THE GREATEST OF THESE IS LOVE

I Corinthians 13 is commonly known as the "love" chapter, and we all know that God is love. We know that it was His love for man that impelled Him to send His only begotten Son into the world (John 3:16). The liberals among us tend to end their description of God with the point that He is love.

However, the Scripture is full of other references which identify our Diety as one who expects and deserves something in return for His great love. The liberal school of thought often overlooks the unalterable facts that He is also holy, righteous, just, pure — too pure to even behold iniquity, much less to allow it. Just recognizing God's love alone is to ignore the testimony of the Apostle Paul that "our God is a consuming fire," and that "it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of a living God" (Hebrews 12:29, 10:31). How can one explain away II Corinthians 5:11 which states "Therefore knowing the terror of the Lord, we persuade men." What's he talking about? Doesn't God love everybody; didn't Jesus die for all? Isn't He primarily a teacher and not a judge? What is there to be afraid of?

There are many fundamental, conservative people in the world who feel quite confident that the atoning work of Christ calls for nothing more from them than a warm, emotional response and the assurance that Jesus died for their sins, and that He rose again for their eternal life. They are not willing to accept the doctrine of cross-bearing and self-denial (crucifying the desires and passions of the flesh). No costly obedience is necessary, no striving to enter by the strait gate, and no spiritual growth or conforming their lives to Christ! None of these things are needed, just a blithe, cheery resting on the everlasting arms. Nothing more. Grace is cheap! There is no judgment, no accounting, no need for self-examination, no danger of a door being shut. How could God deny anyone who cries, "Lord, Lord, open to us"?

Now, beloved reader, whoever you are, if you feel that this type of loose "Christianity" and easy believism is true, just know this: if the testimony of the Apostles is true, if the teachings of our Lord Jesus are trustworthy, if the witness of the Church and the faith of our fathers for almost two millenia is

correct, you are in for a terrible shock. This type of faith will lead you to the place prophecied in Mark 9:44 ". . . their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched".

The teaching of parables, warning us of heavenly truths through earthly stories, is very common throughout the Gospels. Please note carefully the parable of the ten virgins in Matthew 25. All were once pure, all had oil, all awaited the bridegroom, and all fell asleep. They all believe He is coming, they love His appearing, they have secured their lamps. They are quite thoroughly church members, you see. Yet the Lord told five of them who were foolish to depart! Why?

The truth is that not all who think they are wise possess true wisdom. Look to the love chapter itself as support for this truth. It starts with the ministry, "though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels . . .". If a speaker filled God's house with people, and hundreds were moved to repentance by his preaching, if he himself did not have the true love of God in his heart, he would be lost.

Though you give all you own or possess to the poor, if you do not have the spirit of Love, you will be shut out. It will profit you nothing. How can you claim to be converted to Him who has given His all if you are not prepared to give something in response?

If just believing isn't enough, if being part of the company of the wise (a church member) isn't proof positive that you will inherit a place in Heaven, if giving to the poor, if telling others the story of Love doesn't demonstrate we belong to Christ, surely if we die for our faith we shall be eternally blessed.

But what does the Word say? "Though I give my body to be burned and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing." This is strong meat; it's obviously a facet of our Lord we do not like to face up to. But it is in the Scripture. We have to face up to it.

Does this mean no one can be saved? Indeed not! It merely tells us that we must respond on our part to the great love that God has showered down on us. He gives us His Holy Spirit to direct us. To develop the full benefit of the Spirit requires daily effort on our part. This is a very serious matter, one which means more than anything else in the

world because all material things are going to pass away. A good prayer pattern is essential.

Let us therefore, dearly beloved, arm ourselves with the Word of God and fight a daily battle against the forces of darkness which gather around us on every side. We have every right to be full of hope (our God will never leave us nor forsake us) but we must stay and stand with Him. It is always a struggle, requiring that we watch day and night. We can stand on the scriptural promise which says, "nevertheless, the foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, the Lord knoweth them that are His." (II Timothy 2:19).

In conclusion, let us examine two passages that Paul wrote to a young minister years ago. I Timothy 4:11-16 says "These things command and teach. Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers, in work, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity. Till I come, give attendance to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine. Neglect not the gift that is in thee, which was given thee by prophecy, with the laying on of the hands of the presbytery. Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them; that thy profiting may appear to all. Take heed unto thyself and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee." And in I Timothy 6:17-19, "Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not high-minded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy; That they do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate; Laying up in store for themselves a good foundation against the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life."

- 4. You will be sent a printout of your local subscribers prior to the month your collection is due. Also listed on this printout will be any gift subscriptions paid by someone in your local congregation.
- 5. Please use printout for making all necessary changes. Attempt to account for all names on the printout.
- 6. As you will see, on the printout there are headings for record number, church code, and month subscription is due. This same information is also at the top of each individual mailing label.
 7. The record number is a computer number assigned to each in-
- puter number assigned to each individual subscriber. PLEASE include this number when referring to any subscriber. The number is of equal importance as the name!
- 8. The two-lettered symbol for church code found on printout and on label is mainly for our information, and refers to the church where the subscription is paid. When someone pays for someone else's subscription as a gift, the recipient's label will be coded with the giver's church. When an address change involves a church change, please mention old and new churches.
- 9. Please return updated printout with all corrections on it when you send in your payment.
- 10. On any new subscriptions, make sure you have full address, including zip code, and church through which subscription will be paid. If it is a gift, designate which church it is paid through.

NEWS FROM ROMANIA

Sadness came upon the community of our fellow believers in Romania, as

two of their beloved elders have been called home to their eternal rest and reward. Both are known to us and carried on correspondence with us. On March 15, Ilie Dumbrava, about 70, passed away and a week later, March 22, Janos Balog, 87, laid down his armor. In one of his recent letters -Silver Lining, Feb. 1984 - he wrote: "I am suffering with lung ailment, very painful, but soon I will be going home where there is no more pain, sorrow or suffering, but eternal peace and rest." Both brothers have spent two sevenyear terms in prison and both were released after serving half of their third seven-year terms. Both have been arrested for holding unauthorized meetings and heavily fined. In 1969 Bro. Dumbrava and about 350 worshippers were interrupted by the security forces for holding services without a permit. The agents were directed by a local minister, whose former members were converted to our faith and were among those arrested and fined.

Our corresponding elder writes: "I cannot fully describe the grief and the great void their departure has brought upon us. Our hope is in God, that He, by His great compassion and providence will fill their places. . . . I pray for an opportunity to visit with you (in America), I hope you will see it that way and may the Lord grant it to become a reality."

The last order of food packages arrived in this area. Many of our brethren are unable to write to you and asked me to thank you and the brethren in the U.S. for their love and care for us

In the same way, God won't let us be totally independent of others. God has built His church on a system of interdependence, each person ministering to others through their different talents, gifts, abilities and prayers. But at the same time, everyone recognizes God as the Source of all blessings. All of us need an Aaron and a Hur, two people we can share our needs and burdens with. Christ, in the Garden of Gethsemane, revealed His burden. He, too, needed the prayer support of His friends but found them asleep. Aaron and Hur didn't serve as Moses' counselor. They didn't tell him how to hold the rod so he wouldn't get tired. They were his supporters. They really held up the rod by supporting Moses arms. All too often people will give us advice for our spiritual battles but they won't give of their time in prayer. We need less advice and more praying. The owner is roaring his motor and the steam is hissing from the radiator, but not an inch is gained. He sends a message for help; soon a ponderous tractor arrives and its driver backs down as near as he can, but a short heavy chain is needed. Three huge links hang from the draw bar of the tractor, but more is needed. The man in the tractor tosses out a short heavy two-hook chain, and the gentleman will have to stop his sputtering motor, get out in the mud of the roadside and hook on for himself. One big hook fits over the axle; three or four big links stretch out and the other big hook just reaches nicely the third link on the tractor "Now wait," says the gentleman, "till I start my motor and I will help pull myself out." "No," says the tractor man, "hooking on with the short chain is all you can do; your motor was just burning itself up with one wheel spinning in the air. Release brakes!" Chunga, chunga, chunga, up the line they go and the machine is soon in the repair shop for overhauling.

Every soul is a costly machine wrecked on the mountain road of sin and balancing over perdition.

They who call for help will see the Gospel Tractor coming near; but a heavy chain of conditions met is necessary to reach from the road to the wreck. The sputtering motor is selfrighteousness and is futile and the three great links on the tractor bar are: 1) the Love of God, 2) the Atonement of Christ, 3) the Promise of conditional grace. The short two-hook chain furnished by the rescuer means that the Lord gives us the powers of obeying the conditions. Requiring the man to attach the chain himself means that God brings the Gospel in reach of us and gives us power to meet the conditions of grace – but we must get down out of our self-righteousness into the mud of humility and hook on ourselves with

belief of the gospel joining to the link of repentance, confession and restitution, and then – clank – the hook of saving faith clasps the divine links of promise, atonement and the love of God and out we go, under the divine power, but not until we get down and do our part. You can hook up by faith, as shown, but not by faith only; if repentance, confession and restitution are left out, the chain will not connect.

depend upon church order. It is a strengthening thing. We feel a wonderful security because where there is oneness and unity of heart and mind, there is strength.

Having, then, this orderliness, we find that it promotes the other thing which Paul commended them for, steadfastness of faith. What does being steadfast mean? It means being consistent, being strong, not wavering. It means being able to weather out the storms, the trials and the tribulations that come along in life.

We know that such things will happen. None of us will be spared some kind of cross to carry, and we know why it is to be that way. We know of the Saviour's teachings, of the great importance which He put upon humbleness of spirit. Surely humility and the crosses that the Lord places upon us go hand in hand, do they not? That is part of steadfastness, continuing strong and firm in our faith even though crosses are laid upon us.

Then Paul said, "As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in him: Rooted and built up in him, and stablished in the faith, as ye have been taught . . ." Col. 2:6, 7.

Two elements come to mind here. One is the spiritual essence, the spiritual presence of God, that force which brought forth the miracle of conversion within our hearts, our souls and spirits. Man could not do this. It was done solely through the power of the Spirit of God.

The other element is that we could receive instruction through inspired teachings. As it says, ". . . as ye have been taught . . ." We are going to be students all of our lives. We have a great deal to learn.

How thankful we are that the apostle could point that out as well. We know that it was meant for us. He then gives us this warning, "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ." Col. 2:8.

We know that the Saviour Himself warned His disciples against those coming after Him, even carrying His name. He told them to beware. I believe that quite likely the greatest danger that the soul of man has to fear is false doctrine and false teaching.

Jesus was so loving, so kind, and so generous to have given His blood so that our sins could be forgiven. Each one who has made that wonderful and miraculous experience knows the depth and the power of this miracle that God performs in the hearts of men.

We have also come to realize that we are subject to a variety of inputs into our lives. We are just built that way. Today with modern communications, there are many sources of this, many doctrines, many pieces of instruction. The Saviour initially, and now the Apostle Paul, warns us against being deceived.

Here in this country, we have a complex network of highly sophisticated sensing devices. It is called, "The Early Warning System". It is to protect the country, to give very early warning of dangers that would come from enemy forces. What is the reason for that? It is to give a little bit of time to come to a posture of defense, to be able to be protected, to be able to take shelter, and I believe that is the same principle that is behind these warnings for Christians. If we can sense in advance that there is danger headed in our direction, then we will have some time to prepare

our defenses and to be ready for it when the onslaught comes. We know where to go for our defenses, do we not?

In Ephesians, the Apostle Paul pointed out beautifully the armour that we have. Part of it is the reading of God's Word and the faith that we have. We have opportunity to pray to God for His help, His strength and His guidance. I believe that that is what the apostle was directing us to do in his good instructions.

Whenever we have an early warning, we should go to the Word and to God in prayer. We have also been given the blessedness of the shepherds of the flock, who have been ordained and have been given duties and responsibilities. We are all human and, myself in particularly, rather naive in so many ways and in so many things. Often, as the human mind reacts to certain situations, we formulate our own ideas and our own opinions; but we have the opportunity to come and to ask for advice and counsel, to share and to say, "I felt this way."

Ask advice from our dear brothers and sisters-in-faith, from those whom we have great respect for and especially from those who have lived long in the faith, who are the pillars of our faith, and who have weathered many storms in life. We can share with them in a quiet visit. They have had much experience and can give us good advice.

In this way we can make some preparation for danger which is perhaps headed in our direction. Then, when we hear false doctrines, this spoiling that can come through vain deceit and through philosophy, we can be ready for it. When the test comes, when we actually come face to face with it, we have the assurance of some very special help.

We remember the teaching of our Saviour who told His disciples that when brought before the magistrate, they should not think beforehand what to say, for at that time it would be given to them. Isn't that wonderful? When we are faced with such challenges which are oftentimes fearful to us, who is standing there by our side? It is our Lord and Saviour, Christ Jesus!

Do you know how He came to stand there by our side? Do you know how much He loves us? He was willing to give His life so that He could come and stand by our side and help us. Is He standing by your side?

SERMON BY BRO. JOHN KLOTZLE OF ALTADENA, CA

Text: Colossians 2:1-15

We know that the author of these words, the Apostle Paul, was given a very special mission to accomplish. He was a chosen vessel of the Lord, and he experienced what you and I can experience, a blessed awakening through the presence of the Spirit of our Saviour, Christ Jesus. We can then become converted and rejoice in wonderful bliss.

After Paul's conversion, he received further direction from the Spirit concerning his calling in life. We are the fortunate beneficiaries, we might say, of the results and the fruits of his labors. Part of this has been shared with us through today's reading in this Holy Word.

Paul was instructed by God and moved by the Spirit to teach and to establish churches. We know that he had a great love for these churches. We know that this love stemmed from the heart of our Saviour, Christ Jesus, Who is one and the same with our Heavenly Father.

Paul knew that to walk here upon the earth would be very difficult even after we have been washed clean in the shed blood of our Saviour. He knew that we would need help and assistance as we walk this pathway of life. These precious epistles that the Apostle Paul has written have given us much help. We can sense the love that Paul had for us, not only his duty to his calling, but also concern for the welfare of all souls that would follow.

Even though Paul the apostle was not a married man and had no children of his own, we can feel that he had the love of a father in his heart. He looked upon the children of God with a 'fatherheart' full of care and concern like that of our Heavenly Father.

We who are earthly parents know that feeling well. We know the duties and responsibilities that fall upon us, and the great love that we have in our hearts for our children. How we hope and wish and pray for their soul's welfare, their physical protection and their material provision. We want only good things to happen to them.

A portion of this good which we desire for them is sharing the physical blessings that the Lord has given us. But that is secondary to their spirit's welfare. Because of the love that we have in our hearts for our children, we want to share God's spiritual blessings with them.

We feel the responsibility that is given to us as parents to rear our children in the fear and nurture of God. This takes form in a variety of ways, does it not? Obviously, in our daily lives they look to us for direction. The Lord gave us loving parents, many of whom are now lying in their graves. The love that they had for us, their care and concern, was manifested in numerous ways. Some of the ways that it was given and shared with us was in their direction, in their counseling and in their advice.

As children, we sometimes had a resentful feeling about that. We felt that mom and dad were "putting their finger on us" a little bit too heavily. In our early years, those feelings lasted perhaps five or ten minutes. Then all was forgiven and forgotten, and it was wonderful to feel their love, and the sense of safety and security that we had in the home.

As we grew a little older, we found that we wanted to exercise our independence just a little bit more. Then this goodly advice, counsel and admonition became somewhat wearisome to us. The feelings in our hearts lasted a little longer than they used to. We have to confess this instinct of human nature that wanted to rise up within us.

Of course we know where those bad feelings came from. The evil one wants to have his way with us and to take control of our lives. But that did not dishearten those who loved us, or who were concerned about us. We found (depending on our relationship) that sometimes there was not a great deal of communication. However, there was something special that perhaps it took us a while to realize. That was the prayers of our parents.

I heard something just yesterday that was so touching. As the Word was brought forth, this comment was made: If young people could see printed on the walls of their bedrooms all of the prayers of their parents, what a deeply moving and touching thing this would be!

That communication with God, that form of guidance and direction, was generated out of the love that they had for us.

The Apostle Paul had that same kind of love for the church because he was responsible for much of it in its early formative years. He gave this good counsel to us also. It is written and recorded so that we can read and be reminded.

As we recall, too, our parents' approach often came in a warning. They wanted us to be aware of harm and danger, because that was a great concern that they had.

We find the same care and concern in the Apostle Paul who warned about false teachings. He first acknowledged and encouraged through reiterating the precious blessings that had been received from God through His Son, Christ Jesus. Even though Paul was "absent in the flesh", he was with them in spirit. He rejoiced in their order, and in the steadfastness of their faith in Christ. This tells us that he had a great deal of confidence in them.

Isn't it wonderful how Paul sets this forth? He identifies the importance of order within the faith. We have learned to know, to love, to respect and to

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
