England,

there was no government ready to give them aid, comfort or support. All they had to sustain them was a deep and abiding faith, that was sufficient. Their voices rang through the hills with the great songs of faith.

We shutter today when we hear the songs over the air, compared to the songs of faith of long ago. This faith has given us strength when we faltered, courage when we were afraid, unity when we were divided. As the Psalmist wrote, "in what time I was afraid, I trusted in God."

Between the America of yesterday, and the America of tomorrow, stands our generation. To us has fallen the duty to preserve. By looking to God, by dedicating ourselves to His teachings, we and our children can be filled with renewed and strengthened faith.

The scriptures remind us that, as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he. This Biblical admonition tells us that we cannot think in terms of failure, and then succeed, in terms of weakness, and then be strong, in terms of fear, and then be courageous, in terms of doubt, and then have faith.

So the United States was born, fathered by men who considered death preferable to loss of liberty.

So our faith was born by fathers of faith, who chose death, and burned at the stake, or sawn assunder, cast into prison, and chose death rather than give up the faith.

In 1912 the call went out that the great Titanic struck an iceberg and sank. The staggering fact is not that the ship went down, but after continued warning of danger ahead, the band played on, and dancing continued, nobody caring that there was ice ahead.

Today warnings are sent out, and people continue to sing silly songs, up to the moment, when we should be singing "Nearer My God to Thee."

Only 700 and some souls were rescued, and 1502 drowned. Noah's Ark stood the storm, but only 8

souls were saved. Only two of God's servants were spared to lead the children of Israel into the Promised Land. And only half of the ten virgins reached heaven. What will eternity hold for this generation? It is high time to awake.

Our generation will face the future with the same grim determination, sacrifice and sacred dedication to our Founding Fathers, which makes this country "the land of the free and the home of the brave."

In closing I want to add this poem.

ARE ALL THE CHILDREN IN?

I think ofttimes as the night draws nigh

Of an old house on the hill,
Of a yard all wide and blossomed
starred

Where the children played at will.

And when the night at last came down

At one point, two of them were fighting about something and Sue just simply said, "Either work it out or you are going to have to leave the counter." They evidently felt it worthwhile to pay the price of "give and take" to get along because it is a half hour later and they are all still up there and at it.

A day before Thanksgiving, I leafed through the concordance and found an appropriate verse to write on our blackboard. As I wrote, Dawn read, "It is a good thing to give thanks . . . ", but before she finished, Gary Lee walked in and then out of the room ,quoting the remainder, "... unto the Lord. Psalm 92:1." In amazement I turned my head and pursued him down the hall asking, "How did you know that?" Immediately the guide rushed back, grasped him by the collar, and with no gentle hand dragged him back. Then he pointed to a patch of snow upon which the man had intended to walk. Instead of being a sure foothold, it was a mere crust of ice covering a great crevasse opening into the deep recess of the glacier. The short cut would have been disaster. So, too, sometimes our Heavenly Shepherd seems to be leading us too slow, but it is much better to take the detours with Him than to take the short cuts without Him.

How wonderful He can also comfort those who mourn the loss of loved ones. We extend our sympathy to Beulah Sauder in the passing of her brother and to Wilma Sauder McCutchen in the passing of her husband. We are also saddened at the departure of Sis. Theresa Kissel, 88, who died on Nov. 8 of a stroke. She is survived by two sons, Raymond and Carl Kissel. We will miss her presence in our midst.

We are happy to report that Sis. Naomi Cordrey has been released from the hospital after having been confined for six weeks.

Continued From Page 28 son did get better. But, unfortunately, as her son matured, he got into problems and difficulties and he finally became a murderer and was convicted for that. She lived to see her son executed as a murderer

Again, how much better it would have been if she had prayed to God, "Your will, not mine, be done. You know best." God holds our future in His hands. We should put our complete trust and confidence in Him.

I want to touch on a few other things pertaining to Josiah. The amazing thing that happened when the priests found the Word of God (the Old Testament) in the temple that they were repairing, was that they read it! And their hearts were convicted.

They came to the King with that Word and told him what it said. The king rent his clothes because he realized how evil the country had become. He asked them to inquire of the Lord about what they had read. The priests went to a prophetess, and she told them that because Josiah had humbled himself, the Lord would not punish the people until after he had died.

The point, I think, that we should get here, is the fact that they did turn to God's Word, that they humbled themselves, and that they wanted to serve Him. Then, because Josiah wanted to do what was right, God dealt kindly with him.

In the New Testament Scripture of John, we have read something which touches our hearts. Jesus knew that Lazarus was sick, but He knew that the glory of God had to be shown to the people. So He waited.

Martha, Mary, and Lazarus were close to Jesus. He had been in their home often and had enjoyed their hospitality, just as you and I enjoy one another's hospitality in our homes.

Bethany, where they lived, was only a two, or maybe three, mile walk from Jerusalem. Out the Eastern Gate, beyond the temple where Jesus often walked, across a little valley, and then two miles up the mountain was Bethany.

Jesus often went there for rest and for fellowship. They trusted Him. They knew Him and they loved Him. They had seen the miracles that Jesus had done. Probably they wondered, "Why doesn't Jesus hurry? Why doesn't He come before Lazarus dies?"

No doubt everyone of us has wondered at times (if we haven't, we will) when a tragedy or sickness comes to us, our family, or loved ones, why God doesn't answer our prayers. Or, perhaps we will be like the disciples in the boat in that storm with Jesus. They came to Jesus and woke Him up and said, "Master, carest thou not that we perish?" Mark 4:38. Maybe there will be times when we will wonder if Jesus is sleeping when we pray.

Yet, it tells us in Revelation that every sincere prayer of every believer is kept under the altar of God. It may or may not be answered in our life time. We get a lot of mail, junk mail, that we sometimes barely give a glance before we toss it into the wastebasket. But every sincere prayer that is prayed to God is kept and not thrown away. That should comfort us. It should comfort the aged. It should comfort those parents who have prayed for their children all their lives and perhaps go to their graves in disappointment because the children haven't followed in the faith. Those prayers can be answered when the parents are gone. Those prayers are still vital and effective.

In another place we can read about Martha, who was always busily working, and about Mary, who would take more time to visit and sit at the feet of Jesus. Mary knew Him well and she loved Him so much. Both women had talents that were necessary and useful. Many women went to the grave that morning when Christ arose, but this Mary was not one of them. She was one of the few who really believed Jesus meant it when He said that He was going to arise. The other Marys were at the tomb, but not this Mary. She believed that Jesus was going to arise again.

"The Jews then which were with her in the house, and comforted her, when they saw Mary, that she rose up hastily and went out, followed her, saying, She goeth unto the grave to weep there." John 11: 31.

But Mary saw Jesus and said what they had all felt: "Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died." John 11:32.

They had a trusting faith, but they didn't realize that their prayer could have been answered whether Jesus was there or not. They didn't know that Lazarus'

death was to occur to glorify God. Do you remember that when the Pharisees asked Him for a sign, Jesus said, "... there shall no sign be given ... but the sign of Jonas the prophet"? Luke 11:29.

And do you remember when Jesus told of the rich man and the beggar, Lazarus? The rich man pleaded that Abraham would send Lazarus back to his brothers to tell them what had happened to him, and about the terrible place where they were going. The rich man said, "If one went unto them from the dead, they will repent." Luke 16:30. He wanted some one to warn them. Hell will be one place where misery won't love company. It will be too miserable.

Do you remember what Abraham's answer was? He said that the rich man's brothers wouldn't repent even though one come back from the dead. This is the actual account of Lazarus (the beggar)

in life after death.

The Pharisees did not believe. They would not believe. We might wonder why they would not. The main reason is that they did not want to believe. You have to want to put the Lord's will first. Selfwill keeps us from serving God.

The Pharisees wanted their own way. They were comfortable in their areas of authority. They had control of much of the wealth of the country at that time. They didn't want anything to disturb that. They wanted their own way and they did not intend to let anyone take it away from them.
Stop and analyze it. I asked an

old brother one time why so many in his family had not repented. He thought awhile and "boiled" it down to a couple of words: selfwill. They were not ready to yield their wills to the Lord. They were not ready to pray, "Thine, and not my will, be done."

Later on after Lazarus was

raised (to continue this thought). the Pharisees wanted not only to put Jesus to death, but they wanted to put Lazarus to death again. Because Lazarus had been brought back from death, many believed on the Saviour, Jesus Christ.

When Jesus asked, "Where have ye laid him?", he knew the answer; but they took Him there. It says that, "Jesus wept." John 11:35. That is comforting to all of us. There isn't anything you or I or anyone else has experienced that the Saviour didn't experience before us. He experienced what it is to be poor, to be lonely, to sorrow.

Jesus knew what it was to fast for forty days in the desert. The devil tempted Him there in many ways. The devil can't tell you anything that he didn't already tell Him. When you pray to Him, He understands. Probably when those forty days were over, the devil told Him, "You really aren't the Son of God. You aren't a Child of God. No way. God wouldn't let any child of His be out here in the desert. There is no one who cares for You. You haven't got anything to eat. You don't have a roof over your head. You can't be God's Child." How often Satan puts doubts in our mind such as, "Am I really God's child?"

Several weeks ago I visited with a soul who was very disturbed. She couldn't believe and had trouble holding on to the fact that she had repented and had peace. She was very disturbed. We visited and

talked about a number of things.
Our faith is increased by the reading of God's Word, by studying and meditating on it. When we read, we are strengthened. Faith comes from hearing and reading the Word.

If we neglect this manna from above, it is to our own hurt. Our

souls grow lean and lukewarm.

Another thing experience has taught us is that it is much better to read the Scripture in the morning. Gather the manna (the dew) from heaven in the morning before the severe heat of the sun makes it disappear. Then you have something to take with you the rest of the day.

I like to read it in the evening, too; but at the end of the day, we haven't had the help of the Word all day long. So it pays to gather our manna in the morning and apply it to our lives throughout the day. It's a big help.

To return to the story in the

gospel of John, Jesus told them to take away the stone from in front of Lazarus' grave. Martha was dismayed at that because she knew what happens to flesh when it has been dead for four days. But Jesus said something like, "Don't you believe me? Don't you think you are going to see the glory of God? Wait and see."

When they took the stone away, Jesus immediately prayed to God and thanked Him for hearing Him, and for providing the miracle in front of the people. He knew that it would strengthen and comfort them, and that it would open their eyes to the mystery that God was

revealing to them.

Then He spoke those few beautiful words, "Lazarus, come forth." John 11:43. You can almost sense the hush that must have been in that audience right then. You wonder what kind of voice would command the dead to come forth!

Not long ago, we were reading in Revelation. It says there that Jesus' voice was like a trumpet sound. I used to play a trumpet when I was in high school but I could never really make it talk. The trumpet has a sure tone, a tone all its own. You can identify

I think the apostle tried to tell us (for lack of other words) that the voice of Christ which will call us to heaven is going to be a voice like no other. It will be a voice like we never heard before. Even though we haven't heard it, I don't think any of us will have any difficulty in recognizing it as being the Saviour's voice.

Just as He said here, "Lazarus, come forth," He is going to call His children sometime. "Come here." Then they will leave this

earthly tabernacle.

The result of the activity at Bethanv was that many of the Jews who saw these things, believed.

Today we have the benefit of the Word and all the witnesses who saw those things happen. We should believe them. We shouldn't have any difficulty in believing them. But we are like the flowers around the house which have to be watered several times a week to sustain life.

To sustain our Spiritual lives we have to read from this Word. We need manna from above, so that we can say in our hearts without any reservation: "I know that my redeemer liveth." Job 19:25.

SERMON BY BROTHER CARL WYSS OF WASHINGTON, IL

Text: 2 Kings 22, John 11:31-57

The mystery that the world had waited so long to know about was taking place before the people's eyes as we read from the gospel of John. These were things that the ancient patriarchs had hoped to see, that David had looked for, that were promised to Abraham. Even Abel, Adam and Eve's son, had knowledge of these things as did Enoch, who walked with God. Many people had looked for the mystery of God which was to be revealed in Jesus Christ for the salvation which would come to all mankind through the One who was to give His life on the cross of Calvary.

Looking back to the chapter we read together in Second Kings, it is interesting to note the faith of those people in serving God. Did you notice that, when the silver was given to the priest to pay the carpenters and the people who worked on the temple of God, there was no reckoning? They gave it and had faith that it would be used properly. That's the kind of faith we should have in one another and that Christians should always be worthy of.

Do you remember that Paul wrote that we should keep on the whole armor of God? We should wear the helmet of salvation and keep the sword of the Spirit in our hands. Our feet should be shod with the gospel of peace. We often read those things but unless we stop and meditate, I think that we sometimes miss the meaning of the words.

Consider the manna given to the Israelites when they came out of bondage and slavery. After they had reached the wilderness, they were destitute as far as having food to eat. They depended on God and He supplied them with manna.

Out of curiosity this past week, I searched to discover just what manna was. We can read in the Scripture that manna was little,

white, and frost-like. God supplied the people in the morning so that it came with the dew. Because it was small and like coriander seed, it took a lot of effort to gather enough for the day. The people couldn't just walk out and pick up what they wanted and go back in again; they had to work. They had to pick up the little pieces of manna to have enough to grind and bake for their families. If they waited too long and weren't diligent, the severe heat of the sun melted it.

The thought occurred to me that manna is like the Word of God. This Word, little words put together, has much meaning. We have to search. We have to be diligent. We have to take time to read and then to meditate. Otherwise, when we read a chapter we can miss the message that God has had for us.

The people of whom we read in Second Kings were repairing the temple during the reign of Josiah. Josiah's grandfather, the wicked king Manasseh, was probably the most wicked of all kings in the Israelite line, but Josiah did that which was right in the sight of the Lord.

Manasseh was Hezekiah's son, and here is a case to make us ponder. Hezekiah was the one who, when the Lord told him He was going to require his life, pleaded with God to extend his days. Hezekiah was favored by God because he had served Him, and after he pleaded with tears God did extend his life for fifteen years.

Unfortunately, he probably would have been much better off if he had said, "Lord, Thy will be done. If that is what You want, that's what I want."

His son Manasseh, who was twelve years old when he began to reign, was born after the extension of Hezekiah's life. Manasseh was the most wicked king to ever reign over Israel. He killed many innocent people and shed much blood. He caused the country to worship idols and was wicked in God's sight. He was very cruel and very adulterous.

If Hezekiah could look back and see what happened, no doubt he would wish that he could relive

that part of his life.

This reminds me that last Sunday we read about Jephthah, a judge who delivered the people of Israel in battle. He prayed to God. He wanted God's help so much to win the battle that he bargained with God. He said (this is in my words), "God, if You will let me win this battle, I'll sacrifice the first thing that meets me on my return home." Well, God gave him the battle and the first thing that met him brought sorrow to his heart. He had one child, an only daughter, and she was the first to meet him. He told his daughter what he had promised God, and she told him that he should do whatever he had promised.

Jephthah and his daughter knew that a promise to the Lord must be fulfilled. "Better is it that thou shouldest not vow, then that thou shouldest vow and not pay." Eccl.

5:5

The daughter of Jephthah asked for two months to go to the mountains with her friends. After the two months, she came back and Jephthah kept his promise.

When I think of that Scripture, I think also of another story that is supposed to be true. It is of a woman whose only son was very sick and about to die. Here again is a case which shows us that we should not bargain with God. Rather say, "Thy will, not ours, be done."

In this case, the woman prayed and asked God to heal her son. She said, "God, if You don't heal him, I'm not going to serve You." Her

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
