Death is unusual in that we only experience it once in a lifetime. What do you expect death to be like and have you done everything you know to get ready for it? It can be pictured as a knowledgeable departure from this body into a new realm.

When Fidel Castro took control of Cuba via a successful revolution against a dictatorial government, he decided it was necessary to execute some of his friends who no longer supported him when they learned of his intentions to establish a Marxistoriented government. One of his friends walked to his execution with this remark, "I've always wanted to know what's on the other side." His remark concerns death and is not easily forgotten.

We have heard and read of people who left their bodies and then returned to those bodies to continue living here on earth. They speak of watching the doctors and nurses, or family members, hover over their bodies, and of their reluctance to return to their own bodies. They seem to have freer movement outside the body. OUR EASTERN EUROPE VISIT

Bro. Vernon Leman, World Relief Representative

"Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver."

II Corinthians 9:7

A suggestion was made at our World Relief committee meeting, which was held in Ft. Lauderdale in December, that we evaluate our sharing of food packages and monetary gifts which we send to our brethren in Romania. The elder brethren who are on the World Relief Committee thought this necessary and gave their consent for someone to visit that area. With the blessings of those three elders and the other committee members, plans were made for Bros. Andrew Hunyady and Vernon Leman to make this trip. It had been ten vears since our dear Brethren. John Bahler, Rudy Graf and Andrew Hunyady had visited those brethren to see about their conditions. Also traveling on this recent trip were two to represent the Apostolic Christian Nazarene Church. Those two were George Hunyady and James Siladie. Both these two and Bro. Andrew had lived part of their lives in that area so could readily understand the language and interpret for others.

Our flight to Budapest, Hungary was enjoyable as the weather was conducive to ideal flying. We were greeted by a group of dear brethren at the airport and they kindly provided for us in every way by sharing their love and hospitality. Several elder brothers and one minister came from other churches to discuss the World Relief work with us.

That weekend in Hungary was a blessed one for me to again assemble in the Budapest church, as Viola and I were on the Heritage tour in 1983, and enjoyed a Sunday in their area at that time. One can soon feel their love for God's Word and their humility as we worship together.

In Hungary they are able to assemble in churches for their worship. Though a Communist country, Christians have more freedom there than in the other countries where we visited.

On Monday, March 25, we rented a Mazda car with a luggage carrier on top, to continue our journey to Romania with much concern and fervent

prayer as we knew not what we might encounter. In traveling to Romania from Hungary, we noticed the operation of State controlled farms. These are large grain farms, much as we have in the States, but controlled by the State. They raised wheat, corn, alfalfa, vegetables and vineyards all with controlled laborers, as each was ordered to do his special work. We saw many older people walking to work, carrying hoes or other garden tools. Their land is generally a very fertile soil and for the most part level. Machinery compares in part, although they seem to use it to an older age.

Upon reaching the Romanian border, we again found the large iron gates closed and the need to go through customs. The guards did a thorough check of our luggage and asked many questions. I was very thankful for the other three companions being able to interpret for me as I did not understand their language. They took my tapes and my Statements of Faith, but I was told they would return them upon our leaving the country. However, we did not leave the same port as we entered so I did not receive them. After 3¹/₂ hours of checking, waiting and exchanging money, they gave us the permission to enter. We were thankful to God and appreciated His nearness in the Communist countries.

There are many poor brethren and friends in Romania partly due to several disasters which hit that area. There was a flood in 1970, then an earthquake in 1977 which was followed by a dry season. Our Apostolic Christian churches collected \$25,000 for their relief after the flood. This gift was delivered by Bro. Andrew Hunvady to the head of State, Nicola Ceauscia. Since those events, our church has been trying to send food packages and monetary gifts to help our needy brethren. In our visits, we found the food packages getting to them in good condition. We were thankful for the blessing to be able to bring a good report to all of you that have shared so generously.

The food packages which we are sending contain the following: soup mixes, sugar, canned hams and sausage, powdered milk cocoa, margerine, coffee, grits and cooking oil. Their winters are much more critical because of the restrictions on the use of electricity and heating fuel. One dear sister told of her condition and felt that starving was going to be her lot as she was out of food. One can believe that she prayed very earnestly as she went to bed hungry. On the next day her prayer was answered as she received a food package. Those who are receiving the food packages, want to thank each of you for sending this help to them.

They are to use only one light bulb at night, perhaps around a 50-watt bulb. Because of the fuel restrictions, many older folk have died as the weather was very cold, some 30 degrees below zero. Therefore, it is our recommendation that we continue to help, especially in the winter, as the need still exists. In the warmer weather, the need is less as they have individual gardens, fruit trees, vineyards, chickens, sheep and some will have one or two hogs for food purposes. One participant told us of the requirements to share with the government, that he has to give half of the wool from the sheep, even though he owns the sheep.

In Romania, their agriculture is similar to Hungary but probably more restricted, and more government controlled. These conditions took me back many years as we would see a team of horses and, in some cases, oxen hitched to small old wagons. They load the manure by hand, haul it to the field and unload it on a pile and others will spread it on the land by hand. They make good use of their labor.

We made stops along the way to the Capitol at Bucharest and to visit the brethren. What a rejoicing when we could share God's love with the brethren there!

In Romania the Christians worship in individual homes in small groups. The government seems to know when visitors come and know ones whereabouts at all times. At one time Bro. Andy was grilled for 1½ hours and had to give a good accounting to the police, before they would let him go.

After leaving Romania, we entered Yugoslavia to spend the next few days. Here again, we were well received by the believers. We were able to spend two days and nights with the Berta Maytas family. He is a minister of the gospel in the town of Pisca, Y. He told us of his desire to remodel the present church and another older church building into an Old People's Home. He has asked that we consider this matter as a World Relief project.

These dear brethren were very hospitable all along the way and sacrificed to feed us very good meals. They always began with chicken noodle soup, then meat, bread, potatoes, vegetables, followed with pastries. All meals were served with wine and mineral water. This seemed to be the custom in all of the visited countries. They were disappointed if one did not partake of all they provided. Sometimes, only several hours had passed since we had partaken of such a bounteous meal. In Arad, Yugoslavia, we visited an elder named Virtaci Alexandria and enjoyed services at their home the next day. While there, we were privileged to see the 4-wheel drive vehicle which World Relief purchased for their use. It has the capacity of carrying 8 people. We found it in good condition and very useful to transport brethren.

Czechoslavakia was our planned trip for our last day of visiting. We made two stops and visits at the homes of two elder brothers who lived there.

In all of these countries, Bro. Andrew was to share some of the World

For several years, World Relief, being aware of the hungry peoples in the third world countries, has been endeavoring to send some grains to help those in poverty and hunger.

We think of "James 2" concerning being destitute of daily food and if we don't give them those things which are needful to the body, what doth it profit?

We, in the land of America, have been blessed so bountifully and, indeed, we, of the World Relief committee, are thankful for the many kind deeds of our brethren and friends and for the efforts put forth in doing this good work, feeding the hungry.

Especially M.C.C., International Aid and S.I.M. assure us that in the crisis in Africa, our grains are getting through to the needy. They have personnel in the field helping to see that it does. Other agencies are also helpful.

As a result, your committee has since late fall of 1984 sent approximately 18,500 bushels of corn and 1,840 bushels of beans. This is the largest amount in any one season. Many bushels have been sent prior to this.

We say thanks to the many cheerful givers who made many people happy by giving them something to eat. Lord willing, and as God directs, we will keep sending what we can as in the past.

for an answer and we look for help. We pray to God, "Who art Thou, Lord?" We can feel as Saul felt and also hear, "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest." Acts 26:15.

The love, the compassion, and the mercy of God that speaks to the hearts of everyone who turns to Him, goes beyond telling, beyond comprehension and beyond understanding, beloved ones, when we stand in the light of the Truth.

When we realize that we have been persecuting God in our unconverted life and feel burdened and condemned in the light of that guilt, the Lord comes to us which came to Saul, "But rise, and stand upon thy feet: for I have appeared unto thee for this purpose, to make thee a minister and a witness both of these things which thou hast seen, and of those things in the which I will appear unto thee." Acts 26:16.

There is no less commission given to us, beloved ones all, than was given to Saul on the way to Damascus for we are all ministers. We are all called upon to go forth and to praise God with our lives, to do His will, and to be a light and an example wherever we are, brightening that corner where we are.

We are to do the Lord's will always. Not just on Wednesday night. Not just on Sunday. Not just when we think we might meet one of our brothers or sisters, but all of the time. It isn't something that we can slip off like a jacket or coat when that day gets a little too warm, and we want to be unencumbered. Following the Lord is not an encumbrance; it is a precious and wonderful opportunity. God in His infinite love and mercy, as we stood condemned, made a wonderful revelation to us through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Paul was told to go to the Gentiles, "To open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in me (Jesus Christ)." Acts 26:18.

Dear ones, with my own ears I have heard individuals say, "I cannot repent; I have sinned too much. I have gone too far." What is impossible for God? What sin did He not know of and did He not send His Son to die for? Though our sins were as scarlet, though they were red like crimson, the blood of Jesus Christ in the everlasting covenant can make them white as snow.

Paul got up, blind though he was, and was led into Damascus. We know of his experience there. A man named Ananias was called upon by God to go and lay his hands upon Paul. That individual was told that he would find Saul in prayer. That is one of the best things to do, dear friends, when you find yourself at this juncture. Wherever you may be, by the grace of God, pray. There will certainly come to you, according to the promise of this Word, a new day of light, a new day of truth, and a new day of beauty.

Beloved ones, from the time of Paul's conversion until he was martyred, it did not matter what he faced. The driving force of the good Holy Spirit was within him; he did not turn back, and he never renounced the Lord. He gladly and willingly followed Him all through his life. He said that he was continually pressing "toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Philippians 3:14.

That's how we are to go forward, dear ones, pressing toward that mark of our high calling through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Paul had many moving experiences. He wrote of so many occurrences that we could talk about. Oh, how wonderful this chapter is that is open for us today! How wonderful that we receive forgiveness of sins and an inheritance among the redeemed of God.

Oh, beloved ones, he said here, "I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision." Acts 26:19. He showed them "that they should repent and turn to God, and do works meets for repentance." Acts 26:20.

May God grant us grace to hold close to our hearts the commission that was given to Paul and to all of us. May our lives radiate what we found so wonderful, so beneficial, and so precious.

There was undoubtedly a room full of people whom Paul was addressing here - guards, courtesans and what not, but in particular, he spoke to two very, very powerful men. I believe that Festus was a great deal like Pontius Pilate when Pontius Pilate listened to Jesus. I believe that they were much more impressed with the simplicity of the testimonies that were given to them than they really wished to admit. They felt that such an admission would cause them to lose favor with their fellow Roman citizns. I feel that King Agrippa, who had been schooled in these things and therefore knew what Paul was talking about, felt very deeply moved.

Sometimes, precious friends, I like to speak to you personally. Right now, wherever you are and whoever you are in this congregation tonight, I want to tell you that so often we would like to perhaps "shake it into you" a little how wonderful it is to serve the Lord. After all the experiences you have made in your life, after all the preaching you have heard, after all the preaching you have heard, after all the times you have read the Word, after all the precious fellowship that you have not exactly been part of but have certainly observed, after all that has been sent your way by the blessing of God, there comes a time, dear ones, when we would just like to know: "Don't you believe?"

We know that you must believe. Paul said to Agrippa, "I know that thou believest." Acts 26:27. Beloved ones, would you say as Agrippa said, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian?" Acts 26:28.

We sing a hymn about it which always brings tears to my eyes because almost is not enough. "'Almost' cannot avail, 'Almost' is but to fail!" And the very last words of that hymn: "Sad, sad, that bitter wail, 'Almost', but lost!".

Paul said (and don't we, brothers and sisters, all say as we weep and pray for our friends), "I would to God, that not only thou, but also all that hear me this day, were both almost, and altogether such as I am, except these bonds." Acts 26:29.

In other words, we wish for them the blessing of abiding in Jesus, the blessing of sharing a hope of eternal life and the blessing of being one with Jesus as children of God, not almost, but altogether.

Beloved brothers and sisters, what's the best way for us to help that to come to pass? It is to be true, faithful, joyful and happy in the Lord in our precious faith.

The sub-heading here said, "Paul's conclusion." The conclusion is that everything that we do should point the way to the Lord. Every action, every word, every thought that we have should glorify, praise and honor our Lord Jesus.

Beloved ones, the wish that we share for all of God's creation is that they might come to the knowledge of the truth, and live. We believe that it is God's work and God's alone. It cannot be our work, but our part, our instrumentality in that great and wondrous plan of God will be more fully compieted if we are wholly committed to Him.

May God grant us the grace to that end.

SERMON BY BRO. GARY MAIBACH OF RITTMAN, OHIO

At the close of this chapter, we read that King Agrippa was personally inclined to free Paul, but was unable to do so because Paul had appealed to Caesar. Purely in the realm of speculation, we may wonder where he might have gone and what he might have done if he had not. But this we know, beloved ones all, Paul was a great lion of God.

Paul was a servant in the hands of God, and, wherever he might have gone, he would have done the will of God. He would have served the Lord with gladness. He would have listened to the still small voice which came to him. He would have listened and followed its prompting no matter what was against him. Until this time, beloved ones, he had certainly suffered much.

The Scripture tells us that there were very difficult times, dear ones, when Paul was very nearly dead. He was beaten or imprisoned simply because he told the truth, because he treasured that which he had received in Damascus.

As Paul began his testimony before these noble personages, he told them that according to the Jewish law he had been a perfect individual. But, beloved ones, in various epistles that he wrote, Paul said that he counted those things as dung. They were as nothing to him because they did not give any hope of eternal life. It didn't matter how perfectly he had accomplished all the things that were contained in the old law. He was zealous . . . but he was zealously wrong.

Many of us (and I include myself) came to a time when we had to admit in all humility that we were zealously wrong, and that we were zealously going the wrong way. Those things that we lent ourselves to, engaged ourselves in, and pursued with such vigor were wrong for us. We were, in fact, going

exactly opposite from the way that God wanted us to go.

Often, beloved ones, we are caught up in things that we have persuaded ourselves are right, but which are wrong. Of course, the enemy of all righteousness delights in such a state of mind, and does all that he can to prevent our coming to the knowledge of the truth that we might live.

The persecution that Paul had committed which he outlined here seems a terrible thing. But if we examine the Word of God and apply it to our hearts, don't we, each one of us, have to say that we also were or are guilty of persecution? That seems a difficult thing to come to grips with.

Here was a man who had been given great authority. By his own admission, he had caused people to blaspheme, had put them into prison, and had consented to their deaths. We know that the coats of those who stoned the first martyr, Stephen, were laid at the feet of this same Saul. He consented to that death. He admitted persecuting the church.

Then, we might ask, "How can that be my lot?" You friends, perhaps, might ask, "How can it be that I am persecuting the church or Jesus Christ the way that this man said he did?"

Beloved ones, if we had been able to look upon Jesus on the cross and had looked into His eyes, I don't believe that we could have said anything else but that, indeed, when we lived in sin and not for the Lord, our lives were anything short of persecution. For God loved us so much that when we were still in our sins. He sent His Son to die for us.

The experience that Saul made on the way to Damascus was profoundly moving, wonderful and precious. It is an experience that each one must make if we are to have in our hearts a living hope of eternal life.

Paul went to Damascus with authority to persecute the early Christians. He was going zealously according to the dictates of his own mind and his own heart. In other words, loved ones all, he was going where every sinner has always gone, the way of destruction, the way of the world, the way of self.

I had a dream once in which I was standing by my own grave, weeping and weeping and weeping, because I knew that if that was my grave. I was gone and had no hope. I awoke a troubled young man, but I couldn't turn to the Lord because I let self get in the way. I was still in high school. I had friends to consider. I had things to do and places to go. There were other times when the call came, when the pricks and the prods came. There were times when I very nearly didn't make it, but God was good to me. Every experience is different, but we have all been resisting as Paul was.

While still known as Saul, that light shone around him and the Lord asked him, "Why persecutest thou me? It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." Acts 26:14.

Can you imagine what it was like as that light was around him, and he was blinded? I don't doubt that he was terrified because flooding over him was the realization of what he had been doing.

Beloved ones, every individual, when the full weight of the guilt of sin floods over him, must feel totally and completely lost. When we realize what we have really done with Jesus and what we have really done with our great God in heaven, we ask, "Who art Thou, Lord?"

Then we are in a condition that we can't be thankful enough for. When we feel our burden of guilt, the debt of sin, and the sentence of death which we deserve because of those sins, we look
