EASTERN EUROPEAN VISIT **WORLD RELIEF REPORT**

Submitted by Bro. Leon Graf, a member of the World Relief Committee

The World Relief Committee brothers agreed at the meeting in Bluffton on April 17, 1982, that it would be desirable to have an elder or two go with Bro. Sandor Bako and me to Eastern Europe in late July and August. As time passed into June we were very sorry to learn that this would not be possible, but several elders encouraged us to still make the trip to bring back information for the committee. It seems best to review our visit and findings by country, praying that God will impart to each reader some of the feeling of God's Spirit that we enjoyed on this blessed trip.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA

On Saturday, August 7, Elder Pap Janos (John Pap — our correspondent in Budapest) and Bro. Namenyi Janos drove us to Senica, Czechoslovakia, to visit our correspondent there. Elder Belohlavek Jan (John). Along our route to Senica, the home of Elder Belohavek, we passed many nice fields of corn, hay and some sunflowers. The collective farm system has many nice farms, with modern equipment, but is not as productive as Hungary in raising crops.

Elder Belohlavek welcomed us with joy, that we would actually come from the U.S.A. to visit his home. He is 85 years old, but has a clear mind and bright eyes that portray his Christian love and grace in a land that has little hope for growth in the number of believers as we understand the Bible. There are only about 300 believers there and one other elder, Kupec Michal, who is 90 years old. The elders of Hungary are trying prayerfully to help them find and ordain some younger elders for the church. Also, the young men do not have noncombatant privileges and will be jailed for refusing to bear arms. This has had a serious effect on church growth, along with

other external pressures.

We visited about three hours and found two problems, among others, exist. First, the police have inquired about who is sending aid and why. Bro. John explained that it is from those whose only desire is to show love to the needy and the police left him, apparently satisfied. Second, some of the believers fear that our aid is possibly associated with another church, other than the original one started by Bro. S. H. Frohlich, and are reluctant to accept aid. Our elders are presently considering how to respond to this question. Elder Belohlavek prepares a list of the needy and we send individual checks for distribution by him. He sends grateful thanks to the U.S.A. brethren. We left the dear Elder with joy in accomplishing our purpose, but sadness in realizing how alone they seem in this struggle between good and

ROMANIA

We arose at 5:30 a.m., with our driver, Bro. Fumacs Sandor, on Friday, August 13, to be at the Romanian border early. Just before reaching the border, we stopped to buy some bread. rolls and other food to deliver to a poor family inside the border at the village of Semlac. Some delays occurred at the border, where the car was searched carefully for possible contraband. The main road was good, but we turned off to go to Semlac and the paved road was first very rough and then became an

even rougher dirt road where the village begins. The homes there were old and poorly maintained, due to lack of money and resources for repairs. The family we visited was very poor and rejoiced to see what food we brought. They were acquainted with Bro. Fumacs, who visits them periodically with food. This family also receives aid from the funds we send to the Romanian elders for distribution.

The visit to Arad was more encouraging, but the need is great for our aid. We could visit Elder Virtaci Sandor (Alexander) at his home and spend several hours discussing the aid program and needs. He, his wife and brother received us with great joy and thankfulness for visiting them. We were happy to find that since our aid to Romania has increased, due to using investment income from the Romanian Building Fund, they have more government recognition since the U.S.A. dollars are badly needed. The two appointed elders (Virtaci Sandor and Szabo Albert) who handle the aid funds have been able to have better contacts with the government. The present aid method of lump-sum checks to each elder every two months is very good and received with great thanks.

They asked us to consider if we could help them buy a 4-wheel vehicle that can travel the bad roads and back country to help them reach the poor there, since it's so difficult to do in a regular auto, which I can truly believe after our visit to Semlac! They will write to us later with a vehicle cost estimate and also obtain information if

food packages can be sent to Romania from the West.

We left there about 2:00 p.m., but had long delays leaving Romania and re-entering Hungary. It was 7:00 p.m. until we returned to our starting point, the home of Elder Kovacs Ferenc in Oroshaza. The return to Hungary was like leaving Mexico to return to the U.S.A. We thank God for a successful visit to Romania, but have great concern for their economic and spiritual needs compared to our abundance and freedoms. Their chief spiritual concern is to have governmental permission to gather in homes for worship, believing that if this is granted it could lead to reopening their church buildings in time. YUGOSLAVIA

On Tuesday, August 10, we were privileged to meet Bro. Berta Matyas (Matthew Berta — one of those disbursing aid to the needy in Yugoslavia) who was visiting the Pecs, Hungary church. He indicated that Elder Patyi

Lajos (Louis) would also be in Pecs for the weekend and agreed that we would not need to visit Yugoslavia if we could speak to the two while they visited Hungary. So, we had a long visit with Bros. Berta on Tuesday afternoon and Elder Patyi on Sunday afternoon. Some of the significant conclusions are as follows:

- 1. The present method of sending one lump-sum check payable to the Yugoslavian bank account in Novi-Sad is very good, since many of the needy are too old, helpless, or live in isolated villages and are unable to personally cash individual checks. The elders of Yugoslavia met in September, 1981 and appointed certain brothers to disburse funds under the supervision of the elders.
- 2. VERY IMPORTANT We should discourage the sending of individual checks, since the individuals could lose their meager pensions if it was discovered that they receive additional support through the mail.

- 3. Local congregations try to support those who are not included on the list of 33 persons now needing aid from sources outside of Yugoslavia.
- 4. We should write to them only in Hungarian to expedite communications. Elder Ben Maibach, who visited them in 1980, has, through Bro. Andy Hunyady of Columbus, Ohio, started correspondence with them in Hungarian. Since we started sending World Relief aid in April, Bro. Hunyady has continued handling the Yugoslavian correspondence in Hungarian.

EAST GERMANY

We did not have time to visit East Germany due to the lack of time and travelling distance from Hungary. Since this was not on the original travel plan, some money was sent to our correspondent, ministering Bro. Arno Markert, for either his travel costs to take a train and meet us in Budapest, or to be distributed to the needy in East Germany if he could not meet with us. We are sorry that he could not come to Budapest. There are only about 20 members remaining in East Germany, most of them being over 60 years of age. Please remember them in your prayers, that God will keep them,

The Apostolic Christian Children's Home, with your help, is striving to meet the physical and spiritual needs of some of God's les fortunate children by providing Christian homes for those in need. (Continued from Page 28) boat" when death strikes, aren't they? Jairus, the ruler of the synagogue, knew about Jesus Christ and knew that He had performed wonderful miracles, so he came to the Lord for help. Another father had come to Jesus for help and the Lord had said, "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." Mark 9:23.

The man broke down and cried, and said, "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief." Mark 9:24.

There lies the key to our problems, mine and all mankinds. "I believe; help thou mine unbelief." So Jairus came to Jesus because he knew that Jesus had performed miracles. He fell at His feet and said, "My little daughter lieth at the point of death." Mark 5:23. In other words, "Come and help her. I know You can do it; I've seen You do it before."

"Jesus went with him; and much people followed Him . . ." Mark 5:24. Jesus did not hurry to that place. You know, if we get in a hurry with God, He will find a way to slow us down. Take my word for it. If you haven't experienced it, you will. That's the way God works. But His work is sure and perfect. God doesn't do anything unless it is right. Here, the Lord took His time. "My . . . daughter lieth at the point

of death." "Would You please hurry?" Can't you imagine that father thinking that? "She is going to die, Lord, if You don't get there!" But the Lord took His time. What happened on the way? The Lord always has time to help somebody. He is always available when someone has a problem. That is another lesson.

While Jesus was walking toward Jairus' home, another little story slipped in. Something happened and therein is a great lesson for us.

A woman knew Jesus Christ only for what He did. She had an affliction, a physical problem, and she knew that this Jesus was able to cure her. She believed this and had faith. How did she acquire that belief and that faith? Most of these people were Jews and Hebrews. They were brought up with a basic belief in God. They believed in the One God, the One True God. They believed in the Scriptural prophecies of a Messiah, but there was a lot of confusion in their minds as to whether or not Jesus Christ was the Messiah. We can read that throughout the New Testament. They had to be shown. But those who were helped by the Lord Jesus had something in common. They had trusted and believed in a Supreme Being, the Almighty God. They believed that God was in the heavens. They worshipped Him and trusted Him. They knew that He had power to do things that man couldn't do. They knew that He had power to help them that was beyond the ability of any human or mortal being. That is a critical thing to remember. They had faith in God, first of all.

Usually it is the common people who first recognize the simple truths. That verifies the Scriptures where we read that the kingdom of God is "... hid ... from the wise and prudent, and . . . revealed . . . unto babes." Matthew 11:25. "The wisdom of this world is foolishness with God." I Cor. 3:19. That is so often the case.

In this account, as told by Mark, a woman had a physical affliction, an issue of blood. That's pretty basic. Any adult understands her problem. She went to all kinds of doctors, to this one and that one. Does that "ring a bell" with anybody? Today when you have a problem and one

another one? You try everything. She tried everything. No results. The woman finally, as she watched Jesus, had faith to believe that if she could just get close enough to touch the hem of His garment, that she would be healed. Do you get the message? Do you see what was required? She had faith. When she touched that garment, what happened to the Lord? He stopped. He realized what had happened although He was surrounded by a multitude.

Do you begin to see how God works? He works the same way in the world today. There are more than three billion people, going to be four billion before too long, and yet God can see one person. The woman's case is a good example for everyone. Satan likes to tell us, "God won't listen to you Look, there are almost 4,000,000,000 people in the world. How in the world is He going to find you?" Proof that He can is in today's reading.

Jesus walked through a multitude of people. Nobody said a word. The woman didn't say a word to Him, but she touched His garment and Jesus felt virtue going out of Him. Jesus turned to His disciples and said, "Who touched my clothes? And His disciples said unto Him, Thou seest the multitude thronging Thee, and sayest Thou, Who touched me?" Mark 5:30, 31. It was as any human beings would say, "Who touched You? Why everybody's been touching You!" But Jesus had felt virtue go out of Himself.

"And He looked round about to see her that had done this thing. But the woman fearing and trembling, knowing what was done in her, came and fell down before Him, and told Him all the truth." Mark 5:32, 33.

My friends, let me tell you something. You've got to touch Jesus. You have to come to Him. That's a prerequisite, and there is no forcing. Jesus will say, "Come!" And when you touch Him, He will know you. He will turn to you and recognize you. The woman's case is a beautiful example. Somebody like you and me, who had the simple faith to believe, had reached the end of the rope. She couldn't go any further. She had tried everything which man had to offer. She knew

doctor can't help, do you go to that this was her last chance, not only her last chance, but her only chance.

> We have talked about physical things, but there are also spiritual things, my beloved hearers. We all know that this old body is going to die, don't we? That's no secret. Regardless of who we are or what kind of faith we have, everybody dies sometime. There, is an undying soul in each one of us, and it is going to live forever somewhere.

> Today we have had a perfect analogy in the spiritual sense of the way Christ works. We should learn that lesson.

> All the efforts of men in the highest places of learning in the land cannot satisfy us spiritually. We can go to the most intelligent government in the world, and come away disappointed. Let us digress here just a moment. We're not going to "rake anybody over the coals," but let's get one thing straight: governments are not God. Now why did I say that? It is mankind's natural inclination to look to men or to governments to help them out of their problems, to assist them. It is sad, isn't it, when we see what men are trying to do through government? It can't work. You know, some people are so blinded! The great, great kingdom of Camelot came tumbling tumbling down because of the humanity of the people. When are we ever going to learn that through mankind we do not acquire the things that we are after? We're never going to. Satisfaction and peace for our souls come through Jesus Christ, the only perfect Individual who ever walked on this earth, who was and is the Son of God.

When we recognize where we can get our spiritual sense, when we are ready to give up everything and say, "Lord, there is nothing that can help me except You," He will turn and He

will help us.

"He looked round about to see her that had done this thing." Mark 5:32. All we have to do in a spiritual sense is touch the hem of Jesus' garment. That is what He wants. "I'm done with everything else. Lord, help me." That's my simple way of putting it. My prayer when I repented and it still is a lot of times is three words: "Lord, help me." If it is uttered in need and in a manner in which our heart yields our all to Him, He will help, believe me. Jesus will help you.

"But the woman fearing and trembling, knowing what was done in her, came and fell down before Him.." What? "...tell the truth"! Mark 5:33. Here is another key to the kingdom of God. Tell it just the way it is. She told all the truth. She did not hide anything from God. The Almighty God, the Lord Jesus, knows everything that we do. He knows every thought that we have, good, bad or indifferent. He knows it. But the woman came and was willing to tell Him all that she did. What a purging that was.

Do you begin to see the doctrine of the true faith? Do you see why it is necessary for this step and that step in order for a person to "get right"

with God? I think you do.

"And he said unto her, Daughter, thy faith hath made thee whole; go in peace, and be whole of thy plague." Mark 5:34. Let's go on. We're going to talk about the rest of today's reading, and then we're going to sum up with the one thought that keeps coming back over and over again.

"While He yet spake, there came from the ruler of the synagogue's house..." He hadn't arrived at the house. Do you remember what we said before? They were going toward the house. "Lord, come; my daughter is going to die." We tried to relate how anxious he would be for Jesus to get there. The messengers came and said, "Thy daughter is dead (so don't trouble) the Master any further." Mark 5:35.

But Jesus Christ, in this particular instance, had to prove to them that His power was power over death and the grave. That is the final key. God wanted Jesus at this particular time to show that His power was beyond death and the grave. This was man's thinking: "No use bothering Him now. She was sick, but now she is dead. He probably could have healed that disease, but there is nothing He can do now because she is dead. Not a thing that the Lord can do any more."

But Jesus said, "Be not afraid, only believe." Mark 5:36.

The ruler must have wondered what Jesus meant when he said, "Be

not afraid, only believe." In the agony of his soul, he knew that his daughter was dead. But the Lord had said, "Be not afraid, only believe." What could He mean?

"And He cometh to the house of the ruler of the synagogue..." and Jesus said, "Why make ye this ado, and weep? the damsel is not dead, but sleepeth." Mark 5:38, 39.

"And they laughed Him to scorn. ." (Mark 5:40) because they knew that she was dead. But that little girl, 12 years old, was brought back to life. It wasn't that she was in a coma or anything like that. You know, that is one of man's first reasonings: "Well, she was in a coma. She wasn't really dead." Oh, yes, she was! Remember the story about Lazarus and the tomb? Lazarus had been dead for four days. They said something like, don't go near it! Don't roll that stone away!" They didn't have embalming fluid in those days, and as a body decomposes, there is a terrible odor. Martha, the sister of Lazarus, said, "Lord, by this time he stinketh: for he hath been dead four days." John

What was the Lord trying to tell us when He said, "... only believe"? If we trust in Him, we have power over death and the grave. We can win the victory over death. That's what He was and is trying to tell us. The final proof of that came at His resurrection.

Why do we have to say these things? Why is it necessary for us to repeat what we have heard over and over again? I'll tell you why. Speaking for myself, first of all, and for almost every human being who ever walked, our faith is not strong enough. We don't believe deeply enough. We don't believe completely enough. We must be constantly reminded that we should trust in the Lord, be reminded of what Jesus has done for us, be reminded of Scripture and the miracles that took place. Then we should review in our own minds, and digest it again in a spiritual sense. Through this our faith can be reestablished and renewed so that we can trust Him completely in everything. We can turn to the Lord and ask Him for help. "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief." Mark 9:24.

What solved the problem in both cases of which we read today? What did those individuals have which enabled them to receive what they wanted? Faith. FAITH!

Read chapter 11 in Hebrews. Paul speaks of those men of the past who had great faith. Review, if you will, on a more current basis, those among you in your own community who walked in faith and concluded their days with hope of everlasting life and eternity.

Have you ever had the experience, the wonderful experience, of being close to somebody who smiled when he died because he was ready to meet the Lord? Have you ever had that wonderful experience? It would open your eyes.

One person whom I will never forget was a paraplegic. He has been gone for many, many years. All his life, this young man was a wheelchair patient and very seldom got to church. I will never forget this story my mother told me. (She was a good friend to his mother.) This young man repented. On his death bed he opened his eyes, a smile came across his lips, and he said words to this affect, "Oh, Mother, I see the beautiful green trees and the beautiful green fields." And he died. You know, this is what we are talking about. He was looking forward to something better, and he was given a vision of something more beautiful that he had seen on earth. He knew what his reward was. He knew what was beyond the grave for him. With faith you can cut the strings to this old life. You can clip off the humanity within and look for something ahead. We are here again this morning so that when death comes, whether it is from an automobile accident, cancer, a heart attack, or whether it is just a matter of laying down our head on a pillow and going to sleep, we will be ready to go and can see something that God has in store for us that is so much better than what we have here.

The answer, the key, is faith, faith to believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. Then we will follow His teachings and we poor humans can have hope of eternal life for that undying soul within us.

Isn't it wonderful? Isn't God good

to us?

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. ROBERT N. GRIMM OF GOODFIELD, IL

Text: Mark 5:21-43

We have read words this morning which are not strange to us. In fact they are very familiar, but I wonder if the events that took place really make the impact upon our hearts that they ought to. My thoughts, when I said that, were these: Do we really believe that these events took place? Without any question in our minds, can we accept completely and without reservation the fact that this Man, Jesus Christ, had the ability to perform miracles and to bring the dead back to life?

We hear of miracles occassionally. We hear of something happening that we ascribe to being a miracle, something which took place that we don't have any answers for. We see it in our own time, don't we? Amazing things take place in hospitals or in homes of sick people, to those who have afflictions, either physical or mental. Sometimes when the doctors are finished, when the medical people say, "It is out of my hands," something happens which cannot be explained. We say, "A miracle was performed." People may try to account for it, but they really cannot. So we accept it and say, "It was a miracle." Every individual, every person who is here, every person in the world has seen or heard of something like that.

The thing that we need to emphasize this morning is that when Jesus Christ walked on the earth miracles were done by Him. It was His presence that made the miracles possible. People didn't have to say, "Why did it happen?" or "Something took place!" or "I don't know what happened, but it happened!" because they could relate it directly and particularly to Jesus Christ's presence. His words and

His efforts performed the miracles and healed the people.

Now the question which each of us needs to ask himself this morning is: Do I really believe it? Do we really believe that the miracles and the powers that Jesus Christ has, no one else has ever had? That belief is vital. Do you know why? It is because our faith is based on the fact that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. That doesn't sound strange or different from what you have heard here before or different from what you probably think in your own minds, but I'm going to tell you something that is different. That is, if you believe it to the extent that God wants you to believe, it is going to shape and determine the way that you live. It has to! That is the key. That is the secret. That is also the problem that every man struggles with when he learns of Jesus Christ. What is he going to do with Christ? Will he acknowledge that He was an intelligent person, somebody special, or just some great prophet? Will he acknowledge that Jesus is the Son of God? What do you acknowledge?

When you begin to make up your mind, you will think that you know what He is. Then, you will read about His experiences. Go ahead and read them all; put it all together, and find out whether anyone ever lived as Jesus lived or did the things that He did. Find out whether anyone had power over death as He had. When you finally conclude who Jesus Christ is, I'll guarantee you something. You won't need me to tell you what has to be done in your life. That's the whole purpose of the gospel of Jesus Christ today, or in the past, or in the future.

When we begin to understand who Jesus Christ is and what His purpose was on earth, we won't have to have somebody tell us what we need to do. We'll know in our hearts what needs to be done, as far as our relationship with our God is concerned. Let's review what took place in our reading. A marvelous thing happened. There was sorrow in a human family such as we experience today. I know that you have sorrow in this community as we do in ours. Heaven is not on earth.

Everyone has a cross. Do you believe that? Someone who is always bubbling over, who seems so happy and is a good example in the Lord, has a cross. Do you believe that? Sit down and talk with such a person sometime. Maybe he won't say much, maybe just a little smile and, "Yes, yes, I've got a few problems." Ever hear anyone say that? Such people have the ability not to pass it on, but they sometimes carry a lead weight within their hearts. But, who carries it for them? Where do they get that ability? What I am trying to say is that we are all alike, and that there is no use in somebody's saying, "I've got it worse than somebody else." We all have our problems. Jesus Christ knows this.

Let us relate with this father whose daughter was dying. He was a ruler in the synagogue and had power and prestige. He was looked up to and respected, but his daughter was dying. How death neutralizes us! The biggest land owners in the community, the most important businessmen and the poorest people are all "in the same
