FIRST IMPRESSION OF INDIA

Bro. Wendell Gudeman

(Bro. Wendell Gudeman visited several of the Rural Gospel & Medical Missions of India's Tribal Congregations with Bros. Joseph Ramsier, Roy Grimm and John Klotzle. Taped on January 25, 1983 in India.)

As our plane landed, we could see scenes I had never fully observed before. I have been to Haiti and other poverty areas, but here in India, it's different. The people here in India have bright eyes; some have peace upon their faces, some have trouble upon their face that tells a life story. When we meet those who come to us. holding out both hands, it gives you a feeling immediately that they have something in their heart that is much like we feel in ours. When you read their eyes, you see a kind of expression that is much like "back home" when we see brethren that we haven't met for a long time. Standing in the background are many people who have an expression on their faces as though they are pondering what the future holds and wondering what these Christian people have that they don't have.

As we start out through the country, I remember as a boy in school reading about two-wheel ox carts in India. I did not realize that it's so prevalent today to see that wooden wheel and the oxen pulling their load. People are walking. Their dress is so commendable. The women are covered. They seem to be very polite. They are not forward. All of these scenes made deep impressions upon us.

Coming to the place where we met believers is an experience that is hard to comprehend. In the little villages that we visited, there is an unseen dividing line between believers and unbelievers. I believe I could have told within 95% accuracy those who were Christians and those who were not. Believers came to us with outstretched hands and a greeting of "Salam, Salam!" You could tell the Christians by their dress. They were clean. All the Christian women were covered for prayer and worship with their different colored saris and their manner is that of Christian behavior.

To hear them lift up their voices and sing in the Marathi language grips our hearts. I lean over and ask one of the Indian Pastors what they are singing and he says, "Jesus Christ is Lord!" One hymn was repeated over and over. When I asked what they were singing, the answer was, "Teach Us To Pray." They are all songs exalting Jesus Christ.

Then I asked them, "Do these people have what we have, are they born again?" The Pastor tells us, "Oh yes, everyone of these, for they no longer serve idols but Jesus Christ, the Son of God who died on Calvary's cross!" I had always thought that the people of India of the Hindu faith were serving a man, but it's not quite like that. As we drive through the country, we see idols; stones with marks painted on them. These people worship idols much like the Apostle Paul spoke about at Athens where he found they worshiped the "unknown god". There he declared unto the people the known God and Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world. Here on the other side of the Earth we find these pastors doing just what the Apostle Paul did; declaring unto the people the Christ, the Son of God. They must be telling them the true Word, because we see the people responding.

The pastors sat with us. At first we felt unworthy as they brought garlands to put around our necks. We felt like saying, "Don't give us this honor, give it to the Lord." But they wanted to honor us from America. They wanted to show kindness to us in the best way they could by bringing these garlands of flowers to us. In America, we would have invited them into our homes and our hearts and would have given them any comfort they needed. They gave us their very best. It must have taken hours for those dear people to string those live flowers of different kinds and colors with very fragrant aromas. As we drove through the country we didn't see these flowers growing, so they must have gone to great lengths to get them and put them together for us in such a beautiful manner. It made us feel very unworthy.

It will be hard to really relate to the people back home what we saw as we assembled with the tribal congregations. The meeting place is a thatched roof held up by wooden poles. We saw believing women with their heads

covered, sitting on one side and the believing men on the other side with the children intermingled in the group. Their dark eyes were fastened on the one who spoke. What impressed me so much (and I hope I'll never forget it) is when we were speaking they looked right at us, with respect. But, when their Pastor interpreted, standing right beside us as we spoke, they no longer looked at us but looked at their Pastor. They drank in every word that he said. Their minds were not on their visitors, their minds were on the Word of God. As the Pastor spoke, he often used what seemed to us like a lot of expressions of joy, some of sternness and some of teaching. Many times the little group of believers would all smile in unison because it touched their hearts simultaneously. Then they would be very quiet and serious, but those dark eyes would be fastened upon their own Pastors.

Another thing that impressed me were the children. They sat quietly. They didn't stir. The obedience and

the courtesy in behalf of the Word of God, their reverence toward the true and living God was something that we can even learn from. Children have great respect. When they pray, every eye is closed. They don't "peek"! I did, I wanted to see how they prayed! From the little children on up to the old, they put both their hands together, finger to finger and thumb to thumb, reverently, with eyes closed until the prayer was over. Not one opened their eyes and looked around. Then, when the Pastor came to the end of the prayer, they all said "Amen" in unison. The Pastor kept his head down just a little bit longer and then they all very reverently raised their heads.

When they sang, it was, as stated in the Scripture, "in simplicity and Godly sincerity". They worship the Lord. There are possibly some Scriptures that are hard to explain to these people. The reason is that we came halfway around the world, approximately 12,000 miles, but most of these people spend their entire lives never moving more than 30 or 40 miles from the place where they were born; living in extreme poverty.

When we came under their thatched roofs, I saw for the first time what Bro. Roy and all the brothers have been sharing with us from their previous experiences. They told of cow dung floors. I believe if I would have dropped anything from my hand onto the floor and picked it up, it wouldn't have

bothered me. We went into one poor little assembly place and they had cow dung plastered on the walls. You could lean against that wall. It's the way of life here. Sometimes we get everything out of focus. The loved ones sit right on the floor. Tonight as we're leaving this area, I could have sat with them and been very comfortable. These types of lessons are hard to comprehend for us who often sit in soft chairs.

The spirit of Christ that we have beheld, the way they sing with expression, and the way the little children join in unison; it was very precious to us. The pastors here are very dedicated pastors, looking to us for counsel and direction. They have one thing in common, and that's the welfare of their flocks. They want to keep them together and protected from false teaching. Their hope is to spread the Word to those that do not know the Truth. Their task is not easy. I think we have it easier at home because there are so many of us. We have four ministers in our church and over thirty Sunday School teachers.

Here in India, the harvest is great, but the laborers are few. They are doing the very best they can, and we have confidence that if the Lord tarries, there will be those who will carry on the Gospel story in India. Let us remember them in prayer and may the Lord send forth laborers into His harvest fields. To whom much is given — much is required.

tried to destroy man, even the children of promise. The children of Israel were punished many times, led away captive or destroyed in some way by God. APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

Dwight Eisenhower once said, "One of the fine things about silent prayer is that it shuts out the noise of the world." And how we long, sometimes, to escape from the pressures which we all experience, and how necessary and strengthening it is! Christ at various times told his disciples to "Come ye apart and rest awhile . . ." (Mark 6:31) The challenge is to accomplish this when there are so many opportunities to do

good to those who are in need, to spend time visiting the aged and discouraged, to help the disabled or handicapped to cope from day to day, to give assistance to a brother in need of food and clothing, to let a neighborly light shine to those about us in addition to struggling for our own needs and for the whole needs of our families and our loved ones.

In addition to the beautiful and comforting escape to prayer, there are techniques at our command to fortify and renew ourselves even in the midst of great activity. Perhaps if we stop to think about it, we will remember that it is the quiet, little happenings which can uplift us. Have we ever correlated the fact that it is the storms (weatherwise and otherwise) which cause turmoil, and that it is the sunny, peaceful time which comes quietly and brings about a tranquil feeling? It follows then that we search for the daily little gems to fortify us. What are they and where can they be found? Would it not be beneficial to begin each day with an eager search and then at the end of the day give thanks for having found them? There is that special touch of the hand; the innocent, but guileless expression of love from a child; a brief ray of sunshine on a cloudy day; a quiet look of understanding; silence, when a cruel word could have been said; the exuberant song of a sparrow on a rainy day; a warm, forgiving and encouraging smile from a fellow-pilgrim or an unexpected, small courtesy. These are all so fleeting that in our pre-occupation, they are easily forgotten. But let us not forget them. Let's rather forget the negative punches in life which damage the peace of heart and soul. This challenge can be met by believing in Philippians 4:13, which reads, "I can do all things through Christ, which strengtheneth me."

Continuing our "tour" of the Home which began recently, we want to visit the Kitchen Department. The significance of the kitchen here is much like the kitchen to children of a family in a home anywhere. Upon coming home from a day at workshop, school or PARC, many will drop by and ask, "What's for dinner? I'm starved." Mm-m, it smells good!" The mother hearts which so lovingly prepare the food and manage this department cannot help but season their labors with love after comments like this. Often after the meal is over, there will be

remarks like, "Oh, that was good!" One of the beautiful things about our residents is that a comment such as this is completely genuine and equals to beautiful compensation for many long hours of labor from the early hour of 5:30 a.m. until after the evening meal is cleared away. Eighty-six residents are served at breakfast: forty-one residents and 25 staff are served at lunch and 86 residents and sixteen staff are served at dinner. Thirty residents are on 1000-calorie diets; fourteen are on 1500-calorie diets; three are on diabetic diets and four are on bland diets. An idea of quantity is realized when we say it takes 25# of potatoes for salad or 35# of rolled roast for one meal. Twice a week, we bake all of our own bread, buns, pies and cookies. About twenty loaves are baked twice a week, and how we enjoy the aroma! Breakfast is served at 7:30, lunch at 12:00, and dinner is at 5:00. Eight residents help in the dining room, clearing off, washing and resetting the tables for the next meal. Once a month, there is an evening birthday party for those who have birthdays during that month. Usually the families involved come, bringing decorated sheet cakes and ice cream for everyone at this time. Then on the actual birthday, a small cake with a candle is served to the individual and is shared with the other three at this table. When there is a Bake Sale at Workshop, the kitchen bakes something for the individual to take to contribute to the cause.

As all departments are, we are subject to visits from governmental inspections. Cleanliness, of course, is of prime importance. Proper equipment, accident and fire prevention and quality of food are constantly under surveillance.

Many precious memories remain. Remarks like, "M-m-m, that was good. It tasted just like Mom's" is more than reward for our efforts. One goal of this department is not only to provide the food needs of our residents, but to convey to them that this is their home where they are loved and truly cared for.

She replied quickly, "Do you know that if at birth I had been able to make one petition, it would have been that I should be born blind?" "Why?" asked the surprised clergyman. "Because when I get to heaven, the first face that shall ever gladden my sight will be that of my Savior!"

One of Miss Crosby's hymns was so personal that for years she kept it to herself. Kenneth Osbeck author of several books on hymnology, says its revelation to the public came about this way: "One day at a Bible conference in Northfield, Massachusetts, Miss Crosby was asked by D. L. Moody to give a personal testimony. At first she hesitated, then quietly rose and said, 'There is one hymn I have written which has never been published. I call it my soul's poem. Sometimes when I am troubled, I repeat it to myself, for it brings comfort to my heart.' She then recited while many wept, 'Someday the silver cord will break, and I no more as now shall sing; but oh, the joy when I shall wake within the palace of the King! And I shall see Him face to face, and tell the story - saved by grace!" At the age of 95, Fanny Crosby passed into glory and saw the face of Jesus.

day's reading, we can see how the Lord Jesus came upon the earth and did His work in His days here. He was brought to trial, accused and nailed upon the cross. There He gave His innocent blood for the remission of sin.

If the Lord had remained in the grave, where would your promise and mine be? Beloved, He did not stay in the grave. He arose to the power of God and He left instructions before He departed from this world.

These are the instructions that are laid to the hearts of each one of us. I believe, brothers and sisters, that we all have a duty to carry them out. He said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Mark 16:15. Do you think, brothers and sisters, that that means only we who are humble ministers of the Gospel? I believe that it means every brother and every sister.

Do you realize that, as you and I go forth in the world, others are observing us? May I mention just a few words of our trip in the commercial airlines? People observed my wife and two daughters. They observed to the point that when we came back on the plane a week later, they asked about our faith. I hope that wherever we go we can be a good example of our faith, that we can be a light, for isn't it a precious gift to us that we have been saved?

Let us briefly, brothers and sisters, go back to the time when some of us prayed all night that if the Lord would just let us live until morning, we would repent. You and I are to preach this Word throughout the world. It does not mean that we always have to speak openly, but let us always be an example of our faith.

Beloved, when we pray all night and can only see a little light floating in the distance beyond our reach, we can feel a little how it will be in eternity. Will some who have not repented have to travel in darkness forever? Will they see the little light gleam in the distance and never attain it? I have never forgotten that feeling. It touched me and struck my heart so deeply that I thought that if by grace I could relieve that pressure of sin through the blood of Jesus Christ and walk in the light of the Spirit, I would do my part.

It mentions so vividly here, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; and he that believeth not shall be damned." Mark 16:16. This is only one verse in the Holy Bible. How much does it mean to your heart and mine? "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved."

The other week, a friend came in repentance and wanted to unburden her heart. She said, "I cannot go home this way. The load is too heavy." Beloved, we can hear the confession but we cannot forgive. Each one must have faith in this Lord that you and I have faith in. Upon bended knees all must plead with Him for forgiveness and pardon, and, when the Lord forgives them, He casts that sin away. It never troubles them again, and there is peace for the soul. How precious it is. It is wonderful!

To live under the torment of sin is sorrow. But just think how it would be if we had to live under it forever, and never attain the promise that we have heard this afternoon in the Word. It even mentions here, "... but he that believes not shall be damned." Which shall it be?

I believe that you and I can somewhat comprehend what eternity is, for we are here on earth for a time. I have been privileged to meet some folks who

were sixty, seventy or eighty years old. Beloved, that is short compared with eternity which can't be thought of in years. How comforting it is to know that, if we serve Him with all our hearts, He will provide for us through all eternity. The Lord says further, "These signs shall follow them that believe; In my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." Mark 16:17, 18.

You and I know that in the apostles' time many of those things took place. Are we to believe that they can happen today? When I was reading this last part, "They shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover," I thought that every brother and sister has probably been by the bedside of a sick loved one. Many times the report from the doctor is almost hopeless, but through fervent prayer, through asking God that His will be done, there are times when we have been amazed at God's response in a recovery. Those of us who have regained health and had pain removed are thankful every day that we can go to and fro and enjoy the wonderful blessings of God.

"So then after the Lord had spoken unto them. He was received up into heaven, and sat on the right hand of God." Mark 16:19. Today, beloved, He is in heaven, a place we cannot see but a place that we know is there. Even our little grandchildren know what heaven is, and they know what hell is. However, as the years go by and they grow up, some of them go on their own ways. We wonder, perhaps, if they forgot. I am sure that in every family circle there are deep concerns. We have fervent prayers. We ask God to direct and lead each soul so that many will still be redeemed by His blood before His coming.

"And they went forth, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following." Mark 16:20.

Today, beloved, I have heard that you have a soul repenting, too. What a blessing it is to know that we are living in the day of grace, in the time when God still hears and answers prayer. SERMON BY BRO. NOAH GERBER OF WEST BEND, IA

Text: Mark 16

As we read the Word this afternoon, we know that we are nearing the time of year when we are reminded of the Lord's resurrection from the grave and ascension into heaven.

Beloved, we read about believing and about faith. The Word speaks to us in one passage of Scripture, "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, (it is) the evidence of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1. that is a very good definition of the faith that is so precious to our hearts.

As the brother read in the Psalms that all nations should acknowledge the Lord and His almighty power, I wondered if we fully appreciate the faith that our forefathers have kept for us. It is now our duty to keep it for the next generations.

As I look back over a period of time, I cannot help but say that I have observed changes within the church. I am not saying that it has decreased our faith, but certainly I believe that we have to be very careful.

Recently we visited with a neighbor who is of another faith. He said that he admires the way that we have time to sit down during the noon hour to visit one with another, and to discuss the things that are so important to us in our spiritual walk of life.

Perhaps, brothers and sisters, some of you are not very aware of the time when a great depression came over our land. I'm sure that we have older brothers who would be very qualified to speak of it. They had hardships, and, even though some of us were young, we knew that we had to be very careful in our spending and saving.

I have been told that it was brought up within the church at that time that they should quit serving dinner, that people didn't have enough money. But I believe the Lord always speaks, and that He inspired a brother to stand up and say, "If our faith is so weak that we don't believe the Lord will provide us with this noon bread, our faith will fall apart."

So, brothers and sisters, it has been continued down through the years and I hope that we cherish and appreciate it. To me, it gives such a warm and welcome feeling to meet brothers and sisters in the noon hour, and to speak of heavenly things and of our crosses and experiences. We can encourage each other.

As we go a little further down the guidelines, shall we say, the sisters sit on the one side and the brothers on the other. Perhaps you and I give it little thought. But those of us who are the servants of the Lord have our duties. I remember a time when an older elder brother spoke to someone in our family circle who had repented (he had not been brought up in our faith). In the church to which he had gone, husbands and wives sat together. He wondered why we had such a different custom in our church. The elder said to him, "When we are together in God's house, in the sanctuary, we are as in heavenly places."

Now just think. Where husband and wife would sit together, what about the poor widow and the poor widower? As you have experienced in this past week, they would not be together. Would they then be equal in the house of God? It is a foretaste of those heavenly blessings.

I believe that our seating custom has its merit. It has its value. I hope that we can do our part to uphold the things that have value and merit. As we have mentioned, our faith is very, very precious to our hearts. I wonder if we really value it enough. Some of us have opportunities to travel, to visit various churches, and to meet loved ones whom we have never met before. Regardless of where we are, we can sit down and have fellowship together and

appreciate the gifts that God has given.

This chapter that we have read this afternoon takes me back to my childhood. In our community we have several different churches as you probably have also. I believe that your children today aren't any different than we were in our day. We talked over our faith with the children in our class, and they wondered about this and about that.

One young man said to me, "Noah, it seems like in your church they just choose someone to preach. They don't go to seminaries; they don't go to schools of learning." He said, "How can that be?" I little thought that someday I would preach the Holy Word. But I was moved, even as a friend, to say that we had faith in our brothers who had repented and who had experienced the love of God in their hearts. Surely they would know how to interpret the Holy Word. I believe, brothers, that we can appreciate this. It doesn't take schools of higher learning to learn from this Holy Word. The Lord was a fine example. He was humble. He was meek. He understood the Word. He laid it out so plainly that, I believe, everyone of us can understand salvation, and so we trust that down through the years this blessing can be imparted to the churches.

As we have read here, the crucifixion was past. We are all aware of what took place. There was a trial. Things that had been foretold in the Old Testament came to pass. A murderer was freed, and your Lord and mine gave His life on the old rugged corss.

I believe that we often wonder why God planned it that way, but we need not question what God has done. Time and time again in the Old Testament we can read that the blood of lambs without a blemish was shed for the forgiveness of sins. It never was a lasting peace. In the chapters preceding to-
