

History

The first Apostolic Christian Church in Wayne County, Ohio, was built around 1875. It was a simple frame building; a kitchen and dining room were added about 1895. The church became known as the Apostolic Christian Church at Rittman.

The church grew, and in 1917 a new brick church was built on the same location. It was a two-story building with a kitchen, dining room and furnace room in the basement. The capacity was about two hundred and fifty people, and in 1947 it was enlarged to seat about five hundred. In 1962 a new sanctuary was added, which doubled the seating space.

When in 1983 it again became apparent that more room was needed, the general opinion of the membership was that it would be better to build a second church than to enlarge the existing one. A questionnaire was presented to the church to find the preferred area. After considering the Ritt-

man, Orrville, Smithville and Sterling areas, Smithville was chosen.

A site committee was elected and several locations were found to be available. The congregation finally settled for the lot at 8530 Fulton Road, Sterling, Ohio, about one mile west of State Route 585, which is about three miles north of Smithville.

There was a building committee elected to manage and oversee the construction of the church, and a finance committee to handle the financial end of the project. A decorating committee and the trustees were also called upon to help with the many decisions and details that arose. There were countless donations of time, materials and money given by the brethren and friends so that this church could be built.

The ground breaking ceremony was held July 11, 1984, and the first worship service was held August 4, 1985. We are thankful for the Lord's direction and blessings during the building of our church.

Greetings in our precious Saviour's name.

Many of our brethren from our congregations have been active in giving and distributing the Bible. Many accounts have been heard of the blessings realized in visiting the homes, rest homes, prisons and rescue missions, when inquiry and request has come from someone wishing to have a Bible or Testament. Many requests come from individuals who have sight problems, where a large print Bible or Testament enables them to read again. We now have the KJV of the Bible on cassette tapes for those persons who can no longer see. For the blind, we have sets of braille Bibles in stock, ready for those needing a braille Bible.

During the past two years, 24,702 Bibles and Testaments have been shipped to our congregations for distribution by our brethren.

"Master, rebuke thy disciples. And he answered and said unto them, I tell you that, if these should hold their peace, the stones would immediately cry out." Luke 19:39, 40.

Jesus was at the edge of Jerusalem, coming into the city in the morning of the first day of the week. The people worshipped on Saturday, the Sabbath day. There was no traveling, no work, no hustle, no bustle. Everything was quiet.

"And when he was come near (to Jerusalem), he beheld the city, and wept over it." Luke 19:41. He told them that the time would come when the city would be torn down; not one stone would be left upon another.

He said, "If thou hadst known, even thou, at least in this thy day, the things which belong unto thy peace!" Luke 19:42. He was speaking specifically and directly to those Jewish people. "If only you would comprehend the things that are for your soul's salvation, for your good, but which are hid from your eyes because of our unbelief," He was telling them. The opportunity of salvation had now come to the Jewish people, and they rejected it. They refused to have any part of it or hear of it.

The Lord continued, "For the days shall come upon thee, that thine enemies shall cast a trench about thee, and compass thee round, and keep thee in on every side, And shall lay thee even with the ground, and thy children within thee; and they shall not leave in thee one stone upon another; because thou knewest not the time of thy visitation." Luke 19:43, 44.

What does that mean? ". . . thou knewest not the time of thy visitation?" They simply did not recognize that Jesus Christ was the Son of God, and that He had come to pay the supreme price for salvation.

Let's consider that in our modern day. If the Lord and Saviour came into this room, He could speak in those same words, and they would be valid. Any soul who has not yet made a covenant, who has not accepted the privilege of salvation, the benefit of His supreme offering (the giving of His life and the shedding of His blood), has not yet recognized the time of His visitation.

The days which Jesus spoke about have come to pass. He had said that when these things began to happen, they should get out of the city, go into the mountains. He told them not to go into their houses to get their coats, or anything, but to run for their lives. You can read it in the other gospels.

The prophecy was fulfilled in the year 70 A.D. A Roman general named Siestus went to Jerusalem with his legions of soldiers. They circled the city and they were about ready to strike it. In fact, they tested it on one corner, made several approaches, and then backed away. Their camp was quiet for a few days. Finally, they packed up and left.

Josephus the historian tells us that the Christians, those people who had walked with the Lord and who knew what Jesus had said, left the city immediately. They went out into the Judean hills and into the mountains of the area surrounding Jerusalem. I can well imagine that there were many scoffers who said, "They've gone. What are you so excited about?"

Then General Titus came with a different army of legions and encircled the city, and the siege began. It didn't let up until Jerusalem was leveled and burnt. The gold in the temple ran down into the crevices between the stones. The soldiers even pried the stones apart to retrieve the gold and precious metals.

The Jewish people suffered famine, and they suffered starvation. Some even ate their own children. This is historical . . . it's in the records.

"And he went into the temple, and began to cast out them that sold therein, and them that bought; Saying unto them, It is written, My house is a house of prayer: but ye have made it a den of thieves." Luke 19:45, 46.

Can you imagine coming into this church on this Lord's day morning and seeing money changers and people selling doves and other things in the foyer?

The Jewish people had come from great distances, and did not wish to carry their sacrificial offerings with them. They went to the temple where, so conveniently, they could buy a sacrifice and go on in and make their offering.

"And he taught daily in the temple. But the chief priests and the scribes and the chief of the people sought to destroy him, And could not find what they might do: for all the people were very attentive to hear him." Luke 19:47, 48. Each day Jesus went out of the city to the little village of Bethany, and abode there over night. On the next day, He came back into the city and taught.

Earlier, when He was with Zacchaeus, He also taught the people who were around Him. He told them, "A certain nobleman went into a far country to receive for himself a kingdom, and to return. And he called his ten servants . . ." Luke 19:12, 13. This would be a normal procedure. We would do likewise.

He gave the servants instructions and the material things that they should care for while he was gone. He called his ten servants, and he gave them pounds (money). To one he gave ten, and perhaps to some of the others, five, and one, whatever it was. Then he said, "Occupy till I come." Luke 19:13.

Here is the analogy. We have been given "pounds". Our Lord has gone into a far country to receive a kingdom, and He is going to return with that kingdom. When He comes back, He is going to approach each one of us individually as His servant and say, "What have you done with what I have given to you?"

There are all kinds of definitions or substitutions for this "pound". A pound in that day was a portion of money. It was something valuable. When we study the gospels, we find that the most valuable thing on earth is salvation, the precious pearl. It is peace that passeth all understanding. Eternal life.

The Lord is giving us opportunity in the day of grace and salvation. He is giving us the benefit of His supreme sacrifice, the shedding of His blood on Calvary. Can there be anything of greater price? Nothing in this world!

We are taught in the Word that one soul... think of it, one soul... is worth more than this entire world! The soul was created by God in heaven, and

breathed into our bodies. We are stewards and we will give an account.

The nobleman in the parable approached this servant to whom he had given ten pounds, to whom he had said, "Occupy till I come.". The servant gave him his ten pounds plus ten more. He had used them well.

The nobleman went down the line until he came to the last one. That servant said, "Lord, behold, here is thy pound, which I have kept laid up in a napkin. (or I didn't use it; I kept it.) For I feared thee, because thou art an austere man: thou takest up that thou layedst not down, and reapest that thou didst not sow." Luke 19:20, 21.

Then the nobleman said, "... thou wicked servant. Thou knewest that I was an austere man,... Wherefore then gavest not thou my money into the bank, that at my coming I might have required mine own with usury? And he said unto them that stood by, Take from him the pound, and give it to him that hath ten pounds." Luke 19:22, 23, 24. The pound was taken from the man who had one pound, who had the opportunity and didn't use it, and given to the one who had ten.

"(And they said unto him, Lord, he hath ten pounds.) For I say unto you, That unto every one which hath shall be given; and from him that hath not, even that he hath shall be taken away from him." Luke 19:25, 26. Does it seem strange to you that as He was going into this Passion Week, His last few days upon earth, that this teaching was given to us? I believe that it has a special significance.

"That unto every one which hath..."
How many of us this morning, "hath"?
The opportunity of grace and salvation is here today. Each one of you has been given the opportunity to go to the foot of the cross, to repent for the sins that burden the heart, and to lay hold on the promise of eternal life.

Here were servants who rejected, and what was said of them? "But those mine enemies, which would not that I should reign over them, bring (them) hither, and slay them before me." Luke 19:27. Think of it!

Would we want to slay anyone who is near and dear unto us? Does this help us to understand why Jesus looked over that city? Why He wept?

He loves each one of you. He loves everyone. The opportunity for grace and salvation is here today. We have no promise of tomorrow.

SERMON BY BRO. MERRIL LAUKHUF OF LATTY, OH

Text: Luke 19

According to what we have read, let us try to visualize the scene. Jerusalem was overflowing with people for it was approaching the time of the Passover Feast. Many Jews still lived in the surrounding countries where they had been taken as captives, but at this particular time of the year, they felt a yearning and a desire to go back to the holy city to worship and to take part in the Passover Feast.

Through Jericho, and then to the city of Bethany, which was close by the foot of the Mount of Olives, came Jesus of Nazareth, His followers and His disciples on their way to Jerusalem.

I imagine that the man whom Jesus had healed of leprosy was there, and the infirm man who had lain beside the pool, unable to get into the waters (when the waters were troubled) so that he might be healed. Also, the woman taken in adultery and many whom the Lord had healed were there among His followers. Also in Jerusalem were the disciples who had walked with and been taught by Jesus Christ, the greatest Teacher who ever walked upon the face of this earth.

Down deep within the hearts of all these followers was the expectancy that Christ would soon set up an earthly kingdom. They did not understand. They were not yet converted. The Lord led them slowly, gently and carefully to help them understand what was taking place. Gradually He conveyed to them the message that He would give His life upon the cross, that He would die.

"When he had thus spoken, he went before, ascending up to Jerusalem," and He told His disciples, "Go ye into the village over against you; in the which . . . ye shall find a colt tied, whereon yet never man sat: loose him, and . . . if any man ask you, Why do ye loose him? thus shall ye say unto him, Because the Lord hath need of him." Luke 19:28, 30, 31.

Let's just think about this. They didn't question Him. They didn't argue with Him about going into the village to untie and bring out a colt which was someone else's property. They were beginning to believe. There was a measure of faith within their hearts.

They did as they were told, and they brought the colt. They put blankets and their garments upon the colt, and the people spread their clothes in the way thinking, "Here is the new King (an earthly King)." They had been under the Roman rule for many years, and were hoping and yearning to be relieved of it.

They placed Jesus upon the colt and "as he went, they spread their clothes in the way. And when he was come nigh, even now at the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works that they had seen." Luke 19:36, 37.

They thought that the time of their freedom from Rome had come, and they began to praise Jesus and to cry out, "Saying, Blessed be the King that cometh in the name of the Lord: peace in heaven, and glory in the highest." Luke 19:38.

Other gospels tell us that they cried, "Hosanna, Hosanna!" According to Bible dictionaries, the word hosanna means save me.

The multitude was praising God, and crying out, "Save me, save me!" Think of it! Jesus was riding into Jerusalem to become the Supreme Sacrifice and they were crying out, "Save me, save me!"

We don't fully understand what the cry of "save me" is until the call of God touches our hearts.

We read in the beginning of this chapter about Zacchaeus. When he heard the great commotion of Jesus' arrival in the little village of Jericho, he

wanted so much to see Him. However, he was a short man, small in stature.

What did he do? He ran ahead of the crowd to a sycamore tree. He climbed up into that tree, so that he might get a look at Jesus. Can you imagine the feeling that must have come over Zacchaeus when the Saviour, with His disciples and the crowd, stopped before that tree? Jesus looked up and called Zacchaeus by name. He didn't say, "Man, who are you?" He said, "Zacchaeus!"

The Lord said, "This day is salvation come to this house, for somuch as he also is a son of Abraham. For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." Luke 19:9, 10.

He looked at him and said, "This day is salvation come to this (your) house." Today. Not yesterday. Not tomorrow. We do not have a promise of tomorrow, and I'm sure that this congregation has experienced that in the past few weeks or months.

Zacchaeus came down, and immediately he said, "Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have taken any thing from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold." Luke 19:8.

The last time that Jesus was in Jericho, salvation came to Zacchaeus.

In these few verses we have the steps to salvation. We have faith. We have the call of God. We have man's answer, his submission in humility and meekness. We have confession of faith and confession of sin. He said, "Lord, if I took anything, I will restore it fourfold." Then we have peace that passeth all understanding. "This day is salvation come to this house."

When they heard the great multitude crying, "Hail! Here comes the King! Hosanna! Praise the Lord!" and all the phrases of exclamation and joy, some of the Pharisees said to Jesus,
