# REPORT ON TRIP TO HONDURAS

Two-Room Public School Project — January 11 - 25, 1985

Having served on both the World Relief Committee and the Work Opportunity Projects Committee, our brethren have often expressed that it would be good if we could arrange or create our own projects, rather than support or work through other ongoing organizations.

In March 1984, Ezequiel Martinez, whom I met on a second trip to Honduras in October 1982, was visiting the States for a brief period. I invited him and his family to our home in Morton, IL for a weekend. He has been one of our recipients of corn and soybeans distributed to people in Honduras. During his visit in Morton, I asked him about some projects in Honduras to involve our people. He listed nine projects which I brought before the Work Opportunity Committee in Taylor, MO in April 1984. The building of a tworoom public school appealed to the Committee and this was then presented to the Elder Conference in August at Lester, IA for approval, Having received approval, it was then considered by the World Relief Committee and further sanctioned. A sketch of the proposed school and material costs had been received for presentation. At the Lester, IA meeting, the World Relief Committee approved \$8,000 for this project for estimated materials cost, contingent to some inflation.

On September 13, 1984, a telephone conference call was held, requested by Bro. John Klotzle to further discuss the status of Work Opportunity Projects. The North Fort Myers, Florida church was then the No. 1 priority. There were eight Work Opportunity Committee brothers contacted on this conference call, and in the discussion of this project, I was appointed to coordinate the Honduras project. I accepted the assignment because of my contacts in Honduras on two previous trips to follow-up on grain shipments and also my acquaintance with Martinez. I then prayerfully proceeded and asked Bro. Jack Krantz to help me coordinate this project, since he and his wife had accompanied my wife and I to Honduras in October 1982. He accepted and helped tremendously to recruit interested workmen, having the project announced from our church pulpits, and organized our pre-trip meetings.

At this particular time, there were a number of Haiti projects going on which many of our brothers and friends sometimes confused with the Honduras project. From the time of the Lester. IA conference until the end of October, only about six volunteers responded. Bro. Jack and I almost concluded that if there wasn't more interest, the project could easily be dropped. With more concerns and prayers on my heart, it occurred to me that an article in the Silver Lining publication might interest more people. I proceeded to call our Morton correspondent, Sis. Phyllis Farney, to see whom I might contact at Leo, IN to advertise the Honduras project. She gave me Bro. Lynn Stieglitz's name and phone number and I immediately called him. He responded to the idea and asked that I send the sketch and particulars so it could appear in the November 1984 issue of Silver Lining.

Many interested persons called Bro. Jack and me, and most of them had not been aware of the Honduras project until they read about it in the Silver Lining. There was sincere interest shown by many, and there were some regrets by some who could not go on the scheduled date, January 14 - 25, 1985 due to other commitments. The time schedule had to be established by our contact Mr. Martinez, those who responded early, and Bro. Jack and I.

The response was overwhelming as 18 men and 8 wives pledged to go on this trip by the first of December. There were also three college students who inquired about going, but I advised them to set their priorities to remain in school now, and perhaps in the future, other opportunities would occur.

Two informational meetings were held in the Morton church on two Monday evenings in December (2 weeks apart) with all interested people and their immediate families invited. The purpose of the meetings was to provide general information, get acquainted, discuss the project, and make plans for the trip.

Due to the ad in the Silver Lining, Bro. Al Weigele, employed by the Hayes Travel Agency, Inc. in Perrysburg, OH, offered his help in making arrangements for the trip and he attended our first meeting. He willingly made all the travel arrangements to Honduras. The round trip cost of \$615.00 per person from Peoria included reservations for two nights lodging in the San Pedro Sula Hotel and the round-trip transfer on a bus from the airport to the hotel. The airport is located about 8 miles from the city of San Pedro. The above cost was much less than we could obtain from any Morton or Peoria travel agency for group prices, and would not have included the above mentioned extras. The group left Peoria January 14. 1985 at 7:10 a.m. and arrived at San Pedro Sula at 3:30 p.m. Peoria

At the Ft. Lauderdale, FL World Relief Committee meeting held December 8, I could make a status report and an additional \$2,000 was approved for materials for a total of \$10,000 for the school project.

# REPORT FROM EASTERN EUROPE

Greetings dearly beloved:

Bro. Vernon Leman gave a very good report of our trip to visit the brethren in the East European countries in the previous issue of the Silver Lining. Many of you have shown deep interest and inquired about the welfare of our fellow believers and conditions in these countries. So, I'll try to describe a few observations that appeared to be of interest to us Americans.

In a three week period we covered a lot of areas in four countries, where customs and conditions vary a great deal.

#### **CZECHOSLOVAKIA**

After we visited a very dear elder brother, we headed back towards Hungary. As we crossed several small villages, late this Wednesday afternoon, we saw a number of elderly folks all dressed in the traditional black, with black book, Bible or prayer book in hand, going to church. (In a communist country.)

Even with our experienced driver (who made this trip before) we found travel somewhat difficult as most roads in this country are not marked. Travel for foreigners can cost a lot of time, and make it hard to reach the proper destinations on time.

The life of our fellow believers is very difficult in this country and their number is slowly diminishing. We found much love and joy with the dear brother with whom we correspond, his daughter and another sister-in-faith.

#### HUNGARY

This is the most prosperous and progressive communist country. The citizens of Hungary enjoy complete freedom of worship, and freedom to travel. Private enterprise has been in practice for a number of years and as a result their economy is rapidly improving

We attended several churches and found a very good attendance in all. In Budapest, Baja, Ersekcsanad and Szeged, the churches were filled to capacity. Normal capacity of the Budapest church is about 240-260 and in most occasions has up to 450 and 500 present. This of course creates a very serious problem, which the local brethren have been trying for several years to remedy. So far there has been no cooperation from the authorities to issue a permit for expansion, and of course the money matter is a big question too.

In most churches, the pews consist of simple, long wooden benches with no back rest. Worshippers don't seem to mind and each Sunday following afternoon services they stay for singing that can last for several hours. This is a very beautiful and inspiring experience for all.

In Budapest we had the privilege to

hear the examination of a young friend, who was called before the congregation. This is a normal custom, that all new repentant souls be carefully instructed and examined before baptism. On Sunday, April 21, 17 were to be baptized.

Monday, on the second day of Easter, all business places are closed throughout the country in observance of this holiday, commemorating the resurrection of Christ. All churches are open and well attended. This is a great contrast with our "Nation Under God", where business is as usual.

On our last Saturday in Hungary, a group of brethren, young and old, in four cars made a tour around the Lake Balaton and stopped to visit a few small churches, among them the oldest, still in continuous existence, in the city of Keszthely. It was an inspiring experience and we hope some day to return for a longer visit.

Hungary, a country of about 12 million people, last year had about 15 million foreign tourists. For Americans, a strong dollar allows for traveling as an attractive experience.

#### **ROMANIA**

This is a country of great contrast compared to neighboring Hungary. The border guards made a most thorough search of all luggage and personal affects. Recorded tapes, Statements of Faith and several articles were taken away and not permitted in the country. They were to be returned on the way out, but we had plans to exit at another point into Yugoslavia. Finally, after 31/2 hours of delay, we were permitted to enter. What a way to cool your spirits! While waiting for the clearance, a number of Romanian citizens were returning from Hungary, where they did some shopping for bread and other badly needed food.

Our first night in a hotel in Oradea, we learned that you must get used to being without heat and hot water. The electricity was so low that following morning we could not use our electric shaver. All street lights and some traffic lights are out, due to low output of electricity.

All private cars during the first three months of this year were banned due to lack of gasoline. Foreign tourists had to purchase special fuel coupons with hard currency, so we had no problems in this area.

Security is very tight all over the

country. Every move of a foreign visitor is followed constantly.

We visited several members in small villages and found travel rather difficult as most roads are impassible. We had to park our rented car at the edge of the village and walk as the streets were too muddy or deep. Dry ruts created by tractors made it impossible to enter

The people are really poor and often go without food for days. We met some very sick and some crippled, who just wept and prayed while we were in their homes. It is almost impossible to describe some of the conditions that we saw. Some of these people receive no pension and some receive 90 lei, or about \$7.50 to \$8.00 and some receive about 200 lei or \$16.00 to \$18.00 a month. The government is about four to five months behind with the pension payments. We just cannot understand how they are able to survive! These dear souls have much love and compassion toward each other and share their goods and help each other. They just cannot fully thank the good Lord for brethren and friends in America who send those life-saving packages to them. We parted from these dear souls with tears and prayers.

There are no churches open in Romania. Brethren are meeting in small numbers in various homes, always under the watchful eyes of the security. But, a Greater One is also watching and providing their inner needs!

#### YUGOSLAVIA

Here, overall economic conditions are somewhat better than in Romania, but the fast rising inflation is making living conditions very difficult.

The churches are open and due to the very strict military policy of their government, the number of the membership is slowly diminishing. There are reportedly about 13-17 brothers in prison, serving 2½ to 5 years. Some are serving their second and a few their third term. This creates a heavy burden and much suffering upon many families. There is a Prisoner's Relief Fund to assist some of these families, but the current inflation makes it more difficult to assist them.

There are some young repentant souls, who are very much aware of the military service they must face, but it appears that their faith is strong enough to sustain them.

Here, as in other suppressive lands, we need to take their burdens before the Lord in prayers. He alone can provide the faith and grace to go onward and forward.

In most places we were able to hand out some financial help, entrusted to us from the World Relief Funds, that you, dear brethren and friends, so generously and lovingly support and make possible.

On some occasions we did face some very unpleasant situations in Romania, yet through it all we were not discouraged. Many of you, dearly beloved, had called us or wrote to assure us of your support and prayers on this, our mission. Each of us who made the trip, Bros. Vernon Leman (Eureka, IL), George Hunyadi and James Siladie (both from Akron, OH) and myself felt the Lord's leading and protection in all travels.

Thanks and praise be unto our God for His boundless mercies! We also thank each of you for being with us and near us with your prayers.

# APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME

It's not uncommon to hear comments from those around us claiming defeat, self-pity or rejection in order to cope with unpleasant experiences. "I can't do anything right"; "Nobody understands or cares about me"; "That's just the way I am, I can't help it"; "Nothing ever works out right for me"; "Everyone is always on my case" - are some of the more common expressions that have been tossed around. These statements generally tend to overstate the reality of the situation and can have a downward spiraling effect on our mental, emotional and spiritual wellbeing. Our own thoughts and perceptions about ourselves, whether real or imagined, largely determine how we behave or react in certain situations. It is important for each of us to recognize and identify our feelings and empathize with each other. However, if we project negative self-images on our conscious minds, we will become ensnared in the belief that we are help-

We must turn statements like "That's just the way I am, I can't help it" to "I'm feeling this way now but I can choose to change". Rather than saying, "Nothing ever works out for me", we can try thinking, as well as saying, "Some things may not work out right, but I can learn from these things and make better decisions for the future".

Recently one of our teenagers became convinced through this negative thinking that it was impossible for her to complete a school project. After discussing her thoughts and feelings, she began to take control and see that she had options. Rather than allowing herself to be defeated, she chose to try to resolve her problem in a positive way and complete the school project to the best of her ability. This incident is just one simple example of how we are trying to encourage our children to think through problems and change negative thought patterns to productive and positive ones.

On a larger scale, our thought patterns have a far-reaching effect on our spiritual life. To confess sin, acknowledge forgiveness, and move on in positive steps toward a closer relationship with the Lord is vital to spiritual growth. We, in our daily lives, must be ever mindful to focus on that which is

good, productive and holy and to be wary of Satan's temptation to fall into thoughts of hopelessness and despair. "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." Philippians 4:8.

We have moved into the new administration building which is located just south of the West House. It is a two-story building of brick construction. Some finishing touches to the interior are yet to be done, but everyone is excited about being moved in. We had our first board meeting here Saturday, May 18.

The top floor includes the computer room, the secretary's office, the administrator's office, two counselling rooms, two storage rooms, one large closet, a bathroom and a lobby. The lower level includes a large classroom, the board meeting room, two bathrooms, storage space and a lobby. The building makes a nice addition to the Home setting. Thank you, volunteers, for your diligent, untiring efforts in making this project a reality.

We have two new boys in the West House, Tom M., age 15, and Bobby W., age 11. We are looking forward to many rewarding experiences with these boys and hope they will benefit immensely from their stay at our Home. It is a privilege to serve their needs.

The upcoming summer looks like a busy one for our resident children. Some will be taking driver education, some will be working through the Job Training Program (formerly CETA), others will have tasks around the Home. Busy hands make a glad heart. Some volunteers for the summer season have already lent their time and talent, and a number more are scheduled. We appreciate them all.

Both Homes plan on a one week vacation the first week in June, before the summer schedule begins. The East House plans on going to the Morton-Washington, IL area, and the West House plans to go to Rittman, OH, and visit some local areas of interest.

We are looking forward to Vacation Bible School the week of June 10 - 14. The Sunday school students will have individualized classes, and the adults will have the opportunity to listen to different visiting ministers expound on a given topic each night. The whole week should be one of spiritual enrichment; what a fortunate people we are.

The "greenery" of spring is in full bloom in "Hoosier Land". As one glances out the window of the new office building, many "scenarios" meet the eye. The beans and corn are up, the grass is a gorgeous green, and in the semi-distance, the retirement complex is fast approaching the point where some units will soon be ready for occupancy. The green areas depict the majesty and glory of God, and the building complex reflects the result of many labors being blessed by eternal providence, and the Word is fulfilled, "Praise Him in all things", which we certainly can do. We praise Him for the recent visit of our former houseparents, Bro. Larry and Sis. Vera Baer. and the growing little Baers, Mark and Sarah. It seems as though they still "belong" to the Home staff; how precious are the memories we have of our loved ones.

# APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth."

It is not coincidence that the heads of homes, especially Christian homes. are called fathers. Surely they are like a Rock of Gibralter, the "hill" to whom the family looks for help, security and advice. When a child is born, it needs the father's strong arms about him for support and security. Later, the child needs the father's hand for support for his first faltering steps. As he grows, the need is for father's voice, his listening ear, his companionship and his firm guidance. Then when the growing up years are finished, there is the important need of father's prayers all through the remaining years of life. All of this comprises a very important mission in life; and on Father's Day in June, so much of this comes to mind. While we can express gratitude to our fathers on their special day, the sincerest gratefulness can only come from living our lives in such a way that our fathers' prayers seem to be answered.

The effects of ncble fatherhood (and motherhood, too) is often evident among our residents. When a young man graciously opens a door for a staff member, when a resident shows con-

cern for a staff member who needs to go home because he is not feeling well or when various residents wish us a nice weekend or vacation, we well know that loving guidance has been theirs in their growing up years at home.

To further acquaint you with the scope of our volunteers, we want to mention more of the duties accomplished in the activity department. Spending time with and for residents on a one-to-one or group basis are such things as: writing letters for them, playing table tennis, riding bicycles, going for walks, helping with the various group outings, finishing up residents' projects, making basic project patterns, playing Bingo with them one night each week. Organizing, planning and carrying out an Easter, Halloween and Christmas party annually requires lots of time and energy, but it is enjoyed immensely by the residents. Volunteers often assist staff members on the residents' monthly shopping trips. Whenever a program is given by residents, volunteers assist staff members in dressing and prompting them. Other duties needful to the Home and done by volunteers when possible are: running the rug loom and the smaller loom, sewing strips for the rug loom, providing help with assembling and preparing the A.C. Times for mailing, giving help in the ceramic department, making attractive bulletin boards, assisting in the upkeep and improvements around the Home, assisting with clerk and bookkeeping duties, assisting on and before Benefit Day, cleaning the fish tank and being "sitters" during required staff meetings. Then there are those who conduct "Story Hour" (reading to a class of residents), those who conduct the embroidery class, those who give piano, organ and voice lessons, those who help on swimming outings and those who give many hours quilting and doing other sewing projects. Then there are staff members who give extra hours beyond those for which they are reimbursed. When we consider that all of this is just in the Activity Department, one begins to realize the scope of Volunteer Service.

This has been an unusually balmy spring, making it possible for our residents to spend time out of doors. Somehow they seem to have a special kinship with the Creator through the beauty of nature. Perhaps it gives them a sense of peace, as it does to all of us, especially in the evening when "Day is

dying in the west and heaven is touching earth with rest" (Hymns of Zion #8). As the night falls and the stars appear in the glorious heavens, a quiet peace envelopes the Home and its "family".

Along this line of thought, we wish a special peace to our fathers on Father's Day. Wherever you are, we say with the hymnwriter: "Peace, perfect peace, with loved ones far away? In Jesus' keeping we are safe, and they." (Hymns of Zion #26).

When we think of temptation, we oft times think of something "big", like stealing or cheating someone or adultery. But in God's eyes, sin is sin, as listed in Galatians 5:19-21. Sexual immorality, impurity, debauchery, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness and orgies; which of us have not been guilty of at least one on these since our conversion? I know I have.

But while you have no say in the

matter of whether you will be tempted (because you will be), you do have much to say about the outcome. For there will always be an "escape route". God has promised this in I Corinthians 10:13. God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way of escape, that ye may be able to bear it.

Paul exhorts us to look to the Lord, because a temptation, however slight it may be, will straightway overcome us if we rely on our own strength. When God has received you under His protection, you have no cause to fear, provided you depend entirely on Him. For surely this would be a type of deception if He were to withdraw His aid in time of need, or if He were on seeing us weak and ready to sink, to lengthen out our trials even further.

If God has promised a path of escape when temptation strikes, then the real issue is not "Can I emerge victorious?" You can! Rather, the questions are: "Lord, am I willing to look for your path of escape? When I find it, am I willing to use it? And once I've used it, am I willing to resist the urge to leave a forwarding address?" Where there's a willingness, there's a way!

At the second group meeting held in Morton in December, it was decided that Bro. Willis Knapp and I should leave three days ahead, on Friday, January 11, to make certain that materials would be available and pave the way for the group of 24 which was to leave on January 14.

Round-trip arrangements were made accordingly with Bro. Weigele

for the travelers from their nearest airport. Mr. Martinez was also in the States for several weeks and fortunately was planning to return to Honduras January 11. Bro. Willis and I met him in New Orleans airport and the three of us flew to San Pedro on the same flight. This gave us time to visit and discuss the project before arriving on the school site. We arrived safely at the San Pedro airport, and were met by Mr. Mario Guevara, an associate of Mr. Martinez who had leased a Toyota van for our use for 13 days.

From the airport, we drove 102 miles to Siguatepeque (pop. approx. 40,000) and it was already dark upon arrival. We had supper together at the Central Boarding House. After supper, we went to Mr. Martinez's home as his house guests for 3 nights. On Saturday morning, January 12, we made the first trip to the school site approximately 5 miles from the city, a mountain village called "El Pacayal". This village has approximately 25 families living in shacks or huts having only ground floors. It seemed that each family had 5 or 6 children of school age. These people had been praying for three years that a school might be built in this village. Children walked over four miles one way to school.

Upon arrival at the school site on Saturday morning, we found the building was already measured out and the footing was dug. This was indeed a great help to us. We immediately began checking the dimensions and height of the ground on all four corners. A transit instrument was not available to measure the height of the four corners, therefore, Bro. Willis used instead a 48 inch level and sighted the height by a measuring stick, and he found that the ground sloped about 30 inches from the opposite corners. As a result, rock fill was necessary and block row adjustments made so that the building would be level. With some help from the villagers, about 80% of the footing boards were installed the first day on the site. Cement blocks, sand, lime and cement, rock for fill was coming to the site. The city of Siguatepeque furnished a Ford dump truck. Action on the site was accelerating and the villagers now believed that their prayers for a school were answered.

The second day, Sunday, we were served breakfast by Etelia Vega. She and her husband make their home with Mr. Martinez. Mr. Martinez's wife,

Laura, remained in the States so their youngest son, Jonathon, could receive speech therapy. After breakfast, Mr. Martinez, Luis and Etelia Vega left for church. Their church services are in the Spanish language. Bro. Willis and I returned to our bedroom and listened to a one-hour taped sermon by Bro. Charles Sinn (Ft. Scott, KS). He was our guest minister in Morton on Good Friday evening. It was an inspiring message of the crucifixion of our Lord and His death on the cross.

We are only here on earth for a few short years, and we can never. never attain anything that will compare with the glorious things that the apostle Paul saw when he was carried up into the third heaven. He saw things in paradise that he said were not lawful for him to speak of. He heard unspeakable words . . . unspeakable words. I have trouble pronouncing words in the Japanese language sometimes, but these words were unspeakable by anybody in the human body. We cannot begin to express those things that are eternal, those wonderful things that God has prepared for His people.

Now, I do not know how you look at religion. I do not know exactly how you look at your faith. I believe that there is a tendency to repent, come into the church, be baptized, and feel that now you're all set. I want to tell you that you are not all set! You are still tempted on every side, and you need to persevere. We all need to go on to higher levels of spirituality, or we are sunk! The world will crowd in on us and say, "Those people stick by themselves, and they don't care about the rest of the world. They are so clannish that they have forgotten the rest of the Gospel."

Even those who do not follow Jesus Christ know something about the Bible, and they can tell whether we are coming close or not. Therefore, we should never be so satisfied that, once we ourselves have come into the Gospel and into the family of God, we are thereby complacent and satisfied ("I am in and I am safe.").

I am very confident that you should have the assurance of salvation, but I do not think that you should rest on your laurels, spending your time, energy and talents for the things that will be burned up on the day of judgment. Only those things which are like precious stones, gold and silver will last forever, will stand the test of the judgment of the saints. On that day, you and I will wish that we had done better! I know for myself, I will wish that I had done better.

Oh God, if you had given me one inkling of what is beyond the shores, how much more gladly would I have served Thee, how much more gladly would I have denied myself all of the material things and lived as Jesus taught.

Of Jesus it is said, He had nowhere to lay His head. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, had tremendous capabilities. He could have collected much money for His healing. He could have been the King of Israel, and He could have conquered the Roman empire. He could have gone down in secular history as the greatest man who had ever lived, as one who had conquered the armies of Rome and of Caesar. Jesus Christ said that if He spoke the word, legions of angels would come to His rescue, but His kingdom is not of this earth. Neither is your kingdom of this earth, nor is my kingdom of this earth. We need to catch a glimpse of the glory that Paul saw when he was caught up into the third heaven.

Are we interested in the fine clothes which we wear? Do we have the best? Are we keeping up with the Jones's, and all the rest of it? Beloved, that is not what the Gospel of Jesus Christ is all about. We are to be crucified with Christ. Paul said, "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; . . . and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me." Galatians 2:20.

Paul said that he didn't care about earthly things. They could all be taken and if he had Christ, he would be satisfied. If he died from lack of food and God permitted it, he would be satisfied. In fact, he said that he would rather be with the Lord. Nevertheless, he said, "to abide in the flesh is more needful for you." Philippians 1:24.

This is the kind of faith which we need as individuals, as a Leo congregation, and as an Apostolic Christian brotherhood, or we're sunk and simply going the wrong way. It is time that we take inventory and understand that it forbear, lest any man should think of

is only those things which are eternal that really count for the believer in Jesus Christ. Otherwise, we deny that we believe by the very way we live. You cannot explain it when people who believe in Jesus Christ act as though they believe in this world. There is no reasonable explanation why people who really believe in Jesus Christ are caught up with things that have nothing to do with Jesus Christ.

The apostle Paul tries to drive that home. He says that he will glory in such a one as is caught up in the heavens. It was said of him, Paul says, that his speech is despicable, and that the Corinthians don't like to have him come to see them. Possibly he had an eye affliction, or there may have been something about his personal appearance that was not so nice. (The next time you go to our Home for the Handicapped and see people who are not so nice to look at, remember that Jesus Christ loves

In the inner depths of our hearts, in the rock bottom of our hearts is what counts. How much of your heart have you reserved for yourself? Or, have you said, "Take it all. I surrender completely." Only then can we hope to reach the level of spirituality that God wants us to have.

God is looking for men and women who are willing to sell all, who know nothing but Jesus Christ and Him crucified. He can hardly find people who love Him, and who live as though they love Him. It is so easy to say, "Yes, I believe in Jesus Christ." Yes, it is easy to bow our heads, to fold our hands and to follow the norms of deep humility. I say that the greatest humility is to surrender to Jesus Christ. Don't give me all your words, and don't give God all your words. Give Him your life! Give Him your heart! That is the language that He wants to hear. He doesn't need all your verbal expressions. He did not like the verbal expressions of the Pharisees. He wanted them to be right in their hearts. He wanted them to be dead unto self and alive unto Christ. I believe that that is what Jesus Christ wants in you and me today. May God help me to be further surrendered to Jesus Christ. May we together give ourselves to a higher level of service, of devotion and of love for our brothers, sisters and fellow man.

"For though I would desire to glory, . . . I will say the truth: but now I

me above that which he seeth me to be. or that he heareth of me." II Corinthians 12:6. Paul said that because he had been caught up into the third heaven, the people might think that he was a wonderful person. They might think that he was above them, the apostle said, and he could glory in that. But, he said, "... there was given to me a thorn in the flesh." II Corinthians 12:7. He told them that he, too, had sufferings. It was not all victory.

We want the victorious life. We want the glorified life. But in order to get the victorious life and the glorified life, we must be willing to die. We must be willing to die when we come to Christ, and we must be willing to die daily. This is not always easy because those around us do not generally advocate such a thing. People may say, "He has become a radical. He has become carried away. He should fit the norm. He should follow the procedure." But this is not the whole thing.

To be sure, if we appear haughty, if we appear very proud, that is against us because the Bible teaches us to be humble. The Bible teaches us about many things such as head coverings, proper apparel and that our beauty should be on the inside. This is good, but if you make that the issue and leave out the complete surrender to Jesus Christ all through your life, it is not certain that God would be happy with us. We are not sure that He would then say, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Matthew 25:23. We are not sure that He would say, "I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat . . . Naked, and ye clothed me . . . I was in prison and ye came unto me." Matthew 25:35, 36. We have much thinking, much praying and much work to do.

The apostle Paul said that "...lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure." II Corinthians 12:7. The apostle Paul spoke of an affliction which he called a thorn in the flesh. We do not know what that was, but if I were to guess, I would say that it was an eye affliction. I notice that in Galatians it says, "I bear you record, that, if it had been possible, ye would have plucked out your own eyes, and have given them to me." Galatians 4:15. But regardless of what it was, it was a thorn in the flesh.

Paul thought something such as this: "I've healed many people by speaking the word in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and I'll fix this affliction. Dear God, please cure me of this affliction; I pray it in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen." He did that three times and nothing happened. Then he heard the voice of God saying, "My grace is sufficient for thee." II Corinthians 12:9.

That is the message this morning. God's grace is sufficient for us if we'll take it. Do you know that we only take a fraction of the grace He offers us? God offers us grace that overflows. It can make us pure, holy, devoted, godly and indifferent to the things of this world. Most of us take only a little of that grace, enough to have our sins forgiven, and then let it go because we like the things that we see about us. Advertising is very intense, and the peer pressure in our communities is very intense. Only those who are devoted and on their knees. I believe, will keep in mind that the things that really count are those things that are eternal.

"My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness." The apostle Paul was beginning to get the picture. God said, so to speak, "If you were so strong yourself, you would not be so dependent upon me. Therefore, be satisfied. I'll let you suffer. I'll let you bear this, because it gives me the "in" that I want. This gets me into your heart, into the innermost depths where, otherwise, I fear I would not be able to get. Because you were educated at the feet of Gamalial, you were a leader of the Jews. You are a very capable person, and unless I break you somehow and keep you broken, there is a possibility that you would begin to think that you are 'somebody'."

God kept Paul broken from the day that He met him on the road to Damascus'til the day that he died. He said, "I am now ready to be offered... there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness... not (for) me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing." II Timothy 4:6, 8.

"A crown of righteousness," Paul said. I do not particularly care about a crown, but if I'm suppose to wear one, fine. However, whatever it is, we are shown that we are to be rewarded according to the way we are dedicated to God on earth. Those who are Christ's will receive a reward according

to how dedicated they were to His Gospel. There will be many whose works will not stand the test of the fire. Paul's letter to the Corinthians tells us that those works will be burned up.

It is time that we begin to get into our heads, and into our hearts, and into our minds that we as a group of believers should be willing to live in rags if it would help us to serve Jesus Christ. We should be willing to walk; we should be willing to go back to the simple life if that would help. We do not believe it would help, so we have automobiles and many other modern conveniences. but we must be careful that these things do not detract from living as though we had nothing. Paul said, ' having food and raiment let us be therewith content," and also, "I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." I Timothy 6:8 and Philippians 4:11. These things we must remember, and we must live them in our lives.

"My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me." II Corinthians 12:9. The apostle Paul said something like this, "If that's the case, if that is what you tell me, dear Lord, then I've got sense enough to know that this is the best way. Just empty me further so that I can have more of you." Paul said, "Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in mine infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me."

This word power is wonderful. Power. Power is very much sought after. In our society if you are powerful, you can tell people what to do. You can walk into a place of business, and you can say I'll lay down so many millions of dollars or whatever it is. If you have money, you are powerful; and you can use that for good or for evil. But from the Gospel of Jesus Christ we want spiritual power. We want power that lets the Spirit flow through us without being jammed up. It works like the Soviet Union trying to jam up the Voice of America. The Soviets get on our wave lengths, and they jam it. Every time you try to listen to Voice of America from a foreign country, here comes all that static. And it's the same way with us. Every time that God wants to come through us, that the Holy Spirit wants to flow through us, there we are - all jammed up with all this static, and He can't get through. We've got to get rid of it. We've got to have free communication. We've got to be so dead and crucified that nothing interferes. Then the Holy Spirit can work through us. Without that we are really being jammed up in our spiritual lives. The apostle Paul came to understand that, and then he said that he was happy to be very weak so that the power of Christ could rest upon him.

In reviewing what we've been talking about this morning, we first read Jeremiah's lament. He was referred to as the weeping prophet, and we know that he had a very, very bad time. He refers to Jerusalem as a lady who had lots of trouble, as one whom the enemy came in and ravished. He mourned for his people. How could they do such terrible things? I am sure that many of us say, "My country, my country, my country . . . how can they do such terrible things? What has happened to the United States of America? It is going the wrong way." But we must never despair. We must be more dedicated, more consecrated and more completely surrendered so that we can do all we can to turn this thing around.

We, as a group of believers in our brotherhood, must become more and more dedicated. Every decision that we make should keep us on the path that brings Christ the most glory regardless of personal will or desire in the matter. You and I are dead! Only what God's Word teaches that His will is, what the Holy Spirit tell us, and what the brothers and sisters in consultation with us help us to understand is God's will, counts.

If it's God's will for us to die today, let us be willing to die. The day may come when our government will not be so benevolent, and we must decide whether or not we are willing to die for the sake of the Lord Jesus Christ, especially when the antichrist appears and there shall be the mark of the beast. We had better be ready with our hearts set on heavenly things so that we can smile and say, "I'll never do it. Take your food and take your material things. I will never worship the antichrist." Only in this way can we be sure that we will stand the test when the time comes.

Let us take home with us today the words of the apostle Paul, "My grace is sufficient for thee." Take it! He has it overflowing; He has it in great abundance. Is your heart so empty that His grace can fill it?

# SERMON BY BRO. WILLIS EHNLE OF SHIODA, JAPAN

at the Leo, Indiana Congregation Text: Lamentations 1:1-17 & II Corinthians 12

I greet you very warmly in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, the Son of the true and living God. And I hope today, as we gather together to worship Him, that we can remember that we should emphasize those things which are eternal. Jesus Christ is the Son of the true and living God. He died for us and rose again. By comparison, everything else fades into insignificance.

May God bless His good Word as we read from it this morning. Jeremiah is often referred to as the weeping prophet. He found it very difficult to see his people go the wrong way, and we find it very difficult to see our country go the wrong way. We also find it very difficult to see our families or our churches go the wrong way. Although we like to emphasize living a very joyful life, I suppose that sometimes weeping is the order of the day. But I have been greatly comforted, when I found myself weeping, that in the Psalms we read, "... weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." Psalm 30:5. How glad I am to waken in the morning with the joy of the Lord in my heart.

Jeremiah had not done anything wrong, but he was very sorrowful because of what was happening to his country and to his people. He was of a. mind that he must hang on, that he must endure, and that he must persevere. I think that this idea of persevering is very important in our Christian lives today. I think that we will profit from every trial if we hold on. We either let things pile on top of us and overwhelm us, or else we pray and climb on top of our problems and go higher up the ladder of spirituality. So I hope that we all are absolutely determined that everything that comes our way will be used as a rung on the ladder to go higher. Too many people are

going down the stream of sinfulness, and are even turning away from the Lord.

This morning we will talk about the grace of God and His words to the apostle Paul: "My grace is sufficient for thee." II Corinthians 12:9. It is a great comfort to know that we need not sink in dispair no matter what the situation is.

The apostle Paul was favored with very special revelations from God. As we begin this chapter, we see that he speaks of the experience of a Christian man which took place about 14 years previously. He is evidently speaking of himself. In the Holy Scriptures, the first person pronouns are seldom used, if ever. The apostle John did not say, "I, John, was sitting beside my Lord, and I leaned on His breast." He said, "There was leaning on Jesus' bosom one of his disciples, whom Jesus loved." John 13:23.

The apostle Paul said that there was "a man in Christ above 14 years ago." II Corinthians 12:2. There is no doubt in my mind but that he is speaking of himself. I suppose that he was probably speaking of a time when he was stoned, persecuted for the sake of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We can read in The Acts of the Apostles that at Lystra Paul was stoned and dragged out of the city as dead. At that time, his spirit may have actually left his body and ascended into the third heaven where he saw and heard things that were unlawful for him to speak of. All he said was that he was in paradise, but that it was beyond him to express it, and that furthermore, he was not allowed to. So, we believe that the apostle Paul left his body and soared off into space in a moment of time, and that he saw the glory of God and the things that God has prepared for those who are true and faithful in the Lord Jesus Christ.

When we depart this life, the thing that will count is whether we are in Christ or out of Christ. This is the determining factor when we stand before the judgment seat of Christ, as we all shall do. There is no escaping the judgment seat. We may escape judgment for our sins, and this we expect, but we shall all be rewarded according to what we have done, whether it be good or bad. This is the teaching of the Holy Scriptures, and you and I shall give an account of how we have lived after coming into the family of God. That which happened before coming into the family of God, we believe, is under the blood of Jesus Christ and is gone forever. It's as if it had never taken place.

Now we take much comfort in that the Lord Jesus Christ is our great high priest. We are taught in the letters of John that "if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, . . . the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." I John 1:7. So the objective of a true believer is to walk in the light, and to be an ambassador for Jesus Christ. Nothing else really counts.

We may have some experiences such as Jeremiah had. It may not always be that we can smile every day, but I certainly recommend that you always try to smile. And I certainly recommend that in every Christian home you sing a hymn every day. I do not know how you run your homes, but for me, I am determined to sing a praise to the honor of God every day. That's not too much to do, and it's for my own good. If you will do it, it will be for your good.

And of course we should read the Bible every day, and we should pray every day. We must keep up our spiritual lives; otherwise, the things around us will crowd in upon us, and gradually we will become concerned with things
