SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE

January 20 has been designated as "Sanctity of Human Life" Day, commemorating the Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion in 1973. Christians everywhere are asked to pray about, pray for, and remember in thought or word the sanctity of human life. We are instructed in Ephesians 5:10 to be "proving what is acceptable unto the Lord". When studied in the light of scripture, the issue of the sanctity of life (including abortion, euthenasia, infanticide, etc. . .) we see that it clearly becomes an issue of good vs. evil, God-fearing vs. man-exulting, selfishness vs. selflessness and life vs. death.

For thou hast posessed my reins; thou hast covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise thee; for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; Marvelous are thy works; and that my soul knoweth right well. Psalm 139. Many people, young, old, men, women and children consider the above issues as simple solutions! They treat the killing of the unborn or deformed babies as a way to get out of a bad situation easily and forever without any repercussions. We know from experience that this line

of thinking is unrealistic, naive and extremely destructive to both the woman and her child. There are those who will try and "muddy the waters", but when the scripture is allowed to cut through the issue as a "two-edged sword", it can very quickly clear our vision.

May we as Christians remember Sanctity of Life Day, January 20, in both prayer and sincere thought. In the coming year, 1985, may we do our part to have an impact for God and what is right. Let us seek out what God's Word says about the issues, and then let us not refrain in either word, thought or deed

IN MEMORY — EDITORS: HENRY SOUDER EDWARD SOUDER opportunities of local, domestic and foreign nature. Where the latter is involved, it will be the intention to include an Apostolic Christian minister among the volunteers to hold worship services during the absence from their home congregations.

The primary financial support for these projects will require some funding from the World Relief and Mission Funds. Volunteers will be encouraged to share in some of the expenses, especially travel. Local congregations' support through either of the above mentioned funds will be appreciated.

Any members or friends who are interested in voluntary participation in this program should fill out a Volunteer Information Form. A supply of these have been provided for each congregation through the local elder.

There are a number of projects already under way as a part of this program. These include the Honduras school construction project, Haiti work teams and India medical assistance. In the planning stages are assistance programs for smaller churches and a food packaging center.

The purpose of this article is to be informative and to encourage prospective volunteers. Submitting a completed Volunteer Information form does not obligate a volunteer to participate nor does it imply a commitment. It is primarily a source of information upon which the magnitude of project development can be based.

There is also a need to identify potential work projects. In the near future, a format for submitting projects for consideration will be introduced. As they are developed, it is intended to keep the volunteers and churches notified.

The current need is for several volunteers to participate in the February 15, Haiti school roof construction project. Interested parties should submit a Volunteer Information Form and notify Bro. Harold Witzig at 309-266-6263.

We pray that God will bless this program as we seek only to do His will and follow the exhortations contained in His Holy Word.

Supporting Contributions

The sources of support are as follows:

- 1. Allocations made by the World Relief Committee three times a year at their meetings.
- 2. Special purpose collections made by local churches for food packages to Romania. These are forwarded to the Committee Treasurer, Bro. Vernon Leman.
- 3. Investment income from funds collected for possible reconstruction of Romanian church buildings.

These funds are forwarded to Bro. Leon Graf who is responsible for their disbursement. Reports are prepared by him three times a year for review and approval by the committee at their meetings.

Total receipts for the year ended August 4, 1984 amounted to \$136,348 and for the four months ended November 30, 1984, to \$43,316. This included over \$69,000 and \$30,000 respectively for those two periods, for Romanian food boxes and other aid to Romania. There is now a cash balance large enough to continue sending food boxes through the winter to about 170 families on a monthly basis.

Expenditures

Cash is disbursed monthly for food packages to Romania. Bro. Andy Hunyady of Columbus handles the package orders through Zurich, Switzerland and New York City. He received Romanian post office confirmation cards as evidence of receiving the food packages. These packages are assembled and distributed inside Romania. During the last 16 months over 1,600 food boxes have been sent to Romania using this method. The Apostolic Christian Work Projects Committee is now studying a program for possibly doing our own packaging and distributing.

Cash aid is sent bi-monthly to other Eastern European countries. Checks are prepared in three different ways, depending upon that country's needs, as determined by the church elders there. Checks are sent either directly to the needy person, or the authorized brothers in charge of alms distribution, or to a specific bank account recognized by the government as a church charity account. Total funds disbursed in this manner amounted to approximately \$28,000 for the year ended August 4, 1984 and \$9,600 for the four months ended November 30, 1984.

WORLD RELIEF COMMITTEE EASTERN EUROPE REPORT December 20, 1984

Background

A brief history of European Relief is recorded in "World Relief Activities and Report 1976 - 1981", the most recent brochure published by the World Relief Committee. The following report is intended to provide an update covering primarily the 1984 aid sent to Eastern Europe. Accordingly, the main phases of current activities is presented for your information and prayerful consideration.

This form of aid helped over 110 very needy families.

Correspondence

Several brothers have given translation assistance in handling correspondence with Eastern Europe. Bro. Andy Hunyady takes care of correspondence translation for Romania and Yugoslavia, using primarily the Hungarian language. Bro. Sandor Bako of Akron prepares the translation letters to Hungarian representatives and translates their replies. Recently Bro. Phillip Webber, who is a German professor at Central College, Pella, Iowa, offered to translate German correspondence to East Germany and two elders from other countries who write in the German language. Bro. Rudy Graf of Akron had helped with German translation for many years. As one can see, this special area of the work must be done accurately and these brothers have made a valuable contribution to this aid program!

This support for Eastern Europe aid has grown very rapidly in the past year, especially due to the special church collections for food boxes to Romania. The World Relief Committee wishes to thank again each church and contributor for special efforts in this urgent need. Your help and prayers, with God's blessing, have added greatly to the physical and spiritual needs of the believers in Eastern Europe. May God reward each of you for the measure of your compassion in remembering those of the household of faith in Eastern Europe.

Cain tried to alter this, and it did not work. God did not accept his sacrifice.

"By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts: and by it he being dead yet speaketh." Hebrews 11:4. The sacrifice which Abel offered still speaks to us today. It should cause us to think. God says He wants a sacrifice with blood. That sacrifice has been given for you and for me

through the shed blood for the Lord Jesus Christ. If we do not avail ourselves of that sacrifice, beloved, then we are unacceptable as was Cain. We must have faith and believe.

"By faith Enoch was translated that he should not see death..." Hebrews 11:5. Enoch was a man who walked with God. Can you and I say that we walk with God? Can we truthfully say that God is at our side? Do we commune with God on a person-to-person basis?

As you are going through your daily work, and as I am going through my daily work, do we talk with God? We should! That is one of the beauties, one of the blessings, that God has given to his children. We don't necessarily have to be in formal prayer in order to talk with God. God is always at our side if we will just welcome Him.

Enoch walked with God. "By faith Enoch was translated that he should not see death; and was not found, because God translated him: for before his translation he had this testimony, that he pleased God." Hebrews 11:5. You and I do not know if we will see death or not. Some people will be privileged to not see death, but most do.

If you and I do experience death, how would it be to know that our time is very short? If God spoke to you or to me today, at this very moment, and said that we had only six more hours to live, what would you do? What would I do?

There are those whose lives are snuffed out quickly. We don't believe that they fully experience death. Death comes quickly and they don't realize what is taking place. Some have the opportunity to actually go through the valley and shadow of death. What would be our feelings? What would be our understanding? Where would our faith be?

If God spoke to us at this moment, would we become hysterical? Or would we calmly thank God that there is a better place? If so, we could say, "Oh, God, we're looking forward to the beauties of heaven!" That is faith. That is the type of faith Enoch had. That is the type of faith that Abel had.

"But without faith it is impossible to please him." Hebrews 11:6. Without faith, it is impossible to please God. Some of us are very weak in faith, and I, for one, am in this condition. We're weak in faith, but we have some faith. "But without faith (no faith whatso-

ever) it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is . . ." We have to believe that God is. We have to believe that God will take care of us. We have to be able to trust.

"But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." Hebrews 11:6.

These patriarchs of old diligently sought after God. They listened to God. They believed what God said.

It mentions that Noah "... being warned of God of things not seen as yet, moved with fear, prepared an ark to the saving of his house; by the which he condemned the world, and became heir of the righteousness which is by faith." Hebrews 11:7.

Would you and I have enough faith to go out here in the church parking lot, for instance, and build an ocean-going vessel? It would be far too large to float even in the Illinois River. Would we have the faith?

That is about how it was for Noah with no water in sight and no way to move such a vessel. However, having been told by God to build such a vessel, an ocean-going vessel, Noah did it. Now that required faith. Would you and I have that much faith? I fear whether I would. In fact, I know I wouldn't. But God, through His love and throught His mercy, helps us.

Then we go on to Abraham. "By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went." Hebrews 11:8. Abraham was called the father of faith. This father of faith, the Word tells us, went, having been told by God that he should leave his country, leave his kinsmen, and go to a place that God would show him.

Abraham did not know where God was going to lead him. All Abraham knew was that he was to leave the country where he lived, and God would reveal to him where he should go.

Sometimes it seems that our lives are like that when we embark on a new spiritual life. God speaks to our hearts, doesn't He? He says, "I want you to leave the sinful condition that you are in. I want you to travel to a different place, and I will show you the way. So we leave our sinful condition, the sinful life.

You and I were not sure at that point

just exactly where God was going to lead us. I think, young people, that this should be a lesson for you. As you embark in adulthood after having given your heart to God, you aren't sure exactly where God is going to lead, are you? You're not sure. You need faith, don't you?

Those of us who are older may say, "Our lives are somewhat set. We have established a pattern in our lives." Are we sure where God is going to lead us? Are we sure of tomorrow/ Are we sure that one week from now, one month from now, a year from now, we will be able to do this or that? No, we cannot be sure.

We are somewhat like Abraham, aren't we? Do we have the faith that Abraham had? That is the question. Are we willing to embark on a new life?

Friends, we are speaking to you. Do you have a strong enough faith to believe that, if you embark on a new life, God will provide for you? If you do not have that faith, pray that you will. God is so loving and so merciful!

I believe that all here who have the peace of God in their hearts will surely say that, when they were in complete and total submission, God led the way. It was when we resisted Him and interferred with God's way that problems overtook us.

"By faith he (Abraham) sojourned in the land of promise, as in a strange country, dwelling in tabernacles with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promsie: For he looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God." Hebrews 11:9, 10. That's the key. That's the key. We are to look for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God!

That's why you and I are here today, isn't it? We are looking for a city and that city is called the New Jeruasalem. That city will have streets paved with pure gold. That city will be so beautiful that we mortal beings cannot describe the beauty. That city will have solid foundations, built to last through eternity. It's builder and general contractor is God. He is the One who created the world and all that is therein. That includes you and me. The builder and maker is God.

THE SILVER LINING

SERMON BY BRO. CHARLES HEMMER OF PEORIA, IL

Text: Hebrews 11

According to this chapter from Paul's epistle to the Hebrews, those of us who have the peace of God in our hearts cannot plan on a path of roses. We cannot expect God to make an easy or a beautiful way for us. The patriarchs of whom we read were tested and tried. They were tried to the point where they cried unto their God.

28

Beloved, you and I are tested and we are tried. But have we been tried to the point where we were "... tortured, not accepting deliverance"? Have we suffered "... cruel mockings and scourgings, yea, moreover of bonds and imprisonment"? Hebrews 11:35, 36. Have we been tempted and tried in this way?

Maybe God knows that we are just a little bit weak in faith. When I say this, I am speaking of myself first. We are weak in faith. I am weak in faith. I need strength. When things go wrong, we pray, don't we? We turn to God, and we pray more fervently. This is good, but do we believe? Do we really believe, and do we trust?

This chapter opens by saying, "Now faith (and this is what we need – faith) is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1.

You and I want comfort. We want peace and joy in our lives. We want this not only for ourselves, but also for our dear loved ones, don't we? This is the human nature. Our bodies desire comfort, peace and joy. But where do we find real peace, real joy and real happiness? Where does it come from? It comes from God. You know this and I know this. It comes from believing and from faith in God. When we believe and have faith, then we have peace, joy and comfort!

"For by it the elders obtained a good report." Hebrews 11:2. Through faith the elders and the patriarchs of old obtained a good report. What kind of report will you and I have as we stand in judgment with God and say, "Lord, here is my record. Here is a report of my life."?

God knows us. He sees into the innermost parts of our hearts. If we transfer from one school to another, from one job to another or even from one community to another, a series of records follows us. A report.

A report will also follow us to eternity. We want that record to be clean. We don't want any blemishes on it, do we? We want that record to be clear and clean, so that God will recognize us. Then we'll have a home in heaven.

Do we have enough faith to believe this? Do we believe that if we remain faithful and true, we will have this good report? "For by it the elders obtained a good report." The patriarchs of old obtained a good report, and you and I are striving for a good report.

"Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the Word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear." Hebrews 11:3.

"Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God." Can we firmly, fully believe that all things that we have, we see, we do, are in direct relation to God? As believers in Jesus Christ, all of us will say, "Oh, yes!" But I am asking each one to examine his heart. Do we really believe from the depth of our heart? Do we really have the faith to believe?

When we have adversities, when things go wrong, what do we do? Do we take matters into our own hands? Or do we have enough faith to believe that if we can just trust, God will work things out for our betterment? Sometimes you and I are so close to the situation, our problems, our cares, our troubles, that we really can't see clearly.

Do we have the faith to believe that there is a God in heaven who is looking down over us? Maybe this trial, this concern, this problem will draw us closer to God.

You see, that is part of faith. We have to trust. If we are God-fearing and have lived a completely surrendered life, we should believe that all things have been permitted by God as part of His overall plan. Do we believe this?

Let us go on. "By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain." Hebrews 11:4. Self enters into this. When we are selfish, putting self first, we are in trouble. That is exactly what happened to Cain. Cain offered a sacrifice, and he was a Godfearing man or he would not have offered a sacrifice.

Cain offered a sacrifice, but Abel offered a more excellent sacrifice. Why did Abel offer a more excellent sacrifice? Because that sacrifice was according to the Word of God. He believed what God had said.

Remember the two sacrifices that these two men offered. One offered a sacrifice that contained blood; the other offered a sacrifice of plants, where there was no blood involved.

"By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain." Self came in. Cain probably thought, "Well, I'll offer a sacrifice. It really doesn't make God any difference what kind of sacrifice, just so it is a sacrifice." But God doesn't work that way. God is perfect. God is so perfect in His ways that we must do as He commands us, or we have no chance for heaven.
