THE ENDOWMENT FUND OF THE APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF AMERICA

The elder body has approved the formation of The Endowment Fund of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. This fund has been created for better stewardship of assets given to the church for the Lord's work.

In addition to outright gifts, the Endowment Fund would receive gifts from donors who want their gifts used over a period of years rather than immediately. The donor may designate how the gift should be used, or the use can be left to the discretion of the Endowment Fund management committee.

The Endowment Fund can also accept non-cash gifts and can provide advice on compliance with tax laws to provide more funds for the Lord's work than would be possible without following the tax guidelines. An example is a gift of real estate, securities or other properties on which the donor can receive all or part of the income during the donor's lifetime.

The Endowment Fund would use its assets in the following ways:

1. To assist existing church funds such as local and national charity, World Relief, Mission and Bible funds.

2. To provide a source of funds for ongoing projects, unusual or unexpected needs as deemed fit and proper by the Elder-supervised Endowment Fund Committee.

3. To provide emergency loans and grants for other funds or projects within the church.

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

HUMILITY OF MIND AND MANNER

Humility stands out as a prime virtue of the men and women of God who throughout history have been most useful in His service. True humility consists of a beautiful scriptural balance in one's attitude about himself. It is far removed from pride or self-exaltation, but likewise it does not imply self-condemnation. It is perfectly portrayed in the selflessness of our beloved Savior, who did not focus upon himself, but sought to fulfill the Father's will and serve others.

Many times in the Word, humility is a result of an individual's own actions in humbling himself. One of these examples involves the prayer of Solomon when he dedicated the house of the Lord in Jerusalem (2 Chr. 6). By this time in history God's people had seen many of His mighty works, and had been recipients of both blessings and wrath. When wrath fell upon them, in every case it became necessary for them to humble themselves before God, and it was this alone which moved His heart. God acknowledged that he had accepted the King's prayer by a miraculous sign: "The fire came down from heaven, and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices; and the glory of the Lord filled the house" (2 Chr. 7:1). The Children of Israel were deeply impressed by this manifestation of God's might. With faces bowed to the ground, they "praised the Lord, saying, for he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever" (2 Chr. 7:3).

Then in the night, the heavenly Father revealed Himself to the King, and told him his prayer was acceptable. God spoke of what would happen if calamity fell upon the land and the people, and he very clearly explained what would move His heart. "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will for-

give their sin, and will heal their land" (2 Chr. 7:14). Once again, man was told that the sacrifices acceptable to God are a broken spirit and a contrite heart (Psa. 51:17).

Solomon's father David also learned, sometimes painfully, the significance of humility. A prime example was David's sin in numbering the people of Israel (2 Sam. 24). Against the commandment of God and the advice of his own counsellors, the King persisted in counting Israel. In verse 14 he cries, "I am in a great strait." God gave him three choices of punishment, and David chose three days of pestilence, committing himself and his people into the hand of the Almighty. The foolishness of their king cost the people seventy thousand men who fell before God's wrath. Much later the church at Philadelphia was told of the key of David (Rev. 3:7), and perhaps nothing reveals this key more clearly than David's reaction in his dire straits. David cried out in the anguish of his soul, "Lo, I have sinned, and I have done wickedly: but these sheep, what have they done? let thine hand, I pray thee, be against me and against my father's house" (2 Sam. 24:17). This humbling of himself moved the heart of God, and He accepted this sacrifice. The key of David was humility!

Pharaoh was confronted with God's question: "How long wilt thou refuse to humble thyself before me?" (Ex. 10:3) The land of Egypt was devastated and its firstborn sons lost because the leader could not be humbled.

A multitude of scriptural references give clear testimony to the importance of our voluntarily humbling ourselves before God and man. Believers will benefit from reading and carefully pondering these examples: Deut. 8:2, 16; Prov. 6:3, Jer. 13:18; Matt. 18:4; 23:12; Jam. 4:10; 1 Pet. 5:6.

Humility finds expression

through many avenues in a believer's life. These include resisting the exalting of one's personal opinion above the accepted practices of the church and avoiding a lifestyle that knowingly brings distress to a weaker brother or sister.

Humility is extolled in Scripture as a virtue with untold benefits. Proverbs 15:33 explains that humility comes before honor. While we should not be seeking honor as such, yet all of us wish to be respected by our fellow men and above all, approved by God (2 Cor. 10:18). The Apostle Paul spoke of "serving the Lord with all humility of mind" (Acts 20:19) and God certainly honored him as one of His most useful servants.

The soul of man was created to live forever, but not on this earth. Only by taking advantage of the simple plan of salvation by faith in Jesus Christ and His shed blood can we have hope of eternal life. And the greatest examples of a life of humility are those recorded of our Savior's life on earth. He did not exalt himself, even though He was the Son of God. He put on no airs, rather He was gracious, loving and gentle.

Every believer should be highly desirous of God's grace, the most powerful force on earth. Thus, it is of paramount importance that we put ourselves in the proper position to receive this great favor, for "...he resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble" (Jam. 4:6). We should strive to be "clothed with humility" (1 Pet. 5:5) in all aspects of mind and manner. Humility is in no sense an indication of weakness, indeed true strength is found therein.

So I'll strive to be more humble, Evermore be meek and kind; Humbleness shall rule my actions, Meekness dwell in heart and mind. In my manner and my being All my neighbors may be seeing That it is God's Spirit's might Leading me in truth and right.

Please note, we used the word "privilege," and we count it just that, to work with a Christian staff who care so much for the neglected, abused and love-hungry kids of today, that they are willing to give and give of themselves and of their time. The staff tries to direct these kids to become useful citizens for their country, and hopefully guide them to the Lord. What a privilege to have had parents and families to teach us to love God and life!

We have really enjoyed working with the kids also -- even though they don't always show appreciation or respond in love. We need to tell ourselves it takes time to have a "built-in" love.

We came to A.C.C.H. from Gridley, IL, after having farmed for forty years (really all our lives), and rearing seven children of our own. We had thought of retiring and enjoying perhaps Florida or the South, but we really felt God wanted us to give Him a few years of service, via A.C.C.H., while we both have good health and strength. Our only regret is that we didn't come ten years sooner, to have more time to give to these dear kids. Of course, we do miss family and friends back in Gridley, and have blessed memories of those times.

KINDERGARTEN TEACHER NEEDED IN JAPAN

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Kathy Jo Kieser and Sis. Renee Baurer are now teaching. Sis. Kathy Jo will be leaving the kindergarten next July and a brother or a sister who is qualified to teach kindergarten is needed to replace her. Anyone who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to his or her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The brother or sister is asked to give two or more years of his or her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in

addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in Japanese.

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10-

minute walk from the church.

want to sacrifice. It gives us a measure of satisfaction when we do something for the Lord. It is not sacrifice, but obedience. (See I Samuel 15:22). Obedience is better than sacrifice.

Beloved ones, by the grace of God let us understand what the Lord really wants of us. He will probably demand something else from you than He will from me, even though we both are preparing for the same home in heaven.

Perhaps He is going to test us in one way or another or permit Satan to tempt us. God tempts no man (See James 1:13), but testing comes in order that we can be purified and made ready for the kingdom of heaven.

We think of the potter and the clay. How can the potter fashion anything out of clay? When the clay is submissive to him, he can fashion an honorable vessel out of it. God is trying to fashion, mold and make us and He is only able to if we are submissive and pliable.

He can make each and every one of us a vessel for the Master's use. We will then be able to serve the Lord and give Him honor, glory and praise.

"A certain man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came and sought fruit thereon, and found none. Then said he unto the dresser of his vineyard, Behold, these three years I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and find none:" so he determined, "cut it down; why cumbereth it the ground?" Luke 13:7.

"And he answering said unto him, Lord, let it alone this year . . ." The gardener said to let it alone. ". . . till I shall dig about it, and dung it." Luke 13:8. Who could that possibly have reference to? Our heavenly Father created you and me, but the Lord Jesus Christ, a merciful and loving Saviour is long suffering and compassionate, even though we have not been fruitful. When we recall the days of our youth, the Lord could have become very impatient with us, but how long suffering He has been!

It is only by the grace of God, like the apostle said, "We are what we are." It is only be the grace and mercy of God that we can serve Him and that we were spared. Many unfortunate people in this world simply are lost, because they are not seeking the Lord with all their hearts, souls and minds.

There is a commandment that stands out vividly in our minds, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind; and thy neighbour as thyself." Luke 10:27.

We read, "On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." Matthew 22:40. The Lord Jesus Christ came into the world to fulfill the law. The Lord Jesus Christ came to be the Supreme Sacrifice. He came to be the slaughtered Lamb of God.

Let's go back to the children of Israel on that fatal night when the death angel went through Egypt. There were certain requirements and one of those requirements was that they would remain in the house. Today we can think of it as remaining in Christ. They had to remain under the blood. We have to remain under the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is only by the shed blood of Christ that we can be washed, sanctified and made ready for the kingdom of heaven.

The apostle was very explicit when he said not to be overly anxious about the things that will come upon the earth. He wanted to remind us that in the last days there will be great deception in the world. When we are totally surrendered to the Lord, then we have a faith that will hold in trying days.

Beloved ones, we believe we are nearing the end when we see all the evil of this world, the crime, the terrorism and all the earthquakes. I don't know the numbers, but certainly earthquakes have multiplied. In the day of the Lord Jesus we read that there were only a few. He told them that in the last days there would be earthquakes, famines and pestilences. Now we read that there is an earthquake every three minutes somewhere in the world.

Isn't it only reasonable to believe that the last days are upon us, that we must lift up our heads and know that our redemption draweth nigh? (See Luke 21:28).

Looking back at the fig tree, "He answering said unto him, Lord, let it alone this year also, till I shall dig about it, and dung it: And if it bear fruit, well: and if not, then after that thou shalt cut it down." Luke 13:8, 9. Doesn't that sound like the Lord Jesus Christ?

He certainly is patient with us. He wants to carry us, but, beloved ones, we cannot forget that He said, "After that, cut it down." (See verse 9). So there is a possibility that we can be "cut down."

Beloved, it behooves us to remain close to the Lord and always yield to Him as He tries to lead us.

"Behold, there was a woman which had a spirit of infirmity eighteen years, and was bowed together, and could in no wise lift up herself. And when Jesus saw her, he called her to him, and said unto her, Woman, thou art loosed from thine infirmity. And he laid his hands on her: and immediately she was made straight, and glorified God." Luke 13:11 - 13.

The Lord is trying to straighten us all, isn't He? He is trying to heal us so that we will be able to overcome every sin and evil.

He assured us that He would go with us. When we erected a covenant in the waters of baptism, the Lord promised us that He would never leave nor forsake us, and we promised to be true and faithful to Him until life's end.

"When Jesus saw her (this woman), he called her to him, and said unto her, Woman, thou art loosed from thine infirmity. And he laid his hands on her: and immediately she was made straight (whole), and glorified God. And the ruler of the synagogue answered with indignation, because that Jesus had healed on the sabbath day..." Luke 13:12-14. He thought no work should be done on the sabbath.

Why could the Lord Jesus Christ work on the sabbath? He taught them the Lord is also Lord of the sabbath. He created the sabbath. (See Mark 2:27, 28).

He certainly did not come here to break the law, but He came to fulfill the law.

"There are six days in which men ought to work: in them therefore come and be healed, and not on the sabbath day. The Lord then answered him, and said, Thou hypocrite, doth not each one of you on the sabbath loose his ox or his ass from the stall, and lead him away to watering? And ought not this woman, being a daughter of Abraham, whom Satan hath bound. lo, these eighteen years, be loosed from this bond on the sabbath day? And when he had said these things, all his adversaries were ashamed: and all the people rejoiced for all the glorious things that were done by him." Mark 13:14-17. It was marvelous, wasn't it?

The Lord Jesus Christ spoke with authority when He was here. That same Lord, beloved ones, is still on the throne. He is still making intercession on our behalf. We still marvel, don't we? We marvel at the mercy and the love of God.

We can go back to the day when the Lord called us to serve Him. He is still tenderly leading, guiding and keeping each and every one of us. Sometimes we think that it is just up to the ministers to minister the Word. Beloved ones, every one of us who have committed our life to the Lord and become converted are all ministers for the Lord.

Our walk of life and our very conduct should speak louder than words. Many times people who observe our walk of life will never go to church. Yet they see us and are moved and marvel. Let's just become more submissive that we can hear the Lord say one day, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of thy Lord."

Isn't this motivation to keep our hearts in order, bold, cleansed and sanctified? If we let something else come in, then we can lose the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The guidance of the Holy Spirit, beloved ones, is something that we cannot fully understand or appreciate. Let us strive to follow Him so that He will be observed by people.

Even though we can't see Him, yet, we will see what He does through us, and the world may see what He does for us. Then we will be a glory and an honor to God, our Father in heaven, and the Lord Jesus can be magnified in our lives. This is certainly our calling.

Our Lord Jesus Christ Is Marvelous Luke 13:1-24

When the Lord was here upon the earth. He often went to the synagogue and taught the people. In one particular instance that we recall, He opened to the prophet Isaiah and read a description of Himself. We often read it at Easter, the time of the crucifixion. It describes the time when the Lord Jesus Himself was brought as a sheep to the slaughter, yet He opened not His mouth. Many times they marvelled at Him throughout His unjust trial. He didn't even answer them because He simply knew that His time was at hand that the Scriptures might be fulfilled. In many instances the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ is really Scripture that was foretold and being fulfilled. In the very life and death of Jesus Christ, we see that Scripture was fulfilled. wasn't it?

We try to emphasize thinking of our loving Lord and Saviour, Who loved us so much that he gave His life. They did not take His life; He gave His life.

In these words here, we find, "There were present at that season some that told him of the Galileans, whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices." Luke 13:1. We all know Pilate best for having been the judge when Jesus Christ was tried. Pilate, a person who was easily tossed about, yielded the Lord Jesus Christ to the people's wishes and desires. We find Pilate wanted to please everyone.

"And Jesus answering said unto them, Suppose ye that these Galileans were sinners above all the Galileans, because they suffered such things?" Luke 13:2. He taught them, "I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Luke 13:3. I don't think that is too hard to understand, is it? We can fully understand that unless we repent, we perish. That probably isn't too popular anymore in this day and age. The word "repentance" is becoming old fashioned, but for those who truly are sincere in their salvation, repentance is a precious word. It is one of the most precious experiences we'll ever go through in this life.

We'll probably never again in this life have quite an experience as when we turned to the Lord Jesus Christ. When we were totally submissive and had wholly surrendered our life, there was nothing to break. We were so submissive and loved the Lord so much. That's why there are many exhortations to never forget nor lose that first love.

"I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Luke 13:3. It is not God's will that one soul perish, but it is clear and plain that we certainly must repent.

Further on, he referred to another similar account: "Or those eighteen, upon whom the tower in Siloam fell, and slew them, think ye that they were sinners above all men that dwelt in Jerusalem? I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Luke 13:4, 5. Just because we see others go through real trial and tribulations, that does not always mean that God is judging them. Except we repent, unless we walk with the Lord, we will perish.

Then there is the parable of the fig tree. When we think of the fig tree, we probably think of the day the Lord Jesus Christ and His disciples came up to a fig tree and were hungry. He looked for fruit, but there was no fruit there. So He cursed it. He said that no longer will fruit grow on this tree. The disciples had a definite foreshadow of the time to come. The fig tree, in my understanding, was a type of Israel. It was clear and plain that Israel would reject the Lord Jesus Christ. They would never be fruitful. That is a sad state. Isn't the very purpose that we plant a tree, that it might become fruitful? Isn't that the very purpose we plant anything in a material sense?

In the spiritual sense, when the Lord plants the good seed of the Word of God into our heart, He does it so that with a little nurturing and a little cultivating, it might become fruitful. We have to cultivate our lives. We have to read the Word of God. We have to pray in order that we might grow in grace and become fruitful in the Lord?

Then when we become fruitful, we will bear fruit, not for our own fame and ambitions, but rather to the glory and honor of God. We can always strive to praise the name of the Lord in word, in deed and in thought.

May we never hear the Lord say, "I never knew you. Cast them into outer darkness where there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (See Luke 13:27, 28). It is clear and plain that there are those who think they serve the Lord, who at the end of the way will find that they never knew the Lord and the Lord never knew them. (See Proverbs 14:12 and Proverbs 16:25).

Beloved ones, we must humble ourself. What is most pleasing to the Lord? When we stop to consider, the Lord says, "It is not sacrifice." People
