A comparatively new activity for res-

idents is to take a number of them shopping once a month. An appropriate number of staff members takes them to a nearby mall where they may do some browsing or make some actual purchases.

The annual, supervised, overnight mini-vacation at a lovely inn in Peoria has also taken place recently. This event is eagerly anticipated and enjoyed.

All of us extend a warm welcome to our new resident, Aldine Winger, formerly from Miami, FL. Her deceased parents were Andrew and Clara Stoller Winger. If joy were tied to circumstances, you'd likely spend your life asking that question. Certainly, joy doesn't result exclusively from what happens to us. Paul declares he had learned to remain content in any situation (Phil. 4:11), and James urges us to consider it all joy when we encounter trials (James 1:20).

Far from being a product of circumstances, joy is "spiritual fruit", caused not by any thing, but rather by a Person, God Himself. Unbelievers lack real joy because they do not have God's Spirit living in them.

For the believer, however, there is little excuse for lack of joy. Jesus desired that His joy be in us (John 15:11). To guarantee this, He promised to send His indwelling Holy Spirit. Christians, therefore, can have a joy that rises above and beyond life's circumstances.

But why have many believers apparently lost their joy? Perhaps they're failing to live Spirit-filled lives. If we deny the Holy Spirit full control, He can't produce His fruit in us. Life's circumstances then grind us into despair and defeat.

Joy, however, is not an end in itself. Galatians 5 points out the sharp contrast between fruit of the Spirit and works of the flesh.

As God produces His fruit in us, we are no longer governed by our fleshly desires. Anger, dissension and impurity fade. We begin to reach beyond ourselves, restoring others to fellowship with the Lord, bearing their burdens and doing good to all. (Gal. 6:1, 2, 10).

It's hard to be joyful when life is falling apart, especially when we let circumstances determine our level of joy. But, when His Spirit controls us, His abundant joy can carry us through tragedy or discouragement. Then we can stand with Nehemiah and confidently proclaim, "The joy of the Lord is my strength".

We can see, dear ones, that Satan is going to try to destroy us. He even tried to destroy the Son of God. If he had been able to destroy our Lord and Saviour, he would have won the battle, but this has not come to pass. How thankful we are today.

Reading the account of Christ's life saddens our hearts. Yet, we can rejoice because Christ was faithful and true to His God and gave us hope of eternal life. Today, loved ones, we have this living hope that God is going to accept us into the realms of glory if we are faithful and true to Him.

When the time comes, that we lay down our armour in the Lord and there is no more waiting for that great day, all the sadness and sorrow that we have endured in this life is going to vanish. The Word of God speaks just a little about what the Lord has in store for us. What will it be like?

Going back to the temptations of Christ, we read that "the devil said unto him, If thou be the Son of God..." Luke 4:3. Doesn't Satan tell us that same thing many times? He often comes to us, even after we have been baptized, beloved.
