Resist not then God's regulation, Although His hand may press thee hard;


But conquer thy own will with patience;

OPPORTUNITY: HELPING THE HAITIANS

Elder Bro. David Bertsch

Our World Relief and Works Projects program has approved the 1985-1986 project to send teams of volunteers to Haiti to construct the roof for school buildings. There are seven projects planned for this time period and we were privileged to be part of the fourth team to go to the seacoast village of Corail (Cori).

Much of the planning and scheduling was done by Bro. Harold Witzig (Morton, IL) and project leader, Bro. Phil Isabel (Remington, IN). We appreciated the planning and work that was done and the help and advice we re-

We had received work team instructions which gave us information of the project location, general information concerning the Republic of Haiti, schedule, health care needs and some commonly used Creole words. A list of gifts and needed items we could take along for the Haitian families, especially all types of hand tools and carpentry tools, was also given to us. We took as many tools along as we could carry in our two suitcases.

Departure day, January 23, was soon upon us. Brothers from Remington, Wolcott, Leo, IN, and Bay City, MI,

were to meet in Miami, FL, for the flight to Haiti. This being the first flight for John Willis (Children's Home, Leo, IN), he had a window seat. From Atlanta, GA, we flew along the west coast of Florida and the pilot spoke of passing over Fort Myers and we thought of our brothers and sisters there. We stayed all night in Miami and were met by Darrell Brooks, of World Team, who briefed us on what to expect on our arrival at the Port-au-Prince airport and passing through customs. A beautiful flight to Haiti, some 600 to 700 miles, was had by all.

Robert Stewart, World Team Missionary leader, met us at the airport. Robert would be our guide and leader for the entire stay in Haiti. We passed through customs, our bags were opened and inspected and we passed through with no problems. We loaded all the suitcases on top of the bus and were all aboard for the trip to the mission station at El Keyes (Kies). Driving through the streets of Port-au-Prince, we saw so much poverty and so much need. Most of the people were walking on both sides of the street. Many women were carrying loads on their heads and we saw many brightly painted buses just loaded with passen-

We staved overnight at a mission compound in Port-au-Prince. We were very graciously welcomed, served a very good meal and given a cottage for a night's rest. The next morning we packed up again and started on the 130-mile journey to El Keyes. We passed through many villages with many people at the open-air marketplaces trying to either sell or buy the food or produce.

The mission station is on the top of a hill with beautiful flowers and tropical trees surrounding the mission cottages. We were welcomed by Mrs. Stewart and the staff and a delicious dinner was prepared for us. After dinner, we loaded the two four-wheeldrive trucks and a trailer with the steel roofing, the tools and the generators needed for the project. On the trip to Corail, we travelled over tortuous mountain roads filled with large rocks and so steep that we had to travel in low gear and four-wheel-drive for five

HE IS RISEN — HE IS NOT HERE

(Mark 16:6) Bro. Jerry Messner, Winthrop, MN

"Up Calvary's mountain one dreadful morn, walked Christ my Saviour weary and worn" . . . Gospel Hymns #363.

As we approach the time of the year commemorating the trial and death of Jesus Christ, let us go back in time and, in our minds, attempt to witness what our blessed Saviour endured, for "twas there my Lord was crucified, twas on the cross He bled for me, and purchased there my pardon free" . . . Gospel Hymns #355.

On that fateful night our Lord resorted to the place where He often

went with His disciples for, as Luke put it, "And He came out, and went, as He was wont, to the Mount of Olives; and His disciples also followed Him. (Chapter 22:39). The Garden was not new to Him. Jesus went there often, perhaps for quiet communion with His heavenly Father; for already He knew what terrible agony lay before Him.

It is impossible to imagine what tremendous mental torture Christ was going through as He knelt alone in the Garden; as the thoughts of obedience to His Father warred against His desire to avoid the anguish He must suffer. It wasn't the pain alone, of nails into His mortal flesh but of every sin of all mankind from "In the Beginning" (Genesis 1:1) to the last "Amen" in Revelation 22:21.

He prayed earnestly, sincerely, pleadingly to a loving Father, (a Father so full of love that He used the Aramaic term "Abba" meaning "Daddy") to let this cup, this pain, pass from Him. But how thankful we can be that He was obedient unto the death on the cross.

In His High Priestly prayer Jesus said, "Father the HOUR is come" . . . (John 17:1) the HOUR for which He was being prepared; the HOUR which was prophesied for so many, many years; the HOUR of which Moses wrote about in Genesis 3:15, "It shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel"; the HOUR in which God would be glorified.

After the mock trial in which our blessed Lord was laughed at, scorned and denied, by even those who followed Him and witnessed the many, many miracles He performed, whose very life was traded for a murderer, came the dreadful day in which the lives of the entire human race would be changed forever.

St. John's gospel, Chapter 19:1 says very simply, "then Pilate therefore took Jesus and scourged Him". Scourged, the Greek word "phragelloo" is used to describe what our Lord went through. The scourge was made of leather thongs, weighted with pieces of bone or glass. The victim, our Lord, was stripped naked and tied in a bending position over a pillar. As the thongs came down upon His back, the tips, with bone or glass, would wrap around His chest and tear the flesh as the straps were pulled back. In this position, with the head hung low (the excruciating pain was so severe the victim would pass out and be revived with salt water on the open wounds), blood would trickle from all openings in the head.

Thirty-nine stripes were administered so the law of Forty stripes would not be broken (Deuteronomy 25:3).

Then came the crown of thorns, the humiliation of being mocked and laughed at by the soldiers, "but as a sheep before the shearers is dumb, so He openeth not His mouth" (Isaiah 53:76).

Isaiah prophesied the government would be upon His shoulders; now the law of life, the crossbeam, was upon His shoulders. As He walked to Calvary, so weak by the loss of blood.

BIBLE DISTRIBUTION

Greetings in our precious Saviour's name.

Many of our brethren from our congregations have been active in giving and distributing the Bible. Many accounts have been heard of the blessings realized in visiting the homes, rest homes, prisons and rescue missions, when inquiry and request has come from someone wishing to have a Bible or Testament. Many requests come from individuals who have sight problems, where a large print Bible or Testament enables them to read again. We now have the KJV of the Bible on cassette tapes for those persons who can no longer see. For the blind, we have sets of braille Bibles in stock, ready for those needing a braille Bible.

During the past two years, 24,702 Bibles and Testaments have been shipped to

our congregations for distribution by our brethren.

As the cross held Jesus suspended between heaven and earth, the muscles of His body screaming from the pain of attempting to hold His body together in such an awkward position. His lungs burning in an attempt to inhale and exhale, the nails tearing at the flesh of His hands and feet, and above all, feeling forsaken by His heavenly Father (Psalm 22:1).

When God saw the travail of His anguish, He was satisfied and out of mercy allowed Him to die.

The darkness, the renting of the veil, the graves opened and saints which had died walked the earth again, then followed the burial of a dead Christ... but wait! The tomb is empty! He arose! He overcame death! PRAISE THE LORD!

It is still winter time in Indiana how beautiful it is. In reducing the essence of scripture to its simplest form, I received a new sensitivity to faith, love and suffering. Teaching the handicapped demands honesty with ourselves. It takes facing just how much we lack in being all we should be. Our love for God depends on facing ourselves, realizing our failures and needs, and trusting God's promise of forgiveness through Jesus. Your importance as a person is based squarely on the fact that God loves you. It's not enough to tell the handicapped person "God loves you". He must experience that love through God's people, you and/or me. Their I.Q. should not be so important. The individual is important. There are many ways by which people become handicapped and God, Himself, planned them all. All children are prescribed by God, are precious in His sight, and have a purpose in His plan. They may not seem to fit in our plans, but in His all-seeing

While working at the Home we have lived through lessons of pain, patience, play, tears and laughter. The Home encompasses uproar balanced by peace. Pure bedlam has become unbelievable order. We have learned discipline together. We have been taught lessons in

honesty, dignity, integrity and forgiveness. While watching some of the residents struggle with physical and mental handicaps, true courage is displayed many times.

Handicapped? Yes. God's gifts? Yes. My teachers? Yes.

(Continued from Page 2) hours of driving to cover 40 - 50 miles.

We arrived after dark at Corail, staying at Pastor Joseph's home. We were received with a hearty welcome by the family, the church members and many of the villagers. A supper was prepared of Haitian coffee, fish, chicken, rice, tomatoes and potatoes. Even though we could not understand Creole, we could feel their welcome.

On Sunday morning at 8:30, our team brothers and Robert Stewart gathered in the front room for our church services. We sang several hymns, meditated on God's Word and prayed, thanking the Lord for bringing us safely on our journey, for the Lord's blessing and for the opportunity to help the Haitian people. At 9:30 we walked to their local church and as we approached, we could hear their heartfelt singing. Pastor Joseph and Pastor Adoine held the service and an interpretation was shared with us. In the evening, an introduction was given for each and we each explained where we live and gave our expression of thanks. We sang two hymns in English. At the close of the service, each one came to shake hands and give their well wishes.

We got up early on Monday morning to get started on the school which was located across from the church. The local members had cleared the site and put up the concrete walls. Our project was to fabricate the roof trusses, then lift the trusses in place and cover the roof with tin roofing. There were a lot of willing church members wanting to help and many villagers, adult and children, observing. The brothers from Bay City and Wolcott really knew how to put up the roof in a hurry.

We worked on cutting the lumber to size, planning and assembling 25 school benches and desks. On Monday evening we had a singing and prayer around the supper table. It was truly a time of Christian fellowship. We had a

very heavy rain Tuesday afternoon and night. There were some leaks in the roof where we slept. We had buckets to catch the rain. We also had to use the spray to keep the mosquitos away. On Wednesday, the brothers went to the school early and were finished with the roof by 9:30. Then they came back to Pastor Joseph's home to pack and share the gifts with the family, church members and villagers. We then went back to the church where a large crowd had gathered, and Pastor Joseph and the church deacon spoke of their thanks for all the labor and for the school building where children could now go to school. We all then sang, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again". They sang in Creole and we sang in English and again a heartfelt handshake and farewell was given.

We then started the rough ride back to the mission compound at Keyes. Along the way we saw many poverty stricken homes and families, and many Haitians walking along the road and our hearts felt for them with a longing to help them. On arrival back at the Keyes mission compound, we were immediately surrounded by mission personnel, telling of the mob raid on the mission food warehouse. The food being stolen and many other acts of violence, rebellion and burning were taking place throughout the nation. We were advised by the American ambassador to stay inside and not move about. On Friday we loaded all our luggage and boarded the van, trying to get to Port-au-Prince. We had traveled about 100 miles when we came to a fire barricade across the road with a mob of people behind it. Robert Stewart went to talk to the people and there was no way we could get through.

We went back the 100 miles to the mission compound. We encountered another road block as we arrived back at Keyes and had to turn off on a side road to get to the mission. As we drove through two streams, there was a threatening mob, but we passed safely through. On Saturday we had the same warning, to stay in. By noon Pastor Adoine came from Keyes and said the trucks were coming from Port-au-Prince, so we loaded the bus and started to the airport. The road was all clear and we arrived at the airport. We passed through customs and boarded the plane for Miami. We are so thankful to be home safe, for the care and concern for our safety by Robert Stewart and for the many prayers for us at home and throughout our churches.

We were deeply impressed with the work in helping the Haitian people by Robert Stewart and the World Team organization. We surely can have confidence in them and their work and that the help and aid we send and contribute will all be used for this good work. We would encourage the continuation of the works projects effort in helping to build schools for the children. There are many other needs that we will share with the World Relief Committee.

It has been trained to go over to another pen or truck and these stupid animals follow that goat to the truck and the slaughter! You and I sometimes get carried away and we do not realize just who we are following. Are you and I following the good shepherd, the chief shepherd, the Lord Jesus Christ? Or once in a while get our eyes set on something else that is not the good shepherd, and lose our life as these sheep going to the slaughter?

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil." The valley of the shadow of

death is darkness! Have you ever been in utter, total darkness not really knowing where you are? It is a terrible feeling and you do not know what you could run into. Why did the psalmist, David, write this? Because his chief shepherd is Jesus Christ, God Himself. We run into the valley, where everything seems to be so dark. We do not know exactly which way to turn and what is going on, but we follow the true shepherd: "I will fear no evil, for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."

Let us talk about the shepherd's staff. He uses that staff as protection for the sheep. When the lion or the wolf comes, he uses it to fight these wild beasts. But he also uses his staff for discipline. That shepherd's staff has a hook at the end with which he can reach out and hook a sheep around the neck and stop it dead in its tracks. When the shepherd yanks on that staff and stops that sheep on the run, it hurts. And sometimes, if it is hard enough, will break the sheep's neck. Again, this is you and me. Once in a while God reaches out with His staff, hooks us and stops us cold in our tracks because He loves us and keeps us from other harm. Can you imagine a sheep running away and battling with a lion? Who is going to win? The sheep does not have a chance! We can liken the lion to satan himself and us to the sheep. When we come out from under the protection of the shepherd, we are in deep trouble. A sheep does not have a chance with a lion and we do not have a chance with Satan. If we are out from under the protection of the Shepherd, we are doomed.

"Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies; thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

If we will let the good shepherd be our shepherd and stay close to him, let him discipline, feed and water us, we will find refuge for our souls in heaven above. But if we insist on being on our own and doing our own thing, woe be unto us! God is a God of love; He sent Jesus Christ for us. Today He extends the day of grace and if there is anything that stands between us and God, there is still time to correct it. For tomorrow there is no promise. Won't you please make everything right with God?

SERMON BY BRO. CHARLES HEMMER, PEORIA, IL

THE SHEPHERD AND THE SHEEP Text: Psalm 23

This is an exhortation on the shepherd and the sheep. What is a shepherd? The dictionary tells us that a shepherd is one who cares for and watches over a flock of sheep. The Lord Jesus Christ is the chief shepherd and we are the sheep with the chief shepherd watching over the sheep.

We know from practical experience that domestic sheep are very dumb and may not survive on their own. We read in this beautiful psalm: "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want." If we will let Jesus Christ be our shepherd, there is not one thing that we will want, because we are His sheep. But sheep will cause problems, because they are dumb. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want; He maketh me to lie down in green pastures." A sheep cannot find food on its own. Most animals, if you will let them go, find a prey of some kind; even your dogs and cats, if you do not feed them, will find something somewhere. But a sheep has to be taken to the green pastures; "He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: He leadeth me beside the still waters." We, as sheep, are led to the green pastures. When the sheep are led to the green pastures, they consume not only the top part of the grass, but will eat the roots. They will dig down and eat the nourishing part of the root.

Sheep and cattle have much the same type of stomach. But cattle only have teeth on their lower jaws, while sheep have teeth both on the upper and lower jaws and can dig into the roots and partake of the nourishing roots. Do we, as sheep, partake of the nourishing root of the Word of God or just eat the tops? Where we eat determines what we eat, and what we eat determines the nourishment we are going to receive.

What kind of spiritual food are we eating today? Do we allow ourselves

one spiritual meal a week or many spriritual meals? Just coming to church for a service, going home and never opening the Bible will not give us the roots. We are just eating the top part of the green pasture. The good shepherd watches over His sheep. Some food is harmful and if the sheep get the wrong kind of food, they could actually be killed and destroyed.

Sheep have four stomachs and as they take on food, it goes into the first stomach and stays there until the animal stops, rests and relaxes. And if it keeps on going and does not consider what it has eaten, the food will ferment, create gas, start bloating and death is very near. We take on spiritual food today and what do we do with it? Do we try to digest it? A sheep will go off to the side, lie down and chew its cud. In time, it will bring back the food out of its first stomach, regurgitate, chew and mix it with its digestive juices and, when swallowed again, it goes into the second and third stomachs, and so on.

Do we consider the Word of God and digest it? When you hear a sermon or Sunday school lesson, when you dig into the Word of God, do you sit back and think: what have I read? This makes sense, this does not; and we try to sift it out. Just how does it fit my life? God directed me to read this passage of scripture just to be able to say; well I read several chapters today. We ask the person what he read and he might say, I don't know. Maybe it would be better to read just a few verses and digest them and get to the root. We can get to the root of the Word, and God will bless us.

"He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: He leadeth me beside the still waters." A sheep lives in fear. As we go through the Word, it tells us: "Fear not, fear not because we are His sheep. A sheep will not drink from a

running stream as it is afraid of it. And so the Word tells us: "He leadeth me beside the still waters." There is an account of shepherds of old. When they led their sheep out into the pastures and they needed a drink, and there was a running stream and they were afraid, they would lie down across the water with their bodies and dam up the water so it would be still and the sheep could drink. After they had their drink, they would walk around in the water and play some. But what would they do then? Instead of appreciating what the shepherd had done, they walk over him with their dirty feet. What about you and me? God provides for us the living water, and what do we do? We are just as guilty as those dumb sheep: we walk over the shepherd with our dirty feet. Do we really appreciate what God does for us, or do we take advantage of God?

"He leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul; He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness." Sheep are followers. It is pretty hard to drive sheep; they are dumb and stubborn, but they follow. And we, as God's sheep, are no different. We follow, but what and who are we following? The news media in the world today gets on one thing or another and everybody gets on the band wagon because we are followers. Just a week or so ago there was a big ball game and we all got excited because we are followers, like sheep. The Word tells us that God is going to separate the sheep from the goats. As God's sheep, are we going to follow a goat? In the Peoria stockyards, years ago, and I am not sure but what they still do, they have a goat and when they want to take a herd of sheep from one place to another, rather than drive them, they take this goat that has been trained and put it into the pen of sheep.
