We are grateful for the response from our plea for a teacher to serve, God willing, for a term of two years at our nursery and kindergarten school "Under the Vine" in Yamanashi Prefecture, Japan.

God continues to move hearts and to touch souls. Sis. Terri Gramm (Gridley, IL) has expressed a willingness to lend herself in this very important endeavor. She has the support of her shepherd and local congregation, has been interviewed by the Missionary Committee, and has received their unanimous support.

It is not easy to make this sacrifice, but we are confident God will bless Sis. Terri for her expression of love, and provide consolation to her family who obviously will miss her, not only because Japan is so far away, but also because of the length of time she possibly will be gone.

When I was first invited by the elders to go to Japan back in the 1950's, I shared with my father the distance factor, although the plans were to be gone only about a month. My father very thoughtfully and kindly reminded me that it was really not as far from home and family then as it was when his father, as a young man, accompanied Bro. Virkler from New York State to Oregon. That was one of the early missionary journeys our brethren in the United States took when the first church was established at Silverton, Oregon in 1879. My father's point was that although the distance was not as far back in those pioneer days, communication was much more difficult and the time factor greater than my trip to the Orient. It really caused me to think.

Those of us who have made the long journey to Japan understand the need of prayer and the blessings that follow when we, sent by the Lord through his church, are obedient. We commend Sis. Terri to the grace of God. We should be mindful of all our dear brethren who unselfishly lend themselves in these many important labors of love.

Sis. Kathy Kieser (Bradford, IL) is returning home after graciously serving and teaching the dear children in Japan for four years. We also deeply appreciate that Sis. Reneé Baurer has consented to remain in Japan for an additional year. This will certainly (alleviate the problems that would have been generated had both sisters left the school at the same time. We

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

"But godliness with contentment is great gain" (1 Tim. 6:6). The beautiful state of contentment is one of the highest goals of every human being. Though many exhortations and instructions are given on becoming godly, nowhere in the Bible does it tell specifically how to become more content. Contentment is not something individuals can simply produce themselves. Instead, if a soul wants to be content, he must exercise himself in godliness, pursuing the scriptural attributes of this great virtue.

First of all we must love the Word of God and make full use of its divine wisdom. "The testimony of the Lord is sure, making wise the simple. The statutes of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart: the commandment of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes" (Ps. 19:7-8). Another part of our growing in godliness is to practice humility. "For I say, through the grace given unto me, of every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith" (Rom. 12:3). This attribute of godliness is essential for inner peace. Satan would cause us to focus on a bit of pride. Further, discontent is often characterized by offense taking. Perhaps we have not been fairly dealt with and we feel hurt or mistreated. If we are striving for our rights or dwelling on what we deserve, we cannot be content. "Great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them" (Ps. 119:165).

Another important aspect of godliness is to "lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us . . ." (Heb. 12:1). We must pray earnestly for grace to acknowledge our errors and remove these weights. We need to say humbly to our Lord and to all, "I have failed, please forgive me and help me to do better. I need strength and courage and the grace of God to overcome." Likewise, we also need to forgive others. If we are harboring a grudge, we can

never be content (Jam. 5:9). "And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you" (Eph. 4:32).

We must learn to walk in unity. content in the fellowship wherein God has called us. This blending of hearts and nurturing of common beliefs is very important. The Apostle Paul writes: "walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called . endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:1,3). "Fulfill ye my joy, that ye be likeminded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind' (Phil. 2:2). If we focus on ourselves, our individual opinions, we do not contribute to the unity of the brotherhood. In such selfishness, we become more and more discontented with our lot. However, as we direct our prayers and actions toward the needs of the brethren, we become more godly and thus more content.

Being godly also requires that we be faithful, consistent and obedient. True faith is manifested by obedience to the Word of God. Employers look for consistency of effort and responsibility. We cannot rest on last year's or even yesterday's worthwhile performance. "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58).

We must also be aware of potential distractions to our contentment. Being jealous or covetous will definitely work to destroy our godliness. In Luke 12 the rich fool had his soul required of him. In 2 Timothy 3:2-5 the covetous are listed as people to turn away from. We are not to become distressed by looking on others and desiring to possess what they have. One of the surest ways to become discontent is to desire something that is not rightfully ours. How many of us are troubled with trying to be what we cannot and should not be? "Let your conversation be

without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have" (Heb. 13:5).

Desire for riches can be a great disadvantage to being content. In the Proverbs many verses remind us of this. "He that is greedy of gain troubleth his own house" (Prov. 15:27). "Better is a little with righteousness than great revenues without right" (Prov. 16:8). "A faithful man shall abound with blessings: but he that maketh haste to be rich shall not be innocent" (Prov. 28:20).

A desire for immediate gratification can also be a drawback and lead to restlessness. There is a splendid analogy in the Word: "Surely I have behaved and quieted myself, as a child that is weaned of his mother: my soul is even as a weaned child" (Ps. 131:2). Thus we must learn to be patient, allowing our souls to be as weaned, contented children, willing to wait on the Lord for our fulfillment. We must remember our peace is not dependent on circumstances. Despite life's pressures, frustrating situations, or perplexing decisions, we can be at peace; for we know our Lord is always present and has an unconditional love for us. Paul described one of the beautiful results of many of the lessons of his life: " for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content' (Phi. 4:11).

Contentment brings the great gain of peace, joy, happiness and fulfillment. There is inner abundance to be found for the believer in this life and even greater joy to be anticipated in eternity: "Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in Heaven" (Matt. 5:12). There is a natural desire in all of us to enjoy life. The only way to achieve this in its fullness is to practice all aspects of godliness, leading to contentment and great gain on both sides of the grave. Then we can experience true peace and even bring pleasure to our beloved Savior.

LOCAL WORLD RELIEF HARDSHIP Bro. Vernon Leman

Charity begins at home, therefore our helping needy brethren and friends, becomes a priority with our World Relief Organization. With God's help, we try to follow His guidelines and to love our neighbor as ourselves. The Bible gives us other exhortations as in Galatians we read, "as we have opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."

These needs were formerly taken care of through the Alms Fund in each church, however, because of the high cost of living and especially high doctor, hospital and medical bills, it became quite evident that it was proper for the World Relief Fund to help. The total of one yearly report, conference to conference, amounted to \$63,081.31 for one year. If local funds are insufficient to assist those in need, the local church's treasurer representative should, after consulting with the local church's elder, advice the nearest committee member. Then arrangements can be made to disburse money from the National World Relief Fund. In God's Word (Philippians 4:10) we read how the apostle Paul commends the Philippians for the contributing to his need, but ye lacked opportunity. So now the opportunity is provided to all the churches to help in this worthy cause through the World Relief Organization.

We solicit the help and prayers of all in this work and would especially encourage the treasurer representatives to forward any knowledge of such cases to the committee.

Our rule for giving, according to II Corinthians 9:7 reads, "Every man, according as he proposeth in his heart, so let his give, not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver.

It is with deep appreciation and esteem for the efforts of the Pioneer brethren who established the World Relief Committee that we acknowledge their efforts as directed by God to the establishment of this most worthy work. The many brothers and sisters also friends who have supported this work are to be commended to the Lord for His richest blessings. May God continue to place His hand

NEWS FROM EASTERN EUROPE Bro. Andy Hunyady Columbus, OH

Greetings Beloved:

On Tuesday, June 6, 1989, a 48 foot long by 8 1/2 foot wide mobile medical clinic was placed on public display at the Metro Center, in Dublin, OH, a Columbus suburb. The following inscription was painted on the entrance side in red letters:

"Donated to the People of Armenia By

the Citizens of Columbus, Ohio, the Cambridge Yerevan Society, the Apostolic Christian World Relief"

While on display, this event was given highly favorable publicity by the area TV, radio and newspapers. "Area residents contributed \$20,000 and the Hospital Association of Central Ohio provided \$6,000. The World Relief National Committee for the Apostolic Christian Church contributed \$20,000. An Armenian Society, called the Yerevan Society, based in Cambridge, MA, gave \$30,000 and will monitor the operation of the unit in Armenia," reported the Columbus dispatch.

In addition, the area hospitals donated a number of medical equipment and later, after similar public display in Cambridge, the Yerevan Society will fully equip the unit so it will be ready for operation when it arrives in Armenia.

It is an entirely self-contained unit, with two examining rooms, a laboratory, intake room, reception area and closets; electric generator, heating and cooling unit, etc . . . It can be easily moved from one area to another.

This clinic will serve the medical needs of infants and children in the Leninakan area, which was seriously devastated by the December earthquake.

After the unit is fully equipped and sealed, it will be transported from Philadelphia by a Soviet ship to Leningrad, and from there by special railroad car to Leninakan. The Soviet Government will assume the transportation costs.

It was reported that a long list of volunteer doctors have registered with the state department, who are willing to go and serve with the native medics. Dr. Carolann S. Najarian (Lincoln, MA), a native of Armenia, will serve as the co-ordinator of the project.

We solicit your support in praying that our brethren will respond to the Lord's call to fill this important position.

Letters of thanks were received from Dana Reinhart, Mayor of Columbus, and Dr. Thomas Helmrath, medical director for Riverside Methodist Hospital who served as chairman of the Mayor's Task Force on Armenian relief. I was invited to attend the committee meetings and each of the members were deeply impressed with the generous contribution made by the committee of the Apostolic Christian Church. May it all resound to the honor and glory of God, our heavenly Father and His Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ!

The arrival of food parcels sent to our beneficiaries in Romania is very erratic. According to latest reports, the families were required to pay duty, or tax of 175 Lei per parcel, which is the equivalent of U.S. \$22 -\$25. Most families are not able to pay such an amount. We were advised to send money vouchers instead, so they can buy whatever food is available from the government operated "dollar shops." Indeed, it is hard to believe, that a government can sink that low that it has no respect and concern for the welfare of its people. One brighter side of the picture is, that despite the religious persecutions and demolishing of churches, there is an increase in the number of those who attend worship services, and of new converts. The three elder brothers are in need of help in order to properly care for the spiritual needs of the church. They see an urgent need for additional elders.

"The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the Harvest, that He will send forth laborers into the harvest." (Matthew 9:37 - 38)

On Sunday, July 2, two brothers, 24 and 26, who fled from Romania, were baptized in the Budapest Church. Two Romanian elders from Yugoslavia assisted the local elder brothers in the baptismal ceremony. The parents of the two young brothers are living in Romania and are in the faith. Hungarian officials place the number of such refugees from Romania at about 30,000, most of whom are applying for emigration into one of the western countries. This process is very slow and it creates a heavy burden upon the Hungarians. Relief funds are being sent from many of the western countries to help these homeless people. The \$10,000 contributed by the World Relief Committee was received by the brethren in Budapest and channelled to the proper local agencies who look after the needs of the refugees.

In June, 1988, while visiting in Eastern Europe with Elder Bros. Ben Maibach and Wendell Gudeman and their dear wives, we had the opportunity to meet and get acquainted with Elder Bro. Peter Karcsa from the Ukraine, USSR, who was visiting in Hungary. During the week we travelled together and visited several cities and churches.

This past June, Bro. Karcsa and his dear wife, Sis. Ileana, came to visit friends and brethren in California, Ohio and Michigan. We also had the privilege to have them for a few days and so, we attended church services in Smithville, OH, on Wednesday evening, June 14. Next day, we travelled to Detroit, at the invitation of Bro. Ben and Sis. Lorene Maibach. Bro. Karcsa delivered the evening sermon through an interpreter. Immediately after the services, Bro. Peter spoke to us about the churches and conditions in his homeland and answered the several questions that was directed to him. On both evenings, the churches were filled with many brethren and friends attending from the area churches who came to hear and meet him.

This can be regarded as a historical event, for the first time ever, that an elder of our faith in the Soviet Union visited our churches in the United States. It is our regret, that his time was very limited and we could not visit other churches as we had hoped to.

While in Michigan, Bro. Karcsa had a meeting with the brethren from Windsor, Ontario, who are working on the translation and preparation for printing of the Zion's Harp Hymnal into the Ukrainian language. When printed, the books will be shipped to Austria and distribution into the Ukraine will be made from there as needed. This has been a monumental task, requiring a lot of time, hard work and some expense, which is worthy of our support through the mission fund.

We thank our God for His marvel-

ous love and ways He brings believers of like-faith together from far corners of the earth. Despite our differences in language or geographical locations, we find that there is oneness in the spirit and faith through Jesus Christ, our Lord!

On a canoeing trip to Sugar Creek, IN, with the Bible class, I learned a great deal. The most impressive lesson I learned dealt with the presence of evil. Let me explain. We had never canoed i any quickly-flowing water, so I had never realized the effects of the underlying rocks on the stream's current. we inexperienced canoers found out very soon that when there

were extra ripples, it meant a rock lurking underneath the surface. The churning bits of white-water indicated many rocks. We found it wise to avoid as many ripples as possible and to allow the water to maneuver us rapidly through the multiple-rock areas. The rocks, of course, seem symbolic of evil, and if one is alert, the rocks emanate warnings before one reaches them. The effects of evil, then can be foreseen, and contact with it avoided. And even if a situation does not seem to be "obvious evil" to us, we are prudent to stay away from it whether we see it ourselves or are warned by others. The rushing water was valuable in protecting us and our canoe from the rocks below as the Spirit of Living Water shields and guides us through the rocks that threaten to hurt us. His Spirit can help us so much. If we do hit a rock and it crinkles our canoe, He can help us straighten it out. If we work so hard, it turns out to be counter-productive, and we crash on the rocks. He will help us up from the rocky bottom. He alone can give us the humility to empty our canoe, get back in, and continue paddling (with His confidence). May we ever be watchful for hidden evils along the stream of life, for we don not know how much contact with rocks will ultimately founder a canoe, nor how much contact with evil could lead us into deadly difficulties. We are assured, however, that, although our canoes will not last forever, through our Lord and Savior, our canoes will get us to our destination of heaven.

Though this may sound un-Christian, sometimes it's reasonable to let another fellow know he's daydreaming on a green light with others stuck behind him. Thirdly, the horn can warn of danger, which was what originally concerned me. Spiritually, there are several ways to think of the horn. As the first example, think of the Spirit, day after day, working to get people's attention. Sometimes it needs to be pretty loud. And weren't we overwhelmed when we first came to church after we started repenting, to see the spiritual salutations of the brethren. Our ears had been opened. Again we who are spiritual are bound to sound the horn for any brother or sister the Lord brings to mind who might be wavering, floundering, or sinning. Lastly our brethren who speak the Word form the pulpit are to want us as specifically as possible of danger around us -- and we are in the midst of many downpours. May we be spiritually aware of the purposes of the horn, as it applies to the Spirit, to ourselves, and to our elders and ministers. May we sound the horn as it is appropriate in His name: may we always be willing to learn from the trumpet sound as well.

(Continued From Page 32) this good seed, the Word of God, in the hearts of men and that this planting shall also from time to time be watered. And then the master of the vineyard, He may also come, then, to add His blessing and increase. It is indeed the desire of every true servant that though he is only called to work as he might be able to do for the Lord, that the Lord might then come with bountiful increase.

Is it not true also here in your vicinity, how does it move the heart when we see that friends are yet moved by the Word of God and also brought into conviction where we see that the Word of God still has its power, as in times of old, and eventually has a way in the hearts and souls of upright people to the extent that they finally break down and say, "I too must repent," that the Kingdom of God has come nigh unto them and that they are now willing to let the Lord God work in their hearts to the extent that they come into conviction and judgment; and this judgment, dear friends, is only a bearable judgment. It is only for a short time that this soul, this heart, is afflicted. When He was tempted there in the desert, how did He say, even with the final statement there when He said, "Get Thee behind me Satan." We ourselves or many of us, I believe, have already been in

such trials and in such temptations that we just had to do the same as Jesus and speak out loud and say, "Get Thee behind me Satan," lest he would also have overpowered us and destroyed in us that which the Lord had brought. And remember, then, if we are called even into trials and tribulations and must often work out our soul's salvation with fear and trembling, that even those who have gone before likewise had to suffer.

We read how John the Baptist, one whom Jesus Himself recommended and spoke unto those people there in the land of Judea of this John the Baptist, what a prophet he was, but now here he had to give his life even where he was beheaded by those unrighteous people of old. And we are not called to bear so much; rather it is only a little that is asked of us, and we should indeed be willing to give the same for our Lord and for His name's sake. It is true, we have many examples in the Word of God which should encourage us.

We read of Joseph in the forereading, and Joseph was indeed an unfortunate lad, so to say, looking at it from the outward standpoint. Not knowing, perhaps, that God had so in mind that He would be led into Egypt to save those, even of the kindred of Jacob of old. And yet God had a purpose; but to Joseph, who had to live through these dark days, it must not have been so pleasant. Rather we find that when he came into Egypt. the Lord blessed him indeed, there in the house of Potiphar, but we find how that through evil reports he was put into prison. It must have been hard for Joseph to languish in prison, knowing that he was innocent and was falsely accused. But the Lord had not forsaken him; even in prison there we find that favor was granted him, and the Lord blessed him in his every work and endeavor. Now do we see the glorious deliverance of Joseph. Have we ever in our reading of history, or ever in the time that we have read of, heard of a man that in one day's time came from the depths of the prison, even out of a cell, unto the second in the kingdom? And yet God restored Joseph just that way, for one morning there was a morning when he was still in prison and by the time of evening we find that he was next to Pharaoh in the kingdom.

And now sometimes we often groan under the afflictions that often wish to depress us and to imprison us, and we think that perhaps we are of all people the most miserable and sign and groan even for relief. And then when we read how those men of old did suffer and willingly, without murmuring, it brings us to shame, does it not?

Then, therefore, dear ones, let us ever be willing to be of those who remember and to learn by the teachings which we have of the old patriarchs that also we might be, then, faithful and true in our calling. For we have indeed a high and a holy calling; but it is a nice calling, is it not? The Lord has called us to save us. It is not that we are laboring or putting forth an effort only for another; it is, then, for our own self, that wherein we labor faithfully and true, as servants of the Master, that will bring unto us a reward. For we do not only labor for the reward. Indeed, the good servant -- even as those whom we have when we hire laborers to assist us in our work -- we do not count that man that always talks and thinks of pay day as one that is a good servant, rather we love to see our help come in the morning with their sleeves rolled up and a brisk step and ask what they might do that day. Those men, then, we call good servants. How must it be with the Father in Heaven when He looks upon us here below and sees us as we are? Are we, then, of those who ask in the morning what is there to be done, Lord, or are we those who then would shirk our duty, or would be of those who hang back and only do that which we must? Let us consider these things. We speak not one to another to chide or rebuke but rather to remind each other of how things must be in the sight of the Lord God when He looks down here on earth to see those who are, and profess to be, His willing servants. And so may the Lord give us grace that when we begin the day, though it often seems dark and heavy unto us; many things often burden our hearts, those things which come over us in these the times that we live; indeed causes pain. Perhaps many of us have arisen in the morning hour and have thought we must face again the day, not knowing what we shall meet. Perhaps had been in heart heavy, but yet when we had fallen upon our knees and had prayed the Lord again that He might give us grace and strengthen, and how could we feel the nearness and the help of the Lord for that day.

And so we see our Lord is indeed merciful and kind, does for us and wishes to do for us only that which might ge good. But yet He wishes us to be faithful and true and to be deserving of His blessings. And so as we have Him on our side, so to say, then we will also seek to be of those who shall in faith, believing, work out their soul's salvation; and finally we shall also see how that He will lead us unto our full redemption -that day will surely come, it shall come -- and thus follow for all those who are called from this life and time.

We look upon those of our loved ones who have passed on before; we remember and think of their faithful life and their service to the Lord. Is there not a longing in every one of our hearts when we lay away such dear old souls, that we also might be found true and faithful, as we believe the have finished their course? And is it not true that, when we see our loved ones lying cold in death, it is a testimony unto everyone of us that we also should be up and doing and working for our Master. And they who have gone on before, they are now waiting for that day and time, also, when the Lord will give a just reward; and we know that they are waiting for us, we believe they are. Oh we often receive testimonies even in our own hearts that they are waiting there and longing for that time when we may be reunited. I recall one time being overseas and on returning home, word came that our loved ones were waiting in the harbor to welcome us back home; and so the thought came to me at that time, what a wonderful thing it must be for those who have reached that peaceful harbor and haven of rest, how they are now longing and waiting. And from time to time we surely get messages from them that they are waiting for us, and that encourages us and strengthens us.

And so may the Lord give us grace, then, to every good work, that we realize that it is important how we live here on earth, so that it might be well with our souls in all eternity.



SILVER LINING

SERMON BY RETIRED ELDER BRO. RUDOLPH GRAF OF AKRON, OH

Spoken in Roanoke, IL, on Sunday, February 24, 1946 'The Gospel of St. Mark - Chapter 6'

Dear brothers, sisters and friends, the way of our Lord Jesus while here on earth was not an easy one, as we have read, though He did much good among all who could use Him for such and who could believe in Him and unto that which He had come that He might do miracles and wonders among those who would heed and who would follow Him, or those who would gather when they heard that He was in their neighborhood. So, likewise, then there were such who ever and again would cast Him aside and cause that He would be mocked and also have to feel where He was unwelcome among men.

When we consider His mission on earth, how that the love of the Father in Heaven toward all mankind had so caused and brought about that the Father had decided that for an offering for an atonement of lost mankind that even Jesus, the Son of God, should now leave His right hand in the kingdom and majesty above and should come here upon earth to make that last bid, to seek and to save that which was lost. And yet when He came here, we find that He was not welcome, even to the extent, as we know, when He was born on earth, as it was the will of the Father that He not only be the Son of God but be also the Son of man born unto flesh and blood, even as we, so that He might also experience the life of living in the flesh here on earth. And when the proper time had come when He was now to make His appearance and we find there at Bethlehem, there was not even as much as a comfortable and a nice place or that wherein He might be born in, a house or under shelter as we were born, but rather had to be born there in a stable. Evidently, the purpose was that He should make the beginning here on earth in humblest of manner and fashion, to prove even unto mankind that through humbleness and by humility that man may also be near unto his God and receive the blessings from on high.

And though He had a start, as we read there in the early accounts of the Gospels, yet we find that soon He was about the business of His Father, doing that which He knew was His calling to do; and these, then, among whom He dwelt, even as a lad and in His youth, we find in these early verses of this chapter that He was not welcome. They looked down upon Him and said, "This is the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joseph," and said, "Do we not know His sisters that are here with us?" And they were offended in Him. We think of those folks there in His home town as very unthankful people, but we need not look far around about us 'til we see the very same type, where people become offended in our Lord and Saviour, even as though He were nothing and not to be cared or thought of, even as a Holy One. While too, we who have received and tasted of the grace which He offers and gives unto us, have known Him in His love and kindness toward all mankind, we respect and honor Him above all things. To us the Saviour is near and dear, and we should and do cherish Him as the most Holy One, the gift from the Father unto all mankind.

And so even though He could do no wonders and works among His own, He said that "A prophet is not

without honor, but in his own country and among his own kin." We find, though, that even among the children of God, converted and now believers in our Lord, they do appreciate their home servants; it is not even as Jesus had to suffer, that the ministers of the home churches must feel. Rather we do trust and honor, do we not, that those who are to be our leaders and those who serve us with the Gospel are brethren who have the welfare of our souls at heart; and then we as the children should also look up unto those of our fathers to honor and to respect and obey them in all. It is very important, dear brothers and sisters, that in this day and time that we live -- that we ever and again humble ourselves to the extent that we see the utter need that we are in, that we need counsel and advice from godly and wise men, who only work in that direction that it might be well with our every soul.

And may the Lord give us grace, then, that the work of true servants might not be in vain but rather that we might in faith, believing, seek to walk the straight and narrow way. Even as Jesus had to marvel here because of the unbelief, may it not be said of us in our time that we have not believed, but rather that we had believed and obeyed. Jesus sent out His servants to go even two by two as we read here and gave them power over unclean spirits. True, today it seems the servants of the Lord have not much of that power where we may go out then to heal unclean spirits as it were, but we have a mission and a calling and that is that we shall plant
