The Mennonite Central Committee is the cooperative relief and service agency of North American Mennonite and Brethren in Christ churches. M.C.C., as the agency is called, was born in 1920 and today administers and participates in programs of agriculture and economic development, education, medicine, self-help, relief and peace in forty countries. This agency also coordinates a disaster service to help in areas of various disasters. They have volunteers serving in Africa, Asia, Europe and North and South America.

The self-help program of M.C.C. encourages local crafts in twenty countries and teaches people to make these to earn their own living. These craft items are then exported and sold in self-help shops and relief sales in United States and Canada.

Our dear brothers, Elder Bro. Herman Kellenberger, and Bros. Henry Beer and Herman Norr, were inspired with a heavenly inspiration. The message they received from God was to put their thoughts into action. The teaching from God was, "To feed the hungry and satisfy the afflicted, then shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy darkness be as the noon day." Isaiah 58:10.

The elder body encouraged the brethren to move forward in this rewarding work. Thus the inception of Apostolic Christian World Relief in 1964. M.C.C., CARE and Heifer Project were the first agencies to receive help from this newly formed group. Through the years World Relief sharing has spread their disbursements to a greater number of organizations, but the first three receive a good share. We are thankful for our dedicated brothers, sisters and friends who continue to share their God-given blessings with those in need.

The Apostolic Christian World Relief evaluation of M.C.C. is very good. This came about through their answering a questionaire which was sent to them. Their administrative cost was very low, they are dependable, considerate and willing to help in whatever the need. Through the years we have worked together in disaster areas. Our sewing brothers and sisters have helped to send layettes, bandages, soap, school and health kits, sewing needs, bedding and clothing through this organization. They have also received help in various places such as Newton, KS; Kidron, OH; and the Mennonite Relief Sale in Peoria, IL. In some areas our brethren have supported their meat canning project.

The largest project in which we have shared with them in the past few years has been sending grain to needy countries. Again in the past year we sent one load of edible beans and many loads of corn to Africa where we hear the need is very great. We have been pleased with their distribution of the food that is sent, as we understand they have M.C.C. personnel in the fields to distribute the grain.

Our prayer and wish would be to hear, "Verily I say unto you, inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me." Matthew 25:40.

NEED FOR TEACHERS IN JAPAN

Dearly beloved brethren,

Most blessed and wonderful are greetings in the fellowship of the saints through Jesus Christ our Lord.

It has been quite some time since we have had to make a plea to the brethren for teachers to carry on the labors in Japan among our brethren.

Sis. Margie Heintz from Champaign/Urbana (as well as from Rockville, CT) will finish her two-year term in the nursery/kindergarten school "Under the Vines" at Shioda, Yamanashi, Japan. We are fortunate to have Sis. Sheila Moser (Lester, IA) who is serving so capably and sharing an apartment with Sis. Margie. We have tried to follow the Lord's teaching where He sent them forth two by two. This helps to provide companionship as well as support to the sisters who work together in this important calling.

It has also worked out very well that Bros. Frank Sauder (formerly from Roanoke, IL) and Randy Mogler (originally from West Bend, IA and more recently from Champaign, Urbana and Bloomington, IL respectively) are also serving in Japan. The brothers have a nice apartment not too far from the church in the country. They help to administer the school as well as provide conversation English classes. In addition, along with other activities, they have been holding special Bible classes in Tokyo. It is encouraging to note that they have definitely stimulated some interest. We're glad to see young men becoming involved in some of the classes.

There is a burden among all who are knowledgeable about the work, that after the children leave the nursery/kindergarten school they just seem to phase out, and we generally don't see them again. The plea has come from Japan that we recognize our responsibility in trying to keep them closer to the faith. The suggestion was made to the Missionary Committee that we consider another sister to be available for special classes to attempt to reach the children and their parents to whom the brethren become so closely attached while they are in kindergarten. This will be quite a challenge. The Committee is agreed that if we can find another sister, who has the professional ability, we would be most happy to isee what can be accomplished.

Consequently, we have a need for two qualified sisters. If any of you are interested, we urge you to very prayerfully consider this important matter. Candidates must be in good standing with their home congregation and shepherd, have certification compatible with the positions available, and be prepared to lend themselves, God willing, for a two-year commitment to the position in Japan.

We have found it wise for accepted candidates to prepare themselves while yet in the States with some Japanese instruction. Surprisingly, it is available in a lot of areas. It is not mandatory, but very helpful as it prepares one to be better able to communicate with the parents and neighbors. Japanese lessons are available by some of our own brethren. Most of those involved in the work in the School take on-going Japanese lessons.

To those interested, any of the Missionary Committee brethren would be happy to answer questions, or you can contact Bro. Willis Ehnle or myself. We stress, it is not a vacation, but rather a very responsible opportunity to lend yourself to a very important work in God's vineyard. Replacement for Sis. Margie Heintz should be by midsummer '85.

IDLE WORDS?

When we gather together to worship and whenever we pray, we do so in Jesus name. To every child of God this name is the sweetest, most precious and dearest name known in his heart. The name, "Jesus," is, to the believer, the very symbol of love, sacrifice and suffering which brought us unto salvation. Yet, at times, in our weaker moments, as we converse with one another, we soil our lips and dishonor our Lord's name through careless and thoughtless expressions.

To illustrate, let me share with you

an experience I had several years ago. While attending an agricultural field day, standing in the midst of thousands of people, a total stranger came by and handed me a small pamphlet. I slipped it into my pocket and later read it at home. Following is its contents:

WATCH YOUR SPEECH

A visiting minister was asked to lead in prayer in Sunday school, and when he had finished, a teacher heard one of the girls whisper, "Gosh, what a prayer!" Such an exclamation seems incongruous in expressing one's appreciation of a prayer, but a little thought will lead anyone to the conclusion that "gosh" is not an appropriate word for a Christian to use on any occasion whatsoever. When we look into the original meaning of such interjections, we may be surprised that even some Christian people are habitual users of expressions which the dictionarv terms "minced oaths"

A very commonly used interjection is "Gee". It is capitalized in Webster's New International Dictionary and given this definition: "A form of Jesus used in minced oaths". This derivation is even more apparent when the form "Geez" or "Jeepers," now frequently heard, is used.

Two other common words and their definitions are these: "Golly," a euphemism for God, used in minced oaths". "Darn, darned, darnation," are said to be "colloquial euphemisms for damn, damned, damnation". Persons who allow their lips to utter "Gosh-darned" quite freely, would be shocked if they realized the real meaning of the word.

Since there is no occasion for the Christian to use anything other than reasonable adjectives to emphasize the thought he desires to express, how can he use any form of our Lord's holy name as a means of expression or as an exclamation. Certainly there is no room at all for minced oaths and nearcurse words at anytime.

MEMORIES OF JAPAN AND INDIA

ARRIVAL AT THE KHARDI MISSION COMPOUND

As we traveled north of Bombay, we were able to see and witness the rural farming area. The farming is very primitive, using oxen or water buffalo and a wooden plow. The farmer would go a few steps and then have to urge the oxen on. We saw the threshing floors and the oxen tied to a pole, going round and round, treading the grain out, just as in Biblical times. We passed all modes of travel. Many people were walking, oftentimes the women bearing burdens on their heads. There were Indian farmers with two-wheeled carts taking hay or produce to the market. Often the wife and children would be riding in the cart. There were large trucks hauling produce and merchandise to the cities. These trucks were gaudily painted in many colors and designs. Often there were young and old clinging to the top of the load for a ride to town. All this traffic was mixed with herds of sheep, goats and cattle (they are considered sacred). I was amazed at a life so different from ours.

The driver got us safely to the Khardi Mission Compound and we found a welcome sign over the gates. Again we were so kindly received. The Khardi Mission is the original home for

the Bagwhats. We stayed in this home while visiting. This mission compound has a church, dispensary, orphanage, home quarters for the staff and Pastor Aghumkar. There are 30 orphan boys being cared for. They sang hymns for us and recited portions of scriptures during a welcome service the next The morning. Village Pouchyst (mayor) and some of the village officials were there and all of the mission personnel. Again in their custom, garlands of flowers were placed on our neck and we could feel the warmth of their Christian love. After the service. we presented the gifts we had carried for the orphan boys and for the ladies of the mission. We visited the dining quarters and sleeping quarters for the boys.

"For I was hungry, and ye gave me food; I was thirsty and ye gave me drink; I was a stranger, and ye took me in; Naked and ye clothed me; . . ." Matthew 25:35-36.

What a wonderful blessing it was to see these boys healthy, well fed and happy. What a contrast to the many children we saw, underfed and living in poverty. The orphan boys all lined up around the large room (their sleeping quarters) and sang hymns and recited scripture verses. They all have a bed roll and sleep on the floor. In our land, the children have so much. If they could just see these children happy with so little.

A beautiful Sunday morning greeted us, as we were able to attend services in the chapel. The orphan boys, in their white pajama suits, sat on the floor in the front. The women and children sat on one side and the men sat on the other, all on the floor. There was a bench in the back for Sisters Lois and Virginia to be seated with some of the Indian women. Here, 12,500 miles from home, with hymns, prayer and the Word, we were able to share God's Word through an interpreter, with the Indian Christians.

On the next day we visited the open well across the road from the mission compound. All the water used must be hauled by ox cart. We also visited the Pipe Line Channels. The British troops were stationed in these barracks before they left when India gained independence. This land and barracks were given to the mission by the British. A retired minister and his wife live here, again in very meager circumstances. A walk out to the mission cemetery was a very sobering experience. We had to think of this small group of Christians holding fast in faith until death, surrounded by a vast sea of humanity caught up in idol worship.

REPORT FROM EASTERN EUROPE

Since the first of the year, all of the European continent suffered the coldest winter weather ever reported. Our brethren living in the East European countries, and particularly in Romania, had additional burdens to bear; severe food and heating energy shortages. In many small villages the schools have been closed and small children are required to walk many kilometers to the neighboring village schools. Many are inadequately clothed. Many deaths have been reported in these countries due to the heavy snows and severe cold weather.

Food shortages are worsening. Our monthly list of families have increased from an average 170 to 265 since the first of 1985. Village dwellers and those distant from the cities suffer the most. Many families can no longer raise their own poultry, for meat and eggs, due to total lack of feed grains. Food packages, made possible by your most generous gifts, are most welcome and in many cases serve as a lifesaver.

To worsen the situation, World Relief Funds sent to elder brothers for distribution to the very needy for clothing, fuel or other necessities, were held by the banks for a year or longer and eventually returned to Bro. Leon Graf. No explanation was given. Another indication just how little consideration is given to the needy, elderly citizens by those in authority.

Dearly Beloved, let us remember these brethren in bonds in our daily prayers, that God in His great love and mercy will strengthen them in their faith to endure the severe trials and hardships.

Our new administration building is progressing nicely, thanks to the many volunteers who so freely give of their time and talent. What a blessing there is in a labor of love and a work of faith.

At our Home we are attempting to mend these broken children. Their needs are great and it is so evident that their lives are the broken pieces of divorce and other problems. These problems are by no means isolated to Northern Indiana, but rather broken homes are a nation-wide epidemic. We serve very few children in the national aspect.

In the course of conversation, it's common to hear many of our Christian brothers and sisters express strong interest and desire to know more about and share in the work at our Home. However, to actually participate or serve as a houseparent in one of our Homes is not always a feasible option to gain that understanding or experience. Yet, this type of ministry is not confined to this particular location but can be carried out in a variety of different ways in each of our communities. Our options are endless. To name a few: Foster Parenting. Adoption, Take in an unwed, expectant woman or a mother and her child, become a "Big Brother" or "Big Sister" to some needy child, reach out to a neighbor or a family in need. We want to encourage anyone who shares this burden to pursue those convictions. The Lord can use us wherever we are; the choice is ours.

An alert, listening ear at the Home is often able to catch some interesting comments. As one resident was watching the falling snow make a lovely scene around the evergreens, she said, "It's beautiful! And to think that some people say that there is no God!"

Though the winter days are confining for many of the residents, others are able to participate in such enjoyable activities as sledding and basketball.

Again, among our valuable volunteers are those who cook the Sunday dinners to relieve the kitchen staff. Four or more volunteers, working under the guidance of one kitchen staff member, cook and serve all of the food on the planned menu, often furnishing the dessert for the 100 plus people. An important part of serving the food is adjusting the menu to the numerous, special diets. After dinner, the tables are cleared and re-set for breakfast. Dishes are washed, and the kitchen is cleaned. After several hours of concentrated work, the volunteers leave for home, hopefully with the knowledge of a much-appreciated task well done.

John Paul Eddy, our resident number 97, has come to make his home with us. The son of Kathy and James Eddy (Hanna City, IL), he has one brother and two sisters. Cake is John's favorite food; music and bells are an enjoyable pastime for him. At the present time, he is attending school at Hanna City. Birthday time for John is January 27. Welcome, John!

We need to have on the breastplate of righteousness protecting our hearts, the most vulnerable portion of our body. The Roman soldier's breastplate was very sturdy, but yet flexible and covered his most vital organs from the neck to the knees. We need to have God's righteousness for our protection of our spiritual body. The soldier had to have his feet properly shod to prevent his stepping on one of the very sharp pieces of wood which were often planted by the enemy to cripple him. We are shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace when we first repent and become converted and are given God's peace, and also when we are spiritually prepared at all times, keeping that peace in our hearts. We should shod our feet so that we can swiftly carry the "good news" of peace to others. A valuable piece of equipment is the shield of faith. The shields of that time were made of a layer of wood covered with a layer of metal and of leather. They were specially treated to extinguish burning arrows upon contact which were fired at them. May our

faith be durable enough to quench the darts of Satan and his followers. Two other parts of the armour mentioned were the helmet of salvation to protect ones head, which man needs to think clearly, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God. We need to be practiced up in handling this sword so we don't have to clumsily try to pull it from the sheath when the enemy strikes. We should be able to use it with skill and ease. If we put on this whole armour daily, we will be prepared to fight the enemy by the grace of God.

"Peace from God our Father." Peace, perfect peace! What music there is in these words! rank, representing a country or sovereign."

This is what we are: the highest

order or rank representing a government or sovereign. You and I are ambassadors of God Almighty. Let us think about that further and carry it another step. Let's look at the life of an ambassador and at his message.

Oftentimes, I think that we preachers are like little Western Union boys. We don't create the message; we only carry the message. We are not the important ones. The message itself is the important part.

We are ambassadors. An ambassador travels to and lives within a foreign country. He actually dwells in that country. His policies, the ideas, thoughts and understandings are not his own. They are of his government. You and I, if we carry out our responsibilities as ambassadors, will only do what our government (our Godhead which is God Almighty) wants us to do.

Recently (I know that all of you are aware of it) an ambassador was dismissed (or he resigned). He wasn't giving the message of the country, was he? He was contrary; he wasn't in tune with his government.

Paul calls us ambassadors. If we are ambassadors, then we ought to represent our Lord and His doctrine.

A country that is in harmony with another country, at peace with another country, has ambassadors within that country. But when two countries go to war, what happens? The ambassadors are called home, aren't they? The ambassadors are called home because there is no longer peace; there is war. They are brought home for their own safety.

What is going to happen in the very near future? I believe that the Lord Jesus Christ is coming soon, s-o-o-n, soon! He is coming soon to gather His own, His ambassadors, those of us who know and love Him.

Before there is a terrible war, before the great tribulation time upon this earth, the Lord is going to come and take His ambassadors home. Then there is going to be unimaginable wickedness upon the earth. Our minds can't comprehend it.

There is a restraining force in the world today. The Holy Spirit restrains the evil so that it cannot run as free a course as it would like. But when that Holy Spirit, that Comforter, that Restrainer is removed and evil is able to run rampant, then evil will escalate to levels that we cannot comprehend today. It would cause fainting. It would cause great, great distress.

You and I who are ambassadors don't have to worry about those times. We don't have to worry because we are going to be called home before the battle day, before the evil is so great and heavy. During that time, when all that evil occurs, we are going to be in bliss. We are going to be in a place called heaven, and I believe that it is a place. The Word says that it is a place.

We're going to be there, and we will begin a time of eternal joy and happiness that is even greater than the joy that we feel today when fellowshipping together. I believe, since God is an infinite God, and the Word tells that He is an infinite God, that even the joy which you and I will experience will be multiplied and become greater and greater every day. How can it be? It can be with God.

The Lord many times presents us with opposites (cold and hot, or, black and white) in the Word, but what are we experiencing across the land today? It's not the hot and the cold, is it? There is a coolness, a lukewarmness. Recently I heard a senator, I believe that he was a senator, say that he no longer says, "Yes," or "No". He said that he had a new word in his vocabulary. It was "Yo". When asked what it meant, he said, "It is neither 'Yes' nor 'No'; it is just in between."

That's what we find in the world today, "in-betweens". That's the blindness that the adversary, Satan, the devil, is using. A gray area. It is no longer white or black, cold or hot, but it is in the middle.

A man who was in my office this past week told me of a conversation which he had had with another man. The other man happened to be a preacher in another church. He was talking to him about his concern. He said, "If I preached the Word as I ought to preach it, I would lose my job. I would lose my position." When asked, "Why don't you," he couldn't answer.

What we need is preachers who will preach the true Word of God as Jesus preached it in this chapter which we read today. Can we grasp the wrath of the Lord in this chapter?

He said, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites!" How many times did He say that? Six or seven times in this chapter. A hypocrite is one who says something, but really doesn't follow through or think so in his heart. He said, "... for ye compass sea and land to make one proselyte (that's a convert), and when he is made, ye make him twofold more the child of hell than yourselves." Matthew 23:15. Christ talked to them in this way at that time. But what is happening today with this lukewarm, easy belief wherein repentance and true conversion is not experienced?

That is the key, isn't it? We could talk about repentance and belief in the Lord Jesus Christ. We could talk about that, and one could understand the word "repent" very clearly, that it is a turning around, a change of attitude of the heart and mind. One could get an understanding of what repentance is and say, "Yes, I believe." But unless we experience a true repentance and change, can we really believe on the Lord Jesus Christ?

You know, the word "believe" has repentance in it. When people deeply believe that Christ died for their sins, they repent. When they fully realize that Christ was crucified for them on Calvary's cross, repentance occurs.

We try to understand this way of salvation. We try to grasp it all; and yet, we must throw up our hands. It is a mystery! It is a mystery how God can change man into something different. The Word tells us that we become a "new creation".

A new creation! And we wonder. We know the workings of the Spirit and we can testify to it; but, as it tells us in one place, it is like the wind. We don't know where it comes from or where it goes. It is amazing, isn't it?

Recently I saw a man who had been in a motorcycle gang. He weighed three hundred pounds, had hair down to here and was a beastly looking man. He sat in a chair right in front of me. I believe that he was a converted man at the time that I saw him.

Just this past week I found out that before he became converted, he was a member of the "Hell's Angels". As I reminisced about how I had talked with him, I couldn't get over it. Here was a man who had been a member of the "Hell's Angels" and now he is a member of the band of Jesus Christ. This change, this new creation, works, doesn't it, beloved brothers and sisters? Salvation is real.

Oftentimes, I consider the fact that we don't assemble for social reasons. Our searching in the Holy Word of God isn't something that we just do because of church membership. Our desire is real. It's real to each of our hearts. It's real because of the conviction and the power of the Holy Spirit, and because of the marvelous grace, the wonderful, matchless grace of God.

Many illustrations can be given to explain salvation, and what God does for mankind. I am reminded of the story of a court case in the state of Pennsylvania. It became a very famous court case that was known throughout the United States.

The judge who was to preside over the case would have to give a sentence to his son, because his son had fallen to sin. Yes, that's what it is. It is sin. Crime is sin. So, he had to preside over the case.

The judge had built up a tremendous reputation. He was looked upon by the town and by those about him as a man of integrity. Many of his friends came to him and said, "Sir, if it is in any way possible, don't judge your son. Get someone else to take over this case. You have an unblemished background. You have been a man of integrity, and we are afraid that, when you judge your son, you might not do what should be done according to the law."

The good old judge wouldn't be changed, but said, "No. I will preside over this case." The weeks went by, the information was gathered, and the day of the court hearing came. The people gathered in the courtroom, and all the material and evidence was presented. The jury deliberated, and they found him "guilty".

Then it was time for the sentence. The judge pulled the old law book from the shelf, and he leafed through it and found the place where this type of sentence was. He said, "I sentence you, my son, to fourteen years of hard labor and imprisonment. This is the maximum pentalty of the law in the State of Pennsylvania, and I sentence you to this maximum penalty for the crime that you have committed."

The jurors and those within the courtroom gasped at the decision of the judge. Then the judge got off and stand and walked to where his son was sitting. As he stood there and looked at the bench where he had been sitting, he said these words: "The information has been gathered. The sentence that has been given is proper and true. THE SILVER LINING

SERMON BY BRO. ROD HUBER OF VALPARAISO, IN

Text: I Kings 7 and Matthew 23:1-33

Today in this beautiful land of America, we have freedom of worship. We can come to the house of the Lord and worship together. We can sing together; we can pray together; we can hear the Word together; and we can worship the Lord together. We are a privileged people. We are privileged to hear the truth that is given to us in the church.

If there is untruth given to us as we listen to the Word, we are underprivileged. We are as orphaned children. But if we can come to the house of the Lord and be fed the true Word, the true Gospel, then we are a privileged people. We are a very privileged people!

Think about the children of Israel. They were a chosen people. I want you to realize something else this morning. We are a chosen people. We are chosen of God. Have you understood our high standing? We are the chosen people of God. The Word says, "Many are called, but few are chosen." Matthew 22:14. We are part of that few.

Oh, the privilege of assembling around the Word. It is not a credit to ourselves. We must continually go back to the working of the Spirit of God who convicts our hearts, convicts us of those things which are right and proper. Then His marvelous grace gives us the opportunity and the desire to go ahead and fulfill those convictions. It's not the working of men; it's not man's ability to stay close to the Word, but it's the ability which God gives to us. We must keep a correct perspective in all of our spiritual responsibilities and duties.

We are a part of a glorious religion, the true religion, which is belief in the Son of the Living God. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16.

That's truth. That's the basic truth,

the foundation for the religious practices and beliefs that, in faith, you and I have today. If we try to build our religious faith on anything else, we might as well just get up and walk out that door. It won't do you any good to sit here this morning if you're trying to build on anything else. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Slain Lamb, is the only foundation that we can build on.

Why build? Why build anything at all? Why build a religious faith? Why have a religious faith? The Word tells us very plainly of a plan of God from the very beginning to its ending. It's full of the mercy of God. It's full of warnings, admonitions, admonishments and encouragements to each and every one of us. There is something in the Word for each of us, and if we don't heed what is intended for us, we will be lost throughout eternity.

Some of us may go through the portals of heaven and be safe, spared of eternal hell. That's for those of us who are redeemed. But, if we don't heed the Word and build upon the firm foundation, we will lose the reward. If we build anything that is not of faith, or have done anything for self-glory or selfpraise, those things will be burned up. Only those things that are done for Christ, for His glory and for His praise and for His honor, are going to last.

On the other hand, we have the lost. The lost are those who do not know the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour, who have not built on the firm foundation.

How do we build? We repent. The Lord Jesus Christ says that we must repent and believe the gospel. The instruction is not from man. This is what the Bible says. This is what we preach by His grace.

We have services at a County Home near where we live, and we share them with the LaCrosse congregation. Every month we go there. There is a beautiful little chapel built onto the side of the County Home. It is decorated so nicely and it is just a beautiful little chapel. One Sunday evening when we were there, a man who lived there came in with a Bible. He asked, "Do you preach the truth?"

Oh, my heart! I was kind of low ... I was so empty. But he asked me, "Do you speak the truth?" I said, "Yes, by the grace of God." My spirits were lifted because here was one who wanted the truth.

If we desire anything other than the truth, we err, and do not what we ought to do.

We can make many comparisons in life. The Lord often used them when He spoke. He spoke of brides and bridegrooms. Recently we attended a wedding in the Bloomington congregation, and there we saw the bride and the bridegroom.

He spoke clearly about the lost and the saved, those who are lost and those who are saved.

He talked about the brightness of heaven and the light of heaven, and then about the darkness of hell. In all of these things, He used many beautiful comparisons to explain what we are on earth for, what the purpose of our existence is.

There is an eternal purpose. If we could only grasp that this morning. The eternal purpose is to worship God Almighty in truth, through His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

In one place He talked about ambassadors. Do you know that we are ambassadors for Him? You and I who are redeemed and know His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, are His ambassadors. If we would look up the word "ambassador" in the dictionary (I had to do this recently in a business situation), we would find that the word ambassador means: "One of the highest order of
