

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November next to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our service and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquility, union and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been established constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions, to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a government of wise, just and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us), and to bless them with good governments, peace and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally, to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

Given under my hand, at the city of New York, the third day of October, A.D. 1789.

VISITING THE BELIEVERS IN HUNGARY, ROMANIA, RUSSIA AND YUGOSLAVIA

After one year of prayerful consideration, it was revealed to Bro. Ben and Sis. Lorene Maibach and to my wife, Marcella, and I, that together we make a trip to Europe. With the encouragement and support of the elder body, Missionary Committee, World Relief Committee, our family and local congregations, we spent June of 1988 in Europe. Our mission was to observe and assist the Budapest Church building project, visit churches, and counsel with the elders and ministers. We wanted to observe the spiritual and physical conditions among believers in Hungary, Yugoslavia, Romania and Russia. Also, we wished to observe the World Relief Program that has been implemented in Europe for many years.

As a result of God's grace and the prayers of the church, our mission was completed with even greater success than we had ever anticipated.

Our trip began on June 1, 1988. Because of a severe storm, TWA flight 766 from Detroit did not arrive in (JFK) New York, with Bro. Ben and Sis. Lorene. Within two hours, we four were to leave for Stuttgart, Germany, but at departure time we still had had no contact from Bro. Ben and Sis. Lorene. We were advised by TWA to leave for Stuttgart and were informed that Bro. Ben and Sis. Lorene would be put on another flight. With calm assurance, Marcella and I left on flight 766 feeling the prayers of the church.

During the flight my thoughts and prayers could be summarized with: "Let my eyes see, my heart feel and my mind grasp what Thou Lord would have us to see, to hear, and understand. And then grant us grace to tell the story that Thou would have to be told to glorify Thy Name."

As we circled Stuttgart, we became a bit anxious, wondering if we would be able to communicate and if we would make contact with the person or persons there to meet us. Upon stepping out of the 747 we were engulfed in people, customs, and strange languages. After a short time, a tall gentleman stepped up to me and asked in broken English, "Are you Bro. Gudeman?" His eyes and smile spoke the same language as our hearts felt. He was Hans Heer, a fellow believer in Jesus Christ. Soon we were in the midst of other believers who cared for our every need. About six hours later Bro. Ben and Sis. Lorene arrived in Stuttgart, and together we spent twenty-nine days of precious fellowship and joy, mixed with occasional tears that will be in our memory for a lifetime.

For various reasons, I will omit listing personal names of believers we visited, but will try to convey the depth of their love and esteem for us who were privileged to visit them.

The Home for the Aged in Neuhatten, Germany, reminded us we were only walking in the steps of our brethren from America, who thirty-five years ago had the vision to assist in building this large Home for the Aged. Today it stands as a memorial of our love and care for the aged believers in Europe, just as our Homes here in America show our esteem and love for our aged here. It is a work of faith, a labor of love.

In Ludwigshafen - Oggersheim area, we attended a worship service with believers with whom our spirits blended. The elder brother's home has a large adjoining room which serves as the church. The crowded room proved the sincerity of their love. At the present time, they are prayerfully seeking a larger building in which to worship. We encouraged their efforts. The elder's son is also a beloved minister who speaks English very well. It was in this area that many of our boys in military service from our churches in America, were cared for physically, and spiritually during their time of duty after World War II. While in this area, we person ally observed medical supplies pur chased and sent to Hungary with funds provided through our World Relief.

The men of the church related

many accounts of how they were spared during World War II and how they later repented and experienced a conversion.

We drove through the area where American bombs were released, meant to destroy an intelligence stronghold. but fell instead on a village, taking the lives of 8,000 inhabitants in one night. A large mound marks the mass grave where women, children, aged, and military men, await a resurrection day. Each year a memorial is held of that fateful night of destruction. Today, because of Calvary, we, with tears of love, embrace the believers in the love of Jesus Christ. Our eyes saw, our ears heard, and our hearts felt compassion. We left Germany with the hymns of the Heft and Zion's Harp in our minds and with respect for the believers who are ambitious, making use of every opportunity both in body and soul. Shepherds lovingly care for the flocks of God in many churches.

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

The New Testament gives specific instructions for dealing with many aspects of life. There are also decisions which must be made by believers in areas which the Scriptures do not address directly. Romans 14 and 1 Corinthians 8 are devoted to several important principles which are to guide us in meeting these situations, both with regard to our own personal choices as well as our reactions to choices made by others, which may differ from ours. These two chapters deal with some of the greatest tests of true love within the brotherhood. We are instructed to adhere to three basic principles as we make such decisions: 1) we must "do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31); 2) we must esteem our brother so highly that we will seek to please him in our actions and likewise respect his opinion (1 Cor. 10:33; Rom. 14:3,10); and 3) we must strive for the things which keep peace in the church (Rom. 14:19).

It is clear that there will be some variation in what is considered acceptable within a group of believers. "For one believeth that he may eat all things: another, who is weak, eateth herbs." "One man esteemeth one day above another: another esteemeth every day alike." (Rom. 14:2,5) However, this is not a license to abandon the principle of likemindedness! These teachings refer to areas where no doctrinal position exists in the Scriptures and no specific standard has been established in the church.

The Holy Spirit revealed to the Apostles and elders that positions were to be established on certain issues and these were communicated to the churches (Acts 15), just as occurs in our brotherhood today. This is for the purpose of maintaining peace and good order in the church and to assist the believer in applying the truth of God's Word to everyday life (1 Tim. 3:15). This submission to godly order will help keep us from again becoming "a friend of the world" (James 4:4).

When the Apostle Paul wrote, ".

Offense and Judging

there is nothing unclean of itself: but to him that esteemeth anything to be unclean, to him it is unclean' (Rom. 14:14), he was obviously referring to those areas of life where the Scriptures are silent and no church standard exists. He certainly was not declaring that any act is all right if so viewed by the individual. This would be condoning relativism. a great deception of our time in which individuals establish their own personal moral standards based upon circumstances and their own thinking, rather than on the Word of God (Prov. 14:12).

"Weakness" in these chapters refers to a sensitivity of conscience about a certain matter which is not defined in the Scriptures as either right or wrong. It sometimes includes a feeling of need to have clear-cut universal patterns on such matters. "Strength" implies a faith that it is acceptable to participate in such a matter; and this should always be accompanied by a heartfelt attitude of charity and humility (1 Cor. 8:1-2). The Word does not praise or criticize either the weakness or the strength if each approach honors the Lord (Rom. 14:6). All of us experience both qualities to varying degrees, but when strong, we are to be very considerate and supportive of the weak (Rom. 14:21-23: 15:1-3).

The test of true love among brethren consists of the ability to deal with these areas of life without judging, grieving or offending each other, all of which are displeasing to God. Judging is determining on a personal basis that another has erred; this is especially serious when a person's motives are faulted. Grieving someone is to cause him severe distress. Offending is bringing spiritual harm to another person by causing him to stumble. The directives in these chapters clearly involve more than just minor annoyances or hurt feelings.

Individuals can misuse their weakness or strength about an issue as they relate to one another within the church. One who feels freedom of conscience on a matter may assume a superior or condescending attitude toward the weak. This attitude will make it very hard for him to defer to another's conscience, even when offense is involved (1 Cor. 10:29-33). "Knowledge puffeth up, but charity edifieth" (1 Cor. 8:1). The brother who feels he must abstain may demand that others defer to his convictions simply because he wants to have his own way. He might also conclude that anyone who doesn't share his opinion on a matter is in error, which then becomes a form of judging (Rom. 14:13).

Humble obedience to God's Word will keep the love of Christ flowing within the body of believers. Exhortations are given against extremes in observance of unnecessary restrictions (Rom. 14:17; Heb. 13:9) as well as for the need to keep one's "conscience void of offense toward God, and toward men," (Acts 24:16). Leaders were given to the house of Israel and to the church to provide guidance and help resolve conflicts. Of the priests it is written: "And they shall teach my people the difference between the holy and profane . . . and in controversy they shall stand in judgment . . ." (Ezek. 44:23-24). Of the New Testament leaders it is written that they should "rule well" and "labor in the word and doctrine" (1 Tim. 5:17), but never as "lords" who might lay unnecessary burdens upon the people (1 Pet. 5:3; Acts 15:28). No presumed strengths on the part of an individual should ever justify exemption from church-defined, biblicallybased standards of godliness.

Offense and judging are easily avoided if we adopt the "mind of Christ" (Phil. 2:5). Unspeakable joy on earth and eternal rewards in Heaven await those peacemakers who are motivated by genuine, sacrificial, Christ-like love, and who always esteem their brethren higher than themselves (Matt. 5:9; Rom. 12:10; Phil. 2:3).

From Germany, we traveled to Switzerland. Again we were received with much love and respect. The home of Paul Apprecht, a faithful believer in Jesus Christ, provided many hours of precious fellowship. A tour of the University of Zurich with an elder in Zurich, revealed to us that the nation of Switzerland has specific goals. Only 3% or less of their college students are "dropouts."

The true faith in Switzerland is being severely attacked by Satan using the New Age Movement, and various other tactics. The believers are being "sifted as wheat." We, in America, need to pray for the preservation of their true faith. Spending several days in Switzerland exemplified to us the beauty of God's creation. We enjoyed the Swiss Alps, the Matterhorn mountain with its majestic view, a special Swiss meal (roclett), but most of all, the fellowship of many believers whom we have confidence we shall meet in the resurrection.

On June 9, we drove through Austria on our way to Hungary. Travel was a little more difficult, especially through Innsbrook, Austria, where we stayed overnight. While in Innsbrook, our wives were able to purchase more articles for the believers in Yugoslavia such as coffee, oil. flour, sugar, soap, towels, etc. We had a packed car. We also learned that earth has no sorrow that heaven cannot heal" as several times, because of the lack of detail on the map we had, we lost our direction. One time a car pulled up beside us and asked in broken English, "Where you go?" We answered, "Auto Bahn." He told us to "just go straight, don't turn right or left." After traveling for what seemed to be a long time, we began to doubt his instructions. Then a policeman on a motorcycle pulled up beside us. He led us out of the city of Innsbrook to the Auto Bahn, headed for Budapest, Hungary. Do you get the spiritual connection of this account? "Go straight, don't turn to the right or left," don't doubt. In Genesis, an angel led Lot out of the city -- today the Holy Spirit and the Word will lead the church out of this world if we follow.

Dear church, many times we felt the protection of your prayers.

The speed of driving on the Auto Bahn brought back memories of my teenage years. A believer in the Lord Jesus cannot pray, "lead me not into temptation," and then personally tempt the Lord with excessive high speed that may be lawful on the Auto Bahn but does not edify the driver or those with him. We drove in moderation.

As we entered Hungary, we became aware of a different government. The Soviet Block of Nations, by God's permission, are permitted to rule, and we are to respect their order and authority as the Bible directs us.

When we stopped at the border of Hungary, we were courteously treated. We observed the large fields with very fertile soil that God had blessed with bountiful rain. The corn and wheat were a beautiful sight to behold -- just the opposite from the drought-stricken corn and bean fields we left on our farm in Francesville, Indiana. As we observed these thousands of acres of good crops, we became thankful for the people of Hungary. Could the Lord use this blessing to cause them to see and know there is a living God who alone can give rain and bountiful crops?

But more glorious than the beautiful crops was our first stop in Hungary, the meeting place at a truck stop, where we saw from a distance our beloved Bro. Andy Hunyady, and his brother, George, along with believers from Budapest. Our meeting was meaningful because now Bro. Andrew and his brother, George, would be used of the Lord in many ways to accomplish God's will in our mission. By their translation, we were able to communicate with believers, governmental authorities and at the Embassy.

Our first view of Budapest was not as we expected. We saw beauty, an old city of beautiful sculpture, and with the beautiful river Danube flowing through its center. The buildings spoke a silent language of over 1000 years of war and conflict dating back to the Roman age. In 1945, when the last bomb was dropped and the last shot fired, Budapest was a city of the homeless, a city with no bridges to cross the beautiful Danube, a city where our brethren kneeled to pray, a city where many unmarked graves of children, mothers, fathers and friends rest. It is a city where the Word of God could not be quenched. As the new bridges were built over the Danube, the remnant of true believers were building spiritual homes and bridges. With tearful sowing, they are seeing a glad harvest.

(Continued from Page 32) of God." Luke 9:20. Peter was bringing his confession and his faith. He was confessing his faith in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, that he, himself, recognized that Jesus was the Son of God.

In another portion of Scripture, based on Peter's confession and on Peter's faith, the Lord said, "That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church." Matthew 16:18. The faith that Peter had in Jesus Christ was on the Solid Rock, which is Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "I am going to build My church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." Matthew 16:18.

Beloved, how thankful we can be for the many promises and words of our Lord and Saviour Himself. We know that He is not going to go back on His Word. He is a faithful Lord and Saviour. He will fulfill those things that He has spoken.

He said the gates of hell will not prevail against the church that is built upon the Solid Rock, and that is Jesus Christ. so we know, beloved, that we have to come through the Door to the sheepfold, which is Jesus Christ. If we come in some other way, the Word tells us that we are thieves or robbers. We must come through Jesus Christ, the Door to this holy church.

Then we build our spiritual house, anchored upon that Solid Rock, that the foundation will not crumble in the time of trials and adversity. May the house of faith that you and I are building today stand firm and steadfast when the storms of life blow upon us.

Sometimes I wonder why He said to the disciples, "Don't tell anybody this right now." (See Luke 9:21). But He said, "The Son of Man must suffer many things, and be rejected of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be slain, and be raised the third day." (See Luke 9:21, 22). This then was going to complete the mission that His Father had given Him to carry out the wonderful plan of salvation.

Because of a faithful Lord and Saviour, you and I are sitting here today with a clear conscience. We have been cleansed by the blood of Jesus Christ. You and I are sitting here today not feeling condemnation, but rather feeling and entertaining within ourselves a hope of eternal life. Our Lord and Saviour was hot ashamed to walk here upon this earth, speak of why He was here and then go to the cross. He was not afraid but believed that God would be with Him.

Jesus went to that cross and took your sins and my sins with Him and nailed them to the cross, so that you and I might now have this wonderful hope and this longing to be with our Lord in all eternity. But there are certain requirements that we must meet in order to enter through the Door into the sheepfold.

] Our Lord and Saviour lovingly laid some of them out in this chapter. We can be thankful that He thought enough of God's creation that He was willing to instruct at that time, and said to them all, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me." Luke 9:23. That doesn't sound too hard, does it? When we sit down and rally analyze the things of this life, is there anything in this life that we would not want to deny ourselves of?

We know that Satan is so crafty. He is not satisfied with those that he has in his clutches, but when one escapes his prison cells that he holds them in, he is right back out there trying to get them back. He is never satisfied. He knows where he is going to end up and he wants others to be with him.

But here the Lord said, "If any man will come after me..." Our Lord and Saviour has gone out and is calling souls. How thankful we are that we have evidence from time to time that there are hearts that are touched and answer His call. He said that those who would come after Him should deny themselves. He didn't say the things of the world, did He? He said to deny himself. So we look at ourself and we wonder, "What did the Lord mean?" I believe every one of us knows it is the lusts of the flesh, the pride of life and the lusts of the eye. I believe that every one of us knows of the desires of the flesh. To the flesh, the things of the world seem to sparkle and they seem to draw us.

That is why the Lord said to deny yourself. We have to deny the things that this flesh looks after. The way, beloved, to keep that flesh in subjection, is to see it nailed to the cross. This old fleshly body has to be nailed to the cross of Jesus Christ. This flesh has to die to those things that it lusted after, ran after, and was pursuing after. Then we will be willing to deny ourselves, take up our cross daily and follow Him.

... Take up our cross daily... I believe that every soul that is born into this world has a cross. We can look out over the whole wide world and see people that seemingly don't have a cross, but we don't know what is going on inside. We don't know the struggle that that person has in their mind, in their heart or in their walk of life. There are many different crosses that come upon mankind and so we don't know the cross that everyone has to bear. I believe that everyone has a cross.

We don't have to feel that when we take up our cross daily that we are doing anything different from anyone else in the world. I believe, beloved, that the Lord wants us to take what He gives to us and to bear it patiently. Then it says, "... follow Me." Luke 9:23.

When we willingly take up the cross of our Lord and Saviour, then we put our will into His will. We know as we sing in that song, that the beams lie across each other. But it tells us when they lie parallel, then it is easier to carry. When we can submit our will to His will, how much easier it is to carry that cross!

We can be thankful that the Lord has said that He would help us to carry that cross. He will help us to endure all things but He wants us to prove our love by our obedience to Him. He tells us here, "Take up your cross daily and follow Me." (Luke 9:23).

So we take up our cross in patience and in love for our Lord and Saviour and for one another. Even in this spiritual walk of life, if we see one that has a cross a little heavier than we think we have, we try to help them bear it, don't we?

How many times have things come into our lives that seem to make the cross a little heavier. It almost seems like we would stumble under the weight of that cross. When we are submissive and commit ourselves to God, we know that somehow He helps us through he trying times.

God brings it to our minds that we have no promise of tomorrow. We heard of the tragedy just east of us of a young man being killed. The sorrow and the hurt that that family must endure, the cross must be heavy. Then, to the west of us, another young man, twenty-two years old, his life was taken in an instant. How heavy the cross must be. God alone is the judge, but this young man was raised in the faith. he was taught in Sunday school and I'm sure his parents taught him at home. It leaves a question mark in our minds, doesn't it? How much better we would feel, if one like that could have confessed before hand that he had a hope. We only can pray that God, as His is always merciful, was merciful to him.

We often think of the thief on the cross. It puts a fear into my heart that anyone would ever wait until that time as the thief did on the cross. He did have time to look to the Saviour. His eyes turned to the Saviour and said, "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." The Lord said to him, "Today shalt thou be with me in paradise." Luke 23:42, 43.

If we put too much trust in "that is the way it is going to happen to me," we might be disappointed someday. God gives us the opportunity today and He said, "Today when ye hear My voice, harden not your hearts." Hebrews 4:7.

In Galatians we read, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Galatians 6:7. It tells us that if we try to save that life, we are going to lose it. We will also lose eternal life. But if we put away and lose that life, then we are going to save life eternal. We will be ready when our Lord comes. I believe everyone here realizes that the Lord is going to come again.

He tells us here, "For what is a man advantaged, if he gain the whole world, and lose himself, or be cast away?" Luke 9:25. Why would God cast anybody away when He is such a God of love? Because of sin. He gave that which was the dearest to Him...

. His Son. If man continually rejects our Lord and Saviour and continues in sin and unrighteousness; if man doesn't even recognize what God has done for him, then God has no choice but to cast him away.

It tells us here, "For what is a man advantaged, if he gain the whole world, and lose himself . . ." Luke 9:25. We can be out there striving, and enjoying the things of this world. I remember a brother today, who was out in the world . . . and didn't come to church any more. Then all of a sudden out there in the world, the Lord convicted him. He said it puts fear in him yet today to realize how far out in the world he was. The Lord could have cast him away, but the Lord was merciful. He said it puts a fear in his heart today to realize how far away from the truth, how far away from the Lord and from what he was taught, that he had travelled. He is so thankful that the Lord brought him back.

Here it tells us, "If we gain the whole world . . ." Is it to our advantage to gain the whole world, then lose ourselves for eternity? Remember that rich man? He had a lot. He had so much that he had to tear down his old barns and build new bigger barns so that they could hold all his possessions and the crops that he harvested. He didn't think of anything else. He didn't think of the soul that he had been given. He thought of this life, and he thought perhaps he had gained the whole world.

He said, "Now I've got all this and I'm just going to take it easy and enjoy myself." What were the words? "Thou fool . . . Thou fool, this night thy souls shall be required of thee: then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided?" Luke 12:20.

"For whosoever shall be ashamed of me and of my words, of him shall the Son of man be ashamed, when he shall come in his own glory, and in his Father's, and of the holy angels." Luke 9:26. That speaks to every one of us. If we are going to be ashamed of the Lord, or of His words, then He is going to be ashamed of us on that day when He comes in His own glory. He is going to come and rapture His church. He is going to come as a Judge someday. We are going to have to give an account of how we have lived here upon this earth.

"But I tell you of a truth, there be some standing here, which shall not taste of death, till they see the kingdom of God." Luke 9:27. Perhaps that is a little harder to understand or know just exactly what the Lord is talking about. Perhaps there are different interpretations of that. Maybe the Lord was trying to tell some of those people there that they were going to miss the plan of salvation because they didn't want to believe or because they put it off too long. There were some standing there that would not taste of death, eternal death, until the Lord comes again.

May it be, that each one of us here are worthy to escape that eternal death; and that we would be worthy to be with our Lord and Saviour. As He has gone to the Father and sits there on His right hand, may you and I be of those that will sit at the feet of Jesus. SILVER LINING

In the first reading Jacob was instructed to go to Bethel and build an altar to God. Jacob said unto his household and all that were with him, "Put away the strange gods that are among you, and be clean, and change your garments." Genesis 35:2. They were obedient. We did not find that there was an argument or that they became contentious. They were all willing to give up those things and go with Jacob because he was instructed by God to go to Bethel to build an altar. They put the strange gods out of their lives.

I had to think as we read those words, of our lives. When we were yet in our unconverted state, we were instructed to come out of the bondage of sin and Satan and the slavery that we were in. We were to come out from that and put away those things of this world. Then we were to put on a clean garment.

He wondered just what kind of, shall we say, "feedback," the disciples were getting from the people. I believe our Lord and Saviour could see into the hearts of every man then as He can today. But He wanted to know what the disciples thought as the people talked to them about Him (Jesus). "They answering said, John the Baptist; but some say, Elias; and others say, that one of the old prophets is risen again." Luke 9:19.

We can see that the people realized that Jesus had something that was special. They knew of John the Baptist, Elias, and many of the prophets of old. They knew that many of those things that were prophesied had been fulfilled. They knew that what the prophets had spoken was truth and, I believe, realized what our Lord and Saviour was speaking also must be truth.
