And the **Angel** said unto them, fear not; for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people.



FAMILY DISCOVERS ANSWER TO DISTRESS IN TRUE STORY OF CHRISTMAS

Pain was Billy's ever-present companion. It delayed his falling to sleep at night. It was with him through the long dark hours, and it was his first wakening awareness every morning. For the last two of Billy's 11 young years, the pain had shadowed him. He grew thinner. His cheeks were drawn and his eyes haunted. Billy's pain was the terrible aftermath of a tobogganing accident. He had been flipped from the rear of one toboggan, and as he was sitting in the snow, another toboggan came from behind and struck him in the back. A tumor developed on his spine, and though his parents were unaware, it was turning cancerous.

Desperately, Billy's parents sought a cure. Billy was their only child. There could be no more. They took the boy from doctor to doctor, hoping one would say "I think I can help him." But never was there any encouragement. The search didn't end until the day a wisened, aging doctor in a small town far from Billy's home examined the boy.

"Billy will soon be free of pain," he said. "Soon he'll know it no longer."

"Billy's mother knew that soon Billy would die. But his father refused that interpretation. In his grief, he accepted only that Billy would live. He needed that belief—that faith—to keep going. He couldn't let the boy down. The lad needed his strength, and the father needed his son's.

The week before Christmas, Billy's fever rose. His pain worsened and only constant medication brought "token" relief. The father raged in his anguish. He ranted to the futility of it all ... the cruelty of God and the pointlessness of taking a life so young. Everything was a lie. He knew no solace.

Then came Christmas Eve. The father was awakened by the sounds of Billy tossing fitfully in his bed. Walking into the darkened living room, the father looked at the presents under the tree. There were so many unopened gifts there for Billy. They represented the plans so carefully made for the boy. The father slumped into a chair. He put his hands to his face and wept. Then, when grief could no longer come, he sat still for long minutes. The clock on the mantle ticked silently. He searched into himself, painfully and with determination. Then he remembered.

Slowly, awkwardly, he got down on his knees. Clasping his hands until the knuckles whitened, he raised his head.

'God," he said in an anguished whisper, "something has happened. I ask that You hear me out. As I sat here. I remembered what a personal success I've been, and how you've responded when I asked you to give me a hand. But I know now that these were selfish prayers, for my own personal gain. And when I asked You to save Billy, that was personal too. I couldn't stand to lose him. I had such great plans for him and wanted some day for him to carry on for me. You know what I remembered now? I remembered Your Son and Your great love when You gave Him to the world. What sadness you must have known when He died. And so, God, if You would do this great thing for all of us, then I must be comforted by Your sacrifice. It's long past the time, oh God, when I must put my trust in You. So I pray that You will welcome little Billy when he comes ... I know he'll be in good hands. I know that it is 'Thy will be done'."

The Father got to his feet and went into Billy's bedroom. It was time for a pill. The boy lay still. It almost seemed as if he wasn't breathing. On his cheek was a dried tear brought by the pain of only minutes before. Tenderly the father took Billy's limp hand. He looked upon the boy he loved. Suddenly the little hand tightened. Billy opened his eyes.

"Dad," he said simply, "I won't be needing that pill tonight."

Desperately, the father closed his

eyes. Then he took a deep breath and asked the question that he knew he must.

"Why not, Billy?"

"I've been dreaming, Dad. I've been dreaming about Jesus. He seems very close. It might sound funny, but it's almost like He's here in the room with us right now."

Billy's fingers loosened in his father's grasp. The breath of life so silent, it could barely be heard, escaped his lips in a sigh and his eyes closed. EASTERN EUROPEAN VISIT --- WORLD RELIEF REPORT

Continued from November 1982 issue.

Submitted by Bro. Leon Graf - A member of the World Relief Committee.

BAJA-We arrived at the home of Bro. Fumacs Sandor (Alezander Fumacs-our correspondent there) about 9:45 a.m. on August 12. Upon returning from Romania we also stopped here August 14. We attended Saturday evening song services at their church which we enjoyed very much. They, too, went "all out" to welcome us, as in all other places.

The aid to Baja is also doing good and no changes are needed here. Bro. Fumacs Sandor is very active in helping the needy since his family has only one child to care for and he has very much love for the poor. He tries to visit Russia and Romania periodically to help the needy there, and is an inspiration for all of us. HODMEZOVASARHELY-No aid is being sent here, but we were privileged to visit here on our way to Romania and back. We had lunch on August 12 at the home of Elder Albert Sandor and stayed overnight there on August 13. We attended evening church services there on August 13 and the next morning visited Elder Nyari Jozsef (Joseph) who is 86 years old and cannot go to church. Both elders are very satisfied with the aid methods being used and were happy to meet someone from the Committee.

OROSHAZA-We visited here August 12 to complete plans for the Romanian trip and attended church services that evening. Elder Denes Ferenc welcomed us to the church. After services we had a brief visit at their home for the aged which houses about 12 to 15 old sisters in two buildings behind the church. A new elder, Kovacs Ferenc (Frank), is our correspondent here and we were blessed to review the aid work with him.

HUNGARY CONCLUSIONS -This country has more freedoms and opportunity than any other nation in Eastern Europe. The young men in Hungary have the privilege of noncombatant military services and do not need to swear the oath of allegiance, privileges granted by law in 1977. No other nation in Eastern Europe allows these. The people work hard and have a head of government who is sympathetic to their needs for food, shelter and clothing. Accordingly, their standard of living is better, but they still have many needy persons just like in the U.S.A. and they are limited in personal income to meet all those needs.

The country is very productive in growing food products because of a lot sunshine and longer growing season than in nothern Europe. However, a real problem is developing since much food is being exported to help Poland and Romania. There was a nationwide increase in food prices, effective September 1, 1982. The increases on some foods were 100% indicating that our World Relief Aid there will be even more important than before.

The church order and respect was very impressive. Everywhere we were welcomed as brothers and could observe the closeness of the believers and friends. Most churches have at least two mid-week gatherings, one for worship and one for singing. Sunday has at least three services, morning and afternoon for worship and a song service afterwards. Greetings are announced after the friends are excused and travel plans are announced also so that greetings may be sent to the church to be visited. The members say "kosonom" (thank you) in unison for the greetings, which have a deep meaning to them.

GENERAL CONCLUSIONS God blessed us richly to make this visit to Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Romania. We pray that this report may impress you in some way, as we were impressed in many ways during the visit to Eastern Europe. Perhaps as important as our economic aid, or more so, is the spiritual impact upon the believers there. For them to know that someone cares enough to help is a great spiritual lift. I heard about this from Bro. Sandor before we made the trip but now personally observed with my eyes, ears and heart. Our past efforts have been blessed by God beyond what we can imagine and leave a strong message of encouragement to us to prayerfully consider to continue strong support for the needy believers in Eastern Europe, as God directs.

It has been said that as one gets older time seems to pass all the more quickly. I do not know about the "getting older" part, but time seems to be passing more and more quickly. The world is once again in the Christmas season and with it the hustle and bustle of shopping for gifts, baking cookies, making candy, sending out cards, visiting family and friends, and all the other things that go with the season. Isn't it comforting to us to know that we can set aside these worldly concerns and find a peace that comes from Him whose birthday we will soon be celebrating? However, if you are still interested, or are interested in one or more of the children, please send me some information about yourself and I will send it to the children's caseworker. The two little sisters who were mentioned some time ago should be placed soon. All children deserve loving parents and Dawn and Angela should be with their new permanent parents soon.

Also, two new staff members should be arriving soon. Sis. Bridget Mahon (Kansas City) and Sis. Cindy Baurer (Princeville) have accepted positions as assistant houseparents. With their arrival our staff needs will be met except for the very important positions of alternate houseparents. We are still in need of a Christian couple to come and serve on a full time basis. Please contact us if you have any questions (there is no obligation) about this.

It is a joy to see our children grow physically and spiritually under the love and guidance of our staff and for all of us to experience the love and guidance of our Heavenly Father. May all of us share this Christian unity as we celebrate the birthday of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The tangled wires made no effort to hold out intruders. Most of the headstones were leaning and some had toppled over. I pulled the tangled mass of weeds from one of the stones and read, "Thomas Fisher, 1854-1884." Who was this Thomas Fisher? Iwondered. What kind of man was he? Where did he come from? Where did he go?

Thomas Fisher — the name didn't tell much. He may have been of English or Dutch descent. His family may have settled in America for religious freedom. Had Thomas Fisher brought his family west in a covered wagon? Is that how he happened to be here? Had he been plodding along beside his oxen, while visions of a new land and homestead danced before his eyes? Then perhaps without warning an arrow from an Indian bow sang through the air and Thomas Fisher's vision vanished forever. Is that how he happened to die so young? Or did he make camp near a mosquito-infested swampland, then lose the battle with malaria as so many pioneers had? Was he a gay, laughing, handsome man, with ready wit and a keen sense of humor? Or was he quiet and studious? Was he content to sit outside his sod shanty at night and play his fiddle? Or did he look up at the stars and ponder the greatness of God? Did he have a family to mourn his passing? Did a crushed young wife hold an infant son to take a last look at his father's face — a face he wouldn't remember? Or perhaps he was a cruel man, a drunkard who beat his family. Did they stand, dry-eyed, not mourning, as he was lowered into his grave?

But then, he may not have been married at all. He was only thirty when he died. Perhaps he had come west to make a fortune in furs or gold to take back to his beloved. Where was his mother as he was drawing his last breath? Had he taken his own way as did the prodigal son of old? Was she praying for her "black sheep" as he roamed over the broad face of America? Had he gotten into a fight in a saloon and met a violent death that way? Was he a poor man? Or was he rich? Was he a poet? an author? a bartender? a farmer? a prospector? a minister? Had he heard terrible tales of savage Indians in this territory? Had he come to lead them to Christ only to be martyred at their hands?

Likely we will never know the answers to these questions. It really

doesn't matter. It makes little difference now what nationality he was, where he was born, whether he was rich or poor, learned or ignorant, gay or shy. Neither does it matter that his remains lie here in a forsaken weed-covered cemetery instead of within a costly mausoleum. His body has long since gone back to the dust from which it came.

There is only one thing about Thomas Fisher that is important today. That is: WHERE HAS HE BEEN ALL THESE YEARS SINCE HE WAS LOWERED INTO THIS GRAVE? Has he been enjoying the bliss of the redeemed? Or has he been in a hopeless, Godless eternity that has hardly begun? What did Thomas Fisher do with the Lord Jesus back there somewhere before 1884? Did he receive Him, love Him and serve Him during his life, or did he spurn Him, laugh in His face and turn away?

Whatever that choice was, it holds good today. It will continue to hold good throughout eternity. Thomas Fisher made his decision. He will never have another opportunity.

As you are reading just now, you have a big advantage over Thomas Fisher. You are still living. You have an opportunity to choose today. What will you do with Jesus?

And a certain man was there, which had an infirmity thirty and eight years. When Jesus saw him lie, and knew that he had been now a long time in that case, he saith unto him, Wilt thou be made whole? John 5:5, 6. "Wilt thou be made whole?" consider, dear ones, the words of this very short sentence that the Lord spoke to this man. It was so powerful! "Wilt thou be made whole?"

"The impotent man answered him, Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool . . ." I have no help. ". . . but while I am coming, another steppeth down before me." John 5:7. Can we imagine how great a disappointment this might have been?

But the Lord said, "Rise, take up thy bed and walk." John 5:8. This Lord Jesus of whom we read here, dear ones, is still active in the lives of people today. Throughout the entire world this very same message is being echoed over and over again: "Wilt thou be made whole?"

We are free to direct our own lives. As long as we are innocent and little children, we are not responsible for our lives here upon earth. We have the promise that as little children, God is satisfied with us. But when we understand and are accountable, then we are responsible for the lives that we live. The only difference, dear ones, between the time that the Lord was speaking at the pool in Jerusalem and now is that whoever desires it can be made whole. Wilt thou be made whole? Not only the first one who steps forward can be made whole, but every soul who is exposed to His Word. "Wilt thou be made whole?"

You know, we are running a race. In the sports world there is only one or so who will win a race. But in the spiritual race every single one of us here this morning can get the first prize, which is eternal life. Nothing in the world can compare with what God has promised to you and me.

The impotent was told to pick up his bed and walk. After being helpless for eight years, the man was healed. The people who saw it observed a tremendous miracle.

Immediately, some of the people found fault because the man carried his bed on the sabbath day. They tried to enforce the religious laws, and yet they overlooked the Life that was given to be a perfect sacrifice. They overlooked the prophecies. The prophets of old had said that the Lord would come. We believe the instruction to pick up the bed on the sabbath day was the Word of God. It seems to me, dear ones, that as we come to the time when we seek the Lord, we are seeking a cure for our disease. There was no one to put the helpless man into the pool. When we feel separation from God, when we feel the guilt of sin, there is no one in this world to put us into the "pool". Who is going to take our sin away from us? Only this same Lord who helped the man of whom we read.

Let us remember, dear ones, that our Lord died upon the cross. We read in our first reading that there needed to be blood shed for the covering of sin. We read that Adam and Eve took skins to cover their naked bodies. From the very beginning, blood was shed for the covering of sin.

Down through the ages many animals and birds were sacrificed for the covering of sin, never for the forgiveness of sin; not to free man from sin, but to cover sin.

We believe that the Lord Jesus was sent to be a perfect sacrifice. When His blood was shed upon the cross, there was power in that blood beyond all blood that was shed previously. We believe that the Lord Jesus was a perfect sacrifice, and that His blood was shed for the forgiveness of sin. This sacrifice was necessary. It was the plan of God. This is the truth, dear ones. It is the plan of God that you and I might go free.

Everybody born into the world is responsible for his sins. We must go to the cross, to the shed blood of our Lord Jesus. There is no other way. Nobody in the world is going to take us and put us into the "pool". Each one must turn to the Lord.

Dear ones, that blood that was shed many years ago is still crying, "Mercy, mercy!" We have a beautiful hymn in which we sing, "There is power in the blood! Wonder-working power!"

Let us remember that God's power is unlimited and His power is shown in your life and in mine by His love and by our love for Him. Love is the greatest power upon earth!

We must contend with the devil. We have an enemy of our soul who is the prince of this world. He has many things to offer. This is a beautiful morning and there are many places we could have gone. But God has given you and me the desire to come here to worship Him, to be reminded of our highest and heavenly calling and of the great love that He has for you and me.

Many times, dear ones, we consider the enemy of our souls. We believe that he is still very, very powerful. We sense it and it is important that we recognize it. But we know that the power of God is greater.

We were privileged to come here to the Bluffton Church. It warms our hearts to see so many beloved brethren, those whom we know and those whom we have never met before. We are bound together in love, Christian love.

Perhaps some people would colsider this fellowship as foolish, as a waste of time. You and I know how precious it is. It is our way of life. As we associate with one another, we are lifted up in the spirit. We are comforted. We are encouraged upon life's pathway.

We often think of our dear older brothers and sisters. One brother in our congregation told me not long ago that he wonders why he is still here in this life. He is able to come to church, but he feels as though he is in the way. This is not the case.

Our older brothers and sisters are an inspiration to us. If nothing else, just meeting them on Sunday and giving them the kiss of charity is appreciated. We know that they are the fathers of faith. There is no way that we can measure their importance and our love for them.

This is also true of our middleaged brothers and sisters. We appreciate each other. I think that many times we lose sight of how much we really need each other to be encouraged and to be lifted up.

In our younger brothers and sisters we can know our future church. We feel that, by the grace of God, they will carry on when we lay our armour down. We feel that there will still be faith upon earth when our Lord returns, when He comes to claim His own.



THE SILVER LINING

Text: Genesis 3 and John 5:1-30

The Word that we have read this morning, like all Scripture, is the Word of God and the Word of truth. It is the truth that can make us free, as we are told in the eighth chapter of the Gospel of John.

We first read from Genesis of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. When God created man, it His intention and His will that man should live in that beautiful garden with no cross to carry.

After God had created earth and heaven and all the things in this world, He said that it was good, and we believe it to be true. He also created man to be over all. It seems to me that in all the creation that God made before man, there was nothing to respond, nothing to return His love. Therefore, He created man. Man was put here upon earth, we believe, to live forever. This would have been a tremendous place to live, and there probably would have been no end to the life of mankind here upon earth if they had been faithful and obedient.

However, sin came into the world, and there is no escape from it. There is no way that we can be born into the world and not be guilty of sin. For God had said that if Adam and Eve would eat "... of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil" they would "surely die". Genesis 2:17.

Right away, Satan tried to turn this thing around. He said to the woman, "Ye shall not surely die." Genesis 3:4. He was trying to create doubt in the hearts of Adam and Eve, especially Eve, that God's Word was true.

Here again we find, as we find all through the Bible, that God's Word is true. Many prophecies of old have been fulfilled, some are now being fulfilled, and some will take place in the future, but all will come to pass. There is no way that we can correctly hope that we are not guilty of sin. This world would lead to our own destruction. Even if we could live a life here upon earth that would be free of sin, we are still guilty of the sin of Adam and Eve. But you and I, especially those of us who have reached the age of accountability, are aware of a power for evil that seems active in our lives from the very beginning.

As we become guilty of sin, we are separated from God. When we reach the age of accountability and recognize this separation, we need to make it right. We find that God was so loving and kind toward the human race that He sent His only begotten Son to suffer for our sin. We read this morning about our Lord's life upon earth. We read of His deep concern and of His love for mankind. We should never lose sight of the fact that the love of God is the greatest power in this world.

Perhaps some people would give an entire fortune to become popular, to have a great position, or to have authority. It seems that tremendous effort is put forth by many people to gain these things. You and I, as children of God, have most the precious heritage and standing that can possibly be obtained in this life.

We need to remember that this life is not the end. We believe that everyone who has a sound mind will be held responsible for the life he has lived.

Yet, we need to remember that we, of ourselves, are simply nothing. We need to go to the cross. We need to go to the cross to see our Lord and Saviour, the Son of the Living God, hanging between heaven and earth and suffering that bitter death for you and me. We believe that He bore the sins of the entire world, including yours and mine. Let us never, never forget that when our Saviour, there upon the cross, felt His separation from God, He cried out, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Matt. 27:46 and Mark 15:34. Remember, dear ones, the cry did not come because of the nails that were driven in his hands or the nails that were driven through His feet. The sins of the world lying upon His heart made Him cry out, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

The prophet Isaiah referred to the Lord's suffering when he said that God "... shall see the travail of his soul, and shall be satisfied." Isa. 53:11. This was required dear ones. Our Lord Jesus had to feel death for you and me. It was prophesied and it came to pass.

God said to Eve and to Adam, "... of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, ... Ye shall not eat of it ... lest ye die." Gen. 3:3. And it came to pass. Take any passage and you will find God's Word is true and faithful.

Dear ones, we read this morning about a man by a pool of healing. "Now there is at Jerusalem by the sheep market a pool, which is called in the Hebrew tongue, Bethesda, having five porches." John 5:2. I'm not familiar with the Holy Land; I don't know if this place can be found anymore or not. Irregardless, we know that at the time when the Lord was here upon earth, there was such a place. Every so often an angel would come and trouble the water, and the first person who stepped in would be healed. Of just leprosy? No, no. Of whatever disease he had.

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
