"... The pastors also transgressed against me. . " (vs. 8) Today we have more elders and ministers than ever before. They meet together often to counsel and promote unity, but they cannot hold the Church together by themselves. They need sincere encouragement, the daily prayers of the Church, and kind admonition from the members if they fail to uphold the Truth. Sermons should have strong

COMPROMISE WITH SIN

The dictionary describes a compromise as an agreement arrived at by mutual concessions. This means that each party gives up something and therefore loses something it believes in.

Compromises usually take time to negotiate, therefore the changes they bring do not come suddenly, and sometimes are hardly noticed as changes. Exactly the same can be said of compromising our spiritual principles which is really compromising with sin.

Jeremiah chapter two gives seven stages that are involved in compromising sacred principles. It would be helpful to read this chapter before you complete this article. 1. Israel had something very precious.

"I remember thee, the love of thine espousals... Israel was holiness to the Lord." (vs. 2, 3) When we repented and came into the Church, we valued our relationship with God as most precious in our lives.

2. Over a period of time they lost it.

"What iniquity have your fathers found in me, that they are gone far from me, and have walked after vanity . . ?" (vs. 5) Vanity is fruitless desire or endeavor. It took place slowly over a period of years as each generation gave up a few tenets of faith dear to their fathers. Perhaps none of these by them-

emphasis on the Pure Word and follow the Faith and belief of those who have gone before. We must keep the Faith pure and the Word undiluted!

5. At any time they returned to Him, God would have accepted them.

"Wherefore I will yet plead with you saith the Lord and with your children's children will I plead." (vs. 9) When we feel ourselves slipping into compromise, let us go back to the day we received peace with God and to the covenant in the baptismal waters. This is the milestone that marks the beginning of our journey in Faith and the cornerstone on which our spiritual house is built. Remember, God always will keep His side of the covenant.

They substituted something false for something real and precious.

"For my people have committed two evils; they have forsaken me the fountain of living waters, and hewed them out cisterns, broken cisterns that can hold no water." (vs. 13) Now comes the real effect of compromise, when we substitute worldly things, goals, and ideals in the place of True Spirituality. This is the final stage in which our life, instead of being transformed by the renewing of our minds, becomes conformed to the world. The evidence is found in our walk of life. our choice of companions, how we spend our leisure time, the places we visit, our outward appearance, our obedience and submission to the will of God, our attendance at church, our fellowship with those of like mind, and so forth. Do we establish and practice good habits in reading the Word and in regular prayer? Are we really living a consecrated life of self-denial? Selfexamination and evaluation in the Light of the Word are absolutely essential in the life of a believer. The Holy Spirit will guide us if we seek in faith to find - if we, as Enoch, are truly walking with God.

7. Their own acts convicted them. "Thine own wickedness shall correct thee, and thy backslidings shall reprove thee." (vs. 19) Jesus said we shall be known by our fruits. It is vital that we search our individual hearts to see if we have fallen victim to the gradual process of com-

promise. We will all find areas we need to work on and revert back to the basics of our Faith. If we find that we have indeed experienced some backsliding, this is not fatal. Read Jeremiah 3:12-13. "RETURN thou backsliding Israel, saith the Lord, and I will not cause mine anger to fall upon you: for I am merciful, saith the Lord, and I will not keep anger forever. Only ACKNOWLEDGE thine iniquity..."

Our God is so great and merciful that He will receive us with open arms, if we RETURN and ACKNOWLEDGE our errors and become willing to walk with Him once again. We must realize that it is not only for us that we uphold the Faith and resist compromise, but it is also for future generations should the Lord tarry His coming.

"We see dimly in the darkness what is small and what is great,

Weak of faith how slight a hand may turn the iron helm of fate,

But the Soul is still oracular amid the market din,

List the ominous stern echo from the delphic caves within,

They enslave their children's children who make compromise with sin."

His ever presence was felt during my hospital stay, with many blessings coming my way, the closeness of the brotherhood in Colorado; praying also that my roommate could with me feel the nearness of our Heavenly Father as we discussed the Word during our recovery days.

I'm thankful for the everlasting love of God for sending His Son to bear all of our sins, and leaving the Comforter to be with us through all trials, as well as joys, until we enter His Heavenly Kingdom. He has chosen us, out of the masses of people on this earth, to be His selected few, I know "Why Me, Lord?" as I have the happiness of being His child, I also feel the unworthiness of this honor.

(Isaiah 53:7) Jesus said, "Come unto Me . . . take My yoke upon you and learn of Me." (Matt. 11:28-29) If we can learn to be meek as He was and be lowly in heart, we will also have His promise: "And ye shall find rest unto your souls."

we don't want it, beloved, if we become lax in our actions, our thoughts, and our desires. If we become lax in our service to God and in our love toward God, such a spirit can take possession of us. It is a fearful thing. It can make things which are not black or white, but gray, seem to be of God although they do not possess the power of God. This is the danger. Things appear to have a certain characteristic of God, and yet deny the power.

We know the power of God. The power of God permitted us to repent for our sins and to be redeemed. We couldn't repent of ourselves. We cannot do it. We have no power. It is only because God has desired it that we can repent for our sins. It is the same with other things, such as the fruits of the Spirit. These all come by the power of God in a soul through the help and the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

"But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love wherewith he loved us, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved)." Eph. 2:4, 5. Grace. What is it? A gift of God. It is nothing that we deserve, nothing that we earn, nothing that we can purchase. It is of God. When we no longer stand in that grace, beloved, we are in trouble spiritually. We may be going wonderfully in this world. We may have everything "coming our way" in this world. Yet, if we lack the grace of God, we will eventually be extremely miserable.

"And hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus." Eph. 2:6. Where else would that be, beloved, but in the assembly of the saints? The Scripture tells us not to forsake the assembling of the saints.

Why? Why can't we go out by ourselves and live good lives after we have repented? Because we can't. You have heard it said (I am sure from this pulpit), that at that point you become one person fighting against the devil; and you cannot conquer the devil fighting by yourself.

We need the power of the church, the church of God. You need that power. I need that power. I would be nothing, beloved, without the power of the church. Without the power of the prayers this evening, had we not all prayed, beloved, there could be no word come that would amount to anything, that would have any power in it, that would do any of us any good. Oh, yes, we could learn to be orators and we could learn to be persuasive, but we need God's power.

"That in the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in his kindness toward us through Christ Jesus. For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast." Eph. 2:7, 8, 9. We could build all the churches in the community and nothing be added to our crown unless we have been redeemed, unless we are believers, unless the power of God is in it.

"For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them. Wherefore remember, that ye being in time past Gentiles in the flesh, who are called Uncircumcision by that which is called the Circumcision in the flesh made by hands: That at that time ye were without Christ..." Eph. 2:10, 11, 12. We were all without Christ at one

time. A bad example, I was much too long without Christ. I was of the Gentiles. I was of the Uncircumcision, not of the Circumcision. This distinction came from the children of Israel. It was part of the early convenant that they be circumcised physically. Today we are not circumcised physically, but we are circumcised in the heart. That was accomplished by the blood of Christ being shed upon the cross of Calvary.

The Word refers to us as having been Gentiles. Gentiles were looked upon as sinners and unsaved because only the children of Israel were the chosen followers of God. Today, however, God has given the opportunity for all to be saved who come and taste and see.

"That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, ..." Eph. 2:12. Now we have been adopted into that commonwealth of Israel. We are Gentiles, but we have been circumcised in heart and have been adopted into the commonwealth of Israel, the redeemed of God. This is the highest standing, beloved. Regardless of the kind of job you may have today, you can have no higher standing anywhere in this world than being a child of God.

A humble, lowly child of God has more power within him than is possessed by all of the so-called powerful people in the world today. We are able to stand up against kings and judges and all the rulers of the world. We! We poor mortals here who are nothing in the sight of the world. They like to call us "strange".

Our faith is going to take us to heaven. Our faith in God, our faith that we have been redeemed through Christ's precious blood is going to take us to heaven. Through the Holy Spirit and with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we can live a life in this world which is worthy of our hope.

Let others do what they will. We should never kneel down before the world, beloved. We have no need of it. We have the power of God. We don't go around shouting it, but we savour and nourish within our hearts and minds that we are children of God. We want to be humble servants of the Almighty God for as long as we live. Because we love Him, we love the household of God. We want to stay with the household of God because we believe through the Holy Word that it has power to help us. Some day the Lord will invite us into His mansions.

SERMON BY BRO. LEROY HARTMAN OF PEORIA, IL

Text: Ephesians 2

Beloved, after we have been in the faith for some time, perhaps coming to church becomes a habit. Let's not let that happen.

We have read today of one of the main blessings of being a child of God. Having had the opportunity to come to the knowledge of the truth of God, and having realized that we were sinners without hope in the world to come, it was revealed to us that there is a hope through Jesus Christ, our Lord. We should often meditate upon the shedding of His precious blood on the cross at Calvary, and not only upon Christ, but also upon what the Father has done in giving His only begotten Son as a ransom for our sins.

We should never take our faith or anything concerning the heavenly Father and our Saviour for granted. Our redemption was much too costly to God for us to take it lightly. We would not be worthy of God's grace and mercy if we did. Every day that we live and have our being, as the Word says, we should be a thankful people.

Our prayers should not be uttered as a matter of course. I know, beloved, that there are times when we are in a hurry and say a prayer almost mechanically. Then, later on, we realize that it hadn't been much of a prayer. We had just said it "off the top of our head" because we were supposed to say it. The relationship that we have with God should always be vital and important.

When we experience trials or tribulations we realize that we do not bear our burdens and our cross alone. I can look upon the congregation tonight, and see those who have passed through some of these trials and tribulations. Some are young and some are older, but they did not have to endure these things alone without a hope or without a Companion.

Those who stand beside us, our husbands, our wives, our brothers and sisters, our mothers and fathers can

help up to a point. But in the innermost secret part of ourselves, we need God's help and guidance.

When God breathed into the nostrils of man, he became a living soul. In that soul which your body contains, beloved, are thoughts and desires that never come to the surface in public. They are always subdued. Therein would lie danger for us if we did not have a Companion with whom we could speak and seek help, because there might be something that we would be ashamed to tell someone else. A weakness, perhaps. It need not necessarily be a sin, just a weakness. No other person knows what we are thinking at this moment, but God and the Holy Spirit know. I can look at your face and see your expression, but I cannot see into your heart and I cannot see into your mind.

As we walk in faith, we become totally alone with God. When we have been cleansed through the blood of Christ, making our hearts as white as snow, we have the Holy Spirit within us. God gave us the Holy Spirit so that we can have Someone to talk to. Someone, in the challenge of the hour of misery, is there to comfort and guide us. Then we speak to God. Sometimes God moves us to go and speak to someone else and to rectify something that we have done.

Satan is not sleeping. Satan is always present and he likes nothing better than to invade the mind and to disturb the peace that we have with God. He doesn't want us to have even a moment of satisfaction with God. He would rather confuse us so that we would eventually say, "Well, God is not helping me," and we would seek something else. Then we would really be in trouble.

But we have the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of God. God Himself can only be present through the Holy Spirit. As Christ is sitting upon the right hand of God, He infiltrates our bodies, our minds and our hearts with the Holy Spirit. We can go to that Holy Spirit, and we can be led of that Holy Spirit in whatever direction it may take us.

"And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins." Eph. 2:1. He changed us. We no longer want to be involved in sin. We have been quickened in the Spirit, and the Spirit now resides in the hearts of those who have been cleansed and purified. "Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air (Satan), the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience." Eph. 2:2. We can't help but be disobedient, if we have the spirit of Satan within our hearts.

A few of us were speaking together today of a spirit. I termed it an evil spirit, probably because I have had some experience in this matter. On the surface we may have good desires and go through all the motions of being a true child of God. However, if we have a secret wrong desire, if we have a weak understanding, or if a weakness within us causes us to seek more than God will give us, then we are opening ourselves up to the power of another spirit. That spirit will be only too glad to come in and misdirect us, and take us away from the Truth which we have learned and known. I have seen this happen, beloved. A compulsion from this evil spirit will take over and, although we know better, we do the evil bidding of that spirit.

I'm thinking now, beloved of the man possessed of an evil spirit whom Christ saw as He walked along the road. Christ called the spirit out of him, and He put it into some swine. The swine then ran down a cliff, into the sea, and drowned. Only the power of God can do this. We of ourselves cannot get rid of this evil spirit. We can possess it even if
