II COR. 9:7

Giving! At a time when we're hearing about business losses, bankruptcy, crop failures, lay-offs and wage cuts, this sure doesn't seem like an appropriate topic. But let's take a second look.

But what about when times are "tough". "Tough times" can offer us more opportunity for blessing than times of plenty. In Luke 21, Jesus commended the widow who, of her penury (or poverty), had cast in all she had. Her two mites were probably a far cry in comparison to the gifts of the rich men, but she received the greater blessing. Let's ask ourselves, is it a true sacrificial gift to give only out of our abundance? There is a saying that says, "Give until it hurts, then keep on giving till it feels good!" "Tough times" may be discouraging, but let's use these trials to strengthen our faith (James 1:2-4). God challenges us to place our trust in him. In Mal. 3:10 He commanded His people to "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse . . . and **PROVE** *me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts,* if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it.

So we see that our opportunity to give cheerfully is not limited in any way by what we have or how hard the times are. Let us throw off any inhibitions in this area and allow our God to use us and multiply that which we sacrificially offer to Him.

FOOD PARCELS FOR BRETHREN IN ROMANIA

Our program to provide aid to many of our needy brethren in Romania is progressing very well. At our meeting in Gridley, IL a detailed report was presented to the World Relief Committee. Thus far, nearly 140 individual packages were ordered and we are pleased to report, that all are being received by the recipients or beneficiaries in good order. The Romanian postal service has been delivering these parcels to the homes of the brethren and a signed receipt is returned to us bearing the postmark and date of delivery. During the past few months 57 letters were received from various places, of brethren who received the food packages. It is very heart warming to hear their expressions of gratitude and thanks to our Almighty God and to the brethren in America, who are moved by divine love and compassion and fail not to remember them in their needs.

Orders are delivered approximately 5 - 6 weeks from the date the orders are mailed in. Each package contains 10 kg. (22 lb.) of food. A typical package contains flour, powdered milk, rice, cooking oil, canned meats (ham, pork and beef), hard salami and dried, smoked sausages, coffee, sugar and chocolate.

Anyone wishing to help in this noble cause, may make a contribution through your local World Relief representative and designate it so it will be forwarded to the Food for the Romanian brethren. Let us remember the words of our Saviour and do it in faith in His name.

THE BLISS OF HEAVEN Willis R. Ehnle

"Why Emma, I didn't know you were here?" These words were spoken by a brother in our church as he closed his eves in death after having suffered a fatal fall from an apple tree a good number of years ago. I remember reading of that account in the Silver Lining some years after it had occurred.

A number of days had elapsed between this brother's fall and the time of his death, during which time his sister, Emma, had died. Because of his serious condition, he was not informed of her death. Hence, he expressed surprise unto meeting her in the spirit world in heaven as he left the body.

I called at the home of one of our kindergarten children where the grandmother had died. The grandfather met me and expressed himself in Japanese, "I don't know why my wife has left us but she has gone to heaven." Actually, Buddhism teaches that human beings become Hotoke Sama, or gods, upon dying, and that the family can get a better name for the departed one by paying more money to the Buddhist temple, if the information I have is correct. Nevertheless, they speak of heaven.

I have never gone to a home where someone has died and been told. "Please come in. Our loved one has gone to hell." The thought of hell is too much for us to concede to, but the thought of heaven, in contrast, is comforting and reassuring.

An American friend of mine here in Japan told me that he was a Marine on one of the Pacific Islands during World War II. He and his buddies were stranded without supplies and one by one they died. One day he and one of his buddies, a Jewish Marine, were sitting outdoors when his seriously weakened friend said he didn't think he could live much longer. This friend then prayed this prayer, in all seriousness, "Dear God, if you help me out of this jam I promise I'll never bother you again." He died the next day and my friend told me that in a museum somewhere in California is written his prayer, entitled, "The Prayer of a Dying Marine". A very common phrase during World War II was, "There are no atheists in the fox holes." The thought was that everybody prayed there and such was the case of the dying marine who was not in the practice of praying or of exercising faith in God but who did muster one prayer in his desperation. His prayer is in stark contrast to the prayer that so many prayed during that war, "Dear God, if you get me out of this and let me live, I promise that I will live for you the rest of my life." The latter prayer is easier prayed than carried out but with God all things are possible.

In any case, we long to live, especially when we face death, and when death becomes inevitable, we long to think of and speak of going to heaven, an obscure place, not clearly defined even in the Scriptures. In fact, the Apostle Paul wrote in I Corinthians 2:9, "But as it is written, eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him." It appears to be quite impossible to clearly define heaven in our present languages. However, the Scriptures give us many hints as to what it is like.

In John, Chapter 14, the Lord Jesus Christ is speaking to his disciples in verse 2, "In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you." We understand from this that there are mansions in heaven but we don't really know if they are at all the kind of mansions we see here on earth. I was once told by a university professor that a wealthy man is a man who owns a big house or mansion, filled with servants. He himself has little

time to be there. That has always made me a bit apprehensive about mansions but I believe they must have a better system in heaven.

One time many years ago I was reprimanded by a young seminary student in Portland, Oregon, for speaking of the new Jerusalem mentioned in Revelation 21, as heaven. He said that was not heaven but the new Jerusalem so I held my peace, but after careful reflection and the passing of many years. I will again venture to speak of the new Jerusalem as heaven. It is written in verse 2, "And I, John, saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband." Since it came down from God out of heaven. I assume it was and is to be, at least an extension of heaven. I can imagine heaven including a whole universe, or whatever would make it better.

The conditions there shall be pretty good according to the 4th verse, "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away." The very things which cause us considerable discomfort and annoyance here on earth are to be done away with in that heavenly city, which is a cube, foursquare. "And the city lieth foursquare ... The length and the breadth and the height of it are equal." Verse 16. Those living in the center of the cube will evidently have no trouble getting ventilation, or better yet, no ventilation will be necessary for complete comfort.

In verse 21 we read, "... And the street of the city was pure gold, as it were transparent glass." How would you like to walk on a street of pure gold? It is an envigorating thought but here again it may be a different kind of gold, much better than what we have, or hear about, here on earth.

Verse 23 tells us, "And the city had no need of the sun, neither of the moon, to shine in it: for the glory of God did lighten it, and the Lamb is the light thereof." This is really what completes the bliss of heaven where we will have many wonderful and interesting times. I speak of the glory of God and the very presence of His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. That, I am certain, will be beyond ecstasy. I hope to meet you there with a cheerful greeting.

November 18 — The time for our annual Benefit Day is close at hand. If you wish to volunteer your services for the day, please phone 266-9781, giving your name, address, spouse's name and phone number. In this way, you can be contacted about working. Remember, we do need your items to sell.

October is anniversary month here at the Home for the Handicapped. With the Psalmist we say, "O Give thanks unto the Lord. Make known his deeds among the people." (Ps. 105:1). Truly it has been the Lord's work here, and we want to "make known to all people" that so many have shared in this far-reaching responsibility. Only our Heavenly Father can know the sacrifice and the love which were the motivation. Often when we receive gifts of money, we wonder what it is the donors may have denied themselves to

make the gift possible; and we can only utter humble thanks to our Heavenly Father who can again "fill their cups". And when we make known a need for physical help, the response is there. though we realize that perhaps personal plans had to be sacrificed. Then we think of the example of a dear. elderly one who, though in failing health, grew a large garden so that he could bring its fruits to the Home, while at the same time apologizing that he could not bring more because of the unusual heat and drought. His love was undeniable. We at the Home are merely the instruments to express thanks in behalf of the residents. A rich reward will surely follow some wonderful day.

A walking tour of the Home must, of course, include the all-important nursing department. But where is it? Is it at the nurses' stations? Is it those in uniform who are scattered throughout the facility? Is it those who administer meds at the appointed hour? It is all of these around the clock, but it is more — much more. They are "mothers" to the young, encouraging them with a good morning hug and kiss; they are comforters and consolers in times of discouragement as well as sources of physical care. Though the intangible aspects of care are the responsibility of all staff working as a team, yet the nursing staff is the first source of hands-on, loving care.

Because love is of prime importance to our residents, we need to examine what it really is. Based on a right relationship with God, it has been defined as the forgetting of oneself for the good of another. Only in this way can love truly reach those of our "family". A walking tour of the Home does not reveal the many extra acts of kindness rendered by the staff. (Aides and other staff members often take residents for an outing on their time off or go shopping for them, also on their time off. When there is an organized, planned outing, many times staff members volunteer time for the benefit of residents.) Sometime ago a friend gave me a book of a mother's view of spiritual insights. That task of being a parent is often a frustrating and thankless job. yet we all know the joys and rewards of it.

NO-STRINGS-ATTACHED KIND OF LOVE

"... the greatest of these is love." I Cor. 13:13

In a recent column, Ann Landers asked her readers, "If you had it to do over again, would you have children?" An overwhelming 70% of those readers who responded, said "No".

For myself, I would unhesitantly say that the joys of being a parent far outweigh the hardships. I have a hard time understanding why so many responded as they did, unless their motivation for becoming a parent in the first place was wrong. Even though there are many rewards in parenting, a person should never become a parent simply for those rewards. The motivation must be, "I have something of myself to give, a special, no-stringsattached kind of love, and I can best give it by being a parent."

The Greeks used the word agape for this kind of love "willing another's highest good". It's the kind of love God is, and demonstrates. Paul, in I Corinthians 13 gives us a beautiful definition of it

Every time I read this chapter, I am slapped in the face with how far short I really come. So I submit my "amplified version" of I Cor. 13:1-8, not as a description of what I've attained, but rather as a goal toward which I'm working. This is not intended to be a substitute for the actual text; please read the Scripture along with my word.

Though I speak with the tongues of Haim Ginott and Dr. Spock, and have not God's kind of love, the sound of my words has as much value as a dripping faucet, or a squeaking oven door.

If, because of my age and experience, my knowledge exceeds that of my children; but I do not in love recognize that sometimes they must experience and discover things by themselves, that knowledge is worth noth-

ing. If I had that faith which can move mountains, and tried to force it on my children in an unloving way, it would amount to nothing.

If I give up that new dress so my son can have the football equipment that means so much to him; even if I were to give my own life to save my child's life, and did it without God's kind of love, I would achieve precisely nothing.

This love of which I speak is slow to lose patience - even when asked, "Mom, why -?" for the seventeenth time that day. It looks for a way of being constructive . . . if my child brings home a spelling paper with every word wrong. I can praise him for the care with which he printed his name in the corner, and, one at a time, we'll work together at learning to spell those words. Love is not possessive; even when my child chooses to confide in an adult other than myself. Love doesn't allow me to be anxious to impress friends and acquaintances with the athletic prowess or academic achievements of my children. Nor does love permit cherishing an unrealistic picture of my children.

Love has good manners; even when no one's home but the children. Love is not touchy; even after a very short night. Love does not keep account of evil; "Is that that naughty Timmy Smith who trampled all over my flowers last Spring?" Love doesn't gloat over the wickedness of other people's children: "MY Kristin would never do a thing like that!"

Love knows no limit to its endurance; even if a daughter has been sick, cleaned up, and put back to bed four times already that night. Love knows no end to its trust; that diary is private, even if the key is accessible. Love knows no fading of its hope; even after the last ballot from the Student Council election is tallied, and my son's opponent has won; There's always next year! God's kind of love can outlast anything. It is, in fact, the one thing that still stands when all else has fallen.

(Continued from Page 32) ourselves in godliness and shy away from those things which work for the devil. Paul spoke of other things also. He spoke of brotherly love. It is a positive approach, dear ones. He said that we should love our brother. We have been taught that the greatest commandment of all is that we should have love for our brother. What are some things, dear ones, that aren't considered acts of love? What are some of the things that we might do that would indicate a lack of love for our brother?

We see our brethren in church. We love to come to church and greet each other. We also have occasion to see our brethren in our daily walk of life. I am sure that in a large congregation such as you have here, you do many things with each other. I think that is wonderful. But here is the warning: "That no man go beyond and defraud his brother in any matter: because that the Lord is the avenger of all such, as we also have forewarned you and testified. For God had not called us uncleanness, but holiness." I Thess. 4:6, 7. In our dealings with our brethren (or with everyone as we read further) there is no place for fraud or to defraud.

Paul also reminds us that "God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness." I Thess. 4:7. We prize our calling. It is very precious to us that we have been called, called to come out from the world and from those things which are not right in the sight of God. Let us embrace those things which are holy. God says: "Be ye holy; for I am holy." Lev. 11:4 and I Peter 1:16.

We might think concerning our failings, "Well, it's just myself; I am the only one who knows." Or, we might say to ourselves, "My brother and I are the only two who know about this thing." Or, "I'm only hurting my brother." That is not what this Word tells us, is it? "He therefore that despiseth, despiseth not man, but God, who hath also given unto us his holy Spirit." I Thess. 4:8. Think of that, dear ones. Whenever we fail, we fail against God. We disappoint Him. We don't want to be a disappointment to God.

"But as touching brotherly love ye need not that I write unto you: for ye yourselves are taught of God to love one another." I Thess. 4:9. Isn't it a blessing that we can go to the Word of God and find many examples of brotherly love.. We don't have to dwell on those things which we should not do. We can dwell on those things which we should do, and those times in which we find that we can help each other.

We recall the example of loving our neighbor. A lawyer, tempting Jesus, asked Him, "Who is my neighbor?" Luke 10:29. Then we have one of the most beautiful parables in the Bible given concerning the question of who our neighbor is. I know you know it well and I do not need to repeat it, but it certainly is a lesson to us. It is certainly a blessing for us when we read those words together and clearly see our duties before God and for our fellow men.

Continuing with today's Scripture. Paul beseeched Thessalonians again. Isn't it wonderful that the apostle loved them so much that he beseeched them? I think it means more than just. "Now, I'm telling you these things." He is exhorting them . . . he is beseeching . . . he is pleading with them to do these things. I think that is a sign of real love to be that earnest in our speech. ". . . but we beseech vou, brethren, that ye increase more and more." I Thess. 4:10. We find that it is like abounding more and more.

"That ye study to be quiet, and to do your own business, and to work with your own hands, as we commanded you; That ye may walk honestly toward them that are without, and that ye may have lack of nothing." I Thess. 4:11, 12. Here we see that blessings follow when we are willing to be obedient to God. We know that many people in this world are dishonest. We know that many people gain because they are dishonest. But the Lord has given us a greater promise than that. He has promised us right here, through the apostle, that if we mind our own business, work with our own hands, and are honest with everyone we will lack nothing!

I believe that that is indeed something that we ought to consider. I believe that many of us, all of us, can say, "It is so true." Although we don't have all of the luxuries that the world offers, and cannot afford them, yet we find that we are content. We have enough to live a very good life, a better life than our ancestors ever dreamed of. Let us not take it for granted. Let us give God the praise and the thanks.

Now, as we find ourselves becoming better prepared to meet the Lord through these exhortations, we dare lay hold of His promise and trust in His coming. How wonderful it is to be reminded of those things which are to come to pass in the future. "But I would not have your to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep. that ye sorrow not even as others which have no hope." I Thess. 4:13. Dear ones, when a loved one passes from time into eternity, even though we have the precious hope that that soul lived for the Lord, it is difficult to say that there really is no need for sorrow. At least we do not sorrow as do those who had no

There must be deep grief when souls who were not prepared pass from time into eternity. However, we dare not or must not judge. We do not "play God." We do not know the destiny of a soul, but we can't help but think about it. We must encourage everyone who is gathered here today to make preparation because all of us will someday depart this life. We want to know that we are prepared, we also want to know that those whom we leave behind are comforted. No doubt they will sorrow, but not as they would sorrow for one who had no hope. Such a difference, dear ones, such a difference in the manner in which we leave this life!

What the Lord Jesus said, and what the apostle has repeated here, is that when the Lord comes again we who walk with Him in faith will be caught up in the air to meet Him. We know that. But what about those who have already died? Will they be given that opportunity also to be with the Lord? Here are the precious words: "... that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep." I

Thess. 4:15. "Will not prevent them." I think I heard someone say, ". . . will not precede them." We will be caught up together to be with the Lord.

There will be a glorious reunion and the reunion is going to take place when the Lord returns. At that time we are going to hear various things. It is going to happen

very quickly.

"For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord." I Thess. 4:16, 17.

That is going to be the end. That is what we are striving for today while we still have the breath of life. Why do we speak these words. ones? We speak because we believe through faith that the Lord opened this Word to us. Is anyone sad because we read these words? I hope not, because that is not what the apostle intended them for. He said. "Wherefore comfort one another with these words." I Thess. 4:18. Are they a comfort to us? I believe, dear ones, that if they are not a comfort to us, we are not quite right with the Lord. I believe that if they are not a comfort to us. the Lord is still calling us. He is still beckoning to our friends so that they might prepare themselves for His coming. If any feel a burden in their hearts, they can come to Him and He can remove that burden so that these words will be a comfort.

May it be that these words of exhortation to holiness might have been a blessing to each of us. May we not just accept the fact that Christ has died for us and continue on through lie as if we are unconcerned, but rather heed the words that we read and be willing to abound more and more and to increase more and more.

Again, I don't want to leave the impression that this can be done of ourselves. It can be done with willingness on our part through prayer and through grace of God. May the Lord bless you.

SERMON BY BRO. KENNETH INDERMUHLE OF SARDIS, OH

Text: I Thessalonians 4

The caption under the chapter number in this particular Bible says: "Holiness and the Lord's Coming." That is what we read about, dear ones. Someone might now be thinking, "the message is going to be that we should become holy so that we are ready for the Lord's coming."

But first, I don't believe that we could preach a sermon or speak on a subject like this without considering the great price that has been paid that we might become holy. By our own power we could read these words or even study every word in this chapter and be no better off at all. We cannot of ourselves become holy.

However, you and I know that the Lord Jesus was crucified for our sins, and that we, through faith in His death, can have a converted mind and spirit. With this beginning (which many of us have made, and we exhort all who have not, to please make it) and with the privilege that the Lord gives us to share His Spirit, we can look at these words as a help to us. We can further prepare ourselves for the great day when the Lord comes again.

To repeat, we cannot do it of ourselves; but, after beginning our walk with the Lord, such teachings as we have here can help us, as the Word says, to "make . . . our calling and election sure." If Peter 1:10. That is what we need, dear ones; we need comfort.

When we have doubts in our minds and wonder, "Will we be permitted to enter into those heavenly mansions..", then we search ourselves with the Spirit of God and ask ourselves, "Are we going to be ready.." All that we can do is pray to God, asking Him to reveal to us whether or not we still stand in His

grace and whether or not we are ready to meet Him. He can reveal our needs to us, perhaps even some of the things of which we have heard today. He can show us through His Living Word what is necessary.

When we compare our lives with this Word, if we measure up and if we have faith to believe, then we still stand in His grace and indeed we are ready. I believe that we should go through this process daily so that we can cleanse ourselves and can say each day, "Yes, I am ready."

ready."
I notice in the reading, the word "abound." Paul told the Thessalonians that, through himself, they had been given the com-

mandments of the Lord Jesus Christ: ". . . that as ye have received of us how ye ought to walk and to please God . . "But now he beseeches them to "abound more and more." I Thess. 4:1. We can see that we do not have a stopping point in our spiritual growth. We cannot have a point at which we reach the height of pleasing God. As a matter of fact, most of us would agree that though we feel we are ready, we feel very insignificant before God. We strongly wish that we could do more. We deeply wish that we could have our vessel in

better order.

It is as we have read. We should abound more and more. We should strive every day to live better. "For ye know what commandments we gave you by the Lord Jesus." I Thess. 4:2. We have a record of those commandments and we know what He expects of us. The apostle was specific and perhaps we should be also. When we consider our standing before the Lord, we should ask ourselves, "Where do we fail? Where do we fall short of His

teachings? Where do we err? Where do we sin?"

We were reminded this morning in a prayer that everything which we do that is not right in the sight of God might be classified as sin. We believe some of the things are failings, but God does not like us to fail. Paul became specific in this chapter, dear ones, in talking with them of their needs and problems. I think that all mankind ought to take a look at these words because the great sin of fornication is rampant. I believe that we need to remind ourselves of God's directives so that we never give the enemy an opportunity to enter into our lives in this way. Paul said, "... everyone of you should know how to possess his vessel in sanctification and honour; Not in the lust of concupiscence, even as the Gentiles which know not God." I Thess. 4:4,

Think of the situation in the city of Corinth. The Apostle Paul came there and saw a disastrous thing. Where the Gentile people dwelt a that time, fornication was common among the people. They habitually did things which God reserved for married life, as is still commanded today.

It is a warning to us. I do not stand in judgment or in fear that we have this sin, but I believe that the warning is to remind us how to possess our vessels. I think that is probably our message today. I think that we should examine ourselves. We may think that it does not matte, dear ones, how we look, or act, or conduct ourselves, but I believe that it does matter. If we cause a soul to fail, if we cause a weak soul to be overcome by temptation, we will be held accountable.

Let us heed the warning to keep (Continued on Page 30)
