LOVE THROUGH PRAYER

As we reflect upon our past life in 1983, has our prayer life been as fervent as it could have been? A true story is told of Cuff, a negro slave who lived in the South before the war. He was a joyful Christian and a faithful servant. His master, however, was in need of money, and one day a young planter, who was an infidel, came to buy Cuff. The price was agreed upon, and the Christian slave was sold to the infidel. But in parting with him the master said, "You will find Cuff a good worker and you can trust him; he will suit you in every respect but one." "And what is that?" asked the buyer. "He will pray, and you can't break him of it. but that is his only fault." "I'll soon whip that out of him," remarked the infidel. "I fear not," said the former master, "and would not advise you to try it; he would rather die than give it up." Cuff proved faithful to the new master, the same as he had to the old. The master soon got word that Cuff had been praying, and calling him said, "Cuff, you must not pray any more; we can't have any

praying around here; never let me hear

any more about this nonsense." Cuff

replied, "O massa, I has to pray to

Jesus, and when I pray I loves you and

Missus all the more, and can work all

the harder for you." But he was sternly

forbidden to pray any more, under

penalty of a severe flogging. That even-

ing, when the day's work was done, he talked to his God, like Daniel of old, as he had aforetimes. Next morning he was summoned to appear before his master, who demanded of him why he had disobeyed him. "O Massa, I has to pray; I canna live without it," said Cuff. At this the master flew into a terrible rage and ordered Cuff to be tied to the whipping post, with his shirt off. He then applied the rawhide with all the force he possessed, until his young wife ran out in tears and begged him to stop. The man was so infuriated that he threatened to punish her next if she did not leave, then continued to apply the lash until his strength was exhausted. Then he ordered the bleeding back to be washed in salt water, his shirt replaced, and the poor slave to set about his work. Though in great pain, Cuff went away singing in a groaning voice: "My suffering time will soon be o'er, When I shall sigh and weep no

Cuff worked all that day, as the blood oozed from his back where the lash had made long, deep furrows. Meantime, God was working in his master. He saw his wickedness and cruelty to that poor soul, whose only fault had been his fidelity. Conviction seized upon him. In great distress of mind he went to bed, but could not sleep. Such was his agony at midnight that he awoke his wife and told her that he was dying. "Shall I call in the doctor?" she said. "No, no; I don't want a

doctor. Is there anyone on the plantation that can pray for me? I am afraid that I am going to hell." "I don't know of any one," said his wife, "except the slave you punished this morning." "Do you think he would pray for me?" he anxiously inquired. "Yes, I think he would," she replied. "Well, send for him quickly." On going after Cuff they found him on his knees in prayer, and when called he supposed it was to be punished again. On being taken to the master's room, he found him writhing in agony. The master, groaning, said, "O Cuff, can you pray for me?" "Yes, bress de Lord, Massa, I'se been prayin' for you all de night," and at this he dropped on his knees, and like Jacob of old, wrestled in prayer. Before the break of day Cuff witnessed the conversion of both master and mistress. Master and slave embraced. Race differences and past cruelty were swept away by the love of God, and tears of joy were mingled. Cuff was immediately set free, and worked no more on the plantation. The master took Cuff and went to preach the gospel. They traveled all over the South, witnessing to the power of Christ to save to the uttermost. Such is the power of the love of God in the soul where Christ dwells. "Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins." (I John 4:10)

Let's love one another and those about us more fervently in 1984.

NEWS FROM ROMANIA

In October 1983 a brother visited eastern Europe and spent 3 days visiting fellow believers in Romania. Here are a few excerpts from his report: We traveled many miles, met and visited many loving brethren and often wept with them. The conditions cannot be described, one must see the misery, poverty and the suffering of the sick, old and materially very poor people. Some live in unheated rooms, have hardly any food, and often go for days without a decent meal. Bread and the daily essentials are rationed. The very old and sick are unable to stand in bread lines, thus cannot buy food. Their clothes and blankets are badly worn and are faded. In many cases the younger, unconverted members of their families fail to provide and care for them. Of about 2,000 fellow believers nearly half are old and poor and about 200 are considered to be extremely poor. Many live in small villages and hamlets away from good roads. Access during rainy seasons and winter are very difficult and often impossible.

During their visit to churches in eastern Europe in Aug. 1982, brothers Leon Graf and Sandor Bako were approached by elder brothers in Romania, explaining the situations there and the possible need for a 4-wheel drive vehicle, that would make it possible to visit and help these isolated brethren. After careful study and investigation, funds for the purchase of such a vehicle have been approved and provided for by the World Relief Committee. The order is now in the process. The responsible brothers in Romania made it known to us that such a vehicle would be used strictly for relief work to help those needy brethren who live in the hard to reach areas.

The food package program is progressing very well. More and more

names are being received and added to our list for help. In order to provide packages to more families with the monthly allotted funds from World Relief, our orders now consist of slightly smaller packages (from 10 kg. to 81/2 kg.) per family, thus spreading it out to more families.

Here are a few excerpts from the several 'thank you' notes received lately: "... with a grateful and joyful heart I want to thank each of you who contributed and to you who labor to forward it. We cease not in our prayers to thank God for His great works through the hearts of His people and opening the doors of His storehouse to provide for His less fortunate people. Elder brother Dumbrava and Bro. Biro (minister) are well and they too greet you all." (Widow of a former minister)

"We received a package on the 20th of Nov. and several others previously. for the generous gifts in the holy name of our Lord Jesus Christ." Victoria J.

"We received your letter and the parcel. We thank our holy God and you, who so graciously cares and provides our needs." F.M.

Three elderly sisters living in the same community received their parcels and each wrote a brief note, and shared the same envelope to mail it. A warm expression of love and gratitude to all the brethren in America for their love and gifts.



apostles' experiences with converts caused them to write words of warning. We should profit from them.

In today's reading the Israelites were tempted and, if I recall it right, the result of this temptation was that they were constantly complaining against the way God and His Spirit were trying to lead them.

Neither murmur ye, as some of them also murmured, and were destroyed of the destroyer." I Cor. 10:10.

Even in later years after they were in the Promised Land, there were some who said to the prophets, "What is the burden of the Lord?" Jer. 23:33. What a negative attitude! What a way to lose the blessings of God! The commandments are not a burden. The Lord Jesus said, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matt. 11:29, 30.

The grace of God is available to each and every one whose heart has been made new. However, if we murmur or if we rebel against the cross which the Lord lays upon us, we can come to harm and destruction. On the other hand, if we follow the example of our Lord and Saviour who said, "Father... not my will, but thine, be done," (Luke 22:42), our life will come to a good end, and we can also be a help to others.

"Now all these things happened unto them for examples: and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come." I Cor. 10:11. That was written nearly two thousand years ago, but it's the same good example, the same final Word from God. The New Covenant that God made through Jesus Christ will never be changed as the Mosaic law was changed to the covenant of Christ. This is the last Word from God, and it is sufficient for our spiritual needs for time and eternity.

Here is a warning: "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall. There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." I Cor. 10:12, 13.

We can profit from our temptations for these crosses are sent into our lives so that we might draw nearer to the Lord, so that we might be more humble and dependent upon Him. Then His work can be better done in us. If we become self-sufficient and think that we accomplish good by our own strength, we are in danger of falling. That has happened, sad to say. We are well warned in this chapter against

that. We have many good examples to follow, examples of those who have been faithful and true. We often think of those who have gone before, those whom we knew many long years ago, who lived and walked in the ways of the Lord. They did not claim to be perfect, but they strove after perfection. They were examples to us and taught us the Word of Truth. They finished their course with a living hope, and that is the greatest and most important thing.

"Wherefore, my dearly beloved, flee from idolatry." I Cor. 10:14. As we mentioned before, there are many idols in this world.

"I speak as to wise men; judge ye what I say." I Cor. 10:15. Jesus asked them to use the wisdom that God would give them to determine the truth of what he was telling them.

"The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?" I Cor. 10:16. We know how we are blessed when we have holy communion. It brings us nearer to the Lord. and nearer to each other. It fills our hearts with love and zeal, and give us renewed determination to serve and follow our Lord. Jesus said, "For we being many are one bread, and one body: for we are all partakers of that one bread." I Cor. 10:17. Jesus said, speaking symbolically, that unless we eat His flesh and drink His blood, we will have no part in His salvation. So we must use the spiritual food day by day which He purchased for us. Also we need the grace that He brought within our reach to sustain us in this life and bring us to eternal life.

What a blessing it is that, though we be many, we can be of one heart and of one mind if we obey and follow the teachings of the Word, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. I have often marveled that the Lord and Saviour considered the guidance of the Holy Spirit even more important than His own presence among His disciples. He said, "Nevertheless I tell you the truth; It is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you: but if I depart, I will send him unto you." John 16:7. So, if we heed that Spirit, we will be led and guided in all ways of righteousness.

The Israelites who made offerings and sacrifices to God before the covenant of Christ were partakers of the gifts and benefits thereof. But now, because the Corinthian believers, for the most part, were converted idolaters, Paul warned them against taking part in the worship of idols.

"But I say, that the things which the Gentiles sacrifice, they sacrifice to devils, and not to God." I Cor. 10:20. When we do anything in obedience to the promptings of the evil one, we are working for him and not for God.

"I would not that ye should have fellowship with devils." I Cor. 10:20. We gave that up long ago, did we not, loved ones? But Satan comes. He comes every day, doesn't he? Jesus had the solution to this when Satan tempted Him. He said, "Get thee behind me. Satan." Luke 4:8. Then He used the Living Word that the Father had given. Satan quoted Scripture also, but he quoted it incorrectly. Jesus straightened that out for him . . and for us. When we read the Word, we see that through His humility and His sincerity, God gave Jesus the words to counter the temptation of Satan. We also have this at our disposal if we are fervent in prayer and sincere in our desire to serve the Lord.

"Do we provoke the Lord to jealousy? are we stronger than he?" I Cor. 10:22. We all know the answer to these questions. We could provoke Him to jealousy, but we are not stronger than He. We rely upon His strength to help us overcome evil things.

Paul brings up a subject that is very important for us as believers. "All things are lawful for me, but all things are not expedient: all things are lawful for me, but all things edify not." I Cor. 10:23. Many things in this world come to our attention and perhaps attract our eyes and our minds. The question comes up, "Is it right, or is it wrong?" Here we have a good answer for that. The test is, "Is it expedient?" A thing that is expedient will help us along our way and further the growth of our faith and our service to the Lord. If it does not, then no matter how lawful it may be to the people round about us, it is not for us.

Not everything edifies. People do many things and say, "That's not a sin." But there is a point beyond which there is no edification. To edify means to cast light upon something. If we do things that cast darkness on our way of life rather than light, then we are working against ourselves and against the Lord. We are well warned against such things.

I often think of what the Saviour said. If something which is caused by the lust of the eye or the lust of the flesh is going to get you into trouble, or is going to cause someone else to stumble, cut it off. Cut it off forthwith. Throw it away. It's not always easy to do, but we find in doing so that we are happy and blessed. Then we know that our conduct will not be such as to be harmful to others.

Paul said, "Let no man seek his own, but every man another's wealth." I Cor. 10:24. He was not talking about financial things; He was talking about spiritual wealth, the same treasures which Jesus talked about when He said, "Lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven (not here on earth), where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal." Matt. 6:20. Let us lay up treasures in heaven.

If we can help one another to do this. I am certain that we ourselves will benefit therefrom. Any good that we do for someone else will be blessed. Jesus said a drink of cold water given to someone in the name of the Lord will not fail to have its reward. Shall we not consider then that the smallest thing that we might do against the Lord, or which would not be a good light, can also have its evil results? We need the guidance of the Holy Spirit along our way, and it is available to us. Blessed are we when the Lord speaks to us as He does in various ways, through reading the Word, in speaking with one another, or through our conscience.

There is a saying, "Let your conscience be your guide," but the human conscience is not a very good guide. I think that if we say, "Let the Word of God and His Spirit be our guide," then we are on safe ground. I have never seen that anyone who denied himself something for fear that he might displease the Lord, suffered any loss through that. Many have suffered a loss because they took too great a chance. This is lawful. This is permissible.

In many cases it doesn't say in the Bible that we shouldn't do this or that. We are told that anything that works against the control of God and His Spirit in our hearts is evil and wrong, no matter what someone else says. If we heed the Word and the Holy Spirit, we can go safely through this life into eternal life.

THE SILVER LINING

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SERMON BY BRO. ERNEST A. GRAF OF AKRON, OHIO

Text: I Corinthians 10:1-24

The system of sacrifices and Godly worship given to the household of Israel were symbolic of the things that would come in the New Testament, the New Covenant, the New Dispensation, through our Lord and Saviour, Jesus.

The Apostle Paul wrote of the experience of the Israelites going from Egypt to the Promised Land. It is written here that the Jewish fathers were all "under the cloud, and all passed through the sea." I Cor. 10:1. This is a forerunner of the experience of those who turn to God through Jesus Christ and are liberated from the power and might of sin and Satan through a true conversion following a repentance.

Our hope of everlasting life is a much better promise than that which the Israelites had when promised good things in the land of Palestine which they were to come to physically. They passed through the water of the Red Sea, and we are baptized in water as a token of the liberation that God has worked in us, and to demonstrate the beginning of a new way of life in our Lord.

A cloud is mentioned here. We read in Exodus that the Israelites were brought through the sea, and then went upon their way in the wilderness. There was a visible cloud over them during the day, and a pillar of fire at night to enlighten the camp. They were told that when the pillar and cloud moved on, they should move. When it stopped, they should stop. I think that we can compare this with the Holy Spirit that God gives to His children when they are born again and are received into the household of faith. The Spirit leads and guides the child of God in the ways that he or she should

If we run before the Lord, we get into trouble; and if we do not follow close behind Him, then we also get into trouble. That was the sad experience of the people of Israel. They all had the

same teaching from God. It says here that they "did all eat the same spiritual meat; and did all drink the same spiritual drink: for they drank of that spiritual Rock that followed them: and that Rock was Christ." I Cor. 10:3, 4. Christ was not in the physical form in which He came upon earth later, but in Spirit. He was with these people because they were the chosen people of God. "But with many of them God was not well pleased." I Cor. 10:5. Elsewhere we read that they did not believe in God and His promises. Therefore, they were overthrown in the wilderness.

Unbelief is, I believe, a great hinderance today. Many people who know what is in the Word of God, and have often been taught therefrom, do not have faith in it, faith to come to God and let Him work in their hearts and lives, faith to be obedient to Him and follow Him through the wilderness to eternal life.

Paul said that the experiences of the Israelites are examples. We also have examples in the lives of those round about us, the good examples of those who serve the Lord and walk in His ways and the bad examples, from which we can be warned, of those who do not obey God and follow Him.

"... we should not lust after evil things, as they also lusted." I Cor. 10:6. We read that the Israelites did not appreciate the fact that God was going to take them into a Promised Land. They began to yearn for the things that they had had back in Egypt, and even created an idol such as they had seen and known there.

God's wrath was raised against them. God said to Moses, who was their leader, that He would destroy them and make of Moses a new nation. Moses said something like this: "Oh, don't do that! People will say that You were not able to lead Your people into the Promised Land." So God continued with them but the bodies of very

many who were disobedient were left in the wilderness. These things are brought to our attention because there is danger for each and every one of us. It is true that through the grace of God we have been born again and placed upon the narrow way. We rejoice to walk therein, but we still have an evil enemy who works through the weakness of our flesh. The difference between the true believer of today and the people of Israel is that the grace of God through Jesus was not available to them. Only the death and resurrection of our Lord and Saviour brought into the reach of man the full salvation that God had prepared.

"Neither be ye idolaters, as were some of them (they made a golden calf in the wilderness); . . . The people sat down to eat and drink, and rose up to play." I Cor. 10:7. We can read in histories of the people who worshipped idols that they have feasts followed by carnal orgies which were highly displeasing to God.

Today, people might say, "We don't have any idols." But this world is full of idols! The Apostle Paul mentions that covetousness is idolatry. Idolatry is to love the things of this world so much that they are our prime objective. Any of us who try to gain wealth and hang our hearts thereon will lose our heavenly treasure. We are warned against all kinds of idolatry. Anything that keeps us from giving our whole heart to God is an idol. The first law of His commandment is, "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." Exodus 20:3.

After our hearts have been changed through conversion, we love the Lord and we love to do His will. But, as mentioned, we have an enemy who tries to lead us astray. Let no one be deceived by the teaching that once we have been saved, we cannot be led astray. Our Lord and Saviour taught the opposite in parables, and the

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
