

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words givethlight; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

"Nevertheless, whereto we have already attained, let us walk by the same rule, let us mind the same thing" (Phil. 3:16). "Fulfill ye my joy, that ye be like-minded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind" (Phil. 2:2).

The Christian ideal of believers maintaining a healthy sense of likemindedness finds clear expression in 1 Cor. 1:10, "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

A judgment is defined as an opinion or position. If a body of believers is to be "perfectly joined together," there must be a tremendous effort to minimize self-centered opinions and blend hearts and minds together into a unified core of biblically-based positions on the significant aspects of life.

To meet this ideal requires a breaking of the strong wills of individuals. Paul wrote "Be not wise in your own conceits (opinions)" (Rom. 12:16). This can only be accomplished through conversion followed by a lifelong process of a believer's will being daily "crucified with Christ" (Gal. 2:20).

God's people today face a dilemma unique to our time. Contemporary society dismisses the biblical principle of like-mindedness. Rather, it aggressively fosters the themes of diversity and individualism. "Think for yourself," "Do your own thing," and "Do what is right in your own eyes" represent popular viewpoints which are not only appealing to human nature, but are actually given wide respect in our society. As converts come out from their former life and enter into the household of faith, great care must be taken that their hearts are thoroughly cleansed of this destructive individualism. Believers also must continually resist the development of selfcentered opinions.

Christ-like love among believers draws them into close relationships in the Spirit. God's people are described in the Word as a "body" and "members one of another" (Eph. 4:25). They are thoroughly integrated in mind and spirit. All parts are to cooperate and pull in the

same direction for the glorious cause of Christ. In graceful harmony they display an effective coordination that dispels self-centeredness and division. This holy body of Christ, the church, is to be "perfectly joined together" (1 Cor. 1:10), "fitly framed" (Eph. 2:21), and "compacted by that which every joint supplieth"

(Eph. 4:16).

As God's children strive to keep the same judgments, a central and relevant question arises. Can all of the brethren agree in all of life's judgments? Obviously not, because individuals must make hundreds of personal, everyday judgments, many of which are unrelated to other brothers and sisters in the Lord. Yet, the brethren should agree on doctrinal matters and on clearly defined standards which are taught by the church and are based upon careful interpretation of the Scriptures under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. These standards consist of specific applications of biblical principles to various aspects of life. They provide definitions for important concepts such as worldliness, nonconformity, spiritual separation, pride, humility, sanctification, nonresistance, brotherhood, unit of spirit, and many others.

If abstract concepts are left without any uniformity of definition, then the believer's interpretation of them gravitates toward individualism. Each believer responds only as he personally understands them based on his own experiences. Spiritual truth then becomes relative, and the church becomes divided and defenseless against Satan's onslaughts. In matters of faith and verity, the truth should be defined

and remain absolute.

In matters of doctrine and church practice there must be clearly defined judgments which are taught consistently in the home, Sunday School and church assembly and faithfully obeyed. These truths are sometimes referred to as "the faith." Jude exhorted, ". . . ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints," (Jude 3). In this context "the faith" consists of a set of scripturally-based truths which must be adhered to by a body of true believers. It is evident that when Paul was preaching the gospel at

Philippi he also taught customs, which are patterned applications of scriptural truths to specific aspects of everyday life. These teachings required marked changes in living by his followers (Acts 16:19-21).

If each believer interprets the Scriptures according to his own preference, a condition develops which is little different from the time when "every man did that which was right in his own eyes" (Judges 21:25). The result was not good for God's people.

Church judgments are not rigid or suppressive when given by a "servant leadership" with deep affection and concern for the welfare of the brethren. Believers should be thankful for and not resent spiritual instruction, because the intent is to offer insights and guidance that will help on the upward road to Zion.

A great opportunity exists today for the church to present a beautiful, consistent example to an unregenerate world that is sinking lower and lower into the depths of selfishness and depravity. To do this will require Christ-like humility and brotherly love, with each preferring the other above himself (Rom. 12:10). In practical terms, this also requires submission to the kindly-administered judgments advocated by the church.

Unity and likemindedness create a deep and beautiful sense of solidarity in the household of faith. They enhance strong supportive relationships among believers allowing them to be more able, when necessary, to strengthen, encourage and admonish one another. On the other hand, variance and independence can stir up a sense of alienation and cause relationships between brethren to become lukewarm, making it almost impossible for them to admonish each other in the true spirit of love and meekness.

May we wholeheartedly obey the Scriptures: "... let each esteem other better than themselves" (Phil. 2:3), "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God" (Eph. 5:21), "Obey them that have the rule over you and submit yourselves..." (Heb. 13:17), and "... be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Cor. 1:10).

GLORY TO GOD

What is it that brings glory to God? The multitude of angels who appeared to the shepherds at the time of Christ's birth, said, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Luke 2:14. It's fine to say, "Glory to God," but we must ask ourselves if all we are supposed to do is say it. If not, what all is involved in bringing glory to God?

Mary had been visited by the angel, Gabriel, who told her she would have a son who would be called, the Son of God. Her response was, "Behold the handmaid (servant) of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." Luke 1:38.

Her attitude and the servant role she was willing to play no doubt brought glory to God. Therefore, we learn from Mary that if we want to bring glory to God, we should have the attitude of a servant in our relationship with God. This is in spite of the fact that God calls us (in the Bible) His sons and daughters, and joint heirs with Christ of all the eternal treasures of heaven. II Corinthians 6:18 and Romans 8:17.

The multitude of angels told the shepherds, "Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." Luke 2:12. The shepherds responded by saying, "Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us." Luke 2:15. "And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger." Luke 2:16.

Mary was not told to do anything in particular, nor go any certain place. She had only to wait, and trust with a sweet attitude. On the other hand, the shepherds were called into action. They went with haste. This, no doubt, brought glory to God as we understand that obedience is important in the eyes of God. "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him." I John 2:4.

The wisemen, who came from the east, saying, "Where is he that is born king of the Jews?" were quite diligent in their search for the Christ Child. The diligence with which they searched for Him and their act of worshipping Him brought glory to God. To worship a baby is abnormal and would not have been proper except for the fact that this baby was the Son of God. That makes it not only permissable to wor-

ship Him but it brought glory to God.

We now have three ways of bringing glory to God, (1) by having a servant attitude toward God (2) by being obedient to God's teachings and (3) by worshipping God and His Son, Jesus Christ, whose birth we celebrate at Christmas.

What is it that brings glory to God? If it is an attitude, let's have it; if it is an action, let's do it; if it is worshipping, let's worship. In this way we can bring glory to God at this Christmas season and throughout the year. He deserves all glory.

The brethren also have a deep sense of historical perspective, and can relate their own plight to broader currents of political and social development in Europe. Perhaps we should take a lesson here.

It happens by chance that Bro. Markert's house is built over a series of underground tunnels built centuries earlier by a local monarch. Sis. Traudel showed us these tunnels and told how they were used as shelters during the war. The image of those tunnels has remained with me as a reminder of the experiences of these dear brethren. Grounded in a much older tradition than ours, they have seen and felt things unknown to most of us. We definitely have some lesson in faithfulness and patience to learn from these dear souls. The very least we can do in

turn is to reach out to them in love and fellowship.

Is East Germany worth the effort? To this question I can only give an emphatic YES. First of all, we need to help support these dear souls so that they can finish their course in faith, without losing hold of the precious prize in the final hours of their life. Secondly, a revival in East Germany would be a miracle, but one for which seeds have been sown. If this church were to revive, the glory to our Lord would be extraordinary. May He give the grace to those who need to come into the fold. Finally, the Lord tells us that even if we extend our love to "the least of these" (and I believe that our East German brethren are far more than that) we have performed a service to Him. In this spirit, may we follow His

Recently, a brother asked me if I thought the Children's Home was successful or not. I suppose there are many of us who have had the same question. How many of the children we care for actually repent? How many are reunited with their families? How many finish high school? How many get jobs? Are we really being good stewards of our resources by operating a Children's Home? I don't have all the answers, but it seems to me that success really depends on how a person defines it. For instance, if we say that our goal in this work is to give the children a nurturing, structured Christian environment, and to expose them to God and His plan of salvation, the success rate is very high. Biblicallyspeaking, I Corinthians 4:2 says, "Moreover it is required in stewards. that a man be found faithful." Our work and everything we do with what we have, will not necessarily be measured by God in terms of success. Rather, it will be measured in terms of our faithfulness to what we know God wants us to do. Let us ask ourselves, "Are we striving for success or faithfulness?" If we are faithful, then we will be successful with God.

Christmas is approaching. The children and staff here are busy buying gifts for each other. Some of our residents packed boxes of gifts for poor children in Central and South America. Others are going to participate in the distribution of food packages to needy people in Fort Wayne. "What am I going to get for Christmas?" seems like

such a secular and selfish response to the season. This Christmas, let's follow Christ and ask, "What can I give?".

improvement, that we might be the reflection of the Light that He was while here on the earth.

"He was despised, and we esteemed Him not." This was the case then, where not only was He not esteemed, but even His existence as the divine Son of the heavenly Father was challenged.

How closely our generation and society might fit into the very time that the man of God, the prophet was writing these words.

"Surely He hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows; yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed." Isaiah 53:4, 5.

Here was His prime and supreme sacrifice. I don't think we can quite imagine the load that was on our Saviour. We think of Him taking upon Himself your sins and mine, and I think of Him on the cross feeling separated from His heavenly Father, I believe the Lord experienced for a time there what man will experience eternally if he rejects the Lord Jesus Christ and finally ends up in a terrible place of condemnation and torment. Jesus experienced, perhaps only for a moment, what separation from God is like. His time of separation was brought about by your sins and mine. Not anything that He had done, but by our sin. He experienced our chastisement! "He was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him;" Our sins were upon Him there. This is, after all, what the whole plan is about. This is what He came here to do. He didn't come to be reverenced, revered as a baby alone. He experienced a humble beginning in life, after being conceived of the Spirit. This is all part of it, but we have to think of Jesus' life in its entirety, as the hope of our salvation.

"All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all." Isaiah 53:6.

Perhaps we all ought to go back in our minds and realize that we had a part in this. It is easy as we read these Scriptures to wonder how these people could do this. How could they crucify the Lord as they did? He who was without sin. How could they be so wrong? We have to realize that none of us are any better than the others and "all we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all."

I think back to 1949, when I was converted, of the very first Christmas and following Easter. I can remember so well how much more Christmas meant to me. It had been a happy season, but it never quite meant to me before what it did after I was converted. We can go back in thought to that time and I'm reminded of the Apostle John writing of that first love.

I think what he meant was that when we experienced His peace and forgiveness, we realized we had gone astray also, and were also guilty of His shed blood upon the cross. "The Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all". Not one of us can say we didn't have a part in it. We, in a sense, helped to drive the nails in His hands. We're all guilty of His blood.

"He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet He opened not His mouth; He is brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so He openeth not His mouth." Isaiah 53:7

I don't know how many have ever seen sheep shorn, but this is really the way they are. They're easily subdued, and when subdued, they're completely submissive to the shearer. This is the perfect example of Christ.

At Christmas we often think of Christ's humble birth. However, by looking at His willingness to obey His Father in death, we can see an even greater lesson in humility. "Who . . . made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name: That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Philippians 2:7-11.

This is the Jesus we need to remember at Christmas. May He be the object of our devotion, service and obedience.

THE SILVER LINING

SERMON BY BRO. MARVIN STIEGLITZ OF LEO, IN

Text: Isaiah 53

the year of God's love toward us.

I think of these words of the prophet, and then I think of the words of our Lord. He was born into the world in a manger in all lowliness. He grew up to manhood and then ministered for three short years. He spoke of how the prophets of old would have loved to have seen the salvation. I think of Simeon. In Luke 2 we read of Christ's birth with the shepherds and the wisemen seeking Him with a sincere desire to worship. Later on Simeon was in the temple when the child was brought at the age of eight days to be given to the Lord. Luke tells us that he beheld the child and he said "Lord now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace . . . for I have seen Thy salvation." Luke 2:29-30. This was the fulfillment of life for this man. He had, through God's divine inspiration and wisdom, seen the salvation of God in the form of this child. the Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus later taught that the "Prophets desired to see the things that ye see." Sad to say, there were those who had salvation at hand and didn't even recognize it or avail themselves of it. Yet today people do not recognize the importance of life, the seriousness of life and the importance of availing ourselves of this great salvation.

We can't think of God's salvation as the good time of Christmas. We have to think of it in terms of Jesus' life in its entirety. His birth is the fulfillment of God coming in the flesh, in the likeness of His Son. We must see His life. His obedience as a child, and how He grew up and was subject to His parents.

His entire life was an example for us to follow. Early in life He saw the need to be about His Father's business. those things that were of eternal consequence and benefit.

We find again at the end of His life His obedience unto His heavenly Fa-

We ought to be mindful every day of ther. He was willing, and I don't think we can minimize the great burden it was to Him. In the Garden of Gethsemane He prayed that the cross might be removed . . . however "not My will. but Thine be done." Through His faithfulness and willingness to shed His blood on the cross, we who believe in Jesus Christ can obtain the standing of righteousness in God's sight.

The life and death of Christ in its entirety is our only hope of life eternal, our only hope of salvation.

Isaiah speaks of His life in its entirety. "For He shall grow up before him as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground: He hath no form nor comeliness and when we shall see him. there is no beauty that we should desire him." Isaiah 53:2.

That's how it was at the time of Christ's birth. There was nothing there. Perhaps they sought something majestic that they could really reverence or something that would be to their gain. When He came in meekness, humility and was born in a manger, they didn't recognize Him. There was nothing there that they would desire. The angels spoke to the shepherds and they said "let us go see this thing which has come to pass." But other than the angels, there was nothing there that they should have desired Him. In fact, rulers feared Him and even sought at that early age already to destroy Him. They wanted to get Him out of the way, because they thought He would take from them things that they desired in this life ... the position ... the power ... and the glory that they had. They feared that this man might one day replace them. They sought to do away with Him, even to the point of killing all the children up to two years of age, all with the intent of stamping out the Lord Jesus Christ.

"He hath no form nor comeliness; and when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him. He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief; and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not." Isaiah 53:3.

And now when we think of Jesus . . . He had a tremendous following while here. We can read about the multitudes that followed Him, especially the lower class of people. He speaks one place about the gospel being hidden from the wise and prudent and revealed unto babes and the poor.

Here's a prophet, a man of God, and in the circle of religious leaders, those who should have recognized God's working, those who should have been leading the people, rallying them around the Saviour were the ones seeking to destroy Him.

You would say He had a following, but He was despised . . . His life was a life of rejection . . . and He was "A man of sorrows, acquainted with grief". He even had to flee out of town to keep people from throwing Him over a cliff.

"We hid as it were our faces from Him." I'm sure there were people at that time doing that, and I'm sure there are people today hiding their faces from the Lord Jesus Christ.

A brother spoke here not too long ago, and he spoke about Jonah knowing what he should do, but not wanting to do it. I think a lot of people today, and even many of us who already made a profession of faith, aren't always as faithful as we ought to be. We aren't always as fervent in carrying out the guidelines of the New Testament Scriptures, the Apostle Paul, and other Apostles. Remember the words of the Apostle James when he says true religion is "to visit the fatherless and orphans and sick, and to keep himself unspotted from the world."
