THE ENDOWMENT FUND OF THE APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF AMERICA

The elder body has approved the formation of The Endowment Fund of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. This fund has been created for better stewardship of assets given to the church for the Lord's work.

In addition to outright gifts, the Endowment Fund would receive gifts from donors who want their gifts used over a period of years rather than immediately. The donor may designate how the gift should be used, or the use can be left to the discretion of the Endowment Fund management committee.

The Endowment Fund can also accept non-cash gifts and can provide advice on compliance with tax laws to provide more funds for the Lord's work than would be possible without following the tax guidelines. An example is a gift of real estate, securities or other properties on which the donor can receive all or part of the income during the donor's lifetime.

The Endowment Fund would use its assets in the following ways:

 To assist existing church funds such as local and national charity, World Relief, Mission and Bible funds.

2. To provide a source of funds for ongoing projects, unusual or unexpected needs as deemed fit and proper by the Elder-supervised Endowment Fund Committee.

3. To provide emergency loans and grants for other funds or projects within the church.

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

Abiding in the Vine

The infinite wisdom of the Almighty is clearly manifested in the Scriptures and is portrayed in the examples chosen by the Saviour to reach mankind with His message. He used simple illustrations from everyday living to enable humans to relate to the divine. When He was with farmers, He spoke of sowing fields, to the housewifes He spoke of baking bread and cleaning houses. To fishermen, His message was about catching fish, and to the husbandman the parallel was about tending and pruning vines. Through it all, He delivered the timeless message that the relationship between God and man was intended to be intimate. personal, and enduring, surviving beyond life on earth, to be continued in the presence of God eternally.

The Spirit of God inspired the Psalmist to write, "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful. But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night" (Psa. 1:1-2). The exemplary life and ministry of Jesus carry out the same theme—remaining close to God, the supreme power of the universe.

In his 15th chapter, the Apostle John records the words of our Lord as He spoke using the illustration of a grapevine. Jesus makes it perfectly clear that He is that vine, and faithful believers are the fruitful branches. The vine is the main part of the plant, and usually quite long-lived. The branches produce large quantities of fruit if tended with care. God is timeless. He spans countless generations, and His truth endures forever (Psa. 117:2). As the vine is the source of all nourishment for the plant, feeding successive generations of branches that bear the fruit, so is the relationship between God and His children.

The plan of God is clear from the

first recorded words of the Bible. Man was put on earth in the image of God, to dress the earth, care for its creatures, and produce an increase (Gen. 2:15). In the same way the generations of man, each in their own time, are intended to bring the fruit of increase to their Creator in its season. Everything believers need for fruit bearing is contained in our Lord, the true vine, and in what He has done for us (Col. 1:19-20). Nothing has been overlooked or omitted that is necessary for that result.

The vine is the source of all spiritual truth and strength. The branches must be carefully pruned and shaped so that they can bear much spiritual fruit (John 15:2-3; 7-8). They must also remain firmly attached to the vine, their lifeline to nutrients vital for growth. Through the vine, into the branches flows the sap, which is the lifeblood of all plants. These nutrients feed the clusters of fruit right up to the time of ripening, when they are harvested. At that time the husbandman rejoices over a work well done, carefully reflecting on the wonderful plan that made this miraculous process possible.

The plan is simple, yet beyond our full comprehension. We may learn ever so much on earth, yet we will not approach knowing the mind of the Almighty (1 Cor. 2:16). Enough understanding is given, however, so that we can each fulfill our part in the marvelous work of fruit bearing. It is clear that it can be done in one way only, and that is by abiding in the vine. When humans follow the way of the cross unto salvation, they then become intimately attached to their Lord, the true vine. Like the branches, they cannot bear fruit of themselves; only if they remain connected to the vine will they find the nourishment vital to growth and bringing forth fruit to perfection.

Our Heavenly Father is the husbandman of the vineyard. However, just as He directed man to labor in the natural course of life. He likewise intends for us to labor in His vineyard in the spirit (1 Cor. 15:58; Col. 1:10; Heb. 6:10). Jesus ordained the establishment of the church, and He prepared the entire way so that those who came after Him could fulfill this, even though they were fragile men. Jesus Christ, the vine, is "the same vesterday, and today, and forever" (Heb. 13:8). One generation of fallible humans follows another, each in its time tending the vineyard. The fruit, however, should not vary from one season to another. Jesus told us we do not garner grapes from thorns nor figs from thistles (Matt. 7:16). The responsibility of all who are intimately bound to the vine is to produce much good fruit. This is what God, the great husbandman, expects of His children.

The plan of God for life on earth and also for the eternal salvation of man is complete. Jesus kindly exhorted the people of His day, "Abide in me, and I in you" (John 15:4). The same eternal message is relevant today! Times have changed, and the course of history has resulted in a culture which is much different from that of Jesus' time. Yet vines still bear grapes in exactly the same way, and although methods in vineyard-keeping are somewhat different, the vine still endures, and the same good fruit is borne on the branches.

A tremendous comfort can be derived from the immortal message that Jesus spoke in His parable of the vineyard, exhorting all to abide in Him. After nearly twenty centuries the heart of man can leap for joy when hearing the eternal truth: "As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you: continue ye in my love. If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments, and abide in his love" (John 15:9-10).

WORKS PROJECTS

Wycliff Associates Building Project

The Work Projects Committee has approved a new domestic work project that has a two-fold purpose of giving opportunity to those who would want to volunteer their labor and talents on a construction project and to promote fellowship with our brethren and friends who live in the Dallas/Fort Worth, TX, area.

The project is with Wycliffe Associates, the construction arm of Wycliffe Bible Translators, a non-denominational organization whose objective is the use of the science of linguistics to give to those people who do not yet have their own language in writing. the Word of God in that language. Wycliffe Associates is a lay group charged with the responsibility of construction and maintenance of buildings throughout the world. Currently they are building apartments for elderly members who are returning from the mission field and who will be sharing their knowledge and experience with those students who are learning the translation techniques.

Skills are needed for all types of building construction and there are work assignments available at the center for women who would like to participate. Volunteers are asked to bring their own small hand and power tools. Large machinery and equipment will be on the site.

Living accommodations are provided. They have 10 spaces for RV's or trailers -- complete with sewage and electrical hook-ups at a cost of \$4.00 per day. There are showers and a coin laundry nearby. Others can stay in a room in one of the duplexes built several years ago. The rates for these rooms are: single (\$25/week) or one couple (\$45/week). If children are included contact us for the additional cost. The construction center dining room is open for three meals a day at a cost of \$6.50 per day. Reservations have to be made ahead of time for living arrangements.

The Wycliffe building projects can use volunteers at any time and for any length of time -- whether it be one day or two weeks. The third Sunday of each month is being set as a target date for volunteers to either begin or

conclude their volunteer work period. This third Sunday conforms to our regular worship service, which is held at the Holiday Inn in Desoto. This is nine miles from the work site. Services are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Sunday of every month.

It is anticipated that there is a minimum of four years of work at this site; however, it is the desire of the committee that those who have a heart for this service consider putting this work effort into their plans as quickly as possible. KINDERGARTEN TEACHER NEEDED IN JAPAN

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Kathy Jo Kieser and Sis. Renee Baurer are now teaching. Sis. Kathy Jo will be leaving the kindergarten next July and a brother or a sister who is qualified to teach kindergarten is needed to replace her. Anyone who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to his or her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The brother or sister is asked to give two or more years of his or her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in Japanese.

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10-minute walk from the church.

WORKS PROJECTS Our Trip to Haiti "Group 6"

Our trip to Pu-Sal-Le, Haiti, began from our comfortable homes and our supportive church community where we have abundance, to one of the poorest countries in the world, where people work for as little as \$3.00 a week or 50 cents a day.

Eight brethren from five different states all met at Miami Airport for the first time. We boarded a 757 to Port-A-Prince, a trip of about 2 hours. We had to go through customs which took about 45 minutes. When we arrived at the guest house, we met four brothers from Oakville, IA. They were on their way home. We spent about six hours together singing and reading the Word. They shared their experiences in this very needy country.

After a good night's sleep, we traveled 110 miles to the job site, a trip that took 6 hours! We traveled in an open pickup and some in a trooper jeep. We didn't have much traffic; saw two trucks, no cars, some donkeys and oxen, as these roads can only be traveled by 4-wheel drive. When we crossed the streams there were no bridges.

When we arrived at the site, we found no electricity, only a generator to run the saws and the lights for the evening services. There were no phones, newspapers, radio or plumbing, so we all took salt water showers that came from an open tank on the roof. "Burr!!!"

After a night's rest, we had our worship service. Evening services were about 2 hours long. These Haitians really love the Lord and they show it.

Now for the work project, we were to put an addition on each end of the school. They had most of the block wall up for us and we finished the rest of the wall. We then made trusses and put on the metal roof. We were so thankful we could finish the work they had for our group to do.

We made doors and frames for all the classrooms and put up shelves and screen doors in the guest house. Two of the brothers did the electric wiring in the school and guest house. For night classes they used the gas generator or solar storage batteries, they also used gas lanterns. Right now the school we worked on has 350 students and 14 teachers and aides.

We did all this work while school was going on. It didn't seem to bother anyone, for these children really want to learn and better their way of life!

After our work was finished, we went to visit Willis Miller. He takes care of the water for life well drilling. He is surely doing a very good deed.

We all enjoyed working together for such a worthy cause and even talking about a return trip if the Lord so opens up the way!

We want to thank all for your support and help that made it possible for us to go. May God bless each and every one of you!

(Continued from Page 32) us the way back and He is going to ask us, "Where is your brother?" Then we want to be interested in each other.

"What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Luke 10:25. What did He say? Jesus in essence said, "What do you think?" He said, "What is written? How do you read that? How do you understand it?" (See Luke 10:26.) Don't we find that often?

I have found so often in my life, when I have a question and I really know the answer, but I'll ask somebody. Maybe we want reassurance or maybe we don't like the answer we know and we are looking for something else.

How should we treat each other when somebody comes to us that way? Have we thought about that? The human response is that if somebody comes and asks us a real important question about life, the human response is just to kind of go along with whatever their thinking is. But we really shouldn't do that. We should really put it just the way it is.

That is what Jesus said here, "What is written?" What does the Bible say about it?" (See Luke 10:26). That is how we should approach it. We shouldn't play any politics or favorites or seek to win any favors of man. We simply should say very kindly and very openly, "What does the Bible say?" You probably know the answer already, and we really do.

So He says, "What do you think?" The man knew what it said, but he was looking for a loophole. Do you know what a loophole is? One of our elder brothers defined that once. A loophole may be defined as a violation of intent. We talk about loopholes in the laws of our land and all we are trying to do is find a violation of intent. That is sad, but how much more tragic it is to try to find loopholes in the Word of God . . . a violation of the intent of the Word of God.

That is what this lawyer was trying to do here, willing to justify himself and that is why we look for it. He said, "Who is my neighbor?" Luke 10:29.

Now a neighbor may be defined as a nearby dweller. It is the person right next door, right over the back fence, or right down the road. That's our neighbor.

But how about if you took a trip and you were one thousand miles from home and you sat down in a restaurant beside somebody in the next booth? Then they are your nearby dwellers...that's my neighbor. Isn't that what Jesus went on to teach here, "Who is my neighbor?" It is whoever is nearby to us at the time.

He illustrated this so beautifully. A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and he met with misfortune. He was laying there half dead, stripped, wounded and by chance, there came down a certain priest. (See Luke 10:30, 31.)

We said a few Sundays ago, that a priest was an officer of God specially charged with the responsibility of worship. Here was a man who more than anybody else should have helped. a priest is one that stands between man and God in Old Testament times. This certain priest should have known more than anyone else, here is a man that needs help. He came that way, "and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side." Luke 10:31.

He must have thought, "What has this to do with the work of God?" Maybe he was busy. I think if we read the history of these times, we find out that the priests lived a little bit away from Jerusalem. They took this road and came to Jerusalem when it was their turn to do duty in the temple. So they travelled this road often in the course of business.

That's what we do so often, just in the course of our everyday business. We go to work or school every day and we meet some of the same people every day, and they are our neighbors. What if they are in trouble, like this man was? Maybe we are the one God has appointed to be a priest. If we are in the fold of God, we are.

There is a priesthood of believers . . . everyone of God's children is a priest and charged with the responsibility to represent God to man, to his fellowman. We are God's representatives and ambassadors upon the earth charged with the worship of God, the reverence of God.

Maybe somebody is in trouble and we are so busy that we just don't have time and we take a look and pass by on the other side because it might damage our career, or it might be a little bit humiliating to stop and help somebody, especially somebody that might be of a little lower class. Isn't that a shame? But we have to speak honestly. These things happen.

Likewise, the Levite. We said also a few Sundays ago, the Levites were especially given the responsibility by God to be of service to God... to do the work of God. Here was the work of God. It should have been done. He was at the place where he came and looked on him, he came a little nearer, he assessed the situation, but he passed by on the other side. (See Luke 10:32.)

Now comes a certain Samaritan. He didn't really have a special charge. He was looked down upon because he was of mixed people. He wasn't held in high esteem, but this one came and as he journeyed, he came where this man was and he had compassion on him.

Again, I'd like to go back to a definition one of our elders brought out once. He heard a speaker to a graduating class and the speaker dwelt on the word "compassion". He spoke this way because the graduating class was one that was going into the medical profession. The class was going to be those people who really had studied and were dedicated to helping other people. This speaker told the class, "You are going to have people come to you that are hurting. If you have real compassion, you are going to feel in your heart some of their pain."

So this Samaritan felt in his heart some of the pain of this poor traveler. Now once we really do that, all of a sudden our work isn't so important, our studies aren't so important.

The most important thing is helping...helping where it is needed...helping our neighbor, the one that is nearby us, and it might be a long way from home.

Here they were out in the middle, you might say, of nowhere. True compassion provides works. He poured in oil and wine. He went to him, bound him up, set him on is beast and brought him to an inn and made provision, stayed there with him that night and then left the provision so that he would be cared for further until his restoration. (See Luke 10:34, 35.)

Now Jesus turned it right back and asked a question. We are back to questions again. The lawyer had asked the question, "Who is my neighbor?" Luke 10:29. After Jesus told him this most lovely of the parables, He said now, "Who do you think was a neighbor?" (See Luke 10:36.)

The lawyer had to admit it, it was so plain and so clear. Then Jesus said the answer to the question, "You go, and do likewise." (See Luke 10:37.) Now as we read through this and briefly consider it, we see the primary teaching and the most obvious teaching of, "Who is my neighbor?", and what constitutes a true spirit of neighborliness.

But there is a deeper teaching here. We find this in all the parables. In most of the parables, Jesus didn't give the answer. He interrupted the parable of the sower and the seed. He said, "By this, you will know all parables." He said, "I speak in parables in order that those who are spiritually blind will continue in their blindness and that those who are spiritually awake will be able to see."

So now let's take a look because we believe in humility that we are spiritually minded this morning. Isn't that why we have gathered here with a desire and it's because we want to be spiritually minded.

So now let's take a look and may God give us the understanding of the deeper message . . . the real story of neighborliness that goes far beyond the little we will be able to do. But after we briefly go through this, may we all be inspired to be imitators of Christ and we say that in a good sense.

We can never be just like Christ and we don't hold ourself on any such plane, but we should always try to be imitators of Christ and do what He did when He was upon the earth in those few short years.

We go back to the beginning now and take a deeper look in the meaning of this parable. It just says, "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho..." Luke 10:30. When it says a certain man, there is noone spelled out, but the word is singular so it speaks to individuals.

The journey is from Jerusalem to Jericho... from a holy city to a city that is under the sentence of doom and destruction. Go back to Joshua's

time and Jericho is known as a city of destruction. Jerusalem is known as the eternal city... the city of peace and a city of blessing. So we see here the journey of every man that is born upon the face of the earth that he starts in the city of blessing. He starts in innocence and he travels the road down to destruction... everyone of us. We don't have to make any apologies for speaking this way because it is for everyone of us.

On that journey somewhere (it doesn't say exactly where it happened because for everyone of us, it is a little different, but somewhere) we are intercepted by Satan. That is who the robber was. What does he do to us? He makes us aware of our mortality that we have no continuing city here . . . that we face a certain death, naturally and physically. We become aware as we become a little older to the age of reason that someday we have to depart from this life.

All of a sudden, life starts taking on a little different dimension and things become just a little more important. Maybe we being to entertain this question of eternal life and eternal death, and is there such a thing? If there is, how do I go about finding out and how do I go about acquiring eternal life? That is really the question we started with here.

When Satan meets us and intercepts us there on that road, for all practical purposes, in a spiritual sense, we are dead. In Ephesians 2, it says, "You hath He quickened," or made alive, "who were dead in trespasses and sins." Ephesians 2:1. Trespass means to cross over the line and sin means to miss the mark. So the Bible is very clear in all it's teachings.

It says as we go down this road, everyone of us, somewhere sooner or later we cross over the line and we miss the mark and that results in spiritual death. Then Satan has met us and he has robbed us of our innocence, of our hope, our joy, our peace and has left us with nothing.

Then we find priests and Levites, officers of the old law. All we find, simply stated -- we could spend hours on this -- but simply stated what we really find in the Bible what the law did was make us aware of our sin. There wasn't compassion in the law. There wasn't mercy. "The law was given by Moses, but grace and truth

came by Jesus Christ." John 1:17.

So we find these two officers of the law with no compassion and that is all the law tells us today. When we come to the age of accountability, we are convicted of our sins, we recognize that we are spiritually dead and in need of life, and when we take a look at the law of God, what do we see? All we see is how short we have come by the law: not the New Testament. We just see how short we have come. We see the commandments of God . . . we haven't kept them and all it was it really just adds further to our condemnation.

Then along comes this good Samaritan who is none other than our Lord Jesus Christ . . . God in human flesh and the man of supreme compassion. Remember we said that to feel in our heart some of the hurt and now we see Jesus hanging on the cross and in His own self bearing our sins, feeling our hurts. Here is compassion! Here is the good Samaritan!

We said the Samaritans were people who were looked down upon. We realize the life of Jesus Christ, born in a manger of poor parents, just a carpenter, no fancy home, no place to lay His head, and He was looked down upon. He was reviled and cast out. So we have a Samaritan and he journeyed.

It says before the foundation of the world, this was all laid out by God. So Jesus Christ began His journey long before the world was formed. It was known by God from eternity that Jesus Christ would pay the price.

As he journeyed, he came where he was. Where was he? He was laving on the dusty road between Jerusalem and Jericho on the face of the earth. Everyone of us who are God's children were found exactly in that place. Jesus Christ came to us . . . we didn't go to Him. We could not. We were dead and we didn't have any hope and that is grace. In one word, that is "grace"! He came where we were. Mind you, the humility and the condescension! He came and met us right there all naked and bloody and in the dirt.

What did He do? He had compassion and bound up his wounds and pouring in oil and wine. Oil is the symbol of the Holy Spirit. Wine is the symbol of the new life in Christ.

Binding up the wounds has such

teachings. It teaches us that the salvation of Christ is real. It is not a "band-aid" treatment, but when Jesus Christ meets us, in this position in our life were He finds us, that we are lost and without hope and He finds us laying there, He makes us spiritually well again.

He pours in the Holy Spirit and new life, and sets us on His own beast. He provides the conveyance. He doesn't turn us loose and say, "Now I fixed you up. You go find a good Bible-preaching, Bible-believing church where you are comfortable, and you worship there." He did not say that or do that here. He provided the conveyance. I am not inclined of any particular place now that he is going to bring. Understand that. But when the experience is real, that we meet Jesus Christ and He does the work that He did here. He will bring us to the right church.

What is the right church? Church is extremely important. It is the bride of Christ instituted by Christ. From the end of the Gospels on, the Bible has to do with the church.

What is the church? We find it very simply here. It is a place where Christ takes us and puts us under the care of the host and provides through the host those things that are needful and necessary for the complete restoration of this soul and provision from there on. Even to the point that He says, "When I come again . . . " So He doesn't leave us to wander. he found us when we were lost and He doesn't leave us to wander around. But He provides so wonderfully for us.

"Go, and do thou likewise." Luke 10:37. When we think of that, in no way can we save anyone? We are not implying that at all. Salvation is the work of the Lord. Salvation is OF the Lord. It is not found in any man and there is no name under heaven given whereby men must be saved except Christ. (See Acts 4:12.)

But when He says to us, "Go and do likewise," first of all, as we said, He means in the little things. We are to be true neighbors and to help those that just happened to be nearby us when they are in need.

But there is the deeper meaning that goes beyond that. What is the help that everybody needs? That is the help of salvation. As we said, we can't give that, but we can be workers

together with Him. That is the essential need of humanity today.

Just take a look and read through Scripture as we close, you will find several lists in the Scripture of things ... very serious things ... that simply say that when men do those things they shall not have eternal life. So much effort is spent today in just trying to convince people not to do certain things.

I think for a simple illustration that we can all understand, there is quite an uproar about certain movies, for example, that we find on the scene today. Certain philosophies of men and of life, the abortion issue I am thinking of. These things are foremost in many minds today. All kinds of energy is expended on how not to be involved in some of these things, what to do and what not to do, and that is all good.

But the real problem, as we read in the Bible, behind this is the problem of the heart of man. That's what the law did. It just said, "You really shouldn't do that . . . you really ought to do this." But when the good Samaritan came, he healed the man so that he wanted to do the right thing and he wanted to stay away from the wrong thing, and he gave him the ability and the strength to do just that.

That is the way we want to be helpful to others. We can be secondarily helpful in other issues . . . I am not saying that. But the few people. . . because it says, "Few there be that be on the narrow way." (See Matthew 7:14.) The few true Christians... the few true children of God that are on the earth today, we really ought to spend our time in the true Gospel, in being a true neighbor and that is to expound and exhort how that a person can be changed to be successful in these things. Not just remind each other what we should or should not do because when a person is truly converted, he just wants to do the right thing.

Why? Because he has the mind of Christ. He is a child of God and a brother to the Lord Jesus Christ. He is twice born. He is born again so he is a different person. That is the message we have to say and it is the most wonderful message that ever hit the earth. That is how to be a

neighbor one to another.

Who Is My Neighbor? Luke 10:25-37

There are so many teachings and so many ways to approach this. May we pause for just a moment and let the Spirit direct us.

The first verse we read was a question. It comes to my mind that in the Bible, questions are quite an interesting study. I've never really sat down and studied this, but just a few of them flash through my mind as I think of this. That's why I said that.

We notice a certain lawyer asked a question and he did it to tempt the Lord. So we may ask questions. The question he asked is good. That is really how we learn. It is perfectly alright to ask questions, and really we should. It denotes a certain amount of humility. Don't you agree? If we ask questions, we are admitting that we don't know and that we need to be taught. To ask questions is good, but we can have the wrong motive when we ask questions. Like we see here with this young lawyer.

Now going back more to the beginning, thinking of the questions of the Bible, here is a man's question, and the question really is of primary importance. For the motive, we will just let it up to everyone this morning to judge in our own heart. What is our motive if and when we ask this question? I would hope that it would be sincere

The questions is of utmost importance: "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Luke 10:25. This presupposes there is such a thing as eternal life... and there is! So if we ask that question not tempting, but sincerely, that means we recognize there is such a thing as eternal life... everlasting life!

If that is true, it must be true there is a counterpart . . . eternal death . . . everlasting death. That is the most important question that the human race has to resolve, and how thankful we ought to be that we have the answer in the Bible.

Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: and he that cometh to me, I will in no wise cast out." (See John 14:6 and John 6:37). There is the source of life and the promise that anyone who seeks sincerely will not be cast away, but will be able to find it, if his motive is right.

God asks some questions in the Bible. We go back to the beginning in the Book of Genesis, which means "beginnings," and we have there the seed for every doctrine in the Bible that further develops as we read the whole Bible. So very early, we find God is asking a question, and He is asking it to the man that He created, and He asked it after the man had sinned. What was the question? He said, "Adam, where art thou?" Genesis 3:9. Why did He ask that question? God knew where Adam was.

When God asks questions, it is not for His information, but it is to help us for our information. He asked Adam where he was, not that God could know where he was because He already knew, but to enable Adam to see where he was. Adam had fallen and he was hiding because he was ashamed because he had sinned. He had been disobedient.

So God said, "Where are you?" That has to do with eternal life because God said He told them before it happened that in the day they eat of that tree, they will die . . . they will

surely die.

So we have there a question of eternal life and eternal death.

It wasn't long after that, that another question was asked. God asked it again. This time he asked it to a man that had become a murderer. It didn't take very long after sin entered the world until things got real bad... real, real bad because that is the power of darkness and power of sin. You don't just hold a status quo when you are in the service of Satan. We might be able to do that for awhile and maintain a fairly moral life and be a good citizen and so forth, but really, if we look at it in the light of Scripture, it is a steady decline to sin.

Jesus said one time, "He that is not with me is against me." Matthew 1230. The decision has to be made.

Back to the question, God asked Cain, "Where is your brother?" (See Genesis 4:9). Now those two questions were very early in the Bible and they are very important. First, "Where are you?" and second, "Where is your brother?" God asked both questions and that is very important to us yet today.

I think God is still asking those questions of everyone. He asks us first, "Where are you?" Because we can't be interested in our brother until we are found of Him. First we have to see that we are lost. So He asks us where we are.

Once that question is resolved, we find where we are and when we find that out, we are going to find we are separated from God. That's what Adam found and that is what we will find, and have found. Then God will show
