The following article was written by Bro. Willis Ehnle with the hope that we can "... be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." (I Peter 3:15). We are entering into a time when the world is espousing humanism, where Christ is viewed only as a man. It is no longer sufficient to say: I believe Christ was the Son of God." We must be able to articulate why we believe. We must strive to become as the Apostle Paul who was able to reason with the unbeliever (Acts 17:2).

THE DIVINITY OF CHRIST

The significant characteristic of the human being known as Jesus Christ is that He was divine. Take that away from Him and He is simply another human being and we do not worship anyone who is only a human being. In fact, we are cautioned against trusting in human beings beyond what is proper. The Scriptures teach us: "Power belongeth unto God." (Psalm 62:11)

Why then, do we worship Jesus Christ who was a human being? Because He was divine, that is, He housed the Spirit of the Son of God, who is equal with God, in His human body. We do not worship that human body;

we worship the Christ who lived in that human body.

Christ was born of a virgin, conceived by the Holy Spirit, according to the Scriptures which we believe and embrace. This is an important truth which made Christ divine, God living in a human body.

The concept that God was in Christ is taught in II Corinthians 5:19, "To wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself . . ." It is important, at least for me, to understand and believe this in order to unhesitantly lift up Christ without being concerned about lifting up man.

After the resurrection, Christ's body was no longer a human body — it had no blood, but it did have flesh and bones of a non-material nature. It was clearly a body from another world because Christ could pass through closed doors without opening them. Christ's spirit had a new house to live in although His Spirit was that of the Son of God, whether He lived in His human body or His resurrected body. The idea of the human body being a house to live

Yet the farmer knows that unless he diligently pursues his responsibilities to plow, plant, fertilize and cultivate, he cannot expect a harvest at the end of the season. In a sense, he is in a partnership with God, and he will reap its benefits only when he has fulfilled his own responsibilities.

Farming is a joint venture between God and the farmer. The farmer cannot do what God must do, and God will not do what the farmer should do. We can say just as accurately that the pursuit of holiness is a joint venture between God and the Christian. It was Bro. Wendell Gudeman's first trip to India, and he told us so vividly after a visit in one of those little tribal villages, that he could see so clearly the difference between the Christians and the non-Christians. The Christians had a look of peace on their faces. Also, they looked neater and cleaner. They didn't have any more money than the others, but they took care of themselves better. They seemed to have more pride in themselves after they

found joy and peace in their hearts.

Many of them were subjected to persecutions when they became converted and believed on Jesus Christ. Witch doctors tried to dissuade them. Some had their huts burned. People suffer persecutions not only in India. Bro. Leon Graf told us yesterday of the persecutions of our brethren in Eastern Europe. Many have to suffer for their faith.

We are free to come here and worship the Lord today. No one had to pass through a point where we had to check our credentials and prove where we were going. We had no fear that the officials might come in today to arrest us for being here. We should appreciate this freedom.

Bro. LaVoyd pointed out this morning the open invitation the Lord gives and how He calls us from all walks of life. What a remarkable calling Bro. LaVoyd had. He was not raised in our faith; yet he saw that the way was open and a warm welcome was given. Many of us, who have been raised in this faith and have access to it, come and warm ourselves around the Word week after week and don't avail ourselves of it. I believe, in the light of God's Word, that we have a lot to answer for.

We have had much instruction here today that should be an encouragement to us. Bro. LaVoyd also pointed out that we who are believers must not only begin this pilgrim pathway, but we must continue on in it. We should not become overconfident; accept admonishment, but take encouragement.

In this chapter we read, "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." I Cor. 10:12. We should not be overconfident and think that we can't fall from the way, because we might become complacent, weak and lax. Then Satan can come in. If we stay on guard, we will be able to withstand and not fall.

The Word, inspired by God, encourages us. "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." I Cor. 10:13.

The Lord will always offer us a way of escape, but we must have the determination and the courage to take that avenue of escape. If we do not take advantage of the way that the Lord gives us, we will not be able to stand.

However, we are encouraged to know that He will give us a way.

We must stay close to the Lord. Being close to the Lord can be accomplished in two important ways. One is by praying. Begin each day with prayer and continue throughout the day. The second is by looking into His Word.

When we counsel with those who say that they have fallen from the way, they invariably tell us that this didn't happen by one false move. First they became negligent in reading the Word and in praying. Then they fell from God's grace. They didn't seek the Lord's help and pray that He would give them grace for each day. Then, without grace, they weren't able to withstand.

Paul says that the Lord will give us help to overcome. Then he tells us that we should flee from idolatry. We are thankful that we have a way to flee from the idolatry that tempts us.

As we said, our idolatry isn't the temptation to worship a man-made image, but to put our possessions or anything ahead of worshiping the Lord and Saviour who came and loved us so much that He died for us.

Paul told us that Jesus Christ shed His blood so that we could have this hope of salvation. We are commanded to remember it as we observe communion by breaking bread which is a symbol of His broken body, and in drinking from the cup in remembrance of His shed blood.

Then Paul tells us that we cannot serve two masters. We can't have divided allegiance. We can't serve both the devil and God. God expects our total loyalty. The Lord, as He has throughout all the ages, expects us to love and serve Him with our whole heart and mind. He gives us the way to do this

Consider the time in which we live. We read in the forereading of the days when the nations of the north will gather their armies in great numbers against the land of Israel. We feel that events which are now taking place foreshadow this. It certainly seems that we are living in the end times.

We are told in one of the prophecies that in the last days men's hearts will fail them for fear. When have we seen a time when people (even among our own) have fear about what the future holds? Never before, at least in the times that I can remember. That should make us all take stock of the

time we are living in. Each of us should look at his own life. Are we availing ourselves of what the Lord has done? Are those of us who have turned to the Lord still walking close and true to Him? Are we watching and praying as His Word tells us?

If any of you have not yet become reconciled with the Lord, we plead and pray that you will take advantage of His simple plan. It has been made available to each one without cost on our part, but by a great price paid by Jesus Christ. Turn to Him in true repentance and confess your sins.

As Bro. LaVoyd said this morning, go to your shepherds and they will be more than glad to help you. Invariably, people both young and old say, "This isn't as hard as we thought." Satan seemed to make it hard; he had put a barrier there. However, once people are willing to overcome the barrier that Satan puts up, they find that it is not nearly as hard to make this most important step in their life as they had anticipated. They were making it so difficult that they had blown it all out of proportion.

We realize how privileged we are in this land to have such easy access to the Word. We should be warned by the Scriptures and by the advice that we have had that to whom much is given, much will be expected or required. To whom little is given, little will be required.

When we consider how much we have been given, I don't believe that the Lord is going to overlook it if we have not availed ourselves of His shed blood and have not turned to Him. When we realize that many have had to find Him through much suffering and that some have never even had the privilege to know of Him, we think that those will be the ones with whom the Lord will have patience and forebearance.

Let us all realize that the times in which we live certainly are the end times of which our forefathers spoke and which have been prophesied in the Scriptures. We read of this where we opened up, unselected, this afternoon.

Let us always keep the thought in mind that if this were our last day here on earth, would we do the things that we were going to do? Or would we do something a little differently?

Our last breath may be next week, or the Lord may come and take His own. Let us live so that we will be ready. EAST LYNN

THE SILVER LINING

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. ROY GRIMM OF TAYLOR, MO

Text: Ezekiel 38 and I Corinthians 10

In the same way that the Lord often spoke in parables to make the message something that all could relate to, here we find that the apostle Paul brought a common thread into his message. His listeners knew the history of their forefathers. They knew that there had been many troublesome times and many good times during the history of the Jewish nation. Good or bad always seemed to reflect on how closely the people were abiding in the will of God.

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Paul reminded them of the time when Moses had led the people out of their bondage in Egypt. Many of them, when they went through the wilderness, murmured and complained when things didn't go well. This displeased God.

We should examine ourselves and try to profit from the mistakes that other people have made. Paul was warning the believers of his day that they should learn from the history of those who had gone on before them, and not make the same mistakes.

Paul pointed out that many of the Israelites did not please God and were overthrown in the wilderness. They lusted after things that they should not have. Many of them became idolaters. We know how displeasing it was to God to see them worshipping images made by the hands of men.

We probably think that we are not tempted to worship an idol. I imagine that that ranks pretty low on things that might be a temptation for any of us, when we think of an idol in the aspect that Paul spoke of. However, if we look at the broad overall meaning of an idol, I think that each of us has things that we are putting too much emphasis on, and, in a sense, it might be deemed that we are worshiping them. For example, it could be our possessions. We should not make anything an idol, letting it take precedence to God. Nothing should take prece-

dence over our love and devotion in service to our Lord and God.

As we mentioned, idols as images, aren't that prevalent in most of our Christian nations. Yet, we know that in other parts of the world there are more people who worship idols as gods than there are whose who worship the true living God. We were able to witness this. The thought of idol worship never sank in much until we visited in India, Japan, Thailand and some of the rest of the Far Eastern nations and saw people worship idols.

They often seem uncertain even about the idol that they worship. Sometimes there is more than one, a whole series of idols, and they go from one to the other to worship.

We had the opportunity just a few weeks ago to visit a leper colony. It was by a river. It wasn't a colony that was operated by the government. At first when we heard about it and heard that they were in need, we thought it might be a project that we could help with; but we found it was not a project, but just an area where they were forced to go off by themselves because they were shunned. It was just like we read of in the Bible times when those who had leprosy had to call out, "unclean".

To get there, we went down by a river that was deemed a holy river by the Hindu people. Here we saw things which we had only seen in books and pictures. Some people were carrying a Hindu priest on a make-shift ark on sticks across their shoulders. They carried him in a sort of sling with a fancy umbrella over his head. They were taking him to bathe in the "holy" water.

Other people carried many kinds of fruit on platters, or had various articles to sacrifice or worship or whatever they were planning to do.

As we walked on through this area, we saw some people by a little building

containing a monkey god. In another one was an idol that looked like the body of a man with six arms and the head of an elephant. The next one was a stone ox.

We noticed that the people would go from one to the other. They would put down a few coins and say a few chants. Some would put down some flower petals. It seemed to be very commercialized. There were always people selling the flower petals and various paraphernalia that were needed for their worship.

We inquired of the Indian who was with us why the people went from one kind of god to the other. This Indian was a Christian, and he said, "It is so sad. They are uncertain as to what the true God is, so they worship all of these various gods, plus the sun and the moon and any other thing that they don't understand or know much about, hoping that they cover all the bases so that they don't miss out but make sure that they worship the right god."

It is distressing to realize that there are more people in the world who have been raised in such ways than there are those like us, who have been raised to know that Jesus Christ is the true and living God.

In our Bibles, the heading here says. "Christians must flee idolatry". We have things that might, as we have said, become our idols. They might keep us from serving the Lord. There may be some in India who just hear the Word once and are willing to turn their backs on those gods that they worshiped before. Or perhaps in some of the tribal villages where they weren't sophisticated enough to know of the Hindu religion but were under the influence of witch doctors, the aboriginal people would have a deep and abiding faith when they heard of the love of the true God.
