At the edge of our woods here at the Home stands a tree that has weathered many a storm. It's a peculiar tree because of a split in the trunk about six feet above the ground which forms a gap until higher where it grows back together. Thirteen years ago, at the Dedication Service of the first Group Home, this same tree was likened to the lives of the children we work with. Like the tree, some children's lives are left with big gaps when families are torn apart. Our goal then is to see those gaps closed and see young lives again made whole.

As we reflect on the past four years we have spent here, we are amazed at how quickly the time has gone. We have shared so many varied experiences with a great group of children and fellow staff members. We believe that God has given us this opportunity to learn a great deal about ourselves as well as those children we have had under our care. Each experience in the relationships we have formed have been building blocks in our lives.

Our aim has been to give what we could to help these children grow, but looking back, it seems they have given much more in return. In accepting the challenge, we have discovered new insights that have served to strengthen our marriage and family. The addition of our daughter, Emily, to our home has really been a positive experience this past year. As the other children watched her develop, much of their attention has been focused on her instead of themselves. She has surely been the cause of many smiling faces.

Seeking to establish a firm, constant, and stable family environment, we have seen progress made in damaged lives. With God's continuous help, we have tried to provide the love, support, and security some of these children never knew. Realizing we can't replace their parents, we've simply tried to bridge the gaps by teaching them the ways of the Lord. It's encouraging when we see children responding to God's love.

As the Home grows, it is our prayer that God will continue to work in the hearts of those who desire to share His love for children in need. We thank God for the memories and experiences we've shared here and feel that our lives are much richer as a result.

Preparations are in full force as we near this year's annual auction and sale which includes the dedication and open house for our new group home.



Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

". . . Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish" (Eph. 5: 25-27).

Sanctification is defined as being set apart for a sacred sevice, a holy use. When the firstborh of Egypt were destroyed, the Israelites were set apart, for the death angel saw the blood and passed over their households. It is a great privilege to be thus called of God and marked or set apart for holy use. But with that gift also comes a very significant responsibility. "... unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required" (Luke 12:48).

Sanctification begins with faith in Christ (Acts 26:18) which results in an imputed righteousness. The Word (John 17:17) and the Holy Spirit (Rom. 15:16) then further sanctify and purify our hearts and lives. This is a practical sanctification which involves the application of scriptural principles to all aspects of our attitude and behavior. "Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit. perfecting holiness in the fear of God" (2 Cor. 7:1). This practical holiness is not an option for the believer. "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord" (Heb. 12:14).

Where do we stand today with regard to sanctification of spirit, soul and body (1 Thes. 5:23)? Do we abhor sin or have we allowed worldliness to re-enter our heart? Do we read things we shouldn't or dwell on evil thoughts? We must yield to God and not to Satan's lures: "But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts thereof" (Rom. 13:14). This

means we should not think about how we may please our flesh. We are told the wall around the New Jerusalem separates the ungodly from the godly. "And there shall in no wise enter into it any thing that defileth . . ." (Rev. 21:27).

If we allow an evil thought to become a strong imagination, we may go on to delight in it and finally consent to it in word or deed. It has been said that we should "withstand the beginnings," just as we most effectively deal with weeds in a garden when they are young and shallowrooted. If these invasive plants are allowed to remain for a period of time, they become deeply rooted. They take the nourishment from the fruit and, like evil thoughts, if left unchecked they ultimately choke out all that is good (James 1:14-15).

It is very clear that the early church was truly set apart for Christ. However, through the ages of time there have been many changes in the attitudes and lifestyles of professing Christians. Years ago many took the stand of being non-combatant. The Anabaptists in Europe were persecuted for this but never took the sword. However, World War II brought a relaxation of this standard, and it became common even for "fundamental" Christians to bear arms. Historically, honoring the Lord's day by abstaining from labor and commerce was a widespread practice. This has deteriorated a great deal in recent years. We are thankful that our brethren keep the Lord's day holy and rest from their labors.

Many other churches formerly did not believe in going to movies. Gradually they relented and said their members could go to the "good" movies. Now many allow themselves to go to any of them. Entertainment becomes a refuge from a disturbing conscience. God tries to convict souls, but they drown it out by one sport after another, one movie after another. The influences of television programming and Hollywood eventually manifest themselves. Divorce was common in Hollywood many years ago; now it is common in our society. In adornment there have also been many changes. Yet the Bible says "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; But let it be the hidden man of the heart . . . " (1 Pet. 3:3-4). After all we are not to please the world but are set apart to glorify God. In the Word, painting the face is associated with corruption. (Ezek. 23:40).

There has come to be little difference between professing Christians and unbelievers in many aspects of lifestyle. What has happened to biblically based practical sanctification which truly sets the believer apart from others? We need to prove that our allegiance is to the Lord and not the world. In Him are the true pleasures, not those that satisfy the flesh but those which satisfy the soul's need (Ps. 16:11).

We must not only pray but watch. We must watch for trends in our own heart and withstand the beginnings. We must realize that we are in a real battle, greater than the battle of Gettysburg or Bunker Hill, and better is "he that ruleth his spirit than he that taketh a city" (Prov. 16:32).

Sanctification should occur in every phase of our lives, our personality, our thoughts, our lifestyle, and our outward appearance (2 Tim. 2:19-21). We are to glorify God in our body and in our spirit, both of which belong to Him (1 Cor. 6:20). "Now our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace, comfort your hearts, and stablish you in every good word and work" (2 Thes. 16-17).

"No cornstalk can grow, except on the root from which it sprang. Through all its existence it can only live with the life that was in the seed being nurtured by water. With little moisture to absorb, the root system loses its stability and strength, thus failing to perform its purpose intended by the Creator. Root systems may be called earth machines because they operate in the darkness and dampness of the soil. Continually pressing into and down in the soil, the hair roots spread out until they are more in area than the branches above. Relentlessly the hair roots search for moisture. They grow so fast that with a microscope the growth can actually be seen. Consequently, an apple tree, for example, lifts approximately four gallons an hour from root to leaf. This verse advises to continually press down in the Bible for necessary spiritual nourishment. Rooted deep down produces healthy growth which results in an outward abounding beauty that is unshakable. Isaiah stated this truth like this: "Take root downward, and bear fruit upward." Isaiah 37:31.

For Strength - I Corinthians 10:4

Not only is food necessary for spiritual health, but water is, too. This touches upon reliance on the Lord Jesus Christ, and knowing His love and care. Drinking deep at the Fountain of Living Water produces a strength and satisfaction that is unshakable.

For Confidence - I John 5:13

A Christian's roots must not stop growing. A Christian's roots must continually thrive in the meat of God's Word. This produces a confidence that is unshakable, and consequently he knows wherein his strength lies.

Like a tree which survives the slash of death, a person can find restoration in the 'scent of water' the Lord offers.

(Continued from Page 28) quick as we can. If we take on just a little bit, it is just that much harder to resist.

Then the Scripture tells us what we should replace this with... "but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart." II Timothy 2:22. Follow charity and peace. We heard this morning that we are to seek peace and to ensue it.

These are simple teachings, beloved. Try to seek peace. "Blessed are the peacemakers," Jesus would say. Matthew 5:9. If we would analyze the life of Jesus, and that is our example, He exhibited peace wherever He went and whatever He did.

Today around the breakfast table, we read the account of Legion. He was a wild man, and no man could tame him. But when Jesus was through with him, he was sitting peacefully at the feet of Jesus, fully clothed. (See Luke 8:27-35).

Beloved, we are to be peacemakers in our communities and in our churches. There are things we can do that Jesus would do to promote peace. Put on this divine nature, the nature of Jesus Christ, which is called charity.

We all ought to read I Corinthians 13 before we go to work, or before we take care of the children at home. Just read it a few times in the morning before you go out and do your duties. That is what charity is. Then, during the day when we find out that we are not carrying it out to the fullest, it pricks our heart. It should cause us to pray a little harder.

I would encourage each of you from

time to time to read it. Sometimes we find ourselves so caught up in the cares of life. But some morning, just read about Charity, I Corinthians 13. It is short and brief, but oh, how it admonishes me!

So we are beginning to see the description of a man of God. It continues, "And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient." II Timothy 2:24.

As young men, we are often taught that a man is to be tough, loud and forward. But that is not the true man of God. He is a man that is gentle to the people he deals with, \ldots to the people he knows, to his family and to his children.

He is a man that is patient and apt to teach. This is not the make up of man, nor women in all cases. Women have some of the attributes of gentleness that men do not, but it is now speaking to both.

The beautiful thing about a true believer in Christ is that if we call upon Him, He will help us to be gentle.

The next chapter speaks about the last days. When are the last days? This Scripture was written almost two thousand years ago and I don't believe they actually knew when the last days were. I think even in that time, they thought they were living in the last days. God never really said for sure when it would be.

But, beloved, we have come through a long period of time since then. It would seem to me, as we see events taking place, that we are in the last days. It just does not seem possible that mankind can exist under the influence that Satan has upon man in this day.

I believe since the time of the first church until the time that God finally pours out His wrath upon the earth, Satan gains more and more power. When his power reaches a certain extent, it begins to "snowball." He has many tools at his disposal, and many things to use in perilous times.

"... In the last days perilous times shall come." II Timothy 3:1. When I read this Scripture and think of perilous times, I often think of the tribulation period when in my own mind, I had portrayed people hunting down believers and trying to take their life.

As we read about the tribulation and the last days, it seems a little bit different than that. There is a different peril that we are facing. The perilous events are not so much giving our life, as it is just staying true among almost impossible circumstances, events very similar to today.

Let's look at what God meant when He said that in the last days perilous times would come. He was concerned about the spiritual aspects of men; not about the physical. He was not concerned, necessarily, if an individual gave his life; He was concerned if an individual lost his faith.

He begins to speak, "For men shall be lovers of their own selves . . ." II Timothy 3:2. Here are things that he defines as perilous. We might not think they are perilous, but think how they can affect you spiritually.

"For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, trucebreakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God;" Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof: "then he says, "from such turn away." II Timothy 3:2-5.

Let's analyze these perils one at a time. When the disciples were with Jesus Christ, they asked Him, "Lord, when shall the time of thy coming be?" And what shall be the sign that we might know?" Jesus mainly warned them of one thing. He said, "Let no man deceive you." (See Matthew 24:3, 4).

It says that during that era, "Except those days should be shortened, there should no flesh be saved..." Matthew 24:22. That doesn't necessarily mean physically saved; it could mean spiritually saved.

What will constitute the tribulation period? The Scripture doesn't say it has to be a lot of physical events upon this earth, like earthquakes and all that. But it does say one thing that will be in the tribulation is deception.

The thought that often comes through my mind is "What is there to say that we are not in that phase right now?" There have been more people who have starved through famines in this generation that in any time on the face of the world. There have been more people killed in war in this generation than at any time on the face of this world. There have been more people killed by earthquakes during this time than any time in the world.

Just because it's not happening in the United States. doesn't mean it isn't real. The economic conditions of the time is unrest. There is instability. There is the fear of nuclear war over all the world.

As I read the Scriptures concerning the events of the tribulation period, there is nowhere that I find that it is only going to last seven years. But we do read that one of the single greatest events of the tribulation period is deception. And we are in the midst of the greatest deception the world has ever known.

I don't see how it can get much worse. Deception that is real deception is deception that is hard to see.

The author of the "Martyr's Mirror" analyzed thousands upon thousands of martyr's deaths. He wrote a book about thousands of people and how they gave their lives.

He commented (he was apparently no longer under persecution, but under a benevolent government) that the time he was living in, was far, far more dangerous than the time of the martyrs. Satan was easily seen and observed. Anybody who served God gave their life, or at least was hunted down like animals.

But now Satan comes forth in pleasant and favorable disguises. He comes in a way that we desire him. He comes through the pleasures of this life, through pride, and through different areas where it is hard to discern him. But he is still the same devil coming in a different way. That's the peril of the last times.

"But as the days of Noe were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." Matthew 24:37. They planted, they builded, they gave and married wives, but when the Lord came, He destroyed them all. Beloved, we are in that type of a situation here in perilous times.

"Lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God." II Timothy 3:4. Forty years ago, our forefathers did not have to worry as much about the pleasures of this world. Technology had not reached the extent it could be brought right into our homes in the form of television or printed matter.

Second Thessalonians speaks about a man of sin and perdition coming with great signs, all power and lying wonders. This is one of the signs prior to the time of the return of the Lord.

One evening I was in a motel room. I

read the Bible that night and it opened to that Scripture about how the man of sin would come with all power, signs and lying wonders. Something snapped and made sense that night that never did before, even though I had read that Scripture many, many times.

I began to analyze what could come into my own room. There sat a television. You talk about wonders! There were events of the super natural that hold people fascinated. Wonders! There are abnormal feats of strength. Wonders! There are athletes, primed and fitted. Wonders!

The definition of wonders is anything that causes great amazement for people to be a follower, or to be impressed.

People are following the movie stars and the trends of this world. Wonders! Lying wonders! Who is in charge of the television? The man of sin who is coming in all power, signs and lying wonders.

Beloved, sometimes we miss the obvious things that are right before our eyes. We are waiting for fire to fall out of the sky, when "lying wonders" are before our very eyes. Sometimes the believer just can't see it. That is deception. That is the peril of the tribulation period. That is the peril of the last days. That was the period of the Laodicean church when they fell, and that is what faces you and me.

"Lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God." II Timothy 3:4. Satan becomes so powerful. He just has many tools. He comes in ways that appeal to the flesh. It is hard to resist. Let's be careful. Beloved, as your ministers, we are really concerned about you. When the Lord reveals some of these perils to us, we have an obligation. We have a duty to say it just like it is so that we might not fall prey to these perils.

Beloved, it speaks here of "lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God." Π Timothy 3:4. From time to time, our duties take us where we are talking with other people.

People's minds are filled with athletics today. It is on their minds as they watch and observe them. We might say, "What does getting all involved with athletics have to do with getting to heaven?"

Slowly, but surely, Satan is coming and whittling away at your spiritual life. That's the part of deception, I believe, that Christ was talking about. Some of latter days. He has the tools, beloved. these things we just have to let go. Flee Let's be careful.

youthful lusts that we followed when we were young. We are supposed to serve God.

The wonderful thing is that when we serve God, He helps us to be patient, to put on charity and live a separated life filled with the Spirit of God. What joy that is! Nothing we found before compares with it.

"For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous . . ." II Timothy 3:2. How easy it is to become snared to covet. We can covet earthly gain to the extent that we are disobedient. We have to be careful. It seems difficult in the times we are living to keep things going. When we get caught up in covetousness, we're tempted to tell what we call, "half-truths." Instead of it being a lie or dishonest it may be termed as being aggressive.

Beloved, there is honesty and there is dishonesty. These are all things we have to watch, so that we don't get caught up for a little bit of money.

We are reading Scripture this afternoon hour for the very reason stated in this verse, "That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." II Timothy 3:17. In other words, the Scripture will show us the way and what it takes to be throughly furnished in all good works.

Some of the thoughts from the book of Proverbs are also in the Scripture of Timothy. Some of the matters that we were asked to pursue and show forth in our Godly walk of life were matters of charity, patience and being at peace with one another, especially those we are dealing with and working with in our communities.

Solomon of old said, "When a man's ways please the Lord, he maketh even his enemies to be at peace with him." Proverbs 16:7.

When we are walking in the ways of the Lord, we are not perfect. Each of us sometime or other have wronged someone or have done something that we regretted. But, when we walk in the ways of the Lord, the Spirit convicts us and we realize that something should be done.

It's always a humbling thing to have to go back and say, "I'm sorry. I dealt wrong with you." Or, "I said something I wish I hadn't." When we carry this out, it seems that even hard-hearted people, even our enemies, can be softened by apologies and our asking for forgiveness. This will bring us to peace even with them.

Simple things like this, beloved, are the things in life that cause us to lay our heads down at night and sleep better. It's things like this that people are watching. If we have some rough edges with various people that we've dealt with, may the Lord even direct us to the proper way to deal with them.

There were many other good

thoughts here, "Pride goeth before destruction, and an haughty spirit before a fall. Better it is to be of an humble spirit with the lowly, than to divide the spoil with the proud." Proverbs 16:18, 19. It's a simple saying, but, beloved, pride can overtake each of us. Pride takes on several different forms. It doesn't necessarily have to be all outward. Outward pride cannot be hid, but there is also the inward pride.

The inward pride believes that we are a little bit more knowledgeable or that whatever the case might be, "We have all the answers." The devil knows the best way for pride to sneak into our lives. Certainly, for some people, it is easier to reach them inwardly than outwardly. We are all different.

But as pride begins to grow just a little bit, it will then exalt itself in the lifestyle that we live and start to come out. It becomes evident and the individual becomes weaker and weaker in the Lord as he becomes prouder and prouder.

The Bible says that, "God resists the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble." James 4:6. That's a simple teaching and a simple lesson, beloved. It is easy to understand. The difference between humility and pride is that humility is when an individual (by the dictionary definition) is able to admit he is wrong, and then able to ask for help.

Humility is the ability to see our shortcomings according to the Webster definition. When a person can no longer say, "I'm wrong," he is not humble. What I mean by "wrong," is when he compares his life to the Scripture. When a person finds himself in that state, It says, "Pride cometh before the fall." Even though the fall could be a ways off, it is in the process.

The writer of the proverbs then says,

"The hoary head is a crown of glory, if it be found in the way of righteousness." Proverbs 16:32. We might say, "My anger is short. I get it out of my system and then it is all through." That reminds me of an account where a woman had a short fuse. She was quick to anger. She was somewhat trying to justify her position to another man and said, "Yes, I am quick to anger, but in a minute it is all over and I'm settled down again." The man thought a little bit and said, "That's just like a shotgun. In a moment the blast is over, but look at all the damage it can do."

Beloved, we don't realize what anger can do, even to our own children. Sometimes they do something to us that instantly aggravates us and our first impulse is to let go. But, there are better times to discuss things than when we are angry.

It is better to be slow to anger and cool down, we might say, when we deal with others. Just like a shotgun, anger's blast is quick, but it can do a lot of damage, irreparable damage.

We also read the Scripture in Timothy. Timothy was a young man at the time this letter was written. The Apostle Paul was growing older and wanted to pass the torch, you might say, to younger brethren. He was trying to pass on information.

He speaks about youthful lusts and said, "Flee also youthful lusts:" II Timothy 2:22. I just saw a picture this morning in the newspaper of what it means to flee. There was a fire taking place and there were people running as fast and as far as they could to keep from getting burned.

The problem with man is, we feel that we can handle just a little bit of youthful lust. I believe the advice here is to get away from it as fast and as
