


The Valley

HEFT (LONG BOOK) TAPES

All three volumes of the Long Book Tapes are now available. Bro. Josef Farkasch, of Salzburg, Austria, has made tapes from the old "Long Book" beginning at number one and going straight through the book. He plays the classical guitar and other instruments. There is also singing on a few songs. All proceeds go to our needy brethren living behind the Iron Curtain in Eastern Europe.

Vol. I includes songs 1-11, 13-18

- Vol. II includes songs 12, 19-31
- Vol. III includes songs 33-48

HUNGARIAN TAPES

Two cassette tapes are now available of the singing and playing of the Hungarian churches. The music, performed by choir and orchestra, is from the Zion's Harp and the Heft and other church books used in our church in Hungary. This music is played beautifully and reverently.

The two tapes, "Holy Love," a tape of orchestra, and "Blest Be The Tie," which has both orchestra and singing, are available at \$6.75 for each tape. For shipping cost on orders of 1-5 tapes, add .75 extra for each tape. On orders of 6 tapes or more, add only .30 extra for each tape. All proceeds from these tapes are being donated to the distressed church members in the poor country of Romania.

THE ENDOWMENT FUND OF THE APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF AMERICA

The elder body has approved the formation of The Endowment Fund of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. This fund has been created for better stewardship of assets given to the church for the Lord's work.

In addition to outright gifts, the Endowment Fund would receive gifts from donors who want their gifts used over a period of years rather than immediately. The donor may designate how the gift should be used, or the use can be left to the discretion of the Endowment Fund management committee.

The Endowment Fund can also accept non-cash gifts and can provide advice on compliance with tax laws to provide more funds for the Lord's work than would be possible without following the tax guidelines. An example is a gift of real estate, securities or other properties on which the donor can receive all or part of the income during the donor's lifetime.

The Endowment Fund would use its assets in the following ways:

- 1. To assist existing church funds such as local and national charity, World Relief, Mission and Bible funds.
- 2. To provide a source of funds for ongoing projects, unusual or unexpected needs as deemed fit and proper by the Elder-supervised Endowment Fund Committee.
- 3. To provide emergency loans and grants for other funds or projects within the church.

The mercy, love and righteousness of God are without end. "But the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children" (Ps. 103:17). "The Lord hath appeared of old unto me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore with lovingkindness have I drawn thee" (Jer. 31:3).

From the beginning God has always been willing to pour out His love and mercy upon all those who seek him sincerely and serve Him faithfully. David shared words of great wisdom with his son shortly before his death: "And thou, Solomon my son, know thou the God of thy father, and serve him with a perfect heart and with a willing mind: for the Lord searcheth all hearts, and understandeth all the imaginations of the thoughts: if thou seek him, he will be found of thee; but if thou forsake him, he will cast thee off for ever" (1 Chron. 28:9).

The purpose of life is to prepare for eternity by obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Thes. 5:9). The opportunity for preparation ends abruptly at death, when our eternal destiny is unalterably sealed. It is clear that "... where the tree falleth, there it shall be" (Ecc. 11:3). When Abraham was begged by the rich man in Hell to send Lazarus with water to cool his tongue. Abraham replied that there was a great gulf between them which could be traversed by no one (Luke 16:24-26). It is an inescapable fact that there will be endless joy for the redeemed in Heaven while the lost will suffer an everlasting punishment.

The Apostle Paul often spoke longingly of his goal of being with the Lord. He said, "For to me to live in Christ, and to die is gain" (Phil. 1:21). Old Testament prophets spoke of the day when everlasting joy would replace the sorrows of this life. "And the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads: they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (Is. 35:10). Jesus said, "Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in Heaven" (Matt. 5:12). The Apostle John wrote, "And this is the promise that he hath promised us, even eternal life" (1 John 2:25).

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

Many times in this life it appears that those who serve self and Satan have many successes and pleasures. This was also observed by the Psalmist, but he looked beyond life to the eternal outcome. "When the wicked spring as the grass, and when all the workers of iniquity do flourish; it is that they shall be destroyed for ever" (Ps. 92:7). Too often we have excessive concern for the physical dangers and materialistic uncertainties of this life. Jesus made clear the distinction between those things which have consequence only for this life as compared to the eternal. He said, "And fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Matt. 10:28).

God provides opportunity for everyone to prepare for eternity. We are called upon to "lay up...treasures in Heaven" and "fight the good fight of faith" (Matt. 6:20; 1 Tim. 6:12). Eternal life is promised to those who "...by patient continuance in well doing seek for glory and honour and immortality" (Rom. 2:7). All of this must be prefaced by faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ and is ultimately fulfilled by faithfulness to Him until life's end (Eph. 2:8; Heb. 3:14).

A believer must be prepared to die at any moment. When he is prepared to die, he is free to live and can joyfully proclaim the words of David of old: "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever" (Ps. 23:6).

KINDERGARTEN TEACHER NEEDED IN JAPAN

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Kathy Jo Kieser and Sis. Renee Baurer are now teaching. Sis. Kathy Jo will be leaving the kindergarten next July and a brother or a sister who is qualified to teach kindergarten is needed to replace her. Anyone who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to his or her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The brother or sister is asked to give two or more years of his or her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in Japanese.

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10minute walk from the church.

In 1984 we read in the Guideposts concerning the unfilled need for 10,000 Bibles. We wrote to the organization and started sending some repaired and some new Bibles. Since that time, we have sent over 500 Bibles, much Sunday school materials and song books.

During this past year, Sisters Becky Knapp (Dave) and Jane Huette (Curtis) from Goodfield, IL, have been helping in this work.

If our churches or individual members have Bibles, Bible story books, Hymns of Zion, Tabernacle or Gospel Hymns that are worn and in need of repair, please let us know or send them to us. We tape and repair the books and obtain names and addresses of people in foreign countries who want and need them, package and mail them in large canvas mailing bags. It costs 55ϕ a pound to send books or \$1.10 for printed material of less than 30 pages. On a recent shipment to Africa, the cost to send a Bible was 72ϕ .

(Continued from Page 32) about what they thought was so bad because they ate without washing their hands.) "... but," he said, "that which cometh out of the mouth, this defileth a man." Matthew 15:10.

We might, in our own way, question that because we know that things like alcohol and tobacco are harmful to our bodies. The Lord was trying to tell them that even evil desires come from the heart. He says that's really what comes out of the heart.

"Then came his disciples, and said unto him, Knowest thou that the Pharisees were offended, after they heard this saying? But he answered and said, Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up." Matthew 15:12, 13. We are concerned for converts that they have a good root, a good foundation and that they are planted by the Lord so that they will never be rooted out.

One of our ministers recently mentioned that he was reading about the earthquake in Mexico. He said that the city was really built on sand way down underneath. Because it was built on sand, there was terrible destruction. He read that someplace not far from there the earthquake had almost the same power. But that place was built upon a rock, and there was not nearly as much destruction.

When children become children of God, they must build their house firmly upon the Rock, that when the storms of life come, they won't be destroyed. They will stand.

"Do not ye yet understand, that whatsoever entereth in at the mouth goeth into the belly, and is cast out into the draught? But those things which proceed out of the mouth ..." Matthew 15:17, 18. We know the tongue is an evil thing and it can both praise God and curse man. This is what comes out of the heart.

"For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts..." Matthew 15:19. Sometimes we have quite a battle with evil thoughts. How can I control these thoughts that want to come into my mind?" We know that it is the enemy. In the book, Pilgrim's Progress, Christian said Satan whispered something in his ear and he almost thought that he thought that.

So sometimes these evil thoughts come and it is really the enemy just talking to us. He is trying to tempt us. The enemy actually tempted the Lord to jump off the pinnacle of the temple. Christ was actually tempted to make stone into bread. He was tempted to be ruler over the earth. (See Matthew 4:3-11). So Satan sometimes tempts us. We really don't want these thoughts, and if we dwell on them, they can only bring evil for us.

"For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders..." Matthew 15:19. We know that those that take life are murderers, but Jesus said if we call our brother a fool, hate our brother and do some of those things, we are equal to a murderer. We should have a deep abiding love for every brother, every sister and all people of the world.

It is our prayer that we can love everybody; that there be no ill feelings, no grudges, no hate toward anybody in this world.

"... adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies." Matthew 15:19. We know that all these things are from the devil. He puts them in our mind and heart, for some people in some way and some in another. These things proceed out of the heart of man. But, like it is written, those who do such things cannot inherit the kingdom of God. (See Galatians 5:19-21). But we are to have the fruit of the Spirit. We are to be filled with the Holy Spirit. (See Ephesians 5:18). When we are once cleansed, we are not to let our heart remain empty. If we do, Satan will come and fill it with evil spirits. Then the last condition will be worse than the first. (See Luke 11:26).

We are so thankful that we have the Holy Spirit. We are so blessed by what the Holy Spirit will do for us, how He will lead us and how He will guide us. We plead time and time again that we may even have a double portion so that we can carry out our duties and our responsibilities.

Often we lay awake at night in concern for some of our responsibilities and how we can cope with them. Instead of lying there and doing nothing, we talk to the Lord. How comforting that can be to talk to the Lord sometimes at night when we lay there and cannot sleep. All at once, we fall asleep.

We are so blessed with this nearness of God that we can talk with Him through the channel of prayer. We don't need to be upon our knees, standing or in the house of God. Any place we are, we can talk to the Lord. Sometimes we have to pray about our work. We feel the pressure of the enemy, many, many times. Then we have to say, "Satan, get thee hence" or "Satan, get behind me" using the same weapon that the Lord used there when He was tempted of the devil. (See Luke 4:8). We need to use the sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God (see Ephesians 6:17) and say as He said, "Get thee hence."

We know that with that same power, with those same weapons, we can also defeat the enemy. It doesn't matter whether we are elders, the youngest convert, the oldest, or the minister, the enemy will seek to deceive. He does deceive, if we give him a chance. But if we have the Lord on our side, we are filled with the Holy Spirit. We can plead for the guidance of the Lord, lean and trust heavily upon the goodness of God and His Spirit, and then we can overpower the enemy. If we stay with the Lord, He will not leave us. (See Hebrews 13:5). But if we leave Him, the promise is broken for those who have tasted of God's goodness, become His children, been baptized into His death and taken those vows and promises that we would abide faithful as long as we live. The Lord through His Word promises us eternal life. (See John 3:15).

"These are the things which defile a man: but to eat with unwashen hands defileth not a man." Matthew 15:20. The enemy is so crafty, so cunning and tries to make little things, like washing hands so important. The important part is to have faith to believe and trust in God.

The scribes and Pharisees tried to

find fault with the Lord in many ways. It looked like they were jealous. Yet we know that some were sincere. Nicodemus was a Pharisee also. We can't put them all in one category. There were those who sought to do right and we are thankful that Nicodemus went to Jesus by night. We don't know why, but maybe he was somewhat embarrassed and ashamed in the presence of others. But, he really had a yearning in his heart.

It doesn't matter who we are. If we really seek the Lord, we will find Him. When Nicodemus came to the Lord, the Lord told him, "Ye must be born again." He explained how we all must be born again out of water and out of spirit. (See John 3:1-8). We have experienced this and know the blessings and joy that we can have by becoming a child of God.

We also know that by prayer, by asking, by helping and by seeking the Lord we can receive His help.

"Behold, a woman of Canaan came out of the same coasts, and cried unto him, saying, Have mercy on me, O Lord, thou son of David: my daughter is grievously vexed with a devil. But He answered her not a word." Matthew 15:22, 23. We can almost picture this woman saying, "Please, Lord, help. Please, Lord, help." He just waited. Maybe it was for the benefit of His disciples but they told Him, "Send her away; for she crieth after us." Matthew 15:23.

Then the Lord answered, "I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel." Matthew 15:24. Again he tested her, but He could see the sincerity of her heart. She said, "Truth, Lord: yet the dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table." Matthew 15:27. She put herself right down to the very bottom and considered herself as a dog seeking the crumbs. But, she continued pleading and said, "Lord, help me."

We have that same privilege to cry and plead for the Lord's help, and we know He helps. There have been times of problems, cares and anxieties and we really pleaded to the Lord, "Lord, help us." Then we can just feel the help that comes. Sometimes we have to go into our closet and pray. (See Matthew 6:6). We can pray anywhere, but sometimes it is just nice to go someplace all alone and really pour out our heart to the Lord. Then we can just feel the help and strength that comes. We have many problems and cares in life, but if we put our trust in the Lord and call upon Him, we know that He will hear and answer.

"Then Jesus answered her and said unto her, O woman, great is thy faith..." Matthew 15:28. Can He talk to us that way? We just spoke with a sister this evening of how her little children have faith that there is a God in Heaven. A little child in their simple way, can trust in the Lord and know that the Lord will help. If we can have that faith, then we know the Lord will hear and answer our prayers.

These little children knew that their father was in heaven, and that God would hear and help. It is very touching. Sometimes little children have faith so strong that we wish we would have faith as they do.

"Jesus departed from thence, and came nigh unto the sea of Galilee; and went up into a mountain, and sat down there. And great multitudes came unto him, having with them those that were lame, blind, dumb, maimed and many others, and cast them down at Jesus' feet; and he healed them." Matthew 15:29, 30. Sometimes we visit those who are sick and almost question how much we can help them. But, we can lay our hands on them, pray for them and have this faith, that if it is the Lord's will, He will help them. He will heal where it is His will. If not, it gives courage and helps them that they can be uplifted, strengthened and encouraged.

He came here to the multitude. In another place, the disciples had just about five loaves and two fishes and took up twelve baskets. (See Luke 9:13-17). Here they had seven loaves and a few fish and took up seven baskets. If we could just have this desire of our heart and plead for His blessing. We think, what can we benefit tonight or this day? But say, "Lord, You just add Your blessings." If there are just a few loaves and just a few fish, just a few words, and the Lord will add His blessing, we know that we can be blessed.

May it be that way tonight. If the Lord will take that little bit of fish, little bit of bread, and add His increase, then we can be filled. FEB 02602 CHARLES WALDER

"Praying Brings Help and Strength" Matthew 15

We are so thankful for stories in the Scripture of Jesus feeding thousands of people with so little. It's not so much that the people were fed and had enough to eat, but now we know that the Lord can bless anything. As we minister His Word, we often have so little to offer and see how much need there is. Then the Lord sees fit to add His blessings that all can be fed.

We all need Spiritual food. We all need help and grace from the Lord. There is not one of us who doesn't or one who needs more than the other. We are all in need of it. If we neglect the assembling of ourselves and reading the Word, then the enemy has ways to come. We get so busy sometimes that we get a little careless.

But, we know that if the Lord will bless us that we might receive His Word this evening, then we can leave this place encouraged to serve Him a little better.

It is so nice that we can assemble on Wednesday evenings. In talking to converts, they tell us that they came to church, somewhat in respect for their parents and somewhat because they knew they should. But, they look at their watch as the minister is still preaching and the service seems so long.

But after they are converted and really desire the Word, then they think, "Is he done ministering already?" They can hardly wait from Sunday until Wednesday and from Wednesday night to Sunday. This is the way it should be. We should desire to seek and hear the Word of the Lord. With just a little bit of the Word, we can be strengthened and encouraged to go forth as a little better light to our neighbor and our fellow man.

I think we all experience how the enemy comes to make us just a little careless. We have to continually plead for the grace of God, for His Spirit and even for a double portion. Then we can just feel the help coming as we are willing to deny ourselves.

The scribes and Pharisees came to Jesus because they were somewhat jealous and said, "Why do thy disciples transgress the tradition of the elders? for they wash not their hands when they eat bread." Matthew 15:2. The Lord was physically clean in that respect, but He wanted to impress upon them that there are things far more important than the material things of life.

They were also transgressing, and He said, "Why do ye also transgress the commandment of God by your tradition? For God commanded, saying, Honour thy father and mother.

.."Matthew 15:3, 4. This is one of the commandments, the first commandment with a promise.

"But ye say, Whosoever shall say to his father or his mother, It is a gift, by whatsoever thou mightest be profited by me: And honour not his father or his mother, he shall be free. Thus have ye made the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition." Matthew 15:5, 6. Jesus called them hypocrites. The Lord wanted to impress upon those at that time, that the way of the Lord was to be obedient to our Father in Heaven by honoring their fathers and mothers.

I think of the parable where He told them about the sower that went

out to sow. Whether across a pulpitor in our homes, the Word of God is sown in our hearts. It says that some of the seed "fell by the way side, and the fowls of the air came and devoured it up." Mark 4:4.

Sometimes when we have a large assembly the Word that is spoken falls into various hearts. We know the enemy is never invited. We always invite God into our midst, which he promised to be. But Satan is always that uninvited guest that comes in. He likes to pluck up that seed, the Word of God, so that it will not bring forth fruit.

We know also that sometimes the seed falls on stony ground, has little depth of earth and doesn't bring forth fruit (See Mark 4:5). It makes me think of when we used to sow seed in a little seeder by hand. When we came to the end of the field, we would hear the seeds dropping out in the leaves under the trees or along the lane someplace. The thought came that certainly that seed will never do any good. It will not grow even though the seed was good.

When God's Word is spoken, whether on a Sunday, Wednesday night or in our homes, it is being sown. It will fall on hearts and how nice when it falls on hearts that are prepared. As mothers and fathers tell the children of the way of truth, this will be a seed that will fall into good hearts and bring forth fruit, thirty, sixty or hundredfold. (See Mark 4:8)

"He called the multitude, and said unto them, Hear, and understand: Not that which goeth into the mouth defileth a man . . ." (He is talking
