When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, He said, It is finished: and He bowed His head, and gave up the ghost. John 19:30

This past Easter season, I've thought a lot about the final three words that Christ uttered before He died. "It is finished!" At first glance, you would think that Christ was referring to His life here on earth. You might think that He was proclaiming an end to the pain and agony that He had suffered on the cross and at the hands of the soldiers. The past twenty-four hours had been as degrading as possible for the Son of God. It is true, His death signified an end to a lot of pain, suffering and misunderstanding.

The Greek word for "finished" is "teleo," which is translated in other portions of scripture as make an end, expire, fulfill, accomplish, perform and pay. I often wonder if at that point, God didn't turn to His Son and say, "Son, we have to save our creation. So God, after declaring that the wages of sin are death (Rom. 6:23) set about to give us freedom from the curse, by dying for us in the form of His Son, Jesus Christ.

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

Spring beauty surrounds us everywhere! Hopefully, we are not moving so fast that we tend to overlook its presence. Because it bears no price tag, do we underestimate its value? Life does necessitate giving attention to our responsibilities, but it also behooves us to satisfy the hunger pangs of our spirits for beauty. When our Heavenly Father wrote the music for the birds to sing and when He clothes the flowers in their fragile garments, surely He meant for mankind to pause and to draw inner strength and wisdom from nature's beauty. It surely can be of quiet, gentle comfort to the soul

Attention to responsibilities here at the Home includes the work in the office. A visit to this department finds it located near the Administrator's office. Bustling with activity, the various tasks in a week's time include: answering the phone, greeting our visitors, typing letters and reports for other departments, handling all incoming mail and delivering it to the various departments. Mail for our 86 residents alone can become heavy, especially at holiday seasons. However, this is very important to our residents, and we encourage you to keep it coming.

Of the six staff members in the office, two of whom are full time, one is the accounts payable bookkeeper. Her duties include: handling all bills, confirming their accuracy and writing the checks in payment; checking and correcting all public aid room care billings; checking and charging the telephone bills to residents and staff; reconciling the various bank accounts each month and keeping a petty cash fund.

The accounts receivable bookkeeper records all incoming money. Memorial contributions are recorded; donors receive acknowledgment and a Memorial Fund account is set up in the name of the deceased. Contribution records are kept and acknowledged. money received by the residents is deposited into their personal checking or savings accounts. Cautioning and counseling residents on wise spending habits becomes an important part of this department's responsibility. All residents' records are sent to residents' families quarterly.

Personnel records on each of approximately one hundred employees must be kept. Payroll every two weeks must be calculated and checked. Payroll records are kept in detail and paychecks written. Paid Time Off records are kept for each individual employee, allowing them to see at a glance the amount of vacation time which is available. State and Federal tax reports must be filed. Insurance for health and for automobiles must be kept current. The Silver Lining article is to be sent once each month.

Balancing journals and ledgers, compiling, typing and dispersing financial reports and forecasts is another important assignment of the office staff. Keeping abreast of all the changes of state and federal regulations is a necessity. Medical bills must be filed with medicare and public aid, when it is not done directly by the doctor. Public aid is billed for medical transportation for our residents. All ledger cards for room care expense and for miscellaneous charges must be analyzed and checked for accuracy. A file with up-to-date information must be kept for each resident. The A. C. Times is compiled and typed monthly. Board of Directors' minutes are typed and dispersed. Setting up procedures and job descriptions and keeping inventory and ordering supplies is included among our duties. Add to this partial list of things to do the many, many unexpected interruptions each day, and you will find the reason why this office is the pleasant area that it is - busy and happy to serve the residents and one another. In all of this, we try never to lose sight of the responsibility we feel toward the parents of our residents and to all who so faithfully support the Home. In the office, we are particularly grateful and indebted to our numerous professional volunteers, without whose help our work load would be much heavier. We have the opportunity to witness first hand the manifestation of God's love through His children, who have done so many acts of kindness throughout the years.

I am often overwhelmed by my inadequacies, as a Christian and as a teacher. I believe that most often I am least effective when I "play it safe." An nstitute speaker recently spoke of the importance of taking the risks. The Bible certainly encourages us to reach out and share another's burdens, to confess our own sins, and to fellowship. What good are we if we are vessels that do not respond to the specific needs of others? "No man is an island, no man stands alone . . ." (John Donne, paraphrased in song).

On the other hand, I, perhaps as we all, am sometimes tempted to pat myself on the back because "the person before didn't organize as well," or "I did such a good job," with the emphasis on I. You know all the rationalizations and forms: "if I do have to say so myself, I'm doing better than . . ." But we are taught if I am able to do anything it is only through the sacrifices that Christ first made and that many around me have made. Sometimes those earthly sacrifices (by my husband and child, my parents, relatives, brethren, friends and colleagues) laid the groundwork for other policies and steps to be taken that made the time right for what I did. Perhaps I was given credit; yet it truly was not all my doing. My (dare I say "our") debt is great to those who have affected me (us) in so many capacities, beginning, of course, with our hearts and lives and strength owed in full to our Lord. "But ye, beloved, building up yourselves on your most holy faith, praying in the Holy Ghost, Keep yourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." Jude 20.21.

thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." God wants us to consult Him, to be thankful, and to make our requests known. Many verses in Scripture teach us how we should pray. We need to pray repeatedly but not mechanically.

It was said of the Pharisees that they thought that would be heard for their long prayers. It isn't going to do us any good just to say the same thing over and over and over again. We should ponder upon what we are saying when we are praying to God. We need to pray in faith. We have to be careful that we aren't praying for something that we want and don't really need.

Often our prayers are of gratitude and they should be. We should thank God for supplying our needs, both earthly and spiritually. We should pray for others. I believe that every one of us is concerned for those who are without. for our own loved ones and for our friends and neighbors. We need to be concerned for all mankind, for everyone. There are about four billion (4,000,000,000) people upon the earth today, and every one of them has a soul. Do we remember them? Do we hold up their cases before our merciful God? I believe it is necessary to think about the needs of others, to do what we can to help them, to provide for them, and certainly to hold their condition before our good and great God.

We need to pray in faith, and the Word tells us that we need to pray according to God's will. It isn't going to do us any good, and in fact, it may harm us, if we ask of own desires for something which really wouldn't be good for us. We have to ask according to His will. In making our requests known to God, this will somewhat temper our prayers and direct them into the right channels. When we pray or when we ask for something, are we asking in a selfish way or would our desire be according to God's will?

I believe that in requesting, begging and beseeching God to draw other souls, we are on safe ground insofar as asking according to His will. The Bible tells us that it is not His will that any soul be lost or perish, but rather that everyone would be saved.

"And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Phil. 4:7. I believe that people have been deprived of almost everything but life itself, imprisoned with practically nothing except the peace of God. God was with them and the nearness of God was theirs. They did not let either the prison bars or physical suffering sway or deter them.

Many souls have lost their lives, some in a very cruel manner, in defense of their God and of their Lord Jesus Christ. Yet, we believe that they had the peace of God. To them, the peace of God was the most valuable thing in this world.

Anyone who has felt the condemnation of God because of his sinful condition and has fallen upon that Rock, which is Jesus Christ, becoming broken and then receiving the gift of peace into a previously troubled heart, realizes that the peace of God is the most valuable thing that is available today. The world strives for peace, but Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." John 14:27.

There is a peace which this world strives after. We believe that there is an honest effort to achieve peace among the nations. We are not convinced that the leaders of all nations really want peace. They want their own way; they want possession or mastery over other lands and nations. But we want to give as much credit as we possibly can to those who are earnestly striving for peace. They haven't been very successful. If we believe our historians, and I believe we can, the years since our Lord's appearance that the world has spent in peace, with no armed conflict at all could be counted on the fingers of our two hands. There hasn't been much peace in the world.

There is also much unsuccessful searching for inner peace. People turn to all kinds of things to achieve some sort of inner rest. Some simply claim the right to do anything that they want to do. They give themselves license to commit just about any sin imaginable. That doesn't bring peace.

The peace of God is the absence of condemnation, the knowledge that we are right with Him. We are at rest even though the world about us is turbulent, even though our outward circumstances are depressing or oppressing.

Before our reconciliation with God, there was within us the condemnation which was brought about by the nature of sin into which we were born and by our own committed sin. All of us have to acknowledge this as we grow to the age of accountability. When the price for this sin, paid by the Lord Jesus Christ, is received and applied by us, the condemnation is lifted. God forgives us and holds nothing against us any more. Our record is clear and we are at peace.

Won't it be wonderful, after this earth's trials are over, when we enter into eternity where there will be another kind of peace? It will be a peace that will be undisturbed for ever and ever.

I think that one of the most wonderful things about heaven will be that the enemy of our soul will not be there. I think that the best thing about heaven is that the Lord, along with many of our loved ones, will be there, but the absence of the enemy of our soul would make any place a pleasant place to be. Added to that is the presence of the One who died for us.

"The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, which we frequently read of in the Word, should be sought by any of us who don't have it, valued above all else by those of us who have been granted it, and retained by us at all earthly cost. There is nothing that is worth more than the peace of God. If we have that, we have all that is really necessary. If we don't have that, we have little of real value.

"Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." Phil. 4:8. Often times, the enemy will come to us with troublesome thoughts. He will come to us with evil thoughts. If we are not on guard, we will find ourselves very quickly feeding a thought which is not wholesome and which can really be evil.

We can't help it if a thought comes to us that isn't right or is downright evil. As we have often heard, "We can't help it if a bird flies over our head, but it is our fault if we permit it to nest in our hair." It's the same way with an evil thought. We can't help it if one passes through, but we have to strive very mightily and seek God's help so that it will do just that. Evil thoughts come and go very, very quickly.

These, then, are the things that we are to think about: things that are true, true in God's eyes. Poor troubled Pilate asked the question, "What is truth?" John 18:38. There are perhaps numerous definitions, but in another place in the Scripture, the question is answered very briefly and accurately and to the point. "Thy Word is truth." John 17:17. So, those things which are true according to God's Word are the things that we should think about, the things that our Father in heaven and our Savious would value.

There are all kinds of ideas. There are all kinds of thoughts. There are all kinds of theories. Many things are presented to us in a very convincing way, but any doctrine, any thought, or any way which does not conform to or stand upon the Word of God should be automatically and immediately rejected by us.

"Whatsoever things are honest..." We are told in more than one place that we should do that which is honest in the sight of all men. There is respect even in the world for honesty. If we aren't honest, we aren't trustworthy.

We need first of all to be honest with ourselves. We had to be honest with ourselves before we could repent and come to God. We had to know ourselves and be honest as to what we really were in the sight of God, which wasn't very good.

We have to be honest with God, and we have to be honest with our fellow men. We have the power within our hands to deceive our fellow men, but we would not want to do it. We can't deceive God. "God is not mocked." Gal. 6:7. We shall reap exactly what we sow. We wouldn't want to deceive our God, anyway, or our fellow men. We should be honest and upright on the inside as well as on the outside.

"Whatsoever things are just . . ." Justice is very closely related to honesty. "Whatsoever things are pure . . ." There is a great deal of impurity today. Again, there are many applications to these words. We need to get down upon our knees and ask God how these words apply to the situations which confront us. Certainly "pure" would mean the opposite of something which is defiled or contaminated. This refers first of all to our thoughts, to our words, and to our conduct. We should keep them pure, clean and holy.

"Whatsoever things are lovely . . ." Whatsoever is good in God's eyes. "Whatsoever things are of good report . . ." Do we find more satisfaction in a report that is good concerning someone than we find in hearing some ill report? Even though it may be accurate, do we find joy in that type of thing? We shouldn't. We should weep with those who weep or have misfortune, and we should rejoice with those who rejoice. We should cultivate an attitude of finding satisfaction in good reports and good news about others.

"If there be any virtue (Godly virtue), and if there be any praise, think on these things." Our speech, our conduct and our general walk of life begin with what we think. Therefore, let us think after a manner in which God wants us to think. God loves us all. He loves us more than we deserve to be loved, but He expects certain things of us and has a right to demand them. If we are to enter into His eternal realms, we have to follow His Word.

The Lord Jesus paid the price. He paid a price which we couldn't pay ourselves, but we have to apply His gift. Our Lord suffered terribly and was willing to serve His Father in heaven regardless of the cost to Himself. Are we any greater than our Master? Can we expect to be disobedient and still gain salvation?

We also have to be willing to sacrifice, sometimes even to suffer, to permit God to fit us into the place that He has in mind for us upon the earth. Then, He will have a place prepared for us in heaven.



THE SILVER LINING

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. DANIEL KOCH OF TREMONT, IL

Text: Philippians 4:4-11

"I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." Phil. 4:11. It is a wonderful blessing from God to be content with our lot and portion, whatever it is. We live in a world which seems to be requiring or even demanding more and more all the time. Yet, the Word of God does not tell us to expect much of this world's goods. Whatever comes our way from our good God after we diligently fulfill our duties here, should be accepted by us with thanksgiving, received as a blessing from Him, and used in a way that would please Him. We are expected to be content with such possessions as we are blessed with.

The Bible tells us that "Godliness with contentment is great gain." I Tim. 6:6. Godliness would seem to be aptly defined as being in the state that is after the likeness of God. We know that God's ways are as far above us as the heaven is above the earth. We know that He is the Supreme Being, Master of the universe, and Bishop of our souls. We cannot expect to be exactly like Him, but we should try to be like His example and His Word. We should be Godly in our manner, in our conduct and in our thinking. If we can do this, we surely will be content. What a wonderful blessing.

We have all observed people. It seems that acquiring more and more doesn't bring satisfaction, and sometimes it adds unrest. On the other hand, we have all seen people with little of this world's goods who were peaceful and contented. How fortunate they are.

"Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." Phil. 4:4. It would appear from this that if everything we had were taken away from us, we should still rejoice to have the Lord. In such circumstances, most of us would have difficulty rejoicing, but that is what we are suppose to do. We aren't supposed to be attached to the things of this world. Our most valuable possession should be the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. We should be thankful. We should rejoice.

"Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand." Phil. 4:5. There can be various interpretations insofar as the word "moderation" is concerned. We often hear that we should be moderate in all things, but we have to be very, very careful that we use the word "moderate" properly.

The word moderate means exactly what it says. We don't doubt that we should be moderate in all things. It is possible to be too extreme this way or too extreme that way. The Bible does not preach or teach the extreme, but a middle course. However, we want to be very careful. A middle course doesn't mean a moderate amount of sin or evil. God does not want us to tolerate evil or to embrace sin. We have to be very careful that what we feel is "moderation" isn't a way that is too lenient or too severe.

We should study the Word and we should do what we can to learn what is meant. We should sincerely and uprightly try to apply it, but we have to recognize the fact that only God knows exactly what is moderate, for instance, in every case. However, I believe that if we sincerely want Him to reveal His will and His way, He will do so.

"Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand." I suppose "the Lord is at Hand" could be applied in more than one way. If this Word, which was written perhaps two thousand years ago, included the words, "the Lord is at hand," how much more aware must we be?

When we make decisions about our conduct or about courses which we should take, when we consider the things which we think and the things which we say, we should remember that the Lord's coming is very near. Also, "the Lord is at hand" could very well mean that the Lord is around us, by us, and observes us all the time. Whether we are alone or whether people are around us, God knows what we are thinking and what we are saying. He knows what we do.

We are not alone insofar as His observation is concerned. This should cause us to be reverent and careful, not unduly tense or nervous. We should just be aware of the fact that God is by us and observing us. He wants us to please Him, and He wants to receive us into heaven one day.

"Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Phil. 4:6. We have to be careful about how we apply these words. "Be careful for nothing" doesn't mean that we shouldn't care for anything at all. It means we should not be unduly anxious about our physical needs and the things which surround us.

Too much of the time, I would have to place myself first insofar as being weak in this area. We all worry too much about what is going on around us, and about our circumstances; we trouble ourselves. We would be far better off if we depended more upon God.

Sometimes we wonder, "Did we really let God have His say about this, or, did we follow our own will and way?" It's very easy, when making a decision, to conclude that it is what God wants us to do. If we aren't careful, it can simply be what we want without due consideration as to what God wants.

Are we really willing in all our decisions, both great and small, to say, "Let Thy will be done?" If we can sincerely feel that in our hearts, and follow that course, it will be well with us.
