In one experiment, seagulls, which normally feed on fish, were confined and given only grain. Their stomachs gradually changed in structure until they resembled the stomachs of ordinary pigeons, which are grain feeders. I also read of a Brazilian parrot whose color changes from green to vellow when it eats certain fish.

Likewise, in the spiritual realm, we are gradually changed by what we continually take into our minds and hearts. Paul spoke of the beginning of this process in I Thessalonians 2:13. He wrote, "when ye received the word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." (Continued from Page 28) quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty" I Timothy 2:2. The Word tells us to do that, but it will be by His direction, not by man's wisdom.

The United States, Russia, and all other nations will never get together and agree on everything. We know that. God's Word says that it can never be. It will happen only when our Lord Jesus reigns after His return.

"Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air..." The power of the air! We were all caught up in that more or less, and we followed it. We had no help and no recourse because we didn't ask.

"... the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience." Disobeying God's Word, disobeying the truth, disobeying all good teachings comes from a spirit. It's not the way things are, or just the way I am, or the way you are, or the way the world is that causes us to act as we do. We are either under the influence of that evil spirit, or under the Spirit of God.

Look at what the Lord brought us out of. We will probably never realize what desperate straights we were in as unbelievers. If we are faithful and enter heaven, probably we never will be able to comprehend the tragedy of the lost.

Thank God we understood that something needed to be done in our lives to make us right with Him. We needed to receive the Lord Jesus Christ into our hearts, and to follow Him faithfully. If we had not done that, we would be lost. If we had not reached up for help and been converted, if we do not walk in the power of the Holy Spirit, our end would really be terrible.

"Among whom also we all had our conversion in times past..." Paul says that we all walked"... in the lusts of our flesh." Ephesians 2:3. He doesn't even leave himself out. The Apostle Paul had been caught up to the third heaven and saw things that were unspeakable; he couldn't even speak of those wonderful things that he saw. The Lord Himself spoke to him in that vision, saying, "Paul, Paul..." He called his name!

"... had our conversation in times past in the lusts of our flesh..." What did the flesh want? All the desires of the flesh, the pride of life. Our world is really in bad shape if you look at it and think about it. We read the papers. Perhaps some of us turn to the sports pages. What is it all? The pride of life, one of the very things we as believers do not need.

"... fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind; and were by nature the children of wrath, even as others." Ephesians 2:3. That's a terrible finish to a sentence... even as others. We can't look down from a pedestal and say, "Those are all lost." That's where we were at one time and we need to remember that.

We no longer want to walk in the error of that way. We want to walk in the light, and thereby reach out and be a witness, a true witness for the Lord. May God give us insight in whatever circumstance we find ourselves, so that the Spirit working within us will impress on others that they should do something about their eternal destination. Bro. Willis brought that out last Wednesday night.

We can't just say, "Well, I'm safe." We have to stay faithful. Paul says, "... lest... when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." I Corinthians 9:27. We have to take stock of ourselves and make our own calling and election sure.

In the process, with the help of God, we can be a light to others. Let the barbs come and use the shield of faith. Let us not retaliate in the world. That will convince people that we are different. Don't react according to the flesh.

If we are born again, we were at one time with those on the outside without a promise. We were the uncircumcised lost. Think of that song about the ninety and nine. One was out on the hills astray, and rejoicing took place when he was found. In the chorus of that song, we sing, "Rejoice, I have found my sheep!"

"But God, who is rich in mercy..." Ephesians 2:4. God doesn't cut everything short as we might. I have a friend at work who is very militant. If things aren't just exactly right, he is very vocal and says that, "I'll take care of that," or "I'd straighten this out, or that out." We're thankful that maybe we aren't in charge. We are thankful that God is in charge.

His mercy! Look at what has transpired in this world. Still in mercy, He calls out to mankind to repent. He still hasn't "called it a day". He's still letting time go on. But the judgment will come.

"But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love wherewith he loved us." Ephesians 2:4. He surely must have loved us to do what He has done for us. He sent His Son, and that wasn't easy. We can only imagine in a very small degree what that must have been like . . . to send His Son into this wicked world which He had once destroyed because of sin. Then Noah and his three sons and their wives started anew again. And again, transgression.

Then we think of Moses at the tabernacle when the Lord told him to stand back and He would destroy the whole lot of them, and Moses interceded. The Lord surely is rich in mercy and He is still patient with us.

"Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved)" Ephesians 2:5. What a wonderful message! It is still valid today, not just to the church at Ephesus. The world desperately needs this message.

There is no condemnation in Christ Jesus. Condemnation comes to those who don't want to believe or to change their lives. They love darkness rather than light. Christ Himself is the Light.

"And hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus." Ephesians 2:6. We are here together tonight, believers for the most part, and he has raised and lifted us up out of the miry clay and set our feet upon the solid Rock. I know that I don't appreciate it enough.

I don't consider often enough what my condition would be if I weren't a Christian. Still, sometimes I wonder, if we weren't, where we would be tonight. But here we are together, and able to rejoice in the Lord and have fellowship in His name and His Spirit.

"That in the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in his kindness toward us through Christ Jesus." Ephesians 2:7. This is what He has done.

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." Ephesians 2:8. Many times we read in the Word that we are saved by grace. The love that God has for us was demonstrated when He sent His Son to this earth. That Son obediently gave His life. They didn't take it from Him . . . He gave it. By believing upon Him, believing upon that Sacrifice and the Lamb of God, we are saved. That faith is not of ourselves; it is the gift of God.

We are going to earn wages if we sin. The wages are death. Satan will pay those wages. But the gift of God is eternal life.

"Not of works, lest any man should boast." Ephesians 2:9. We are nothing so we cannot say, "We did this or that." That would accomplish nothing at all. After we have believed and are God's children, then we will show by our works whom we are following, who our Captain is, and who our Master is.

"For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." Ephesians 2:10. That isn't contradictory. He is not telling us first one thing, and then another. He is speaking of the new walk of life that we have as His children.

Old things are passed away and all things become new. This is necessary. The old sinful things must pass away, and everything should be new in our walk. Then we will be pleasing to Him, and receive His blessings and His help. Our motivation has changed.

"That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world." Ephesians 2:12. That verse spells complete alienation, darkness, gloom and dismay. "That at that time ye were without Christ"... weren't believers. We didn't believe in the Lord Jesus, not in the fullness we should have, and were aliens with no hope of salvation.

We were not part of Israel. We were not of the right name, the right family, the right lineage. We were strangers from the covenants of promise. We had no hope at all. Not even the slightest bit of hope. Not even a little ray of light. There was just no hope. We were separated from God. What a forsaken condition we were in.

"But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ." Ephesians 2:13. We are His children, or can be.

"For he is our peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us." Ephesians 2:14. That dividing wall was broken down by our Lord and Savior.

"Having abolished in his flesh, the enmity, even the law of commandments contained in ordinances; for to make in himself of twain one new man, so making peace; And that he might reconcile both unto God in one body by the cross, having slain the enmity thereby." Ephesians 2:15, 16. By the cross. That is the only way this can be done.

"And came and preached peace to you which were afar off, and to them that were nigh." Ephesians 2:17. Gentiles heard it. The Israelites, the Hebrew children, the Jews, heard it.

"For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father." Ephesians 2:18. We are thankful that we have this privilege to be grafted in. We also pray God for mercy for those who do not believe. Rather than jest about it, or take it lightly, or treat the unsaved with scorn, we should be praying that God will continue to call and have mercy on those who have rejected Him, both Gentiles and Jews.

"For through him we both (the Jews and the Gentiles) have access by one Spirit unto the Father." Ephesians 2:18. That was an almost unheard of thing to those people. They could hard-

ly receive that. The Holy Spirit inspired Paul to write these words, and we, two thousand years later, can read them and see the wonderful provision that was made for the Gentile people, which we are.

"Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints, and of the household of God." Ephesians 2:19. What a different feeling we have here from that of the twelfth verse! No more strangers and foreigners, no more aliens, but fellow citizens with the saints

Across the way, not too far from here, we have a Mexican border. Many people there have a very meager existence, and they look to this country as a place of hope. They cross the border, and it is illegal unless they go through the right channels. It probably doesn't enter our minds too much because we are Americans, but think how we would feel if we were in their place. We would want to come to a country which has more opportunities and where things are better. What a privilege it would be. In this relationship, we can understand a little bit how it was with the Jew and the Gentile.

"... strangers and foreigners, but (now) fellowcitizens with the saints..." How thankful they must feel when they are assimilated into our society and receive their citizenship. It must be a wonderful thing.

We know how it was when we were alienated from the Lord, and we thank Him that He allowed us to become one of His children. We pray now that we can fight the good fight and hold fast. We are ". . . of the household of God." The most beautiful part!

"And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets . . ." Look at the establishment he has here: "Jesus Christ Himself being the Chief Cornerstone." Ephesians 2:20. So, the next time we are tried, the next time small things give us trouble, when we come into some temptation or trial, may we remember Whose we are, Who purchased us, what was done to receive us and take us in and what Foundation we are on. Then we can stand firm and fast in His strength. Paul was convinced that with the Holy Spirit's help he could do it, and we should be convinced that we can too, with the Spirit's help.

SERMON BY BRO. ALBERT JAMES FUNK OF TUCSON, AZ

Text: Ephesians 2

Did you ever consider that we who are the Gentile people have no blood line of any spiritual use? There is no connection with the seed of Abraham at all. Do you ever think how fortunate we are, we who are not heirs to the blessings that the children of Israel were given, that we have been able to become brothers and sisters of Christ Jesus, who came for His own and His own received Him not?

I sometimes think of the Jewish people, of the Jews who refused the Lord. The Jewish race has suffered much in this world, as we all know . . . great and terrible difficulties and persecutions. They couldn't believe most of them. There were a few believers, but for the most part, blindness overcame Israel. Since the Jews weren't able to or chose not to receive Him, the Lord turned to the Gentile people.

It was all in the plan of God. We can read it. The Lord made no mistake in the Old Testament with the law. It was not a mistake. It was all preliminary to events coming up. We can understand this. Jesus once said that it was not meet to give the children's bread to the dogs, when a woman had asked Him for help. Yet because of her faith and her persistance, He did help her. She requested the crumbs that fell from the children's table.

But the fullness of the Gospel message, the privilege to become sons and daughters of the living God and to walk in the blessings of Jesus Christ, has opened to us wonderfully.

This chapter "spells out to us" how it was with us before we believed, when we were dead in sins, and the mercy that He had toward us. Let us go through the chapter, and see if we can be encouraged by a kindred Spirit with the Word, and an association with the Word.

It thrills our hearts, our spirits, and our souls when we can read these

words together and say, "That's how it is with me." I pray God that He will help me to walk with Him all the days of my life, so that in the end I can be as a "building fitly framed together... unto an holy temple in the Lord." Ephesians 2:21. We are not looking for just a good beginning or a good life in our middle years with the Lord, but to be true and faithful until our life's end.

We don't know yet what we are going to confront in life. Things change tremendously from one day to the next. There is no guarantee at all of life even going on. Are we going to be able to handle every event that comes in our lives? Tomorrow? The next day? Or the day after that? Trials will come, but may the Lord help us through them; it will be by His strength and His help that we'll be able to do anything at all.

Oftentimes we find that our strength is feeble. Men's efforts are so unable to cope with the problems that arise in life. If the Lord is our helper and the Word is truly our charter, we have something wonderful. It's not of this world, and it will carry us on through to heaven. It will help us that much.

"And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins." Ephesians 2:1. Quickened means "made alive". To receive the Gospel message we had to know that we were in darkness, that we were lost and needed help.

The promise in His Word is that He will quicken us and make us alive, if we believe upon Him. It is not dependent on any works that we can do or upon any sacrifices that we can make by giving up things in this life. This can't do it at all.

Believing upon Jesus Christ and then walking a new life with Him is what makes us come alive from the dead out of trespasses and sins.

"Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world,

according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience." Ephesians 2:2. That is so true. We can see ourselves as we were, and we can go out into this world and see the evil of it. There is a system to this world. We know that. There is a power that controls what is happening around us. Why is there war in the world? Why is there unrest in the world? Why aren't countries at peace with each other? We have it so good. We have an easy life if we compare it with times past. Life really isn't that hard, to be honest with our-

Sure, we work; but we are living a pretty good life, most people, especially here in the United States. Then why aren't nations at peace with each other? Why isn't there good will? There is a power at work.

Daniel was confronted by the power of the prince of the kingdom of Persia. He prayed, and the angel couldn't come for three weeks to answer his prayer, or to bring him the message. He prayed for twenty-one days, and finally the angel came and ministered unto Daniel and told him, "From the first day you started praying thy words were heard... but the prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me one and twenty days" and I was hindered and couldn't come. Then he said, "Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me; and now I am come to tell you" what is to take place. Daniel 10:12-14.

So, there is a power in this world. We formerly walked according to that worldly power. It's influence is great. That's why the masses are not walking the Christian, or converted, walk of life. That's why the leaders of our world and of our nation are, for the most part, not God-fearing.

We pray for our leaders and for those of all nations so that "we may lead a (Continued on Page 26)
