

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN WORK PROJECTS

"As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men . . ."

Galatians 6:10

It has been just over 2 years since this Scripture was selected as the motto for the new Apostolic Christian Work Projects Program. Since that time and the first article in the Silver Lining (January 1985) a number of opportunities to work for the Lord have been developed and implemented with more being planned. Perhaps you have not heard too much about this program and would like to learn more.

A brief recap of the program and its purpose may be in order. It is to provide opportunities to serve the Lord on a voluntary basis for those who are so moved to contribute their time, effort and skills. Development and approval of projects will be under the auspices of the Work Projects Committee comprised of members of the Mission and World Relief Committees. Funding will be provided through these committees' funds and other sources as may be required.

In September, 1984, an informational letter, along with volunteer information forms, was sent to all the elders for distribution to their churches. To date, 52 volunteer information forms, representing 29 of our 80+ churches, have been received.

Some of the projects completed or in progress include: Haiti work teams (school roof construction), Honduras school building, Ft. Meyers church construction, Alabama summer school, recruiting for staff and vacation relief for Apostolic Christian Home & Facilities, Haiti grain bin construction, India medical assistance, Resthaven (Elgin) construction, Home Sweet Home renovation (Bloomington), Valparaiso church construction, Alabama storage facilities, Garden Grove, IA, Vacation Bible School and others.

The recently established Food Packaging Center in Bluffton has given many opportunities to help prepare the food packages that are sent to needy brethren and others in Eastern Europe.

Another special project is "Assisting Smaller Congregations To Grow". This project gives guidelines to smaller congregations how growth can be stimulated on both internal and local bases. It also includes accommodating migratory growth from larger congregations in the form of financial assistance where required and approved.

A new project that urgently requires additional volunteers on a current basis is the Mexico City project to rebuild living quarters destroyed in the earthquake.

Future projects in the planning stages include the Taylor, MO, church construction, Lafayette, IN, worship center construction, veterinarian assistance program, tape library and local church volunteer opportunity programs.

In March, 1985, the Work Projects Identification Program was distributed to all of the elders, providing the format for submitting recommendations for new work projects to be considered by the Work Projects Committee. To date, only a handful of suggestions have been received.

If you are interested in participating as a volunteer or in submitting a recommendation for a work project, please contact your elder who has the information and forms available.

Additional information regarding work projects will be included in the next issue of the Missionary and World Relief brochure to be published in the near future. MEXICO CITY WORK PROJECT

More volunteers are urgently needed to help with the construction of two multi-family dwellings in Mexico City. Those with construction skills or willing hands to labor who can spend one or more weeks there will find a blessing in assisting the homeless victims of the earthquake. The project is expected to

take several months to complete. The building materials are being provided by the Apostolic Christian World Relief Fund.

Local congregations are encouraged to assist volunteers from their congregation with the travel, food and lodging expenses. However, supplementary funds for these purposes are also available from the Works Project General Fund.

BIBLE DISTRIBUTION

Greetings in our precious Saviour's name.

Many of our brethren from our congregations have been active in giving and distributing the Bible. Many accounts have been heard of the blessings realized in visiting the homes, rest homes, prisons and rescue missions, when inquiry and request has come from someone wishing to have a Bible or Testament. Many requests come from individuals who have sight problems, where a large print Bible or Testament enables them to read again. We now have the KJV of the Bible on cassette tapes for those persons who can no longer see. For the blind, we have sets of braille Bibles in stock, ready for those needing a braille Bible.

During the past two years, 24,702 Bibles and Testaments have been shipped to our congregations for distribution by our brethren.

WASHINGTON, D.C. Ed Aeschleman

As pointed out in "Marching To Zion", increased industrialization and declining demand for labor on the farms has led many Apostolic Christians to seek employment in towns and cities where churches had never been established. Washington, D.C. is one of these areas where quite a large number of people with Apostolic Christian backgrounds now work and live.

To make it possible for these people to again avail themselves of the "church of their youth", services are now being scheduled in the Washington, D.C. area. The first service was held Sunday, May 11, 1986, by Elder Bro. Corbin Bahler and Bro. Ed Aeschleman. A total of 23 adults and 4 children attended with 17 of these from the Washington, D.C. area.

The staff and children are eagerly looking forward to summer with its many activities. Summer jobs with the job training program are being arranged. The East House is planning a vacation out East. The West House is planning a vacation in Kentucky. The children are earning some of their vacation money with a garage sale and a car wash. Some of the children are currently participating in community activities such as 4-H projects, candy striping, working in a grocery store and working in a nursing home. It is extremely rewarding to see our children being productive in the community in which they live. It gives them a sense of "belonging" and "contributing", two much needed factors for their selfesteem. Two sixth grade boys, accompanied by their housemother, joined their class from Leo school for a oneday trip to Chicago, IL, where they toured the Sears Tower, Fields Museum and the Museum of Science and Industry — a real learning experience.

The annual recognition dinner for retiring board members was held May 16. Our two retiring board members are Bro. Stan Hodel (Roanoke, IL) and Bro. Urb Bauer (Cissna Park, IL). Our two new board members are Bro. Bob Indermuhle (Sardis, OH) and Bro. Jack Krantz (Morton, IL).

Bro. Gottlieb was born December 26, 1902, in the southern part of the Black Forest. He was one of eight children (of whom two others survive) in a Lutheran household. Sis. Emily's parents (Lauser by name) were originally farmers in a smaller village wherein was our church, but when they bought a store and moved to Heidelberg, our church met in their home. Sis. Emily was the youngest of 17 children, ten of whom lived to adulthood. Now she is the only one of her family left and was blessed with another birthday May 5.

Gottlieb came to the United States in 1926. Originally, he had considered

going to visit a cousin in New York, but when that cousin moved, he came instead to Chicago where another cousin lived. Emily came to the United States in a more roundabout way. First she went to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, where she had a sister. After being there for a year, she decided to come to the United States. In Peoria, IL, she had another sister, Hilda. There she worked, as did her sister, for rich families, learning the language and working toward bettering herself. Eventually she moved to Chicago as part of that process.

Gottlieb came to our church in Chicago because he had gone to school with the Haas brothers. For Emily it was her church. And so they met because of their church ties (a way that comes highly recommended). Though they were committed to marrying one another as much as two years earlier, because of the Depression and tough times financially, they waited until May 27, 1933.

Gottlieb and Emily lived in an apartment until the rent was raised from \$35 to \$42. They decided then to buy a house, and in 1937 bought the house at 3046 N. Natchez Ave. for \$5500. They paid it off in five years (by careful saving, I'm sure) and lived there for 49 years — until their move this spring to the Elgin Resthaven apartment.

Shortly after their marriage, Gottlieb was laid off at Stewart-Warner. They lived on savings and then he found work for 11/2 years as a janitor at Sears' 79th St. store. He went back to Stewart-Warner then, operating an automatic screw-making machine and continued in that same kind of work, never being without work again. Gottlieb said that the war years brought more money. Before that, times were difficult (rather an understatement, I think). Later he worked for others who began their own, similar, businesses and asked him to work for them. In fact, he worked up until several years ago. Near the last he had finally cut down to only half days.

In 1940 Gottlieb and Emily took the most important step in their lives, repenting and allowing the Lord to convert them. They have been an asset to the church in their quiet witness and many years of Christian hospitality.

Especially after their trips — some within the United States, to Mexico, through the Panama Canal and around the South American continent, several

times to Germany and England and the European continent — they would share their trip, their home and their love in fellowship. They have brought mementoes back for many, as well. Their trip to the Holy Land was quite a highlight for them.

Their three children, too, and their children's children, have been special blessings from the Lord. Daughters, Esther and Nancy, are both married. Esther lives in England. Nancy lives in South Dakota with her husband and three children. Their son, John, and his wife live in Glen Ellyn, IL, and also have three children.

At the end of the evening, we left Bro. Gottlieb and Sis. Emily in their beautiful apartment. The yellow tulips in front of Resthaven were reflected in their sunny smiles. They seem more relaxed now with the facilities available to them, taking care of each other, still sometimes playful even. "Keep the faith," Gottlieb said. They have certainly given us an example of that kind of perseverance.

This morning a lot of people have no desire to be in church. Be thankful that God has given you the faith and the desire to come here. My heart aches when I think of those not in church this morning. I know some who are not in church, and you probably do too. There is a continual burden on my heart for those who are lost.

There may be someone here who is lost, someone who is living without hope, someone who realizes, whether you admit it or not, that you are lost. May the Holy Spirit speak to you this morning, and in the power of God convict you in your sin so that somehow, by the grace of God, He can start to work on you. It's time for you to start the work on your soul's salvation, and work it out in trembling fear of God.

I once heard a man say that he didn't fear God. It shocked me because I knew this man quite well. He attends another church very close to where I

live. He said that he didn't fear God, and I couldn't understand it. His name is Coy. I said, "Coy, the Word says, 'Fear God, and keep His commandments." Ecclesiastes 12:13. He dropped it there, but I had felt it a duty to remind him of what the Word says. He was a close friend. If we fear God, we will keep His commandments to the best of our ability, won't we?

The hospitals are filled today with people who are there as a result of not facing reality. Why do people get sick? The reasons vary an awful lot, but it seems to me that a good percentage of people get sick because of a failure to face reality, of trying to make something be that is not. We should accept life as it really is, be ourself, and not try to be something we are not. Pretending ... that's hypocrisy. If we pretend and try to make-believe, pretty soon tension builds up.

It is the same when a person tells a lie. That lie automatically puts tension on you. When somebody asks you a question about the subject, you have to think, "Now what did I say?" You have to repeat the same thing, to lie in the same manner. That's one of the many reasons why we should never lie.

In verse ten of the chapter which we read, we are told that "... the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night ..." at a time when we least expect it. Probably there is someone here who doubts that the Lord is coming soon. We don't know, of course, but He's coming. In the world, people doubt and ask questions, such as, "Where is the promise of His coming?" II Peter 3:4. We read this already. There is doubt. There is a lack of faith.

If you are not a Christian this morning, it is probably because you don't have enough faith. If you have enough faith to be humble and surrender your will into the will of God, then God will meet you, and He will start to work in your life.

We are reminded that the heavens and the earth will pass away. "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved," the question is asked, "what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness, looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God, wherein the heavens being on fire shall be dissolved" (the heavens being on fire shall be dissolved!), "and the elements shall melt with fervent heat?" II Peter 3:12.

I don't think that I can even imagine

what heaven is like. I feel guilty, sometimes, of sort of dreaming. I like to dream, I guess. But even in my most private dreams, I cannot imagine what heaven—or hell—will really be like. I've got my own thoughts about it, but I don't really know. I'm confident that heaven is the place for me. By the grace of God, through the shed blood of Jesus, that is where I am planning to spend eternity.

"Seek ye the Lord while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near: Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return," if we have drifted, "unto the Lord". Isaiah 55:6, 7. We should live and walk as close to God as we can. How terrible it is to be separated from God! We fail, don't we, many times? We often look too much on the material things of life because that is what we can touch, see and feel.

I once read, and can remember some of it, about how money had corrupted the world and the minds of men. It went as follows:

Money can buy a bed, but it can't buy sleep.

Money can buy a house, but it can't buy a home.

Money can buy medicine, but it can't buy health.

Money can buy many things, but it can't buy love.

The Word says that "... the love of money is the root of all evil." I Timothy 6:10. Love is the one thing that will make us happy in this world. Oh, the unending, boundless mercy of God. God is love, and the love of God that is in our hearts is what makes us happy! I rejoice this morning that the love of God is in my heart, and I pray that it is in yours. If the love of God is not in your heart, then you are missing the most joy in this world. Pretty soon life will be over, and we will stand before Jesus Christ, God Himself, who loves us so much, and who is so merciful!

I sometimes think about how we fail God so miserably in our weakness, in our times of some major disobedience or in whatever our lot might be. We fail sometimes. We try every day to do what we ought to do, don't we? Sure we do. We try. But we come so short in comparison with what God has done for us.

To be justified is to become just as if we had never sinned, through the shed blood of Jesus. To be sanctified is to be set apart, and to not be a part of this world. Sanctified and justified. What a blessed feeling it is to not have to worry about death, to not have to fear death.

When I was a little boy, I was afraid of the dark. Some of you might have been, but I was. I was scared in the dark. When I used to go to bed, I looked at a little plaque on my wall that glowed in the dark, and I will never forget it. I know you know it and have prayed it. It said:

Now I lay me down to sleep; I pray Thee, Lord, my soul to keep. If I should die before I wake,

I pray Thee, Lord, my soul to take. I prayed that prayer as a little boy every night. Some nights I pray it today as a man. It's simple, but that is what I pray . . . that God will keep me; and if He should come as a thief in the night at a time when perhaps I am not as spiritually awake as I ought to be, that I will go to be with Him, and that I will be with you and all those Christians who have gone on before in all eternity.

In the last part of the chapter, we read and were warned about being careful in preparing for the day of the coming of the Lord. I'd like to read once more the seventeenth verse: "Ye therefore, beloved, seeing ye know these things before, beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own stedfastness." II Peter 3:17. Yes, we can fall. We can fall if we turn away from God.

When we realize that we are lost sinners, when we realize that we are doomed for hell, we are convicted by our sin. We realize suddenly that we are headed for hell, and that we are following the devil and all that he teaches and stands for. Then we can make a great change in our lives. Then we no longer desire to follow after the world. We are sorry for our sin, and repent of it.

We allow ourselves to be transformed by the renewing of our minds. We turn around one hundred-eighty degrees, and we face God and we walk toward God. As long as we walk toward Him, as long as we are living for Him, as long as we are on that narrow pathway that is leading to heaven, then we will be ready when He comes back.

But if you turn your head a little and look on either side, you'll see many things that will entice you. The devil has prepared many snares. He tells lies to try and trick us, the church, to turn away from God. But if we keep our

sights on the glory and beauty of heaven, and on the cross between us and heaven, if we can envisage the blood that flows down that cross, we'll be ready by the grace of God.

I hope and trust that each of you is a Christian, a child of God. My heart bleeds for you if you are lost. My deep desire is that, if you are lost, God will soften your heart and help you to realize what you need to do, and that He will break your stubborn will.

Most likely you do have faith enough to believe in God. You know that there is a God. You do not doubt that there is a God, but you can't break loose from that grip that the devil has on you. You can't lay aside your own thoughts, your own will, your own stubbornness, and your own pride. These things we must give up, and surrender ourselves into the will of God.

We need only say, "Lord, here I am. Take me and use me. Do with me, Lord, whatever you want." We need to lay aside the "me", and the "I", and "what I want". Surrender into the will of God. Then God will bless you! There is no greater standing in all the world. There is just no way I can describe it this morning. I've tried many times, but I can't think of the words (I don't believe the words are in Webster's Dictionary) that can describe the peace that God's people have!

When I was a small boy, before my Mother died, I used to go home after Sunday school, and she would ask "What did you learn?" I am thankful for those times and days. I am thankful for the example in our home.

I hope that you and I, as God's people and as parents, can be good examples in the world today, that we can let our lights shine to the honor and glory of God. Oh yes, we have a duty to each other. We ought to try to live together in peace as much as lieth within us, but yet, let us live for God. He sees our hearts. He knows our hearts. He knows our thoughts. He knows our motives. He knows YOU.

When you enter into your "closet" to utter that private prayer as you so often do, no doubt, I ask you to pray for me that I might always lay aside my own will and let my will become God's will. If I can do that, I know I will be ready when He comes.

May the Lord bless the words that we have read together this morning.

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. LAVOYD MOORE OF ATHENS, AL

Text: II Peter 3

This particular chapter contains so many simple and wonderful teachings of God that it would be hard to discuss all of them during the time in which we are assembled on this Lord's Day.

Consider the impressive beginning. In the very first verse was written: "This I write in order to stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance." II Peter 3:1. Yes, we have to stir ourselves, don't we? From the youngest of us to the oldest, we have to go back in time occasionally, and remember our repentance, our conversion and our baptism.

We were vividly reminded last evening, when we heard the words of those who recently have found peace in their lives, of our own conversion, and of the time before that when we were lost and without hope.

It is wonderful to live day by day with peace and joy in our hearts, believing that should we die, we stand ready to meet the Lord face to face. I know that many of us long for that day, and we pray for God's will to be done so that the return of our Lord and Saviour might be soon. I long for that day.

I don't know exactly how it is going to be, but I'm sure that it will be for our good. God would not allow anything that would not be good for us. Anything else would be our own doing, would it not? The Word says, "... all things work together for good to them that love God..." Romans 8:28.

Sometimes we have a cross to bear and things are rather hard. But whatever our cross, compared with the cross that Jesus hung on, it is not much to bear. No, it's not very much. He hung on Calvary's cross and gave His life for you and me. He suffered for you and me.

It would be good if each day we took a little trip in our thinking back to Calvary. In our thoughts we should see the Lord Jesus Christ hanging on Calvary's cross with the crown of thorns upon His head, humbly surrendering Himself in obedience. Yes, even unto death. Why? Because of love . . . God's love for you and me. He was willing to do this.

When we get discouraged and weary (and we all do), and think that our cross is pretty heavy, let's think of that cross. Think of the cross that Jesus carried. He carried it Himself, and then He was crucified on it. We need to stir up our thoughts and remember this as often as we can.

We heard last night that the Word says to pray without ceasing. Whenever we have a free moment, that free moment of thinking can be used for prayer wherever we are.

It is important that we are always aware that it is quite likely we are living in the last days. We are warned that in those days scoffers will walk after their own lusts, questioning the Word of God and questioning the authority and the power of God. People are raising such questions today wherever you look.

I know people who like to argue and debate the Word of God. The Word of God is not debatable. It is the true Word of God and cannot be changed. It is important that we discuss it, but on a careful basis. I would never argue or debate the Word of God, but some people try to stir up problems and troubles. The world is filled with troublemakers.

I am glad to be one of you today, of the church, of the bride of Christ. We are not troublemakers, are we? We are peacemakers. We must be peacemakers. Within the life of a peacemaker, there cannot be hate, envy, strife or malice. If such would be in our lives, it would be wrong. It cannot continue. If it does, it must be done away with.

We can read in Romans that when we arise out of the baptismal waters,

we must not continue in sin. The Word says God forbid that we would continue in sin. It should not be. Each of us will give account unto God for all the things that we do, including all the hidden things that are covered up, that perhaps no one knows about except God. Individually, we must work out our own salvation in trembling fear of God.

The earth was once covered with water and all perished except Noah and his family. One day soon, the end of time is coming when each of us will leave this life in one way or another. We will then spend eternity in either heaven or in hell.

That is a reality that we must face. We may die this very day. Let us ask ourselves these questions: "Where will I spend eternity?" "When I stand before the Son of God, the Lord Jesus Christ, and give account of my life, what will He tell me?" "What will He say to me?" "Will I hear the words, 'Well done, good and faithful servant'?" Are you a good and faithful servant of God this morning? Or will you hear the words, "Depart from me. I never knew you."

It will be too late then to try to do anything. It will be too late when you stand there. There won't be a lawyer to plead your case. There won't be anybody there to try to twist the facts a little bit. The facts are being recorded now, beloved. Whatever we are doing this day is being recorded very carefully. On Judgment Day, all things will be revealed.

We are warned that "... the heavens and the earth, which are now, by the same word are kept in store, reserved unto fire against the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men." II Peter 3:7. It is sad when we look around and see how many people live such ungodly lives.
