



### THE PERSISTENT NICODEMUS

Nicodemus was an intelligent person but he couldn't understand what Christ was talking about when He said, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God". At times, intelligence can be a barrier to understanding spiritual things.

Besides being intelligent, Nicodemus was persistent. He didn't give up easily. He continued to ask questions such as, "How can these things be?".

Nicodemus was intelligent, persistent and he was also pragmatic, that is, he was willing to check out what kind of results you get by believing and doing what Christ taught, regardless of your understanding of the matter. This is a very valuable virtue regarding spiritual things.

Little is recorded in the scriptures as to how closely Nicodemus adhered to the teachings of Christ. However, it is quite remarkable that when Joseph of Arimathaea received permission from Pilate to remove the body of Jesus from the cross, Nicodemus was there, with the spices which were used in the preparation for burial.

When Nicodemus first visited Christ to inquire what His teachings were all about, it was at night so no one would see him. When he brought the spices it was evidently broad daylight and Nicodemus was now willing to identify

with Christ openly, although He had just been put to death as an impostor. His allegiance to Christ had improved, but not necessarily his understanding. Because of Christ's death on the cross it is likely that he was more perplexed than ever.

We must assume that after the resurrection Nicodemus was also there and that he saw the risen Saviour. No doubt his persistence was rewarded. We, also, when seeking Christ in repentance, may not understand many things about Him nor about His teachings but we should persevere. Faith will come as a gift from God if we show our allegiance to Him.

Even after conversion we may lose our faith but we should persevere in Christ's shadow. Be persistent in talking with God, in reading the Bible and in fellowshipping and conversing with God's people. It is important that you never give up but continue clinging to God and to Christ by doing the things He taught, even if you can't understand Him or believe in Him as you should. The scriptures say, "Be still and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10.

It is good to be persistent in your spiritual life regardless of the ups and downs of your faith. At least, believe enough to obey.

### REPORT ON TRIP TO HONDURAS

Two-Room Public School Project — January 11 - 25, 1985

(Continued from June Issue)

The third day, Monday morning, we started to pour the concrete footing and by 1:00 p.m. about three-fourths of the footing was poured. The village men helped, or this could not have been accomplished. The work was then stopped for 24 hours until Tuesday afternoon. The reason for stopping work was because we wanted to return to San Pedro airport to meet the 24 people arriving that afternoon. We all remained in San Pedro that night and after supper, held our first meeting together further outlining our objectives and day by day plans for our sisters.

The fourth day, Tuesday morning, the entire group left San Pedro to go to Siguatepeque, arriving for an early lunch and being assigned rooms for the entire week at the Central Boarding House (except Martinez invited my wife and I to be his guests for the entire stay). It usually took three trips to get us all to the building site. After lunch, Bro. Willis and his masonry crew were the first to go to the school site since block laying could be started and completion of the foundation was the first order. By mid-afternoon, all were on the site, including the sisters.

The fifth day, Wednesday, the cement block walls were rapidly going up and the 14 building pilasters, made by the villagers, were cemented into the foundation. Fred Roecker and several helpers assembled five roof trusses, which were built on the ground. In the evening after supper, a regular church service was held in the restaurant as we had the room to ourselves. It was a blessed evening as we had reasons to thank God and to praise Him.

The sixth day, Thursday, the window and door jambs were placed and cement blocks were attached to them. The pilasters on the corners of the building and those in the side walls were framed for concrete to be slushed in. Footings were also prepared for the overhang walkway support posts. The remaining roof trusses were also now complete. At noon, the sisters made a delicious complete picnic lunch (the best soup ever made), for all the workers and it was prepared in Martinez's kitchen and dining room. Everyone

brought food from the States and it was shared by everyone.

The seventh day, Friday, the entire perimeter over the top row of blocks was framed eight inches high and concrete was poured to hold the building together should a hurricane or high wind occur. Also the two wash room concrete requirements, drains and a cesspool were built, and provision made for a toilet to be installed in each closet. Framing for the outside walkway was completed and the first roof truss on the north end was lifted into place by the men. The noon lunch was prepared by the Central Boarding House and delivered to the site.

The eighth day, Saturday, all the concrete flooring was poured for the entire building and walkway. The concrete was all mixed by hand, wheeled, leveled and troweled for both school rooms, storage and toilet closets. At noon, the sisters prepared a second picnic lunch prepared in Martinez's home which was enjoyed by all. The concrete could now harden over Sunday. As we left the site Saturday evening, we all had to marvel at the work that had been accomplished during the week, giving God the honor.

After the roof trusses were assembled, there was considerable concern over how to lift the trusses onto the building. We all realized that this could be time consuming and even dangerous if done by manual labor. I prayed several times over the matter. Ezequiel Martinez and I made several inquiries at a building construction firm if it were possible to have them lift the trusses with their portable crane. They would not give us any hope that the crane would be available. I did meet a local business man, Jorge Jarufe, who spoke English and expressed to him my needs. He was really sympathetic and thought perhaps the Honduras army could help since the school house was public property. He was acquainted with the top officers and took me into the army headquarters to meet the commanding officer. This was a oncein-a-lifetime experience with soldiers walking beside me with guns on their shoulders. Mr. Jarufe did the talking in Spanish and convinced the Captain Ochoa to help as he was in charge (Primer-Battallon-de-Ingenioros)

the battle construction equipment. He agreed to help and have a lift crane and operator on the school site at 8:30 a.m. Monday morning. There was fear and prayers in my heart, but I felt the Lord was standing by. The army offered to do this free of charge and Mr. Jarufe offered to drive the crane operator to the site Friday afternoon so he would know the way. We realized that the army crane did not have the mobility of the construction firm's crane, so we went to the construction firm once more late on Saturday. They then promised to help us and had their crane on the site at 8:30 Monday morning. So, Monday morning we had two cranes on the site. Our prayers were answered. We accepted the construction firm's crane and the crane lifted up all the roof trusses in one hour. Three men accompanied the crane. The charge was \$100 (the best one hundred dollars spent on the entire school project). The army engineer also realized we made the best decision and left us with good feelings, as we were appreciative of their efforts.

The ninth day, Sunday, after breakfast, we all left in a bus which was leased for the entire day. The cost for leasing the bus was \$100 attended by two drivers, which was very reasonable when divided by 26 people. Also invited on this trip were Luis and Etelia Vega and Mr. Martinez. It was a beautiful Sunday to enjoy the beautiful scenic views of Honduras' mountains. We sang hymns as we went along the main highway between San Pedro Sula and Tegucigalpa. After several hours, we came to Lake Lago de Yojoa, Honduras' largest lake, where we stopped at a resort Hotel Agua Water (Hotel Blue). A waiter came on board our bus and explained the noon dinner menu. Here we made our dinner reservations again planning to return in two hours. Fresh bass fish from the lake was their specialty which nearly all of the group ordered. From the resort, we traveled to Dr. Stephan Youngberg's compound in a remote jungle region near Lake Tojoa, in a place called Pena Blanca, meaning "White Rock". Dr. Youngberg is now 65 years old. He graduated from Linda University in California and his wife is a nurse. People were waiting to see him for medical services the day we arrived. but he took time to show us around his compound. After leaving Dr. Young-

JOURNEY FROM NASIK TO VISIT THE CHRISTIANS IN THE TRIBAL VILLAGES

On Tuesday, January 31, 1984, we left Nasik on a long journey to visit many of the village churches. The road wound its way up the mountains with very beautiful scenery. The travel on these narrow mountain roads is always exciting, with large trucks, animals, ox carts and pedestrians all trying to make their way along a narrow road. I was beginning to become accustomed to the Indian driver using the horn to clear the way. We finally arrived at a mountain top rest house at Saputura called Shree Sai Krupa. The Indian lady owner showed us our rooms and then continued rebuilding her rock and mud cooking place. The old one had broken down. We saw a beautiful sunset over the mountain lake. We then went to our rooms to unpack and unload the children's clothing, sorting to size, so we would be ready for the visit to the villages the next day. Joseph John, our cook, set up his kitchen in one of the rooms preparing supper for

We walked up to a government flower garden on top of the mountain and looked over a valley, possibly 50 or 60 miles, seeing many villages with the evening cooking fires sending up plumes of smoke. The pastors explained to us that there were 6 churches, some 35 villages, that Pastor Mulhunker visited, traveling by foot to visit the Christians, preaching and worshipping with them, caring for their spiritual needs. This long journey by foot takes days to complete. Pastor Mulhunker's devotion and steadfastness deeply touched our hearts and brought a deep concern that a means of transportation could be provided for him and this work.

The next morning we packed the van and headed down the winding roads and hairpin curves into the valley. We parked the van at the side of the road and took a steep mountain trail to the village of Kothandar. Along this steep path, Pastor Dougre pointed up in a tree and said, "A tiger was in that tree the last time I walked this path." A

little farther on we heard a lot of shouting and we walked to an area where the Indian natives were harvesting teak logs, pulling them out of the jungle with water buffalo. The pastors explained our presence and we took a polaroid picture of the group. As they saw the picture develop before their very eyes, they were amazed and as we walked on, they still were talking and looking at the picture. How deeply our hearts were touched to think of the millions of precious souls in remote areas. such as we just visited, and the profound effect on their hearts and lives as they can hear of the wonderful love of God and the way of salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord. In the midst of all the poverty, there was an innermost thanksgiving and praise in the hearts and lives of the Christians.

As we approached the village, the men, women and children came to welcome us and walked with us to the village. A whole village was in poverty, as we could see the great need from their housing, clothing and food. Our hearts were deeply touched by this need that was so prevalent in all the tribal villages. They love their children. One man was rocking an infant in a makeshift hammock. Pastor Dougre had such a kind and loving way with the villagers and we could see they loved and respected him.

We then traveled to the village of Jakhanas where Evangelist Laxman Pawar was serving as minister. As we arrived, they were so very friendly, and placed flower leis around our necks as a token of Christian love. There, next to the mud-walled and thatched-roof hut. we held worship services with the Christians, villagers and many Hindu who stood in a circle around where the Christians were seated on the ground. How deeply we were impressed to see the Hindu villagers eager to hear the Word of God. There were Christians there from four villages, having walked many miles. There were about 100 members and their children. They sang two hymns and had a Bible reading in Maharati dialect. We sang two hymns in English and held the worship service with Pastor Dougre serving as interpreter. We then gave 6 Bibles (printed in Maharati) to those men who can

(Continued from Page 3) bergs, we returned to the Resort and had our Sunday church services on an open deck porch to again view the beauty of the lake and mountains in the

background. It reminded me of "Lake Louise" in Canada. Following the church services, we had our dinner in a beautiful setting, an experience never to be forgotten. After dinner, we toured Honduras countryside and the stopped at the Pulapanzak Falls and its rapids downstream. The Falls were approximately 135 feet high. Most of the group walked down the long steps to the bottom, and again it was a long climb back up. It was now late in the afternoon and we were about 2 hours from Siguatepeque. Along the Sunday drive, we saw many open lime furnaces used to provide lime for industrial purposes.

The tenth day, Monday, the entire crew was on the site earlier than usual because the two cranes we had ordered were to be on the site at 8:30 a.m. Fortunately, both cranes were on the site at the scheduled time. The results of lifting the roof trusses is discussed earlier in this report. All the walkway framing boards were removed and progress was being made to install the asbestos roof, which was 98% completed. The reason the roof was not finished was because there were not sufficient nails. Five skylights were also placed in the roof to provide additional light into the classrooms. Also on Monday, we were fortunate to lease a cabinet shop for two days. Six men made 5 doors, 9 fixed window louvers and 18 window enclosures which were to be hinged so they could be opened. On Monday noon, the third and last picnic lunch was prepared by the sisters and enjoyed by all.

Tuesday, the last day on the site, the roof was completed, the doors and windows were installed and five locks were provided for the building. A general clean-up around the building was now in order as the two-room school was complete. An all-night rain came Monday evening and continued through Tuesday morning. We were indeed fortunate to have sunshine every day as we worked on the project. The climb uphill to the site was almost impossible the last day.

Ezequiel Martinez had planned a dedication service for 10:00 a.m. Tuesday morning. All the families surrounding the school site were invited, plus the school administrator and a local senator. Because of the rain, all had to be cancelled, which was the only disappointment on the entire project.

We together planned to read from I

Kings 8:22-29, which was Solomon's prayer of dedication for the temple. Ezequiel planned to introduce everyone and make the brief remarks. I was to follow with remarks and read in English the above eight verses. Ezequiel was then going to read the same eight verses in Spanish with further remarks. Our entire group was to sing several songs in English and then close with a prayer. Following the services, the 26 of us from the States were to line up under the school walkway and everyone present could shake hands with us. As previously stated, this did not materialize. Keys to the school house were given to the school administrator and classes were to start in February.

Tuesday afternoon was parting time and everyone had checked out by 4:00 p.m. Ezequiel Martinez planned to go to Tegucigalpa, the capital city, and four couples went with him in the Toyota van. Two couples, the Harold Hodels and the Nelson Martins were planning to travel from Tegucigalpa to Costa Rica and Guatamala. The Rudy Luginbuhls and the Gene Hangartners returned with Ezequiel on Wednesday.

Late Tuesday, the remaining 18 of us also left Siguatepeque in a leased bus and arrived back in San Pedro Sula. We could all rejoice that the project was finished and we had two days to go sightseeing and shopping in San Pedro. By Wednesday evening. the Luginbuhls and Hangartners had also returned to San Pedro Sula. After supper, we had our Wednesday evening worship services together and also an additional hour of fellowship after the service. Bro. Jack Krantz chaired the second hour wherein each one could express their feelings regarding the project. The comments were all very interesting, pro or con, and enjoyed by all.

Approximately 190 Spanish Bibles consisting of the Book of Psalms and the New Testament were sent with us for distribution. Inserts were translated in Spanish by Steve Russell (Spanish teacher in our Morton High School) of our "Statement of Faith" consisting of the first six items. These inserts were pasted on the inside cover by our sisters before distribution in the Siguatepeque Boarding House. All of the workers in the village "El Pacayal" received one. At the boarding house, a copy was given to the receptionist, a former "Miss Honduras", as her par-

ents owned the boarding house. Also others that we met received copies and seemingly appreciated them.

One afternoon, Ezequiel took the sisters and I to tour a hospital in Siguatepeque, "Hospital Evangelico". Dr. Noe Marroquin, the chief surgeon and a director of the hospital, gave us a personal tour. He is a Christian (spoke English) and a personal friend of Ezequiel. He and his wife also visited the school site project. We left with him over 100 copies of the Spanish Bibles for distribution. He felt that one person each day became a Christian in the hospital and that he would distribute these Bibles personally to those he felt would receive the most benefit. The sisters also enjoyed a tour through a public school in the city. The principal of the school gave us the tour.

The complete cost of the school project came to \$9,853.66.

There were numerous items included which were not originally planned. These were: 1. Two chalk boards (one for each classroom), 2. Forty chairs with an attached writing board, 3. One teacher's desk and chair, 4. Two toilets, 5. Use of a local cabinet shop for 2 days to make 5 doors, 9 louvers and 18 hingeable windows, 6. A donation for three men who tremendously full throughout the entire project, Ezequiel Martinez, Mario Guevara and Luis Vega, 7. Five skylights in the roof, 8. Lumber for item 5 above, plus 5 key locks for doors, hinges for all doors, plus hinges for all windows, slideable bolt locks for the inside of all hingeable windows, 9. The largest expense was the use of the Toyota van, which could transport 13 people; it was used as a truck, driven hard over 1,300 miles, rented 13 days, gasoline \$1.87/gal. for a total cost of approximately \$1,200.

Friday morning, January 25, we left San Pedro airport for our flight to New Orleans. Here a tour of the city was planned and enjoyed by all.

We all arrived home safely Friday evening and thanks be to God for a successful project and trip.

It would be my recommendation that a follow-up trip be made next February 1986 whereby a couple from the Work Opportunity Committee and also a couple from the World Relief Committee would visit Honduras. Lord willing, my wife and I would join these couples or more if this were planned.

#### CROGHAN & NAUMBURG NEW YORK

Two dates, seemingly unrelated, figure very prominently in the history of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. The first - widely acclaimed and heard around the world - occurred on July 4, 1776, when fifty-six men gathered in Independence Hall to sign the Declaration of Independence, a document which asserted unequivocally "that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness". Adjunct to this was the First Amendment to the Constitution which said, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of a religion, or prohibiting the exercise thereof". This great event occured with much fanfare and acclaim!

The second date was July 4, 1803, exactly twenty-seven years later. A boy, Samuel Heinrich Froehlich, was born in the city of Brugg of canton Aargau in Switzerland. In time he would grow up to lead a religious awakening which would erupt in Switzerland and spread to several other countries, including America. This event, while a joy for the Froehlich family, occurred without fanfare.

With the birth of Samuel Froehlich, the stage was set for the doctrines of repentance and conversion, particularly as understood by Apostolic Christians, to ultimately find their way to America. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY, AMERICA'S GRANDEST OF FREEDOMS, WAS INSTITUTED BY THE COUNTRY'S FOUNDING FATHERS IN 1776. A few years later God raised up a man of unusual devo-

tion and vision whose energies and zeal awoke multitudes to the One who could give them eternal life. As emigration from Europe to America began in great volume, it was inevitable that the faith of our fathers on that continent would gravitate to America, the land of religious toleration.

Yet, in a broader and more accurate sense, the true roots of the church date back to events associated at Mount Calvary when Jesus Christ of Nazareth, the Son of God, bled and died on the cruel Cross for the remission of sin.

The movement which Samuel Froehlich began in 1831-1832 found a presence in America in 1847. It was during this year that twenty-eight-year-old Benedict Weyeneth, having just recently been ordained an Elder in the Evangelical Baptist Church in Switzerland and personally consecrated by Samuel Froehlich, landed on American soil.

Young Weyeneth, diligent in spirit and obviously feeling led of God because he was ordained specifically to come to America, patiently checked through customs and soon found the boat that would take him up the Hudson River to Albany, then by canal to Utica. From there he may have walked the twenty or so miles to the Black River and then taken some type of water conveyance (or he may have walked) the entire sixty miles to Lewis County, New York. This is the site of the two Apostolic Christian Churches which exist today at Croghan and Naumburg.

He was on a mission of profound importance. Rather than attempting to initiate a broadly based program of evangelism for America – which already had many Christian denominations – he instead was responding to a request from Joseph Virkler, a Lewis County Amish Mennonite farmer, to Samuel Froehlich for help in alleviating some spiritual problems which were besetting his group of believers in that area.

It was during a previous meeting of Virkler's group that one of them, a former member of Froehlich's Evangelical Baptist Church in Europe, had recommended the group write to Froehlich to see if he could either adjudicate their differences or make other spiritual recommendations which might resolve the situation. It was their hope that Froehlich would come to America.

Because Froehlich was a strong, dynamic and very persuasive leader, no doubt this man, while separated from Froehlich's church, continued to retain a deep respect for his ability and talent in helping those who needed spiritual guidance.

Although he remains unknown, the man who recommended Froehlich played a very significant part in the history of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. Had he not suggested that Froehlich or one of his followers be summoned to America, the church might never have crossed the Atlantic at that particular time, and the history of the church in America might have been markedly different.

Research concerning the man who recommended that Joseph Virkler write to Samuel Froehlich fails to reveal any definite clues to his identity. In 1939 at Roanoke, IL, Fred Herbst, a local history enthusiast interviewed Priscilla Weyeneth Liebig, a daughter of Benedict Weyeneth. His notes of this interview, while somewhat difficult to read, contain the phrase, "Benhart Ben sent word to Europe". Whether she is referring to the name "Benhart" is unknown. At this time there is no known family in the church by the name of Benhart. Thus, the man's identity is a mystery that will likely remain unresolved. There is conjecture, however, that the man might have been John Keiffer, an early arrival in America who persuaded many Mennonites to move from Europe to Lewis County. This cannot be totally con-

It is not altogether certain whether Benedict Weyeneth came to America alone or with a male companion. It is certain he was the only Elder to come over to help the Amish Mennonite colony in Lewis County, NY.

Joseph Farney and Rudolph Virkler served the Lewis County church as bishops as were probably the leaders who had previously brought the group to America.

(Continued from Page 32) brothers and sisters to the Lord Jesus Christ, and we are equal in the sight of God. We should consider one another as equal, and we should live our lives in such a state of mind.

"Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others." Philippians 2:4. Now that doesn't mean that we should look upon the things of others to covet, but that we should look upon the things that another has with the same respect that we look upon our own things. We should not say, "This is mine . . . I shall care for it very well; but this is not mine, so I don't care what happens to it." It is easy to do that, but we should be concerned for others, especially for the things that are of the Spirit. We should mind the house of the Spirit. We should be willing and able to give the warning; and we should certainly be willing and able to be an example to the praise and honor of God so that others might take heart.

"Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." Philippians 2:5-8. Loved ones, we want someone whom we can follow as an example, although we should not idolize anyone except our God.

Many times we look to someone and say, "If I could only live my life as well as he." This is all right; but if we are seeking for someone to follow after, why not seek out the Lord? He lived His life here in a perfect state. He was sin-free, and He did the very things that we are expected to do. "He made Himself," it says, "of no reputation".

He made Himself a servant. Imagine! The Saviour of all mankind, God's only Son, came as a servant. He proved His willingness to be a servant when He washed the disciples feet. He said, "... do as I have done to you." John 13:15. In this He meant, loved ones, that we should be servants, one toward another. By so doing, we would always be helping one another. The servant must always do the work, so if we are all servants, we will all be working. If we are all working, just think what we can accomplish! God wants us to accomplish a great deal here, both the saving of our own souls and the encouragement of others.

We read here in this Psalm (I thought they were such inspiring Words) of all that God has done for us.

It says: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits." Psalm 103.2

Every day, loved ones, it is important for us to kneel down to our God. and to thank Him for all His gifts. When we have our food, we should thank Him for providing for the needs of our body. Now we have never, any of us, known what it is to be hungry. I once read that a man said he knew what hunger was, but he always went to a restaurant. Well, this is sort of a joke, but that's the way it has been with us... we have never known real hunger. When we were hungry, we went to get something to eat. But there are those in this world, dear ones, who cannot do that. They do not have a place to go to get food. They have to suffer. There are those who live their whole lives knowing nothing but hunger. How thankful we should be that God has abundantly provided for us.

I was talking just before the service with one of the farmers, and he mentioned, "Did you see the great, long line of corn going into the elevators?" Oh, I saw it, and it's a wonderful thing. Isn't it comforting to know that there is so much good food in our nation? Shouldn't we be thankful for it? Shouldn't we be concerned that we support our government?

We should be thankful continually for the wonderful things that we have here. We should be like the men of old who established our nation. They came here so that they might find a place of peace and also a place where they could worship their God as they would. They were grateful that God had blessed them so much, and even established a day of thanksgiving which is soon to be celebrated.

If all the people of this nation would be thankful to God for all that we have, and if they would be supportive in their churches and in prayer, then, dear ones, I believe that we would have nothing to fear. But it is not like that. We know that there has been a falling away in our nation, that the churches have weakened somewhat, and that the emphasis is not there. There is so much more to do on Sunday than to go to church. God cannot appreciate this. How much longer will He allow it? As long as He does allow it, loved ones, let those of us who know better and appreciate His blessings, thank Him.

We read, "Who forgiveth all thine iniquities..." Psalm 103:3. How could

we ever become a child of God, how could we ever be converted, if God didn't forgive our iniquities? We come to God and we admit before Him that we are sinners. We all are. We were born in sin. Unless we are willing to acknowledge before Him that we have been sinful and ask Him to forgive us, we cannot possibly become a child of God. We cannot become converted; we cannot be renewed in our minds unless we do this.

We must come in meekness and with a contrite heart. We must not come with a haughty heart, because God does not like anyone who is proud. If we come, it says, He will forgive our iniquities. All He asks is that we come and ask Him; then He will forgive us.

It says, "Who healeth all thy diseases ..." Psalm 103:3. Many things distress us, loved ones, both physical and spiritual. We have all had our problems, and many times when we brought them God, we have felt better after we have prayed and read His Word. I have had the experience, and I know all of you have had, that when things lay heavily upon me, looking into the Word of God gave true encouragement.

Perhaps a situation very much like yours occurred to someone long ago. Through faith and reliance upon God, all things worked out well. We can read in the Old Testament, and there is no better example, that the kings who followed God were well cared for, and there was peace in their nations. Those who turned from God were removed from His protecting hand, and things didn't go so well. I believe we will find that that happens to us.

"Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with loving kindness and tender mercies; Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's." Psalm 103:4, 5.

After we have come to know God, we have been changed. We have also seen it in others. People who have lived very worldly lives, after committing themselves to God, have quickly been tempered in their ways. They have replaced the worldly desires with love. They have desired, then, to be more like God. Once we have come to know Jesus, we long to be more like Him.

The apostle says that when the last day comes, we will see Him and know Him face to face. It is something we all desire, something we all hope for, something we all can have. It is not something that just some of us can have, but it something all of us can have.

It comes to my mind that just a week or so ago I heard in the sermon (I believe that all of us have heard things such as this) an account of someone who had come very near to death. Perhaps the heart had stopped and the person had apparently passed from this life, but was revived through the wonders of medicine. When such people came back and were again conscious, they mentioned that they had seen such beautiful things. They wished that they could have stayed there. I believe that these things have happened.

Some thoughts came to me then: Will we all see these beautiful things? Will only those who are on their way to that beautiful place see those beautiful things? Will those who are on their way to eternal suffering see them also? Will they have to pass them by? Will they long to go there, but will have to go instead to that place where no one wants to go? Will those cry out and beg for mercy? Will it be as it was in the time of the ark, when the door was closed and people could not enter? I don't know, loved ones, but I know that it says in this Word that only those who are true to God, only those who live for Him, and only those who submit to Him are promised that wonderful reward!

We hope and pray that all of us will be able to remain strong. With God's help, we can, we know. So, then, if we ever fear that we are not going to be able, if we fear that we are going to fail, let us call upon the Lord. Let us call upon our God, and let us kneel before Him in prayer. Let us beg of Him to come down upon our own breast, loved ones, in His unseen and spiritual way, as He is here today. He will help us in our efforts to live our lives in such a way that we find our salvation.

May God grant us grace to that end. May He bless His Holy Word continually, and bless all those who come to hear it that they might be renewed in the Spirit and inspired to know their God better; and may we who have known Him be encouraged to remain faithful and true until our life's end so that, when we pass out of this life, we will be at peace with our God and with man.

### SERMON BY BRO. EDWARD A. AESCHLEMAN OF PHILADELPHIA, PA

Text: Psalm 103 and Philippians 2:1-16

I have read through sixteen verses of wonderful teaching by this remarkable man, the Apostle Paul, who gave his whole life to the cause of establishing the church of Jesus Christ, that we might at this time and on this day enjoy it. Through Jesus' suffering upon the cross and through the Word that we have been given, we find a way to work out our salvation.

The Word tells us that if we first seek the things of God, our physical needs will be satisfied. I believe that we have all experienced that this has been so very, very true. If we are first willing to yield to Him, He in turn is willing to provide for our every need.

We are taught that if we ask for whatever it is that we need, asking in faith, He will provide it. He has done so. Many times God has provided these things even before we ask, because He knows what our needs are. He knows the future. As He sees how things are in our lives and how they are going to develop, God makes provisions for His children.

I don't know if you have ever thought of it that way, but many times we look back and say how wonderful it was that certain things happened the way that they did. These things do not just happen "by chance", but are directed by our Lord.

We have faith in Him, and believe that He will give us the necessary things. Even more than that, He gives an abundance of things that are not necessary, above and beyond what we have required. This includes both material and spiritual things. How much more wonderful are the material things that we enjoy, if we have received the Spirit of God and recognize and acknowledge where these gifts come from. Those who live in their old ways, loved ones, may enjoy the same things, but they do not appreciate that these things have come to them by the mer-

cies, by the kindness and by the love of God. No one can give anything to us, except according to His will.

In turn, there is very little that we can do for God. What can we do for the One who has created us? The most we can do for Him is to acknowledge Him, to abide in His ways, to listen to and heed His Word, to appreciate the gift of His Son and to appreciate what His Son, Jesus, taught and did for us. Through Him we may become children of God, dwell in that beautiful home and be partakers of the reward that He has in store for us.

The whole purpose of this Book, from the beginning to the end, is to teach us what God desires of us. What God desires of us, loved ones, is not that we should be under a great burden, but that we should experience great joy throughout all of our lives. If we elect to do so, if we elect to submit, then we can enjoy the freedom and peace that He alone can give to us. We can also enjoy the world that He has created for us to live in even that much more.

If we understand this, I believe that we can realize what God sees when He looks down upon us and how much He appreciates those who follow Him and those who do His will and His work. He does not withhold from anyone, loved ones, for the rain falls upon all whether they are sinners or are redeemed in God. Yet, I believe that God likes to see that we appreciate His gifts. We like to know, when we give someone something, that they appreciate it. We like to have them acknowledge it, and we like to have them tell us that it is a nice gift and that they are thankful for it. So it is with God. He likes to know that His children appreciate what He has done for them.

In this chapter a sub-caption said, "An exhortation to humility to Christ's example". It is always good to be

humble. As we have already mentioned, what we have, loved ones, was not created by us. We may have worked for some things, but they were given to us of God, and we should receive them in humbleness and in thanksgiving.

"If there be therefore any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any bowels and mercies, Fulfill ye my joy, that ye be likeminded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind." Philippians 2:1, 2.

Dear ones, I believe that God would appreciate nothing more than to see us truly in one accord and in like-mind, having the same love. How can we have the same love? If we have the same love that the Lord Jesus has, if we have this within our hearts, then we will all have the same love.

The Lord loves us all, and we love the Lord. Likewise then, we should love one another with true love and understanding. We need the fellowship of those who truly love one another in the Spirit. Therefore, we should be willing to minister to one another. We should be willing to deny ourselves so that we would not be offensive, and we should not be offended so very easily. There are many times when errors are made, loved ones, when we are offended when offense is not due.

"Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." Philippians 2:3. This is very difficult. We think very highly of ourselves whether we want to admit it or not. It is not natural to the pride of man to admit that someone else is better than he. I don't believe that God desires that we should do that particularly, but He desires that we certainly should not think that we are better than anyone else, because we are all one in Him. We are all His children, all
