

MEXICO CITY RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT

Reconstruction of the apartments is moving along nicely and may God bless the 50 brothers, sisters and friends that have given of their time and resources to go to Mexico City and help with the rebuilding. So many have expressed the blesing they have received as a result of being there and they are thankful to God for the blessings at home. The people of the Morales-Tepito area, especially the children that are orphaned, with their pleading eyes, and widowed mothers. have a way of getting to your heartstrings, and cause tears in the eyes of our work teams.

Construction is well underway on Pintora 53, one of the buildings that our church is financing, that will be 3 stories high and provide living accommodations for 12 families. At the other site, Peluguras 66, all of the debris have been cleaned and hauled away and hopefully we will be able to start shortly.

The Morales-Tepito area of Mexico City was poor before the quake, and unfortunately since then many are devastated. The crying and pleading of the people for help to restore their buildings is oftentimes hard to walk away from. The government, many times, gives them a short time to move out, but yet provides no place for them to go except in make-shift shelters.

May the Lord bless all that have given of themselves and may many more brothers and friends answer the call to help a thankful and needy people.

We're thankful that Bro. Tim Reinhard (Latty, OH) has taken advantage of the opportunity to serve as site coor-

dinator for an extended period of time and trust that the Lord will bless him for his efforts.

> John Klotzle Works Project

The Mexico City Rebuilding Work Project got under way the latter part of May with the first Work Projects Volunteers. Bros. Brian and Paul Fehr (Roanoke, IN) and Luis Gomez (Washington, IL) comprising the vanguard. Since that time, over 70 volunteers, representing 17 churches, have participated. This has been an opportunity primarily for men, brothers and friends alike, since the work involves construction and heavy physical labor. However, even willing volunteers in their ninetys (Bros. Sam Bachtold and Nathan Kellenberger) have participated, doing their part for the Lord.

At the onset, the volunteers helped at various sites in the Tepito area until the first of the two sites assigned to the Apostolic Christian Church (53 Pintora and 66 Peluguras) was ready for construction. The slab has been poured and cement block work begun at the first of these.

Lord willing, these Work Projects will last well into the first part of 1987 at least. There will be an ongoing need for volunteers throughout its tenure. As time passes, the work assignments are being refined and better coordinated. Please search your hearts and schedules to see if this might not be a calling from Above to help in bringing much needed love and shelter to the earthquake victims in Mexico City. IN MEMORY - EDITORS: HENRY SOUDER EDWARD SOUDER

We are pleased to learn that the food parcels packaged and shipped from our Bluffton Distribution Center are reaching our beneficiaries in good condition. In addition to letters from a number of families in Romania, we received an official message via the U.S. State Department to verify the facts. As reported in our previous news report, Secretary of State George Shultz has personally interceded to Romanian president, N. Ceausescu, in behalf of the Nazarenes in that country during his visit in December, 1985. In addition, our Ambassador to Bucharest, Roger Kirk, is keeping close contact by sending two Embassy Counselors to interview Nazarene elders and members in their homes in several cities.

Here are some brief excerpts from their report as transmitted from Bucharest to the State Department in Washington, and relayed to us:

Contact With Romanian Nazarenes...

"... using mailing list, on June 3, in the city of T... Emb. Off. spent 8 hours contacting several Nazarenes ... all said their food packages were arriving regularly, without difficulty... no one indicated any difficulties regarding customs formalities or loss of items from parcels. There are no payments required of recipients such as handling fees or other."

"We also spoke with Nazarene leader C...B... in the city of T... who is not a parcel recipient and others who are not on the list. Though very guard-

ed, B . . . (and others we spoke with) generally indicated Nazarenes in T... are able to practice their religion quietly without current harrassment. The building owned by the congregation and used as a place of worship was confiscated by the government in 1982 and demolished in the course of urban renewal. At that time, the congregation was also fined for its "illegal" religious activities. Since then, B... and others confirmed they have generally been able to meet Sundays for prayer in the homes of various members of the congregation without police interference. They hope this situation will continue as long as they are not overly visible."

On June 9 the same embassy officers visited another area where a large number of Nazarene believers live.

"E. O. were successful in contacting Romanian Nazarene leader A. V. . . . June 9. In a one-and-a-half hour conversation, he confirmed that the packages are coming through to Romanian Nazarenes generally without impediment. As in T. . ., he said, the congregation in A . . . currently is able to hold prayer meetings without interference from the authorities. He made clear, however, his view that this resulted from keeping a low profile."

He indicated difficulty in communicating with others of the Nazarene faith outside of Romania, and expressed warm gratitude for offers to assist in this in the future. He gave P. C. more than 50 new names of deserving church members whom he hoped could be added to the list of those receiving food packages. He also had suggestions to improve "mechanism" for receiving food packages . . . There was also some comment on the possibility of changing the contents list, to eliminate some items less appropriate or desirable, in favor of others more needed. This topic was raised only briefly and seemed more in nature of "fine-tuning" the system than a significant need for change. We would appreciate any comment the U.S. donors might have on this and, if it seems useful and possible to the donors, would discuss with V... what changes in contents Romanian recipients would like to see made."

BIBLE DISTRIBUTION

Greetings in love and esteem in our dear Saviour's name.

The Lord has surely blessed the labors of our brethren in giving and distributing the Bible and New Testaments this past year, with 18,247 Bibles being shipped to our churches. Many opportunities were found to give and share God's Word. Bibles were given to individuals, placed in prisons, reformatories, rescue missions, the Salvation Army, in motels, doctor and optometrist offices, sent with food and clothing shipments to the needy, sent with mission teams to India, Haiti, Mexico and Central America. Bible tapes and braille Bibles were provided for the blind and for those with poor eyesight. Brethren in several church areas have been able to work together to expand the outreach in giving the Bible.

With many revisions of the Bible being offered to the people today, we have grave concern about the additions, deletions, changes and paraphrase that has changed the thought and meaning of the Word. We remain committed to giving the King James Version and will be providing Bibles, tapes and Testaments of the King James Version.

House of Representatives, has played a significant role since 1974. His family ties with the Apostolic Christian faith dates back to the early days of Bro. Samuel H. Froehlich in Switzerland. We are deeply indebted to him for his untiring efforts in this noble cause.

During our visit last year, we learned that in Yugoslavia there were a number of brethren in prison for refusal to bear arms. One was serving a third and two or three were serving their second terms. Upon our return, we contacted the offices of Congressman Michel and he in turn made contact with the State Department. Within a couple of months, the brethren serving second and third terms were released and sent home to their families.

Very recently we learned from returning visitors to Yugoslavia, that two young brothers were released from prison in June after completing their military duty and upon arrival at the train station near their home, they were immediately picked up by the authorities and returned to prison for their second term. This greatly saddened the entire church community in Yugoslavia and elsewhere.

Beloved, let us continue our pleadings before the throne of grace for these oppressed brethren; perhaps God will hear our united, fervent prayers and will soften the heart of these modern day Pharaohs, to "let His people go".

(Continued from Page 28) tiles by my mouth should hear the word of the gospel, and believe". How wonderful it is that we can sit here today as Gentiles and have that opportunity We can believe by faith alone, having never seen Jesus or the apostles, through the Word of God that has been handed down in the scriptures which are here before us.

What good does it do us if the scriptures are laid before us and we do not read therein for ourselves? If we do not see the glory that we can receive, all the glory that God has prepared for us?

Or, if we do not believe, to see the

terrible things that God has in store for us, to learn that someday God will say, "Depart from Me, for I know not thee." We will have to serve Satan throughout eternity as a live soul if we do not believe in God and have this faith, just as the unbelieving are serving him now.

That might sound strange. Maybe we've never quite thought this out, that we have to serve one or the other. If we are not serving God to the best of our ability and in every way possible that we can serve Him every day of our life, then we are serving Satan. We glorify Satan because we cannot be in the middle of the fence. Whenever we are not serving God, we are serving Satan.

"And God, which knoweth the hearts, bare them witness, giving them the Holy Ghost, as he did unto us." Acts 15:8. Much is said about the Holy Ghost. Much is said across the pulpit and in the Sunday school rooms about the Holy Ghost. Yet we do not use the power of the Holy Ghost to His fullest. We do not rely upon Him because we do not wait upon Him.

We realize that whatever we grasp and hold on to is going to burn with us, if we do not make a commitment to the Lord and separate ourselves.

We should grab hold of the Silver Cord that the songwriter writes about. Oh, to think about being severed from that Silver Cord in a way other than being in paradise.

"But we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved, even as they. Then all the multitude kept silence, and gave audience to Barnabas and Paul, declaring what miracles and wonders God had wrought among the Gentiles by them." Acts 15:11, 12. They heard about the wonderful miracles and they could see lives being changed. They probably had many questions in their minds, but they could see the beauty of it.

"And after they had held their peace, James answered, saying, Men and brethren, hearken unto me: Simeon hath declared how God at the first did visit the Gentiles, to take out of them a people for his name. And to this agree the words of the prophets: as it is written . . ." Acts 15:13, 14, 15.

We all know that the Israelite people were chosen to bring God's Word down through the ages, giving us those wonderful stories of old and telling how God worked in their lives. We also learn how Satan could work in the hearts of those people who were chosen by God, leading many of them to destruction.

If we can't feel the Holy Spirit working in us, saying, "You'd better go back to the foot of the cross," then God might have given us up.

I believe that that is happening to many souls. I believe that there are many who, even if they were once converted and had that beautiful feeling of peace inside, are slipping away. They don't even feel the Holy Spirit anymore because they rationalized themselves right out of the Christian realm. God is just letting them fill out their lives, and someday will take them. Someday their lives, and ours, will be finished. But what is their future? If we can't feel the Holy Spirit moving us, then we can't feel close to God.

"Known unto God are all his works from the beginning of the world. Wherefore my sentence is, that we trouble not them, which from among the Gentiles are turned to God: But that we write unto them, that they abstain from pollutions of idols, and from fornication, and from things strangled, and from blood. For Moses of old time hath in every city them that preach him, being read in the synagogues every sabbath day. Then pleased it the apostles and elders, with the whole church, to send chosen men of their own company to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas; namely, Judas surnamed Barsabas. and Silas, chief men among the brethren: And they wrote letters by them after this manner: The apostles and elders and brethren send greeting unto the brethren which are of the Gentiles in Antioch and Syria and Cilicia." Acts 15:18-23.

Those dear brothers of years ago sent these greetings to churches all over the land. They sent these letters with guidance from God. Now we can sit here today and enjoy the beautiful greetings and learn from the beautiful contents. We can weigh them in our minds, and apply them to our lives today.

They could have been written yesterday. It is just as though Paul were walking this earth today. The concerns are the same, and the problems were basically the same. If we look at it in that light, then the solutions, too, can be the same.

SERMON BY BRO. RALPH E. GARBER OF MORTON, IL

Text: Joshua 20 & Acts 15:1-23

Our first reading this afternoon told of Joshua, a man who had to be strong in faith to obey God in every command that was given to him. We know that Joshua was so strong in his faith that he was one of the great leaders of the Israelite people.

One of God's commands was to designate certain cities, called the "cities of the avenger of blood," to be a place of refuge to those people who had sinned, but who had done it without wrath in their hearts.

Today God has also given us refuge for the sins that we commit, not only for those that we do without wrath, but for all of our sins, even though we do them thinking in our minds what has to be done in order to receive the forgiveness (or refuge) that Jesus Christ has provided.

We read in the second scripture opening this afternoon: "And certain men which came down from Judea taught the brethren, and said, Except ye be circumcised after the manner of Moses, ye cannot be saved." Acts 15:1. (We all know that this was not meant for us.) A decision was then made.

"When therefore Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and disputation with them, they determined that Paul and Barnabas, and certain other of them, should go up to Jerusalem unto the apostles and elders about this question." Acts 15:2. We see that there was "no small dissention" in those times about the question of circumcision. Some men said that it had to be done, and some said that it did not have to be done.

As they gathered in those days, they, too, had trials amongst themselves. They, too, had dissension about whether certain things were right or certain things were wrong. Down through the ages, our churches have had this. As long as men live on this earth, there will be questions about what is right and what is wrong.

As we read, we think of the Apostle Paul, and Barnabas, and those men. They knew that they were doing the will of God, because they were sent to minister to the people of that time. Then we question in our minds, do we not, why they had this dissension, why they had this argument amongst themselves. Why couldn't this thing be worked out?

We ask ourselves, "Why do these things pop up? Why do we have trouble making decisions, especially in our church when we are a God-fearing people?" We have the Holy Spirit's guidance as the early Christians did. We wonder about this, knowing that all things come from God and knowing that we should be thankful for all things.

We have to approach these differences with the right frame of mind. If we are so determined that our own will be done that we will not listen to reason, that we will not open the Word of God and read the scriptures, and then search earnestly to determine God's will, many souls will be hurt.

We cannot come into the sanctuary or into any discussion with a mind that is already made up. We cannot come into a discussion knowing that the other person is wrong, and we're right. We have to approach this with a humble attitude, and if pride is present, the right decision cannot be made.

"And being brought on their way by the church, they passed through Phenice and Samaria, declaring the conversion of the Gentiles; and they caused great joy unto all the brethren And when they were come to Jerusalem, they were received of the church, and of the apostles and elders, and they declared all things that God had done with them." Acts 15:3, 4.

Isn't this something that we can do today? Wherever we go, to whatever city, to whomever we work with, can we not declare what God has done for us?

These people spoke to others so that they, too, could have faith and believe.

In this world there is so much sin, so much sorrow, so much sickness, and we know that not only believers but non-believers are afflicted. Death and suffering come to all.

A person who is humble and has an open mind, who professes to be a Christian, is still respected today. Sometimes we may not think so, but just walk into a group of non-believers and see how the conversation changes if we are different. If we ourselves stand on the commitment that we have made, then the conversation does change. If we do not stand fast upon it, then maybe the conversation will go on just as it was. We know which it should be

"But there rose up certain of the sect of the Pharisees which believed, saying, That is was needful to circumcise them, and to command them to keep the law of Moses was no longer in affect. They did not realize that when Jesus hung on the cross and shed His blood that the veil of the temple was rent and things were changed. There was no longer any difference between the Jews and the Gentiles. The high priest no longer had to intercede because each one of us now has direct access to God through Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ took away the veil that separated the people from God.

"And the apostles and elders came together for to consider of this matter. And when there had been much disputing, Peter rose up, and said unto them, Men and brethren, ye know how that a good while ago God made choice among us, that the Gentiles by my mouth should hear the word of the gospel, and believe." Acts 15:6, 7. We know what Jesus said to Perer, that he would be a solid rock and would build His church.

Peter said here, ". . . that the Gen-(Continued on Page 26)
