

As we approached the church in Budapest, I did not recognize the building as a church because of "the wall" along the street. But once inside "the wall" we were met by thirty to forty workmen and sisters who were waiting to serve us a meal. It was about 2:00 p.m. when we sat down to a delicious meal that consisted of many courses. Their food and generous hospitality were a special love gift to us.

The workmen were believers and friends who were constructing the

new church across the street for which we, in America, have had the opportunity to lend financial assistance. We observed the hand of God as a united team of dedicated workers and church shepherds work together in love. They are building a beautiful edifice where the Word of God may be preached for the edification of the church, bringing glory to God and awakening many to the need of a Saviour.

As we worshipped together in Budapest, tears flooded our eyes when the church raised their voices in singing "Christian Greetings" to us. We started our service at 9:00 a.m. and

left the church at 8:30 p.m. with hearts filled with love and minds filled with memories.

At a special meeting in Budapest with the man in charge of the "Ministry of Religious Affairs," he commended the orderliness of the building project. For this we are thankful. Many times the believers in Budapest expressed their thanks to us for the love and assistance from America.

The opportunity was granted us to meet with thirteen elders and ministers of Hungary, in Szeged, another beautiful city. An elder from Russia also met with us. Our day together found us discussing the same concerns and dangers that confront our churches in America. We were comforted by the Word of God and the Holy Spirit that led, guided and dwelled among us.

THE ENDOWMENT FUND OF THE APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF AMERICA

The elder body has approved the formation of The Endowment Fund of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. This fund has been created for better stewardship of assets given to the church for the Lord's work.

In addition to outright gifts, the Endowment Fund would receive gifts from donors who want their gifts used over a period of years rather than immediately. The donor may designate how the gift should be used, or the use can be left to the discretion of the Endowment Fund management committee.

The Endowment Fund can also accept non-cash gifts and can provide advice on compliance with tax laws to provide more funds for the Lord's work than would be possible without following the tax guidelines. An example is a gift of real estate, securities or other properties on which the donor can receive all or part of the income during the donor's lifetime.

The Endowment Fund would use its assets in the following ways:

1. To assist existing church funds such as local and national charity, World Relief, Mission and Bible funds.

2. To provide a source of funds for ongoing projects, unusual or unexpected needs as deemed fit and proper by the Elder-supervised Endowment Fund Committee.

3. To provide emergency loans and grants for other funds or projects within the church.

Secular Humanism

In recent years secular humanism has become one of the most influential false beliefs in our land. Today it is Christianity's greatest rival! This article is intended to expose the fallacy of humanism and describe how it may influence individual believers and ultimately the church.

Humanism is a system of beliefs which essentially becomes a secular (worldly, temporal) "religion" to those who espouse it. However, true followers of God would not think of it as a religion. Humanism is a philosophical view which emphasizes the centrality of man, his dignity and worth, his capacity for self-realization through reason, his autonomy (complete freedom from restraint), control of his own destiny, his capacity to solve the world's and society's problems without any external help (such as God), and his capabilities as a rational being, possessing the source of truth and right. Secular humanists go so far as to declare that man cannot rely on some deity to save him; they claim that man must save himself. Man exalts himself above God!

Secular humanists believe that man is basically good, not evil as stated in the Bible (Matt. 19:16-17; Rom. 3:23). Most deny faith in God as Creator of the universe and Revealer of all truth; whereas the Bible teaches that man must have faith to please God (Hebrews 11:6).

Secular humanists believe that the universe is self-existent and that man is the product of evolution rather than divine Creation. Because they discount life after death, they believe that self-satisfaction and the pursuit of happiness are the only realistic and meaningful goals of mankind. Having rejected the Bible, secular humanists believe that ethics and morality come from human experience and ideas, not from God. As a result, they recognize and accept variant sexual activities and immoral lifestyles as being valid even though condemned by the Bible. In addition to this, some of them even accept abortion, euthanasia (mercy-killing) and suicide as being legitimate alternatives for mankind.

With the eye of faith, one can easily discern how these beliefs conflict with God's Word. One can also recognize the effect they have had on our society, particularly on such matters as public school prayer, abortion, and pornography.

It is well to consider some of the areas in which this philosophy may influence our children and even the brotherhood. The educational system today is heavily tainted with humanistic ideas. Thus, children are exposed in varying degrees to these unbiblical viewpoints, including the false teachings of evolution and situation ethics (the belief that the particular situation one finds himself in determines the appropriate response rather than application of the absolutes of God's Word).

Educators today often place primary emphasis on human reasoning, which sometimes erodes a simple faith in the Bible and in God. Schools are simply a reflection of society; if distortions of the truth are taught there, it is because society has allowed and willed it to happen. Television programming has also had a major role in fostering humanistic lifestyles and attitudes through its emphasis on and portrayal of immorality, violence and other evils. When man, rather than God, becomes the measure of all things, man deteriorates to a lower and lower estate because there are no absolute standards to uphold. Perhaps more importantly than ever before, every effort must be made by parents, Sunday School teachers and ministers to counteract these evil influences with scriptural truth. Jesus said, "I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them from the evil" (John 17:15).

Humanism has precipitated a general decline in respect for authority. This too has made its presence

felt in the church. Humanistic thinking challenges all authority—including God, the church, and its leadership. Biblical references to the importance of submission to spiritual authority are abundant (Eph. 5:21; Heb. 13:17; Rev. 22:14). The humanist considers such submission as degrading. He also views the biblical description of the role of the godly woman to be demeaning, since she is taught to be subject to her husband and a keeper of the home (Col. 3:18, Eph. 5:22, Tit. 2:5). It is no coincidence that the advancement of the women's rights movement has paralleled the increasing impact of humanistic thinking on society.

Humanistic influence has insidiously caused some believers to follow their own personal preferences with regard to observance of doctrinal teachings and church traditions. Humanistic influence has resulted in some believers exalting their own views above the consensus of church leadership. Further, humanistic inclinations have undermined a healthy sensitivity toward the weaker brother's conscience. The Bible teaches that man should not rely on his own understanding (Prov. 3:5). because he can sometimes deceive himself (Prov. 14:12). The believer should hold fast to scripturally-based conclusions drawn by the church leadership (Acts 15, 2 Thes. 2:15). Humanistic attitudes can mislead one to conclude that if he prays about something and feels no conviction about doing it, he has the liberty to ignore church counsel; when in fact the matter in question may be a doctrinal precept or church tradition. "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit ..." (Col. 2:8).

We must stand firmly on the truth of the Word of God. The Lord Jesus said, "If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:31-32).


During this past year, Sisters Becky Knapp (Dave) and Jane Huette (Curtis) from Goodfield, IL, have been

AWA (Apostolic Water Aid)

Unknown to anyone in the Apostolic Christian Church, a conservative evangelical Baptist Church in South Haiti was praying that God would motivate some Christian group to help them provide safe, clean drinking water for their people. As little as 15% of the people of Haiti have a safe.

KINDERGARTEN TEACHER **NEEDED IN JAPAN**

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Kathy Jo Kieser and Sis. Renee Baurer are now teaching. Sis. Kathy Jo will be leaving the kindergarten next July and a brother or a sister who is qualified to teach kindergarten is needed to replace her. Anyone who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to his or her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The brother or sister is asked to give two or more years of his or her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10minute walk from the church.

1986. Five brothers from the Bluffton, IN, congregation traveled to Haiti in February of 1987 on a mission of faith, to help drill water wells in an area of South Haiti that had seen only a few precious water wells. Though there were many obstacles. it was the Father's will that these Haitian Christians were to have the clean water they were praying for, A well was successfully drilled and a heavy duty Smits hand pump installed in the city of Simon. This well was used constantly, except for a few hours after midnight, and there is still a constant line of people waiting to fill

their buckets to this day.

From this humble beginning the Haitians now have several systems that provide a safe, sanitary method of digging water wells by hand to depths of up to 100 feet. Our work teams have also trained the Haitian drilling group to use the rotary drill rig originally sent to Haiti. Their ability to utilize this equipment is amazing, considering their cultural disadvantages. To date, there have been 27 wells drilled and the pace is rapidly increasing. It is estimated that at least 56,000 people now have clean water who were drinking diseased and parasitic ridden surface water. If we apply the infant mortality rate, in rural Haiti, due to bad water, of 11% to 50%, we begin to appreciate the number of just children, the Father has seen fit to save. Sometimes it's difficult to relate to other people so far away, but what if large numbers of our children or grandchildren were dying in this way? If we had to watch them suffer and waste away, this is not a pleasant way to die. What form would our prayers take? What would our feelings be if we saw these prayers being answered?

If the Lord wills, there will be additional work teams sent to Haiti this winter to help train the Haitian drilling group in the use of a new rotary rig that has cleared customs this summer. We would also like to send at least one team to help develop a spring for use as a drinking water source for a village. We are also involved in creating vocational (trade) schools, in conjunction with the MEBSH Church, to help the Haitian Christian to earn a living, and also to help combat the 60% unemployment rate in South Haiti. Many small farmers raise sugar cane on the flat lands near the coast, and we have been involved in a surveying project that would allow the farmers to irrigate their land and raise a much more profitable rice crop. With the help of many Apostolic Christians, the Lord allowed us to furnish a much needed semi tractor and trailer for these people to help transport animal feed, agricultural products to market, and a variety of other functions.

Drilling wells in Haiti is only part of the struggle to provide the people of Haiti with good water. There are only several pumps in the world that will withstand the grueling, constant use experienced by pumps in Haiti. We were privileged to meet the originator of one of these pumps, and he graciously permitted us the manufacturing rights to his pump. These pumps, named Smits after their originator, are currently being built in the Bluffton area with volunteer labor and funds provided by World Relief.

These accomplishments are the fruits of many individuals in the Apostolic Christian Church, especially World Relief, and several other concerned groups. But far and above all of us mortals, the praise and real credit goes to our mighty, loving Father. It's amazing and stimulating to see His love and concern for His creation, even in a poor little island in the Caribbean. It's really refreshing to be a part of a church that God is using to answer fervent prayer, on the part of His children, in other parts of His world. We ask that you will pray that God will bless all of the efforts of the Apostolic Christian World Relief as we struggle to be sensitive to His will and call to service. Perhaps the Lord will have a direct part for you in this work someday, but being a member of the Apostolic Christian Church, your prayers and support, makes you a partner in this effort. If you feel a desire to help in any way, contact your local elder or local World Relief representative.

(Continued from Page 2) many of the believers' homes, we could observe their children and family lifestyle. In almost every home, the children were learned in music and would gather around the piano or organ and sing beautiful Christian hymns. Love and respect in the home, for parents and guests, is a reflection of consistent Biblical training. Our love for the youth, the teenagers of Germany, Hungary and Yugoslavia, compels us to remember them in prayer. Memories of them linger in our hearts.

As we left Hungary, we left a people we had come to love, with a desire in our hearts to return. We crossed the border to Yugoslavia, our passports were stamped, and we were courteously granted passage. It is the practice in Yugoslavia, that when you enter the city where you intend to lodge, to report to the police station within twenty-four hours. We were permitted freedom and traveling privileges throughout the country.

At Nodi Sad, a large congregation was gathered for Sunday services which started at 8:00 a.m. and lasted till 12:45 p.m.; then after a lunch break, gathered together again for worship service which lasted until evening. We had the privilege of hearing several converts share their testimonies with the church. Our hearts were moved when one young lady conveyed to us, through an interpreter, that God is now her heavenly Father and the church gives her motherly love and care, providing a spiritual family environment. The true church is a pure virgin espoused to Christ. II Corinthians 11:2. The dear young lady testified of three bap-

- 1. The baptism of water, the symbol of her death with Christ.
- 2. The baptism of the Holy Spirit, which she received in her heart.
- 3. The baptism of Fire -- the trials that will come to purify her.

Each of the three souls were baptized and added to the flock of God. We then had song service, which was a great blessing. It is very common for them to gather together several times a week to sing.

What the majestic view of the Swiss Alps with the Matterhorn mountain did to stir our hearts, the majestic sound of the believers' hymns did to stir our inner spiritual being. Both are to exemplify God's glory and praise.

At the close of one song service, I noticed eyes fill with tears and heard the soft sobs of a family. By interpretation through Bro. Andy, I learned that a dear young man would leave very soon to fulfill his term in "special" military service. Twenty-nine young men are now serving in some type of "special" service and their faith is often tested. But the Word is still true, "God will not suffer us to be tempted more than we are able to bear -- but will with the temptation make a way to bear it." I Corinthians 10:13.

They are comforted by our prayers and the financial aid we send as "proof of our love." Continue to pray for their governmental leaders to be merciful, and for the young men to have courage, faith and grace to be faithful.

Sitting near the young believer who was to leave for service, was a man who was middle aged, strong bodied, but blind. We were told that one day he noticed his four children playing with a grenade, left from the war, which they had found in the soil of their yard. Quickly the father took the old grenade from his children, but it was too late to save himself. As the result of the explosion, he became permanently blinded. He had seen his children for the last time.

Our Saviour took the deadly grenade of sin from us and paid the penalty of our sin with His life and blood that we might see spiritually. Are we thankful?

They lead this blind father to an area of the city where someone reads the Word, and then he preaches from the Word. Let this be an encouragement to us.

In Yugoslavia, as in Hungary, we had the opportunity to meet with seventeen elders and ministers and spent many hours discussing the spiritual lives of the believers in these end times. Our general topics were:

- 1. The gradual departure from the Christlike fellowship.
- 2. Drifting toward the ways of the world.

- 3. Departure from the true foundation.
 - 4. The effect of ecumenicity.

They told us, "What is good for the body is often bad for the soul spiritually."

With hearts of compassion, they yearn for a united elder body as we enjoy in America. We have fifty-one elders seated together twice a year to steady the ship of faith on the stormy sea of life, with God's Word as our compass and the Holy Spirit as our guide.

After a very lengthy discussion, we left with the conviction that, as the prophet Ezekiel wrote in 37:16-28, the "two sticks" are in the hand of the Lord. We have a comfort and confidence, that they of Europe and we of America, who remain faithful, are sticks (people) in the hand of the Lord. There only, we find refuge and safety.

The hour had come to bid our fellow believers in Christ Jesus, farewell. In the two weeks of fellowship together we all grew in the grace and strength of our Lord Jesus. Our eyes did see, our ears did hear and our hearts did burn within us as we blended our voices in the song, "Fellowship Of Kindred Minds Is Like To That Above."

The embrace from our beloved brother from Russia will long be remembered, he left us to travel twenty hours by train back to Russia, to feed the flock of God entrusted to him by the Holy Spirit. Our fellowship with our Russian co-laborer was blessed by the many things we learned from him, who in obedience to the Word of God, respects his God and government's authority. The parting gesture was to press the hand to the heart -- then to each other -- then raise the hand toward heaven. This meant, if we never meet again on earth, we shall by God's grace, meet again in heaven. We parted, and only our heavenly Father knows the day and hour we shall meet again. Are we ready?

Before we left Yugoslavia, we went to Cervenca, the home of the Gutwein family, the birthplace of Marcella's father. Several others accompanied us, including an older elder. Under their excellent direction, we drove to the old mill, where grandfather Philip Gutwein, Sr., the elder in Cervenca, had his milling business. We saw where he reared six sons and one daughter. By faith and with conviction, they came to America in 1905 for the purpose of freedom of worship. He started the Milling Company in Francesville and was elder of the new church here.

The mill in Cervenca still stands, but is abandoned. The old well, where grandfather Gutwein drank, still pumps water. The older elder traveling with us related that he personally was present in 1929, when four souls were baptized inside the old mill.

Today, where the church once stood, stands a police station, and the way of life in Cervenca is changed. As we drove away, we had taken many pictures of the old mill, the well, the canal, and the town where grandfather lived. Pictures may fade, but our eyes did see, our ears did hear, and our hearts did receive a message that we want to tell for God's glory.

At this time on our trip, our beloved Bro. Andy Hunyady and his brother, George, who served the Lord so faithfully in translation for us all, were able to visit their relatives in Romania. We were not permitted to go, so we bid them farewell as they went as faithful ambassadors of good will

Please pray for the people of Romania. We were told of an account of three aged sisters who ran very low of food. One, because of love for the other two, refused to eat. Just as death was imminent, a food package arrived, sent through our World Relief, and grateful thanks were given to God. Many accounts and stories of God's special grace in time of great need were confirmed to us by many believers.

Bro. Andrew confirms that the hand of God prospered their trip and mission to Romania, which we feel was another example of the results of a praying home church.

Before our plane departed from Rome, Italy, at the end of June, Bro. Ben, Sis. Lorene, Sis. Marcella and I had drawn very close in spirit and kinship. We had the opportunity to visit the Catacombs and spent a length of time in the prison in Rome where the Apostle Paul was imprisoned. Here, while in prison for his faith and love for his Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit inspired him

to write to his loved brethren for

whom he prayed daily.

The prison was below ground level with stone walls and a damp floor. Here, in a very subdued light, he wrote to the Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and a loving letter to Philemon. Why? Because his eyes had seen, his ears had heard, and his heart did believe that the preaching of the cross is foolishness to them that perish, but it is the power of God unto salvation to them that believe.

God gave him grace to tell the story. Grace is still sufficient for every believer to live for the Lord Jesus, love the church and tell the story

with a sanctified life.

Thanks, dear church, for the prayers that made this trip a bless-

ing.

Jesus did not hurry to that place.

You know, if we get in a hurry with God, He will find a way to slow us down. Take my word for it. If you haven't experienced it, you will. That's the way God works. But His work is perfect. God doesn't do anything unless it is right. Here the Lord took His time. "My daughter is at the point of death. Would You please hurry?" Can't you imagine that father saying to himself... "She is going to die, Lord, if You don't get there!"

But, the Lord took His time. On the way He even had time to help somebody else. He always has time to be available when someone has a

problem.

This woman had a physical affliction, an issue of blood. She went to all kinds of doctors. Does that "ring a bell" with anybody? Today you have a problem and this doctor can't help, so you go to that one. You go and try everything. She tried everything without any results. She finally came to the point, as she watched Jesus, to have that faith to believe that if she could just get close enough to touch the hem of His garment, she would be healed.

Do you get the message? Do you see what it requires? She had it! And when she touched that garment, what happened to the Lord? He stopped in all the multitude!

Do you begin to see how God works? Can we see how He works in the world today? There's more than three billion people -- going to be four billion before too long -- in the world today; And . . . God can see one person!

Here is a typical example for any person. Satan likes to tell us. "God won't listen to you. Look, there is almost 4,000,000,000 people in this world; how in the world is He going to find you?" Here is an example of the proof. Jesus is going through the multitude of people. Nobody said a word to Him, but . . . she touched His garment and Jesus felt virtue going out of Him. Jesus turned to His disciples and said, "Who touched My clothes? And his disciples said unto Him. Thou seest the multitude thronging thee. and sayest thou, Who touched Me?" Mark 5:30, 31. Just like human beings, they said, "Why everybody's been touching You!" But Jesus felt virtue go out of Himself, and that explained it.

"And He looked around about to see her that had done this thing. But the woman fearing and trembling, knowing what was done in her, came and fell down before Him, and told Him all the truth." Mark 5:32, 33.

You know, my friends, let me tell you something: You've got to touch Jesus . . . You have to come to Him . . . That's a prerequisite . . . There's no forcing . . . And when you touch Him, He will know you, He will turn

to you and recognize you!

It is a beautiful story. Somebody like you and me had simple faith to believe when she had reached the end of her rope. She couldn't go any further. She tried everything man had to offer. She knew that this was her last chance. She recognized the fact that it was not only her last chance, but it has the only chance that she had.

Now we've talked about physical things, but there is also the spiritual. We all know that this old body is going to die, don't we? That's no secret. I don't care who you are or what kind of faith you have, everybody dies sometime. But there is an undying soul in each one of us; it is going to live forever somewhere. Here we have a perfect story . . . a perfect analogy from the spiritual sense of the way Christ works. We ought to learn that lesson. When we reach the end of the rope, there is no place else to go. Men go to the highest places of learning in the land and come away disappointed. We can go to the most intelligent government in the world and come away disappointed.

It is mankind's natural inclination to look to men or to governments to help them out of their problems or to assist them. It is sad, isn't it, when we see what men are trying to do. It is through Jesus Christ, the One and the Only Perfect Individual who ever walked on this earth, the Son of God, that we find what we need.

When we recognize where we can get our health in a spiritual sense, when we are ready to give up everything and say, "Lord, there is nothing that can help me except You," He will turn and He will help us.

"He looked round about to see her that had done this thing." Mark 5:32. All we have to do in a spiritual sense is touch the hem of Jesus' garment. That is what He wants. "I'm done with everything else, Lord, help me." That's my simple way of putting it.

My prayer when I repented was three words: "Lord, help me." If it is uttered in the context and manner where our heart yields our all to Him, He will help. Believe me, Jesus will help you.

"But the woman fearing and trembling, knowing what was done in her, came and fell down before Him . . . (That isn't the end!) . . . came and fell down before Him, and told Him . . . (What?) . . . all the truth!" Mark 5:33.

Here is another key to getting into the kingdom of God; telling it just the way it is! She told all the truth and did not hide anything from God. The Almighty God, the Lord Jesus, knows everything that we do and every thought; good, bad, or indifferent. He knows it! But she came and was willing to tell Him all that ever she did! What a purging that was!

Do you begin to see the parallels and the doctrine of true faith? Do you see why it is so necessary for each step in order for a person to really get right with God? I think you do.

"And He said unto her, Daughter, thy faith hath made thee whole; go in peace, and be whole of thy plague." Mark 5:34.

Let's talk about the rest of this story and then sum up with the one thought here that keeps coming back over and over again.

"While He yet spake, there came from the ruler of the synagogue's house . . ." Mark 5:35. Jesus didn't make it to the house! Remember, they were going toward the house and this man said, "Lord, come; my daughter is going to die." We tried to relate how anxious he would be for Jesus to get there.

Finally some messengers came and said, "Thy daughter is dead: (so don't) trouble . . . the master any further." Mark 5:35.

Jesus Christ, in this particular instance, had a calling to prove to them that His power was power over death and the grave. That's the final key!

God used Jesus at this particular time to show those people that His power was beyond death and the grave. Man's thinking was, "No use bothering Him now; She was sick, but now she is dead. He probably could have healed that disease; but there is noth-

ing He can do now because she is dead. There's not a thing that the Lord can do any more."

But Jesus said, "Be not afraid, only believe." Mark 5:36.

Now what does He mean? "Be not afraid, only believe?" In the agony of his soul, the father's daughter was dead. And, now the Lord said, "Be not afraid, only believe." What does He mean? We know the rest of the story. Jesus said, "Why make ye this ado, and weep? the damsel is not dead, but sleepeth." Mark 5:39. "And they laughed Him to scorn ..." Mark 5:40. They knew that she was dead. But, that little girl, 12 years old, was brought back to life. It wasn't that she was in a coma. This is one of man's first reasonings: "Well, she was in a coma; she really wasn't dead." Oh, yes, she was!

Remember the story about Lazarus and the tomb; he was dead for four days! "Lord, don't go near it! Don't roll that stone away!" They didn't have embalming fluid in those days. "The body's decomposition is taking place and you're going to get an odor that is terrible."

What is the Lord trying to tell us? He is trying to tell us that . . . if we trust in Him: we have power over death and the grave; we can win the victory over death. That's what He is trying to tell us! Jesus said, "I have power over death." The final proof of that came at His resurrection . . .!

Why do we have to repeat these things? Why is it necessary for us to talk about these things that are so common and that we have heard over and over again? I'll tell you why: Because, for myself first of all, and for most every human being that ever walked, our faith is not strong enough.

We need to . . . be reminded that we should trust in the Lord, be reminded of what Jesus had done for us, to be reminded of these stories and miracles that took place, review them in our own mind and digest them again in a spiritual sense. Then our faith can again be reestablished and renewed so that we can trust Him completely in everything!

If we get serious enough, we can go to the Lord and ask Him for help, saying, "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief." Mark 9:24.

What was it that solved the problem in both of these cases? What was it that those individuals had to enable them to accomplish what they wanted? Faith. Faith!

Read Hebrews, chapter 11. Faith. Read the review of all those men who had faith in the past. Review, if you will, on a more current basis, those among you in your own community, who, not of their own selves, not because of their own ability, but by faith they walked this life and they concluded their life with hope of everlasting life and eternity.

Have you ever had the experience, the wonderful experience, to be close enough to somebody that when they died you saw them smile? They were ready to go to meet the Lord! Have you ever had that wonderful experience? That will open your eyes.

One that I will never forget was a paraplegic, now gone for many, many years. All his life, this young man was a wheelchair patient and very seldom got to church. I will never forget the story my mother told me because she was a good friend to his mother. This young man repented. On his death bed, he opened his eyes, a smile came across his lips and he said words to this affect, "Oh, Mother, I see the beautiful green trees and the beautiful green fields." And he died. You know, this is what we are talking about. He was looking forward to something better; and in the vision that he was given, there was something more beautiful than he had seen on earth. He knew what his reward was. He knew what was beyond the grave for him. You can cut the strings to this old life. You can clip off the humanity within us . . . and look for something ahead.

You know, that's why we are here again this morning; so that when the time comes . . . whether it is an automobile accident, cancer, heart attack or just laying down our head on a pillow and going to sleep, we are ready to go. We can see something that God has in store for us that is so much better than what we have here.

This is the answer!... This is the key!... Faith. Faith in Jesus Christ and in the fact that He is the Son of God!

By following His teachings and by believing Him, we humans can have hope of eternal life for that undying soul within us! Isn't it wonderful? Isn't God good to us? FEB 02602 CHARLES WALDER

SERMON BY ELDER BRO. ROBERT N. GRIMM OF GOODFIELD, IL

Text: Mark 5:21-43

We have read these words that are very familiar. The story is familiar. I wonder if the impact of the events that took place, really make the impression upon our hearts that they ought to. Do we really believe that these events took place here on earth among men? Can we testify without questions in our minds and accept without reservation the fact that this Man, Jesus Christ, had the ability to perform miracles to the extent of bringing someone back to life?

We hear of miracles happening here and there. We hear that something took place that we don't have any answers for! We see things take place in hospitals with those who have many kinds of afflictions, both physical and mental. Sometimes when the doctors are finished and say, "It is out of my hands!", we see something happen and we do not know the answers. We say, "Here a miracle was performed."

In technical terms from a human standpoint, we might try to explain what happened in a particular instance. Nevertheless, we just don't have the answers and so we say, "It was a miracle."

Every individual, every person here, every person in the world has seen that happen sometime or other. Now the thing that we need to emphasize this morning is that when Jesus Christ walked on the earth (as we read this Scripture) these miracles followed Him.

It was His presence that made the miracles possible. People didn't have to say, "Why did it happen?" or "Something took place!" or "I don't know what happened, but it happened!" They could relate it directly and particularly to Jesus Christ's presence. It was His words and His

efforts that performed the miracles and healed the people.

Now the question each of us needs to ask ourselves this morning is: Do we really believe it? Do we really believe that the miracles and the powers that Jesus Christ has, no one else has ever had? It is vital. Do you know why it is so vital? It is vital because our very faith is based on the fact that Jesus Christ is the Son of God.

Now that doesn't sound strange or like something different from what you have ever heard here before. But if we believe it to the extent that God wants us to believe, it is going to shape and determine the very way that we live. It has to! That is the key! That is the secret!.

That is also the problem that every man struggles with the first time he learns of Jesus Christ. What are you going to do with Christ? Are you going to acknowledge that He was an intelligent person, somebody special, or just some great prophet? Or, are you going to acknowledge that Jesus is the Son of God? What are you going to acknowledge?

When you begin to make your mind up, and say to yourself that you think you know who He is, then read about His experiences. Go ahead, read them all, put it all together and find out if there has ever been an individual who lived on earth before that ever lived like Jesus and did the things that He did. Is there anyone who had power over death as He did? When you finally get to the conclusion of who Jesus Christ is, I'll guarantee you one thing, you won't need me to tell you what has to be done in your life. That's the whole purpose of the gospel of Jesus Christ today, in the past, or in the future!

When we begin to see and under-

stand who Jesus Christ is, we won't have to have somebody else telling us what we need to do. We'll automatically know in our own heart what needs to be done, as far as our relationship with our God is concerned.

Now let's review some of the things that took place. There was sorrow among a family like we experience today. I know you have seen it in this community as we have in ours. Nobody has heaven on earth.

This father was a ruler in the synagogue. As far as mankind is concerned, he had position, power and prestige. He was looked up to and respected, but his daughter was dying. Oh, how death neutralizes us! I don't care who you are. The biggest land owner in the community, the biggest businessman in the community, or the poorest person are all in the same boat when death strikes.

This Jairus, the ruler of the synagogue, knew about Jesus Christ and that He performed wonderful miracles, so he came to the Lord for help.

When another father came to Jesus for help, the Lord said, "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." Mark 9:23. The man broke down and cried and said: "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief." Mark 9:24. There lies the key to our problems . . . "I believe, help thou mine unbelief."

Jairus came to Jesus at that particular time because he knew that Jesus performed miracles. He fell at His feet and said, "My little daughter lieth at the point of death:" Mark 5:23. In other words, he said, "Come and help her. I know You can do it; I've seen You do it before." "Jesus went with him; and much people followed Him..." Mark 5:24... and He just sort of took His time.
