This is the challenge we have before us in the new year.

We are taught in Philippians 4:8, "... Whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report ..., Think on these things." Let's pray for grace in the new year to think all kinds of nice things about others, to say all kinds of nice things to others, and to be very kind and courteous to others. BIBLE DISTRIBUTION

Greetings in love and esteem in our dear Saviour's name.

The Lord has surely blessed the labors of our brethren in giving and distributing the Bible and New Testaments this past year, with 18,247 Bibles being shipped to our churches. Many opportunities were found to give and share God's Word. Bibles were given to individuals, placed in prisons, reformatories, rescue missions, the Salvation Army, in motels, doctor and optometrist offices, sent with food and clothing shipments to the needy, sent with mission teams to India, Haiti, Mexico and Central America. Bible tapes and braille Bibles were provided for the blind and for those with poor eyesight. Brethren in several church areas have been able to work together to expand the outreach in giving the Bible.

With many revisions of the Bible being offered to the people today, we have grave concern about the additions, deletions, changes and paraphrase that have changed the thought and meaning of the Word. We remain committed to giving the King James Version and will be providing Bibles, tapes and Testaments of the King James Version.

SISTER NEEDED TO TEACH IN JAPAN

Dear Brothers and Sisters-in-the-Lord,

We send you warm greetings of love in Jesus name. Our precious Word tells us, "... the prayer of a righteous man availeth much . ..". And we are so appreciative of the prayers many of you breathe for the brethren, friends and work here in Japan.

We write you today with a specific need we wish to share, however. As many of you know, our church operates two basic outreach programs here in Japan: an English school and a private kindergarten. And our need today has to do with finding a sister to teach in our kindergarten.

The Shioda-American kindergarten is located in the country about one and a half hours drive from the western suburbs of Tokyo. It is a 2-year comprehensive, Christian-based English kindergarten program for 32 Japanese children. This program has served area children for nearly 20 years, and our Lord who knows all and sees all has continued to provide for our needs.

Over the years our system has developed to include a classroom for 16 four-year-old entering students and a classroom for 16 five-year-old second year students. God directed, willing sisters have been offering services for these precious children on a two-year or longer rotation plan. The sisters' transportation to and from America, housing, health insurance, a monthly

expense stipend (approximately \$600), a domestic travel package (approximately \$450) and an annual bonus (approximately \$600) are provided.

Sis. Sheila Moser (Lester, IA) will be completing 3 years of service in July, and is scheduled to return to the States. Therefore, we are praying for God to provide another willing sister to teach. We are searching for a sister who:

- 1) Is a mature Christian woman and a sister in good standing with the church.
- 2) Feels she is unquestionably led by the Father for humble service.
- 3) Holds a bachelors degree in education in the fields of either English as a second language, elementary education, special education, speech pathology, early childhood education or a related field.
- 4) Is an individual that is flexible, willing to begin studying/using a foreign language and is able to fully support a church which is located in a different culture and a country with less than a 1% Christian population.

We would like to leave you with several scriptural passages:

- Luke 1:37; With God all things are possible.
- Isaiah 6:8; I heard the voice of the Lord saying, whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I, send me.
- Matthew 28:18; Go ye therefore unto all nations, teaching them all

things whatsoever I have commanded you. Baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. And lo I will be with you alway even unto the end of the world.

If the spirit is speaking to your heart today, we beg you to confer with your local elder, who in turn will contact our Missionary Committee representative, Elder Bro. Ben Maibach. He will then contact the team here in Japan. If you do have questions concerning your role here or any other details, feel free to contact us. If you are not eligible for this position, we humbly ask for your sincere prayers.

'Yes,' answered Mr. Sankey, 'in the spring of 1860.'

'Can you remember if you were do-

ing picket duty on a bright moonlight night in 1862?'

'Yes,' answered Mr. Sankey, very much surprised.

'So did I,' said the stranger, 'but I was serving on the Confederate Army. When I saw you standing at your post, I said to myself, 'That fellow will never get away from here alive.' I raised my musket and took aim. I was standing in the shadow, completely concealed, while the full light of moon was falling upon you. (Continued from Page 32) vided from the land so that there would be dry land and there would be sea, and it was so. And it was on the third day that God made the grass and the herbs, which have fruit and seed and it says "whose seed was in itself." The grass will grow and it is not even necessary for us to go to great lengths. Once the surface of the earth is scratched and left alone it will revert back to grass as the seed is there and within itself, because "The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof." He founded and established it and on the third day He made that grass and the trees bearing fruit after their kind, whose seed was in themselves. And then on the fifth day He created the animals and provided the environment and the food before He created the creature. And it is still the same, if we will but trust and believe in Him. The food is there before we are, because God provides and cares for His own.

We are living in a dark and troubled world, in the greatest technological society the world has ever known. Yet we have seen in recent months what happens when man's technology fails! We have found that it can fail; that there are some things which are beyond the hand of man.

Men make four assumptions in life which are not correct. One of them is that wealth is riches, which is not true. Another assumption is that a house makes a home, which is not true. We are reaching a point where there is almost one divorce for every marriage statistically in America, the greatest country, a land of opportunity, the finest land ever established on the face of the earth. Another assumption is that a building makes a church, and that's not true. Perish the thought that this building would be destroyed; but if it were, the Peoria church would go on. You would find another way, another place. And it is adequate and comfortable for your needs, even far more so than that; yet we would find perhaps if we lost it, maybe it would be good for us. If we lost the beautiful churches we have built for ourselves in the last 30 years or so and had to revert back to more basic things, maybe we would realize and understand that the building does not make the church at all.

And perhaps the greatest error of all that men make is when they equate knowledge with wisdom, which is absolutely false. If you don't believe it, read Job 28; how he explores the facts of the earth, the things of beauty, which God has established. "There is a path

which no fowl knoweth, and which the vulture's eye hath not seen. Iron is taken out of the earth, and brass is molten out of the stone" and he asks the question, "But where shall wisdom be found? and where is the place of understanding? Who shall ascend to the hill of the Lord, or who shall stand in his holy place?" And in the last verse he says, "Behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding."

It was that way in the days of Job, hundreds of years before the law of Moses existed upon the face of the earth, before God had made the law. In all the chapters of Job no mention is made of the law of Moses, but in the 19th chapter in verses 25 & 26 this astonishing statement is found, "For I know that my redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth: and though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God." Job said that centuries before anyone had ever heard that a redeemer was coming. Yet he knew it. How did he know? Was it through knowledge or through wisdom? It was through wisdom that he perceived it. And he could understand it and was able to bear his affliction. Later in that book it talks about the ostrich, who lays her eggs upon the sand, heedless of the fact that some foot may step upon them and crush them. And she forsakes her own young, and he said: "Why?" Because God has deprived her of wisdom.

"Behold the fear of the Lord is wisdom." Jesus is going to win. Let us be glad and rejoice, King of Kings, and Lord or Lords. It all fits together in one great, beautiful picture when we put it together and remember that Jesus is the center of it all. The story is told of a little girl who was given a puzzle, which had been cut out of a newspaper and cut up into small pieces; it had a map of the world on it. And just to entertain the child the parents asked her to put it together. To their astonishment she did it in a very short time and they asked her how she did it. She said. "Well, daddy, on the backside was a picture of Jesus and I just put the picture of Jesus together." And when Jesus was put together right, the world was in order.

And that is what's wrong today — we have Jesus out of focus. 40 wars are taking place right now on the face of the earth. We have commented on the

disasters of technology, which have taken place in the last few months and don't even know what the results of them are going to be. It places man's knowledge in its proper perspective and it shows us, above all, that God is in control. And the martins in the backyard care not one thing about those 40 wars or the blownup technology. They go about their pursuit and are raising their brood because that's the job God gave them to do. And they do it without fail. And the flowers come up and bloom and pay no attention to what's going on. There is a lot of comfort in it for me and I hope for you also. I hope you can appreciate those simple things of life, because they are in the city, too. Even in the midst of the city we have listened to cardinals singing. They have come to grips with city life and found a way to carry on. Even though they are creatures of the wilderness, they have learned to live with man and don't care either about the other problems and go about their pursuits.

So today, inspite of what man is doing to this earth, it still is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof still belongs to God. He has given us the duty to be stewards over His heritage and He has always required from them an accounting. There has always been a day of reckoning when stewards have to give an account. And God has given us guidelines whereby we can conduct our daily efforts and labors and do them according to His good will and pleasure. This then separates knowledge from wisdom.

"Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in his holy place? "Who is going to be among this number when the bridegroom comes: when the marriage of the lamb is come and his wife has made herself ready? Who is the wife, the bride of Christ? It is those who have been redeemed by His precious blood. Does it not say here that he had a vesture dipped in blood; and his name is called The Word of God? And putting the mysteries together, John said, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God and the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." So is the name of this person who came out of heaven, clothed with a vesture dipped in blood, riding upon a white horse, called Faithful and True. with eyes as a flame of fire, head crowned with many crowns, with a name that no man knew but he himself.

The clue is right before us. It says the name is called The Word of God and obviously it was Jesus.

Jesus was in the beginning with God, and He was God. He was a portion of God and He was The Word of God, and this Word took upon itself flesh and blood and came and dwelt among us.

And He is the center of the entire universe. Today the sun is the center of the universe we live in and everything revolves around the sun. It says here that there is going to be a day when an angel is going to stand in the sun. We can't fathom that because the sun is on fire that burns with fervent heat and many million miles away is still able to burn our skin if we stay too long in it. We are many miles away and yet an angel is going to stand in that sun. We can't even look at it today; it blinds our eyes and can cause permanent damage if we stare at it long enough. Yet that angel is going to stand there to cry with a loud voice to the fowls of the earth to come and feed upon the unrighteous, who are destroyed by the fierceness of almight God; who were slain by the two-edged sword which cuts when it goes this way and when it goes that way. The Word of God is a two-edged sword. We have it all before us and everything fits together perfectly, describing those who are going to be in that place, those who have clean hands and a pure heart.

This gives us work to do! We know that our hands become dirty as we work here upon the earth. Even as we till the soil, as mothers work in the flower beds, the hands become soiled and dirty and we wash them. He is not talking about soiling our hands with our labor, but soiling our hands with sinful things; by handling things which ought not be handled. After he had consigned Jesus to the howling, screaming multitude, Pilate went and washed his hands. But somehow he didn't get them clean and couldn't wipe off the stain of guilt. And today, when immorality and unrighteousness happen on the face of the earth, they cannot be washed off with soap and water. There is only one thing that can erase the filth of sin: the blood of Jesus Christ which is on that vesture that was dipped in blood. That's the towel, the washcloth, which wipes away our sins, the blood of Christ, which was shed for many because God knew we would not always keep our hands clean or our eyes and hearts pure, that our souls

would be lifted up to vanity and that sometime we would swear deceitfully. God understood it and prepared a way to redeem us by sending The Word of God in the flesh upon this earth to become our redeemer and saviour, in fulfillment of what Job saw in the depth of his despair, before he even knew what he was really talking about. The psalmist likewise wrote these beautiful things and yet he didn't understand and know what he was writing. He didn't realize that the words he wrote as a shepherd, as a king, as an old man, would last for centuries and for people in a society, which are bewildered and perplexed.

"Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we remember the name of our God." And some trust in rockets and some in nuclear plants, but we will remember the name of our God! They are brought down and fallen, but we are risen and stand upright.

"Save Lord, let the king hear us when we call." Does it work today? Of course it does. Is there any other book in the world, is there any other source whereunto we can resort beside the Word of God, which tells us how to cope with a world that's like an engine which is completely out of control, as a train at full throttle hurtling down the track, with nobody to guide it? Even those people who have no faith wonder how much longer this world can go on the way it is going. Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we will remember the name of our God!

A building doesn't make a church, knowledge doesn't make wisdom, a house doesn't make a home and money is not riches. Remember that and let's trust in our God. If we do that, we shall be those who shall receive the blessing from the Lord and righteousness from the God of his salvation. It's the only thing that matters and nothing else makes any difference!

This past March in our part of the country we lost a beloved brother. Many of us had labored with him in the household of the Lord handling physical affairs of the church; perhaps not the spiritual, but yet they are tied together. He had many successes in his life and saw many failures and had gone through troubled times in the last two years. He was a man of influence and wealth, but now it's all forgotten. In a moment he was gone and none of this makes any difference to him now. But just a few days before he died he told

one in his employ: "Naked came I into this world and naked shall I go out of it and blessed is the name of my God." That told it all. It isn't the size of the estate that makes any difference; it was the relationship he had with his God. "He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation. This is the generation of them that seek him, that seek thy face, O Jacob." (Psalm 24:5, 6).

Yes, if there ever was a message for a troubled world and there ever was a time when a troubled world needed that message, it is today." Lift up your heads, O ye gates; and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of Glory shall come in (24:7). Rather than become discouraged, troubled, worried and sink into despair, we are exhorted to lift up our heads so that the king of glory can come in. "And I saw the heaven opened, and behold a white horse; and he that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness he doth judge and make war." (Revelation 19:11). "Who is this king of glory? Out of his mouth goeth a sharp sword that with it he should smite the nations: and he shall rule them with a rod of iron: and he treadeth the winepress of the fierceness and wrath of Almighty God." (Revelation 19:15). "The Lord strong and mighty, the Lord mighty in battle. Lift up your heads, O ye gates; even lift them up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of Glory shall come in. Who is this King of Glory?" (Psalms 24:8, 9). "And he hath on his vesture and on his thigh a name written: King of Kings, and Lord of Lords (Revelation 24:16). The Lord of hosts, He is the King of Glory.'

Do we need to know more from the Book of Revelation? Do we need the psalmist to explain anything else to us? Can we accept what has been given in simplicity from the Word of God, speaking to us so clearly and plainly where we are to put our trust? If there remains in our presence a single person who has not yet taken advantage of the opportunity which is given you, what are you waiting for? Jesus said, an evil and adulterous generation looks for a sign, but there is no sign going to be given except the sign of Jonah, the prophet. Jonah went into Ninevah and cried and said, "Yet forty days, and Ninevah shall be overthrown." (Jonah 3:4).

When we choose leaders, they say "if you don't vote for me, a terrible thing is going to happen but if you vote for me,

something good will take place." Have you seen in the newspapers that this earth is going to be dissolved with fervent heat, the mighty men are going to be destroyed and horses and the men that sit on them will be consumed by the forces of the air? Yet it is written in the book of books, the place we finally resort to for our strength and health!

Who is this King of glory? The Lord of hosts, He is the King of glory. And the earth is His and the glory thereof. Isaiah 66, "Heaven is my throne, and the earth is my footstool: where is the house that ye build unto me? and where is the place of my rest? For all these things hath mine hand made, and all those things have been, saith the Lord: but to this man will I look, even to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembleth at my word." (66:1, 2). Do you tremble at the Word of God? If you don't, there is going to be a day when you stand there and face it. Today we can do it in the presence of an intercessor, today we have someone pleading our case, begging the father for mercy for us. When that day comes and we have not taken advantage of mercy, we are going to get justice! Is that what you want? Be that far from me! I hope I never have to get justice; I hope that I can be dealt with in mercy and I hope you can, too. The opportunity is here and the choice is yours.

But it will not always be so. When the great busy plants of our cities have turned out their last finished work. when our merchants have sold their last order and dismissed their last tired clerk, when our banks have raked in their last dollar and paid out the last dividend, and the judge of the earth calls a hearing and asks for our balance, What Then? When the preacher has preached his last sermon, has offered God his last prayer, when the choir has sung its last anthem and the sound has died out on the air, when the Bible lies closed on the pulpit and the pews are emptied of men, and each one stands, facing the records, and the books are all opened, What Then? When the bugle calls sink into silence and the long marching columns stand still, when the captain repeats his last order, when they've captured the last fort and hill, when the flag is run down from the masthead and the wounded have all been checked in, and the world that rejected its saviour is asked for the reason . . . What Then???

SERMON BY BRO. GENE LEHMAN OF WOLCOTT, IN

Text: Revelation 19:7-21 & Psalm 24

This is a very mysterious book and I am not qualified to comment on the bulk which is written but there are portions of it which are clear to us. There was a time when a man was walking along the road and he came to a man sitting beside the road, reading from the Bible. He said to him: "What are you reading?" And he replied: "I am reading in the Revelation." And he was astonished that such a man, who appeared to have no particular importance or great knowledge, would be reading out of this mysterious book; and he said to him: "Do you understand it?" to which he replied, "No, I don't understand it but I know what it means" . . . and that confused the traveler only more and he said, "How can that be?". And he said, "It means that Jesus is going to win!"

And that's the way it is; we don't understand it but understanding is not a requirement for belief and it does mean that Jesus is going to win.

The message is very clear that Jesus is going to win, come what may, in this dark and dreary world. If we put our faith and hope and trust in Him and are on His side, we are going to be on the winning side. Someone once said to President Lincoln at the time of the great civil war that they certainly hoped the Lord is on our side. And the President said it had never concerned him whether the Lord was on our side or not. He said the Lord is always on the side of the right and what concerns him is whether we are on the Lord's side. That is the way we should look at it today; not is God on our side, but are we on His. Are we doing what is right and necessary that we can be soldiers in the army of the Lord and part of that great multitude, thousands and thousands and tens of thousands, which stood together before the white throne, clad in white raiments, waving palms in their hands and singing "Amen, glory

and honor and worship to Him that sitteth upon the throne for ever and ever."?

We want to be among that number when the saints go marching in to Zion, the cares of life forever past, the struggles of earth no more to be remembered but to be in the presence of God forever and forever. In the 24th Psalm it states that "The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein." He made it. He formed it out of the void; it was empty and void, yet God formed an earth and the solar system, which functions in perfect regularity. So perfect that it is possible to predict decades in advance the path of a comet, the position of a constellation, the time of the coordination of the planets, the signs of the moon. It is all very easy for them, who study such matters, to forecast: not because the forecasters are so wise but because the universe functions in perfect order and God has made it that

Also, the animals perform their duties in perfect order. It is a blessing in the spring, when the earth awakens once again from the slumber of winter. When the bosom of mother earth grows warm again and brings forth buds and flowers, we are able to see a miracle taking place before us. The awakening of resurrection! It is no coincidence that Easter is the time we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord (and this event really did take place at that time), when the earth is resurrected once again and we can see these miracles before us. There is a tremendous comfort for one who communes with nature and studies those things and sees the beautiful order which God has created and knows that "the earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof."

In "Thanatopsis" Bryant wrote: "To him who in the love of nature holds communion with her visible forms, she speaks a various language, in his gay hours she has a voice of gladness and she glides into his darker musings, and with a mild and healing sympathy steals away their sharpness ere he is aware." And when thoughts of the last bitter hour come over us as the theme of that poem ("Thanatopsis" means a vision of death) he says "Go forth under the open sky and list to nature's teachings." Look 'round about you.

The birds which had migrated south in the fall have come north once again and are very busily engaged in their pursuits. They have no great wisdom and yet they know exactly, without a compass, without a sextant, without a guide, how to fly hundreds of miles, often in the night, how to return unerringly to the place where they were born. The martins in our backvards come there and I fully believe it is the same family of birds each time, not the same ones, perhaps, because their lifetime is limited, but nonetheless, the same family that was born in that house returns and they go about their pursuits. They raise their little broods and the broods go south again in August. It matters not to them what happens in the house, they are not concerned for sickness or health, poverty or wealth, whether there is strife or discord, happiness or peace. They go about and do the things which God intended for them to do. There is a lesson in it for us! If God so clothed the birds and the grass of the field, which is today and tomorrow it is passed away, how much more will He clothe you and me, who have so little faith!

And it is so significant that even at the time when Jesus stilled the raging waves of the sea, he immediately afterwards asked His disciples, "Where is your faith?" He found it upon the sea and established it upon the floods. He spoke that the waters should be di-
