# **Light From The Word**

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

#### SPIRITUAL SEPARATION

Today there are vast numbers of churches, religious groupings, parachurch ministries, denominations, movements and persuasions which consider themselves as Christian. These groups include almost every conceivable variety of beliefs, with markedly different degrees of emphasis upon the Bible. Even among the groups known as evangelical or fundamentalist, who claim the Scriptures as the foundation for their beliefs, there are innumerable differences in doctrinal interpretations.

The question arises as to how we should relate to other individuals who profess Christianity, particularly those who appear to be sincere in their love for the Lord. Although there were no apparent denominations in Bible times, perhaps it would be of benefit to carefully consider some of the scriptural teachings regarding the relationship of true believers in Christ to individuals or groups of other spiritual orientations.

The disciples of Christ had to be rebuked by Him because of their concerns with personal ambition and feelings of superiority. Following a discussion in which they had disputed who among them was the greatest, another issue was raised. "And John answered and said, Master, we saw one casting out devils in thy name; and we forbad him, because he followeth not with us. And Jesus said unto him, Forbid him not: for he that is not against us is for us' (Luke 9:49-50). The point was clearly made that the disciples did not have a monopoly on the power of the Spirit. Likewise, no group or individual today has the right to claim the exclusive favor of the Lord. Even Elijah had to be chastised when he despaired and said "I, even I only, am left" (1 Kings 19:10). The Lord replied, "Yet I have left me seven thousand in Israel, all the knees of which have not bowed unto Baal . . ." (1 Kings 19:18). The disciples had based their complaint upon the fact that these others were not following Christ and his group. In Christ's response he emphasized that their work should not be interfered with and that since they were not against Him there was benefit to their efforts. However, He did not

make any mention of forming an alliance or interacting with them in any way.

The Apostle John was very strong in his warning to believers regarding the influence of any who did not abide in the doctrine of Jesus Christ (2 John 9-11). It is clear that John sounded this warning to help prevent deception by teachers of false doctrine. This warning was surely intended to include those teaching a perverted gospel or advancing beyond what the gospel says, as well as those who did not believe in Christ at all. He even went so far as to admonish that the believers should not wish these misguided teachers well or "bid them Godspeed," and that those who did were partakers of their evil deeds. In this Scripture we can see a more defensive approach in dealing with individuals with variant beliefs. This position of separation was emphasized because of the danger of being deceived through close association with those of a different doctrine. It is scriptural to be tolerant of such at a distance, but it is also scriptural to exert very definite protective measures when the danger of spiritual deception approaches one's door. In an era when legitimacy is given to widely ranging forms of Christianity regardless of quality, it is evident that the doctrinal position of separation has been overlooked or ignored by many.

Finally, the strongest warning found in the New Testament regarding teachers of a different doctrine was given by the Apostle Paul to the Galatians, who had initially embraced the gospel of Jesus Christ through his ministry. Later, others had arisen who taught that in addition to faith in Christ, the believers must practice certain rituals of the old law such as circumcision in order to obtain salvation. It is important to note that the deception presented to these believers was not a markedly different religion, but a modification of the gospel of Jesus Christ. The reaction of the Apostle was utter dismay as he wrote, "I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another gospel . . . " (Gal. 1:5). He then went on to prescribe drastic measures to eradicate this error: "If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed" (Gal. 1:9). How many true believers today are resisting altered Christian doctrines with that kind of vengeance? Instead, the prevalent trend is to welcome spiritual interaction with other professing Christians, many of whom have made numerous compromises in interpretation and application of the Scriptures. Misinterpretation has usually occurred because of a dependence upon the wisdom of man rather than staying with the Word and accepting all teachings of Christ and the Apostles as literal truths.

The three scriptural teachings cited above (given by Christ and the Apostles John and Paul) are the foundation for our position regarding spiritual separation from other professing Christians. This is made explicit in our refraining from addressing them as our brothers and sisters, which are family titles. They denote a close kinship. The Word tells us to first do good to those who are of the "household of faith" (Gal. 6:10). We are also instructed to do good to all men and without question we should be kind, respectful and helpful toward our fellow men of all races and creeds. However, the word household is another family term. It denotes a structured, recognizable grouping of closely related people. We are taught to "walk by the same rule" (Phil. 3:16), "be of one mind" (2 Cor. 13:11) and to participate as a body in loving discipline of erring members (1 Cor. 5). These functions can occur in accordance with the scriptural pattern only within an organized, visible church, where believers are truly responsible to Christ as well as to each other. May God help us, by His grace, to focus on the spiritual edification and perfecting of this portion of the body of Christ, our beloved church, so that we can present a distinct example to the lost sinners of the world and serve effectively to point them to Christ. We can likewise look forward with great anticipation to the day when the entire body of Christ will be revealed at His coming, when true believers of all ages and all nations will be joined to be with Him in Heaven forever.

#### Visit To Hungary and Yugoslavia

Greetings in the name of our precious Savior! It was a real pleasure and blessing to travel with Bro. Don Sauder and Bro. and Sis. Andy Hunyady to Hungary and Yugoslavia May 21. The flight was very nice, but morning came quick as Budapest is six hours earlier than at home. We arrived at Budapest about 12:30 p.m. Friday, the 22nd. Bros. Janos Pop. Janos Ombodi, the elders at Budapest church and others were at the airport to meet us. Very loving greetings with a kiss were exchanged right at the airport. We all made our home at Janos Pops while in Hungary. Words cannot describe the love and hospitality shown us, they could not have been better. We enjoyed visiting various families in the scattered churches who served us very tasty lunches and at mealtime delicious food. They are good bakers.

Our object in going was to help the members and friends of the Budapest church in their effort to get approval and finances to build a larger church. They desperately need more room. Plans to enlarge the present building were refused by the government. The church is so crowded, the halls, steps and other areas are crowded with people standing to hear the Word of God. Their plans are to erect the new building directly across the road to seat 500 people. This seemed too small as the total members, friends and children total more than this, but this is as large as they are permitted to build according to the number of members, but there will be accommodations to hold more where they will still be able to hear. They were recommended to use the present building for an old folks home in time.

We met the president of the "Council of Free Churches in Hungary" and two other members. Accompanying us in our meeting were a number of their elders and George Hunyady from the Apostolic Christian Nazarene Church (Akron, OH). This council is the arm of the Hungarian government for this work. The president of this council, H. D. Jozsef Izakaes is also a member of the Hungarian parliament. They treated us very kindly and wished to help

where they could. Full approval was given if the church guaranteed to finish the building. They stated if the building was started and not completed, people would blame the government for the stoppage. We were able to see the completion of the transfer of \$140,000 contributed by the Apostolic Christian Church, to the bank account of the Budapest church.

They recommended ordering and making a down payment on materials such as brick, lumber, doors, windows, etc. to protect against inflation and availability. They suggested getting some from Austria which would be better quality. Another very favorable act was to exempt Bro. Zolton Szabo from military service, as he is an architect and should work with the church. Also they would work with the police to shut off streets when necessary to pour concrete, etc.

The president of the council also said 10 years ago this building could never have been built and we do not know if 10 years from now it would be possible either, so now is the time to build.

They want all monies coming from America to come through one channel for the church project. It was felt by all that Bro. Ben Maibach, who is secretary and treasurer of the Mission Committee, should take charge of this. The wages of the Hungarian members and friends is very small and it would be impossible for them to raise all the money needed.

It is hoped the American people will be so kind and generous to help until it is completed. If you could experience the sincerity and love of these dear brethren, your hearts would be deeply moved. I think we all experience the blessing of sharing the Lord's money and how He will open the windows of heaven and shower blessings upon us.

The church at Novi Sad, Yugoslavia, is badly in need of repair and they expressed very humbly they would appreciate a little help if only a few thousand dollars. All monies sent to Yugoslavia should go through the proper channels as through Bro. Andy Hunyady or World Relief. Monies that were sent by individuals direct to some boys made the government there suspicious

and even wondered if these individuals were connected to the C.I.A.

Because of this way of trying to help, some are sent back to prison, so if any one has a sympathetic heart, channel through proper channels. I have only given a brief report and am sure Bro. Don or Bro. Andy can give a far more complete report of our mission. May the dear Lord bless you all for sharing what God has given us with these precious souls.

### APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH BIBLE DISTRIBUTION MEETING

The eighteen churches in Illinois have worked together to organize a Bible Distribution Committee for the Illinois Bible distribution. A meeting was held at Fairbury, IL, April 4, 1987, with fifty-five brethren and ministers attending, all who have a deep interest and are participating in giving and sharing the Bible with those requesting a Bible. Elder Bro. Art Bahler welcomed the brethren and the meeting was opened with prayer. Elder Bro. David Bertsch shared and reviewed the Bible distribution over the past 25 - 30 years, including our contributions to the American Bible Society, Gideons and Braille organizations. Our present day efforts involve sharing the Bible through local church brethren throughout the land and overseas. From two to five representatives in each church are appointed to find and locate the need for Bibles. Contributions to the Bible Fund can be sent. to Elder Bro. Ben Maibach. There is now established a central Bible Distribution Center at Leo, IN, with quantity orders being called or forwarded to Elder Bro. David Bertsch. During the past three years, the Bible distribution work has been blessed and is increasing. During the meeting, the brothers shared with one another the blessings of visiting individual homes, giving Bibles and visiting in prisons, placing Bibles in motels, hotels, rescue missions, doctors and optometrists offices, Salvation Army and supplying Bible tapes and Braille Bibles to the blind and the elderly who can no longer read. Oftentimes the personal visit to give a Bible reveals a need to feed, clothe and shelter the needy, that the World Relief Brethren can respond to. In the closing comments, Elder Bro. Perry Zimmerman gave encouragement to the brethren in continuing this good work and of the many needy nations that don't have the Bible. Then the meeting was closed with prayer, thanking Almighty God for the blessings of the day and for the opportunity of giving and sharing the Living Word of God, the Bible.

Lavoyd Moore and David Haggermaker. In November of 1985, Bro. Lavoyd was made acting administrator and Bro. Tom Schrenk took his place on the board. Then in the fall of 1986, Bro. Ed retired and Elder Bro. Aaron Steffen is now acting board chairman.

After much remodeling and preparation, the Preschool opened in the church basement in the fall of 1981, accommodating children from the ages of 21/2 to 5. At the beginning, only one child was enrolled, but by the end of the first school year the enrollment had increased to 13. A lot of advertising had been done through fliers, etc. and by parent referrals. By the end of the second year, enrollment had increased to 20. The Athens church supported the Preschool by providing volunteers on a regular basis. Sis. Louise Hall was hired for the 1983-84 school year to help with the 27 children who were enrolled. Summer school was also started and once again the Athens church donated time and support. Then in 1984 an additional request was made to the Education Committee to start a kindergarten class. After this request was approved by that committee and the elder body, two kindergarten children were enrolled for the 1984-85 school year as well as 33 preschoolers. During the summer of 1985, six volunteers from other churches contributed to the Preschool. Sis. Irene resigned during that summer. Sis. Evie Blunier (Eureka, IL) volunteered her entire summer and was employed as Program Coordinator in the fall of 1985. Sis. Laura Haggenmaker (Athens) was also hired as parttime help and Sis. Marilyn Walder (Cissna Park, IL) was hired to help with the increasing enrollment. By graduation in May of 1986, 53 children were attending. Thirteen volunteers from other churches, as well as five from the Athens congregation, contributed their time and talent to the Preschool during the summer. During the 1986-87 school year we had 45 children enrolled. This may sound like a decrease from 1985-86 but we limited the number of children per day to 35 according to the available space. We are operating at capacity and had 15 on a waiting list all year. Sis. Eunice Kelley (Athens) was hired as a part-time cook and aide. Currently, we have 45 enrolled for the summer and we are almost full for the 1987-88 school year. Advertisement has strictly been by

word of mouth. Sis. Laura finished her time with us in March to go to college full time. Sis. Joan Meister (Peoria, IL) was hired as a part-time aide. Sis. In the United States of America, the 4th of July is Independence Day. We thank God for our freedom. But all Christians should be thankful for any nation that guarantees liberty for its citizens and works toward peace with other countries of the world.

In late June 1807, the British committed an act of aggression that could have triggered an armed reprisal and quickly escalated into war between the two countries. The British warship, Leopard, attacked the American vessel Chesapeake as she cleared the harbor at Norfolk. In the murderous attack 21 Americans died. Later the British explained that they were merely looking for deserters from their navy. Although it would have been natural to retaliate, President Jefferson used restraint and did not order U.S. forces to attack. Instead, he deliberately postponed action until Congress decided that the best way to respond was to pass the Embargo Act. Thus war was averted.

If conditions call for us to defend our country to preserve our homes and our freedoms, we should meet the challenge with all strength and resolve. But first we should do everything possible to avert war and strive for peace. As Christians, we must faithfully pray for our national leaders that we may "lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and reverence." I Timothy 2:2. Let's strive for peace and thank God for all who are peacemakers.



(Continued from Page 32) walk of life as the brethren of the Lord, then we have time yet. A timely reminder here is to take care and set things in order.

"And now, behold, I know that ye all, among whom I have gone preaching the kingdom of God, shall see my face no more. Wherefore I take you to record this day, that I am pure from the blood of all men." (Acts 20:25, 26). There again is a question that comes to us. Have we done our full and complete duty toward one another? In our families? In our neighborhoods? In our congregation?

If you are like me, you will find that at times we have not lived up to the standard of our calling and have reason to humble ourselves before the Lord. He will help us carry it out more fully.

"For I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God." (Acts 20:27). This is a very important verse. "Hirelings" will not preach the whole counsel of God because they are hirelings. The Lord Jesus said that in John 10. Those who serve the brethren out of love because the Lord has given them those duties will not flee when the wolf cometh. They will warn and take extra special care of the sheep.

Paul told them, "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." (Acts 20:28). Now we all have a ministry. It may not be on the pulpit or as a shepherd of the flock, but each one of us have a talent and a responsibility. The Lord will show us our ministry. Ministry doesn't mean rulership, but helping one another. We can help one another throughout this life.

Often I think that many who so kindly minister to other people, are worthy of a greater reward than those who minister the Word. However, the Lord Jesus promised that we in this labor will also gain a reward in the final reckoning.

"For I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock." (Acts 20:29). This is taking place in our time, loved ones. The deceptive forces of Satan surround us. If we are not alert, and our love for our Lord grows cold, we can be victims of these seductive forces. "Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them." (Acts 20:30). Sad to say, this has taken place in our time. It is a warning to us that we should be of one heart, one mind and one judgment, Then the Lord can unite us and bless us. Then the church will grow in numbers and godliness.

Paul reminded them further, "Therefore watch, and remember, that by the space of three years I ceased not to warn every one night and day with tears." (Acts 20:31). That was because he loved them. We can certainly be aware that our dear shepherds love us also. While they do not complain, yet, we know that they have many conflicts in private, and perhaps at night when the rest of us are sleeping.

But Paul was not hopeless. He said, "And now, brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified." (Acts 20:32). An inheritance here on earth can be a blessing, or it can be trouble. But, the inheritance that he speaks of is the inheritance of eternal life that God grants to His servants and followers who walk and abide by the word of grace. That grace can build us up from

day to day, and throughout our life. That inheritance is life eternal.

When we think of the physical things of this world and time, they fade in importance. They grow small, especially as we grow older. In another writing the Apostle Paul said, "For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet the inward man is renewed day by day . . . While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal." (II Corinthians 4:16, 18). Inheritance and the other blessings of eternity that are spoken of are not seen vet. We shall see them if we have faith and are faithful to our Lord. That will be a wonderful inheritance, will it not, loved ones? He said that which is visible is temporal. We need to use some of it. We need not hang our hearts on it. That which is invisible is spiritual and eternal. He said, "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then (if we attain that resurrection of the just, we can see and know) face to face." (I Corinthians 13:12). So shall it be with all who are faithful.

"I have coveted no man's silver, or gold, or apparel." (Acts 20:33). How blessed if we can feel that we would be glad to give to others; rather than seek and desire, perhaps, even that which is not honestly ours. "Yea, ye yourselves know, that these hands have ministered unto my necessities, and to them that were with me. I have shewed you all things, how that so labouring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:34, 35). So it is today.

Then he knelt down with them at the seashore and prayed with them, and they all wept sore because they loved him. They fell on his neck and kissed him (Acts 20:36, 37).

"Sorrowing most of all for the words which he spake, that they should see his face no more. And they accompanied him unto the ship." (Acts 20:38). In the remaining chapters of this book of the Acts, we can read what happened to him in Jerusalem. We do not have a record of how it went with the Ephesian church, but we know that the advice and counsel that he gave them fits very well into our day and time. We need it, and we need to follow it

Best Inheritance Is Life Eternal Acts 20:17-38

We can see that the Apostle Paul was not one to preach to people and then forget about them. After they were converted and churches were established, he would always follow up. In various places we read that he returned and strengthened them in their faith. Why? Because they, even as we, were mortal. Our human nature is to forget. That is why we gather together in the house of God.

It is good for us to store in our memory the words of God, but we cannot think we have learned all these lessons and need no more to be taught. We need to be reminded.

It was the Apostle Peter who said, "Though you know these things, I find it worthwhile to remind you of them again, and again." (II Peter 1:12, 13).

It's good to be present in the house of the Lord, but during the week, take the opportunity and time to read the Word. Every time we do so with prayerful hearts, the Lord blesses us. It is His objective to lead us through this life to life eternal, if we will cooperate.

The Apostle Paul wanted to speak once more to the elders of Ephesus. They met him there at Miletus, and he said, "Ye know, from the first day that I came into Asia, after what manner I have been with you at all seasons." (Acts 20:18). We see here that the conduct of this apostle and his fellow laborers was just as important as the Word they shared.

We read earlier in the Book of Acts that he was there at Ephesus for two years. (Acts 19:10). Soon there was persecution. He escaped safely from them and went on to other labors. Now he was concerned for them and said that he served "the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears, and temptations . . ." (Acts 20:19). His fellow Jewish people that he loved and would gladly have seen them all con-

verted, were some of the worst to persecute him. Yet, he continued. He said, "I kept back nothing that was profitable unto you, but have shewed you, and have taught you publicly, and from house to house." (Acts 20:20). By every possible means he preached the Word that there might be converts and that also they might be sustained and kept in the ways of the Lord. If we could stand in the position of our elders for a few days, we would probably know better what Paul was talking about. It should be sufficient to us to be admonished out of the Word by our dear brothers.

Paul said he testified "both to the Jews, and also to the Greeks, repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ." (Acts 20:21). It is just that simple for those who have not yet come to know the Lord. They must turn away from the sins of this world and seek the Lord God, confess their sins and then have faith in the Lord Jesus for salvation.

To truly believe in the Lord Jesus includes being obedient to His Word. I fear there are many millions of people deceived in our day and time, when they are taught simply to believe in Jesus and you are saved. That is necessary and a good beginning, but it is only a beginning. Those who want to be at peace with God and have a hope of life eternal need to yield their whole life and will unto the Lord and Saviour, and to our heavenly Father. Then they can experience, through conversion, a happy and blessed walk of life.

We are glad when people, even in their older years, come to the Lord and finally attain peace with God. But, we feel sorry for them for all the years of blessings and fellowship they have missed. Quite often their families have suffered a spiritual loss because they did not have the environment they could have had if their parents had been believers.

"And now, behold, I go bound in the spirit unto Jerusalem, not knowing the things that shall befall me there:" (Acts 20:22). The Holy Spirit had already shown him in every city that there were bonds and afflictions awaiting him. "But none of these things move me," he said, "neither count I my life dear unto myself." (Acts 20:24). In our day and time, none of us are threatened so much with physical persecution but in the ease and comfort of our life, it is only too easy to count our "own life dear unto ourselves".

Jesus said plainly, "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: and whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it." (Matthew 16:25). That is important for us today. It is significant that the same things that were important and necessary in the time of the Apostle Paul, are also important and necessary in our day and time.

Paul looked far beyond the things of this world and time. He said, "... so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God." (Acts 20:24).

This he had diligently pursued and in one of the last days in his life, he wrote to Timothy, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness (in heaven), which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing." (II Timothy 4:7, 8).

Now, the question is, are we situated that we can love the coming of our Lord and Saviour? Or, do we fear it? If perhaps we have not yet been converted, or have become careless in our
